PRESIDENT'S REPORT

An update report on the investigative participation of some Chicago AIA Committees:

Interior Architecture Committee: The great historical precedent set by Frank Lloyd Wright at the Johnson Wax Center in Racine, Wisconsin, where the architecture, landscaping, interiors, furniture and product design was integrated into a homogeneous and continuous environmental masterpiece has become a rare anachronism today. Societal diversity, cultural fragmentation, and economic need has inevitably resulted in the intensification of specialization within the practice of architecture. This specialization has greatly enhanced the know-how and efficient delivery of categorical services to the public.

One of the fastest expanding specializations within the practice of architecture is that of interior design. The success and growth of the interiors industry today can easily be measured by the proliferation of interior magazines and extravagancy of budgeted advertising. The magnitude of the economic growth of this industry has significance; however, more importantly, the cohesion of professional collaboration is imperative to an effective comprehensive architecture.

This month, the Chicago Chapter AIA launches the Interior Architecture Awards program to culminate in an awards ceremony in June. This project culminates the goals of a 1979 Steering Committee composed of Ken Johnson, Norman DeHaan, Ken vanderKolk, Mike Youngman and Janet Schirn.

The Chicago AIA welcomes the energetic participation of this architect species.

Design Committee: If Post-Modern designers have an illusion that architectural design has become a game without rules, easy to play, a game for all ages, impending harsh economic realities will change that to a serious game played "for keeps".

Chicago's preeminent School of Architecture began in response to the pragmatic needs of its community, its people, and its resources. Our landmark treasures are basically utilitarian, spartan, and imbued with a puritanical aesthetic. If we are forced to overcome the constraints of dwindling resources, shouldn't we return to our roots in search of a viable, rational, and ultimately

economical architectural ethic?

The Chicago Chapter AIA Committee on Design, chaired by Bruce Graham, with its Steering Committee members will hold its first open committee on Thursday evening, March 27, 1980 at 5:30pm in the Chapter office.

Accessibility Standards Task Force: The response in Chicago to the impact of the Accessibility Standards of the Illinois Capital Development Board was immediate and effective. In addition to letters to Springfield, Todd Wexman, an architect in Wicker Park, wrote an eloquent scenario in the Chicago Tribune of the termination of his rehabilitation apartment project. On February 14, the Capital Development Board initiated an emergency order exempting privately-financed apartment buildings from these standards. The City of Chicago Building Department is now processing those permits.

The next critical application is that impacting upon rehabilitation projects. There is an investigation to find a viable test cise for testing injunction legislation in the application of these standards. A sixmonth moratorium for their implementation would allow the time needed for revisions of the standards immediately. The interpretation of project value through square foot percentages differs from the suggested Chicago interpretation using monetary values.

The Architectural Task Force which is vigilantly leading in this effort of creative understanding and interpretation is composed of Joe Bob Kill, George Weinold, John Fugard, Norman DeHaan and Robert Wesley.

The Chicago Chapter AIA has invited the Capital Development Board to Chicago to deliver their Colloquium Series in clarification/interpretation of these standards. We have suggested that the seminar attendance be expanded to include code enforcement officers, owner and real estate interests in addition to architects who are directly influenced by this legislation.






