PORCELAIN BOX WITH CHINA EGG

This porcelain box containing a china egg has been handed down in our family, but we don't know anything about its origin. Can you H. S.-Santa Rosa, Cal. help identify it?

The porcelain egg in your box bears the monogram of Alexandra, wife of Nicholas II, Emperor of Russia, 1894-1918. Quantities of these eggs were made each year and given as gifts at Easter. The porcelain box bears the crossed L's of Sèvres, one of the most widely forged marks, so you should have it examined for authenticity by an expert. Paul is the name of the artist who painted the decoration.

#### ADAM STYLE TEAPOT

My family have owned this silver teapot for many decades. Can you identify it? M.B.—Devon, England



Your silver teapot with footed stand illustrates the simpler version of the Adam style evolved in the late 18th century to suit the taste and the purses of the English middle class. It was extensively imitated abroad, especially in Scandinavia and Portugal as well as in the newly liberated American Colonies.

#### COIN SILVER CUP

This is a sketch of a coin silver cup (and its marks), which belonged to my great grandmother. Do you know what silversmith made it and how old the cup may be?

H.N.A.-Winnsboro, La.

The mark-an anchor, lion, and capital G-is the familiar Gorham trademark introduced in 1868, when it abandoned the coin silver standard

and adopted the sterling standard. Your mark is B interesting because it still conforms to the earlier COIN

standard. "B" indicates that the cup was made in 1869. 49

#### VICTORIAN HAIR WORK

This lovely antique, I am told, is a fine example of hair work. When was this unusual craft popular? F.T.-Perris, Cal.

Jewelry, such as memorial rings, made of hair was created in the 18th century by artists and jewelers. However, hair work for the amateur did not become a fashionable Victorian "art recreation" until about 1850. It remained in favor until

the end of Victoria's reign. Your picture of hair work under glass, in its original frame, is an impressive example of this taste.





E.M.B.-Springfield, Ohio Your curly maple rocking chair was made in the United States, perhaps Ohio, about 1850. It is a fine example of its class.





#### HIGHBOY BASE

I think our lowboy was made in Connecticut. What more can you tell us about it?

H.E.M.-Lakehurst, N.J.

Your piece is not a lowboy but rather the lower part, or base, of a Queen Anne style Connecticut highboy of about 1740. The knee


brackets and moldings joining the lower to upper part are missing. It is said that the carved "sunburst" or "rising sun" is almost the only decorative feature of a Queen Anne style New England highboy.

#### AMERICAN GRANDFATHER CLOCK

This grandfather clock, in my family for years, has on its face the name G. Chandlee-Winchester. Do you know anything about this clockmaker? T.T.H.-Harve, Mont. Your clock was made by Goldsmith Chandlee (d. 1821), who belonged to a Quaker family of clockmakers of Pennsylvania and Maryland. He worked for and succeeded his



father Benjamin Chandlee, Sr. (1685-1745), who, born in Ireland, settled in Philadelphia in 1702 and moved to Maryland in 1712.



#### FRENCH DAYBED

Is the shape of my French daybed typical? To what period does it belong? R.F. -Sacramento, Cal.

Yes, the shape is most typical and enjoyed great popu-

larity from 1740 to 1780. This type of daybed, distinguished by its gondola-shaped back, was made in both the Louis XV and Louis XVI styles. Yours is in the Louis XV style.

Russian china in my possession and of the mark. Can you identify M.L.-Boonton, N.J.

The factory where it was made, Kornilov Bros., which began at St. Petersburg in 1835, shipped a considerable amount of this china to the U.S. from around 1893, during and after the World's Fair at Chicago. The porcelain at the Fair was marked with a Russian bear and inscribed "Made by the Kornilov Brothers." Their export porcelain was of fine translucence and brilliant coloring.



The earlier in life that the habit of overeating is corrected proper eating is instituted the more likely one is to maintan normal weight. The eating habits of the adult often reflect the eahabits of the child. Losing weight is a *learning* process that r be begun, continued, and practiced until moderation become natural way of life.

A diet to lose weight should be adapted to the individual's ne





Crash diets are so restricted that adherence to them is short-lived Crash diets frequently call for the omission of salt and most o the weight loss is water and not fat. Resumption of using sal results in water retention. The salt and water balance in *healthy* individuals is automatically maintained.



a week adds up to twenty-six pounds a year, one pound a week will be fifty-two off in a year. On a gradual weight losing schedule one need not feel deprived nor guilt smitten if one decides on a little indulgence on occasion. The more moderation is practiced in eat-

ing, the more of a fixed habit it becomes. As Albert Camus wrote, "Find indulgence in moderation."

Take on some new activities, not only to take your mind off food, but to add to your weight loss as well. *Walk*. Walk to your neighbor's house rather than drive, walk with a club such as the Adirondack Club, walk as a volunteer guide at your local museum or zoo. It's a marvelous easy exercise. Walking increases your circulation, it increases your cal-

orie utilization, firms up sagging muscles, makes one feel more alive. Be a participant in a sport rather than a spectator. With the current boom in tennis barns, tennis is now an all-year sport. You're sure to be able to find one friend who didn't play as a child. Begin together. And bicycling, now in its renaissance, was one of the first ways a woman felt liberated.

Seasoning is a subtle aid in a low-calorie diet. But season to taste. rather than season to waste. Epicurean seasoning suggests, never announces. Use lemon juice, wine vinegar, herbs and spices such as basil, thyme, and curry, Durkee's or McCormick's butter-salt. Try cooking your vegetables in bouillon. Or the French m for vegetables—very little water and cooked a short time. sprinkle with the butter salt, an American addition. Above all, season to waste all the calories you've already saved. 

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
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### A great American idea 300 YEARS IN THE LIFE OF A COLONIAL TAVERN

n February of 1762, a Rhode Islander, Samuel Matteson, set out with his brothers, their families, and with a grant for a tract of land called Shaftsbury in what is now Vermont. The journey was made by ox sled in the dead of winter and took two months. Although there were no roads or bridges, the ground and the rivers were frozen, and the caravan slid along like a great ski, with Samuel's wife comfortable on a mattress

on the back of a cow. Arriving in Shaftsbury in early April, the clan settled near a fine spring of water, felled trees, built cabins, and planted corn, flax, peas, beans, turnips, and pumpkins-even roses and lilacs. The family prospered, their farms burgeoned, and so did Shaftsbury, which soon became a village bisected by a road that ran all the way from Bennington to Canada. The rumble of stagecoach traffic increased, and by 1766, Peter Matteson, Samuel's oldest son, had the perspicacity to realize that a roadside inn and tavern would not only be appreciated by travelers-but would be a very good investment, too.

It was. Finished in 1777, built like a fortress and surrounded by outbuildings, it provided food, refreshment and comfort for weary travelers for many, many years. In the 1920s, Beatrice Claffin Breese, a New Yorker looking for a country house, came upon the tavern, fell in love with it ("Oh, it is simply topping!" she said—hence the tavern's present name), and

bought it from Peter Matteson's great granddaughter. A few years later, she fell in love again, this time with the Earl of Gosford, an English nobleman, married him, and for forty years the tavern was their summer home.

Lady Gosford was an indefatigable restorer and an insatiable collector. Once the tavern had been put into pristine condition; she combed the countryside for antiques of the right



period, and got up on ladders and down on her hands and knees to stencil walls and floors. This astonishing woman worked unceasingly until 1967, when she died, having bequeathed the tavern to the Bennington Museum as a record of Colonial life.

It is a superb record. Architecturally, the tavern is a late Colonial, three-story, plank and clapboard building painted deep barn red with white trim. There is a handsome front door with a fanlight, side lights, and pilasters, although visitors today enter at one end of a long ell through the old woodshed—now a display area for rare Early American pottery.

The cellar has a cistern, a well with a *very* old oaken bucket, storage for wine and root vegetables.

In the taproom is a bar equipped with fascinating old bottles, tankards, flasks, and a "flip dog"—an iron toddy heater, highly essential in winter. The parlor and the keeping room (a kind of family room) are furnished with Lady Gosford's "finds," which run from elegant


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#### SOME NOTES ON GOOD LOOKS & GOOD HEALTH

EDITOR'S NOTE: Drs. Mary Catherine Tyson and Robert Tyson, she an internist and he a psychologist, are a husband and wife team who bring special knowledge to the subject of dieting. In their new book Psychology of Successful Weight Control to be published in May, they have given considerable attention to the mental side of slimming. "Losing weight is not only a caloric matter but an emotional one as well," they say firmly. You can have all the mechanics of a diet laid out, the final weight goal, the weekly weight loss, the daily caloric intake, the meal charts, but it won't be successful until you overcome the real obstacles that make it difficult to put the program to work. You've got to understand why you are overeating. In this extract, they illustrate some of the typical emotional situations, observed from many years' experience of people and personal conflicts. Their insights may help you locate and get over your own inward hurdles before you get down to the straight sensible suggestions for reducing from our nutritionist Eloise R. Trescher on page 16.

We congratulate the lucky ones who decide to eat less and then do just that. Fortunately, their emotions do not play tricks on them. The majority of overweight people are not so lucky. They have to contend with the hidden obstacles of emotional interference. And to overcome these obstacles, they must first identify them.

#### The basic conflict

Emotional interference doesn't have to be complex. Anyone can make a long list of what pleases and distresses him. The frustration caused by dieting, however, creates a new complication.

Strong motivation *for* dieting is provided when a doctor tells a person that he must diet for the sake of his health or to save his life. Of course he wants to diet for such vital purposes. Even so, when the dieter first gets hungry, he faces a most uncomfortable state. He *thinks* he wants to diet, but he doesn't *feel* like dieting. He wants his usual food in the usual quantities, but he also tries to deny himself this satisfaction. The conflict that results can be severe.

The intensity of this struggle between two opposing wishes is revealed by the fact that very often, even when health or life itself is at stake, the wish *not* to diet is the victor and the whole plan to lose weight fails.

To recognize fully the strength of the wish not to diet is to know the enemy. Only by doing this will you be prepared to persist even if it is exceedingly hard to do so. Many would-be dieters have failed because they underestimated the task they faced.

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

by the doctor and planned her meals for the week ahead. She followed the diet scrupulously at breakfast and lunch on the first day, but at dinner an overwhelming desire to eat more led her to eat at least twice the amount she was accustomed to. This defeat caused her to feel utterly discouraged about losing weight. What was the unconscious block that prevented this woman from carrving out her good intentions?

A talk with the physician, who believed that guidance was often needed along with medical advice, soon uncovered the trouble. Since adolescence, the student had felt that her excess weight made her unattractive, and in fact it did detract from her appearance. She was not sought after when dances and other social occasions became more important in high school. She gave up trying to meet boys and joining in the usual extracurricular activities and preferred to stay at home. Eating became her way of getting pleasure. Social success seemed to be out of reach, but candy bars, ice cream, pizzas, and French fries were rewards she could always count on.

The young woman's conscious determination to diet was sincere and her planning was sensible. However, she did not understand what an important part overeating played in her life. That was the hidden block. She was trying to do without one of the few real satisfactions in her life: eating as much as she wanted to whenever she felt the urge.

The hidden block in the path of a dieter often seems to be illogical, far-fetched, and "just in the mind." But it's real enough and damages a person's best interests. When it is uncovered and understood, a pathway to new habits can open up.

The student in this story realized that her overweight condition interfered with her social life, her image of herself, and her health. She knew that dieting would help her in all these areas. Gradually she accepted opportunities to meet more people rather than avoiding them as she had been doing. This new and increasingly successful search for new satisfactions left her less dependent on food as solace, and she found she could adhere to a reasonable diet plan.


This college student's problem was relatively clear and simple. To make the nature of a hidden block still more understandable, here is a more involved story: the case of a woman who lost two pounds a week for five weeks and then, in one dismal week, gained back half the lost weight. Over a period of several months, the pounds were on again, off again. Finally, they remained on and the woman was right back where she started. It was at this point that a conversation between the woman and her doctor solved the mystery.

The woman's husband made regular business trips every few weeks and was away from home for seven days each time. It was in those seven-day periods that the woman gained weight. Loneliness made those absences dull intermissions in her life. She missed not only her husband's company but also the activity of a busier household. Forbidden but attractive food was the simplest compensation and she overate without knowing why.

Could she have perceived this cause and effect? Possibly, and some people solve such mysteries easily. This woman didn't, Continued on page 42


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
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"Wash your hands," your first grade teacher probably said, "before you pick up a book. Don't dog-ear the pages. Don't leave it lying open on its face-that breaks its back. Don't eat over it and scatter crumbs. And if you must make notes, for pity's sake, use a pencil."

Things were simple in those days. First grade readers are not generally concerned with first editions or incunabula or ephemeraor just plain books as books, serious objects bound in solemn brown leather and freighted with the world's knowledge, frivolous pretty things in print paper, or cloth and pasteboard pleasing to the touch, wrapped around some literary artist's lifework. There comes a time in every reader's life, perhaps following addiction to old book shops and library fairs, when he needs a more special knowledge of the care and keeping of fine books.

Properly cared for, books are probably as long-lived as any of man's other paraphernalia. Babylonian clay tablets have an obvious chance at immortality, but even books in their contemporary form -pages sewn up together-can last, say, a thousand years. There are books that old in several rare-book collections. Today, however, books have enemies more omnipresent than ever before in history. Heat, light, dampness, and dirt, always dangerous, have combined with rising levels of air pollution, especially sulphur dioxide, to make faster deterioration a librarian's nightmare.

The worst villain is acidity. Sulphur dioxide in the air is absorbed and slowly oxidizes into destructive sulphuric acid. Or there are natural acids in leather, in the wood pulp that eventually becomes paper, in some cloth, even in some inks, that oxidize over the years and gradually eat away the material of the book. Publishers are very conscious of the problem: "At any respectable level, paper and bindings are now acid-free," says Harry Ford, book designer for Atheneum. "But the 19th century!" says Morgan Library conservator Deborah Evetts, and shudders. Increasing literacy in the 19th century created a demand for mass production of books, and new techniques did away with rag content, which in preceding centuries had kept book paper durable and relatively nonacid. Faster processing left acids in the new wood-pulp paper-with the result that many books printed after 1850 or so now crumble in our fingers as we turn the pages.

Modern books have special neutralizing treatments, even protective coatings, but acid cannot be entirely avoided. There are, however, a few simple things you can do to slow the aging process down considerably.

#### Good ways to keep favorite books

Sunlight is fairly speedy death for any binding, cloth as well as leather. Keep your books out of the sun. Fluorescent light works almost like sunlight: avoid it in the library.

Sudden changes in temperature and humidity, or extremes of either, are very bad for books. Don't put them where they will be subject to quick change. Really val-uable books should be kept in glazed bookcases, since glass slows down the speed of temperature and humidity changes and helps

keep out dust and polluted air.

Keep books away from heat, which speeds the oxidation of acids. "Air conditioning is as good for books as it is for people," says bookbinder Carolyn Horton.

Particularly in cities, low bookshelves are better than high ones, since dirt and heat tend to rise and collect at the tops of rooms, especially in the corners.

Dust jackets are colorful and do help to keep books clean, but some Continued on next page

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It's a minor help to keep books flush with the front of the bookshelf, which does away with the need to dust in front of the books -and the wear and tear a dust cloth can cause to bindings.

Don't let books lean on the shelf. It puts an uneven strain on the bindings and eventually the body of the book will come loose.

Dust has a cumulative effect, so keep your books clean. It's a lot easier to keep dust from building up than it is to deal with the longterm damage.

#### Basic care for books

Carolyn Horton's very useful book, *Cleaning and Preserving Bindings and Related Material*, has become an essential handbook for librarians and others in charge of valuable books. In it she describes a technique for dusting books that minimizes wear and tear. If it's a once-over with the vacuum cleaner, use the round dusting brush. Run it gently over the spine and tops of the books on the shelf.

To do a thorough hand-dusting, take each book from the shelf-by its sides, never by pulling at the soft top of the spine-and hold it firmly closed, slanting down with the spine up. Dust the pages carefully with a treated cloth, top first, brushing away from the spine. Then dust the whole binding. Mrs. Horton has tested both One-Wipe and Endust, as she has tested all the products mentioned in this article; neither leaves harmful residues. The gold on some top page edges, incidentally, is there to vent dust from sifting into b

#### Leather bindings need special care

Leather bindings need specare. They should be oiled o sionally to keep the leather f drying out and cracking. Use ne foot oil (a traditional leather dh ing made from calves' feet) leather dressing or the form recommended by Mrs. Horton percent neat's foot oil and 40 cent anhydrous lanolin (see ply sources, page 156).

Test the oil on a small unob sive place first: some leathers not absorb oil evenly, some discolor slightly, some may l become aged and powdery. leather has become so power that it cannot be restored by or alone, a spray coat of Krylon help.) Pour the oil into a he flat dish and apply it to the l with a cloth pad or a flat pa brush. If the binding includes of or paper, protect it from the carefully, and do not oil turned-in edges that come in tact with the pages. An accide spot can be removed immedia with cotton dampened with luene or hexane. Apply the oil one hand only, and hold the l only with the clean hand. W all the oil has been absorbed the book feels dry, after abou hours give the book a good po ing. Vellum or tawed leather co with alum should not be o Clean with an eraser. Since lum has a tendency to warp, I it in a slipcase.

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Once you have decided a book eeds work, there are certain ings that should be attempted ly by a trained book binder. ut, if you are dextrous, here are pairs you can make yourself:

Torn pages: Never mend with ellophane or masking tape. ventually it will dry, crack, roll, nd stain the book. If tape has een used, remove it with equal arts of toluene and hexane aplied to the reverse side of the age, testing first to make sure the olvent won't dissolve the ink. hen mend the tear with Dennion's Transparent Mending Tape, errating the tape edges with pinkng shears if the paper is thin. Or ear a strip of Green's 105 Lens issue to the shape you need, and aste it down with a wheat paste ke Schweitzer's No. 6 applied to he %-inch on each side of the tear. lot the excess.

Acid stains: Sometimes the proective tissue over a plate turns rown and transfers a stain to the icture. Either remove the tissue r place a barrier sheet of paper ke Permalife treated with sizing etween the tissue and adjacent ages. If acid from the binding is taining the fly leaves, use barrier heets. Bleaching or removing tains is a job for a professional.

Loose plates: Look to see how ney were originally fastened in. f, as is usual, they were pasted to text page along one edge, reaste them like this: lay the plate ace down on a sheet of clean aper. Cover it with another sheet, eaving % of an inch exposed on he edge you want to paste. Brush n the paste, thinly. Remove the overing sheet and insert the plate arefully into the book. Close the ook to make sure the plate is in traight, then slip waxed paper in m each side to prevent damage rom any oozing glue, and weight with a wrapped brick until it dries. Dirt: First, try to wipe it from he pages with a treated dustcloth. f that doesn't work, try a wall-

paper cleaner like Absorene, takng care to get all the crumbs out of the book when you finish. If hat doesn't work, try a cleaner alled Opaline. Pink Pearl or Magic-Rub erasers are good for stubborn spots. All of these prodacts have been tested and leave no harmful residues-and if none of them work, the stain is a problem for a professional.

not recommended except for waterproof bindings since it removes sizing and color and may remove or fill in gold stamping. Commercial book cleaners work sometimes. Water should never be used on leather bindings. Saddle soap, barely damp, may work.

Leather bindings should be given a protective treatment of potassium lactate as a first essential step toward preserving them. The formula Mrs. Horton recommends is one by the British Museum Laboratory: 7 percent potassium lactate in distilled water with 0.25 percent paranitrophenol to fend off mold. Test it on an inside corner, then pour the solution into a

heavy flat dish and apply with a piece of terry cloth (don't treat suede or leather that has become powdery), patting it on. Be generous but not sloppy, and pay attention to head and tail caps and turn-ins on the spine. When the leather has absorbed the liquid (don't let it dry in beads), stand the book upright, slightly open, to air-dry for 24 hours. Then oil it.

Faded color: A full-scale coloring job requires great skill, but a little touch-up on heads, tails, and worn edges can be very rejuvenating. Apply Dr. Martin's Synchromatic Transparent Water Colors with cotton swabs. When the color is dry, if heads and tails are fraying, strengthen them with a white glue like Elmer's or Borden's, rubbed on with a forefinger. Tuck the loose threads in.

Broken corners: If the covering is worn through, you can separate the layers of the pasteboard with a thin sharp knife, work wheat paste carefully between them, then cover the corner with waxed paper and squeeze it to work the paste as far between the layers as possible. Wipe off the excess paste and, if the corner holds its shape, let it air-dry, then color it. If it insists on springing open, cover the corner again with waxed paper, place pieces of cardboard on each side, Continued on page 156



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



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### **BY MARY MOON HEMINGWAY**

Spring has come again to my part of the world with all the headiness it implies. The tulips are triumphant. There are still daffodils and narcissus flowering generously in bed and field and American cowslip and lady's slippers bloom in the soft shade of the woodland patch. All of this exhilaration should be shared. I'm impelled to entertain with unfettered enthusiasm but as effortlessly as I can.

One of the easiest ways I know is what we at our house call **the moveable feast**—a buffet party built around a standard pattern but with interchangeable parts suitable for brunch, lunch, or an informal dinner. The trick is progressive planning and cooking, using the same structure for each meal, the same serving dishes and pieces, more or less the same timing, and having a clear kitchen and uncrowded stove no matter the meal. Establish a model, get into the rhythm, and you can do it easily over and over again. The basic structure for all three meals is a matter of four similar parts for each. For instance, **brunch**:

**Part I:** For easy openers, instead of cocktails have two punch bowls, one of white wine and soda (two-thirds wine to one part soda) iced with a strawberry-and-mint-studded ice ring mold—it can be frozen and stored in the freezer days before the brunch. The other bowl filled with daiquiris is iced with another ring, half water, half daiquiri mix, trimmed with lime slices, also frozen in advance. I don't like to overwhelm guests with a preprandial abundance. Anticipation is the word, not surfeit, so for appetizers there will just be raw mushroom slices, raw broccoli flowerets, raw zucchini strips, plus a bowl of chopped parsley, chives, and sour cream dip and a saucer of seasoned salt.

Part II: You can use three buffet tables or a big and a little one or divide one table into three parts. To sharpen the appetite visually have a wealth of beautiful fruit-two platters of two kinds of melon wedges, a platter of sugared half-circles of fresh pineapple, and a big bowl of strawberries with a sugar shaker on the side. For the thirsty add a pitcher or pitchers of icy cranberry with orange juice. Part III: This is the more serious part of the meal. For brunch try crêpes filled with creamed chipped beef. I make the crêpes themselves whenever the mood strikes and freeze them between wax paper squares, assembling the dish the day before the brunch. Just before popping them into the oven, the crêpes are sauced with a thinned version of the filling. Successive dishes of these may be heated to serve a large crowd-in with one, out with the other. Sausage balls are nice with this-uncooked bulk sausage meat formed into small balls and frozen in large foil envelopes. which can be fitted into a crowded oven more easily than if they were in a dish and transferred to the proper serving dish when ready. (They can cook along with the crêpes.) Hashed brown potatoes add a satisfying crunch but if oven space is at a premium, try hashed in cream in a double boiler. Stuff hard-cooked eggs with a crumbled bacon, onion, and yolk mixture, making them in the morning, the eggs already having been cooked, and serve at room temperature. I also make lots of little baking powder biscuits and cornsticks to suit my schedule, freezing them, too, in loose foil Continued on page 140

# Secrets of three American women who have understood and made history with The power 0

EDITOR'S NOTE: Pursuing the pleasures of the dinner table is Naomi Barry's specialty. An American and a dedicated traveler who makes Paris her headquarters, she writes a regular column on dining out for The International Herald Tribune and frequent magazine articles on food and travel. She has also written a popular guide, Paris Personal, and, most recently, collaborated with Beppe Bellini on Food alla Florentine (Doubleday 1972). For House & Garden Naomi Barry examines the entertaining styles and skills of three talented American women who rose to power and fame at the dinner table.

Thomas Jefferson, third President of the United States, scandalized foreign ministers by receiving them in his carpet slippers. So anxious was he to break with traditional formalities that even at his official dinners, guests sat down pell-mell. Jefferson believed genuine republicanism required a revolution in manners and customs as well as in government.

Not everyone understood. Mrs. Anthony Merry, wife of the British envoy, raged for years because the reserved place of honor she expected at her first presidential dinner was occupied by the sister-in-law of the American Secretary of the Treasury. Mrs. Gallatin simply had gotten there first. Mr. Merry, however, interpreted the disregard for protocol as a snub intended for England.

Jefferson, an exquisite host at home in Monticello, was deliberately gauche in Washington. The Republic was still a fledgling and he wanted the message of democracy to get across to the capitals of Europe. In addition, he was out to squelch the aristocratic pretensions of his Federalist rivals.

When the social situation rose to a dangerous boil, a note was hurried by hand to the wife of the Secretary of State, who pinch-hit as official hostess for the President who was a widower.

"Thomas Jefferson begs Mrs. Madison will be so good as to dine with him today, to take care of female friends."

The President knew he could count on the bold, handsome Dolley to uphold his cause. Furthermore, her amiable unpretentious manners were as dependably soothing as balm of honey and almonds.

"Jemmy" Madison agreed with his chief that the new nation had a character so unique that every aspect of its life was worth the attention of those who cared for its future. In Dolley, both men had a skilled ally. When Madison succeeded Jefferson in 1809, the mold had been set and he felt free to unite the cultural graces and the best of European traditions with attitudes, habits, and customs thoroughly republican. Dolley's magic touch made it possible to inject a certain elegance into dinners, receptions, balls, and visits without being unrepublican.

At the Madison inaugural reception, according to Margaret Bayard Smith, first of the Washington gossip chroniclers, both "Jemmy" and Jefferson wore suits from the Connecticut factory. Dolley's finery came from Paris, "the dress with a very long train, plunging around the neck without any handkerchief, and a beautiful bonnet of purple velvet and white satin with white plumes. She was all dignity and affability."

At the Ball at Long's Hotel, where she wore a dress of buff-colored velvet, Mrs. Smith gushed, "Dolley looked like a queen and displayed such manners as would disarm envy itself."

Dolley Payne Todd was a twenty-six-year-old widow with a two-year-old son when James Madison, a shy bachelor of forty-three, asked Aaron Burr to introduce him. She was maternal yet droll, loved to play cards for small stakes, and liked her pinch of snuff. The smitten congressional leader from Virginia was prepared to retire to the joys of life on the plantation. Jefferson cajoled her help to keep him in government, dangling the potential position of the presidency.

With Dolley as hostess, the eight years of the Madison administration were a social triumph, and her husband backed her all the way.

Two months after Madison became president and they moved into the White House, she decided that the decorating was far enough along to institute the first of her Wednesday Drawing Rooms.

Washington Irving described them as being "crowded with great and little men, ugly old women and beautiful young ones. Mrs. Madison had a smile and a pleasant word for everybody."

Congressman Elijah Mills wrote his wife in Massachusetts that "coffee and wine and punch were handed about to all classes and conditions of society, from the minister plenipotentiary of the Emperor of Russia to the underclerks of the post office, members of Congress and officers of the Army and Navy, greasy boots and silk stockings, Virginia buckskins and Yankee cowhides, all mingled in ill-assorted and fantastic groups."

If you wanted to take the political pulse of the town, it was imperative to be present at Dolley's levees. The informal receptions drew diplomats, cabinet officers, congressmen of both parties, American and European travelers. She presided and Madison talked in corners.

"By her deportment in her own house, you cannot discover who are her husband's friends or foes," wrote home approvingly Representative Jonathan Roberts of Pennsylvania.

The Americans were crazy about Dolley's food, whether at tent picnics over the Potomac, alfresco suppers under the trees at the Virginia plantation, or in the White House.

e French Baron de Montlezun, a veteran of own, who visited the Madisons' plantation, pelier, in 1816, was greeted warmly by y, "who is sweetness, honesty, and goodtself. The Madisons possess to a high dehe precious and rare art of leaving to the ns who pay them a visit the comfort and om they enjoy in their own home, placing s at their ease by showing them they are so selves and that they follow their necessary ions instead of fatiguing them by hanging unremitting on their shoulders."

The Madisons entertained as lavishly at Montpelier as they did in Washington and Dolley had a carpenter build a colonnade over the sunken ice house to keep cool drinks and ice cream ready for visitors.

In July 1805, a Dr. and Mrs. Harrison Smith made the 25-mile drive from Monticello. Mrs. Smith noted in her diary, "It was near five o'clock when we arrived, we were met at the door by Mrs. Madison who had us into the dining room where some men were still drinking wine and smoking segars, and after embracing me, took my hand, saying with a smile, I will take you out of this smoke to a pleasanter room.

"She took me thru the tea room to her chamber. I was going to take my seat on the sopha, but she said I must lay down by her on the bed, and rest myself. She loosened my riding habit, took off my bonnet, and we threw ourselves on her bed. Wine, ice, punch and delightful pineapple were immediately brought. No restraint. No ceremony. Hospitality is the presiding genius of this house and Mrs. Madison, uniting to all the elegance and polish of fashion, the unadulterated simplicity, frankness, warmth and friendliness of her native character."

At supper, the long table was spread, according to Mrs. Smith with "tea and coffee, a variety of warm cakes, bread, cold meats, and pastry." Late the next morning, she was called to a late breakfast by Nany, the maid, who brought ice and water to her room and assisted her to dress.

"We sat down between 15 and 20 persons to a most excellent Virginia breakfast—tea, coffee, hot white bread, light cakes, a pone or corn loaf, cold ham, nice hashes, chicken, etc."

The great political hostess is a special breed. Henry Adams credited Dolley with being "brilliant in the things she did not say and do."

Even Mrs. Frances Few, a sister-in-law of Gallatin, who disapproved of her vivacity and daring décolletage had to admit, "Her face expresses nothing but good nature. It is impossible to be with her and not be pleased. There is something very fascinating about her, yet I do not think it is possible to know what her real opinions are. She is all things to all men—not the least of a prude as she one day told an old bachelor and held up her mouth for him to kiss."

Dolley Madison's long and popular reign as queen of official society had no parallel in American history. Even as a widow in Washington, she still kept open house on New Year's Day and Fourth of July. James Buchanan, fifteenth President of the U.S., claims he learned etiquette in Dolley Madison's salon.

She died in 1848. Six years later, Jennie Jerome was born in Brooklyn. Dolley served two presidents with her charm, tact, and perspicacity as a hostess. Beautiful, ebullient Jennie's entertaining talents were equally dazzling. Her gifts advanced the careers of a British cabinet member and of a prime minister of England. The first was her husband, Lord Randolph Churchill. The latter was her son, Winston Spencer Churchill.

Jennie Churchill was a stunner. After she met and married Randolph, the second son of the Duke of Marlborough, her dark and vibrant looks immediately established her on the English scene as a PB. The Professional Beauties were the most ravishing young matrons in British society and their photos (without permission) were sold in shops all (*Continued on page 153*) Set the scene to make things happen

bring the sea and sky indoors is wonderfully demonstrated in this setting. The long entrance hall, which leads to the dining room, has two ficus nitida trees, which only grow with lots of sun—but house, everything gets lots of sun. On the painted white redwood th its glass top is another collection of porcelain, blue and white summer sea. Hardy sisal matting covers the floor throughout. stools and benches line each side of the corridor. The mixture ue and modern is a continuing theme—note the contrast be-

tween the antique table in the dining room, below, and the abstract painting by Frank Stella above it. Under the stairs, a print by Jasper Johns. Bamboo makes many appearances, because it is so light and summery, as in the dining room chairs, which have quilted cushions criss-crossed in ribbon. The screen by the fireplace, below and right, is a Regency bamboo screen, which would normally have fabric in it. The result is gloriously airy. Fresh vegetables from the garden sit on the table. The painting over the fireplace is by Roy Lichtenstein, and its blues and whites and yellows again repeat the song of summer that fills this house. Everything lets the fresh air in, as in the hall, below, the painted wooden fretwork stair railing-simplified Chinese Chippendale, reflecting the pattern in the dining room door that opens on to the beach-both original patterns in the house that fit naturally into the surroundings. "All is cool and summery-like the style of the house itself," says Mark Hampton. That is the feeling throughout. Every breath you breathe in this wide-open house has the taste of salt and sunshine.

# EASY-DOES-IT DECORATING A FARMHOUSE REFINISHED FOR AMERICAN ANTIQUES

Western Massachusetts was a kind of crossroads for the American Colonial world. New Englanders passed through on their way to New York. The Dutch paused there as they came up the Hudson. Settlers headed west along post roads, Shakers settled nearby. In the midst was the 18th-century farmhouse above, restored, filled with furniture of the area and period. "For years, every time I passed, I thought, 'what a lovely house,' " says owner Jack Lumpkin. "Suddenly there it was, for sale." Two centuries had left their mark, but stripped to the plaster, the house itself gave hints for refurbishing. Now his collection of country antiques is gracefully at home. The kitchen, a later addition, above right, has an authentically painted hutch for New England pewter, stoneware crocks-and a 20thcentury American double sink. A 17th-century ratchet candleholder lights the old tavern table. Baskets and herbs hang from beams, utensils hang from Shaker wall pegs on either side of a small-paned window, opposite page, above left. A pencil-post tester bed, opposite page, below left, has an early 1800s handloomed coverlet and bed hangings of a reproduction of resistprint fabric. The 1600s Carver chair is oak. The original kitchen, below, huge fireplace and crane still in place, is now the living room. On the floors, good old Afghan and Persian rugs. Dining room chairs, right below, are country Queen Anne. On windows that frame a Dutch Friesland clock, a copy of 18th-century window treatment. Also in the dining room, opposite page, right, a New Hampshire pewter cupboard holds Canton ware and zinnias from the old-fashioned garden. PEADLE



EASY-DOES-IT DECORATING A RAMBLING HOUSE WITH A FRESH MIXTURE OF COLORS AND TREASURES The ultimate dream for many is to live a summer life year long. Capture the casual existence that goes with picnics, swimming, sailing, sunning. Some manage it. The Roy B. Simpsons love their rambling, turn-of-the-century summer house by the water so much that a few years ago, they decided to give up their city apartment and live there full time. And because they wanted to feel they were living outdoors all year, they added a conservatory on the south side, opposite page, center and top left. Glass skylights and windows all around trap neat in winter; in summer the glass is replaced with screens. The family dines at the beautiful Portuguese tiled table and watches the passing marine traffic and wildlife, opposite page, below left,

in all seasons. "It's a comfortable, rather English room where we live all the time." For larger parties in cold weather, when guests can't spill out to the terrace or the croquet lawn, there is the indoor dining room, opposite page, below right. "I wanted to make this an informal luncheon room so I chose a leafy print and blue and white flowered carpet," explains Mrs. Simpson who with her husband shares a deep interest in the decorative arts. The glorious Sun Yellow living room, this page, is a rich mixture of Danish, Chinese, English, French, and American furniture-"I've always loved blending." The wonderful screen over the cinnabar velvet couch is Japanese "probably 18th-century, Japanese robes hanging in heavenly rest, the gold represents heaven," says Mrs. Simpson. DAVID MASSEY



# EASY-DOES-IT DECORATING AN AMERICAN COTTAGE WITH THE SURPRISE OF COUNTRY FRENCH FURNITURE

This little enchanting cottage on the Cape has quite a history. Nearly 300 years ago it started out as a classic Early American farmhouse with a central chimney, three rooms up and three rooms down. In the 1880s it was swept from its grassy knoll to make way for a churchand relocated in the same village, 100 yards or so down the road, an extension added at the back in character, in old wood. When Robert Hill, a Boston interior designer found it, eight years ago, however, drastic renovation was called for. "It was guite a wreck, but the basic structure was sound," he recalls, "a treasure to bring to life." "We completely reroofed and reshingled the outside. Inside we found the lines of the old chimney, under the roof in the attic, which had been destroyed when the house was moved. We put it back and opened up the three fireplaces downstairs, which had been blocked up. The original moldings in two of them were still there." With four bedrooms, and three bathrooms upstairs now, two lovely terraces (one, below, made from 18th-century cobblestones from streets in New Bedford), Mr. Hill has established a very special weekend retreat where he can enjoy entertaining friends year round. "It's always very casual and very outdoors," he says, "in summer, a picnic at the beach, swimming, sailing. Guests garden if they feel like it. I leave activities very much to them." In winter, he brings the outdoors in, filling all the rooms with potted trees and plants. Driveway to the house, top right, paved with mauvish-gray gravel from a local quarry, meanders mysteriously up to the front door through tall shrubs and trees. This as totally thought out as the marvelous sunlit rooms indoors. "Before, you went down a little road," Mr. Hill recalls, "smack to the house. That was very uninteresting. I planted an island of greenery to break it up. I really love to garden so I enjoyed planning everything outdoors just as much as I did the indoors."

The Early American farmhouse doesn't necessarily need to be decorated in a predictable Early American style. Why not bring in the sunshine yellows of the outdoors, little trees, lots of greenery, take a fresh approach, make an interior that's different? "I do think it's worth remembering that Early American houses weren't all ladderback chairs and spinning wheels, anyway," Mr. Hill observes. "They were varied, people did have pieces from China and all sorts of things. I feel this sort of interior is so simple it can take almost anything, especially to-day." Having lived in France for a while and collected furniture there, he chose to decorate with country French furniture, a lot of yellow, creating refreshing cheerfulness throughout.

The library-dining room, above and lower right, he blanketed white for lightness even lacquering the floors ("all in the house are original, except one, and some have planks as wide as 2 feet"). This room is flexible, now a quiet place for backgammon or reading, at other times, it transforms for dinner parties, since the fruitwood table extends to seat twelve. The comfortable, high-backed chairs are upholstered in a sunny Indian cotton plaid. Between the windows, shaded with white duck Roman blinds, hangs a splendid English parliament clock; on the wall nearby a contemporary painting by Jason Berger. The same pleasing mixture of old and new travels all over the house. In summer, most meals are outdoors-lunch (cold cucumber soup, salad Niçoise, white wine) is set on the brick terrace, right, with yellow Portuguese pottery and Finnish glass. Barn is partly a potting shed and storage for gardening tools.

As well as designing interiors and gardening, Mr. Hill also happens to love cooking—as is evident from his kitchen, *above and far left*, with a wonderfully warm, farmhouse feeling—lots of copper pots, wicker seating, and some strong woods. The table and the armoire (used to store wine) are both French country pieces. "The armoire came from a barnyard in Normandy. It has been outdoors for some time and weathered to a superb silvery driftwood color." The old pantry, *top*, has been converted into a little dining room for Sunday suppers. Staircase wall, *left*, is a great silvery surprise. **EEADLE** 

The big living room, above, top left, lower left, was originally three little rooms, "dark little holes with no light at all," Mr. Hill went on, "I did a lot of work here and took away walls, making one big space 30 feet long. The oak floor is new. The two large French doors to the terrace replaced two tiny windows. I also put in the fireplace mantel, which came from France. The room faces north, it virtually gets no sun, just reflected light, so that was the reason for keeping it yellow and white." The carpet is a sweep of white, nubbly wool, handwoven, from Ireland. More of the yellow and white plaid cotton seen in the dining room surfaces on some chairs. The sofa and other chairs are covered with white duck, crewel embroidered, again a fabric from India. In winter, Mr. Hill treats the sunniest rooms down-

stairs as a sort of conservatory for all his potted plants and trees, clustering cyclamen and geraniums in the fireplace in the morning room, left center. The silver candlesticks and the pewter dish on the mantel are Dutch. White painted floor here, as the one in the kitchen, far left, is sealed with a polyurethane finish, making it easy to mop clean. Even so, for the rainy day, it makes sense to have a shoe mat by the back door.

American-born writer Roderick Cameron describes his historic Mediterranean hou and its small terrace gardens that can be an inspiration to gardeners everywho

EDITOR'S NOTE: Roderick Cameron lives part of the year in southern France and is working on his eighth book, Terraces in the Sun, a history of the Riviera. It will be published in 1975 by Weidenfeld and Nicolson, with cover painted by Graham Sutherland. In Cyril Connolly's words, Mr. Cameron "writes passionately about landscape and architecture." His books include Equator Farm, Shadows from India, Time of the Mango Flowers, Shells (see collection in his pool pavilion), The Golden Haze (South Pacific), Viceroyalties of the West, and Australia.



Le Clos Fiorentina dates from the end of the 18th century and is the oldest house on Cap Ferrat, or more exactly, the Pointe Ste Hospice. It belonged originally to a vintner from Nice, and when my family bought La Fiorentina some thirty-five years ago, it formed part of the

estate. It is rare to find old houses so close to the shoreline for it was not until the 1920s that it became fashionable to live on the coast, most people having preferred to be more removed from the sea.

La Fiorentina was a great, ugly, pseudo-Florentine building when we first moved into it. My mother had the choice of a variety of villas but quite rightly chose Fiorentina on account of the situation. The house could be altered but it would be impossible to better its position, which occupies the end of a peninsula. Doubled back from the Cap like a thumb, it commands the most spectacular view out over the sea to the mainland, a series of precipitous limestone cliffs rising to the height of nearly 2,000 feet before collapsing, in folds of varying blue, into Italy.

We lived in the Clos while rebuilding the big house and then moved back again when the rest of the property was sold four years ago. The house has no pretensions to architecture but in its simplicity has a certain charm and is typical of the country-red tiled floors and white marble stairs, a Roman tiled roof, green shutters, and pinkish-ocher walls. An old covered well outside the front door constituted the only water supply. The rooms in their original state were on the small side and it was a question of knocking down walls and adding the extra accommodation needed: an improved kitchen, servant's hall and pantry and linen rooms, and-the most complicated of all-a garage. It is obvious that any additions had to be carefully handled not to spoil the house's original character and this was rather difficult as the Clos sits

on the side of a hill with its gardens reaching down to the sea in a series of terraces.

As to the recent decoration of the actual house, it has been kept very simple. I purposely chose simple colors, limiting myself to the different variations of green and yellow. The stairs and corridors are chalk white with white cotton curtains, the curtains being always kept drawn on account of the drawings on the walls, which would fade in the bright light. In the drawing room I was obliged to block out two windows in order to obtain space for the paintings. To make up for the loss of light, I washed the whole room a pale yellow; the heavy, crude silk curtains are the same color as the walls, the flooring being laid with old terra-cotta tiles. It makes a deliciously cool room in the summer and the luminosity makes a good foil for the leather-bound books and the glint of gilded bronze on the light wood, French, 18thcentury furniture. Other notes in the room are the yellowish-whites of two Elizabethan portraits and an extra large sofa of a dusty blue color, which mixes well with the pale limes of the Kashmir carpet, especially worked for the house. Opening off this is the small winter dining room divided up into panels and lozenges of false marble painted in a mixture of pistachio green and various shades of buff. Purposely naïve, it is the work of an old man who has spent the major part of his life on scaffoldings, renovating the Italianate pastiches of Nice's numerous churches. The ceiling is washed to resemble a blue, cloud-driven sky, a common practice here in the older houses. Both these ground floor rooms give on to the terrace overlooking Beaulieu Bay, an area shaded with vines that during the hot months acts as a living room.

The rattan furniture at the vine-free end of the terrace and in the swimming-pool pavilion, is either natural colored or painted white, the cushions being covered in a



Citrus trees with white-daubed trunks grow in the sunken garden called the mandarin walk, *above*, a sun-stitched tapestry of leaf colors, shapes, and textures. The white of the trunks and rice-stone paths is a foil for blue-green rue, artemisias, arums, alliums, round-leaved ligularia. Along the wall, *above and opposite page, center left*, are oleander, euphorbias, strap-leaved aspidistra (our Cast-iron house plant) that conceal in-season pots of agapanthus, lily of the Nile. On the dining terrace partly shaded by grape leaves, *right*, guests enjoy the view of Beaulieu Bay and perhaps a breakfast with marmalade made of oranges and lemons from the garden.

n decorating as in gardening, Mr. Cameron limited himself to a few quiet colors. The drawing room, *above left, center, and below,* is pale yellow and deliciously cool in summer. It opens to the grape-shaded terrace in front of the house and the walkways, *above,* to and from various gardens. Obliged to block out two windows to obtain space for paintings, the owner made up for the loss of light by washing the room in yellow and using raw silk curtains of the same color. Their luminosity sets off the leather-bound books, fine 18th-century French furniture, the terra-cotta tile flooring,

the carpet made in Kashmir for the house, even one of Mr. Cameron's apricot pugs. Two of the paintings in the room are a Dutch seascape of Charles I's royal yacht and an Elizabethan portrait of Lady Lovelace, *right*. The plant is an aucuba variegata in a basket from Singapore. From the house, steps lead down the steep hillside past banks of lavender, framed by fig and indigenous palms, *left*, then to the swimming pool pavilion with its pot plants and olive trees, *left*. Even here, colors are as unobtrusive as they are in the terrace gardens and the house. HORST





verywhere at Le Clos Fiorentina there is harmony of color and of form, even in daring combinations such as formal spheres of boxwood and feathery artemisia, *left*. Form becomes subtle rhyme, nature's own mimicry, where spires of cypress trees are repeated by spikes of lavender, right. Pittosporum, below right, and dusty miller in yellow bloom, oleander, and lowgrowing gazania uniflora surround this terrace, a pause in the descent from

house to swimming pool. A pair of 17th-century griffins overlook the pavilion's red-tiled roof, which is curved in the Portuguese manner. The glassed ends, opposite page and below, house a collection of cymbidium orchids, aloes, camellias, amaryllis. On shelves behind glass in the seating area, below, is a collection of seashells. Near a pillar and near the sofa are flourishing green bay trees, lauris nobilis. Here, as on the sunny end of the dining terrace at the house, rattan furniture is either natural or painted white. The cushions are of waterproof nonglossy white material. Towels match the lavender hillsides. Nothing competes with the gardens' colors. Other glimpses of Le Clos Fiorentina, bottom row left to right: Boxwood garden and Chinese Chippendale stair railing that leads to hilltop terraces where, each spring, early irises bloom at the feet of flowering Judas (Cercis) trees. A table set with bird plates by Picasso and a ceramic chariot. Guest room with beds covered in white quilted cotton and hung with airy white voile. A seeming-sculpture, far right, actually an 18th-century lightning conductor from Cézanne's home in Aix-en-Provence; Mr. Cameron painted it white, set it on a plinth, another form of visual poetry. # The surprise of a Caribbean wing in Connecticut

At first glance, 1, it's a pleasant suburban house, the winding driveway down from the road butting into blind garage doors, a glassed-in breezeway, the rest of the house off there somewhere to the right, Comfortable, friendly, typical-but, 2, take a closer look. Advertising executive Folke Lidbeck has added a very private pleasure palace to it, and so made his house exceptional.

The garage sits on top of a new game room that doubles as a place to keep guests. But the real transformation isn't visible until you walk around the house. There, facing a lawn fringed with woods through which, in summer, no other house is visible, is a cool Caribbean façade, 4, its simple restraint at home even in Connecticut, which admires its own reflection in the swimming pool at night.

The simplicity is deceptive. The new addition includes well-loved parts of at least four countries, places the Lidbecks remember fondly-but it's not a house in which international influences jumble together to produce something vaguely cosmopolitan. Rather, specific national references maintain a separate and very peaceful coexistence.


First, there's the bocce court, 3, a macadam strip scattered with balls, dedicated to a favorite Italian pastime.


Then, 4 and 5, there are the broad brick terraces surrounding the pool, set with chaise lounges and tables, reminiscent of the south of France.

Tucked behind the original garage, now a study (downstairs windows on the left), is a sauna, souvenir of Mr. Lidbeck's Swedish childhood.

Most important, the jewel inside the elegant box, is the new garden room. "We've always loved the islands of the Caribbean," says Babs Lidbeck. "We wanted something that would give us the feeling of being there. Orderly, sort of formal, maybe, but relaxed and full of color and light." With architect Robert Hatch they achieved it with patterns and texture, space and light. The arched doorways that echo each other on every side of the room-those in the inner wall have dark mirrored panes-make it a gazebo seemingly surrounded by tropical greenery. Bubble skylights, see plan, below, sift light over the jungle inside. The cool, classical parapet around it all encloses a roof patio for sunbathing. The wing on the right is a carefree throwaway for balance, shelter for a marble child, flowers, a few sticks of firewood in the winter.

Life in the new addition is informal, a kind of yearround vacation. "Like being in the Caribbean without having to get there," laughs Mrs. Lidbeck. But it's planned for Connecticut winters, too. One of the matching garden room sofas, *above*, is covered in white vinyl to welcome wet bathing suits but the other is a warm gay print just as suitable for winter fireplace-watching. The pillows mix. "It looked a little stark the other way," says Mr. Lidbeck. The shiny floor tiles have radiant heat for bare wintertime feet.

In the summertime, lunch is often outside, where a locust provides just enough shade for new sunburns. The terrace has handy access to a small bar off the garden room.


As they stand at the sliding glass doors of the entrance, guests can look up, 1, to the sliding glass doors to the roof deck. The stairway is lit by a Scandinavian chandelier and by a nonsliding glass roof. The orientation of the house allows little direct sun. Instead, jungle plants thrive on the intense indirect daylight they love. The schefflera, 2, has grown a foot under the glow of the skylight. A hose under the stairway allows wholesale watering that doesn't bother the brick floor a bit. On the left wall, a Talavera tile fountain, bought and carefully crated in Spain, sounds like a distant mountain rill. The hall looks like an exhibit in a botanical garden.


The new bar, 3, is useful for informal entertaining. But the main kitchen, 4, got some renovation, too: new cabinets, new white sliding doors to close

it off, new appliances. Where the study once was, there is now a new formal dining room.

The whole project reflects the Lidbecks' plan for years ahead. Of their three daughters, only one is still at home. "We felt the worst thing we could do would be to think of smaller quarters," says Mr. Lidbeck. "What about families and grandchildren?" Even now, school friends camp all over, in guest/ game room, on sofas, sometimes on the warm floor tiles—and share the year-long vacation house.

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# New hub of the house from a narrow kitchen and a mini dining room

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A minuscule dining room, above, which, with the original next-door kitchen, below, became the sleek, gleaming, new dining-kitchen, right.



In the 1920s, it was the custom to build new apartment houses of quality in the tradition of the day. However limited the space, there was almost always a dining room and someone in the kitchena cook or a maid. Today, when the "someone" is likely to be you, tradition gets short shrift. More often than not, the kitchen isn't big enough to eat in, and often the dining room isn't either-fine for breakfast, but too small for a dinner party. So why not incorporate the two areas? The merger can work beautifully, as you can see in this ingeniously successful example of remodeling. The wall between kitchen and dining room disappeared, see plans, far right, to provide enough space for the demands of an ardent cook who likes to entertain in the kitchen, stylishly, yet comfortably. When the old kitchen was gutted, all the foibles of fifty-year-old construction came to lightjigs and jogs, unsuspected beams, out-moded wiring and plumbing. The challenge was major and was met from the ground up. New wiring and plumbing were installed, and then a series of cabinets of various depths was designed to square off the room with jogless walls. Appliances were fitted, without wasting an inch; anything that could be recessed in a wall was; there is storage for everything

—all out of sight; and a table and four chairs sit in an island of space that can be circled for serving.




> In repose, with all its cabinet doors closed, above and right, the kitchen becomes a gleaming white shelllit up, when guests are coming, with a table laid with one of Ken Scott's vivid flower-bed tablecloths. The table itself has a pedestal base, a laminated plastic top, and comes from the Door Store. Bare, it is also a highly useful work surface. Made in Taiwan, the chairs, from Four Corners Imports by Thomasville, are handturned, handcarved bamboo with cane seats and a mottled parchment finish. On the floor, 1, a white, space-extending flow of glazed ceramic tile by American Olean. The spice cabinet, 2, is one of the kitchen's examples of turning problem spots to good advantage. Because of the jutting-out of the wall behind it, the cabinet had to be very shallow-not much room, but perfect for cooking staples and spice jars stationed two deep-all within arm's reach of anyone working at the food preparation center. Just as handy is the Thermador wall toaster, 3, which takes two slices of bread, has a knob to select the desired degree of doneness, and a safety switch to turn it off when closed. Grapefruit? Slice it on the chopping block with a knife chosen from the compartmented cutlery drawer, 4. Each knife fits in a slot. No fumbling, no cut fingers. Set flush with the chopping block is the surface plate for the NuTone Food Center. At the moment, the blender is in place. Stowed away in the base cabinet below are six more appliances: mixer, knife sharpener, juicer, shredder-slicer, meatgrinder, and ice-crusher. The works. Looking into the ell leading to the

service door, 5, we see the Kohler sink, beautifully blue, with its two bowls—one shallow, for washing fruits and vegetables, and topped with its own little chopping block; the other deep enough for even the roasting pan. To the right of the faucet is the KitchenAid hot-water dispenser, and across the aisle is a Sub-Zero refrigerator-over-freezer, 30 inches wide, 24 inches deep—ideal for a compact kitchen. In the frost-free freezer, an ice-maker eliminates the tiresome chore of filling ice trays. Next to the sink is the KitchenAid dishwasher, cycled to soak, hold partial loads moist, wash full blast (dinner plates) or gently (glasses), rinse, and sanitize. It even warms plates. Its countertop and backsplash are DuPont Corian, a smooth, stone-like material that is heat, stain, and scratch resistant. On the wall, a Thermador electric can opener, and above it, a Thermador Microwave oven. Then comes the Caloric double-decker gas

wrap. These can be heated in the "bag" by placing it on a trivet or steamer in a big pot over hot water. Crocks of butter on the table obviate one more last-minute kitchen chore. I also include an assortment of jams and marmalades.

**Part IV:** Buy or make a sweet finale of bite-sized breakfast pastries, an assortment of coffee cakes, date bars, and the like.

In addition to hot coffee, when the weather is warm, iced spiced coffee is delicious—coffee simmered with a couple of sticks of cinnamon and a dash of clove and nutmeg and left to ripen overnight in the refrigerator.

This is the essential scheme. Now for *the luncheon version*, still four parts and three buffets, same attack, same planning.

**Part I:** At lunch punch bowls hold gin and tonic with lime slices in one and bullshots in other, with serve-it-yourself buckets of ice on the side. Instead of crudités, Bovril bread—thin rounds or squares of bread, spread with a mixture of softened butter and Bovril (a stick of butter blended with a tablespoon of the extract) and baked until just crunchy. This delight will keep in airtight jars for days, needs no reheating.

**Part II:** The fruit table is now a salad bar offering platters of thick-sliced, peeled tomatoes dressed with oil, vinegar, and basil, pickled beets, dilled beans, and a bowl of finely shredded greens to be eaten, just as is the brunch fruit, before, after, or with the main

course. For juice, Bloody Shames are good quenchers-vodkales Bloody Marys, that is.

**Part III:** No crêpes this time, tortillas instead, which can l bought canned or frozen. Soften in hot water, dry, and roll arour creamed chicken. Heat and, just before serving, pour a thin, piqua guacamole over them. No potatoes but hominy grits into whic Cheddar cheese or mozarella bits have been stirred at the last mi ute. Greek meatballs are fine with this, made of ground lamb, pin nuts, and flavorings, cooked in oil and frozen, if you like, to be r heated for serving. Middle Eastern cookbooks have a variety keftedes recipes. Chili-flavored deviled eggs suit this menu. Th biscuits may be the same as the brunch ones or varied with the a dition of a dash of mustard or cumin.

Part IV: Iced tea, hot coffee, small tarts, and petits fours.

On to dinner or supper if you prefer.

**Part I:** Have an open bar, but for a crowd stick to the punch bowls. Scotch and soda "punch" is a surprise—just scotch and so but people always ask what the delicious punch is. Fill bowl with i cubes and a highball mixture. In other, try martinis on the roc with lots of rocks. Stick to Bovril bread—a winner anytime.

**Part III:** The salad bar is now a cold vegetable smorgasbord, platers of lima beans, peas, tiny carrots, and a bowl of artichoke hear or cold ratatouille. Dress the vegetables discreetly with a mild dresting. Serve a good cold soup instead of juice.

#### PUFF POPS

is an old English version of opover. Beat I egg thoroughld I cup milk, then slowly add o flour sifted with ½ teaspoon Stir until well blended (2 tes with a rotary beater or 1 te with an electric beater). not overbeat. The batter d have the consistency of heavy cream. Melt 1 tablespoon butter; use it to grease custard cups or muffin tins. Fill the pans ½ full with the batter. Bake in a good hot (450°) oven for about 20 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350°) and bake 15 to 20 minutes longer. Remove immediately from the tins and serve fast while hot and puffed. Makes 8 to 12 popovers.

#### CRANBERRY CHUTNEY

Ingredients: 12 tart apples, 2 cups cranberries, 3 green peppers, 1 cup raisins, 2 cups vinegar, juice of 4 lemons, 2 cups sugar, 1 tablespoon ginger, ¼ teaspoon cayenne, ½ teaspoon allspice.

*Method:* Pare, core, and chop the apples. Chop the cranberries. Mix the two together, adding the chopped green peppers and the raisins. Add sugar, ginger, cayenne, and allspice. Stir in the vine-gar and the lemon juice and mix well. Be sure all ingredients are well mixed. Cook them in a sauce-pan over low heat until mixture is thickened. Stir often to prevent burning. Pour the mixture into clean, hot, sterile jars and seal.

## JENNIE CHURCHILL

ady Randolph Churchill, according to Rosa Ovenden, who worked as a party cook for all the great hostesses of her day, "only wanted a few things but those things she wanted most perfect, and perfect things to eat. She always put her money in a few things." These traditional Edwardian recipes were typical of the food that Lady Churchill served; the lobster and lamb patties were favorite foods to pack in hampers for the races or to serve for supper during a ball.

CREAM FILLED BRANDY SNAPS Using a classic recipe for brandy snaps, stuff them with vanilla whipped cream laced with almond or peach liqueur and dust ends with finely chopped pistachios. If a ginger taste is desired, add ginger wine to flavor whipped cream. A rosette of whipped cream for the ends can be made and trimmed with chopped crystallized or preserved ginger. Three per person if served alone, or with a compote of oranges, serve 1 or 2.

#### STEAMED HOT CHOCOLATE PUDDING WITH DARK CHOCOLATE SAUCE

Ingredients: 1 cup fresh bread crumbs; 2 ounces granulated sugar; ¼ teaspoon vanilla essence; 2 ounces grated cooking chocolate; ½ pint warm heavy cream; 5 beaten raw eggs; rich dark chocolate sauce; if desired, hot cooked fruit laced with maraschino.

Method: In a bowl mix together bread crumbs, sugar, vanilla essence, and chocolate. Pour cream over mixture and let stand until bread is well soaked. Mix in eggs and cover bowl with foil and steam for % hour over boiling water. Turn out onto a platter and coat completely with a rich dark chocolate sauce. If desired hot fruit can be put in the center of the pudding.

QUAIL PUDDING Adapted from Rosa Lewis's recipe, a favorite of King Edward VII.

Season the quails with salt and pepper and lay in a deep dish. Sprinkle with finely sliced onions or shallots, coarsely chopped parsley, shreds of thyme and bay leaf and garlic, if desired. Pour oil over this mixture and a squeeze of lemon juice. Leave in this marinade for a few hours. Using the recipe below, make a suet pastry, and line a bowl with it. Wrap slices of paper-thin beef that will dissolve when cooked around each quail (one for each person) and place in the bowl. Add some finely chopped mushrooms, and parsley, and shallots, and some good chicken stock. Put the rest of the pastry

on top and steam over boiling water for one hour. Serve with rice or barley.

#### DUCHESS OF WINDSOR

he Duchess of Windsor likes to give small parties. Six persons to a table she finds the perfect number for the kind of verbal Ping-Pong she likes; when the group is larger she sets up a series of round tables. She loves American food and has had great success incorporating such favorites as Virginia ham and corn fritters into her Paris menus.

#### ASPARAGUS AND PECANS ON TOAST

Ingredients: 1 pound asparagus tips cut to size of toast, ¼ cup butter, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 tablespoons chopped pecans, salt, and pepper.

Method: Boil asparagus and drain well. Melt the butter with the lemon juice and add the chopped pecans and salt and pepper. Arrange the asparagus on slices of toast (cut in rounds) and pour over them the butter-pecan sauce.

#### AVOCADO TAHITI

Ingredients: 3 avocados, ½ cup brown sugar, and ½ cup rum. Method: Split avocados in half

*Method:* Split avocados in half lengthwise and remove pits. Dissolve brown sugar in the rum and pour into cavities. Serve avocados on bed of chipped ice.

#### YOUNG CHICKENS, CORN FRITTERS, AND FRIED BANANAS

Split chickens and open up butterfly style. Brush with peanut oil and place in 450° oven breast side up. Baste and turn over. Salt and pepper that side and baste again. Cook for 20 minutes. Sprinkle dried bread crumbs over the breast side and moisten with melted butter, and pass under the grill for two minutes. (Continued on page 152)

# How to get a kick out of dandelions Sandra Oddo shares her adventures in wine-making

andelion wine. Grandmothers standing in farmhouse doorways. Creaking porch swings and the intoxicating smell of spring air. Nostalgia incarnate. ...

Actually, dandelion wine is a drink hardly anybody is old enough to remember these days. My own grandmother was a teetotaler who waged fierce war on those dancing yellow weeds that besmirched her lawn in the spring. I never even knew anybody who *knew* anybody who'd drunk dandelion wine until I ran across a recipe in an old cookbook, that same year I first decided to try making wine.

This is what it is like: dry, sherry-ish, with a faint memory of the meanness of March winds. Light vellow in color; the taste is vellow too. Just a little flowery, a delicate pungent aroma. Drunk in December it is a memory and promise of spring; drunk in June, ice cold, it is fortification for the heat of summer. It is also one heck of a lot of work to make, but now a demand has been set up by family and friends. The government doesn't object (in a moment of blindness or benevolence at the end of Prohibition it allowed as how heads of households duly registered with the Internal Revenue's Form 1541 could make up to 200 gallons a year). So every spring now I find myself out there stalking the wild dandelion.

The time for dandelions is May, give or take a month. The season may seem endless to people with green plush lawns but we winemakers have to watch closely: one week dandelions will be just beginning to spot the meadows, the next they'll be ghosts tossing their down to the winds. If it should rain during the week or so they're at their peak, you've had it for that year. Since my house is in the woods, I save the three or four dandelions we have to look at and go scouting on the lawns of neigh-

merry little pop-pop of the air lock as carbon dioxide escapes, letting you know that alcohol is being left inside. The wine is obviously working, putting itself into the job heart and soul. But then the pop-popsettles down to a barely discernible blup . . . blup. Can it be goofing off? Sure, there's sediment at the bottom, denoting yeast activity, but the darn stuff looks like dirty dishwater. Worse, if you sneak a sip, it tastes like dirty dishwater. Dirty old dishwater. At this point, the only alternative to giving up the whole project is to hide the bottle somewhere where you don't have to look at it. (If somewhere is dark and cool, the wine likes that.) Bring it out every three months or so and siphon it off the dregs into a clean bottle, just to remind it that there's a job to be done. While you're siphoning, measure the sugar that's left and-why not?taste it.

racking (siphoning), suddenly, you can actually see through the stuff. It's clear! (Or, if it isn't, speak sternly to the wine, get some isinglass or bentonite from the wine supply store and use according to directions.) Now, watch out. This is the winemaker's most dangerous moment. Oh, the temptation to whip the wine into bottles, cork them up with real winecorks, let them sit three days and proceed to drink.

Don't! The wine will have an edge like coarse sandpaper, a bouquet not much different from Limburger, and a lamentable youth. Put that 5 gallon jug back in the closet and lock it up for another three months at least. The wine will age more evenly than it would in bottles and you don't run the distinct risk of explosion from whatever fermentation is still going on. Finally, roughly a year after you picked them, the dandelions are ready to bottle.

utes. This kills wandering bacteria and the stray yeasts that waft invisibly on the summer air-but if you let it boil longer than about 15 minutes, you may have trouble getting the wine to clear. Pour the hot juice onto the sugar, more or less depending on whether you like your wine sweet or dry. Fill the fermentation vessel, that thing that looks strangely like a bottle, to its shoulder, not its neck. I once filled one to the neck and the first rush of fermenting bubbles to its head surrounded the bottle with a sea of sticky gooev froth that attracted flies and bees who promptly got drunk and lay around the house for days. New wine is young and vigorous. Give it room.

When the mixture has cooled to the temperature that babies like for milk, add a little citric acid in the form of orange or lemon juice to keep the yeast happy. Then add the yeast. It is perfectly possible to use plain old bread yeast (one package for 5 gallons), but I'd advise against it. All that crawling around on the lawn deserves a real wine yeast, preferably one designed for Sauternes or Chablis, available in any wine store.

Now comes the most difficult and most important part of making wine: waiting. At first, it's fun.

## 20 fresh ways with greens and herbs

The tender fresh greens of summer give constant inspiration for salads and vegetable dishes. Sharpened and aromatic with pinches of herbs, they make delicious entrées or accompaniments Here are quick, fresh ways with all manner of wonderful succulent greens. by Jane E

othing's so glorious as the first tender young leaves of spring especially the garden variety, ripe to be plucked for the first salads of the season. Give **garden** lettuce a bright focus with the addition of julienned beets that have been first marinated in rice wine vinegar. José Wilson likes to do this and also mixes tart greens like **arugula** and watercress with a mustardy dressing using sherry wine vinegar. Black olives can punctuate a green salad, and a little anchovy adds sharp good flavor to the dressing.

Flowers add prettiness to a salad; snipped chive flowers add color, the stems a gentle onion flavor. Violets, nasturtiums, day lilies, squash blossoms can all add a colorful surprise element to a tossed salad.

Chop **garlie chives** and their blossoms and sprinkle over frozen Italian beans.

Another flower, this one made from Roquefort cheese blended with butter is piped through a pastry bag and tube by Julie Dannenbaum author of *Menus for All Occasions* (Review Press) onto a chilled salad plate to give a surprise dressing for **Bibb lettuce**.

Deep red **oak leaf lettuce** makes a good salad dressed simply with coarse salt and cracked pepper.

Raw beans or edible pea pods from the garden are delicious dressed with cider vinegar and the merest pinch of sugar.

**Snow peas** (edible pea pods) are also cut into julienned strips by Emerick Bronson and tossed with a bland oil, and rice vinegar. **String beans** can be served the same way.

Tomato juice and paprika make a subtle dressing for **watercress.** Georgette Klinger uses them with juice of a lemon, sugar, water.

**Endives** are pulled apart leaf by leaf and combined with walnut halves by Air France. The dressing a combination of light olive oil, lemon juice, salt, and freshly milled pepper.

Masses of **chopped parsley** give life to a tuna fish-chick pea salad claims Lily Auchincloss who also adds lemon juice and lots of sliced Bermuda onions. Mrs. Auchincloss dresses **arugula** with oil and coarse salt only; serves a cold shrimp salad with **bean sprouts and chives:** a dressing of olive oil, soy sauce.

**Celery** is a somewhat slighted salad ingredient, but it can be delicious cut into thin slices as James Beard does and tossed with 8 tablespoons olive oil, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 1 teaspoon tarragon, 1 teaspoon of salt, freshly ground pepper, 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard,

1 of dry and allowed to stand for 2 or 3 hours. Simmer sliced **Florida celery** until crisp tender. Marinate in oil, lemon juice, onion, garlic salt, basil, and black pepper for 2 hours. Drain, reserving marinade and add to lettuce lined salad bowl; toss with some of the marinade.

Dress tender green lettuce with cream mixed with lemon juice, salt, pepper, and a generous sprinkling of herbs, chopped parsley, tarragon, and chervil.

Leeks make wonderful salads. Simmer in salted water with lemon juice until tender. Drain, chill, serve with peanut oil dressing.

Watercress is good combined with lightly sautéed bread crumbs. Betty Boote mashes a clove of garlic and an anchovy fillet in the bottom of a glass salad bowl, adds the watercress and bread crumbs, tosses with a plain olive oil and wine vinegar dressing.

Serve crisp **romaine leaves** with cocktails suggests Julie Dannenbaum, who supplies a dip made from 8 tablespoons olive oil, 4 cloves mashed garlic, 8 anchovy fillets, 1 teaspoon fresh basil whisked together.

Serve raw **pea pods** and fresh raw garden peas for nibblers.

Quarter sweet green peppers, seed them and stuff with chived cottage cheese.

As a first course serve halved avocados

stuffed with a purée of avocado blended sour cream, lemon juice, and sharp seaso

Combine **peas** with thyme and marje Cook 2 pounds peas until tender and a cup cream together with 2 tablespoons of and parsley, 1 teaspoon each of thyme marjoram. Serve immediately.

Add **chervil** to ½ cup melted butter pour over cooked **cauliflower**.

Cut **snap beans** into 1 inch pieces. Co 1 inch of boiling water with a little salt 5 utes, cover and continue cooking unti crisp. Drain and toss with 3 tablespoons ter, ¼ teaspoon nutmeg, ¼ teaspoon pepp

Cook **kale** in a small amount of water tender and sprinkle with fresh lemon crumbled bacon.

Cut green peppers into julienne together with onions and turnips and say butter and olive oil until tender. Swirl in a butter, season with salt, pepper, oregan

Toss cooked cold fresh **peas** with cream and finely chopped shallots. Sp with dill and serve chilled.

Zucchini is great with sesame seeds. 1½ pounds zucchini or summer squash thinly in 4 tablespoons butter and ¼ cup until barely tender. "It should still be slicrisp," says Mrs. Isabel Wilder. Add sal pepper to taste and sprinkle with 4 tablesp of sesame seed.

Dredge slices of **green tomato** in eg cornmeal suggests Sandra Oddo, fry qu in hot lard until just tender.

**String beans** with a cream sauce is of the Duchess of Windsor's favorites. The are cooked for about 6 minutes until th *al dente* and bathed in a béchamel sauce with half cream and half milk, topped v slice of grilled bacon.

Julie Dannenbaum buys **sorrel** when i season to keep for out-of-season days. She it in large stock pot and cooks with onl water that clings to it after washing. 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### The famous Linzer torte How to make this delicious raspberry tart step by step

Made with a rich nutted short pastry, Linzer torte is a lattice covered tart with a raspberry filling. This version of the classic Austrian torte comes from the London Cordon Bl

cooking school and is made with fresh or frozen raspberries.

t seems as if there are almost as many variations of Linzer torte as there are Austrian cooks; it can be made with strawberry or apricot jam or red currant jelly, but this delicious version, a favorite for twenty years at the London Cordon Bleu, calls for fresh or frozen raspberries. "Coffee can add another hint of flavor," suggests Muriel Downes, co-principal of the school; "add 1 teaspoon of instant coffee with the cinnamon or to replace it if you wish." Linzer torte should cool to room temperature before being served and should be eaten within two days. It can be frozen successfully after baking and cooling. If you are visiting London it is possible to take a one week course or attend afternoon demonstrations at the Cordon Bleu. #### LINZER TORTE

Ingredients: 2½ cups fresh raspberries, or 2 10 ounce packages frozen raspberries; sugar or raspberry jam to taste; 1 cup all-purpose flour; ½ teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon cinnamon; 1 teaspoon instant coffee; 8 tablespoons butter; ½ cup sugar; 1 whole egg; 1 egg yolk; grated lemon zest to taste; 2½ ounces almonds, ground without blanching; quick glaze: ½ cup red currant jelly or raspberry preserves; 2 tablespoons sugar.

*Method:* Bring the raspberries to a boil in a saucepan and cook rapidly for 2-3 minutes. Mix with sugar or raspberry jam to sweeten. Cool.

Sift the flour with salt, cinnamon, and coffee in a large mixing bowl or on a marble surface or pastry board and make a well in the center. Into the well put the butter, sugar, egg, egg yolk, lemon zest and sprinkle on the almonds. Work ingredients together, form into a ball. Refrigerate wrapped in wax paper for at least ½ hour. Preheat oven to 375°.

Roll out half the pastry ¼-½ inch thick, keeping the other half refrigerated. Line a 7-8-inch, buttered flan ring or false-bottomed, straight-sided cake pan with the pastry, and roll the pin across the top of the ring to cut off excess dough. Fill with the cold raspberry mixture. Roll out remaining pastry, cut into strips, and arrange in a



lattice on top. Bake in oven 20-30 minutes or until pastr lightly browned. Cool tart. B entire surface of tart with w glaze. Set pan on coffee can slip down outside rim. Serves QUICK GLAZE



#### ANSWERS

1. (b) Beaujolais should be served at cellar temperature as it is in France, to bring out the flavor. If you do not have a wine cellar you can refrigerate Beaujolais, but take it out 15 minutes before serving. Its temperature should be between 55 and 60°.

**2.** (**b**) The wines of Alsace obtain their names from the grape variety such as Sylvaner, Riesling, and Gewürztraminer.

**3.** (d) Château Haut-Brion is a vineyard in Graves, one of the most famous wine growing areas of Bordeaux.

4. (c) Zinfandel is a native Californian grape. It is best known for wines not unlike Beaujolais in character, but it has, if properly handled, a remarkable capacity to produce wines with long life and full body.

5. (b) Italy produces the greatest volume of wine annually, although the vast majority of Italian wines are not exported. It is only now that the best Italian wines are receiving the recognition they deserve (such as an excellent old Barolo) and finding their way to the U.S. The lighter wines of Italy, fresh and youthful, present many excellent bargains (such as Dolcetto or a dry white Orvieto).

6. (b) Wine stored at 55° develops at the optimum rate. At a higher temperature, development is speeded, and the balance of the wine endangered; at a lower temperature development is arrested. Storage at 55° is most important for the greater wines, lesser wines kept at a higher temperature for a few months will not be adversely affected.

7. (c) Kir is the name given to the French apéritif, Vin Blanc Cassis, by the French to honor Canon Felix Kir, a French resistance hero, once mayor of Dijon. It is a combination of a simple white Burgundy wine with a black currant liqueur, cassis. The cassis should be used sparingly if you like a dry apéritif. This increasingly popular apéritif is now bottled already blended as Kir Gallique.

**8.** (c) 3 bottles. For a dinner party when your guests are known to be fond of wine it is reasonable to estimate that a ½ bottle of the major wine should be available to each guest. 2 of the 3 bottles should be opened beforehand with the third held in reserve.

**9.** (**b**) Wine is decanted to help you to serve it free from sediment. While the major purpose of decanting is to remove sediment from an older bottle, decanting allows harder wine to breathe, and makes it more palatable.

10. (d) A wine is mature enough to produce wines of great quality after seven year's growth. While it is possible to produce wine from the grapes of younger vines, this wine will not attain the full potential of which the grape variety is capable.

If you correctly score 7 or more out of 10, your wine know-how is well above average.

is wine bottles. Cadge them from friends or recycle your own. It is possible to use screw-tops, but it's risky. Air and wine are enemies, and why take chances with something you've worried over for so long? Siphon the wine out of the jug into the bottles, cork, wipe, and lay them on their sides to calm down. Wine gets hysterical when it's jostled much, and bottling is a very traumatic experience. You can test this by tasting the first sip out of the siphon-smooth and contented-and comparing it with the irritated edge of the wine in the last bottle you cork. Two or three months in the bottle is enough time to calm a light little thing like dandelion wine.

Sometimes, wine will throw a little sediment in the bottle. That's all right. It just shows the wine is aging right—a sign we never see any more in mass-produced, massbottled wines. In three months (we sometimes manage to leave as many as five bottles that long), uncork, decant if there's sediment, pour, sip . . . ahhhh.

#### DOLLEY MADISON'S LAYER CAKE

A Madison specialty often served to guests.

Ingredients: 8 egg whites, 1 cup butter, 2½ cups sugar, 1 cup milk, ¼ cup cornstarch, 3 cups flour, 2½ teaspoons vanilla.

Method: Beat the whites until stiff and in peaks. Put aside. Cream the butter with the sugar. Add the milk slowly, mixing well. Add the cornstarch and the flour to the butter-egg mixture. Mix well and add vanilla. Fold in the egg whites carefully. Bake in 4 layer pans, well-greased. Bake in a medium (350°) oven for 30 to 35 minutes, or until the cake springs back when touched lightly. Cool on racks and frost with Dolley Madison's Caramel.

#### CARAMEL

Mix well 3 cups brown sugar, 1 cup light cream, and 2 tablespoons butter. Put mixture in the top of a double boiler and cook gently for 20 minutes. Just before removing from the stove, after the caramel has thickened, add 1 teaspoon vanilla, stir constantly. Remove and let the caramel cool. Fill the layers of the cake and put icing on the top as well.

#### A YARD OF FLANNEL

An old Virginia punch recipe, A Yard of Flannel, was served during the Madisons' stay in the White House in an elegant French punch bowl. Made with ale, a Yard of Flannel is much more delicious than it sounds.

Warm some ale over a low flame. Beat 3 or 4 eggs with 4 ounces moist sugar and I teaspoon nutmeg or ginger. Slowly add 1 quart rum or brandy. As the ale approaches the boiling stage, pour it into one pitcher, and pour the rum, eggs, and sugar mixture into second pitcher. Pour the contents of the one pitcher into the other, then back and forth until the mixture is as smooth as cream. You don't exactly measure it by the yard, and it certainly doesn't taste like flannel. Nevertheless, a Yard of Flannel it is.

#### LITTLE LOBSTER PATTIES (COLD)

Ingredients: 1 small cooked lobster cut into tiny bits; ¼ pint stiff cream; ¼ pint stiff mayonnaise; ½ pint liquid aspic; tarragon and chervil (fresh if possible) to taste; 1 teaspoon tarragon vinegar; dash of paprika, cayenne or Tabasco if desired; unsweetened cream puff cases; garnish: aspic or chervil.

Method: In a bowl over ice mix lobster, cream, mayonnaise, aspic, tarragon, and chervil until gelatin nearly sets. Add tarragon vinegar, paprika, cayenne or Tabasco if desired and fill cream puff cases or puff pastry shells. Glaze with aspic or garnish with chervil, aspic.

#### WINDSOR LAMB PIES

Ingredients: 1 pound cooked loin lamb chopped in small cubes; 2 tablespoons minced parsley; 2 tablespoons minced mushrooms; 1 tablespoon minced shallots; salt and pepper to taste; lamb gravy to moisten; short crust lined tartlet tins 2½ inches across; cold water; beaten egg.

Method: In a large bowl mix together lamb, parsley, mushrooms, shallots, salt and pepper to tax and moisten mixture with lam gravy.

Fill tins with lamb mixtur brush edges of pastry with cowater and cut out a top for eatartlet and make a hole for stea to come out. Brush with beat egg and bake in hot oven un risen and set, lower heat and bauntil brown.

#### SUET PASTRY

Ingredients: 1 cup ground or ve finely chopped beef suet (kidn suet preferred); 1 teaspoon sa 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour; cup cold water, approximately. Method: Mix the suet and salt the flour with your fingertips of pastry cutter. Add the water a fe spoonfuls at a time and toss with fork to distribute evenly. Add me water if the dough seems dry crumbly. Chill the dough. Roll of on a lightly floured board to t thickness and shape desired. T amount of dough should be su cient for a 2-quart casserole abo 2½ inches deep with a top cr about ¼ inch thick. If using a by-14-by-2-inch pan, use 11/2 to times the recipe.

#### CORN GALETTES

Take two ears of corn that have been cooked in boiling water for 4 minutes and strip off kernels and chop. Mix 1 beaten egg, ¼ cup milk, 2 tablespoons flour, salt and pepper; add to this the chopped corn and form into small flat cakes. Sauté them in hot peanut oil.

#### FRIED BANANAS

Split bananas in two lengthwise and lightly flour. Sauté for 2 minutes in peanut oil.

#### ROAST CHICKEN

On top of the stove, in a roasting pan, brown a 3-pound chicken in peanut oil. Remove the chicken and most of the peanut oil. Return the chicken and flame with 3 tablespoons of cognac. Place the chicken on a rack in the pan with 3 or 4 tablespoons of consommé and port wine. Salt and pepper the chicken and baste from time to time. Roast until the juices run clear. Cut into serving pieces.

HOT CHEESE CIGARETTES

She as delightful to women as to . . . Lady Randolph was like arvelous diamond—a host of

facets seemed to sparkle at once."

Queen Victoria did not care for the abrasive arrogance of Randolph but felt one day he might be Prime Minister. With that eventuality in mind, she invited the young Churchills to dine with her at Windsor and spend the night. Victoria was pleased with Jennie and remarked in her Journal, "Lady Randolph (an American) is very handsome and very dark."

Jennie wrote her mother on Windsor Castle stationery, "The Queen was most amiable and talked to me for some time. The dinner was a very solemn, ghastly affair . . . I was the only 'strange lady.' You know how I tend to rattle on, and I was terrified of saying a word too much, and arousing that dread 'We are not amused'."

In the tight upper echelons of British society, good relations with the Royal Family meant open doors or bolted ones.

When Randolph had a falling out with the Prince of Wales, the Prince intimated he would not visit

any home in which the Churchills were guests. Except for a few exceptions, the couple was boycotted as if they had the plague.

Randolph's popularity in Parliament made a reconciliation seem politic and even the Queen pressured to end the quarrel between her son and Churchill. The healing took place at the dinner table. March 9, 1884 the Prince consented to attend a dinner in the house of the Attorney General. Among the guests were the Churchills, Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone, and Lady Dorothy Nevill, London's most celebrated hostess.

Jennie's grandniece, Anita Leslie, says, "Jennie was anxious to end the social ostracism which prevented her being invited to the best London parties and she played her cards perfectly. With naturalness and humor she set the company at ease. The Prince was charmed, and Randolph gave her full marks." Lady Nevill let the town know that "the conversation proved so animated that there was no possibility for awkward thoughts, or looks, or even silences to occur."

The relationship made another small step forward three months later at a dinner held at the Café des Anglais in Paris. Backing up Jennie was her father's old friend, millionaire sportsman, James Gordon Bennett.

By May 16, 1886, Jennie-now thirty-two and at the peak of her opulent beauty-was able to give a dinner party in her own home in honor of the Prince and Princess of Wales. Randolph and his brother Blandford, both excellent raconteurs, were at their conversational best. The party might have been a disaster, but Jennie was not the kind of hostess to be thrown by a mishap.

"The light went out in the middle of the feast," wrote Jennie in her Reminiscences, "just as we were expatiating on the beauties of the newly installed electric light. Our guests had to remain in utter *Continued on next page*

darkness until lamps and candles, which had been relegated to the lower regions, were unearthed."

After ten years, the Prince was glad to be back in Jennie's gay and sprightly household. He kept calling.

ing. "His Highness is dining tonight," said Jennie to her talented cook, Rosa, with whom she discussed each menu in detail. "We'll give him plain boiled truffles he enjoys so much. They look enchanting, as you served them last time, like little ebony apples, in that silver dish, wrapped around a white linen napkin."

Rosa Ovenden, who worked as a party cook in all the best houses, had critical standards of comparison when she said, "Lady Randolph Churchill only wanted a few things, but those things she wanted most perfect, and perfect things to eat. She always put all her money in a few things."

Randolph was served a perfect dish of his favorite *oeufs brouillés aux truffes*, which he claimed he would rather eat than have a seat in the Cabinet. The popular lobster patties were always scratched when Mrs. Hwfa-Williams came to lunch. "Shellfish always brings her out in spots," Rosa reminded her Ladyship. Much appreciated was the quail pudding, which Rosa later made famous when she became owner of the Cavendish Hotel in Jermyn Street. ent at the first one, wrote, "It was thought a hazardous experiment. It proved a complete success. They were all well-bred people. They all recognized their obligations to their hostess as paramount for the time being. They were Lady Randolph's guests. As guests, they were neither friends nor enemies. There were no hostilities. When a man found himself sent in to dinner with a woman he did not speak to, his tongue somehow unloosed; it was a truce. In some cases, ancient animosities were softened. In all, they were suspended. The guests saw that Lady Randolph had attempted the impossible, and had conquered. A social miracle had been performed."

Jennie continued those daring dinners bringing together men who in politics often were deadly enemies.

Lucile, the heroine of Winston Churchill's novel Savrola, was based on his mother.

"Foreign princes had paid her homage, not only as the loveliest woman in Europe, but also as a great political figure. Her salon was crowded with the most famous men from every country. Statesmen, soldiers, poets, and men of science . . ." wrote Jennie's son.

The statesmen of the hour were invited to dinner not only for her husband but for young Winston who was encouraged to ask questions and even politely argue. Af"After that I had to practice to do my hair." Jennie instru her to talk, smile, and not bored whenever anyone was in duced.

Although she knew how to furnish "on the cheap," her great extravagance silk panels for her drawing room were ruined by the damp London fog. Blandford used to refer to her buys from antiques shops as "Jennie's stage props."

Against these props, they played a parlor game called "thought reading." Instructions were simple. A player was blindfolded and told "Don't resist any thought that comes into your head; do exactly as you feel."

Jennie inaugurated the "Dinner of Deadly Enemies." George Smalley, an author who was presterward, she gave him her own estimates of political leaders and explained the intricacies of their maneuvers.

Six persons to a table, she finds the perfect number for the kind of verbal Ping-Pong she likes. When the group is larger, she sets up a series of round tables. Guests to the house in the Bois de Boulogne pick up their place cards from silver salvers in the reception hall before moving on to the salon or the library for apéritifs.

"The French tend to give big parties," she says. Six or eight small parties are more expensive . . . but that's my extravagance."

While she loves French food, she disagrees with the classicism of the menus of French dinner parties.

"You almost know ahead of time what you are going to get," she says. "You start with sole. Then comes lamb or chicken. I like to mix things up."

The Duchess's chef, Lucien Massey, came to the Windsor household in 1945 as a seventeenyear-old kitchen helper. She taught him a number of American dishes. Virginia ham with sugar and cloves. Corn fritters. Sweet potatoes with brown sugar.

"The French love these things," she says. "Something new for them. Curiously enough, crême brulée ought to be French but they've never heard of it. I learned it from Mrs. Ralph, my cook in London. Best thing I've ever known." [EDITOR'S NOTE: According to several authorities, crème brûlée was invented by a chef at Trinity College, Cambridge, England.]

Although the Duchess never drinks coffee—her mother warned her it makes the complexion yellow—she serves what her guests praise as the very best coffee, "very strong, very black, very hot."

She has maintained a lifelong vigilance to keep her figure spare as a line drawing. "How do you look in the long view?" is one of her tests. Nonetheless, she loves American ice cream and American cheesecake and frequently offers them to her international guests.

Whenever she gives a dinner party, she spends the day at home, going over every detail with the meticulous care of a stage manager. There are conferences with the chef, the butler, the maids. The Duchess chooses the menu, the flowers, the napkins, the cloths, the silver, the services. The table décor is coordinated to the colors of the meal.

She has a wealth of porcelain dinner services from which to work

out her schemes . . . a Meissen "Flying Tiger" service of the Elector Frederick Augustus II of Saxony, King of Poland; an 18th-century Copenhagen that had belonged to Queen Alexandra; George IV's Lowestoft with Crown and Cipher in *lie-de-vin* red; William IV's Lowestoft with embossed gold oak leaves and the Royal Arms.

Her favorite flower is the orchid. "But not the chorus girl kind." Potted plants of orchids raised in her greenhouse run to brown, yellow, striped green.

The Duchess worked in active conjunction with the Paris firm of Jansen to decorate the house. The dining room is most expressive of her. It is 18th century and deliciously feminine. Faded blue boiseries and panels of chinoiserie wallpaper were originally part of a room in the Château de Chanteloup near Amboise. The château was destroyed during the Revolution and whatever was salvaged of its treasures was scattered. At two ends of the room are miniature musicians' galleries, each with cello and open music stand.

The curtains of coral silk cast a warm glow. Even women with flawless complexions like to be flattered. The gentle light of candles is reinforced by subtle electric lighting from side lamps.

"I adore my house," says the Duchess. "I'm a born housekeeper, always running my fingers around for a bit of dust, pushing things about, checking on new furniture glue, looking for new pieces, mending dog collars. I do it with love. But then, I even adored my first funny little flats."

Her first dinner party took place when she was a twenty-one-yearold navy wife in San Diego. The guests were a young army couple who lived nearby. The hostess decided she now knew Fannie Farmer well enough to get an entire meal ready to come off the stove at the same moment. The menu was typical of a young American bride. Campbell's cream of tomato soup, roast beef and gravy, roast potatoes, ice cream with chocolate sauce. There was one daring addition . . . artichokes with hollandaise sauce.

The hostess calmed her anxieties by drinking her first cocktail while surrounded by the pots. She recalls that the hollandaise sauce had a *Continued on next page*

creamy consistency, even though her masterful stirring caused flecks to fly off her spoon and dot the walls.

"Fanny Farmer became my bible," acknowledged the Duchess. "I followed her to the letter. If she told me to tie the asparagus with two pieces of string I tied it with two, not one or three. Whatever reputation I may since have acquired as a hostess began with her."

July 4, 1932, Wallis Warfield, then married to Ernest Simpson, gave a dinner for ten at her Bryanston Court flat in London. It was the first time she had entertained the Prince of Wales. She had already noted his preference for simple and uncomplicated dishes smoked salmon, game, grilled sole, and meats of all kinds.

The Fourth of July was always the occasion for a celebration among Americans in London. Wallis decided to give the Prince a typical American dinner: black bean soup, grilled lobster, fried chicken Maryland, and for the

. .

sweet a cold raspberry soufflé, and "as a concession to my English guests, a savoury of marrow bones."

With that dinner, the Prince of Wales commenced the habit inaugurated by his grandfather, Edward VII. He began to drop by for a meal at the table of an American hostess.

Lasting success is never haphazard. Underneath, there is always a structure, and usually more persistent effort than an envious outsider would ever suspect. Moving up into the society of influential men can be a serious business too.

The Duchess of Windsor summed up the importance of that stage . . . the dinner table.

"One of the advantages of being a woman is that one does not have to become emotionally engaged in the peculiar combativeness that males bring to politics. It is my longtime belief that a wellchosen informal dinner is one of the surest eradicators of political bias."

and hold it shut with a Hunt clip until it is nearly dry. If the covering is intact, think carefully before you cut it open. Unless you are very deft, it may look worse after you fix it.

Loose bindings: If the boards are loose, tie the book up like a package with woven tape. It's a temporary measure before eventual rebinding. But if the book is just a little loose in its casing, a common complaint, you can probably fix it yourself if you are willing to go to some trouble. Besides a knitting needle, waxed paper, and a white glue, you'll need a combination press, two boards, each with a brass strip that projects about half an inch along one edge, that can be screwed together (brass projections facing each other) on either side of the book with four wing nuts. The Technical Library Service (Talas) has them.

Stand the book upright. Move it to cause the gap between the body of the book and the case to open. Dip the knitting needle into the adhesive to just coat it, then push the needle down into the gaping hinge area and as far back under the end papers as it will reach-keeping spine and case spotlessly free from glue. When you have applied glue from top to bottom of the hinge area, front and back, slip waxed paper between the end papers to protect them from oozing glue, then slide the book into the press until the brass edges fit into the hinge grooves of the book. Tighten the screws evenly, just enough to give a firm pressure. In about fifteen minutes, open the book and check to see if glue has oozed (if it has, remove the excess), then lay the book on its side for a couple of hours, leaving the waxed papers in. Check again to make sure the spine is not stuck to the body of the book (if it is, work it loose with a blunt table knife, very gently). Leave the book open to air-dry for awhile, then put it away.

Any book problem more complicated than these should be taken to a professional, who can remove some stains, de-acidify the paper, bleach it if necessary, fix worn and torn leaves virtually invisibly—and provide a brand-new binding, or a custom-fitted box indistinguishable from a binding along the spine.

# Gardener's by James Fannir

Crocosmia's been around a long time, but few gardeners seem to know about it, maybe because the name has been changed so often. It used to be known as Montbretia and has also been called Tritonia. Whatever you call it, it is a delightful summer-flowering bulb, right, with bright orange flowers on branching stalks that grow from 1 to 3 feet high. It resembles gladiolus, which is a close relative, but the stems are slender and wiry, with none of the stiffness we associate with gladiolus. Combined with the branching habit and excellent keeping qualities, this makes crocosmia excellent for flower arrangements. Bulbs, planted 4 to 6 inches deep in May, will produce flowers from late summer until frost, and they should be dug up and stored for winter before the ground freezes. Bulb catalogues sometimes still call these Montbretia, so look for them under both names in your favorite one. It's a bit late right now for ordering by mail, but your local garden shop probably has a few in its bins.



s Le Clos Fiorentina (page 126) enjoys the balmy climate of southern France, the flowering shrubs in Roderick Cameron's garden are oleanders, backed by silvery-leaved olive trees and accented by palms. Surprisingly, though, the flower beds and borders are filled with perennials hardy in the north, edged by frost-resistant boxwood, and laced with annual flowering plants. Mr. Cameron uses quantities of gray- and silver-leaved plants, and here again the same wide range of materials is available for northern gardeners. The great majority of these plants belong to the composite or daisy family. Most of them are known as dusty miller but, botanically, Cineraria, Artemisia, Centaurea, Santolina, and Achillea are often included under the one common name. Best known of the lot is probably Artemisia. Most ornamental of the artemisias is Silver Mound, which actually does grow as a foot-high mound of ferny silver leaves. Broader leaved and more inclined to grayish tones is Cineraria, closely related to the house plant of the same name. The cinerarias, notably varieties Diamond and Silverdust, are particularly compact, and may be used as an edging that requires little clipping. Also low and compact is Santolina, with green or grayish leaves so finely cut they look like coral branches. Santolina has enough spread to be used in ground-covering swatches, and also duces quantities of tiny bright yellow flowers. Cent includes one of the smallest silver-leaved plant candidissmia, no more than 6 inches high, as w one of the tallest, C. gymnocarpa, with grayish I on 2-foot plants. Achillea is best known for the sp called yarrow, which has high-borne flower head clusters of yellow buttons. ole generation of gardeners has grown up to consider The Gardener's Bug Book by Cynthia Westcott, as the ndispensable, unquestionable authority on plant pests. First published in 1946, revised twice, it has now aped in its fourth edition (Doubleday, \$12.95). Miss Westcott's direct, personal experience as a plant doctor is rongly evident today as it was in the first edition. She insists that she is not a trained entomologist, but her ledge of bugs and their habits would put many a professional to shame, particularly when it comes to dealing the ones we know as pests. Her list of pests has been considerably enlarged from that of earlier editions, alth nematodes, which rank technically with diseases rather than insects, have been left out. The publisher ad the good sense to include Miss Westcott's prefaces to all four editions, which constitute a liberal education anging times and changing approaches. ### ARMCHAIR TRAVEL STOP-OVER SUN SPOT

CAROL WRIGHT on the pleasures of Bermuda

'AMERICANS on their way to heaven call at Bermuda and think they've arrived,' wrote Mark Twain, that cynical travel commentator of yesteryear. Not necessarily for this reason, the island is now promoting itself as a stopover spot on the way to or from the States, being set 3500 miles from Britain and 600 from the States, on the same latitude as Madeira.

The Bermuda islands (there are 150 of them linked together with bridges and causeways to form a hook-shaped mainland) were not always as welcoming as they are now, with locals opening their homes and gardens to strangers, from March to May. The high number of shipwrecks gave them the name of the Isles of the Devil and they were believed to be haunted; giving inspiration to Shakespeare's 'The Tempest'.

Although the oldest governing colony in the Commonwealth, Bermuda has often hedged her transatlantic bets, even helping the Americans in their wars against Britain. In tourism she tries successfully to balance her dependence on the States—for visitors and vital supplies of water imported from New York—with her British ancestry elaborately displayed for Americans to enjoy. The shops are full of English silver, woollens and china, and historic spots are carefully preserved.

But it is in character and life style that the British tone emerges. As one brochure puts it, 'the atmosphere of a Bermudan hotel, guest house, or cottage colony, and indeed of Bermuda itself, is



one of British reserve, dignified informality.' Dignified informality about sums it up. The island lacks the brash casualness of the Caribbean of which it is no part; that warm sea being 1000 miles south. Bermuda's character is Atlantic, sharing Britain's seasonal pattern although winter temperatures are usually in the low sixties and summer lasts from April to November. Rain occurs in shower form-but it can, occasionally, be torrential-throughout the year. For those visiting in the Rendezvous season (that is, winter) woollens and rainwear are needed. This period is fine for golfers, fishermen and yachting enthusiasts rather than sun lizards. In April the customary peace and quiet is disturbed by the American college weeks which have run since the 1930s and are a time of beach parties and moped races in the narrow lanes.

Otherwise, an air of dignity is wrapped around Bermuda's parishes; 60 churches and 20 denominations in 22 square miles. British uniformed policemen keep tourists in order, and order must be preserved in such a small isolated spot. At night, the big hotels are dressy and elegant, a pleasant parade to anticipate during the day when bikinis are worn only on the beaches. The island has given its name to one of the ugliest garments in history: Bermuda shorts. These are expected wear for touring the island, but can be formal wear for men in the evening, worn with black tie and



tuxedo. Hubert Smith, one of the island's best-known calypso singers, earned fame with his 'Green Ticket' song in which a girl is given a modesty warning ticket by a policeman and asked to 'show less thigh'. These tickets, much sought after by tourists, are no longer handed out but the brochures spell out their message of decorum. 'Polly Pants' was a song made famous by the Talbot Brothers, another top Bermudan group, after the woman who invented the pants and still runs her Calypso beachwear shop in Hamilton.

Traffic is slow and stately. Until 1946 there were no cars on the islands; a tiny railway ran east-west across the 2-mile-wide land but was sold to British Guiana in 1947. Carriages of those times can be seen in the Carriage museum in Water Street, St Georges, Bermuda's secondlargest town. A survival of premotor days are the surrey fringed taxis occasionally seen. With only some 150 miles of road, speed is restricted to 20 mph (15 mph in town) and visitors are not allowed to drive cars. Most use taxisthose with blue flags have qualified guide drivers-or hire mopeds from the cycle liveries at hotels. This is the way to get a tan and find uncrowded beaches easily.

This sense of the fitness of things has enabled Bermuda to produce a very healthy tourist trade without spoiling the natural beauty of the island which could so easily be overrun with high-rise developments; the biggest hotels do not obtrude on the eyesight. The visual impression is of puffy white clouds on blue sky, deep turquoise waters frothy round the reefs, swinging in to pink groundcoral beaches on the south shore.

On the low hill that humps the central mainland are the houses with pink or white washed walls and tray-shaped, whiter-thanwhite roofs limed to catch every drop of precious rainwater. The

houses are built of coral limestone blocks which weather well. The gardens are rich in flowers: hibiscus, poinsettias, bouganvillea, white perfumed lilies at Easter. Grapefruit and other citrus flourish and Bermuda is often known to Americans as the 'onion patch' in memory of its former flourishing onion trade.

A peculiar joy is to travel the flowered lanes on a powered bicycle rejoicing in the sun and the exhilarating ocean air, swooping down hills to rocky coves for a picnic lunch, crossing the world's smallest drawbridge at Somerset, controlled-for the boats that is -by one of the island's three sets of traffic lights. Somerset is a parish with low, long, reef-sheltered beaches. One can also travel by local bus or ferry from Hamilton along to Somerset with many stops. In Hamilton, Bermuda's main town, shopping is in Front Street at stores like Triminghams where one may nose out perfumes made in Bermuda, cedar wood items and local embroidery among the European goods, then take a snack in tea-rooms such as the Tea Cosy, Dorothy's or the Earl of Sandwich (how few who live off the noble lord's invention ever give him credit) or, in more English pub atmosphere, in the Hog Penny.

In spite of land shortage, Bermuda has continued to develop the big sports. She has nine championship golf courses; several set in big hotel grounds such as Southampton Princess, Belmont Manor (with 110 acres estate), Castle Harbour (with 230 acres private lands) and the Mid Ocean Club; the latter, where Eisenhower vacationed, needs an introduction from a member. Tenniscourts are plentiful; no licence is needed for fishing; and there are plenty of opportunities for hiring sailing boats and for water skiing; the ski school will also teach you

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
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

ski kiting. There's cricket to watch; the ocean bed to explore on guided expeditions and cruises round the island stopping for shopping or swimming en route. Power skis, the coward's way of water skiing: standing on two broad and powered skis, are also available.

The latter were introduced to Bermuda by the Sherwood Manor hotel in the Fairylands area almost surrounded by water in a sheltered creek south west of Hamilton. Sherwood Manor is one of the old house-style hotels that are often more appealing than the big resort hotels which have everything built into their grounds. Among my favourites are a group of three: Waterloo House, a place of sun patios and courtyards leading down to Hamilton Harbour next to the yacht club, with a heated pool like many of the island hotels; Horizons is a late seventeenth-century house in the central ridge, with sweeping views from the swimming-pool; and Newstead is another old house on Hamilton harbour with cottages in the grounds.

Bermuda pioneered the cottage colony and there are plenty of opportunities to sample self-contained cottage life where you can cook for yourself or have a maid cook for you. Among the best known are Pink Beach and Cambridge Beach, the latter set in 25 acres of land. Guest houses are another Bermudian speciality and can make the do-it-yourself holiday inexpensive. The term does not carry the slightly derogatory ring it has in Britain, but merely designates size.


And peace is something Bermuda has cannily preserved so her many tourists can relax in flowered garden or beach settings without an oppressive feeling of overcrowding. The south shore beaches are considered the best,


but all the hotels are not crammed on them, yet none is more than a mile from a beach and big hotels, like the Bermudians and Belmont Manor, have free transport to their own south shore beach clubs. Beach addicts should stay at the Mid Ocean, Southampton Princess, Elbow Beach or Sonesta Beach, all with their own beaches. At the Sonesta Beach there is an underwater cocktail lounge from which to watch the fish.

The large hotels have their own night clubs and the island's entertainers tour round these each week. In Hamilton, the Forty Thieves is a particularly flourishing nightclub. In addition to hotel restaurants, for which many hotels have exchange dining arrangements to create more variety, there are pleasant restaurants like Waterlot, in a 300year-old building in Southampton parish; or Tom Moore's, a nineteenth-century pub-style place, named after a poet who wrote under the calabash tree in the garden, and renowned for its lobster dishes. For a peaceful lunch in an old Bermuda house, with original local foods, Belfield in Somerset is quiet with big gardens, and afterwards you can change and slip down through the trees to the beach.


With so many cruise ships coming to Bermuda, lists of sightseeing spots have been compiled, but a view of the reconstructed Fort St Catherine, the 'Gibraltar of the West', replicas of the Crown Jewels, the stocks in St Georges or a seventeenth-century press in Featherbed Alley are more interesting to Americans than Europeans. More fun is Devil's Hole, an attraction as early as 1834 when admission was first charged. This is a pool naturally linked underground with the sea a mile away. Baited but hookless lines are lowered by visitors in the hope of 'catching' and hanging on to shark, moray eel, groupers, or turtles. There is a zoo and aquarium with an exhibition of treasure from a sixteenth-century sunken Spanish galleon, limestone caves to explore and Gibb's Hill lighthouse to see. But, primarily, Bermuda is for enjoying sports or just beach basking. There is no hurry to get anywhere, nothing more pressing to decide than where to dine, what to wear, and what drink to order by the pool


# How to beat the fuel crisis at one fell swoop!

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# MONEY AND HOUSES FREEHOLD VERSUS LEASEHOLD By RANKIN WARD

BY AN ANOMALY in our legal system, while a freehold house is generally accepted as being a better buy than a leasehold house, the opposite is true where flats are concerned.

This is because of the law of covenants.

In 1965, the Wilberforce Committee in a Report to the Lord Chancellor on Positive Covenants Affecting Land, recommended changes in the law to rectify this position. The Report stated that the evidence before the Committee showed that freehold flats are not generally considered to be satisfactory security for a mortgage and that building societies and other lenders are reluctant to make advances on such properties. When they do, they will advance only a substantially smaller proportion of the total value than they would advance on other comparable properties.

According to the Report, the practice of local authorities is not uniform. Some will make full advances on freehold flats; others will not. The Committee had evidence of one council which is normally prepared to advance up to 100 per cent on its property manager's valuation on the security of dwelling houses.

Advances on flats are quite different: the council limits advances for freehold flats to threequarters of the valuation if the flats are purpose-built and to twothirds of the valuation if they are the result of conversion. Many building societies, said the Report, will not make loans on the security of freehold flats at all.

This is all very unfortunate in view of the marked increase in flats built for sale since the war to meet the demand by retired people, business spinsters, bachelors and young married couples who do not want to be saddled with the upkeep of gardens.

If you buy, say, a ground floor flat in a block of flats, all manner of difficulties can arise. For instance, your lease will not include the roof. This probably goes with the lease or leases of the top flats and in those leases there are covenants by the flat buyers to keep the roof in repair. But what is the position if those buyers ignore their repairing covenants and allow rain to come through to the flats below?


Or you may have a top-floor flat. The water and other services have to run through other people's flats. What can you do if there is a stoppage in the services which the flat owners are dilatory in putting right? I think you will see that here there can be real trouble. The lawyers have brought their ingenuity to bear upon the problem and have drafted leases which, they claim, will meet and overcome the legal snags.

Provided the lease is welldrawn, there seems no justifiable objection to leasehold flats. They are good security for a building society mortgage and many societies lend on them. By "welldrawn leases", I mean that you in your ground floor flat have a legal right to make the flatowner at the top of the block repair the leaking roof, although the repairing covenant was not entered into with you but with the landlord. And that this would be so, although the original buyer of the top floor flat, who entered into the repairing covenant, may have sold to someone else and the original landlord, with whom the covenant was made, may also have disposed of his interest to another party. In other words, the repairing covenants are mutually enforceable for the benefit of all the flat-owners. This is possible within the law of real property concerning leasehold property.

The odd thing is that this is not so where the flat is *freehold*.

On the sale of a freehold flat in a block of flats, just as in the case of leasehold flats, there must be covenants by the purchasers with the developer to maintain their flats for the mutual benefit of all flat-owners in the block. These are termed "positive covenants". They involve spending money.

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

In the case of freehold flats, such covenants are enforceable against the first purchasers who gave the covenant but not purchasers from them-not successive owners. Where freehold flats have changed hands, the question arises on a breach of repairing covenants: who can sue whom? Once again the lawyers have thought hard about this difficulty and claim to have devised means of overcoming it. But lawyers are not unanimously happy about the position.

Meanwhile, the fact remains that, from a legal point of view, the leasehold flat is preferable to the freehold flat. That explains why most flat development is on a leasehold basis. If you are thinking of buying a leasehold or freehold flat, ask for an assurance from your solicitor that all that can legally be done to safeguard your position in law has been done. If you are depending on a mortgage to help buy the place, before you sign the sale contract (unless the contract is made subject to your obtaining a mortgage) which binds you to complete the purchase or forfeit your deposit, make sure that the lender is prepared to advance the amount you need.

You may be prepared to take an element of risk. But remember, when you come to sell, your prudent purchaser might jib. You might find difficulty in selling at your price. These are matters to be faced fairly and squarely before signing any deeds.

Many flats have been sold. What we don't know is how many snags have arisen or will arise on the enforcement of repairing covenants where they have been

broken by the "odd-man-out". In a perfect world, all would be well. But we live in an imperfect world. Unfortunately the legal code relating to real property and covenants is also imperfect. Be on your guard. Don't buy a potential law suit.

The popular method of flat development today is for a block of leasehold flats to be built, the individual flat-owners entering into repairing covenants with the landlord-developer and one another. A maintenance company is formed and each flat-owner is a shareholder and has a say about the maintenance of the common parts such as passages, stairs, gardens, paths and roads not taken over by the local council. A local estate agent may be appointed as manager who lets the contracts for cleaning stairs and passages, landscape gardening, outside painting, and so on.

Each flat owner is assessed annually and liable to pay for his proportion of the total cost of maintenance. On estates where the flats are in the higher-price bracket, a full-time manager is appointed and provided with a flat on the estate. On such estates the annual maintenance charge is, of course, much higher 🔵



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

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

MANY a rose blooming profusely overseas is its own glowing tribute to the Englishman's love of his garden, wherever he might be. This interest in horticulture is rapidly spreading to other spheres, notably those in which builders, developers and architects are active.

No longer, they find, is it possible to leave uncultivated and untidy the land around their estates or apartment complexes. Landscaping for blocks of flats and gardens for villas have become vital to the proper finishing of any scheme.

In a decade, the picture has completely altered. There was a time, earlier, when it was considered that a developer's role ended at the four boundary walls of a building. There were many uncongenial sights as debris littered the area between unmade roads and the finished homes.

The English influence changed all that. Slowly, buyers from this country created, sometimes out of sheer rock, gardens which became the pattern others copied. Now a garden is the rule rather than the exception and the newer developments abroad are all the better for the example shown.

As for the properties being offered, they are as varied as the countries in which they are being built. The choice, if anything, is wider now than at any time and

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

prices, while they have risen significantly everywhere, still compare favourably with those at home.

On balance, Spain continues to lure the British buyer to its sunny shores with some of the least expensive properties of anywhere in Europe. A buyer may plump for a coastal villa or apartment or perhaps, an apartment-hotel unit on one of Spain's islands, the Balearics-Ibiza, Menorca and Majorca-or the Canaries, or a

home in the mountains, maybe if one is so inclined, at a ski resort in the Sierra Nevada.

It remains possible to find a small studio-flat for around £2,000 in some of the Spanish developments, including those on the island of Majorca, but Spain is undergoing one of the biggest inflationary periods in building at present and there are estimates that this year costs will have risen by close to 20 per cent.

For £2,000 too, it is still pos-

sible to acquire for renovation an old building in the Dordogne region of France, though such properties, usually disused farmhouses, barns, cottages and the like, are fast disappearing and £4,000 to £5,000 is now much more likely for anything which is capable of being properly modernized. However, for that money, there is usually a fair amount of land, not less than an acre and often up to three acres.

It is official French policy to

encourage the development of the vast Languedoc-Roussillan region on the Mediterranean seaboard and, to this end, the French government has ploughed vast sums into the creation of waterways and marinas, expanding existing towns and enlarging existing village communities. This region, too, presents a purchaser with an opportunity to buy anything from a studio to a marine house complete with its own mooring at the rear and garage at the front. Prices again are as wide as the choice, ranging from around £3,000 to more than £50,000.

There is an unofficial aim to make the Languedoc-Roussillan region a rival to the Riviera where prices are well up in the top brackets, and £50,000 is easily spent on a sea-front apartment with £150,000 or more for a spectacular villa on the mimosaclad hillsides at Cannes.

Even so, in the mountains behind there are more modest old buildings for renovation which may be bought relatively cheaply on both the French and Italian sides of the Alps. £4,000 or £5,000 again can be well spent on such properties, as

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
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

it can in Tuscany, an Italian area much coveted where prices have steadily inclined, and where in practice £8,000 to £10,000 for something to restore is much more the likely bracket. In fact, in Tuscany, foreign

In fact, in Tuscany, foreign buyers are in competition with the Italians who themselves seek Tuscan week-end homes and are willing to pay for them. What they are prepared to pay may be judged from the astronomical figures mentioned for some of the Italian coastal villas between Milan and Rome.

There may be a consolation in the tiny independent state of Andorra for those who seek the old building to 'do up'. A few former farm buildings may be found for around £4,000, but the most likely purchase is a newly built apartment, an average for which is £12,000. Andorra, a principality which enjoys a taxfree existence, is making a name for itself as a ski centre and, like France and Switzerland, is expanding these sports resorts.

Ski-ing is a bonus in Cyprus, which, with some justification, claims to be one of the most attractive of the islands in the world. A great deal of development has gone on in Cyprus and it is possible to buy an apartment from about £4,000. There is much in the pipeline, a great deal more than there is, for example, on the islands of Sardinia or Elba, where £12,000 to £15,000 does not go very far. On the Greek island of Corfu, two-bedroom villas are £5,000. Development is to a large extent restricted by the terrain in those islands, as it is on the Portuguese island of Madeira where a house on the slopes in the Funchal district would rarely be less than £15,000 and an apartment in that capital would be in the region of £12,000.

Nor is the Portuguese mainland inexpensive, particularly when compared with prices in Spain. A two-bedroom villa on the Algarve is around £10,000, and in the more exclusivelydeveloped districts close to the airport at Faro, £20,000 is not unusual for a two- or three-bedroom new 'village' house.

Around the several golf courses in the Algarve, sites are seldom less than £8,000 and rise to £15,000 and villas on them are being valued at between £25,000 and £60,000.

Recently into prominence has come Corsica where, too, £15,000 to £20,000 is the rule rather than the exception, although there are apartments for about half that.

For a real break, the islands of Fiji and the Seychelles are next in line for exploitation, developments there being directed principally at Australasia and Africa respectively. Islands in the Bahamas and the Caribbean broadly await a return of confidence

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#### GARDENING KNOW-HOW

# **PLANTING IN MAY**

#### BY PETER RUSSELL

NOW IS THE TIME to plant maincrop and late potatoes. Sow spinach beet, long and round beetroot, lettuce, carrots, turnips, onions for pickling, cauliflower, broccoli, autumn and winter cabbages, marrows-unless it is intended to put in plants, when available-and the all-important runner and french beans. Make sure that the runner beanpole structures are soundly made and installed firmly. Flimsy ones are easily blown over in gales. Sheltered spots are preferable if beans are to be grown up nets, manufactured or contrived. Fullyclothed in bean growth, nets become as sails. In strong winds a very great strain is put on the roots of the bean plants and they may become ripped or snapped resulting in no crop.

Be sure to plant a full quota of summer cabbages. These are fairly economical in terms of garden space and give a very high return. This is also the time to plant brussels sprouts.

Continue with hardy annual sowings. As with vegetable sowings, try not to sow more thickly than necessary. This way, the very most is made of the seed and the amount of eventual thinningout is reduced. Keep on top of the thinning-out programme amongst earlier sowings of both flowers and vegetables.

Sow wallflowers, polyanthus, forget-me-nots, Canterbury bells and sweet williams. Amongst perennials, hasten to sow some rudbeckia Rustic Dwarfs, something new in the Garden Pride seed range from Hurst Gunson Cooper Taber of Witham, Essex. Colours in the mixture include brown, mahogany, rusty-red, gold and yellow, in a variety of shades.

Begin to sort out spring bedding plants and bulbs no longer worthy of their places. Wherever possible, spent tulips are best lifted at an early opportunity. They are no adornment when petals have fallen. Lift carefully, for stems break away from bulbs very easily. Heel the tulips in, choosing a semi-shady place, if available. Here, foliage can take its time in withering, benefiting the bulbs to the last. When withering is subsequently completed, bulbs will be lifted, parted from foliage remnants, sorted for size and stored ready for replanting when autumn comes. Whether you are going ahead with heeling-

in or having to leave bulbs a while longer in the beds, be sure to snap off seed pods after display. This saves waste of energy in the formation of seeds.

Remember how good the early part of May is for transplanting evergreens. It is also an excellent time of year for any necessary pruning of many evergreens, including the handsome, common laurel. Where any are grown as informal hedges and screens, be adroit with pruning saws and secateurs, where appropriate. Skilful curtailment leaves beauty of foliage and form unimpaired.

Make the most of final chances to give discreet and efficient support to herbaceous plants. Catch them whilst they still have growth to make; growth still able to come up through peasticks pushed in and around clumps.

Note the dates and times for this year's Chelsea Flower Show. And, if you have not so far found opportunity to go to one of the shows, it would really be worth making a special effort this year. There is nothing quite like it. The information: Tuesday, May 21 (for holders of Fellows' tickets, only—though these are transferable), Wednesday, May 22, Thursday, May 23, between 8.30 am and 8.00 pm. On Friday, May 24, the show opens at the usual time, but closes earlier at 5.00 pm

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
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### WHY CAN'T WE BUILD 300,000 Houses In 1974?

One of the most appalling statistics of recent years was published recently in a brief paragraph on the front page of *The Times*. Other newspapers gave the statistics even less space.

A statement from the Department of the Environment noted that fewer private houses were started in January this year than for a similar period in more than a decade. Only 9,400 private dwellings were started. Yet even this lowly figure topped the 7,500 houses started by Councils, and this despite the financial props and subsidies available to public sponsorship.

This lamentable story suggests that until Britain returns to some kind of scheme similar to that evolved by Harold Macmillan, when Minister of Housing in the early 'fifties (aided by Ernest Marples, and Sir Percy [later Lord] Mills), the monthly totals will continue to be equally pathetic.

In this connection the relevant sections of the third volume of the Macmillan memoirs, Tides of Fortune, seem to have a too-topical significance. Characterizing the 'denizens of Whitehall', as he terms them, and the professional economists, Mr Macmillan says 'They hate action and risk. That is why they have become dons and civil servants. They worship security, the Mammon of today, and more destructive of the power, wealth, and strength of England than any of the false gods which we have worshipped from time to time.'

Many young couples, yearning for their first home, will readily believe that such men are still around—and they may well be right. Today, even more than in those days when Mr Macmillan and his team managed to mastermind the building of 300,000 houses in a year, we need what he

calls 'a sort of modified "Beaverbrookism",' in order to achieve a comparable number of completed houses.

As we go to press, Anthony Crosland, the Minister of the Environment, although seemingly enthusiastic concerning the Tunnel, is plainly reserving judgment on the British Rail side of the exercise. Let us hope he will be rather more concerned with the scenic beauties of Southern England than the so-called planners.

#### OFF-THE-MAP CHUNNEL

Of that terrible trio of projects for minorities aimed to milk British taxpayers of millions and millions of their hard-won shekels, Maplin seems to have taken the count and Concorde is also, happily, in a pretty dicey state.

Only the Channel Tunnel remains and with good fortune on the side of the people rather than the politicians and bureaucrats, even that unnecessary project may soon be out of the way. The case for British Rail hasn't been helped by the claims of the Royal Institute of British Architects that the maps used by the railway boffins are thirty years out-of-date; so ancient they are useless. The RIBA spokesman claimed, indeed, that as no recent industrial and other developments were shown on the maps, it would have been impossible for British Rail to judge the effects of the proposed lines on surrounding areas. The most telling claim was that no post-war road or town developments are shown on the maps. Furthermore, the RIBA claims that the gain in journey time would be very small at the expense of horrify-

ing noise for surrounding residents in Surrey and Kent.

British Rail denied the RIBA claims, contending that their plans were based on the latest Ordnance Survey publications. But were the latest O.S. maps available? British Rail's surveyors have been out and about in Surrey and Kent for the past few years.

Little wonder that the whole project seems bedevilled, what with any number of alternative routes and, basically, the sheer non-necessity of the whole thing.

#### **GUIDES' GUIDE**

Guide books can generally be divided into two varieties: those that provide information and those that parade opinions. The former are more valuable, the latter more controversial. Both varieties proliferate annually, and some are of particular interest to *House & Garden* and *Wine & Food* readers. Hence these notes.

Amongst the best of the info-providers is the annual *Guide to Historic Houses*, *Castles and Gardens* which, at 30p, is an inexpensive and essential reference book for any tourist with a serious interest in the Stately Homes, their possessions and pleasaunces. If all guides were as soundly researched and carefully cross-referenced as this there would be fewer grouses about getting lost, arriving on shut days, losing out on refreshments and so on.

The same publishers (somewhat portentously named ABC Historic Publications) also produce the equally well-informed *Guide to Museums and Art Galleries* (30p).


Then follows a spate of smaller and less comprehensive guides, most of them concentrating upon gardens. They range from the two yellow


books: Gardens of England and Wales open to the Public (20p from the National Gardens Scheme, 57 Lower Belgrave Street, London SW1) and Scotland's Gardens (25p from The General Organizer, Scotland's Gardens Scheme, 26 Castle Terrace, Edinburgh) to the green booklet Gardens to Visit, offered by the Gardeners Sunday Organization at 10p (available through W H Smith). There is also the Open Gardens Guide, in aid of the British Red Cross Society, free, from The Publicity Office, British Red Cross Society, 9 Grosvenor Crescent, London SW1. All four are useful and necessary to gardeners wishful to see what the well-heeled green-fingered fraternity are achieving.

Coming sharply down-scale from the Stately Homes, the most useful of all guides for many younger people, is also one of the most specialized: *The Flat and House Hunter's Guide to London* (Allen & Unwin, £1.75) by Patricia and Robert Ross, an American husband-and-wife team who seem to know London as well as Pevsner or Betjeman. This survey, with its lists of estate agents and estimates of the advantages, disadvantages and, above all, the atmosphere of the various London boroughs, is extremely well done.

So much for bricks and mortar, soil and greenery. What about alimentation? Here we come to some quite spikey and controversial guides: those concerned with hotels, restaurants, pubs and other places which provide shelter, food, drink and, hopefully, comfort and concern at all levels.

The year's front runners, as usual, are the Egon Ronay Guide, published in conjunction with Dunlop, by Hutchinson at £2:20, and the Good Food Guide, published by the Consumers'





Association and Hodder & Stoughton, at £2.15.

Egon Ronay, as usual, seeks to be straightforward and factual, listing dishes, pricing menus and adding fairly deadpan notes on interior decoration with admirable detachment. Unfortunately, the Guide doesn't stand up to hard usage and reference pages are apt to come adrift from the binding, well before the year's endor perhaps ours was a rogue copy.

The Good Food Guide continues with the more personalized approach established by its founder, the late Raymond Postgate. Entries are apt to be overloaded with personal trivia and excruciating puns. For example: of Crugsillick in Cornwall: 'Mr Pilgrim used to be a vet. It is presumably his successes rather than his failures that roam the grounds of this large and well-polished manor, and there is no danger of pussy being substituted for poussin, but the place cannot be recommended for faunophobes . . .' And here is the typical personal touch: of Nivington House at Cleish in Kinross-shire: 'The previous promising regime at this crenellated country house came to a tragic end in 1973 with the death of the proprietor. The new owner, Colin Scott-Smith, is in the unusual position of setting up not merely house, but hotel, with the girl he hopes to marry in the spring of 1974.'

These two guides, which hitherto have had things all their own way, have now been joined by two more, both from Michelin: the 1974 Michelin Great Britain and Ireland and the Michelin Greater London which come together at £2, or you can buy the latter separately for 50p. These new guides are jointly acting as an acidic reporter, distributing stars extremely sparsely and resorting en route to some very sharp implications concerning British hotel and restaurant meals-and their prices. Indeed, in an interview with Ann Morrow of The Times, Michelin's anonymous chief inspector, allegedly a Monsieur Dupont, suggested, in a general rundown on the British set-up, that he is particularly suspicious of any British restaurant boasting a marvellous French chef. 'If he is good he would not leave France,' he

asserted. In reply Egon Ronay listed a quartet of present-day Gallic chefs working in Britain: Dumas of the Connaught; Virot of the Savoy, Lefèvre of the Midland, Manchester, and Cortet of Gleneagles, the only restaurant in Britain to get Michelin's coveted five pavillons. For good measure Mr Ronay added such resounding battle-cry names from the past as Soyer of the Reform, Escoffier of the Carlton, Boulestin and so on. But how meaningful those augustan names are for present-day British palates is anybody's guess. The only one who remained cool in this claim and counter-claim was Anthony Stoll, who was somewhat surprised by the Michelin claim that their inspectors investigate incognito. 'I would have thought,' he said, 'that their strange pneumatic garments would have made them instantly recognizable."

The Michelin guides are extremely well produced (far more sturdily than their British rivals) and include excellent town-centre plans and a built-in guide to places of interest and so on. Their only drawback is over-reliance on symbols rather than words. Not every traveller is an instinctive decipherer. Nevertheless, many travellers about the land will feel that much of the implied and stated criticism in the Michelin is only too well-based. During recent years eating out has become such a trendy and profitable pastime for many that any number of ambitious tyros get into the act, setting up as restaurateurs with no training and less taste.

A far more charitable approach to the subject than Michelin is to be found in the 600-page Ashley Courtenay Guide, under its tried and trusted title: Let's Halt Awhile in Great Britain (distributed by Michael Joseph, £1.80) which calls itself an authoritative and unbiased guide to the best hotels, inns and guest houses, personally visited and recommended by the author'. Although

not so gastronomically detailed as the Egon Ronay Guide or the Good Food Guide, its personal, if somewhat relaxed, attitude towards hoteliers and restaurateurs has earned Courtenay the support of a sizeable army of touring enthusiasts who seem to like the way Mr Courtenay explores the lesser-known areas of the land, seeking out cosy old-worlde oakbeamed homes-from-home. The Restaurateur's Association

also publishes its own guide. Dining Out (Company Newspapers, 62 High Street, Croydon, at £1.10 including postage) carries a list of 168 places in London and indicates the kind of meal you'll get and the kind of price you'll be likely to pay for an 'average' meal. But what is 'average' when a three-course meal at Tandoori in Fulham Road sets you back £2.50 and one at Scotts in Mount Street in Mayfair, costs £5? Dining Out is hazy on necessary data but is exceptional in carrying colour pictures of all the restaurants featured in its pages. At least you'll be able to hazard a guess at the ambiente.


A less Lucullan guide to eating is the Health Food Guide by Michael Balfour and Judy Allen, published by the Garnstone Press at 95p, which will direct you, whether in Congleton or Coventry, Wallasey or Welwyn Garden City, to shops, restaurants, hotels where the nosh has been, in their own words, 'produced from or reared on soil that is unpolluted by chemical fertilisers, is free of chemical sprays, artificial stimulants to growth and additives, has not had the goodness refined out of it, and is prepared for the table with the least possible delay and loss of nutriment'. So there!

Finally, of course, there's Denys Parsons', What's Where in London, self-styled 'offbeat guide to London's shops and services', sponsored by BP and published by Kenneth Mason at 50p. So if you want to find a fireback or firedog, an all-night garage, a button of curious design or where to resilver a mirror, Parsons is your dragoman extraordinaire!

courses: one is a one-year professional course in tapestry weaving, the first of a regular series of similar courses. Ten students will take the course. (Several more are on a waiting list.) The other is a course on the restoration of old clocks.

As John Lowe, the Principal of the College says, the shortage of soundly-trained textile and tapestry restorers is a grave problem in this and other Western nations. Outside museum workshops there are few skilled craftsmen or women, whilst there are hundreds of tapestries in need of urgent attention. The college hopes to establish a studio where high-quality restoration work can be carried out.

Adviser for the initial course and for any developments that may grow out of it is Karen Finch, formerly of the Conservation Department of the Victoria and Albert Museum and widely known for the tapestry conservation work carried out in her

London studio. Mrs Finch is also closely associated with current plans to set up a centre which will deal with this problem on a national basis; it is hoped that the college studio, specializing in tapestry conservation, will work in close conjunction with such a centre.

Eva-Louise Svensson, who has also had wide experience in contemporary tapestry weaving in Scandinavia, Paris and London, will be tutor to the West Dean course.

For those who cannot spare a year for such benign and useful study courses, there is a four-week introductory summer course on tapestry weaving. Full details from West Dean College, West Dean, Chichester, Sussex PO18 OQZ.

#### MORE THAN POTS

The Craftsmen Potters Association (which, happily, includes any number of craftswomen) has recently

issued a new edition of *Potters*, their illustrated directory of the work of members of the Association.

The Association has 138 members, all professional. Work by many of the members can be seen at the Craftsmen Potters Shop in William Blake House, Marshall Street, London W1, just off the Carnaby Street complex. A visit there can provide a welcome visual and vocal respite from the blare and glare of the nearby casbah.

The directory, with its photographs and addresses, is a useful book, but, alas, offers only occasional relief from the interminable run of jars, vases and platters. Muriel Wright, of Leiston in Suffolk, is one of the few potters offering less conventional objects; she produces garden fountains in oxidized stoneware and very handsome they are, judging from the example shown. Peter Stoodley of Bournemouth is another; he makes large coiled garden pots in electric-fired stoneware. But too many of the others are still preoccupied with unexceptional ware.

The directory is available from the shop at 75p or by post at 90p from the Craftsmen Potters Shop, William Blake House, Marshall Street, London W1.

#### STUBBS-WEDGWOOD

One of the most exciting of exhibitions in the very near future is that to be staged at the Tate between June 19th and August 18th showing the rewarding results of the unusual eighteenth-century friendship between George Stubbs and Josiah Wedgwood. Fortunate indeed were both men and Britain that Stubbs, looking for large ceramic plaques on which to paint, sought out the technical knowhow of Wedgwood. The success of their remarkable venture will come as a glorious surprise to most visitors.

The exhibition, marking the 250th anniversary of Stubbs' birth, will assemble most of the plaques as well as other Stubbs' experiments in enamel on copper.

Not to be missed.

#### PEOPLE

BRITAIN probably possesses the most professional and pertinacious group of architectural historians in the western world. At least a score of these dedicated scholars seem happy to spend the greater part of their lives delving into the provenance of our ancient and/or significant buildings.

Yet the researches of these pundits have been primarily concerned with questions of architectural style(s) rather than structure or materials. Although Sir John Summerson has dealt drily and at length with John Nash's persona and extraordinary adventures in the picaresque and picturesque, he has dealt less comprehensively with the materials favoured by that smart, and occasionally too-smart, operator. And although Howard Colvin in his notable Biographical Dictionary of English Architects 1660-1840 takes eight pages to outline the life and works of Robert Adam, there is little to be read concerning the materials used by that ambitious Scot and his brothers in, for example, their grandiose Adelphi development.

Perhaps the world of building structures and materials is less appealing to the academic mind than that of stylistic subtleties. To spend overmuch time on the incidence and influence of the carboniferous sandstones on the buildings of Edinburgh or the development of the butt purlin roof in the lesser domestic architecture of Cumberland is perhaps less captivating a prospect than seeking out, for the purposes of a paper in the Journal of the Society of Architectural Historians, the castellated lodges of Robert Lugar or the Birmingham projects of John Rawsthorne.


During recent years, however, a few scholars have begun to give much of their time to these basic studies. In 1961 Norman Davey published *A History of Building Materials*<sup>1</sup> which was a sound, wideranging introduction to the subject, and four years later Margaret Wood published her scholarly and comprehensive study of *The Mediaeval House*.<sup>2</sup>

The first of these two books was followed, a year or so later, by a book which has become, within a decade, what could well be termed a specialised classic. This was *The Pattern of English Building*<sup>a</sup> by Alec Clifton-Taylor, now in its third edition.

The author of that book, now in his sixties, is a genial, white-haired bachelor still somewhat surprised by the success of his work and the continuous correspondence prompted by his architectonic - geological - geographical researches. For one thing, he never seems to have got over the




Alec Clifton-Taylor relaxes in his Kensington Garden

agreeable shock of discovering that after two or three daunting false starts in early life, he is, in middle age, doing exactly what he now realizes he had always wanted to do.

Alec Clifton-Taylor was the only son of a prosperous fourth-generation London corn merchant. Needless to say, he was expected to enter the family business and prosper in his turn, especially as he had sisters who would ultimately be dependent on the resulting dividends. But after schooling at Bishop's Stortford, followed by three years at Oxford, Clifton-Taylor knew that neither his heart nor head was enamoured of corn. He was far too interested in buildings. Yet what had seemed to his father an engaging if somewhat eccentric characteristic in a twelveyear-old son—who would forgo a picnic in order to visit a cathedral was far less attractive in a twentyyear-old director-designate of the

family firm. What alternative profession had he in mind his father demanded, firmly, patiently and frequently. To this reasonable requess his son could only reply—with n great conviction, he now admits—schoolmastering.

To that end, his father generously agreed to let him go to the Sorbonn for a year. He enormously enjoyed his year there, for any of the great French cathedrals were only railway journey distant, awaiting his close and careful examination. 'A passion which has never left me', h says, 'despite the manifold beautied of the English cathedrals.'

At the year's end he returned to London still undecided on a career Within a short time, folly at an end he found himself firmly ensconced in a 'box' at Lloyds as a trainee-under writer and trainee-businessman. That corn merchandising would yet prov his future lot was only too clearly apparent.

Then, in the manner of persona miracles, the Courtauld Institute of Art was under the direction of Professor W. G. Constable. After a number of steely sessions with his father, in which he was magnificently supported by his mother, his got his way. He could live at hom and take the Institute course. He was accepted and enrolled. Thanks the his Oxford degree he was let off year and, two years later, with First in Art History, he was read once again to take up a new career

His first job was as a lecturer a the Institute of Education, London University. He enjoyed the work which was basically concerned with opening the eyes of the English t the beauties around them, always somewhat uphill task in a land mor concerned with words than images This was followed by two mor lecturing jobs. And all the time hi early interest in buildings was, para doxically, both widening and becom ing more specialized, for althoug his interest in buildings remained primarily architectural he was be ginning to look more closely int those physical considerations which helped to shape buildings to thei appropriate purpose. Despite his in grained agnosticism his interest in ecclesiastical architecture continued and developed, now taking in the remotest parisl smallest and churches as well as the great and noble cathedrals.

Coincident with this passion, hi geological curiosity-and knowledge -was growing apace. He published various papers on the subject and in the early fifties Sam Carr of Batsford offered to publish virtually any bool he would care to write. He outlined the theme of The Pattern of English Building on which he had been brooding for several years, bu admitted that it would be too size able a project for him to undertake, in view of the vastly increased lecture programme in which he was now involved, at home and abroad (for the British Council) Such a book would take at least three

ars to write, he judged. In the ent it took six, but Batsford were tient and the book duly appeared and was immediately recognized r what it was: a major work and a cessary complement to the rearches of all those academics precupied almost exclusively with yle and only superficially with the ore basic aspects of materials. The ope of The Pattern, as he usually rms the book has now been greatly idened since Fabers took over a uple of years ago, and issued, for udents and enthusiasts, a sturdy, expensive soft-cover version of the 0-page book at £3.25 as well as the ird cover version at a tenner.

Meanwhile, he has returned to his rst and endearing love: the English thedrals and parish churches. For any years he has been making susined forays from his small and mfortable Kensington house, with s surprisingly large garden designed


y himself, to the next clutch of nurches due for inspection. These tensive and exhaustive excursions ave resulted in *English Parish* hurches as Works of Art which atsford are publishing next month -no slight homage from a sincere mostic to a unique architectural stitution.

In much the same way that Alec lifton-Taylor has opened the eyes this compatriots to the variety and chness of their building materials, onald Brunskill is substantially plarging the areas of interest for nose legions of the young and not--young who still like to wander ound Britain's still incomparable puntryside despite the motor-car. The has begun an immense proramme of research into our tradionally-built manor houses, farmouses, cottages as well as barns, nills, inns and shops.

His first general study, based on he experience of innumerable extranural classes and summer schools, as an *Illustrated Handbook of ernacular Architecture*<sup>4</sup> has been blowed by an even more detailed ocal study: *Vernacular Architecture f the Lake Counties*,<sup>5</sup> which docunents a region of strong and veracular character and is the result of hany years of investigation by foot, ike, car and, finally, caravan, aided y students and fellow-enthusiasts. his handbook is to be followed by thers on the North-West, the West Idlands, Wales and East Anglia.

These small handbooks are packed, ke an architect's notebooks, with omment, caption, drawings, photoraphs and maps. They are extremely ntensive studies, but guaranteed to park the interest of anybody taking walk through a sleepy farming vilge or a bustling mill town. Nobody aving read the Illustrated Handbook ever again likely to take a walk round an old town or village as a ind of architectural blind man's uff. Brunskill's books are as much ye-openers as Clifton-Taylor's. hey begin, he contends, where evsner leaves off.

Dr Brunskill, now in his mid-




Ronald Brunskill examines a cottage in Cheshire

forties, grew up in one of the cotton and papermaking towns north of Manchester, where, he says, 'the Irwell Valley gouges into the hills and where a boy could walk for miles on peaty moors coming across half-derelict settlements forgotten since the day that steam power superseded water power in the textile industry.'

His interest in architecture was kindled by early reading, but well aware of his dicey mathematical talents, he was sceptical of his chances of becoming an architect. Yet enthusiasm and a willingness to subsist on a minute scholarship grant carried him through the Manchester University School of Architecture.

In due course, he became, he says, 'competent at design, skilful in measured drawing and even distinguished in historical studies.' This combination of interests brought him to the attention of Professor Cordingley, Director of the School, and really set him on the way he now follows so energetically.

After graduating in 1951 he spent a year in teaching and research; two years in the Sappers helping to build camps in the Suez Canal Zone; a year at County Hall in the heady days of Roehampton and those miniature point-blocks; a year teach-




ing; eighteen months in the United States as a Commonwealth Fund Fellow, studying slums and housing projects but 'discovering that the architectural problems they posed were slight when set against the social problems, a discovery repeated in this country ten years later.' He then spent three years in becoming 'an expert in the design of branch banks.' He married in 1960, having met his wife, Miriam, born in Jacksonville, Florida, when she was attending one of his summer architectural courses at York University. They have two daughters, Lesley, twelve, and Robin, ten. Following his marriage he began the architectural-academic career he still enjoys.

He sees the study of vernacular architecture to some extent, as part of the general nostalgia of our time. Students of the subject sometimes have to choose between the impartial investigation of historic evidence and the passionate defence of a splendid old house. 'Yet nostalgia,' he says, 'is a human emotion which must be acknowledged; affection for the past doesn't necessarily contradict hope for the future. In my work I try to foster an understanding of the complete past so that decisions for the future can be taken on behalf of a public which recognises the segments of the past building heritage which may have to be sacrificed and by architecture graduates who know how to create new buildings without necessarily destroying time-tested architectural character.

He is frequently asked whether he lives in a vernacular house. Strictly speaking the answer is no, for he lives in a small house which he designed himself in 1961, in a nowsuburban part of Wilmslow in Cheshire. Neither does he have a vernacular country cottage, although he has often yearned to buy and restore a building falling into decay. 'But I've never had the time or the money' he claims. 'And more recently I have been reluctant to appear to deprive a genuine country dweller of a cottage, knowing how several of my cousins have been denied the first rung on the farming ladder through competition from week-enders in the Lake District. Instead I have taken a unit in a group of holiday houses in North Wales of a type which should add rather than detract from the local economy and which have been designed by a former student to try to recapture the essence of the vernacular of the region.'

England is indeed fortunate in having two such men as Alec Clifton-Taylor and Ronald Brunskill to underwrite, literally, in so technical yet easily assimilable manner, the more glossy researches of those other architectural historians, still so busily engaged in such beguiling pastimes as establishing the exactitude of Wren's relationship with Talman, Talman's with Vanbrugh, Vanbrugh's with Hawksmoor and so on and on and on



#### STRAIGHT FROM THE BENGALEE Robin Wyatt writes about the curious world of the ubiquitous bungalow, from its

Indian origins to R Norman Shaw's work—and the strange two-storeyed versions

THAT UBIQUITOUS Western word 'bungalow' derives from the Bengalee 'bangla' which describes a building of one storey that may range from a dwelling to an office or a warehouse. For many hundreds of years the natives of Bengal lived in such simple homes. Then, in turn, traders and settlers from Europe adapted the house type to suit their own requirements.

The typical Anglo-Indian bungalow was a comfortable singlestoreyed home, constructed of materials chosen, as far as possible, for their imperviousness to insect attack and, above all, to encourage coolness. To those ends, walls were generally of thick and solid brickwork, the floors concreted and the roof thatched. The apartments were lofty and spacious, with sufficient windows to obtain through ventilation. At a later stage concrete overhangs were introduced to form shady verandahs. Gradually, the classical styles of architecture were introduced and superimposed on the native style. Eventually, the bungalows came to look more and more like a Roman Villa.

When the first 'bungalow' was built in England is now difficult to determine with any accuracy. Certainly during the nineteenth century it became fashionable for better-off town dwellers to have such places as weekend retreats, either at the seaside or in the countryside. From a recent exhibition, The Bungalow, staged by Sussex University, it appears that the first English versions were erected at Westgate-on-Sea in the 1870s and occupied by The Bishop of Gloucester, D G Rosetti the painter, and the architects, John Taylor and J P Seddon. Other early examples were built at Cromer in Norfolk and Bellaggio in Surrey.

The appearance of the Englis bungalow tended to be far remove from its Indian provenance. For or thing, it had to be designed to resiquite different climatic condition With its stolid middle-class colonis connotations, it became an excitin new term to add to the persuasiv jargon of the estate agents an speculative builders. Within a shor time, the term seems to have bee applied to most dwellings that woul previously have been called lodges cottages or small villas.

The first book specifically dealin with bungalow design and construct tion was probably Bungalows an Country Residences by R A Brigg published in 1891. The book mus have found a ready and receptiv public, for it ran into five edition during the next few years. Brigg was an architect of some influence with a large and flourishing country house practice. In his preface h attempts to distinguish between cottage and 'a bungalow suitable fo our climate'. 'A cottage,' he asserts 'is a little house in the country, but bungalow is a little country housea homely, cosy little place, with verandahs and balconies, and th plan is so arranged as to ensur complete comfort, with a feeling o rusticity and ease.' He added that 'Cheapness and economy are im portant factors, but they should no be obtained at the cost of substantiality and utility."

The serious housing shortage nich followed the Great War sponred the major development of the ingalow in England. Servants ere hard to find, and many who we previously been in domestic rvice now sought a home of their wn. The time was ripe for devepment of a new cheap housing pe, and the bungalow seemed an ovious answer. The Daily Mail ganized a competition for bungaw designs which found good sup-

port and at the *Ideal Home Exhibi*tion of 1923, a separate section of the exhibition, entitled *Bungalow Town*, displayed a group of a dozen bungalows of varied design.

Many bungalows had the advantage of being prefabricated and capable of being built within a month at less than £500. Such ease and speed of construction encouraged companies that had previously been suppliers of building materials, or boat builders at coastal resorts, to expand into the house-building business. As planning laws were not as stringent as they are today, and permission to build was generally much easier to obtain, the rush and rash was soon under way.


The interpretation of the word bungalow now changed into that of any type of one-storey all-the-yearround house (possibly with one or two attic rooms) for the not-so-rich. In 1926 *Country Life* published a revised *Book of Bungalows* in which Randall Phillips attempted to encourage a better standard of design to counter the growing lackadaisical approach to such matters which was already causing concern. 
number of rooms. For one thing, in those days of open coal fires in every room, the number of extra chimneys required added substantially to the costs. Yet, claimed Phillips, a bungalow was easy to run, and had no stairs, and these points should be considered as advantageous.

By the 1930s increasingly spirited protests against 'the semi-civilizedbungalowner and 'bungaloid growths' were to be heard from such bodies as The Council for the Preservation of Rural England and the Design and Industries Association. of ribbon-development along arterial roads and the major element in shanty towns.

Despite these protests from the conservationists, the bungalow is still high on the estate agents' lists of desirable residences. In post-Second-World-War England, the bungalow retains its popularity amongst many people. Certainly bungalows can prove to be practical and easy-to-run homes for the retired and elderly, but it is to be regretted that architects do not take more care in designing them. Good ones are undoubtedly built, but they are all too few


What I am advocating, in fact, a kind of semi-outdoor life for t months in which we can't live t fully outdoor life. This means, effect, that we have year-roun possibilities.





structure of an older type of house, far too little is usually done to make the pool part of the house and its garden setting. Ideally, of course, there should be some kind of canopied shelter or changing-room, but if the pool is part of the garden scene, the planting should be very lush indeed, and particular attention should be given to the surround. Thanks to their ease of laying, flagstones are too often used, whereas a brick or tiled surround would greatly enhance and soften a setting which is sometimes apt to become too stark (Centre right) Garden furniture in wrought iron: table, £135.00, chairs, £26.00 each. 

and unrelieved an element in the garden. Some of the pictures reproduced here show how agreeably a pool can be, as it were, assimilated into the garden setting.

Then there's another aspect of the outdoor life which those living abroad are apt to be more skilful in planning and building than the contemporary British, although our Victorian forebears showed undoubted enterprise in similar projects. This is the first-or second-floor loggia-type room which takes over a balcony and, borrowing a modicum







space from the adjoining room, Ids a summer room to the apartent. The Victorians frequently nilt conservatories and summer ooms over the vast porticoes of the mewhat pompous entrances to heir houses, but the device doesn't eem so widely practised these days. Ien Scott, the international designer, as gone one better in his Milan ome. He has built a garden on two vels. Terracotta tubs form a alustrade around what used to be cantilevered roof, which Mr Scott as strengthened. He has also built an airy metal dining-pavilion with a corrugated plastic roof masked with reeds. 'In summer I have breakfast, dinner and sometimes lunch here,' he says. Green banquettes enclose three sides of a table decked with a paler green cloth. Who wouldn't be happy in such a garden? Having experimented to find what will do well in city air, Mr Scott recommends 'roses—I have had some of these ten years and more, marigolds, dahlias nicotiana, and for yearround greenery, bamboo'. With a guide like Mr Scott, why not try?







# PREFABRICATED HOUSES

#### HOTOGRAPHS BY TURE WESTBERG

AN AGE when the demand for ouses far outstrips supply, the eccessity for structures which can ome off a conveyor belt and on to a repared site is imperative.

The trouble is that so many local athorities still think of pre-fabriated houses in terms of those sad ructures which proliferated proughout Britain in the immediate ost-war years, and still, in some reas, lacerate the landscape.

Yet nowadays there is ample vidence to demonstrate that the odular, prefabricated house comares favourably with other designs. The house shown in the colour ictures on the opposite page is a articularly good example. This ouse, called the Moduli, was degned by two Finnish architects, ristian Gullichsen and Judani Palasma, and is based on a flexible yet terdependent double-modular sysm, one cubic, the other linear. For athematically-minded readers, the tual dimensions are 225x225x225 entimetres for the cubic module ith a subsidiary linear module of 5x225 centimetres used for floors, ilings, walls and doors and winows. How these linear modules


relate logically to the cubic module can be seen clearly in our photographs, which show the dining-area and its vertical battens, housing panels and windows.

The plan incorporates fifteen of these 'cubes', of which ten comprise the main structure and the remaining five are terrace decking and an entrance deck. The house is set on short concrete pilotis, thus avoiding the necessity for expensive foundation work.

There is nothing mean or cramped about the interior planning of the Moduli house. The main feature of the accommodation is a living-area well over twenty feet in length and nearly fifteen feet in width, which also incorporates an open study area.

The kitchen takes over one of the modular cubes and its practical proximity to the dining-table can be seen from the plan; all in all, an unusually thoughtful, compact, integrated plan for a casual but comfortable way of life, with adequate storage as well as living-space. A large divan is skilfully infiltrated into a recess formed by the kitchen.

The focal-point of this living-area is the black free-standing stove



which gives out an all-round heat. All furniture and furnishings are equally practical, and robust. Asko furniture, roll-up carpeting and sturdy kitchen-ware make this an ideal holiday house, complete with adjacent pool. And even the approach to the pool has been carefully planned, for the would-be


bather reaches the pool by way of a giant smooth stepping-stone and ground-level decking,

Although the house is owned by Kristian Gullichsen and used mainly as a holiday house, the structure is sufficiently durable and warm to be used year-round, even in the arduous Finnish winters.



VITH THE inflated property prices nd the recent cut-backs by Building ocieties on mortgage loans, famies-large and small-newly-maried couples, bachelors of both sexes, re searching for a financiallyeasonable solution to the major roblem of buying a house.

The prefabricated house-moduar, component-built, timber-framed -has a great deal to offer to these eekers-after-shelter. The houses and lans shown here and earlier are a ew examples of the sophisticated nodular house now available. Far ry from those doleful but necessary ost-war prefabs.

The most problematical part of the whole procedure, of course, is finding your site and getting planning permission for the building of one or more houses. After those headaches, the actual buying of the modular house of your choice is dead easy, as simple as choosing a new car.

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You opt for a particular model, discuss with the manufacturers or agents the plan, which is, in most cases, fairly flexible, and then place your order.

The building is package-delivered to your site ready to be put together, and even this procedure should go like clock-work, for all kits arrive with detailed working drawings. An additional advantage in the case of the Sun House, and the MaxiVilla A-frame house, designed by Derrick P Smith, is that extra units can be added on to extend the house without having the appearance of an

extension. The A-frame house can also be easily dismantled and reassembled elsewhere. The makers of the Essi homes, for example, claim that although delivery is currently taking from six weeks to two months, it should take three men no more than five days to erect their houses. Others will take anything up to nine weeks or more from date of order.

With some of the houses shown here, normal foundations aren't necessary. Instead the legs of the frame are merely set into concrete slabs. The Nokkelhus house, by Ingvard Iversen of Norway, is supplied with each unit clearly numbered, leaving the owner and his merry men with the simple job of piecing the puzzle together.


With most of the other houses, however, the technical instructions would need to be carried out by skilled local builders. Where pos-


sible, Colts try to recommend a local builder familiar with their kits.

The houses vary in structure from timber-frames to steel or aluminium frames, with a wide selection of external claddings including stone, brick, timber, slates, shingles and so on to suit personal taste and regulations established by local authorities.

Such necessities-and amenitiesas double glazing; insulation of walls, floors and roofs; internal wall and floor coverings; external cladding; window frames, doors, inside and out, built-in cupboards, shelving, kitchen equipment, bathroom fitments, and heating, are, in most cases, included in the price.

Provided, therefore, that you find your site, get planning permission, find a builder, arrange plumbing and telephone installations, you can build the home of your choice, in the area of your choice



### ONE BIG BIG ROOM PHOTOGRAPHS BY TIM STREET-PORTER

GORDON HYATT, writer and producer of TV films, and his wife Carole, deeply involved in child research programmes, have both been collectors of paintings and prints for as long as they can remember.

Inevitably, these interests had a sizable influence on the kind of apartment they wanted and the kind of decorative scheme they deemed right for the showing of their collection.


In the large living-room of their apartment on Central Park, New York, walls and ceilings are painted the palest green and the wood floor is stained to the same colour. Furniture is limited in quantity, striking in quality. Two 'Gyro' chairs designed by Eero Aarnio, made of green glass-fibre, and the seating in the conversation area is made of a matching plastic green laminate, and covered in heavyweight cotton, dyed to match. The pillows in the conversation area are made from silks, velvets, metallics and Indian fabrics.

In the dining-room a different pale colour scheme was introduced. Walls and ceiling are sky-blue, although the wooden floor is stained to the same green as that of the living-room. A specially-designed buffet can be brought forward on castors, so that Gordon Hyatt, who is by way of being a gourmet cook, can add last-minute nuances to his dishes or even, starting from scratch, prepare a complete meal. The top has a marble top, wood-block working surface and inset warming-unit.

The dining-table consists of four equal squares of plastic laminate in off-white that can be separated to seat up to sixteen. The Breuer chairs are upholstered in off-white vinyls

## **SPACE COMPLEX**

THE APARTMENT in Milan shown here was designed and decorated by Cini Boeri, one of the most eminent—and busy—architects now practising in Italy.

The flat was designed with an over-riding requirement for space, but the brief presented plenty of problems with odd room sizes, varying ceiling heights and differing floor-levels. The sense of space was further enhanced by the pale blue carpeting and lacquered ivorycoloured walls. This colour unity was continued in the unusually uncompromising range of shelving and storage units (and huge coffee table) designed by Cini Boeri. The angularity of these units acted as ideal foils for the deep deep sofas from Mobilia International. The resulting room has now become a fascinating exercise in three-dimensioned geometry, broken at strategic points by the exoticisms of the Flos and Archimede lighting units.

The dining area is set on a raised dais at one end of the living-room. Here the furniture is designed by Caccia Dominioni with chairs by Knoll.

The apartment's visual geometry continues with the adaptation of existing limitations: a writing corner, for example, has been infiltrated between sloping eaves and a buttress to which yet another, lower version of a Boeri cabinet acts as a stalwart podium.

The bathroom furniture was also designed by the architect, with the walls covered in brown silk. But perhaps the most spectacular of Cini Boeri's individual contributions to this spacious-seeming apartment is the kitchen, with its spectacular semi-circular steel surfaced working surface enclosed within its Formica shield. The moral seems to be: if a patron has confidence in a designer he should hand over everything



## **INSIDE DESIGNING FOR OUTSIDE VIEWING**

HOWEVER well versed the reader may be in modern design, he or she would be hard pressed to say, without hesitation, in which city, country—or even continent—this flat is situated. In fact, it is in Rio de Janeiro, but the *amateur* could well have guessed New York, Rome, Paris or London.

The flat is the work of Alberto Pinto, the Paris-based designer, several of whose schemes have been shown in *House & Garden*. His brief was simple. The flat was to be designed for use mainly in summer (due to its proximity to the yacht club) and every possible advantage was to be taken of the outlook.

First of all, M. Pinto decided to open up the living and dining areas to form one large room looking out to the bay of Rio de Janeiro. Seating is either free-standing or in the form of built-in sofa units, with brownpainted platforms behind, set against the walls which are also painted brown. These platforms house stereo equipment, concealed lighting and sunken plant-holders, as well as provide bases for decorative *objets*. Colours are cool: white for the carpet, blue-and-white for the sofa.

The dining-area is circular in shape, its contours outlined with dark brown and white horizontal banding. MOST READERS seeing these pictures would probably be likely to place the interiors in a country house deep in Wiltshire. Certainly not in an *appartement* just off the busy Rue Faubourg St Honoré in Paris. Yet that is where they are.

They are the home of an American fashion writer, set on the second floor of an eighteenth-century *hôtel particulier* (or mansion, as the English would probably have it).

After her divorce in New York, the owner of the flat moved all her worldly goods to Europe and, after much searching, found this flat through somebody else's divorce. Ill winds and all that . . .

She had no decorator apart from an exuberant Russian painter and they did the rooms one by one with a certain degree of feverish activity in the mornings, as the Russian's energies were apt to be muted after the red wine of *dejeuner*.

To her delight and surprise everything—from carpets to curtains—in her New York apartment fitted the new Paris place. So, too, did her unusually pleasing English eighteenth-century pieces, Queen Anne screen, Georgian sofa table, girandoles, early American side-chairs.

The sitting-room and diningroom make a perfect pair of rooms for entertaining, a good deal of which goes on here. But, for evenings alone, the small cosy book-filled library, with its recessed day bed, is a perfect escape.







As the staircase was such an important element in the flat, David Resnick Associates, who carried out the interior design, decided to make the most of it. (The splendid results are shown on page 131.) The living-room is designed as a totally beige box, a neutral background for the sculptural green seating units. Walls, ceiling and double entrance doors are all sprayed with beige flock which increases thermal and acoustic insulation. The window wall has floor-to-ceiling mahogany slatted blinds which give the illusion of full-height windows. Similar blinds have been used to divide the living-room from the functional kitchen/dining-area.

In the main bedroom, the only free-standing furniture is the dressing-table chair. Dark felt is used for walls and ceiling, a handsome foil for the bright yellow seen in the bedcovering, specially-built bed and seating platforms, bedside tables and dressing-table. Full-height sepiatinted mirrors behind the bedside tables visually enlarge the room

Architect Peter Subbs of Truro in Cornwall has designed a spiral stairway (for which the patent is being registered) in which the steps, made from concrete, are cantilevered from a central pillar.

The steps can be finished in various colours in plastic paint. Recommended colours are white, red, black, blue and yellow.

Each step is slid down on to a twoinch pole embedded and anchored at least 18 inches into the ground. Each step is then cement grouted and anchored at the landing stage. The mounting pole can be taken right into the roof or cut 3 ft above

gurkhas, the tenacity of sherpas, the necessity of tiffin. The Royal Pavilion may be the most obvious and resplendent evidence we have of decorative Hindoo influences on our architecture and interior design, but there are others, from the subtleties and sophistication of Sezincote in the Cotswolds to the invincible popularity of the suburban bungalow (from the Hindoo *bangla*, 'belonging to Bengal', as the Shorter Oxford reminds us).

Thus the whole Orient opens its vast treasure-trove of decorative themes and motifs to the inquiring and acquisitive—occidental designer, whether he is an eighteenth-century furniture designer, one Thomas Chippendale, borrowing from the Above Traditional Moroccan motifs assembled with modern flair in a house designed by Philippe Tallien and Claude Chauvin for artist Vincent Roux. Intricately cut-out antique screens contrast with the bare white walls; the fireplace is a copy of a design at Glaoui in Marrakech. White leather-covered



And, fortunately, the East

He never lived in it, although it was opened up very occasionally for entertaining (the state dining-table seats one-hundredand-ten people.)

On a recent visit to India, Bruno de Hamel photographed some of these fairytale palaces, containing what must surely be amongst the richest interiors in the world, and some of the results of his trip are shown on page 132





















THROUGH the centuries, the name of Noailles has been illustrated by courtiers, generals, archbishops, men of state, even poets: the Vicomte Charles is a gardener, president of the Société des Amateurs des Jardins, and a vice-president of the Royal Horticultural Society of Great Britain. Nor is it the only surprising thing about him. That he should be one of France's foremost connoisseurs of seventeenth-century art is almost a matter of noblesse oblige; but who would have expected him to be, together with his wife, the late Marie-Laure de Noailles, one of the great patrons of Surrealism ?

Surprises, in fact, are an essential element in the art of gardening as practised by Charles de Noailles.


'They are a necessity in small gardens, and most gardens today tend to be that. The smaller your garden, the more you must differentiate it. The stroller must continually pass from narrow to wide, from dark to light, and so on. A garden that you can see as a whole from the windows of the house isn't a real garden: it holds no surprises. You might ask how a garden that you know well can surprise you, since a surprise only acts as a surprise the first time. Yet there it is: my garden still surprises me.'

'In other words,' I asked my host, 'to the French garden you prefer the jungle—or at least the English garden ?'

'Not quite,' he replied. 'I like patterns strongly stated by means of neatly-kept hedges or borders: they constitute the architecture of the garden. But, within this formal framework, I like the plants and flowers to grow freely, as they please. Over there, for instance, the rugosa spill over a grey border, but I see no reason for cropping them to restore the alignment. If a flower wants to hop over a hedge, let it.'

The arbour in which we now converse is a striking example of the Vicomte's theory. Rectilinear paths converge on a square defined by precise hedges and borders. Inside, wild luxuriance. So wild, in fact, that one forgets that this jungle is but the size of a handkerchief. Surprise is expectation foiled: the measured grace of Pompadour sets off Monsieur de Noailles's creative fancies, as a wall of foliage does a statue.

here are many statues in the garden of Pompadour—a rare stone work by Giacometti, a fountain by the Cubist Henri Laurens, several Italian baroque sculptures, a kitsch Venus by the nineteenth-century sculptor Clésinger, and a pair of *termes* which Monsieur de Noailles spotted on a heap of rubbish in an antique-dealer's backyard and bought for a few francs (his perspicacity was recompensed: they turned out to be rare works by Nicolas Poussin). 'Statues are an excellent thing in the garden,' he said. 'They are halfway

between man and matter, a perfect intermediary between nature and humanity.'

Monsieur de Noailles's philosophy consists precisely in weaving a delicate shuttle between nature and humanity, between geometry and anarchy. His art lies in harmonizing the seemingly incompatible aims of the English garden and the *jardin à la française* and of creating tranquillity with elements that, in less skilful hands, would lead to tensions.

Tranquillity is another key to the Vicomte's way of gardening. 'To me, a good garden is a place where one finds peace, a shelter from the hardships of life. That is why it shouldn't display too much violent colour.'

'Am I to understand that you disapprove of flowers ?'

'If they are used with discretion, I am for them. There are flowers for the garden, however, and flowers for the vases in one's house. They have little in common. People are always planting rose trees. Well, frankly, they make a nasty sight. If you want them to thrive, you must cover them with dung three-quarters of the year. Roses are ideal, but not in a garden where all they contribute is a crude blob of bright colour. It is best to tuck them away in the vegetable garden.'

'A garden without the queen of flowers!'

'The rose wasn't always that. In the time of Louis XIV, the flower most admired was the peony. The Egyptians preferred the iotus; the Chinese, the water lily. Fashion exists even in the garden. But, to get back to colour, the lavish use of it is the sign of a beginner. As a gardener grows older and more experienced, he diminishes the amount of colour.' 'And instead ?'

'All shades of green and of grey. Grey is a marvellous hue. If you have two colours that are somewhat too violent, but you don't want to give them up, put some grey between them, and you will restore the tranquillity of your garden. Nature points the way. Look at practically all landscapes: they almost never look like bright patchwork; with distance, they taper off into brown, green, blue. There is nothing more pernicious for gardens than the fashion of that red tree called Prunus pissardi, after a certain Mister Pissard, a French cook, I believe, who brought it back from Turkey or some place like that. Associated with white negundos-for contrastit makes for the most banal, not to say vulgar, gardens. Nature never produced a checkerboard.'

'If one were to carry this principle to its logical conclusion, one would make gardens without any colour, that is without flowers, what soever?'

'The Japanese have done so. We Europeans, I confess, haven't yet reached that degree of sophistication.'

'If you eliminate colours, flowers, aren't you afraid of falling prey to what you dread most: monotony?'

'There are many things more interesting to play with than brutal contrasts of colour. Light and shade, for instance. A hedge needn't be flat. Or look at these paths through the lawn. Instead of using those uncomfortable pebbles you find in so many châteaux, I have employed the grass itself. I am sure Louis XIV would have done the same, had the lawnmower existed. As it was, cutting down the grass with a blade w costly operation that had freque to be repeated. Here, the same g makes up both the lawn and alleys; but on the latter it is very short, whereas on the form is allowed to grow freely. A gardener is a sculptor as much a painter. Anyway, the real pain the real colourist, is not he relies on colours that are conside beautiful per se but he who cre beautiful relations between col that, in themselves, may be q banal. In the same way, the gard disposes his plants in accorda with those that surround it. I backgrounds are convenient, t enable him to display lighter sha to full advantage. He must thin his vegetal palette in terms of sp In terms of time, too: some t look better in the winter, when t have lost their leaves; others worse. One must remember that garden should have a plea appearance all year.

Nor should one be obsessed one's eyes at the expense of o other senses. Smell, for instance isn't as easy as it seems. The poir a scent is to be smelled. The trop is that you cannot remain aware more than a few seconds. Hence whole art consists in placing n smelling plants at strategic poi where they take you by surpl But if you pause and sit down, effect wears off. With a little p ning, you can have three or t spots in your garden the year ro where you suddenly excla "Heavens, what a nice smell!" I of course, the planning mustn't noticeable.

'Sound is by no means a neglig factor, either. Much of the charm fountains stems from the wat rustle. Trees, too, make differ sounds. A friend of mine plan some aspens along his house beca they shiver audibly even when wind is blowing. People sho always put a chatty tree in th garden. Here, all this is wast because of the traffic outside.'

Dur walk had brought us b to the pocket-jungle I have alre mentioned. I then noticed that was filled with thistles. 'Aren't going to tear them out?' I asked companion.

'I sowed them,' he replied. 'To sure, it isn't the most common thistles, but *Onopordum arabic*. Yet even if it were, if it looks low I don't see why I should depr myself of the pleasure of having

I would put orchids in there, too, but they don't grow in our country.' 'You make no distinction between

noble and common species ?'

'What counts is the ensemble, the effect. There is no reason for not mixing flowers and vegetables. That is how it was in the Middle Ages, and that is how it has continued to be in modest gardens. It was the Second Empire, with its heavyhanded luxury, that introduced prejudice by decreeing that vegetables should be hidden from sight. Yet some are very beautiful. I see no reason to hide my corn, and I find certain curly cabbages so handsome that I have used them in my borders. They are halfway between vegetable and flower.'

Beauty is incompatible with laziness of spirit; it is not given but created. 'A bad garden reflects its proprietor's wealth; a good one, his personality,' said Monsieur de Noailles. 'It is too much to expect people to be in a position to boast, as did a celebrated gardener named Lawrence Johnson: "All the plants in my garden were either given to me by friends or picked up along the roadside." But when I see a grown olive tree being transported by truck, I know the man who bought it is probably rich and certainly not a gardener.'

'But if a true gardener plants everything himself, there are some plants, certain trees, for instance, that he will never really see.'

'Strange as it may seem, no gardener ever feels frustrated by this. When I plant something ten inches tall, knowing it will eventually grow to be ten feet high, I really see it in its full height. Besides, one does witness some growth. Then I tell myself: "I have lost a few hairs, but it has gained a few branches." Considerable pleasures, these. And I assure you that I am not in the least upset by the knowledge that my garden will really be seen in its full glory only by my great-grandchildren. In my garden at Grasse, I planted a Magnolia campbellii. I rejoice at

e moment he saw me, he said: That, young man, you've come hout a basket! Do you think that I Ill let you leave without a plant?"' You just used the word "secret". e gardeners alchemists?'

It is certainly a gift, like cooking. rtain people, with the same plants d the same conditions, obtain ults that others don't. And they by no means the most scientific. rhaps they are closer to nature. wing the green thumb, as the glish say, may simply consist in nsing what plants desire. It is hard explain, but I know that plants n't forgive you if you are not esent when they are going through labour of breaking into blossom.' Sounds like plant psychology.'






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

Dunn, Malcolm (d1899). Scottish gardener and pomologist. After serving his apprenticeship in England and Ireland, Dunn returned to Scotland in 1871 to take up an appointment as head gardener to the Duke of Buccleuch at Dalkeith Palace. He was a man of unusually varied talents: a pomologist of the first rank, a grower of grapes in a cold climate, a landscape gardener, a noted arborologist. He was a forceful advocate of the Scottish

Scheme for establishing a forestry school in Scotland. He was awarded the gold medal of the Royal Horticultural Society in 1897.

Dykes, Percy James (1909-1964). Gardener. Dykes' gardening career was mainly concerned with the development of the Royal Horticultural Society's gardens at Wisley. He joined the gardens staff at the age of twenty and remained for four years. He returned there again in 1946, becoming foreman of the glass-house department and later superintendant, in which position he was responsible for producing extremely large numbers of a wide range of plants for trials, teaching and examinations. The Associateship of Honour of the Society was conferred on him in 1963.


Dykes, William Rickatson (1877-1925). Iris cultivator and hybridist and author. Dykes was educated at the City of London School and afterwards at Wadham College, Oxford, graduating in 1900. He was then for

Arboricultural Society and of the | a time at the Sorbonne, before becoming a master at Charterhouse where he remained from 1903 to 1919. He was particularly interested in, and influenced by, the cultivation of little-known species of iris and the hybridization experiments which had been started by Sir Michael Foster towards the end of the nineteenth century. Dykes began to cultivate the species in his own garden at Charterhouse. One consequence was the publication of his Monograph of the Genus Iris in 1913, which included forty-seven beautiful life-size colour plates of fine quality drawn by Francis Round (1877-1958), a fellowmaster at Charterhouse, who, curiously enough, was quite uninterested in botany.


Dykes had previously published in 1911 a small book for the amateur grower of irises, and in 1924 published a useful and well-illustrated Handbook of Garden Irises, with drawings by Elizabeth Kaye.

Dykes grew many difficult varieties with great skill and successfully carried out hybridization.

He also wrote for a wide range of by WR DYKES

other favourites, tulips. The articles on iris, edited by George Dillistone, were later published as Dykes on Iris. He also translated from the French Louis Lorett's once-famous manual on pruning fruit trees.

Dykes, having made himself a considerable authority as a botanically-minded horticulturist, began what was virtually a new career in 1920 when he took over a key position involving work and responsibilities of which he was entirely without experience, leaving Charterhouse and teaching to become secretary of the Royal Horticultural Society. The job was no sinecure, for not only was he entering a new world but he was succeeding the eminent Reverend W Wilks, who had held the position since 1888 and to 'whose energy, singleness of purpose, and wisdom the Society's transition from poverty to prosperity was largely due', as one obituary notice recorded.

Dykes had all the qualities for success, and soon became involved in the planning of the Society's new hall, on land leased in 1925. Soon after signing the lease on behalf of the Society Dykes met with a tragic motor accident, and died as a consequence. He had been awarded the Society's Victorian Medal of Honour in 1925, was a founder of the Iris (later British Iris) Society in 1924, and the editor of its first publication, the Bulletin.

periodicals, not only on irises but his | the Society said of him: 'With all his occupation in the Society's affairs and his interest in his plants he never lost a certain boyish delight in a merry tale, and it was perhaps to this youthfulness in him that his character owed its charm. Like a boy, too, he was almost impetuous in his desire to carry out some new scheme which he had evolved and which he thought would be beneficial to the Society; and by adopting the blunt straightforwardness of the soldier, he has been known to fail to convince his hearers when he might have succeeded had he been prepared to use the tact and skill of the diplomat. After all, this straightforwardness was one of the finest traits in a very attractive character, remarkable for its strength and its sincerity . . .

The year after Dyke's death one of his yellows, which was named 'W R Dykes' flowered, and was important in the history of the florist's bearded irises.

His wife, Katherine, was a talented artist and gardener, and worked on their new garden at Woking, to which they had moved on leaving Charterhouse. She illustrated in colour and edited her late husband's Notes on Tulip Species published in 1930. An iris she raised, the whiteflowered 'Gudrun', played an important part in subsequent iris breeding. She died as the result of a railway accident in 1933, returning from

Dysart family. The Dysarts are represented in this Dictionary on account of their long association with Ham House, Petersham, Middlesex, and the gardens of that mansion, now owned by the National Trust and administered by the Victoria & Albert Museum. The house was built in 1610 by Sir Thomas Vavasour, Knight Marshal to James I, but in 1637 came into the possession of William Murray, first Earl of Dysart, who, some ten years later, bequeathed the house to his daughter Elizabeth, who, after the Restoration, obtained the title of Countess of Dysart in her own right, with the

power of appointing her successor from among her children.

She, meantime, had married Sir Lyonel Tollemache, 3rd baronet, and three years after his death in 1669, she married the Earl (later the Duke) of Lauderdale, Minister to Charles II.

They were well-matched in ambition and ruthlessness of purpose, and Ham House became a sumptuous background for their extravagant display, necessitating a considerable enlargement of the house between 1673 and 1675. The gardens were also maintained in a manner to match the grandeur of the house. John Evelyn, visiting the house in 1678, recorded the following entry in his diary:

'After dinner I walked to Ham to see the House and Garden of the Duke of Lauderdale, which is indeed inferior to few of the best Villas in Italy itself; the house furnished like a great Princes; the Parterres, Flower Gardens, Orangeries, Groves, Avenues, Courts, Statues, Perspectives, Fountains, Aviaries, and all this at the banks of the Sweetest River in the World, must needs be admired.'

Of these adornments only the orangery, in the singular, survives as a tea house.

After the death of her husband, the Duchess concentrated her interests on her aviaries in what she termed the 'Volary Room'. A century later, another commentator of note had vastly different impressions of



# A LIVELY SERIES FOR THE YOUNG

Mills & Boon have recently introduced a series of a dozen books which should certainly make the younger generation sharply, yet agreeably, aware of their environment, whether urban, rural, or, for that matter, coastal or ecclesiastical.

The new series, entitled **On Location**, is sturdily and imaginatively produced to cope with children's active and inquisitive ways of life. Each book has a coloured photographic soft cover (a pretty tough soft cover) and contains a succinct commentary, supplemented by photographs and drawings and, most important, some forceful injunctions to action: 'If you visit a museum make sketches of things that interest you . . .' And so on.

The publishers have commissioned a vigorous team of writers, photographers and artists for the venture. Alec Davis, responsible for the format of the books, as well as for many of the photographs and drawings, deserves high praise for his contribution, for the books have the irresistible appeal of all scrapbooks, allied with the advantages of a clearcut typographical layout.

So far, eight titles (60p each for the soft covers and £1 for hard covers) have been published: MUSEUMS, RIVERS, SEACOAST, CANALS, CASTLES, RAILWAYS, ROADS and CHURCHES. TO complete the dozen, FARMS, INDUSTRY, HOUSES and COUN-TRYSIDE will be published in the autumn.


They should be widely successful and seem to be impeccably well timed to match the fast-escalating interest in the environment.

#### Dolls' houses

The appeal of dolls' houses is far from a children's preserve: grownups are apt to find them fascinating at all times. The appeal is made clear in Family Dolls' Houses by Vivien Greene (Bell, £5.50) which concentrates on the more sophisticated models, ranging from that for Clare Priory in Suffolk to the English Factory House at Porto, which must be one of the half-dozen most spectacular - and handsome - doll's houses ever built. Mrs Greene, owner of a museum of dolls' houses and a writer with an easy narrative style, is a lively guide to these extravaganzas. The book is extremely well-illustrated and printed.

#### **Oriental explanation**

For almost anybody but the expert, the world of oriental carpets is apt to remain a technical and aesthetic mystery. Sorting out the regional characteristics seems to demand a lifetime's devotion. Nicholas Fokker, born in Hungary, now living in Sweden as a carpet importer, has produced a specialized volume, **Persian Carpets for Today** (Allen & Unwin, £3.95), which is so well equipped with diagrams of motifs

and colour-plates of actual carpets that much is made clear to the tyro-collector.

#### Urban observations

Jonathan Raban seems, from the biographical evidence of the blurb of his book, **Soft City** (Hamish Hamilton, £3) to be something of a wanderer, both as a teacher and student of cities. He has taught in Wales, East Anglia and Massachusetts. Against this background he now seeks to analyse what happens

to people living in large cities, basing his inquiries mainly upon comparisons between his experience of New York and London. Although Mr Raban makes a serious attempt to get at effects of urban life upon people, his one-man survey is constricted by his concentration on one set of people. For example, he largely ignores the vast silent and secretive areas of inner suburbia of London, which begins in Fulham and Camden Town, in order to concentrate on the more vocal and

E DAY the Gondelbahn came to d Dürkheim, the happy burghers this medieval old town of the rman Palatinate knew they had aght up with Rüdesheim, their at rival some sixty miles away on banks of the Rhine.

There are scores of wine festivals th year in Germany but only idesheim and Bad Dürkheim vie pride of place, and if you are a ne-lover your education is not mplete until you have visited both them. They are quite different in ncept but they have the same jective—to sell as much local wine possible and to fill every hotel droom to bursting for a few days the year when all work ceases and ne flows freely if not free.

Bad Dürkheim claims that it prodes the biggest wine festival in the orld, and since it goes on for two extends and attracts half-a-million sitors each year, they may well be pht. What's more, these visitors ink about 370,230 pints of wine d though I didn't count them, ese are the figures supplied with eutonic thoroughness by the local thorities.

The visitors come from all parts Germany and from other counes and there is a convenient mouflage over the whole proceedgs. The occasion is called Dürkim Wurstmarkt, which means usage Fair, and it arose from an nual pilgrimage to an old chapel the Michelsberg mountain near e town as far back as 1442.

As the weary pilgrims plodded ohill, the winegrowers of Bad Dürktim sold them wine and homeade bread and sausages to keep em going.

When this developed into a mart the prior of nearby Limburg bbey gave them space on a meadow the foot of the height and ever nce then the sausage fair has been eld every year. In 1934 a gentleman ith the propitious name of Keller vine-cellar) built the biggest wine arrel in the world to hold 500,000 ullons. Instead of filling it with ock, however, he turned the inside to a restaurant where well over 00 people can eat and drink in a ther warm atmosphere.

A fun-fair was added, with dipper nd big wheel and many more nusements at the other end of the round, while in between stand some orty wine 'tents' in which you drink *schoppen* of local wine, a jug holding a pint which is passed from hand o hand round your party. It costs pout 40p, so is not exactly cheap and each year there is great argunent over the price of the sausage *ir schoppen*, fixed by a special pommittee who taste dozens of wines and approve or disapprove their sale t the fair.

But what has all this to do with he Gondelbahn? The truth is that though Rüdesheim, confining its ctivities to one weekend, cannot tract as many visitors or drink as hany pints, it has had for many, hany years an undeniable advantage.

# THE DAY OF THE GONDELBAHN BY JOHN MORRELL

Slung from steel standards ascending the hillside behind Rüdesheim, a cable car railway has been a great attraction to visitors. In the little gondolas they have been lifted over the green vineyards to the slopes of the Niederwald where stands the national memorial to the victory of the 1870 war against France and the creation of a united German empire.

Most Germans will shake their heads today and tell you they detest this vainglorious figure of Germania, a lady of ample proportions, and what she represents, but so far nobody has tried to pull it down.

Long before the last war, and the later cable cars, there was a cogwheel railway in which a huffing, chuffing little engine and two carriages climbed its perilous way to the same destination though at times it went so slowly you could almost have got out and picked flowers.

From the Niederwald you can look down on the great silver Rhine -it still glistens despite its murky contents-and the white pleasure steamers and big barges drawn by gigantic tugs, the like of which have never been seen on Clyde or Thames. All around you are massed terraces of vineyards, among them those of the Rüdesheimer Berg, famed for its wines, among the best in the Rheingau which is the leading German area (unless you come from the Palatinate or the Mosel). There, above the terraces, dangle the blue, yellow and red gondolas of the cable-car railway.

Each year Rüdesheim fills these gondolas, especially at wine festival time, the first weekend in September. Thousands crowd its narrow streets and particularly the Drosselgasse, scarcely eight feet wide and lined on either side with souvenir shops better than most of their kind—and weinstuben where you can sit and drink such great wines as Schloss Johannisberg or much humbler offerings to oompah band music.

Meanwhile, in the market square there are platforms for dancing and for presenting plays showing the town history—something Bad Dürkheim scorns and thinks itself much too modern for that sort of caper. At one end of the market are two dozen stands with huge barrels that each offer a different Rüdesheim wine and, if you have enough money and capacity, you can try a fair sample of the district's produce in a short time.

The burghers of Bad Dürkheim did not envy all this. They felt they were just as good with their forty wine 'tents' and their forty roast chicken and sausage stands, not to mention the fun fair and the wine barrel restaurant.

They had just as pretty and fashionable wine queens in the Palatinate as they had in the Rheingau for the opening ceremonies and, what's more, Bad Dürkheim has its famous *kurhaus* or spa, a hotel up to international standards, and a casino where you can play roulette with the best of them.

But Bad Dürkheim did not possess a cable-car railway. This set the city fathers pondering and in 1971 they elected a young and active Bürgermeister in George Kalbfuss who is only thirty-two. His name means Calf's Foot—but he is no fool. After all, he can retire after eight years on a pension, which is not bad going at that age.

With his energetic encouragement, the Gondelbahn has come at last to Bad Dürkheim to the great delight of every citizen. It was first necessary to find somewhere it could run to and there was a convenient high rock

above the town called the Devil's Stone, or even more alarmingly in German 'Die Teufelstein'. To this the cables have been slung, supported by standards very similar to those at Rüdesheim. The gondolas are also red, blue and yellow and on top of the Devil's Stone the town is building a restaurant and wine garden.

It shows, too, in the proud words of the Sausage Market Magazine, 'that the people of Bad Dürkheim do not stand still'. At any rate they have caught up with Rüdesheim!

They lock you in the gondola from the outside and the law only permits the window to open two inches but the seats are cushioned and comfortable. As one lady pointed out it will be warm on cold days and on warm days the journey is not very long. And everybody is so proud of the Gondelbahn that you hesitate to disagree.

You can also sip industriously at the Sausage Fair wines and very good they are too, if not exactly cheap. The Festival wine I liked best was the 1970 Dürkheimer Fronhof Riesling which is clean and fresh and with a touch of sweetness in its full savour. No less than five Gewürztraminers were included among the 1970 wines, an indication of the growing popularity of this grape in its spicy, haunting flavour.

A little south of Bad Dürkheim lie the vineyards that are the pride of the Palatinate—the great estates of Dr Albert Bürklin, head of the Bürklin-Wolf Weingut at Wachenheim, Ruppertsberg, Deidesheim and elsewhere and also those of Dr Ludwig Bassermann-Jordan, his friendly rival at Forst and Deidesheim and owner of the Forster-Jesuitengarten vineyard.

Dr Bürklin, ably assisted by his charming wife, is not only a winegrower but also a member of the German Wine Commission and a leading figure in Government circles. He also owns, as a sideline, the famous Gasthaus zur Kanne at Deidesheim founded in 1160. It is one of the few German restaurants with a Michelin star for its cuisine, and here you can eat exquisitely from a perfect French Bisque de Homard to a splendid example of venison from the forests of the Haardt hills in wine sauce German style. But just as you can eat in luxury like this so can you sit in the restaurant's adjoining weinstube and spend no more than 20p on a big glass of a splendid 1969 Burg Bürklin Riesling, full and medium dry.

Dr Bassermann-Jordan told me he had good hopes for continuing quality in the Palatinate wines although quantity will be below the 1970 record. Dr Bürklin, too, looks to the future with confidence and a slow but steady increase in wine consumption. 'The people of North Germany, for instance, never used to drink wine,' he said. 'Now they go to Spain, France and Italy on holiday and come back with a taste for wine at home'

# A YOUTHFUL START WITH CHATEAU D'YQUEM

WHEN I WAS a boy, before the First World War, my father took me to Lapérouse, then one of the best restaurants in Paris, and with the pudding we had a half-bottle of Château d'Yquem. Shortly after the end of that war I took my bride to Paris, and we repeated the experiment. It was delicious.

Mind you, it wasn't cheap. A half-bottle, then, of a good year, at a first-class restaurant, would cost about ten shillings.


Then I began to 'study' wine, and learned that sweet wines were not chic. So for years, as I don't take port, I ended my drinks with the claret or Burgundy I'd taken with the cheese. It was only when I'd finished 'studying' the subject, and discovered that wine was for enjoyment, that I took to sweet wine again with the pudding. And how enjoyable it is . . .

And why not, indeed, end with a sweet wine, despite what the purists say? The traditional cuisine of the Continent has decided to end the meal with a sweet course—though only after long experimentation; for till comparatively recently the *entremets*, as the name suggests, were put in the middle. The British practice of ending with a cheese, or even with a savoury, is an insular peculiarity. And if the food is sweet the wine should be sweet.

Well, Château d'Yquem has gone up a bit since the First World War. In fact it has gone too far. But there are 1st cru sauternes and barsacs that are almost if not quite as good, and not nearly so expensive; and delicious 2nd crus such as Filhot, Doisy-Daëne and Doisy-Védrines that would grace any table. True, even these have moved forward markedly in price in the last two or three years, but not nearly as much as red Bordeaux. And one does not need much sauternes. A bottle will satisfy eight at the end of a meal; perhaps ten.

If, even so, the château-bottled wine is too expensive, Montbazillac from the near-by Bergerac vineyards is a fair substitute. It is less subtle, but an amusing, cheerful wine. Rigby & Evens, who have retailers almost everywhere, distribute a French-bottled Eschenauer Montbazillac that should not cost much more than £1 a bottle. (All prices quoted include VAT.) Muscat de Beaumes-de-Venise, a rare sweet wine from the Rhône, is little known and therefore interesting. The invaluable Yapp Brothers of Mere have it, French-bottled, for £1.65.

One thinks first of sauternes and barsacs in connection with puddings and desserts, because they are luscious enough to match the con-

fections of the most sweet-toothed cook—with one exception (see later.) Puddings, ices, fruits—they take them all in their stride.

For lighter puddings, not quite so sugary or creamy, perhaps the good Coteaux de Layon, such as Bonnezeaux or Quarts-de-Chaume, provide a more delicate coda. They lack the authority of Sauternes, but seem to have more finesse. Yapps again have Quarts-de-Chaume from £1·26 up, and Dolamore a fine Bonnezeaux '64, CB, at £1·93. J. B. Reynier distributes a honeyed Clos-de-Ste-Catherine (domaine-bottled Jean Baumard) that leaves the palate just the right side of satiety.

French family dinners usually end with champagne, and if the last course is fruit, a *demi-sec* (which is really a *demi-doux*) will pass. But with a real pudding, the champagne needs more body. Veuve Clicquot Ponsardin Riche, Lanson Riche and Mercier Riche are all *marques* that will fulfil this function. Other sparkling French wines are perhaps a little thin for this purpose, though a Gaillac Doux will do. If economy is essential, it's probably better to turn to Asti Spumante, of the ordinary muscat grape, not the drier pinot.

Nothing is lovelier at the end than an old Moscatel de Setubal, but this is difficult to get in the UK—and for that matter a really old one (and bottle-age is essential) is difficult to get in Portugal. Málaga Lágrima used to be popular here in the nineteenth century, but this too is difficult to find. However, it would be a good use of the duty-free allowance to bring a few bottles home from a holiday at Marbella.

The profiteroles opposite were prepared by Silvino Trompetto, Maitre Chef de Cuisine of the Savoy, who this year became the first chef ever to receive an MBE. On a busy day 'Tromps' supervises the serving of up to 3,800 meals. Strangely enough, he is English, was born in Westminster, trained in England, and became Maitre of the Savoy in 1965. Tromps advises cooks to be patient and wait until the very last minute before pouring on the chocolate sauce.

# To make the profiteroles.

CHOUX PASTRY:  $3\frac{3}{4}$  oz plain flour; 3 oz butter;  $1\frac{1}{2}$  gills water; 3 eggs.

Method: Prepare pastry, pipe out, or put (measured in teaspoons) on lightly-greased baking tin. Bake in moderate oven 15-20 minutes until firm. Put on rack to cool.

CHOCOLATE CREAM FILLING: 1 whole egg; 1 egg yolk;  $\frac{2}{3}$  oz chocolate (bitter); 2 oz castor sugar;  $\frac{3}{4}$  oz flour;  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz cornflour;  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint milk.

Method: Separate egg; cream yolks and sugar together until light. Add flour and a little cold milk making smooth paste. Melt chocolate in remainder of milk. Pour on egg mixture, blend and return to pan. Stir over gentle heat until mixture boils. Whip egg white until stiff, turn a little of the boiling cream into a bowl and fold in white. Return this to pan and stir carefully 2-3 minutes over heat to set egg white. Fill the profiteroles with chocolate cream. Pile up in serving dish. Pour over chocolate sauce just before serving.

CHOCOLATE SAUCE:  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint cream; 6 oz dessert chocolate; 4 oz granulated sugar;  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint water.

Method: Break up chocolate, put in pan with a little water and melt slowly. Tip on rest of water, add sugar, when dissolved simmer with lid off the pan 10-15 minutes. Pour off and cool. Whip the cream and fold in 2-3 tablespoons of chocolate sauce. better five for a rich one) has be without weight. A  $\frac{1}{2}$ -litre, 5-pu from Berry Brothers costs £2.26.

I suppose if wine is used emphaally in the flavouring of a puddi the same wine should accompany. Everyone agrees that rea fine German dessert wines, Beere auslesen and Trockenbeerenaus sen, are too refined to be taken w any food, and should be sipp meditatively after the mea<sup>1</sup>.

Port-lovers would consider sacrilege to drink vintage port w a pudding, but perhaps a not t special tawny could go with swee other than chocolate.

And this leads to the difficulty which I referred earlier. Chocol: puddings are delicious if the meal h not been too heavy, but chocola does fight with wine. The gro André Simon recommended Saumur or Anjou with a chocola soufflé, but I dispute even su authority. Perhaps a Bual could he its own, or one of the better Cypr commandarias. (Pay the top pric none of them is expensive.) Rea however I think a liqueur fits bette a Tia Maria (rum and chocola have affinities) or Hallgarten's Roy Mint-Chocolate. The latter, by t way, is delicious on vanilla ice-creat

Then there is a problem if t last course is of fruit. With a fi apple even the traditionalist w permit vintage port, but an apple not a very exciting end to a dinne party. With peaches, pears an strawberries a sauternes is necta Pineapple is really impossible f wine; use kirsch or a similar liquet With raspberries the Internation Wine & Food Society had a tastin last summer of malmsey, and th combination was voted a succes One acute judge said it was bett not to sugar the berries. 

This is the first of a new series in which eminent cooks write about their kitchens and their lives. Here André-François Villon, who has made a television reputation discusses a few of his fiercely-held culinary convictions

strations and travelled with what seemed to my friends an insatiable wanderlust. My jobs were many and sometimes menial. Scrubbing floors, working as a shop assistant, washing-up dishes, even assisting as a florist in a very chic Parisian shop but I always found time to cook, set a table and enjoy my food and wine. And because I always get involved with people, being passionately inquisitive about other people's ways of living, habits, how they eat, I always land up in the kitchen.

I suspect that my initial gregarious passion for restaurants is beginning to wane. Perhaps I have tortured my six-foot-five frameand my stomach and mind-in too many hotels and restaurants. Now I prefer to eat with friends at home. I enjoy thinking out menus. I thoroughly enjoy shopping outings, wandering around in the kitchen, tableware and linen sections of department stores. I do reasonably regular rounds in France, Italy, Holland, Belgium, Portugal and Greece. I feel quite down if I don't get to see my favourite potters, boutiques and specialist shops at reasonable intervals. One is lucky, being on the trot around Europe so often. Yet it is New York shopping which really sends me. There is always a new Aladdin's cave somewhere.

Through travel writing I came to

know some people at Independent Television in London. I entertained them at home. Then followed some travel programmes on *Tea Break* (now *Good Afternoon*). Instead of straight travelogues, I prefer to slant my foreign visits to the shopping and how tourists can get most value for the then meagre travel allowances. I enjoyed the work tremendously.

The Adult Education section of Independent Television got hold of me. Thereupon ensued a traumatic period in my life. I was commissioned to do a series on food. I explained that my philosophy was a total one. I simply did not see foodeither on the box, or for real-as a recipe - implementor - cum - presenter job. I thought it was necessary to talk straight to the vastly diverse viewing public. It was imperative, I thought-and thinkto underline the essentials of the excellent meat, fish and fresh vegetables which are available; to let the viewers come to terms with the so-called 'secrets' of cooking; to learn the intelligent way to use and apply heat; to blanch, to braise, to make sauces.

To that end I did a variety of dishes, but always in the context of a meal, a menu. I followed this stepby-step method of presenting the food in an actual 'dining' setting. It was quite hard work to get these



basics across, let alone the plus factor of imagination! The question of merchandising was enough to give any reasonable person a twitch, but I tackled it stubbornly, with typical Virgo arrogance.

The joke was on me, of course. Cooking Without Tears was the title of the series! The reaction of the public was marvellously rewarding. I am now working on a commissioned book called Food for Thought, an exposition of this philosophy about food and eating.

For me, it all simply boils down to this. Food is living; living is to strive for style. Style is perceptivity, an awareness of how to lead only the life you can lead. It demands courage; the will of self-realisation and self-involvement. I don't want anybody else's style. I want my own. It is part of growth, an individual's process of maturity.

For me, a sense of style in everyday living is fundamental. It is the way in which you choose to present things; the way you present yourself. This can either be with a distinctive style, or a faceless style. It has nothing to do with class, education or money. People 'think' of style as something terribly grand or as something impressive. Nonsense. Even the simplest person can have style. Style is something that people create in their own minds, a form of self-expression. Doing your own thing in fact.

I live like this. Annoyingly so to many who irritate me by bemoaning their lot of too little time, or 'everything is such a bother'. After Cooking Without Tears was filmed in 1971 I ambitiously opened The Chelsea Pantry under my own name in the pleasant village atmosphere of Chelsea Green. For me it is encouraging to see the growing interest in good quality food. What is especially agreeable about this venture is the opportunity to plan luncheons, dinners, table-setting with many hosts and hostesses. It is rewarding to see how many take courage, stepping out and doing it eventually all on their own.

Naturally I love my kitchen. I took the basic units from Hygena, re-designed the setting more or less on the lines of my kitchen set for television. Whether I work on my own Scholtes gas hob or my splitlevel oven, I don't need to travel miles to do anything. There are ample work surfaces, lots of concealed strip and overhead lighting. I have a pull-out surface so that I can eat any meal in the kitchen, even seat three people comfortably. The kitchen is compact and, friends assure me, usually in good nick, yet I always lack sufficient cupboard space. Given the Mansion House kitchens, I'm sure I'd still be short of space. I know why. I'm a natural hoarder. Too many temptations arrive in the shape of kitchen china and glass-and my weakness, jugs of all shapes and sizes!



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# FOOD FROM VILLON

#### **Eggs florentine**

b fresh spinach; salt and pepper; ½ small ion; 4 oz butter; 3 oz plain flour; 1 icken stock cube; 1½ pints milk; 8 large zs and 3 egg yolks; 4 tablespoons double am; ground nutmeg; ground tarragon; evel tablespoons dried mushroom soup; ablespoons dry white wine; grated rind lemon; 4 level tablespoons finelyuted Gruyère cheese; sprig of thyme; evel teaspoon sea salt.

ETHOD: Wash spinach well in Ited water. Remove stems and ugh veins; wash in fresh water ur times. Drain well and dry. tin and finely chop the onion. elt 2 oz butter in a pan and fry mtly for about 8 minutes, until ft but not brown. Stir in the flour id cook for 1 minute. Crumble the ticken stock cube into the milk. radually add this liquid to the pan, irring all the time until it boils and ickens. Put half sauce into a bowl id keep warm.

Lightly beat the egg yolks with tablespoons cream. Stir into the ucepan; add nutmeg and tarragon. tir in the soup, wine and lemon nd. Cook gently for 2 minutes, irring all the time. Melt remaining utter; stir it into the sauce before boils. Remove from heat. Add 2 vel tablespoons cheese. Remove 4 blespoons sauce into another bowl. to this, add salt, white pepper and ayme. Whip the remaining cream nd stir into the sauce. Return to the emainder of the cheese sauce.

Bring a large pan with 1 inch of ater to the boil. Add the spinach, ring back to the boil; add the sea alt. Cook for 5 minutes. Put into a plander and wash in cold water. ress gently to get rid of water. eave to drain. Butter a large, eavy, oblong fireproof dish and ne it with spinach. Add half the emaining cheese and then break in he whole eggs. Season plain sauce nd spoon over eggs. Spoon the heese sauce over and top with emaining cheese. Cook for 35 ninutes, or until set and lightly rowned in centre of oven, preheated o 350°F or gas regulo 4. (This is he dish M. Villon is preparing in he colour picture on page 156.)

#### Liver with orange

slices lamb's liver (about 6 oz); 2 oz elf-raising flour; 1 large orange; 2 tablepoons oil; 1 tablespoon chopped parsley; epper and salt.

METHOD: Grate the rind from the orange, cut three slices across it and rim the pith from them. Squeeze he juice from the remainder of the orange.

Trim any membrane or skin from he liver, then wash and dry it. Put he flour and one third of the grated orange peel in a plastic or paper bag. Add the salt and pepper and shake he bag. Moisten the pieces of liver with orange juice, then put them in the bag and shake until they are well coated with the flour mixture.

Pour the orange juice into the pan together with the remaining orange peel and the three orange slices. Let the sauce bubble for a few minutes, then add pepper and salt to taste. Pour the sauce over the liver slices and decorate with the chopped parsley. Serve with new potatoes and saute mushrooms.

Enough for a really nourishing meal for one.

#### Grapes with cream and Cassis

1½ lb ripe white grapes; 2 fl oz Creme de Cassis; 16 fl oz thick cream; 4 oz soft brown sugar.

Creme de Cassis is a fortified blackcurrant wine which can be found in good wine shops. You can substitute a liqueur or even cognac for the Cassis, but don't be tempted to use blackcurrant juice.

At least one chain store sells 'fresh whipping cream', and this is ideal for this dish. Otherwise use double cream.

METHOD: Cut the grapes in half, peel them and remove the pips. Put them in an ovenproof dish, measuring about 9 inches across by  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches deep, to cover the bottom and pour the Cassis over them. Leave for about half-an-hour.

Pour the cream into a mixing bowl and gently beat by hand. When the cream has thickened but is still free-flowing, spread it over the grape and Cassis mixture and put it into your refrigerator. Leave it there until it has set hard (about 2 hours) but do not freeze. If you do, the water in the cream will form little splinters of ice which spoil the dish.

When the cream is hardened, cover its surface with the sugar and place under a very hot grill until the sugar melts and turns to toffee. This needs to be done very quickly. Allow to cool and return to the refrigerator (*not* the freezer) until you serve it. If moisture condenses on the toffee, dry with a kitchen towel.

This should be enough for six.

## Hungerford Park

3 eating apples; 1 lemon; 12 oz dry ginger ale (1 can or 3 small bottles); 6 fl oz Amontillado Sherry; 2 pints light ale; 4 oz caster sugar; ½ bottle Spumante (Italian sparkling wine).

METHOD: Grate the rind from the lemon and squeeze juice from it.

In a bowl mix the light ale, dry ginger, sherry, juice and rind of a lemon, sugar, nutmeg. Refrigerate. Shortly before serving, peel, core

and slice apples. Add them and the chilled spumante to the punch.

GOOSEBERRIES are the earliest fruits we pick in our gardens. Boiled salmon with mayonnaise, hot roast lamb, and gooseberry-tart, usually served cold with cream, are said to form the perfect English menu for Whitsun. But often these early gooseberries are too small and immature to have much flavour, and they are nearly always too sour to be palatable: you need more sugar than fruit, which means you get very little genuine gooseberry flavour.

There are both cooking and dessert varieties, and some cookers can be left to ripen for dessert, these being picked along with the true dessert kinds at the end of the summer. Strange to say, few people know about them and they are seldom seen in the shops.

The yellow gooseberries have the finest flavour and, according to a seventeenth-century writer, when thoroughly ripe, taste more like grapes than any other English fruit. Gooseberry wine, made from firm No 1 of an occasional series on soft fruits

green gooseberries, has been praised by some writers—'but a shade below champagne', says one—and dispraised by others—'inferior brands' (of champagne) 'are often spoken of contemptuously as "gooseberry"' (K Deighton, 1890). However, it makes a refreshing summer drink, and there is, by the way, a gooseberry called *Champagne Yellow*, a late dessert variety, bright yellow in colour when ripe, and of a rich, very sweet flavour. Two varieties recommended for wine-making are *Careless*, a midseason fruit (picked early while the berries are green); and *Keepsake*, an

early or mid-season fruit which is mostly picked green.

Although there is a great number of different varieties, not many are offered by nurseries these days usually about half-a-dozen. The midseason ones seem to be the most popular: *Careless, Leveller, Whin*ham's Industry, Whitesmith appear in the catalogues I have at hand. *Leveller,* unfortunately, does not succeed in all districts. As with other fruits, it is important to find out from your supplier the varieties you should choose for your garden; and, at the same time, ask for informa-

tion on pruning the varieties reco mended: the habit of the plant of determines the special meth used. We will return to this po later but, first, here are a few gene cultural matters. Established bus which have been trained and gro for some years in the nursery are best for most people to use. Pl them on a dry, sunny day in Octob setting them about 5 feet apart i deep, well-drained lightish loa soil. Three will probably be enou for a small modern garden: goo berries, like the other soft-fruit currants, strawberries, raspbern and so on-take up less room th do the large bush and tree fru Another advantage is they often co tinue to bear excellent fruit for thi years or more. Furthermore, th are readily propagated by cuttin which will root in any light soil in garden



fruit in the cool, rather rainy parts of the country, such as Lancashire, and parts of Yorkshire and Norfolk. They don't prosper at all in hot, dry climates. (They are scarcely ever seen in Italy and Spain and are not common in many parts of France.) Plant the bushes in a sheltered part of the garden to help protect the tiny flowers from late spring frosts.

Pruning of established bushes is usually done immediately after the fruit has been gathered. Strong, healthy shoots made during the previous summer should be preserved (for these will bear next season's fruit) and the older shoots cut out; all suckers, springing up round the bush, and diseased wood must be removed. (As gooseberry wood is extremely tough, use a pair of keenbladed secateurs or a very sharp pruning-knife.) Aim at keeping a well-balanced, open-centred bush. Some varieties, such as Careless and Leveller, have weak hanging branches, the lowest touching the ground: cut these out. The others, above them, should be shortened to about half their length (at an upward-pointing bud); retain the strong-growing, erect branches.

Dessert gooseberries are often left on the bushes until as late as November, as they swell and get very ripe and juicy, but be sure to thread black cotton among the branches as birds peck at the fruit.

Broom Girl has large yellow berries and is one of the best dessert varieties for flavour. When it comes to eating these delicious berries, they should be topped and tailed and usually served piled up on vineleaves. What should one drink with them? A glass of champagne, iced or well chilled is the perfect accompaniment, although you may insist on a sweet dessert wine, in which case the famous Vin Santo Brolio, from the Brolio vineyards near Siena (said to be Italy's finest dessert wine) is delicious chilled or not chilled with almost any fruit.

The Germans, who are said to grow very good gooseberries—much better than the French—have Stachelbeerkompott, which is a simple compote of gooseberries stewed in syrup. May Duke is an excellent variety for this sweet; the berries are mostly picked when green.

**Gooseberry compote:** Clean and wash 1 lb *unreife* (unripe) goose-

berries. Into some rapidly boiling water put 2 tablespoonfuls of vinegar; throw the gooseberries in and cook for one minute only. Drain them in a colander; then drop them immediately into a bowl of cold water and leave them for 2 minutes -this process helps to preserve the green colour. Take them out and put them on a sieve to drain. In the meantime, prepare a syrup of 3 lb of sugar boiled with about 3 of a tumblerful of water. Cook the gooseberries very slowly and carefully in the syrup until they are soft. But they mustn't loose their shape. Take them out with a spoon and put them in a glass bowl; boil the syrup until it thickens, then pour it over the gooseberries and serve quite cold. The German recipe doesn't suggest anything to go with the fruit. A tablespoonful of Cherry Brandy mixed with the syrup gives a wonderful flavour but spoils the colour. I say have a glass of Kümmel with it, plus a bowl of Devonshire cream. Gooseberry trifle: is a delicious old English sweet and as good as any of the fruit purées or mousses we get from the Continent. Cook sufficient gooseberries, with sugar and a little water, to make a thickish layer when pulped at the bottom of a dish-pass the cooked fruit through a sieve. WITH SALES of sparkling wine exceeding champagne for the first time in this country, and the price of the latter accelerating at a rapid rate, many wine lovers are turning to other sparklers for their variety and value for money. No longer need a sparkling wine be saved for a special occasion for it is certainly not expensive. It is definitely an anytime drink and costs no more than a reasonable table wine. In fact, what can be more enjoyable in late summer than to sip a sparkling wine on a warm afternoon or in the garden on a late Sunday morning?

Sparkling wines are made in almost every wine-growing country and are produced in one of four different ways. The dominant style for quality and high price is the wine made on méthode champenoise lines. This is the same technique as that used for the production of champagne and involves the same care over handling the mainly black grapes in order that the pressing does not excessively colour the must. Outside the defined Champagne region, other French districts, like Bordeaux and the Rhone, do not always remove the wine from the lees with quite the same precautions. The other process is the same, although the secondary fermentation is in bottle.

The Loire Valley yields some of the best sparkling wines, partly

# SPARKLING WINE CONSIDERED AS AN ANYTIME DRINK

Now that champagne is becoming ever more expensive, **Philip Shaw** suggests a fresh look at the sparklers

because the chalky soil is in many respects similar to that found in Champagne. The 'Touraine' is the finest district, based on the towns of Saumur and Vouvray. The champagne process imparts a more fruity flavour, greater character and a longer *mousse* (or bubble) than is achieved by other processes.

In Saumur, the sparkling wines are known as *mousseux*, a term applied by the French Government to wines, other than champagne, that are exclusively made in the same painstaking way. Saumur is produced from both the black Cabernet Franc grape of Bordeaux and the white Chenin variety, and ages for a minimum nine months in bottle before sale. Of those I have recently enjoyed, I would mention Blanc Foussy, sold by Grants of St James in a delightful bottle, and Veuve Amiot, from the old town of St Hilaire-St Florent and a family that has been perfecting sparkling wines since 1884. Then there are Carte Blanche and Golden Guinea, which cater for a wide variety of tastes by their various styles of drvness.

Outside the Loire, *méthode cham*penoise wines are now being made for the first time in Alsace. The House of Dopff has recently brought to Britain their *cuvée extra* and most wine merchants should by now have stocks. Like all Alsatian wines, it has a crispness and flavour that is truly indicative of the region. The other French districts yield a variety that is worth tasting: these include red Burgundy, such as Red Cap from the House of Chauvenet, a Burgundian rosé, known as the Partrid Eye, made around Beaune and Ra the Blanquette de Limoux whic a medium-sweet sparkler from area near the walled town of C cassonne, and Seyssel in the Sa This last-named district yield charming white sparkler, kn here as Varichon et Clerc, an made from the Altesse, Mole Chasselas and Jacquère grapes, wi are grown not far from Annecy.

Spain sends several méthode ch penoise wines to Britain. Know vinos espumosos, it was a Spa sparkling wine that started famous champagne court case London. 

of luxury, expecially as an apéritif. The other large producer of *charmat* method sparkling wines is Germany. Apart from the export

market, Sekt enjoys a large home consumption of over 160 million bottles, which is not that surprising in view of the small duty in Germany of under 13p per bottle! The name Sekt is meant to originate from the actor Ludwig Devrient, who played the part of Falstaff and called mistakenly for 'Sack' instead of Schaumwein', or foaming wine. Various styles are made, ranging from the relatively cheap and inferior type that is dependent upon other countries' wines for importation before the charmat process begins, to the single estates who make a wine of distinct quality. The Riesling grape predominates and much is bottled in the 'piccolo' size quarter-bottles. Quality Sekt is labelled Pradikatssekt under the new German wine law.

It is curious to reveal that in the Moselle Valley, growers are forming an association to try to protect their region and its distinctive Sekt wines, for they feel the wines should have safeguards much as the Champagne producers do today. In fact, the producers of sparkling moselle compete with sparkling hock estates with as much enthusiasm as their table wine neighbours. Schloss Prinz and Schloss Livia are well worth looking for here, as is Kupferberg Gold, which has been shipped from Mainz since 1852 and is, incidentally, one of the few Sekts made by méthode champenoise.

The final large-scale method of making sparkling wines is known simply as the *impregnation* method. In this process, the wine is cooled, carbon dioxide is injected under fairly low pressure and, as the temperature of the wine rises, so the pressure increases. Thus the gas dissolves and does not chemically combine with the alcohol as in *méthode champenoise*. The result is a larger-sized bubble and a very short appearance for the *mousse*

# CHESTERFIELD BUTTERY

Charles Street, W1 (01-491 2622) This hotel has been quietly gaining an excellent reputation. The buttery is amazingly good value and rather more exciting than the name suggests. There is a small, pretty courtyard for eating outside, plus one or two tables adjacent to large French windows. The interior is comfortable and well designed, using greens, orange and beige.

In these days of high prices, the menu is excellent value. For £1.40, including service and VAT, you can choose two courses and coffee. The two courses include a choice of cold dishes with a large table of different salads and side dishes, or the hot dish of the day with vegetables. Pudding, cheese or ices provide the second course, and the menu prints clearly: 'Please feel free to help yourself to as much as you like.' A large jug of wine costs £1.40, and both red and white are better than the average carafe. Altogether, this is a delightful restaurant, and an example others could well copy to increase their turnover, with only a small reduction in prices. The main restaurant at the Chesterfield will be reviewed in a future issue. A meal at the Buttery costs about £5 for two.

## CHARCO'S

#### 27 Coulson Street, SW3 (01-589 2097)

This wine bar, owned by Searcy's, has become as popular as the one in Montpelier Walk. You can't book tables, but there are one or two in the sun. Cold food only is served from the counter. Consistently one of the best-value restaurants in London. At least one merit of rising prices is that they seem to be sorting the sheep from the goats as people are becoming more discriminating about what they will pay for. Fortunately, this restaurant has always set high standards at reasonable prices. There are one or two tables on the pavement outside, and the street is quiet enough for diners not to worry about traffic. About £8 for two.

Continued from page 145 'Well, love and passion are in-

volved, and also a good deal of perseverance. Take these lilies: they are called Green Dragon-a beautiful name—but they derive from a lily called simply Aurelianense, which was created by a marvellous old postman in Orleans, Monsieur Debras. He fell in love with lilies in his childhood. He once told me that he had seen the garden of his father, who was a country schoolteacher, filled with white lilies. One day, when he was ten, he saw a red lily and this gave him the idea to hybridize them to create a pink lily. Of course, he failed, but he went on trying. Some years later, he discovered that what he had taken for a red lily wasn't a lily at all, but an amaryllis. Well, he became an expert on lilies, and around 1953 he succeeded.'

'Modesty of means doesn't seem to be an obstacle to gardening?'

'Wealth can be a much greater one. The keeper of a railway junction, a parish priest, a postman create gardens in which personality expresses itself more easily than in a park made by a professional gardener. Plants must be loved by their owners. For a man who has a very beautiful garden tended by ten gardeners, plants are things he sees in passing: they are not friends. I would rather be one of those begonias so beautifully nursed by a chambermaid or a secretary on the windowsill of her garrett.'

Opulence often puts the imagination asleep. There are, however, other factors detrimental to the expression of personality. History is one.

'It freezes the creative impulse. Why should there be only Louis XIV works in a Louis XIV interior, or park? In Louis XIV's own time, they used things that weren't Louis XIV—antiques or copies of antiques, for instance. The "period piece", which came to us from America, I believe, is a heresy.'

'You have no respect for history, it seems.'

'No excess of it, I confess. It makes life too difficult. The room I like least, at Pompadour, is the grand salon, because it is the only one that has come down to us in its original state. Hence there is nothing to be done with it. It is far more stimu-

lating to have a house where you can begin from scratch. Here, the only places where I have been able to amuse myself are the corridors: they didn't exist in the Marquise's time. I have avoided those monotonous alignments of eighteenth-century etchings or of hunting prints; instead, I have tried to fill the corridors with surprises—quaint pictu cupboards filled with curiosa, stu birds, ceramics, books of e kind...?

'I suppose you have remain loyal to Pompadour because it i old family residence?'
