PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Several of the programs played to standing room only audiences.

The Friday night dinner honoring Philip Will, Jr., FAIA, founder of Perkins & Will, closed with the award of the Institute's Presidential Citation to Mr. Will for meritorious service to the Institute. Saturday night's gala honoring Philip Johnson, FAIA, was equally successful. Accompanied by former Chicagoans John Burgee and his wife, Mr. Johnson commented how pleasant it was to spend time here in Chicago. There were many new buildings to see since his last visit; some of these, he confided, were very fine, while others, he thought, silly. Take your choice. I cannot betray

a confidence. Thanks to Carter Manny, FAIA, for contacting Mr. Johnson and John Holabird, FAIA, for a beautifully designed award.

The week just past has been hell. I'm going to bed. Goodnight!

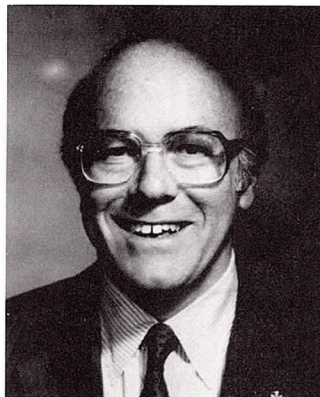


CHAPTER MEMBERS TO MEET NATIONAL LEADERS

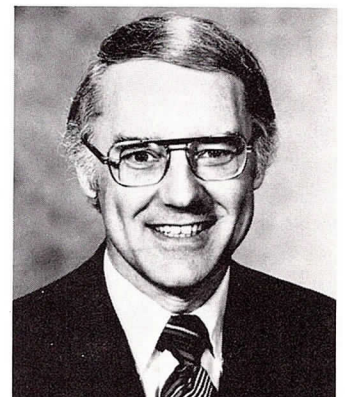


The winners will be announced and prizes awarded at the membership meeting on Nov. 4.

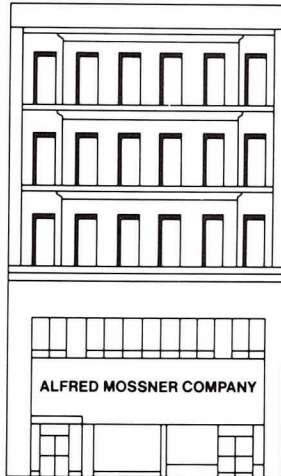

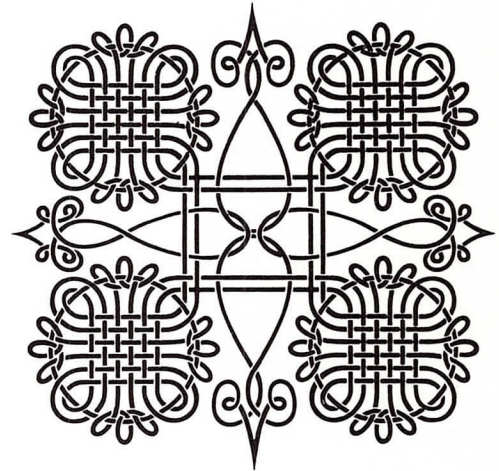

PHILLIP WILL HONORED BY AIA

At the recent IC/AIA State Conference, Phillip Will, Jr., FAIA, accepted the AIA's Presidential Citation, given to 17 members across the country who have inspired and influenced the profession of architecture. The Institute cited Will as the "patriarch of an architectural firm which has had a significant national influence on design."

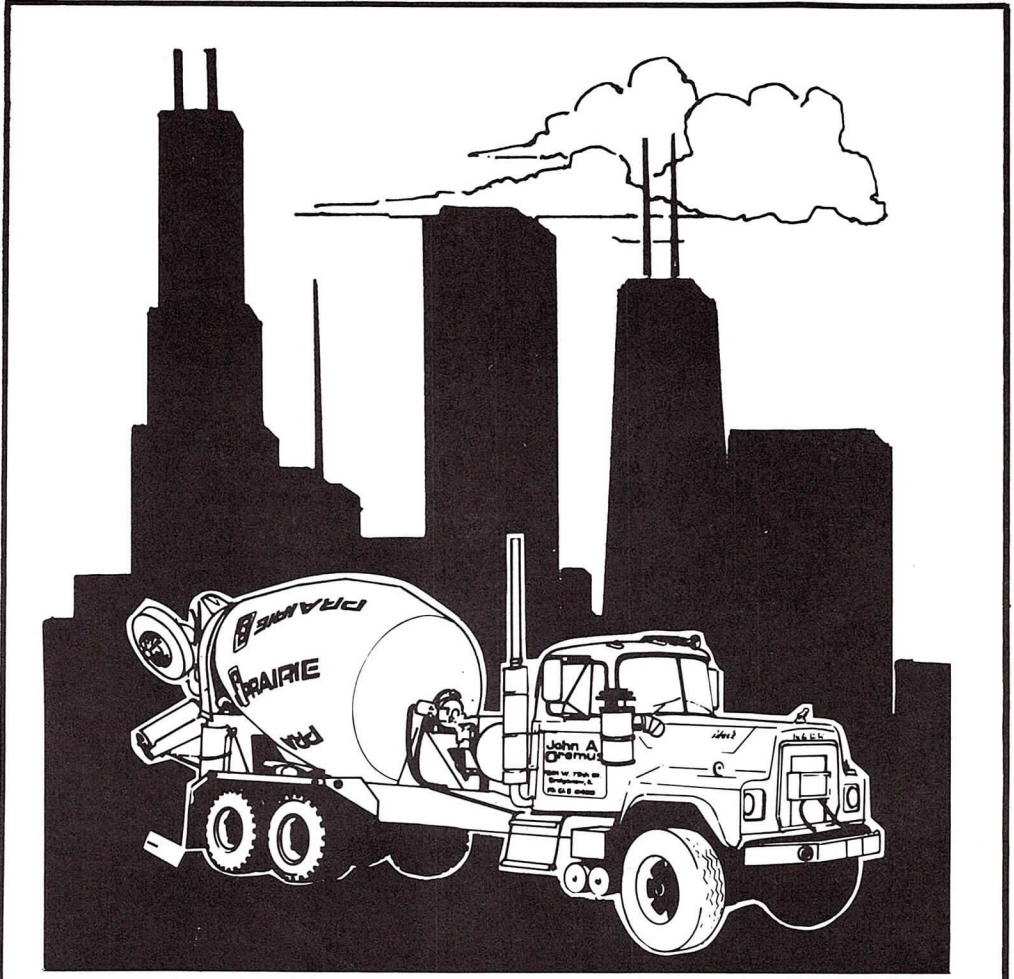
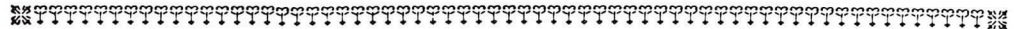
Mr. Will joined the Chapter in 1947 and was President from 1952-54. He was President of the Institute in 1961 and 1962. At the October 1 banquet honoring him, Mr. Will quoted August Heckscher in accepting his award: "'The architect today should find it impossible to miss the significance of his position. He stands at the center of almost every great development in our society. The changes which are acting most powerfully upon the American people...are within the field of his immediate concern. He will shape some of them; his career will be influenced by them all.

"'Because of the nature of his trade and the dramatic and dominating character of building in America today, the architect stands as a prototype and, indeed, almost as a prophet. Others may have their share in bringing matter under the control of spirit; but unless the architect succeeds in doing it, the cause is lost. It is the same with the shaping of the environment, the organization of space and the establishment of a balance between old and new forces in the social order. Whether he likes it or not, the architect is at the center of things, setting the pattern beyond his own works and, in a large measure, determining whether the remaining decades of the century will see our common life made more rational and rewarding.'
