QUINN EVANS | ARCHITECTS has brought expertise in preservation and sustainability to university campuses, theaters, government buildings, museums, churches and historic park settings across the country. By Kim A. O'Connell

n a city as crowded with classical masterpieces as Washington, DC, one can easily overlook the National Academy of Sciences building, designed by Bertram Grosvenor Goodhue and built in 1924. Located near the Lincoln Memorial on the western end of the city's Constitution Avenue, it lacks the grand columns that characterize nearly every other classical building in the city. Yet this is a monumental structure of "extreme simplicity and refinement," as noted scientist and academy leader George Ellery Hale once wrote, marked by beautiful details and metalwork. For the better part of a century, the building has served as the headquarters for groundbreaking research in science and technology. Today, that tradition continues in a comprehensive renovation that will showcase both state-of-the-art preservation treatments and sustainable design technologies – the perfect kind of project for its designers, QUINN EVANS | ARCHITECTS.

Celebrating its 25th anniversary this year, Quinn Evans has developed a diverse portfolio of projects in historic preservation, interior design, new architecture and master planning. Since its inception, the firm has operated out of two full-service offices in Washington, DC, and Ann Arbor, MI, – which has provided opportunities to work on nationally significant landmarks such as the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington and the historic City Hall in Miwaukee, WI, as well as regionally significant projects such as the Crooked Tree Arts Center in Petoskey, MI, and the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum in St. Michaels, MD. In the last decade and a half, the firm has also become a leader in the sustainable preservation movement, developing innovative strategies for updating historic buildings with state-of-theart green products and systems.

"We want our work to respect its cultural heritage," says Michael Quinn, FAIA, the firm's president and cofounder. "We strive to recognize heritage, express it and build on it. As a group of professionals, we have a social commitment that we try to express in our work. We want each of our projects to help stabilize and enhance its community and serve future needs." At the National Academy of Sciences, the firm is transforming what has historically been a private and insular forum for academy members into a more welcoming venue that will include the public at its events and meetings.

In addition to restoring the historic 132,000-sq.ft. building, the firm is creating two new 100-person conference facilities to house day-long scientific panel discussions by world-renowned scientists. The project will enclose two open-air court-yards to create additional interior atrium space for breakout sessions and other gatherings. These new spaces will incorporate significant daylighting as part of an overall sustainable design scheme. "This is very much about taking this building and giving it a purpose to continue on in the future," says Larry Barr, AIA, a vice president of the firm. "It's about the traditional preservation of original fabric as well as a major sustainable redesign."

Quinn Evans has performed this kind of balancing act – between restoration and new design, between one period of history and another, and between sometimes competing agendas – in many other projects.

### A Professional, Collaborative Team

On a bright morning this spring, Michael Quinn was narrating a slideshow of the firm's past and current projects in its Washington, DC, office. Advancing from frame to frame, he spoke as passionately about the small, unassuming preservation projects as he did about the large, high-profile ones – lingering, for example, over a 19th-century Midwestern grist mill that the firm had restored. "We are probably better known for our large institutional projects," he says. "But we actually love both big and little projects. On the small projects you get to really practice your craft. When we started Quinn Evans, we didn't have an ambition to be large; we just wanted to be big enough to do any project that inspired us. And we wanted to build a professional, collaborative team that stayed together. That's a very important part of who we are."

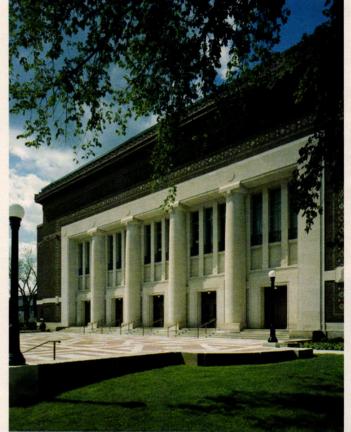
Quinn's future in architecture was not always assured. Quinn had started architecture school in the 1960s but was not impressed by the architecture of the time. After earning an undergraduate degree in zoology, he entered the Peace Corps and worked on cultural heritage preservation in Barbados. Inspired, he went back to school and earned a master of architecture degree from the University of Michigan. In 1974, he joined Preservation/Urban Design/Inc. led by preservation architect Richard C. Frank, FAIA. There, David Evans joined forces with Quinn and they developed their skills in renovation and reuse in various cities, culminating with projects such as the renovation of the Old Post Office Building and the Smithsonian Arts and Industries museum in Washington.

After ten years at that firm, Quinn and Evans formed their own practice in

1984 – establishing the two-office system from the beginning. Quinn, who today oversees work in both offices, says he has always found living and working in two regions an enriching experience that has informed his work. "In 1984, in a similar recession to today, we were lucky that our personal resumes brought in work at both locations," Quinn says. "Since then we've evolved from a team of two to 65 people, pretty equally divided between the two locations. And we recently opened a satellite office in Madison, WI."

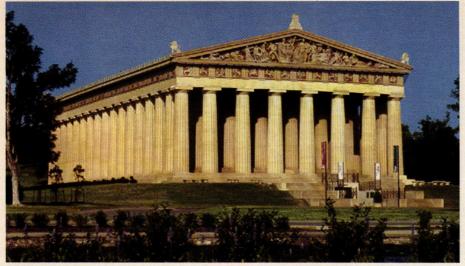
In addition to Quinn and Barr, the firm's principals include Steven Jones, AIA, a vice president in the Ann Arbor office, who directs cultural stewardship projects with the National Park Service; Kenneth Clein, AIA, LEED AP, who specializes in both civic and university projects; William Drewer, AIA, LEED AP, a leader in context-sensitive design and museum projects; Carl Elefante, FAIA, LEED AP, director of sustainable design; Elisabeth Knibbe, FAIA, who has extensive experience in community revitalization and historic tax credit projects; Jeffrey Luker, AIA, LEED AP, who manages federal building modernization work and is currently focused on renewal of urban k-12 schools projects; Baird Smith, FAIA, FAPT, director of conservation in the Washington

office who is currently managing the restoration of DC's historic Eastern Market following a devastating fire; and Ilene Tyler, FAIA, FAPT, LEED AP, director of conservation in the Ann Arbor office, who brings leadership in monument conservation and ecclesiastical renovation projects. (Sadly, David Evans, FAIA, passed away in 1998, prompting the Michigan Architectural Foundation to write in an obituary that Evans' presence "is felt in dozens of small towns and a few important urban centers where his meticulously restored monuments stand.")

Although the firm's projects vary widely, they are united by a desire to serve constituent communities through reuse and transformation of existing community resources. For example, the firm has worked on more than 50 museums and cultural facilities, including such disparate places as Frank Lloyd Wright's Pope-Leighey House in Alexandria, VA.; the Ulysses S. Grant home in St. Louis, MO; and the Parthenon in Nashville, TN. Performing arts work ranges from the Kennedy Center to the Civic Theater Renovation in Grand Rapids, MI. The firm has completed major projects on 15 university campuses, ranging from master planning to specific building rehabilitations including the renovation of the Christopher Wren Building at the College of William and Mary and expansion of the Peabody Music Conservatory for John Hopkins University. Visitor centers, government facilities, religious buildings, and primary and secondary schools are all major sectors of the practice as well.

At the Michigan State Capitol in Lansing, for example, an 1878 structure with a massive dome and spire, the firm directed a complete restoration of the exterior as well as the ornate Governor's Wing. Like many repurposed office buildings, the Governor's Wing had been altered over time by dropped ceilings, inappropriate paint jobs and obscured architectural features. In addition to restoring the wing to its Victorian experience, the firm was able to sensitively introduce updated communications and mechanical systems.

At the Kennedy Center, where the firm has worked since 1992, Quinn Evans has been engaged in restorations or renovations of all of the center's renowned performance halls. It was designed by the Modernist Edward Durell Stone (although critics have always pointed out the stripped-down quasi-classicism of the façade). The three main halls of the Kennedy Center each have a distinct character, such as the floor-to-ceiling-red Opera House.

The firm endeavored to maintain these distinctions even while making some dramatic changes, such as a more decorative proscenium arch and expanded balconies in the center's Eisenhower Theater. "I like to think that we've shown measured respect for Stone," says Quinn, "but that we haven't been afraid to show some creativity and bring some theatrical experience back into these spaces where it was lacking." Quinn credits the firm's work at the Kennedy Center for informing an exquisite transformation and restoration of the Hill Auditorium at the University of Michigan, a 1913 Neoclassical structure with a striking parabolic ceiling.

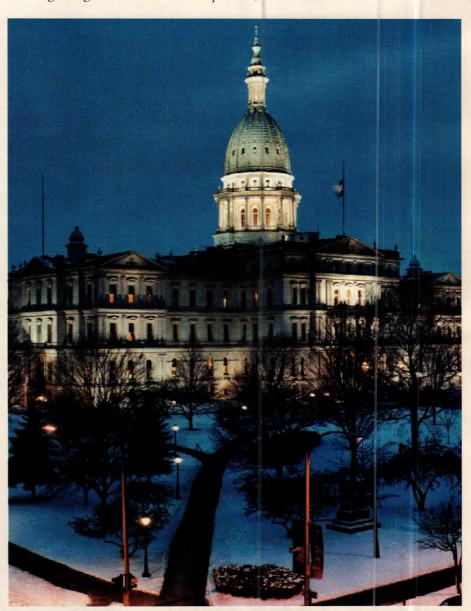
Another Neoclassical building, Nashville's Parthenon museum, was in dire straits by the time the firm was engaged to do a complete restoration. Built in 1897 as a temporary structure for the Tennessee Centennial Exposition, the Parthenon was reconstructed in the 1920s in more permanent concrete and is a full-scale replica of its ancient counterpart in Athens. By the late 1980s, however, leaking, corrosion, and concrete failure had become major problems.

The ten-year restoration entailed meticulous materials conservation and replication of pediment figures and ornamental details, taking care to match the original aggregate concrete construction. The site will be a featured field tour at this fall's National Preservation Conference. "We made a lot of field decisions there, and it seems to be working," says Ilene Tyler. "It's the featured building in a wonderful urban park." (See *Traditional Building*, October 2002, page 58.)

### Green and Groundbreaking

In the last couple of years, a slogan of sorts has arisen in the preservation field, appearing in articles and blogs and presentations and PowerPoints. "The greenest building," the saying goes, "is one that's already built" – which a growing body of research has proven true in terms of retaining embodied energy, the inherent energy-efficiency of traditional materials, and resource conservation. That oft-repeated phrase has been attributed to Carl Elefante, who wrote an article on the subject in the National Trust for Historic Preservation's *Forum Journal* in 2007. For the past 13 years, Elefante has led Quinn Evans' growing sustainable design sector, with a particular focus on green restoration.

The first major sustainable preservation project for the firm (and among the first nationwide) was the renovation of the S.T. Dana Building for the School of Natural Resources and Environment at the University of Michigan Working with William McDonough + Partners, Quinn Evans added 35,000 square feet to the 100-year-old building, with an enclosed courtyard and a new fifth floor under exposed steel trusses and an extensive skylight roof. It was important that the building be a showcase for its sustainable interventions, Elefante says, including daylighting, natural ventilation, recycled-content materials, composting toilets and an innovative radiant-cooling ceiling panel system. The project also reused the building's original fabric wherever possible, rather than send it to the landfill:

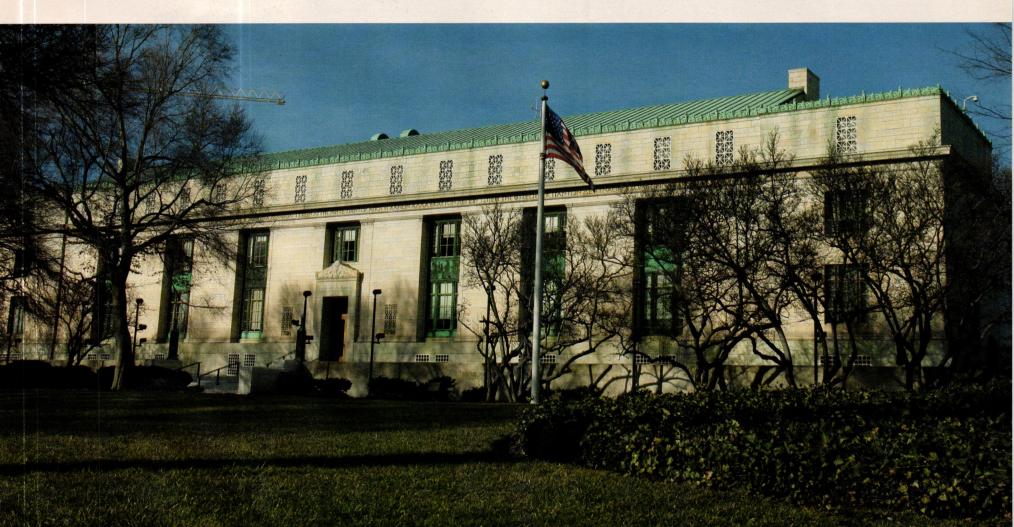

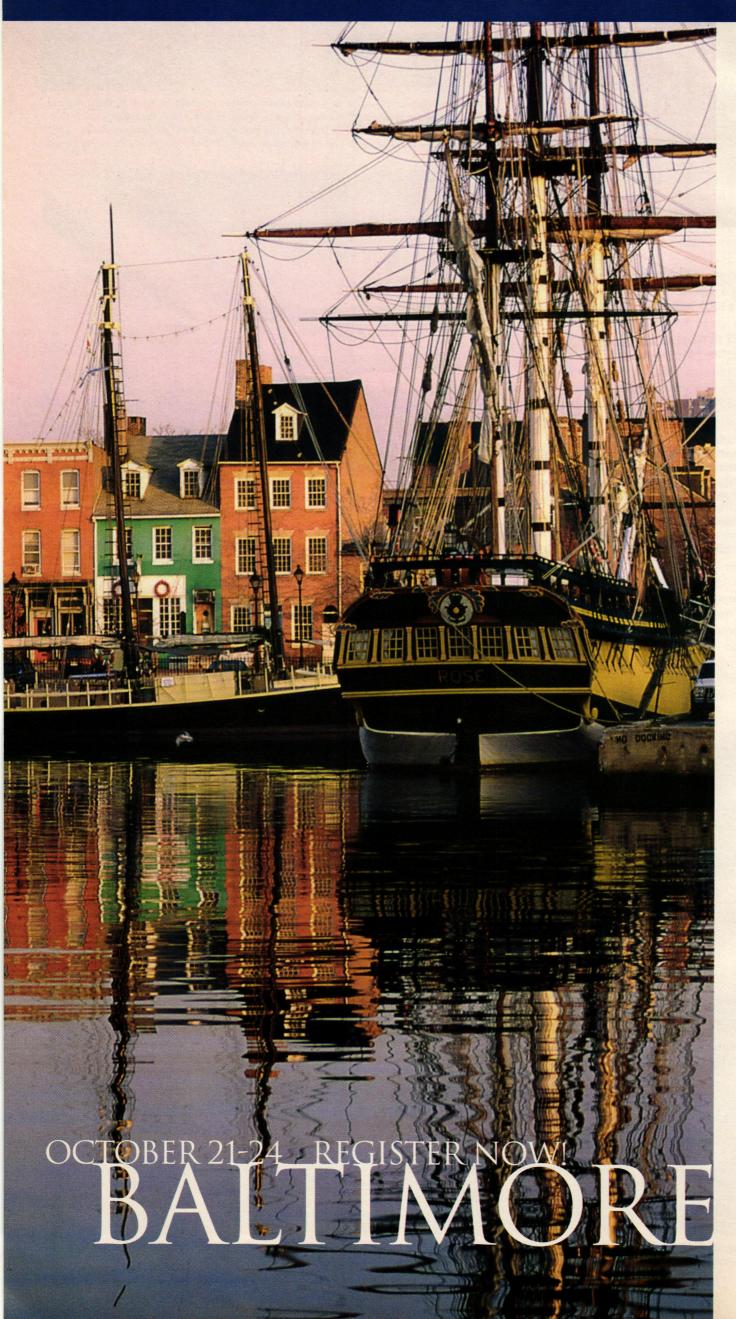

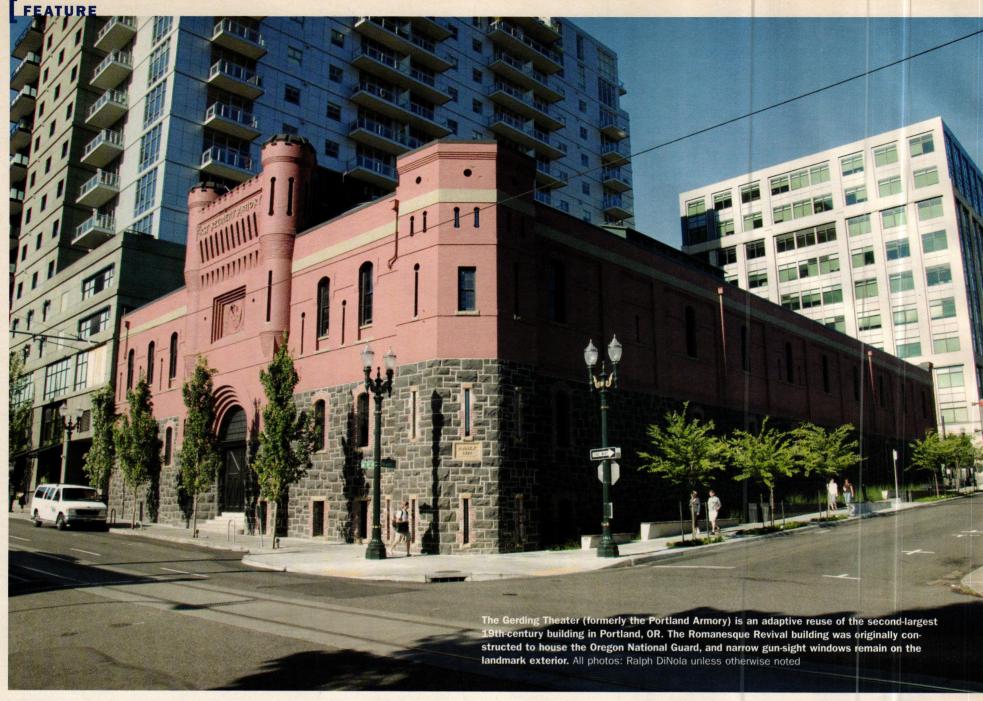

# Enduring Partnerships

Historic preservation and green building have more in common than originally thought, as shown by these restoration projects in Portland, OR. By Ralph DiNola, Associate AIA, LEED AP

conomic and environmental concerns have turned the nation's attention to our existing building stock. The economic climate has investors less willing and able to make large capital investments in new construction, and the immense impact that existing buildings have on climate change has fueled a surge of improvements. With more than one million historic buildings recognized by federal and local governments, these structures are primed to be major players in today's market. Sustainably rehabilitating these landmarks will ensure that they not only stand as testaments of our past but responsibly serve future generations.

# One Size Does Not Fit All

There has been a perceived conflict between green building and historic preservation. Some believe that historic buildings cannot be sustainable because they are not energy efficient, require significant labor-intensive maintenance and, more specifically, preclude urban areas from increasing density. Historic preservationists are concerned that meeting energy efficiency requirements will destroy the historic building fabric and dictate the replacement of historic windows. But the intersection of historic preservation and green building does not have a prescribed set of rules. There are many different levels where the two can meet to achieve the aims of each movement. The key is to implement an integrated process from the outset. Three historic renovations in Portland, OR, that earned LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification from the U.S. Green Building Council demonstrate successful results from approaching each project on its own terms.

# Ripple Effect

The Gerding Theater in the historic 1891 Portland Armory building attained a LEED Platinum award – the highest possible level of certification – for its sustainable rehabilitation. Situated in an emerging affluent urban district, the building was part of the five-block Brewery Blocks redevelopment, a portion of which sold for the highest value per square foot in Oregon's history. The major redevelopment was a pivotal feature in transforming the Pearl District into a vibrant, 24-hour community.

The Gerding Theater was an adaptive reuse project that took a vacant building on the National Register of Historic Places and made it the new home of Portland Center Stage. Incentives were key to the project's success. Historic and energy efficiency tax credits allowed the public/private partnership development

team to leverage their investment in the \$36.1 million project. Approximately 46 percent of the construction cost will be recovered through incentives. By carefully maintaining the rich historic character of the building, the project garnered federal Historic Tax Credits, and the receipt of New Markets Tax Credits further enhanced project financing.

The White Stag Block development in Portland, OR, by Venerable Properties, combined rehabilitating original double-hung windows and replacing damaged steel sash windows. The replacement windows provide better thermal performance, solar heat gain control and acoustical attenuation on the south side of the building adjacent to Burnside Street.

Inside the castle-like exterior of the Romanesque Revival-style armory building, the rehabilitation emphasizes character-defining historic elements such as enormous bowstring lattice trusses spanning overhead and an exposed brick interior.

Making the 55,000-sq.ft. building into a state-of-the-art 600-seat theater demanded tremendous effort and intense collaboration. Communication and coordination with local, state and federal preservation agencies was essential. Engaging the authorities early and often throughout the design and

construction process ensured that they understood the goals and worked to generate solutions that satisfied their concerns while meeting the project intent and earning the desired incentives.

Advanced computational fluid dynamics computer modeling was used to identify the most effective energy efficient systems, and the project incorporated innovative green building technology. A displacement ventilation system brings fresh air into the lobby and auditorium. Radiant floors in the lobby keep the voluminous space comfortable. Offices tucked under the roof plane receive natural light from skylights and chilled beams provide heating and cooling. From an energy standpoint, the project achieved 30 percent energy savings compared to ASHRAE 90.1 – 1999. Roof rainwater is collected in a 10,000-gal. subterranean cistern for reuse in plumbing. Combined with water-efficient fixtures, the project realized an 88 percent water saving. Site storm water is captured and diverted into storm water planters.

A public amenity in every sense, the Gerding Theater brings new vibrancy to the district, offers a living educational example of green features, and remains a beautiful historic landmark for citizens and visitors. The high-profile facility dramatically enhanced attendance at Portland Center Stage performances, which improves the theater company's bottom line and offers the city a new space for cultural interaction.

# A Little Persuasion

Portland's Venerable Properties has been in the business of breathing new life back into Portland's historic buildings since 1991. The concept of preservation itself is a sustainable one, as new materials, products and buildings require tremendous resources and energy to extract, transport, manufacture, install and dispose of at the end of their useful life. In addition to repairing buildings rather than replacing them, Venerable incorporates green features in their projects to save energy

costs and minimize environmental impacts. The three-building White Stag Block redevelopment, however, raised the company's interest in sustainability to a new level, and the renovation of the late-Victorian mill construction project earned a LEED Gold certification.

Venerable's Historic Preservation Specialist Jessica Engeman says that the project's anchor tenant, the University of Oregon, pushed its green building measures. "Going the extra mile for LEED Gold was really a tenant-driven exercise. Financially, it wasn't a risk we were going to take on our own. Because the University of Oregon was willing to help shoulder some of the added costs, LEED Gold became a reality for this project," explains Engeman. "We also realized that we could create synergy by attracting tenants with a building that expressed their values. We found that we were able to deliver a product that was not only sustainable but truly marketable."

The original construction cost, including the majority of the build-out for the University of Oregon, was roughly \$168 per square foot. The 137,000-sq.ft. project utilized both New Markets Tax Credits and Historic Tax Credits to assist with financing.

Through a combination of reuse, salvage and recycling, 98 percent of construction and demolition waste was diverted from the landfill. Rainwater from the roof area of the development is filtered and reused in toilets and urinals fitted with low-flow fixtures to lower the project's water use by more than 85 percent. The development includes energy-efficient heating and lighting systems to minimize electricity loads. Green housekeeping practices will protect indoor air quality and tenants are encouraged to utilize green practices in their tenant improvement projects.

From an historic perspective, the project showcases the buildings' high ceilings, cast-iron columns and exposed brick walls. Typical of many historic buildings, a light well was an original design feature at the block's center to bring daylight into interior spaces. The renovation added a glass cover over the light well to create a

usable light court, and two original saw-tooth light monitors were restored, providing architecture students in the university's studio below a real-life example of daylighting and natural ventilation.

# Off the Shelf

It's true that green building technology has made great strides, but many of the most progressive sustainable redevelopments use standard building technologies in thoughtful applications. The first historic building in the nation to receive a LEED Gold certification was the Jean Vollum Natural Capital Center, The Ecotrust Building, Portland, OR. The renovation of this 1895 structure used daylighting, a zone-controlled mechanical system, and operable workspace windows for energy efficiency. A vegetated roof, bioswales and storm-water planters prevent rainwater runoff.

Another project that used standard building technologies is the American Institute of Architects Portland Center for Architecture. It is on track to receive LEED Platinum certification. Four split-system air conditioning units support a natural ventilation system to maintain set-point temperatures, and daylight dimming controls conserve energy. A cistern captures rainwater for sewage conveyance and irrigation.

# Ahead of the Game

In 2002, when the green building movement was still relatively new, THA Architecture decided to move its offices. As a firm that promoted sustainable design and construction to its clients, THA recognized that a new workspace provided the opportunity to set an example. The firm teamed with a contractor to redevelop, own and occupy

the 1913 Balfour-Guthrie building, an attractive 20th-century American Renaissance style warehouse that had been waiting for inspiration.

By making intelligent use of simple applications, the team achieved a high performance building that enhanced the historic elements. Capitalizing on the light from large windows facing north, west and south, THA cut out a large section of the first floor to create an open stairwell "atrium," allowing daylight to cascade to the basement level.

Because the team worked to place the building on the National Register concurrent with the design effort, THA installed storm windows on the inside of the historic double-hung sash windows. The storm windows are removable, so employees can access the operable windows in the summer months for natural ventilation. The passive daylighting and ventilation strategies combine with a high-efficiency, low-cost residential HVAC system to lower energy use.

Initial modeling predicted the building would perform 25 percent better than code, but actual analysis after it had been occupied for three years showed that the energy use is 40 percent less than code baseline.

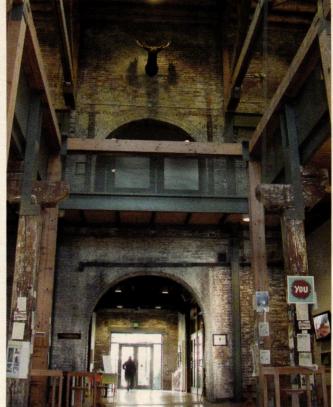
The renovation cost \$83 per square foot (in 2002 dollars). In the original project pro-forma, costs related to achieving LEED certification were revenue neutral because of the many financial incentives offered by the city and the state, but the cost of the project increased, including the costs related to sustainable measures.

"It was a pivotal moment," says Jonah Cohen, principal at THA Architecture. "In the end, the four principals, who were also the building owners, took a deep breath and decided to get an additional loan from the U.S. Department of Energy to make up the difference. While it wasn't an easy decision, we felt we had to practice what we had been preaching to our clients and this was very important to us as individuals and as a company."

The Balfour-Guthrie received a LEED Silver award, and Cohen says that by owning and occupying the building, THA has consistently reaped the benefits of low utility bills.

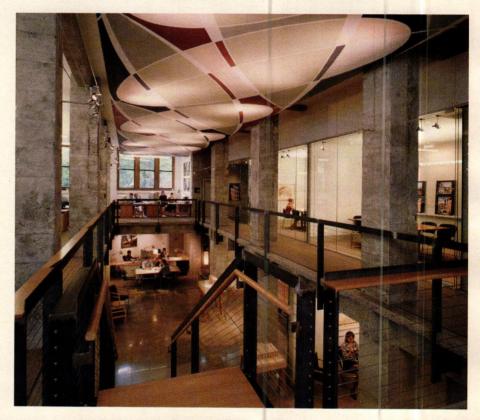
Because many historic buildings were constructed at a time when electric lighting and air conditioning didn't exist, they already have many inherently sustainable qualities. Often, many of the original green building features have been obscured by insensitive renovations over the years. Restoring these features and integrating them with innovative sustainable strategies brings out the best in these treasures. When historic preservationists and green building advocates join forces, the partnerships result in more than better buildings, they elevate communities and create value for the future. TB

# 2009 PALLADIO AWARDS

# For Excellence in Traditional Commercial, Institutional & Public Architecture

Sponsored by Traditional Building and Period Homes magazines and the Traditional Building Exhibition and Conference

The eighth annual Palladio Awards competition has recognized 11 architectural firms for outstanding work in traditional design for commercial, institutional, public and residential projects. # THE PALLADIUM

The Palladium is the cast-bronze trophy

awarded each year to the winning firms in the Palladio Awards design competition. The trophy is based on a motif that has been in continual use as an architectural enrichment for more than 2,500 years: the Greek anthemion. The anthemion, a highly stylized version of the Greek honeysuckle or palmette plant, has been used through the centuries to decorate everything from the Parthenon to contemporary classically influenced furniture.

The trophies for the Palladio Awards program are created by

Historical Arts & Casting, Inc., of West Jordan, UT. The firm's design studio took the traditional anthemion form and adapted it to create a new ceremonial sculptural shape. The Palladium trophies were then cast from the model in architectural bronze using the traditional lost-wax method.

In creating the Palladium, the artisans at Historical Arts & Casting, Inc. have exemplified the basic goals of the Palladio Awards program: They've given us a dramatic example of how historic forms can be adapted and used to create beauty in the modern world.

# Base Principles

hough its earthquakes are rarely of the magnitudes that make headlines, the state of Utah is a seismically active area. Since 1850, an estimated 35 "events" have occurred in the region, and while they follow no pattern, geological surveys of Utah suggest that those of magnitude 6.5-7.5 occur, on average, once every 50 to 150 years; magnitude 5-6.5 once every 10 to 50 years; and magnitude 5.0 every four years. History has taught us to fear strong earthquakes, the kinds that periodically reduce cities to rubble in a matter of minutes, and with such brutality that they were once believed to be the wrath of an angry god. However, the damage inflicted on structures by smaller seismic shifts is still considerable, if less dramatic, not least because it impedes their ability to withstand "the big one," whenever it may next arrive. And as we can no more predict an earthquake than prevent one, it pays to assume the worst.

Such was the thinking behind Capitol Restoration Group's (CRG) recent seismic upgrade and full exterior and interior restoration of the historic Utah State Capitol (1915) in Salt Lake City (see *Traditional Building*, April 18, 2008, page 18). CRG – an association of VCBO Architecture and MJSA Architecture, both of Salt Lake City, and Schooley Caldwell Associates of Columbus, OH – was formed in 2002 for the project, with the primary goals of improving life safety and efficiency, and preserving and restoring the building's historic architectural integrity.

The 320,000-sq.ft. concrete-framed, granite-clad capitol was suffering from years of structural deterioration and modifications that had obscured the original floorplan and left the mechanical and electrical systems behind the times. Seismic investigations revealed the urgent need for upgrades; of chief concern were the rotunda and dome, the top of which was projected to displace at least 20 inches in a 7.2 seismic event. "In doing so it would probably have collapsed," says Robert Pett, AIA, president of MJSA and lead design architect.

To improve seismic safety, CRG selected a base isolation strategy that had previously been employed at the City Council Building in Salt Lake City (in 1987, it became the very first historic building in the world to undergo the process). Essentially, base isolation detaches the structure from the ground, limiting the transfer of motion. "The capitol is very well-built but very rigid," says Pett. "We needed to find a means of strengthening the building so that when the earth moves, the building moves at a different frequency. The goal was based on life safety, but there would be damage to the building, repairs would be required after. The purpose was to make sure that there wouldn't be structural failure, and people would be able to evacuate safely."

The building foundation was completely replaced and the soil was reinforced with 3,000 individual micropiles before 265 base isolators and 15 Teflon sliders were installed under 280 of the capitol's 380 concrete columns. Made of steel and rubber with an energy-dissipating lead core, the isolators are cylindrical in shape and range from 34-44 in. in diameter. During an earthquake, they stretch into an oblique shape in any horizontal direction, reducing the impact of seismic forces on the structure above.

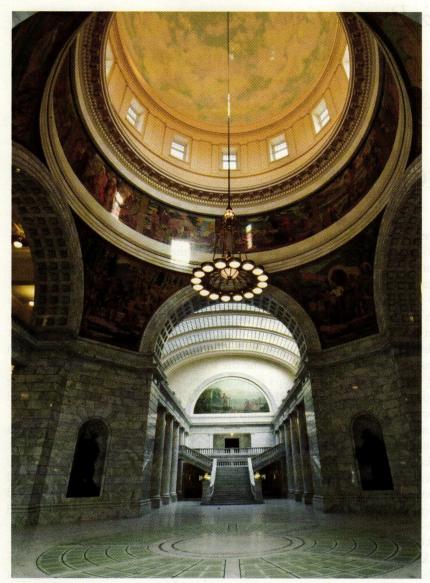
The selected columns were cut off below new five ft. wide load transfer beams, and the isolators lifted into place while temporary loading jacks provided additional support. As the construction process made the building extra vulnerable, time was of the essence. "The most dangerous time was when some of the building was on isolators and some was not," says Pett. "These isolators were locked – they couldn't wiggle. Once everything was in place, they were unlocked in a very short period of time. But, when some of the foundations were removed, and some columns were on base isolation and some were not, there was a disparity of structure that would have made a seismic event very dangerous."





The Utah State Capitol in Salt Lake City recently underwent a seismic upgrade and full exterior and interior restoration by Capitol Restoration Group (CRG). Above ground, steel straps embedded in the floors absorb horizontal forces, and strategically placed shear interior and exterior walls resist the lateral load. "Except in spaces that were highly historic, the exterior wall actually got thicker," says Pett. "And around the interior of the rotunda, just below the dome, we added another layer of gunite to strengthen the concrete, which was very, very weak - in some areas it was no stronger than chalk. That too would have crumbled in a seismic event."

While the base isolation work continued, a host of subcontractors worked on the capitol's systems upgrades and interior and exterior restoration. Of principal concern was the loss of public space over the years, which in turn had obscured natural daylighting schemes and historic fabric. Among the many modifications to the original floorplan was the division of the original boardroom to make room for a governor's office and the accommodation of many small committee and hearing rooms, which had closed in the auxiliary corridors, originally designed to open to windows on every floor.

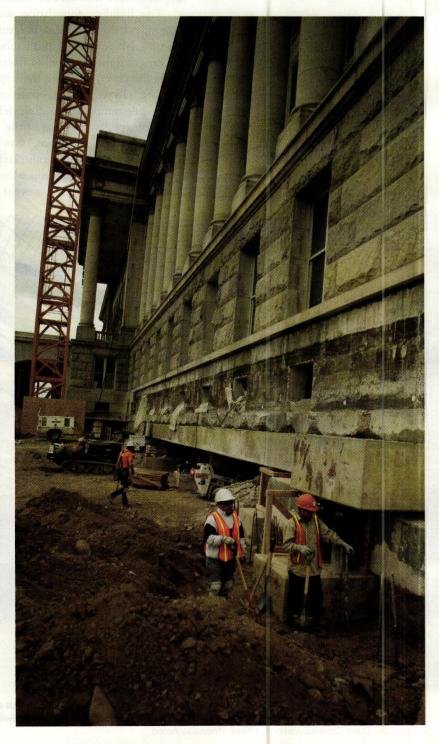
"Government functioned differently when the capitol was originally built," says Pett. "But as departments grew, they took space from what was originally designed to be exhibit space and grand public space. Those remodels were destructive, not merely in the loss of space, but in that ceilings were removed, lay-in ceilings were added and mechanical and electrical systems were added in a way that interrupted the natural spaces."

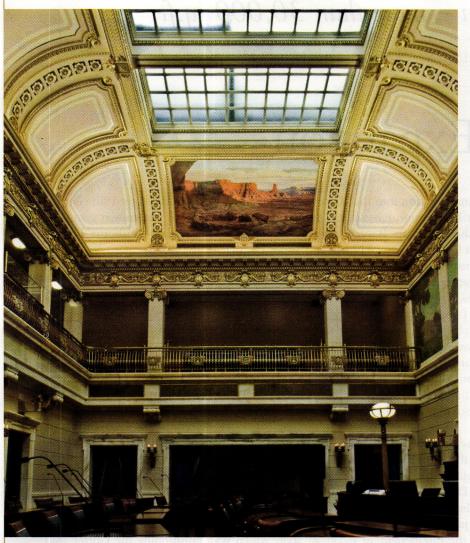
CRG restored the public space to the historic floorplan, removing all non-historic intrusions and allowing natural light to reach the center once again. Drop ceilings were stripped out, modern metal windows were replaced with historically accurate wood windows, and new HVAC and smoke detection systems were run vertically between concrete wall spaces. A physical heating plant was built at a separate location on the site, providing heat and hot water for the building complex, and mechanical equipment was concealed in the attic and the new basement.

"The basement fed the first and second floors, and the attic fed the third and fourth," says Pett. "We were able to do everything vertically rather than horizontally. In some places we thickened walls, but only where they separated offices. And of course, everything was brought up to accessible and ADA required codes."

More than 8,000 sq.ft. of historic patterned glazing in laylights above the atria and chambers was replicated, restored and anchored. The unique shingle-system appeared to be failing, and would certainly have been dangerous in a seismic event. "The pieces of glass measured around 2 ft. by 16 in. and were held in a very large steel frame," says Pett. "The biggest issue for the building officials was that in a seismic event, the glass and frames would start to rack. We took measures to strengthen the frame, but also fastened the glass to the frame with small clips."

The daylighting scheme was further transformed by the restoration of the rotunda floorlight. Previously, the original cast-glass floor had been removed - possibly for safety reasons - and replaced with green terrazzo.

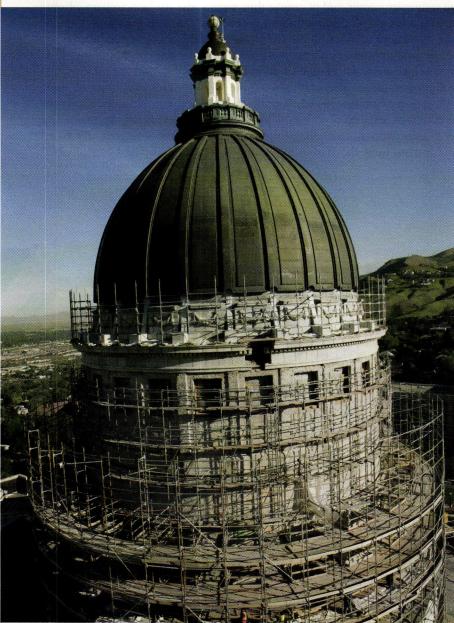




The restored Senate Chamber includes a restored laylight, restored plasterwork, a replicated stencil in the coved ceiling and a restored historic mural.

However, the steel frame remained and was structurally augmented for the new multi-layered laminated fritted glass, which filters light all the way down to the first floor.

As work on the capitol was carried out in quadrants, the interior restoration began in each area as soon as significant structural upgrades were completed. Early on, Restoration Associates of Park City, UT, was engaged to analyze and document the original historic paint schemes. Evergreene Paint Studios of New York City restored all decorative plaster

elements, walls, ceilings and other surfaces, and uncovered and restored historic painted stencils in the process. Archival records proved invaluable in determining historic painting, fabric patterns and lighting schemes; historic lighting fixtures were beautifully restored and replicated by Rambusch Lighting Company of Jersey City, NJ. Finally, modern carpets were manufactured to recreate the originals seen in historic photographs.

Original drawings of the capitol by architect Richard K.A. Kletting showed a large terrace surrounding the building at grade and indicated that the rotunda drum would be constructed of granite. However, both ideas were sacrificed due to soaring construction costs; the terrace was never built and the rotunda was downgraded to terra cotta and finally plaster, painted and detailed to look like stone. CRG's restoration expressed the original intent, replacing the failing plaster with terra cotta and constructing the terrace. "The terrace was built for two reasons," says Pett. "One was that when we did the base isolation, it removed the basement's ability to be occupied and all those spaces had to go somewhere — outside of the building and into the terrace. Secondly, we had the means to finish the original design."

While the base isolation work ensured the capitol's future, its restoration was the completion of unfinished business. "Our goal was to avoid removing as much historic fabric as possible and to complete the original plan as conceived by the architect," says Pett. "It was just a magnificent job on the part of the contractor, Jacobsen/Hunt Joint Venture, to schedule and protect the building and the ongoing work. It required a lot of communication and a lot of people who were dedicated to conserving the building." – *Lynne Lavelle*

# Western Expansion

he city of St. Louis' transformation into the "Gateway to the West" began in the early 19th century. In 1803, when Robert Livingston orchestrated the Louisiana Purchase, little was known about the vast territory west of the Mississippi River that included present-day Missouri, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Arkansas and Iowa and parts of North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico and Louisiana. To explore and map the approximately 900,000-sq.mi area, President Thomas Jefferson enlisted Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, who officially set out in May 1804 at the confluence of the Mississippi and Missouri rivers, just north of St. Louis. A few decades later, migrants would begin setting out in droves from the St. Louis area to settle the western territories. Today, the city's most iconic structure, Eero Saarinen's Gateway Arch (1965), commands the Jefferson National Expansion Memorial, a downtown park commemorating the westward expansion of the U.S.

At the turn of the 20th century, around the time St. Louis was chosen to host the 1904 World's Fair, Cope & Stewardson won a competition to design a new campus a few miles west of downtown for Washington University. Working in the ubiquitous Collegiate Gothic style of the era, the Philadelphia firm laid out the campus on an east/west axis; Brookings Hall, the campus' most iconic building, was completed in 1902 and utilized for the World's Fair.

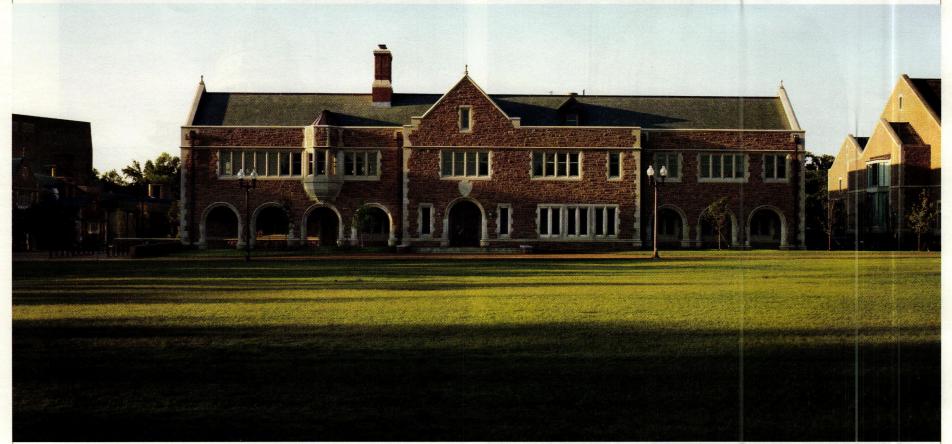
In 2005, Cambridge, MA-based Tsoi/Kobus & Associates was hired by the university to design a new university center that would follow the precedents set forth a century before by Cope & Stewardson. From the beginning of the process, Washington University made a clear commitment to honoring the Collegiate Gothic tradition of the 169-acre campus. David Owens, the design principal for Tsoi/Kobus, says that when he first saw the site 13-14 years ago (Tsoi/Kobus previously designed the university's Earth and Planetary Science Building), he was struck by the "interesting juxtaposition of the different notions that were going on with the campus."

"The campus is designed in the Elizabethan, or Jacobean, style, which was transitioning the Gothic into the Classical," says Owens. "In some ways it has its foot in both camps – the aristocracy was very much enamored with the Classical, but the building trades were still locked into the Gothic because that is what they knew.

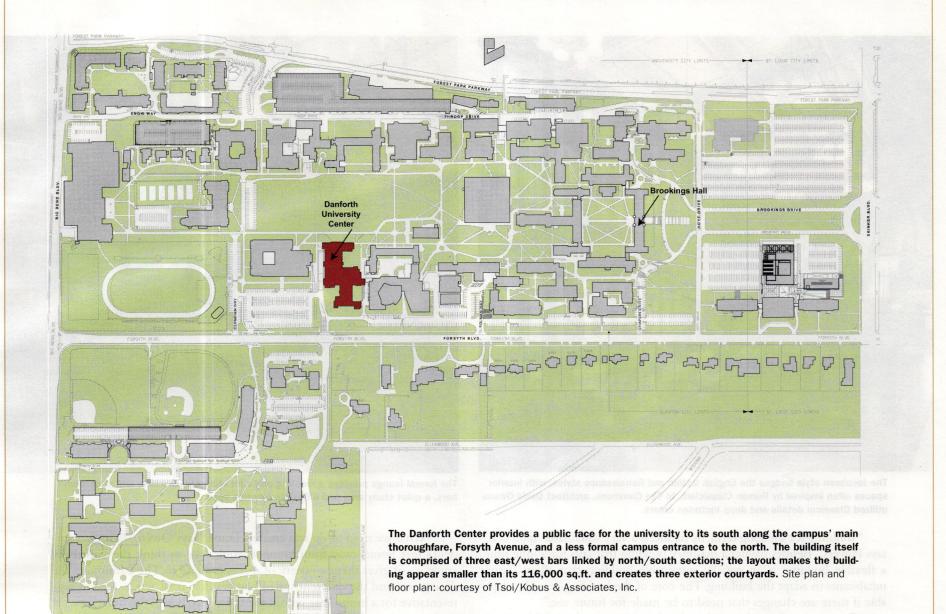
"The campus was laid out on an east/west axis – likely making a nod to western expansion. Most of the buildings are elongated rectangles, following the axis and creating a consistent rhythm of forms. Going through the campus, I was pleasantly struck by the humane scale of the place, and how, in a number of instances, the different buildings were of roughly same size as the spaces they created. The campus is unified in its style, scale and mood, so we felt that to do something foreign would have been inappropriate."

Richard Kobus, Tsoi/Kobus principal in charge, says that along with creating a front door to the campus, particular emphasis was placed on creating a university center – not a student center. "Washington University wanted to create an environment that encouraged the traditions on the campus," says Kobus. "The school has a highly interactive faculty, so they wanted the faculty to feel like they have a place in the building. They also wanted alumni to feel at home in the university center, and of course they wanted the students to have a home there. A number of the programs are keyed toward students – student government, student activities, community service, Greek life, student media and career services offices are in the building in combination with the traditional food services and some entertainment aspects. There is a formal lounge along with some less formal spaces, and there are all sorts of informal spaces for people to sit and gather."

Today, the Danforth University Center stands on the south side of the school's Danforth Campus, along Forsyth Avenue. The 116,000-sq.ft., three-story structure, which rises atop a parking garage designed by another firm, is comprised of three main east/west sections – or bars – linked by two north/south volumes. The exterior stonework is Missouri red granite with Indiana limestone accents (from Bloomington, IN-based Bybee Stone) and the roof is finished in slate from the Rising & Nelson Slate Co. of Middle Granville, NY.

"It's almost like three independent manor houses attached in the middle," says Owens. "The bars are stretched east/west, and the spaces created between them are also stretched east/west. This approach allowed us to break down the scale of the building without compromising efficiency." The layout also creates three courtyards – outdoor gathering spaces that expand and diversify the building's usage.

In the interior, the variety of spaces on the first floor include a café, restaurant, a formal dining area, offices, a large dining hall and The Commons – the heart of the building. The second floor includes a classroom, meeting rooms and a large formal lounge; the graduate and communications centers occupy the third floor.

"We extended the materials and the detailing into the building itself, so that the interior is an almost transitional approach of traditional materials, details and traditional coloration, with more dynamic forms and expressions," says Kobus. "I think the university has really enjoyed the approach that we have taken to both materials and color in the buildings that we've done for them."

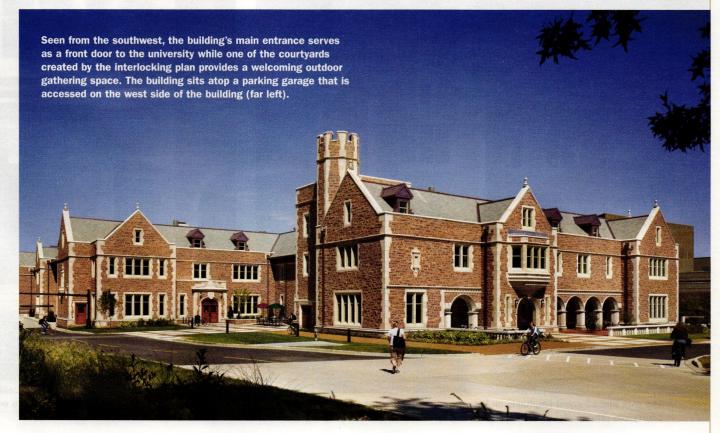
"Many times, the interiors of these buildings are bare-boned," says Owens. "But in this case the client moved away from that. In The Commons, we saw the opportunity to express the Classical aspects of the

design. Almost everything inside is built off of Classical details, but then it uses deep Victorian colors seen mostly in the churches of New England, especially with the works of Richardson. There is so little color on campus that I was determined to get them to saturate their palate, and happily the idea resonated with them."

Owens also notes that the design principles of the Picturesque were important to the design process. "This approach meant working along a path, setting up a vista and drawing people's attention to the vista, and then leading them from there to another vista. It's not a Modernist approach, where you design an object and the object is pure and it's freestanding. This is really about the person who is walking through the space. The building doesn't unfold as one idea - it's always a series of ideas."

From the beginning, Tsoi/ Kobus and Washington University made a commitment to sustainable design — culminating in a LEED gold rating for the building. "Promoting sustainability on campus was an important project goal," says Rick Powers, project manager with Tsoi/Kobus. "We began with the intent to achieve a silver rating, but during construction it became clear that gold was within reach. We went back and re-evaluated some of the things that we were doing, such as the lighting. We also added a significant rainwater collection below one of the courtyards — this was not part of the original design, but was added to achieve LEED gold."

While not a LEED item, Powers and Owens note that the most sustainable attribute of the building is that it's built to last well into the future. "We had a great client that understands how to build substantially – that is, to build well for the long term" says Owens. "This means using only high-quality, long-lasting materials. The university center is a simple masonry box – there is no interweaving of different modern building technologies in this building. There is no steel in it. It is a time-proven method of masonry construction. In order for a building to last 200 years, however, you need to do more than follow the program – it has to be adaptable to new future uses as well."

"Building for the long term, by nature, is a very sustainable approach," says Powers. "Besides having a masonry building that lasts for a long time, a flexible building is an equally sustainable building that allows future inhabitants to adapt the building. The core of the building is easily adaptable if there are changes that need to be made for future use."

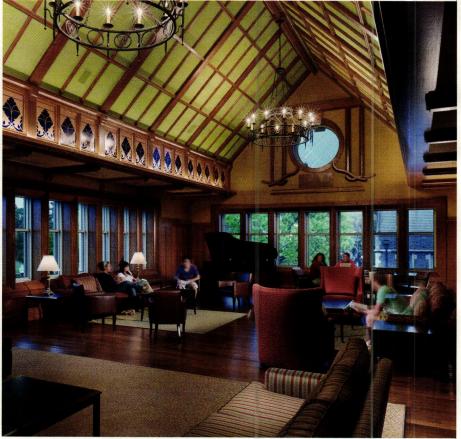
"For us as a firm, this project has been immensely satisfying," says Kobus. "For me personally, to see the building being used the way it's being used is a lot of fun. My daughter is a senior at Washington University and gives me regular feedback – people really do love the building – and she's proud to let people know that her father's firm designed the building. As soon as the building opened, she called me and said, 'It's crowded, and classes haven't even begun!"

Jill Carnaghi, associate vice chancellor for students/dean of Campus Life at the university, has an office on the first floor of the Danforth Center. She is quick to respond when asked about the new building. "We love it!" she says. "We have gorgeous buildings on campus, but we've been lacking a living room — a comfortable space where faculty, staff, students, friends, alumni, parents and the St. Louis community can come and gather. This building has helped centralize a lot of events and activities on campus.

"Guests from other institutions say things like, 'This is what a university center should look like,' and young alums come back and say such as, 'I can't believe we didn't have this when we were here.' It's been overwhelmingly positive, and I think part of this is that Tsoi/Kobus stuck with Cope & Stewardson – even down to how the building frames outdoor spaces. David Owens probably understands Collegiate Gothic better than just about anyone."



The plan placed equal emphasis on indoor and outdoor rooms – the three outdoor courtyards provide popular informal gathering spaces for the entire school community.

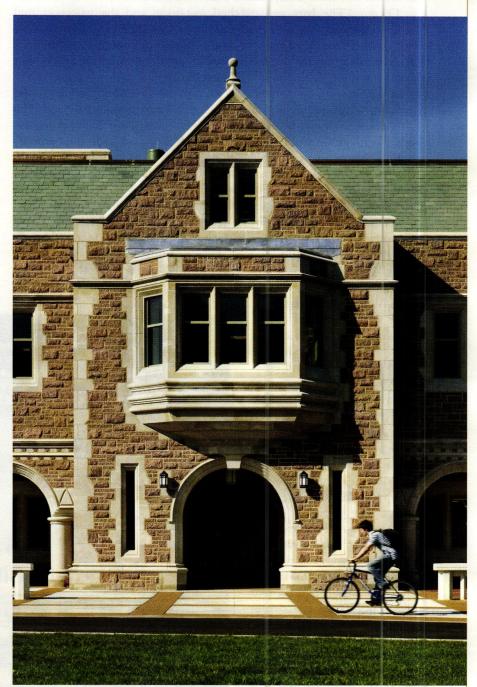


The formal lounge provides a meeting place for students, teachers and staff members, a quiet study area and a flexible function space.

"What we tried to do was create a home," says Owens. "This is a student's first home away from home. I would like to think the kids really enjoy it – it gives them a variety of spaces to bond to. The Commons, the dining area and the different scaled courtyards – it all acts as a good representative for a home base within the university. It is of the university, yet students can go there and feel at home." – Will Holloway

# New Construction – less than 30,000 sq.ft.

# Green Education

esigning a 24,000-sq.ft. Math & Science Center for a bucolic Georgian-style campus in upstate New York is one thing. Designing the structure to achieve LEED Gold certification is another thing entirely. Or is it? Actually the two goals work well together, according to Voith & Mactavish principal in charge Daniela Voith, AIA, LEED AP. "Millbrook has stewardship of the environment as part of its mission statement, but the school had never done a LEED-certified building," she says. "They felt that at this point the school should take an active statement toward sustainability. They wanted to build the most environmentally responsible building they could and to use it as a teaching tool."

The Math & Science Center (MASC) is the third building that Voith & Mactavish Architects (VMA) has designed for the Millbrook School, a co-ed high school for 250 mostly boarding students, during the past 12 years. The Holbrook Arts Center was completed in 2001 and Abbott Hall, a girls' residence followed in 2003. In fact, after the first project was finished, Daniela Voith was asked to become the architect for the school.

For this project, the school wanted the building to blend with the campus, and to also make a strong contemporary statement. It also needed to accommodate four discipline-specific labs, support spaces, independent project areas, five math classrooms, an IT suite, a faculty office suite and a freestanding greenhouse.

"The great challenge was the slope in the site and the height of the ceilings and the different mechanical requirements for the labs and the classrooms," says Voith. "So we ended up with a very complicated section. There's a two-story wing connecting to a three-story wing."

"The other challenge was successfully intersecting the contemporary vocabulary with traditional vocabulary and having that make sense. It was difficult to make the architecture feel seamless."

"The big story to me is that LEED does not have to be ugly. It can be executed with traditional design," she points out. "We achieved 43 LEED points, so we are solidly in the gold category."

VMA solved the siting challenge by designing an L-shaped building that stretches down the slope, creating a three-story structure in the north wing, while the other wing is two stories. The building is positioned to take advantage of daylighting and to relate to the nearby Holbrook Arts Center and Abbott Hall as well as the zoo across the road.

The designers solved the contemporary versus traditional challenge in a number of ways. The quiet detailing and intimate scale of the building blend with the delicate Neo-Georgian context of the campus, while stepped massing and overt juxtaposition of building methodologies make a strong statement about contrast and dialog between old and new, traditional and contemporary, sustainability, stewardship and context. "Visitors to the campus are greeted by the classical pergola on the south," says Voith, "followed by the east-facing contemporary curtain-wall façade connecting the wings, so they interact with both the classical and contemporary. Students, on the other hand, have a pedestrian experience with the building, so they see the more classical details on the west façade and they usually enter through the main entry on the north, into the classically designed entry way. They experience the curtain wall from the interior, which feels like being outside."

In this entry hall, visitors are greeted by a 32-ft. high ceiling and surrounding balcony. Hallways lead to the classroom areas in the other wing and on other floors in the L-shaped building. The curtain-wall corridor on the east façade of the two-story section provides access to both floors in the two-story wing, and it also provides passive solar gain for the MASC.

The result is a successful 24,000-sq.ft. building that combines classical with contemporary styling to create a LEED Gold certified structure. It also meets all of the requirements of the program, providing lab and office spaces for both math and science.

One of the major goals of the project from the beginning was achieving LEED Gold certification. "Designing for LEED is a much more complicated way of designing," says Voith. "You have to include all of engineering functions as part of the initial design concept. You have to integrate these strategies from the beginning."

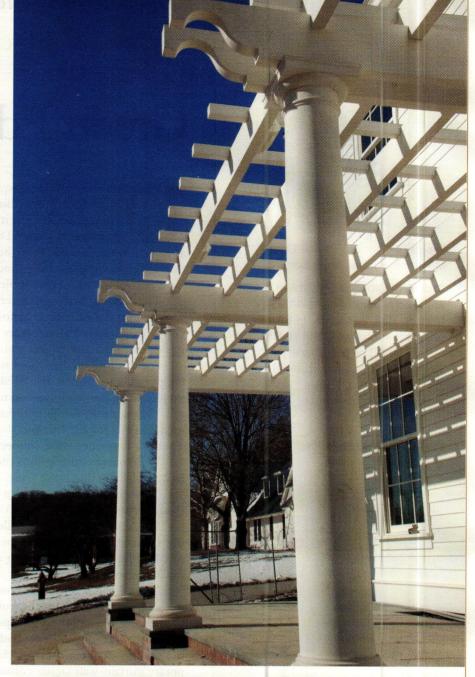
The first step was siting the building to take advantage of daylighting. All learning spaces and offices receive natural light from at least two directions through large windows. In addition, high-efficiency sensors and dimming ballasts automatically control energy consumption. The basic design of the building also allows natural ventilation, especially in the spring and fall, reducing energy consumption.

A number of other features contribute to energy efficiency. The glass-enclosed corridors (shaded in the summer) serve as passive solar collectors by absorbing energy in the colder months. The standing-seam metal roof (manufactured by Englert Roofing, Perth Amboy, NJ) has a special finish to minimize heat absorption and there is a vegetative roof garden over the science corridor to cool the building.

Instead of standard heating and cooling systems, VMA and engineers at Bruce E. Brooks & Associates specified a geothermal system for the Math & Science Center. Sixteen 500-ft. closed-loop wells supply the heating and cooling for the building (installed by Earth Energy Connections). "Geothermal doesn't work everywhere," says Voith, "and the school was not certain it wanted to air condition the building. Geothermal only works if you have a balanced heating and cooling load and it does have some down sides. Instead of one central boiler and chiller you have to have an air handler for every room, so there is more maintenance. However, we looked at the pros and cons and decided that geothermal was the way to go."

Voith says that solar panels were considered but ultimately only a few panels were installed as a demonstration system. "Unfortunately, solar is still not quite affordable," she says. "The payback period is in the 100-year range as apposed to a 10-20-year range for geothermal." VMA did include a LED screen, which is visible at the front of the building. It is connected to solar panels on the roof and gives read-outs about the energy being generated. "We are taking advantage of the sun," she points out. "All of the hot water is heated by the sun through the vacuum-tube system on the roof, but the photovoltaics supply only a small amount of electricity." Also taking advantage of the sun is a separate greenhouse located near the Math & Science Center.

The building was awarded 13 out of 17 LEED credits in energy and atmosphere for its efficient envelope, geothermal wells and sensor controls, passive solar gain and solar hot water. It also received 8 out of 14 credits for siting and 4 out of 5 innovation credits. The labs offer natural ventilation and controllable hoods, features designed to lessen energy bills by as much as 40 percent.

The Math & Science Center also got 5 out of 5 credits for water efficiency (for collecting rainwater for greywater, the vegetative roof and water conserving plumbing fixtures) and 11 out of 15 credits for indoor environmental quality (for low-emitting VOCs from materials, individual lighting controls, individual comfort controls, 90 percent of spaces receive daylight and views).

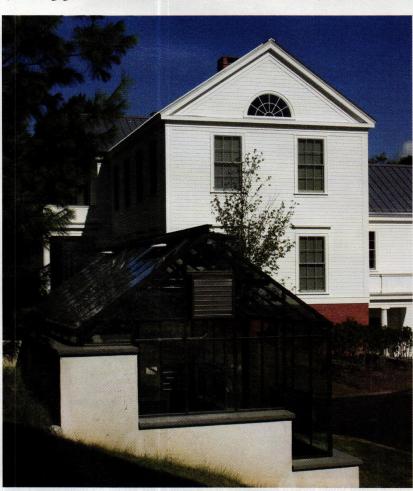
The credits for materials and resources (5 out of 15) were awarded for the use of salvaged and recycled materials, of local materials and of FSCcertified wood and for construction waste management. Slate flooring (unfading green slate in natural cleft and honed finishes) came from the Vermont Structural Slate Co., slate blackboards and countertops were salvaged from other spaces on the campus, weathered wood siding in the lobby was salvaged cypress supplied by Antique Woods & Colonial Restorations, and recycled glass terrazzo tile for the flooring was supplied by Eco Friendly Flooring. Paints were EcoSpec from Benjamin Moore.

The general contractor, Kirchhoff Construction Management of Pleasant Valley, NY, also did all of the carpentry, siding and concrete for the building. Marvin Windows supplied double-hung windows and French and commercial doors. The PolyStone columns were supplied by Chadsworth's Columns.

Construction on the \$9.3-million building began in November 2006 after a 17-month design phase, and the Math & Science Center was first used for classes in March, 2008. "Using energy-modeling software that compares the best-practice standards versus LEED building," says Voith, "we were able to demonstrate that the MASC would use 65 percent less energy than a normal building." She is happy to note that these statistics have been proven to be accurate. The results are in from the first few months of usage and the Math & Science Center is saving between \$30,000 and \$40,000 a year in energy costs, plus thousands of gallons of water because of the greywater system. – *Martha McDonald*

# Adaptive Reuse

# Saving the Barns

he Old Dairy complex, built in 1928 in Warm Springs, VA, was once Bath County's only commercial dairy, serving the community and a nearby nationally known resort, The Homestead, for more than 40 years. Although the community regarded the complex as an icon, it was subsequently abandoned and fell into a severe state of disrepair. Now at the heart of Homestead Preserve, a 2,300-acre residential resort community, the Old Dairy complex has been fully restored to serve its local residents as a community center.

Homestead Preserve is a conservation community dedicated to preserving the architectural heritage and natural landscape of the Allegheny Mountains. Urban Design Associates (UDA) of Pittsburgh, PA, was part of a design team that developed the community's master plan and pattern book, laying out design guidelines for future residences in Hot Springs and Warm Springs. In 2004, with extensive knowledge of the region, UDA was hired to restore four of the seven existing structures at the Old Dairy complex – to adaptively reuse the Main Barn, Guernsey Barn, Holstein Barn and Milk House as a community center that included pool areas, offices, an assembly hall, spa, fitness center and a general store and deli. "The intent," says Matt Fitzgerald, project architect at UDA, "was to make as few changes as possible to the structure and to preserve the buildings."

UDA worked closely with the owners and their team of consultants to understand the history of the complex. This included interviews with local residents and sorting through documents in the Homestead archives. "We worked in teams on site with all of the parties to generate three-dimensional drawings of proposals and options that help everyone involved to visualize the quality and character of the barns, farm and surrounding pasture," says Fitzgerald. "Our designs grew out of the research of the region's history, climate, geography, culture, the qualities of the site, the market and the client's goals."

Historic Tax Credits were utilized to alleviate some of the project's costs; however, it was a slight challenge when the committee decided against design aspects that interrupted the historic nature of the project. The newly added pool, for example, was originally designed to be located within the courtyard on the southeast side of the Main Barn. "The community felt it was important to maintain the courtyard as it was and to not interrupt that space," says Rob Robinson, chairman of UDA. "The pool slid further to the south and southeast to preserve that space. It acts as a kind of ancillary to the cluster of buildings adjacent to the Main Barn."

The rectangular-shaped pool is set in a pastoral setting without a lot of decorative elements and complements the simple manicured lawns of the courtyard. "We framed the pool with architecture to make a space, which is what you often see in agricultural complexes," says Eric Osth, principal of UDA. The windows, doors and eaves of the surrounding pool structures are similar to the original structures, while the vertical plank siding is whitewashed to defer to the original structures.

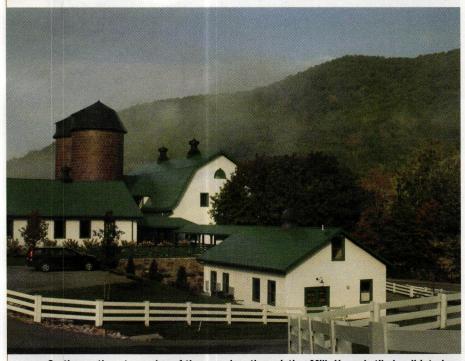
Converting the agrarian buildings into a community center necessitated several modifications. The two silos of the Main Barn, for instance, didn't meet earthquake standards. "What was fine for a silo was not so great when you have people climbing around it for new uses," says Robinson, adding that to reinforce the silos, spiraled steel was embedded inside hollow clay blocks that were plastered over and installed in the interiors. "It acts as a coil or spring to keep it from racking," he says.

The entry between the silos also had to be substantially enlarged to meet requirements. "Other than the pool, the entry was the most significant modification to the exterior," says Osth. "We needed to introduce a staircase that would be generous enough to handle large events and interconnect the loft and courtyard." UDA went through several iterations before settling for the most dramatic, and practical, approach — a porch-like structure over the entry and stairs. The stairs connect the courtyard to the assembly hall in the loft and allow the silos to be used as conditioned spaces for large events. "That connection was part of taking the barn from an agricultural context and turning it into a project that functions for today's needs," says Osth.

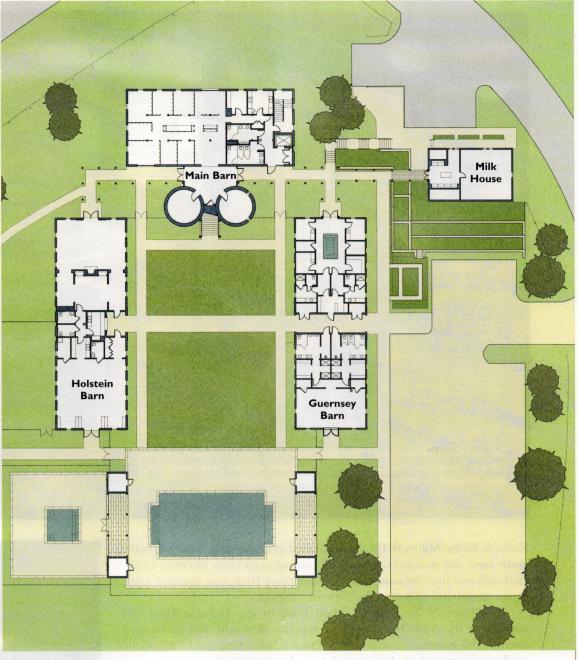
Other exterior changes include replacing the roof with Houston, TX-based Berridege Manufacturing Co.'s pressed metal shingles, and wall repairs using stucco from Monterey, VA-based Rexrode Masonry.

The interior space was altered on the northeast side of the Main Barn to accommodate a second set of interior stairs and an elevator. "It was one of the biggest issues – fitting an elevator and new stairs without damaging the sense of the place," says Robinson. "While it's a bit shorter than the original barn, you really don't perceive that there's been much change. It's a lot about trying to let the space still read as it was – a great loft space with all the same finishes and understated lighting."The mechanical systems were left exposed within all the historic spaces. "We used new system materials that had a texture familiar to the barn and exposed them in a sympathetic composition," says Osth. "We felt like there was really no clear solution in hiding it in a very sophisticated way, nor was there the budget."

The stables of the Main Barn were converted into offices. "This is probably where we brought to bear the most design influence," says Osth. "We took the stables as a cue to the design. It's both a working office and public office for the trust, so we were very careful about organizing the elements and the space so that daily office clutter would not be apparent to someone who walks in for the first time."

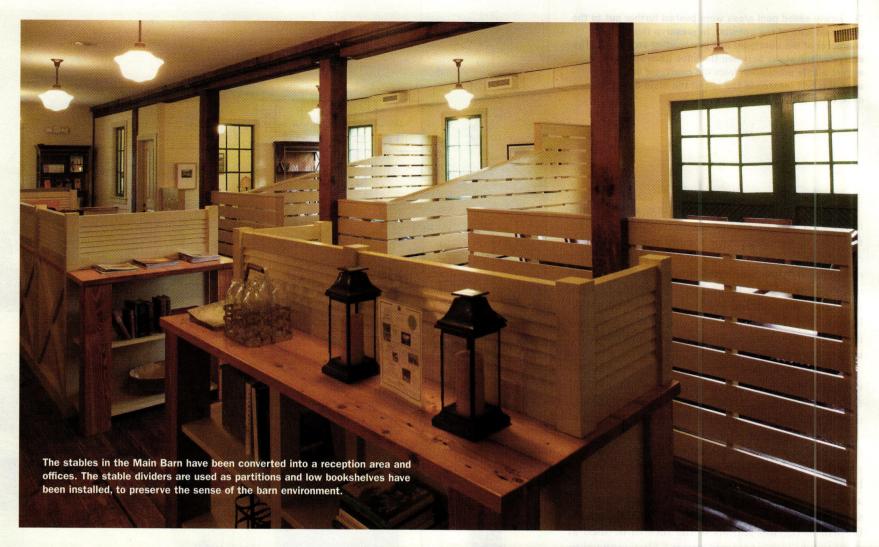
Existing wood floors and beams were cleaned and left in their original colors, the white horizontal wood dividers were constructed to create the atmosphere of a stable being reused as an office; low bookshelves were built against the dividers to conceal office clutter. Windows found on a nearby site were salvaged and installed to enclose two offices.

The Milk House, which had originally been a bottling facility, was so dilapidated that the owners and UDA considered tearing it down and constructing a new building. But with the foundation, grading and drainage rehabilitated, and the interior finishes removed and replaced, the structure now serves as a general store and deli.

All of the windows and doors had been removed from the Guernsey Barn facing the compound and the openings boarded up and covered with stucco. New windows and interior storm sashes from Wausau, WI-based

Kolbe & Kolbe Millwork Co. were installed in the existing frames. Double doors were also installed opposite the existing main entry to create a covered walkway into the courtyard. The Guernsey Barn now contains a spa, fitness center and changing facilities for the pool.

A hyphen connecting the Main Barn to the Holstein Barn and another to the Milk House, in the opposite direction, had to be torn down. "The existing conditions were pitiful," says Fitzgerald. "All of the roofing structures had deteriorated to a degree that they could not be saved. The contractor took great care to salvage what remaining posts were found from the original hyphen." The posts were salvaged and reused on the new hyphens that were reconstructed using measured drawings and photographs culled from the Homestead archives. After re-grading the areas affected by rot and poor drainage underneath the hyphens, retaining walls of local stone were built for a series of cutting and heirloom gardens.

Completed in June of 2007, the Palladio Award-winning Old Dairy Community Center represents just a portion of UDA's efforts in the master plan and pattern book for Homestead Preserve. "This project was a very small piece of a large story about the preservation and re-envisioning of the entire valley from this point onward," says Osth. "The barn itself is symbolic of the kind of care and quality that the client and design team had thought about and pushed forward in the master plan." – *Annabel Hsin*

# Pool of Radiance

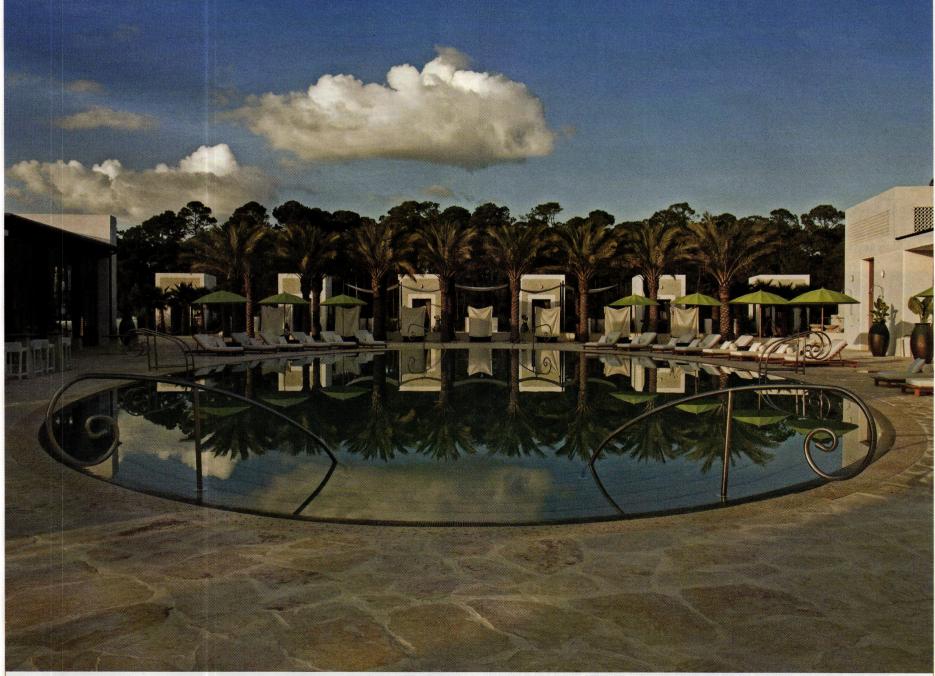
history-redolent yet unprecedented pool complex has risen at the edge of a resort town near Panama City, on Florida's Panhandle. For the second consecutive year, a building at this resort, Alys Beach, has won a Palladio Award. Both winners were designed by the town architects, Khoury & Vogt Architects (KVA). The principals, Marieanne Khoury-Vogt and Erik Vogt, have been helping build out Alys Beach since Miami-based Duany Plater-Zyberk & Company finalized the community's New Urbanist master plan in 2003. DPZ has envisioned a 158-acre mixture of radiating streets, parks and parkways, criss-crossed by pedestrian paths and sleepy lanes.

Last year, KVA won a Palladio for Fonville Press, Alys Beach's 650-sq.ft. combination of café, newsstand, bookshop, and wine and tapas bar. (See *Traditional Building*, June 2008, page 22.) Fonville, the town's incubator commercial and civic hub, has thick stuccoed walls, numerous fountains, and shady wood trellises and bamboo awnings. This year's Palladio recipient, Caliza Pool, is as multi-purpose and naturally cooled as Fonville, but on a grander footprint of 47,300 sq.ft.

That's not to suggest, however, that there's anything grandiose about Caliza Pool. The trapezoidal site, at the town's northern border, overlooks a 20-acre nature preserve with wetlands and longleaf pine forest. Within the trapezoid, Khoury-Vogt says, "one of the primary design concepts was to create as many moods as possible."

Renters and homeowners can spend their days choosing between half-a-dozen cozy or expansive spots to relax. KVA, inspired by ancient Greek stoas (sheltered, partly enclosed colonnades), filled the pool grounds with loggias and open-roofed atria. The structures surround a central elliptical pool of saltwater, 100 ft. long, set flush with a flagstone deck. On the pool's broad horseshoe-shaped stairs, steel volute-pattern railings are reminiscent of Hollywood Regency mansions. At Caliza's 75-ft.-long rectangular lap pool, complete with iPod dock and a side wall of bamboo groves, ebonized Spanish cedar purlins form a trelliswork ceiling. At a children's pool along the compound's northern edge, a raised stone rim doubles as a bench for foot-dippers, and cloth canopies billowing from masts reduce the quantity of sunblock that parents have to dole out frantically during Florida summers.

KVA also specified shade trees by the dozens. Hammocks and canopied wicker daybeds are tucked under clusters of palms, and a wall of cypresses envelops a scalloped-edge spa pool. An allée of oaks shelters a lawn full of S-shaped concrete chaises longues, which KVA based on Le Corbusier's iconic tubular-steel models. The ergonomic concrete versions, Khoury-Vogt says, "are really quite comfortable, with or without pillows, even for sitting and reading there all day."

Most of the buildings – including the bar, two bathhouses and a semicircle of six cabanas with enclosed private gardens – are cubic in shape. "We took archetypal forms and kept paring them down as much as possible, within the scale of a civic building,"Vogt explains. "We stayed close to classic types, the timeless architecture of Mediterranean cultures, to conjure up memories. Yet we tried to float above precedents. There are no direct quotes, no direct stylistic references, except for the Moorish arches on the entry loggia."

The entry loggia has one of Caliza's few turreted roofs: a quartet of tapered towers rises over a rooftop garden with views of the Gulf of Mexico, the town and the nature preserve. There's just one other non-flat roofline: scalloped parapets and four hemispherical urns crown a pool

equipment building that has a fountain cascading down zigzagging troughs on one façade.

Caliza's otherwise flat roofs of concrete slurry, Khoury-Vogt says, "are monolithic. They give heft to these small, low buildings. And they create a seamless connection with the walls," which are mostly coated in steel-troweled stucco. Executed by A & S Stucco of Panama City Beach, the walls "capture and reflect light in a beautiful way," she adds.

The other dominant material at Caliza Pool is Dominican shellstone, a close relative of limestone (the pool's namesake – Caliza is a Spanish word for limestone). The architects applied tawny-gray shellstone from Dominican quarry Marmotech to the pool deck and its perforated gutter, and incorporated the stone into façades, interior walls, fountains and shelves.

A few patches of vibrant color enliven the serene stone palette. The bar top is a slab of green marble, and the bar's back wall is clad in Cuban cement tile (from Dominican source Aguayo Tile) in pale-green floral patterns. Swaths of green and blue glass mosaic surround sinks in the bathhouses, and the restaurant's dining niches are tinted lemony yellow (thanks to integrally colored plasterwork from Brandilee Designs in Panama City).

Craft Design of Santa Rosa Beach, FL, designed the interiors, and the landscape was by Kendall Horne, Alys Beach, FL. The general contractor was EGCD Construction, Panama City Beach, FL, and the developer was EBSCO Gulf Coast Development, Alys Beach, FL.

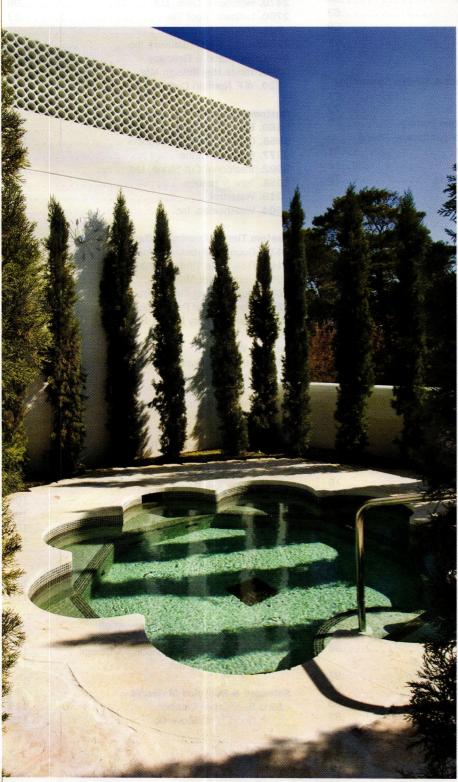
Although the \$6 million pool complex looks luxurious, it is actually cost-effective and environmentally-friendly: no HVAC is required except in the restaurant kitchen. Instead of doors that would block breezes, the bathhouses and dining niches have curtains made from stainless-steel bead strands, which kids like to run through their fingers, weave, knot or let sway and spill like rainwater. Breezes also pour in through unglazed windows fitted with wooden grilles (from E. F. San Juan, Inc., of Youngstown, FL) in a traditional Indo-Asian vein, and hot air is evacuated via attic spaces with wide filigrees of cylindrical ceramic tiles.

"We were constantly conscious of keeping air moving through," Khoury-Vogt says. "Fortunately we had the benefit of the natural Gulf breezes. The whole place stays cool, even in August. People appreciate that. And they love the sound of water falling from the different fountains, the views of the Gulf, the town, the preserve, the contrast everywhere of the green landscape against white walls. The locals have also become quite attached to it, not just the renters and owners – the restaurant is open to the public in the evenings, and Caliza has been used for a number of events."

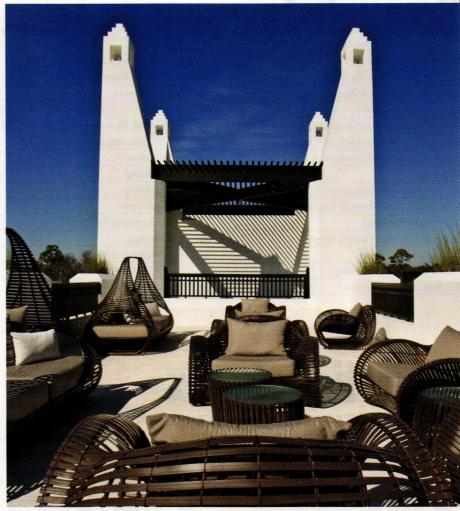
The town has hosted an annual arts competition called "Digital Graffiti": artists from around the world project digital stills and videos onto the white walls and rooftops of Alys Beach. "It's amazing," Khoury-Vogt says, "how all the patterns and colors can briefly transform this place that we know so well." – *Eve M. Kahn* 



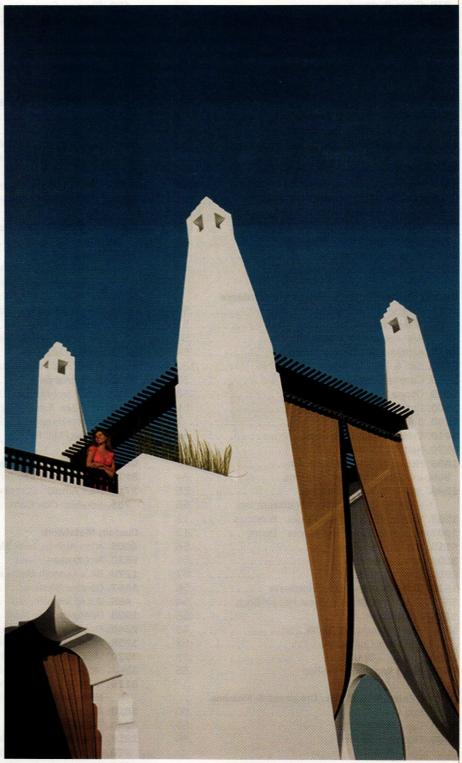

# **Specifying Mosaics**

A mosaic artist offers background information and guidelines for various projects.

s versatile and practical now as centuries ago, the mosaic medium offers design professionals a potent means of expression to enhance projects of any scale and style. Whether the goal is to generate drama through vivid color and texture, evoke an air of formal refinement with classical motifs or conjure a touch of exoticism and sensuality, mosaic has enormous potential.

Mosaics are both a surfacing material and an artistic medium. During the design process, combining imagination with proper technical specification will produce a beautiful and enduring enhancement of walls, floors and accessories. Large manufacturers and small studios offer a profusion of enticing panels, medallions and borders in various materials. Classical motifs are enduringly popular, but custom work opens the door to the widest creative possibilities.

As early as 9000 B.C., "proto-mosaicists" pressed stone chips into the mud floors of temple complex buildings in Göbekli Tepe, Turkey. These embedded stones formed simple, but durable pavements that evolved in other locales into patterning. Over time, artisans developed increasingly sophisticated layout schemes and improved mortars that were disseminated by explorer/settlers throughout the Mediterranean basin and beyond. This work came to be called mosaic. Striking mosaic pavements and wall decorations beautified baths, grottos, palaces, temples, and churches from Syria to Spain and from North Africa to Britain. More recently, Art Deco, Art Nouveau and the various Revival styles all have adopted mosaics in public and private architecture across five continents.

Established fabricators in the U.S., Mexico, Canada, Europe, China and the Middle East can "translate" designs into mesh- or face-mounted mosaics that can be shipped and installed expeditiously. Smaller projects can be undertaken by a local studio, of which there are dozens across the U.S. Selecting a local collaborator makes for a more intimate working relationship, although technology makes pre-production design modifications and progress documentation easy to achieve, even long-distance.

### Design and Materials

Mosaic design generally falls into three categories: pictorial, geometric or free-form. Greco-Roman mosaics often placed a realistic pictorial subject within a geometric border. This design approach still works today. Rather than copying the classical motifs, however, today's designer frequently opts to work with a mosaic artist to invent subjects that link thematically to the building's function and/or locale.

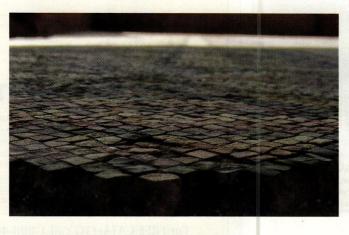
The range of mosaic materials is enormous, and growing. Mesh-mounted stone mosaics are generally sold in the same nominal 10mm-thick (3/8 inch) as stone tiles for easy matching to the field material. These same stones can be used to create custom mosaics for walls or floors. Polished, honed, and split-faced surfaces are visually distinctive and also have practical distinctions – most notably their slip coefficient. Semi-precious stones such as onyx, agate and lapis lazuli make luscious accents and boost the palette into the brighter colors. Smooth pebbles create a striking textured effect – even for pictorial subjects – in patios and gardens.

Glass for mosaics is manufactured in several forms: First is the so-called vitreous or venetian, a thin, uniform glass tile with a flat, slick surface. It is readily available in

North America in a palette of several dozen colors, including metallics and iridescents. The most common size is 20x20mm (3/4 x 3/4-in.), although 10 and 25mm sizes also are available. Vitreous glass is usually sold as face-mounted paper sheets of approximately one square foot. After thinset installation, the paper is dampened and removed.

Vitreous is the least expensive mosaic glass and is suitable for interior and exterior walls and ceilings. However, it is rather delicate and slippery; use caution before specifying it for flooring. When used for pictorial work or hand-cut borders, the glass is first soaked off the sheets by the mosaicist, then cut and assembled into the layout.

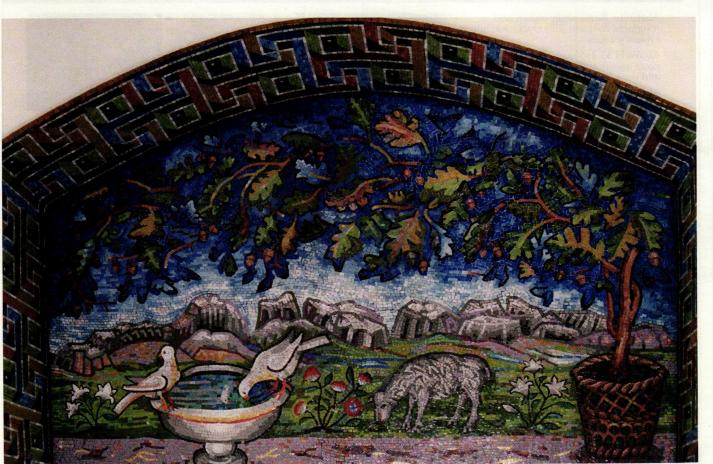
Glass smalti is the traditional material of mosaic wall murals. The tesserae are thicker and more irregular than vitreous glass. They are hand cut from 10-mm thick slabs, and their fractured faces ultimately constitute the finished surface.

Hundreds of colors are available. Smalti is sold loose rather than sheet-mounted. As with vitreous glass, the mosaicist either works with the direct method or face mounts the custom layout on sheets of paper or cloth prior to thinset mounting. The rich palette and rippled, lustrous surface of smalti are unique.

At least one manufacturer also makes a glass specifically for floors. These tesserae measure 12x12mm and 8mm thick, and are spaced wider on the sheets than vitreous glass.

"Byzantine glass" from Mexico is thicker than vitreous glass, somewhat mottled in color and hand cut, so the tesserae are less regular than vitreous, but smoother than smalti.

Ceramic tile varies beyond the scope of full discussion here. Generally speaking, unglazed porcelains can be used for either walls or floors and are not too slippery. Modules of 25x25mm are available in several dozen colors, usually rubber dot-mounted at the factory. Glazed floor tiles are usually produced in larger modules that need to be cut or shattered into appropriate sizes for making custom mosaics. Glazed wall tiles should not be used for floors; they are slippery and scratch easily.

### Stock or Custom

Besides their field material and stock border motifs, some showrooms offer readymade pictorial mosaics. Showroom professionals can coordinate colors, patterns and sizes with other surfacing elements that they sell. However, an entirely unique and personal result awaits the client or design professional that is ready for deeper involvement. By engaging a mosaic artist's talent, a design can be developed collaboratively – one that harkens to historical antecedents, yet incorporates the imaginative abilities of the artist.

The process is more complex than buying "off the shelf," but the greater investment can produce a greater reward. Visual motifs linked to the architecture, to local landmarks or the building's function can inspire the mosaic design, amplifying the impact of the building's interior or exterior surfaces. Freestanding mosaic sculpture can bring focus to a plaza or atrium.

Given the breadth of options, books, magazines, internet research and travel will all help the designer prepare for the specification process, where concept, materials, costs and schedules of fabrication and installation are sorted out.

If selection and purchase are made through a tile/stone showroom, it may be possible to arrange a one-stop deal: The showroom staff coordinates with a tile contractor and/or mosaic artist to present the options, write the order, make field measurements, fabricate and install. Alternatively, a mosaic artist may be contracted independently. The local mosaicist may install the work as well. Usually, the mosaic is pre-assembled in the studio and then shipped to the site for installation.

Evaluate proposed mosaic materials and retain reference samples. If planning custom imagery, first discuss the general goals and ultimately, the specific motifs and placement of the mosaics. The mosaicist's portfolio and other references can help when formulating the design. Once general parameters and budget are established, the mosaicist will create preliminary sketches for review and then final working drawings. The design drawings should be to scale, indicating (in selected details) the module sizes and width of grout joints. When viewed with photos of previous work, these drawings should accurately predict the final result.

The project budget entails thorough analysis of factors that are only listed here: 1. Size (some economies of scale may pertain but like typing, each tessera has to be individually placed.); 2. Complexity of design; 3. Cost and workability of materials; 4. Pre-mounting, delivery and installation; 5. Schedule (try to avoid a "rush job").

Order extra material to allow for the cutting waste when installing fields and borders. Some materials, like handmade ceramics and natural stone, normally show considerable variation. This must be accounted for, so that all the darker material, for example, is not concentrated in one area. Alternatively, glass and ceramic

mosaics – and even certain stones – are uniform in color. When planning fields and patterns, specify some mixing of similar colors to liven up the effect.

### Installation

There are 1,500-year-old mosaics that are in great condition; others fail after a few months. Why? Usually faulty installation is the cause, and it's important to avoid foreseeable hazards. Ask the installer what challenges are anticipated, and establish a plan to deal with them. Substrate preparation – solid, square, clean, flat, smooth – is always key to proper installation. As with tile, stone or wallpaper, beautiful materials can be utterly spoiled by poor installation. TB

### DOs and DON'Ts

- Whether the installation will be done by the mosaic fabricator or a separate contractor, inspect prior projects or at least review detailed photos of jobs similar to yours.
- Look out for fat grout lines and misalignments where sections of the mosaic were poorly joined. If they occur on your project, these will catch the eye (or foot) and be disappointing or even hazardous.
- Be certain that the substrates are sound and free of cracks. Mosaics will not stabilize wobbly walls or floors.
- Mosaic elements themselves are stable and water-resistant, but they can be dislodged if applied to materials such as drywall or wood, which soften or warp when wet. In wet areas, specify cementitious backer panels, if a solid masonry substrate is unavailable.
- Be certain that the substrates are flat and smooth. Mosaic materials especially thin ones will replicate the dips and bumps beneath them.
- Request the best installation materials, such as latex-fortified thinset and grout. A bad installation is demoralizing and very costly to remedy.
- A neutral gray grout is rarely wrong; avoid a high contrast or bright color, unless you want an especially dramatic effect. White, black and bright-colored grouts like clothes are harder to maintain.
- Discuss the choice of sanded vs. unsanded grout with the installer. Unsanded will crack in wider joints.
- Planning and communication are paramount, both in the practical and aesthetic issues. Accurate dimensions are critical; field verification while the mosaic is still in the planning stage is ideal. Otherwise, include some element of adjustability in the design. A border around a picture panel may be expanded or shrunk, for example, whereas the picture itself cannot be.
- To ease installation, specify the same thickness of material for the mosaics as for adjacent surfacing. Otherwise, make certain the installer explains his plan to accommodate these differences.
- Begin the design phase early so that revisions can be considered calmly and unusual materials can be ordered.
- Life is short, and mosaics last a long time. Why not create something as enduring and delightful as the mosaic materials themselves?

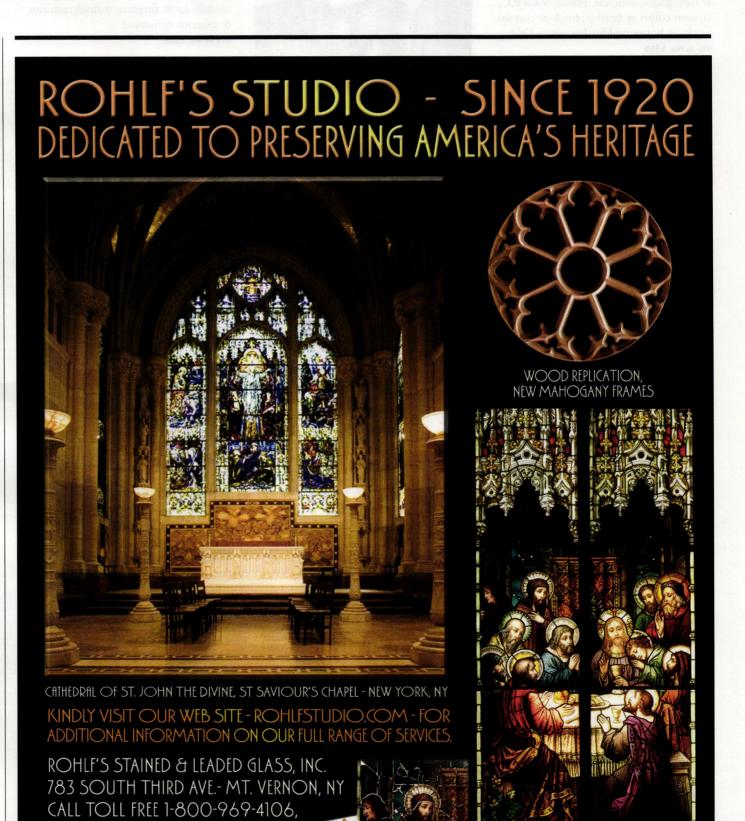

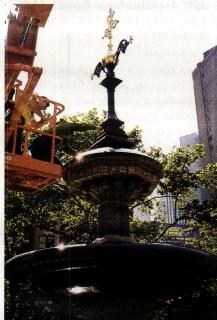

## **IPTW** Goes to Colorado

Christian, PTN Executive Director he 13th annual International Preservation Trades Workshop (IPTW) will be held by the Preservation Trades Network (PTN) in partnership with the Colorado Mountain College Historic Preservation program. The 3rd International Trades Education Symposium (ITES) will also be held in conjunction with IPTW 2009. These combined events, running August 25-29, will take place in the spectacular natural setting of the Rocky Mountains and will provide a unique opportunity for tradespeople, educators, preservationists, students and others from the U.S. and

abroad to exchange experiences, learn skills and find common ground in the application of the skilled trades to the conservation of the built environment.

The ITES will be held at the historic National Mining Hall of Fame and Museum in Leadville, CO. This historic stone and brick structure not only houses one of the largest collections of gems and exhibitions of mining history in the United States, but includes a spacious auditorium, and meeting rooms that are set up with modern AV equipment, well suited to a professional conference. During the ITES attendees will hear presentations on the past, present and future of trades education from leaders in the field from the United States and abroad. They will also tour historic Leadville and visit with participants involved in the workshops taking place



both in Leadville and at Hayden Ranch. These will include grave stone conservation, brick masonry cleaning and log structure relocation.

During the ITES, "hands on" demonstrations of preservation techniques will take place at the Hayden Ranch, an intact example of a high country ranch and agricultural operation, which ran from 1872-1947. Colorado Mountain College purchased the ranch for use as a laboratory, woodworking shop and classroom space for students in the preservation trades program, and it promises to be a remarkable venue for IPTW-ITES events. The ranch not only provides stunning vistas of the surrounding mountain ranges, with over a dozen peaks beyond 14,000 feet, but also provides a unique opportunity to study the historic architecture of late-19th and

early-20th century ranch buildings. The complex includes the original settlement cabin, ranch hand lodging, a water turbine-powered sawmill and several large barns which will house demonstrations on many different traditional trades including English lead-sheet forming and soldering, stained-glass window restoration, log joinery, gauged red masonry, shingle riving and much more.

Anyone who has been to an IPTW already knows what a great opportunity it is to meet old friends, make new ones and network with some of the finest professionals in historic preservation today. The fact that this will be the first IPTW west of the Mississippi

promises to engage new participants and demonstrators and give everyone who attends a chance to see why Colorado has made such a strong effort to save its significant and unique heritage. The town of Leadville itself is rich in history and a perfect place for an IPTW. # **Traditional Blend**

A sympathetic addition to a clubhouse in Atlanta features a tile roof that blends seamlessly with the original.

he oldest golf club in Atlanta, GA, the East Lake Golf Club has been the permanent host of the TOUR Championship since 2005. So when it planned to build a 20,000-sq.ft. addition, the club was insistent that the 2008 playoffs, held in late September, were not to be postponed due to construction. This meant that all of the work had to be done in within one year. The other stipulation was that the new building, including the tile roof, should look like its historic counterpart.

This tight schedule was difficult, but the architects, contractors, and product manufacturers and suppliers worked together to complete the project in on time. "We began work in May 2007," says Chuck Hull, principal architect at Atlanta-based Smallwood, Reynolds, Stewart, Stewart & Associates (SRSSA). "Construction began in February 2008 and the clubhouse reopened for the TOUR Championship on time in September 2008."

The original clubhouse, designed by Neel Reid in 1915, is a Tudor-style building that features a half-timber façade and clay tile roofing. "When the club decided to build an addition, it specified that it should be, as much as possible, indistinguishable from the existing club," says Hull. "We based our design on original drawings of Reid's work that showed the existing design with a single-story wing to the north." Although this wing was not built in the early-20th century, it did serve as a guide to the new structure. SRSSA followed the design guidelines when designing the single-story, 20,000-sq.ft. addition with a half-timber façade.

While the design follows Reid's historic guidelines, the building does deviate from the original drawings in some respects, such as the orientation and gable expression.

As the addition was conceived of as a traditional design, SRSSA worked with many manufacturers and tradespeople in the traditional building field. This included Ludowici Roof Tile of New Lexington, OH, who came on board in September 2007 to re-create the custom roofing tile on the existing clubhouse.

When Ludowici was first contacted about the clubhouse addition there was a slight mix-up. "It was funny, because Hardin Construction, the general contractor, called me and said, 'We know it's your tile on the existing clubhouse roof and we want you to supply more for our addition," says Rob Wehr, Georgia sales manager at Ludowici. "But it wasn't our tile." The tile for the original clubhouse had, in fact, been manufactured by B. Mifflin Hood Tile Company, a rival company to Ludowici that went out of business in the 1950s. Luckily for Hardin Construction and East Lake Golf Club, Ludowici and its 121 years of tile-making experience had the ability to match the tile.

In December 2007, Wehr and others conducted a building assessment. "We took chips and samples of the tile to get an idea of the colors," says Wehr. "We weren't able to take entire tiles off the clubhouse, though, because the owners did not want to damage it in any way."

From September to March, Ludowici was involved in color matching. "We started with Ludowici's standard colors," says Troyce Jackson, sales representative with roofing distributor JGA Southern Roof Center in Norcross, GA. "Once we had established a palette of similar colors, we worked with ceramic engineers to develop custom glazes."

"It was a long process of tweaking the colors," says Wehr. "We would send the tiles to our ceramic engineers, they would change the colors slightly and we would compare the samples to the existing tiles. This was repeated until the architects were satisfied that we had matches." The architects were involved, says Hull, "because we had to decide on both the correct color for the individual tiles and the percentage mix of each color in the final blend." Fourteen different glazes, ranging from shades of red and orange to shades of green and black, were chosen for production.

Interestingly, the tile Ludowici was matching had been manufactured differently from the way clay tile is made today. "B. Mifflin Hood didn't apply glazes on

their tile," says Wehr, "but achieved their colors by 'fire-flashing,' which means they injected gas into the kilns and ramped up the heat at certain points. So while we determined that there were 14 different color tiles on the clubhouse roof, B. Mifflin Hood never set out to make that many. It just happened." Fire-flashing is considered too dangerous today; coloration is achieved now by metallic chemical glazing.

After the glazes were matched, SRSSA and Ludowici made mockups of the roof layout. "It should look random," says Wehr, "but in order to achieve the right blend it is actually semi-scientific." Together, Ludowici, SRSSA and roofing subcontractor KTM Roofing of Snellville, GA, determined the number of colors that should be placed in each area to re-create the blends found on the roof on the existing clubhouse.

Once on site, KTM blended all 14 colors on the ground in a staging area. "KTM organized the tile in groups of 100," explains Wehr. "In this way, the number of tile was easy to determine. For example, if one color glaze should make up 14 percent of the roof, the installers would take 14 tiles for each section. When all 100 tiles were collected, KTM would mix them up randomly."

Jackson, who worked alongside Ludowici, remarks that some of the colors were used quite sparingly while others were needed in large quantities. "There was a large disparity in the number of tiles needed for each color," he says. "Some colors made up 21 percent of the roof, other made up 14 percent and then down to as little as 3 percent."

The roof, which was approximately 13,000 sq.ft., required about 34,000 tiles. Since 100 tiles covered about 40 sq.ft, the selection process was repeated many, many times. Installation took about two months during the summer of 2008. To ensure that it would be completed on time, KTM used a team of 15 roofers who worked 13-hour shifts, six days a week.

Just as the glazes were custom colors, so were the sizes and shapes of the tile. "Our standard-size tile is relatively close to the size of the tile from the existing club-

house," says Wehr. "Ludowici could have matched the size exactly but only at a hefty additional cost." Instead, Ludowici increased the size only slightly to save on material and labor costs, while simultaneously achieving a close match.

As for the shape, the company used the same manufacturing process it uses for its Georgian tile, which it most closely resembles, and then tweaked the surface texture. "Ludowici's Georgian tile has vertical scoring, so that it resembles a lightly brushed surface," says Jackson. "For the tile at the clubhouse addition we needed heavier, rusticlooking, vertical scoring, and some horizontal scoring, which is very rare, but it was easily replicated with a simple adjustment to the machinery."

Roofing accessories, such as ridge tile, were also replicated. The original ridge tile features a very thick collar and heavy scoring, both of which Ludowici was able to match. "We used one of our signature #211 ridge tiles," says Wehr, "and then used the same 14 custom colors and custom texture we had developed for the field tiles."

The level of craft and detail that went into the new tile roofing added to the success of the new clubhouse

addition. "We have reports that some club members asked the club manager which portion of the building was new, which pleased everyone involved," says Hull. "It is a testament to the collaboration between client, architect, contractor and supplier. It made for a good experience as well as a successful result." TB

### After Wal-Mart

#### **Big Box Reuse**

by Julia Christensen MIT Press, Cambridge, MA; 2008 231 pp; hardcover; 91 color illustrations; \$29.95 ISBN 978-262-03379-4

ig boxes are here to stay, even when the retailers inside them aren't. In a series of cross-country treks, artist and teacher Julia Christensen learned how abandoned Wal-Marts and K-Marts have been reused. *Big Box Reuse* (along with a companion web site) tells ten informative and troubling tales of how communities made the best of the remains.

Given that the author focuses on small towns and cities of the South and Midwest, these buildings' diverse fates, while of great interest, are not necessarily representative:

**Bardstown, KY:** The building was demolished and replaced by a new county courthouse in the same parking lot.

**Round Rock, TX:** The building was reused as an indoor Go-Kart raceway, later replaced by a health-and-fitness strip mall.

Wisconsin Rapids, WI: The building was reused as a consolidated senior center.

Buffalo, NY, Charlotte, NC, and Laramie, WY: Buildings were converted into charter schools (the most common single reuse Christensen found).

Hastings, NE: The building was reused as a Head Start center.

**Austin, MN:** The building was reused as Hormel Foods offices and Spam Museum.

Lebanon, MO: The building was reused as a county library, museum and café.

Pinellas Park, FL: The building became a church.

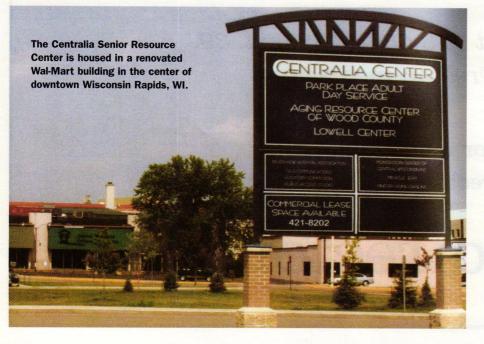
**Chalmette, LA:** The parking lot was occupied by a collection of trailers serving as a health center. The building remains vacant.

Various Kentucky towns: On a temporary basis, the buildings became part of the Peddlers Mall chain of indoor flea markets.

Christensen admires the resourceful locals who championed these reclamation projects – in some cases raising dimes and dollars for them – but she doesn't go overboard with the cheerleading. "Big box reuse offers quite a paradoxical quagmire," she writes. On one hand, it's green: "For every building that is reused, another building does not go up." On the other hand, it's repulsive: "Is this what we want our future landscape to look like?"

Christensen's willingness to go and see is refreshing, and her report on the relocation of schools, hospitals, churches and museums into big boxes is important. As she says, this transformation has been going on "without documentation or collective, systematic thought."

Big Box Reuse is an overdue discussion-starter. Unfortunately, it's not much more than that. Its documentation is episodic, and the underlying thought more impressionistic than systematic. Christensen's quirky approach does produce revealing vignettes: an improvident Go-Kart entrepreneur, senior citizens offering green beans from a community garden, and publicly-funded charter schools' extraordinary fear of public accountability. But it fails to answer her own basic question. At book's end the reader is somewhat better informed but still stuck in that "paradoxical quagmire."





The Nelson County Justice Center in Bardstown, KY, was built in an abandoned Wal-Mart lot. It is surrounded by strip malls, which are gradually being converted for government use. Meanwhile Wal-Mart, who once deemed this real estate "crucial," has opened two more stores nearby.

The author's environmentalism is heartfelt but abstract and imprecise; she's still thinking inside the box. Big boxes and their attendant parking lots have helped arrange our towns and cities so that we have to drive almost everywhere, aggravating multiple energy, environmental and social problems. Once abandoned, they could be made more neighborly – the paradox might be softened if not resolved – but that requires systematic thought and attention to the whole local context, not just the building. Reuse can enhance the walkability and liveliness of the area, as Ellen Dunham-Jones and June Williamson explain in their brief but more sophisticated account in chapter four of the recently published *Retrofitting Suburbia*. In growing communities, the site can be reconnected to the rest of town, and the parking lot reclaimed for landscape, residential and small-scale commercial uses.

Unfortunately, Christensen and those she interviewed pay little attention to context and urban design. She takes local informants' word for it that these buildings are located "right at the center of transport," without recognizing that they're only at the center for those who own cars, who can drive, and who can afford the fuel. Some towns actually avoided professional design assistance.

The chosen illustrations reflect this inattention. Bardstown's new Nelson County Justice Center is always depicted in close-up, its neo-Georgian facade filling the frame. We read that it faces a three-acre parking lot, abutting a strip mall and an abandoned movie theater, but we don't see it. This alleged reuse is only a mile from the old courthouse (now a tourist welcome center), but how walkable is that path? How does the site relate to the older parts of town? Were there ways to reuse the site other than comically plopping a dignified building into an asphalt wasteland? These questions are neither asked nor answered. In Bardstown the big box itself was demolished. What was preserved and reused were the worst things about it: its location and its built-in dependence on automobiles.

Context is sometimes mentioned but largely neglected in the other stories. Christensen writes that the Wisconsin Rapids Wal-Mart "had anchored the Rapids Mall downtown" during the 1980s before leaving to build bigger on the outskirts. Surely a big box in downtown poses different issues from one out on the edge, yet the story of its replacement by a senior center includes no map of the town. The reader is left to wonder whether Wal-Mart ruined the downtown by arriving – or by leaving!

Using web tools, we looked more closely at Bardstown, Wisconsin Rapids and other sites. Walkscore.com – a rough measure of how many basic needs can be met within walking distance of a given address – gives Bardstown's old courthouse an excellent walkscore of 91 out of 100. The new justice center scores only 57. This is not a paradoxical quagmire, it is municipal suicide. The Wisconsin Rapids senior center has a better walkscore, but Google Maps reveals its pedestrian-unfriendly surroundings, and it remains cut off from the river that flows nearby.

Big boxes are commercial successes (a fact Christensen neglects to acknowledge) as well as architectural and urban-design disasters. Reuse can be a chance for towns and cities to get it right. But to do so they need to be conscious of the context as well as the building, they need to envision replacing asphalt with a real neighborhood, and they need knowledgeable design professionals who will listen and help. **TB**

### Modern, Civil, Humane Urbanism

#### David M. Schwarz Architects, 2002-2007

his new, beautifully illustrated volume from Grayson Publishing makes you realize how few architects there are today whose work can truly be called modern, urban and civil – civil in the sense that buildings and spaces are designed to please the people who use them and not merely to cater to a small coterie of architecture critics. Although not normally thought of as a "New Urbanist," most of David M. Schwarz's projects are, in fact, truly new and truly urban in that they are on a large – yet human – scale and provide greater density than many of the greenfield developments that are widely touted as "New Urbanism."

Schwarz's body of work on civic and commercial projects shown in this monograph (projects from 2002 to 2007, with just a few residences included) demonstrates that one can be a fully "modern" architect without resorting to quotations from the picked-over bones of Modernism. Rather, Schwarz has absorbed the norms and forms of historic architecture so thoroughly that he can compose using the traditional design vocabulary in ways that are fresh and original. The completed buildings look quite contemporary, but echoes of the past are detectable enough so that the results are both stimulating for their design innovations and yet still comfortable and reassuring to the people who use them every day.

David M. Schwarz is not an architect of a particular style. Instead, Schwarz harnesses many styles – mostly traditionally inspired – in order to achieve his over-arching goal, which is, in the words of author Robert L. Miller, ". . . to devise ways in which modern architecture can return popular, urban civility to an American environment that, even within city limits, is pervasively suburbanized." Miller terms Schwarz "a modern populist."

#### A Post-Suburban Architect

From another perspective, Schwarz could also be called "Post-Suburban." In his preface, Schwarz describes his formative childhood in a suburban Los Angeles neighborhood bordering Beverly Hills. Schwarz is quite specific in describing what he "... hated about my Los Angeles childhood: celebrating the automobile, lauding suburbanization, and glorifying the lack of traditional urban fabric via the breakup and isolation of disparate communities." This helps explain why his work today has the feel of a man who loves real cities.

His training started him off as a conventional International School architect, but when he opened his own office in Washington, DC, client demand got his firm deeply involved with restoring historic buildings and working in historic districts. The District of Columbia became a teaching laboratory for his firm, and Schwarz



In Fort Worth, TX, Schwarz designed the 12-story Bank One office building, using economical traditional brick cladding – but exploited the decorative potential of brick to the maximum. Helped by computer modeling, the architects explored alternative ornamental patterns possible with a four-color brick system – ultimately delivering construction drawings that located each individual brick on the facade.



Schwarz designed a number of different but related buildings for West Village, a multi-block development in Dallas, TX, with 175 luxury apartments and more than 100,000 sq. ft. of retail space. The façade on this particular West Village building evokes Dallas' older downtown commercial lofts with its dark brick piers, a grid of large double-hung windows interspersed with balconies, and a hard-edged pattern of cast stone lintels, stringcourses, and pier caps. Schwarz used ironspot bricks in herringbone patterns to animate the balconies and spandrel panels.

and his associates began to learn how streetscapes and neighborhoods are knit together - things Schwarz had not been taught at the Yale School of Architecture.

Today, David M. Schwarz Architects has evolved a three-level approach to urban design: (1) The civic level, usually in a master plan, reviews how the project connects to the city as a whole; (2) The street level is concerned with where a building meets the sidewalk and what experience is created for pedestrians; (3) The individual level, which examines the effect on people – both visitors and daily inhabitants – who interact with the building, inside and out.

#### Truly Green Design

Schwarz's outlook makes his work also "green" at the most basic level, because people living in compact, walkable urban environments consume less energy than populations spread out in suburban cul-de-sacs. In seeking to make city environments more attractive and livable, his work provides appealing alternatives to the land-consuming, automobile-based suburban sprawl that has dominated American development since WW II. Schwarz also makes use of sustainable design principles and materials, but not in self-conscious ways that make ostentatious displays of solar panels and windmills.

The monograph is laid out with great clarity, making it a pleasure to turn the pages. What makes the book highly useful for design inspiration are the large, clear, beautifully lit photographs (more than 200) of the 18 projects being showcased. The photographs combine large full-page general-elevation photos with smaller shots for close-up detail. The accompanying text and captions are likewise detailed and lucid, providing helpful background information on the projects and individual buildings.

This book should be on the desk of everyone who is called upon to create buildings for urban commercial and civic spaces. It shows that budget-aware buildings can be designed that are practical, humane, pleasing to the eye and context-sensitive — and still exhibit a lively sense of design innovation. Schwarz proves that a designer need not strain for the bizarre in order to be exciting and creative. **TB**

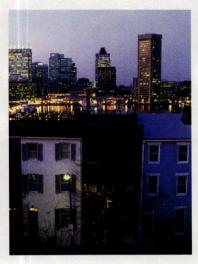

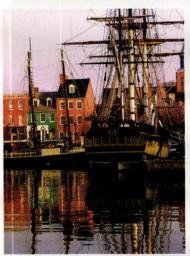

## Style, Not Sustainability

#### **Green Architecture**

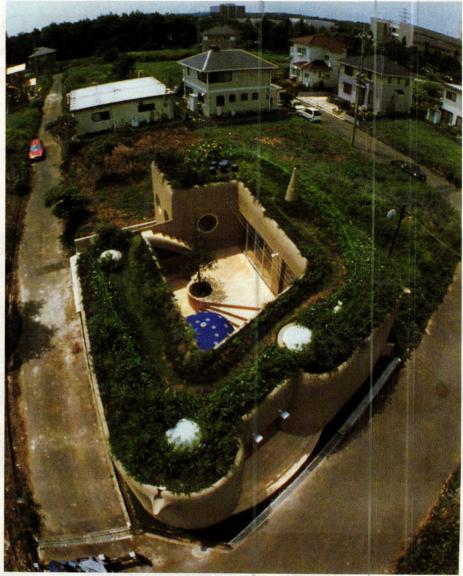
his book was written nearly a decade ago, but grows increasingly more important as the green revolution progresses because it represents a fairly good approximation of the view that many, if not most, architects take toward the idea of "green architecture." This review is a critique of that collection of views as much as it is of the book itself. This critique emanates from the common sense, plain-spoken definition of sustainability as "keeping it going in a healthy fashion long into an uncertain future."

But first, a bit about the author. James Wines (1932-) is an architect, artist and (obviously) author most noted for his work at SITE, which he founded in 1970. SITE produced some of the most memorable architects of the Postmodern era. Their series of Best Products showrooms included crumbling facades, shattered and dislocated facades, facades as green housed rainforests, twisted facades and peeling facades. Any architect studying or practicing in the 1970s or 1980s likely recalls these buildings – or at least their front walls. I'm not sure that anything except the facade was ever published for any of them.

The first hint of the direction of the book appears before it begins, on the inner front cover, which announces that *Green Architecture* will focus on the work of 38 prominent architects. This architect-centric approach is typical of the tack of most in the green movement today: beginning with their product or service and ending (hopefully) at sustainability. At its worst, this devolves into bald-faced "green washing." And even at its best, this method is incapable of getting at the real core of sustainability because it tends to remain focused on the product or service rather than on sustainability.

The author, in good Postmodernist fashion, launches first into the historical and philosophical basis of today's green movement. I found these chapters extraordinarily difficult to follow, in part because the photos are compelling enough to be distracting, and they most often have nothing to do with the adjacent text. Readers with anything less than an iron-clad discipline might want to skip the first chapters.

The "Environmental Architecture Today" chapter begins by listing the standard eco-friendly checklist – and then essentially dismissing all of these common sense measures. The counter list, which forms the table of contents of the rest of the book includes things like "using the elements of earth and vegetation in such a way that they seem to be part of the raw material of construction," "the use of nature-related symbolism as a means of connecting architecture to its cultural context," and "a translation of the most advanced environmental and construction technology... into aesthetic terms." The last item on the counter list is "visionary and conceptual

ideas...that offer prophetic visions for the future...." The prophetic vision of the inside cover, at least, is correct: this book is going to be primarily about style, not real sustainability.

One might reasonably assume that the "Integration of Architecture and Landscape" chapter might revolve around methods of increasing human habitation of the landscape so that conditioned space might be reduced. It does not. Rather, it deals with "the Celtic celebration of cosmology," the "combined impression of

Babylonian garden and space-age celebration," and "assertive, pyramidal forms (totemic in themselves), which are embraced by ground surface incisions and sculptural mounds...."

The chapter on "Organic Forms and Cosmic Symbolism" begins with a fascinating jaunt through the work of Jersey Devil, which may well be the most ecological work in the book on several counts. Jersey Devil's nomadic design/build practice has the seeds of the beginnings of living traditions, which were the delivery vehicles of almost all of the sustainable places and buildings ever built. They simply lack the strong connection to the cultures at large in which they are working that are essential to a living tradition.

Then, however, the book lapses back into pure symbolic expression with projects such as the Soft and Hairy House, which the architects intended as an "expression of... orgiastic potency," and is "a sensuous explosion of organic forms that fuse, convolute, and metamorphose... to produce a compelling environment of fluid membranes and cradling sanctuaries." Clearly, something is breeding here, but it's not a living tradition. Charles Jencks' Garden of Cosmic Speculation closes the chapter.

"Architecture in its Cultural Context" begins in promising fashion,

with David Lea's Studio in the West Country that can only be described as lovable – by architect and non-architect alike. Buildings that cannot be loved will not last. The carbon footprint of a building is meaningless once its parts are carted off to the landfill. The House on Elba that follows is also lovable, in an extremely vernacular fashion. The Fay Jones work late in the chapter is also highly lovable, but these projects sandwich buildings by Hans Hollien, the author's SITE firm, and others that reflect their cultural context in only the most obscure and esoteric fashion.

Renzo Piano's Jean-Marie Tjibaou Cultural Center, which is the cover project, closes the chapter as a building that architects and artists must surely consider beautiful, but which citizens on the street more likely would characterize as "a bunch of giant unfinished baskets."

"Translating Technology into Art" is very nearly headed in the right direction. It can be argued that the green revolution of the 1960s and 1970s was lost because the artifacts of sustainability at that time were conceived entirely as acts of engineering, not as acts of design. So the rooftop solar panels that were installed by the millions all across America in the 1970s were ripped off by the millions in the 1980s when their owners said "I don't care if they are saving me money; get those hideous things off my roof!"

The problem with the proposition of "Translating Technology into Art" is the fact that very little of what is considered art by the critics today is conceived as lovable by the people. So "technology as art" likely faces the same scrap heap as "technology as engineering." "Lovable technology," on the other hand, has a much greater life expectancy.

"Building a Bridge to the Common Client" is a laudable aspiration, but the chapter inexplicably begins with the work of Olson/Sundberg, who work mainly for very wealthy clientele. Sustainability will not occur unless millions of people participate. The homes of exceptionally wealthy people are simply not numerous enough to have much of an effect on the total carbon footprint of a region.

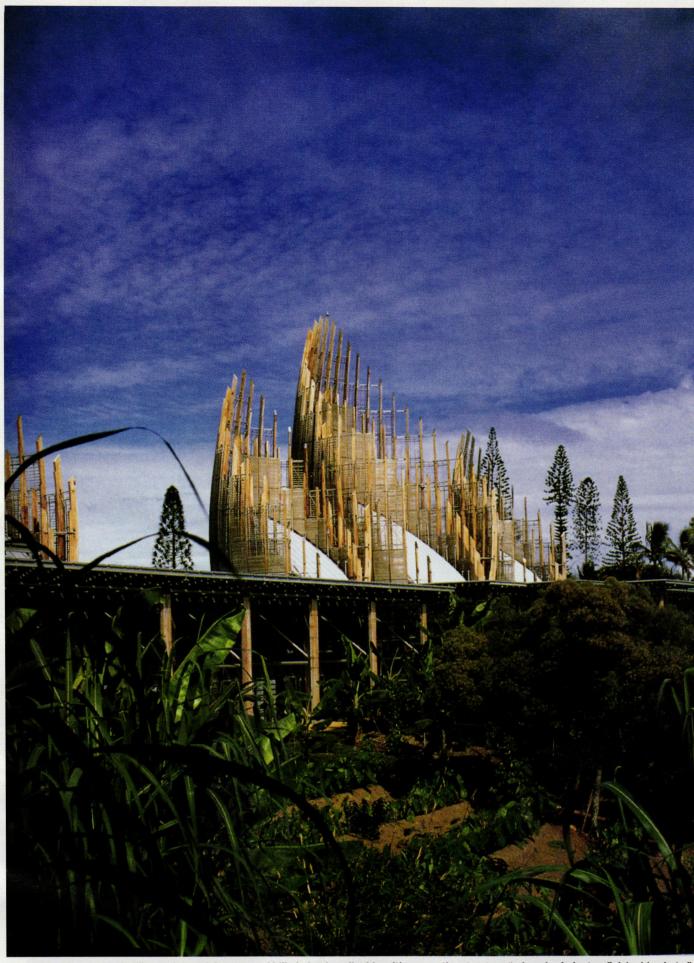
Next up are a series of idea homes which are intended as "a shopping center of green ideas." Idea homes are much more likely to have an impact because they are pitched to builders and to the general public. But they are most likely to succeed if people are able to say, "I could live there." The Arizona idea home looks more like a laboratory, for example, and the Australian Home of the Future is more likely to resemble a psychiatrist's office. Obie Bowman's Sea Ranch house and James Cutler's work, however, are as likely as any in the book to be found lovable by architects and non-architects alike.

"The Sociological Aspects of Green Architecture-Urbanism" begins with two fascinating Troy West projects. Eva's Kitchen is a combined organic garden/kitchen/halfway house project which highlights the growing realization in some (currently small) circles that a sustainable place should feed those who live there. Citizens should be able to look out onto the fields and waters from which their food comes, because if you can't eat there, you can't sustain life there. We should not have to depend on international trade agreements for our daily food. Eva's Kitchen helps create a nourishing place in laudable fashion.

Troy West's New American House can easily be imagined as bringing sustainability to a large audience in Rhode Island. After these projects, unfortunately, the chapter slips back into what might best be characterized as formal expression.

"Prophetic Visions of the Future" is a chapter that, at first glance, seems likely to be disappointing because how many "Tomorrowlands" were ever accurate? Architects have had an abysmal track record for prophecy over the last century. And, sure enough, some of the projects seem to resemble nothing so much as drug-induced dreams – or maybe nightmares. Others seem to be straight out of "The Jetsons."

But there are exceptions. Jeffrey Miles' Ozone-Maker is a fantastic vision of mammoth airships that resemble horseshoe crabs circling the globe, eating chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) and excreting ozone. And the Postmodernist staples of

Charles Moore's Piazza d'Italia and Michael Graves' Portland building are thrown in with Gehry's Bilbao Guggenheim and Meier's Getty Center, although those buildings seem more like history now, rather than prophecy.

The conclusion begins by defending the art and philosophy focus of the book against the forces of the "ecologically correct." The author denounces the "finger-wagging, eco-moralist architects..." who use green architecture as a "camouflage to justify the work of some vociferously righteous, but very bad, designers." He then recites the litany of dogmatists excluded from the book: the 1960s nostalgia wing, the eco-universal synthesizers, the Gaia globalists, the radical deep ecologists, the eco-psychologists, the cutting-edge techies, and the salvation-through-art camp. One must ask, however, if the author's own green architectural expression camp isn't equally damaging to the prospects of real sustainability?

This much we know: sustainability will not be achieved unless we activate billions of people around the world. How many people are touched by the high arts to the point that they actually change significant things in their lives? We need all hands on deck in order to achieve real sustainability.

While the arts certainly should not be excluded, we cannot expect them to single-handedly change where and how billions of people live. We need far broader tools for this task. Living traditions have been proven for millennia, and they are the only tools to date that have demonstrated a strong ability for delivering real sustainability to entire cultures. We really must reawaken them — it's getting late. **TB**

## Silver Lining

This headline in The New York Times caught my eye recently: "Shift to Savings May be Downturn's Lasting Impact." I have been thinking and writing about why this recession is good for traditional building, so naturally I thought this article was about a "shift" toward a greater inclination for "saving" historic buildings, now and also after the economy gets better.

The story began, "The economic downturn is forcing a return to a culture of thrift that many economists say could last well beyond the inevitable recovery." Indeed, this culture of thrift advances our historic preservation cause. Instead of knocking down and building new buildings, building owners, developers, planners, investors and government officials are thinking anew about restoration, rehabilitation and the adaptive use of old buildings. Our newfound culture of thrift has opened minds to the value of embodied energy and to doing more with what we have.

There are 300 billion sq.ft. of space in existing buildings in the U.S. The embodied energy of an historic building is equal to 5 to 15 gallons of gasoline per sq.ft. Let's do the math: 300 billion sq.ft. equals 1.5 to 4.5 trillion gallons of gas! (Embodied energy is the total amount of energy needed to build/use a building and transport the materials that go into it.)

As it turns out, The New York Times story was not about saving buildings, but about saving money. The story went on, "In the last year, the savings rate - the percentage of after-tax income that people do not spend – has risen to above 4 percent, from virtually zero." Saving money is an apt metaphor for saving buildings. The embodied energy in traditional buildings is our nest egg and we are investing in it to make it grow. "Poverty is good for preservation," is how one state historic preservation officer puts it. Preservation can lead

to set standards which better recognize and encourage the construction or renovation of buildings within a dense community (infill).

LEED 2009 increases points for urban infill from 1 to 5. Likewise the new LEED 2009 gives buildings near public transportation 6 points, up from 1 point. Carroon pointed out that transit-oriented housing produces 40-50% fewer cars per household than other housing types and reduces vehicle miles by 38%. There is more work to be done on LEED to strengthen the link between preservation and points, but LEED 2009 makes good progress.

Is preservation green like trees or green like money? Both. This point was conveyed by Carl Elefante, who presented information sourced from Donavan Rypkema's The Economics of Historic Preservation, (1994; 2nd edition published 2005 by National Trust for Historic Preservation), a book more relevant in this recession than it was when originally written. The economic benefits of preservation read like a stimulus package without the price tag, so that now, more policymakers are listening.

The economic benefits include job creation, downtown revitalization, heritage tourism, appreciation of property values and small business incubation. Elefante explained that in sustainable economics, a concern for the environment and economics are merged. Sustainable economics both revive growth and change the quality of growth while meeting basic human needs.

Perhaps the most symbolic good-news-in-bad-times speaker on

the workshop panel was Don Horn, director of the PBS Sustainability Program for the General Services Administration, the largest landlord in America. His participation in this

workshop points to the momentum for traditional building, even when so much private construction is stalled. Horn reminded us that this recession produced the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, a federal program aimed at adding jobs and cutting emissions. Already, ARRA stimulus money is in the pipeline to repair and improve many of the GSA's 430,000 historic buildings, including

houses, both traditional and mid-century Modern buildings. In addition to GSA properties, other federal buildings, many historic, will be restored and rehabilitated now, even when this work had been deferred in the boom times. ARRA is the largest traditional building stimulus since the New Deal.

\$5.5 billion for green building upgrades and \$750 million for court-

The federal government is not the only landlord using this downturn to spruce up existing traditional buildings. New York City's Empire State Building is planning a \$520-million historic renovation designed to reduce the historic skyscraper's energy consumption by 38% a year by 2013, making it more attractive to corporate tenants. When the biggest landlord and the tallest historic building both undertake traditional building in a recession, maybe this recession is good for traditional building?

Is the McMansion culture really dead? Has the wrecking ball been mothballed for good? Is our "culture of thrift" here to stay? I am encouraged, again, by a press release Rhett Butler of E.R. Butler & Co. sent me. It touted his new line of hardware with the title "Materialistic Disenchantment." His new hardware designs return to simpler forms. Out with the new and in with the old. Preservation is an idea whose time has come.

Carroon says that since the passage of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the seminal law that effectively launched the historic preservation movement, "the preservation movement has ossified." Our economic crisis has accelerated preservation's role in climate change and economic recovery and re-energized the preser-

It's true that the traditional building business has suffered along with the rest of the real estate and construction markets, so my silver lining optimism might seem theoretical. But traditional building hasn't suffered as much, problems are opportunities and lessons of our recent past are informing a bright new future for existing and historic buildings, as well as for the professionals who restore and improve them.

#### Saving money is an apt metaphor for saving buildings. The embodied energy in traditional buildings is our nest egg and we are investing in it to make it grow.

A new awareness of "thrift," of saving money, energy and traditional buildings, is evidenced everywhere, including at the American Institute of Architects annual convention. In May I attended an AIA workshop titled "Sustaining the Existing Building Stock: the Greatest Challenge of Architecture 2030." This session was presented by the AIA Historic Resources Committee, the oldest Knowledge Group within the 87,000 member association. The AIA/HRC is arguably most savvy about preservation architecture's economic, cultural and environmental value.

The workshop faculty was led by Carl Elefante, FAIA, principal and director of sustainable design at Quinn Evans | Architects. His associates on the podium were Jean Carroon, FAIA, principal, Goody Clancy & Associates; Don Horn, AIA, director of the PBS Sustainability Program for the GSA Public Buildings Service; Ralph DiNola, Associate AIA, principal, Green Building Services Inc.; and Tristan Roberts, managing editor of Environmental Building News. This all-star team gave us more proof that the current downturn is good for traditional building.

The "greatest challenge" in the workshop title quickly became the "greatest opportunity" in each of the presentations. "Old buildings are the new economy," exclaimed Carroon. "Preservation will lead us out of recession." Tristan Roberts sited a book called The Restoration Economy (Berrett-Koehler Publishers, 2002) by Storm Cunningham and talked about "shifting to a restorative paradigm." For Roberts and his AIA workshop colleagues, the preservation of traditional buildings is synonymous with sustainability and sustainability is the "green lining in the economic storm clouds."

More evidence of our new culture of thrift and its positive impact on traditional building was articulated by DiNola."What's green about historic preservation?" he asked. The audience of about 125 practitioners shouted out with enthusiasm like grade-schoolers who are eager to show off what they know: "Urban density! Transit access! Building form and massing! Daylighting!" DiNola completed the list: natural ventilation; energy conservation; use of local materials; controllability of systems; durability and embodied energy. Everyone got an A in this class.

DiNola also discussed the new 2009 LEED rating system, which he said is more preservation friendly and brings more good news in difficult times for traditional building. He cited the collaboration between USGBC and the preservationists (AIA/HRC, APTI, NTHP) CertainTeed

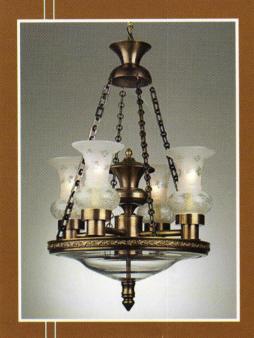

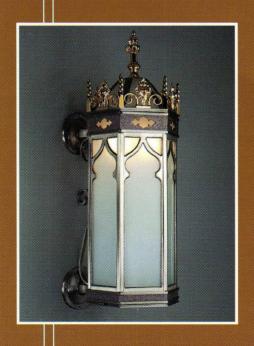
