The Chicago Chapter plans a great year of relevant programs to interest, assist, and involve all members; to cooperate with other organizations, and to remind the people of the Chicago region of the importance of architecture. Architects are idea generators. We all want to be involved in the affairs of the community and help create a better environment for all people. Sometimes we act individually, but CCAIA can often speak out on issues more effectively.

Among the activities we are considering for the year are: 1) an expanded and improved awards program, making it a major event, with

more media coverage, 2) a midwest region design conference, 3) more collaboration with the architectural schools, 4) special programs on energy, computers, preservation, renovation, real estate, and legislative affairs, 5) visits to completed buildings, 6) cooperative programs with the Art Institute, Graham Foundation, Illinois Council, WAL, CSI, Chicago Architecture Foundation, NEOCON, etc., 7) a national AIA urban Planning and Design committee meeting in Chicago, and 8) social events.

Part of the team helping to execute 1983 plans is the Chicago Chapter Board of Directors. We welcome six new members to the Board: Susan Greenwald as secretary, Paul Hansen as treasurer, Diane Legge Lohan, Dennis Probst and Steven Weiss as directors. Our new first vice-president and president elect, Tom Eyerman, already has developed ideas for 1983 activities and is working on a Chapter organization concept.

FOCUS will continue to be an important monthly newsletter, and we expect to expand its scope. We'd welcome your suggestions.

1983 will be another good year for the CCAIA.

CAD DEMONSTRATIONS SERIES

Beginning in January the Research Committee is sponsoring five demonstrations of computer-aided design systems. The first presentation will be given by Sigma Design on January 27 at 5 PM in the Chapter Board Room. Representatives from Sigma will demonstrate a system aimed at the architect/ engineer/construction market.

The CAD demonstrations will be held on the following dates: February 24, March 31, April 28 and May 26. The Research Committee will wrap up its spring season of programs with a tour for members of the 1981 National Computer Graphics Association Conference, which will be held June 26-30.

THE STUDENTS' CHOICE

Architectural students at IIT and the University of Illinois-Chicago will meet in mid-January to select their choices of the best of the entries submitted to the 1982 CCAIA Distinguished Buildings Awards Program. Coordinated by the CCAIA Design Committee and the Student Chapters of IIT and U of I-Chicago, the program will be held on January 28 from 2-5 PM in the Illinois Room in Chicago Circle Center.

Those projects selected will be presented by their designers on January 28 to a combined meeting of students from the two campuses. The program will culminate with the presentation of "Students'Choice" Awards certificates at 4:30, followed by refreshments. All Chapter members are invited.

MORE FOR LESS TO SOCIAL SERVICE GROUPS

Since 1974, the Chicago Architectural Assistance Center (CAAC) has been working in low-income neighborhoods throughout the city. Traditionally, this work was performed by Vista volunteers, CETA workers, students, lowpaid professionals and occasional volunteer professionals. With these resources, the Center's project file grew vast and varied over its eight year history.

This year, with help from the city's Department of Human Services, CAAC has created a program with the aim of bringing more design professionals and community groups together. There are hundreds of human service providers in Chicago - non-profit agencies that deliver job-training, rehabilitation and oher social services to the large group of unemployed and/or underprivileged within the City's population. Many of these agencies are housed in older buildings, and as a result, are in need of technical assistance.

CAAC hopes to bring architectural and engineering services to these groups from the resources of the professional design design community. Architects, engineers and planners who have an interest in community work will gain an important and worthwhile leaming experience by joining the program. Many of these projects have unique circumstances posing challenging problem solving issues and may provide rewarding opportunities, especially for young sociallyminded professionals.

TAHS, or Technical Assistance for Human Services, is CAAC's new program title. CCAIA has endorsed the program by resolution of its Board of Directors and shares Advisory Committee duties with members of the CAAC Board. The Committee's first meeting on December 7th held great enthusiasm and provided the substance for a very real and feasible implementation.

Interested firms and practioners may contact CAAC, 786-1920, for details about the program and how to participate. In the words of one of the Center's long-standing supporters and directors, John Holabird, "CAAC is the architect's clinic serving the needy in our community." As this project gets underway, the hopes are that more help can be provided where it is most needed to improve the quality of all our lives.

INSURANCE · REPORT

You may know that medical costs continue to be the highest increased item on the Consumer Price Index. Health care costs account for \$10 out of every \$100 of the Gross National Product. Hospital and nursing home costs are up four times over the past decade; physicians fees up three times; other goods and services have doubled. As Medicare-Medicaid have reduced their reimbursement, doctors and hospitals have had to make up these lost funds from insured programs. Also, of course, medical life-saving techniques have inflated the cost of medical care.

Federal Home Life, insurance carrier for Chicago Chapter firms, has been increasing medical rates some 20%-30% on most groups just to stay even. Claims paid to Chicago Chapter insureds in 1981-82 totaled \$296,342; if claims remain at the '81-'82 level, the expected claim total in 1983 will be \$341,000. Obviously, current premium rates are not sufficient to cover the increased claims cost, and 1983 premiums will require adjustment in the second quarter.




RAAB PRESENTS STEINER

IMPROVE CM SKILLS

Illinois Institute of Technology's Department of Civil Engineering and School of Advanced Studies will offer an eight-week course, "Managing the Construction Process", beginning February 14, 1983. The class will meet on consecutive Monday evenings from 6:30 - 8:30 PM in IIT's Grover Hermann Hall, 3241 South Federal Street.

The course, intended for all those concerned with the design and construction of buildings, will review management principles proven successful in industry and apply them at a working level to the requirements of the Construction Industry. Particular emphasis will be placed on management to improve progress and quality of the finished product, principally through improved interpersonal behavior.

The course will be taught by Dohn Mehlenbacher, Director of Physical Resources at IIT and registered professional and structural engineer; and David L. G. Jacobs, professor in the Center for Business and Economics at Elmhurst College.

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GOLD MEDAL TO NAT OWINGS

Former Chapter member, Nat Owings, FAIA, co-founder of SOM, has been selected to receive The American Institute of Architects' highest award, the Gold Medal. Mr. Owings, who now resides at Big Sur, California, becomes the 44th person to receive the Gold Medal, American architecture's highest award.


Owings was cited in the nomination for his "signal contributions to the quality and scope of American architecture." Symbols of the high standards set by Owings for SOM include two major projects on which he served as Project manager: the U.S. Air Force Academy and the Crown-Zellerbach office Building in San Francisco. "His most enduring contribution (in urban design) is his 20-year campaign to achieve unity and beauty on the nation's most processional street-Pennsylvania Avenue."

Owings was president of the Chicago Chapter in 1942.

EDWARD H. MATTHEI, FAIA has been selected chairman of the American National Standards Institute's Committee on the National Standard for making Buildings and Facilities Accessible to Physically Handicapped People. Matthei serves as the AIA liaison to the Professional Advisory Council of the National Easter Seal Society. As an advisor to the Society for more than twenty years, he helped design and implement Easter Seal programs aimed at referencing the national standard for accessibility in federal and state laws as well as building codes.

KENNETH JOHNSON, associate member to the 1983 Board of Directors, and BRUCE GRAHAM, FAIA, were guest speakers at the Canadian Contract Furniture Group event, Canexus, in Toronto. A symposium developed by the National AIA Committee on Interiors included Mr. Johnson and Mr. Graham, along with Ken Walker and Arthur Gensler. "Differing Perspectives: the Views of Four Design Giants" was initiated from a nationwide survey in the January 1982 issue of Interior Design that identified the five most respected design firms in the U.
