
ORKING WITH CHICAGO'S NEIGHBORHOODS

'84 ROCHE SCHOLARSHIPS ANNOUNCED







Registration Information Fair

Unlicensed, graduate architects looking to prepare further for registration in 1984 will find the Chapter has geared a program to that end.

The CCAIA "Registration Information Fair" will be held on March 20, 5:30 p.m. at the ArchiCenter. Ronald L. Moline, AIA, past president of Illinois Council, an exam grader, and member of the Regrstration and Education Committee, will review the Illinois Architecture Act and how this law affects the practice of architecture in Illinois. Moline will also review the education and experience requirements for taking the exam. As a grader he has insight on proper preparation for the exam.

In addition to the exam survey, the Intern Development Program will be explored. The IDP is structured to expose the architect seeking registration to all aspects of the profession in a working environment. Robert A. Rosenfeld, director of Internship Programs, NCARB, will present an overview of the IDP, and will explain how to get started in the program. Joining Rosenfeld in this endeavor will be Charles Hubbard whose firm in Houston is testimony to the ease in setting up an intern program, along with Michelle Eaton of San Francisco who is the associate member representative on the IDP National Coordinating Committee. Chicago's introduction to the IDP will be a showcase for the development of IDPs in other states.

RASSROOTS '84: VIEWPOINTS/HIGHPOINTS

Each year in January comnent presidents, presidents/ ect, and executive directors nvene to discuss AIA conrns and issues, and exchange oughts on Chapter affairs. e 1984 Grassroots session, ld in Washington, D. C., inuded a plethora of instruconal meetings covering chapr goals, media relations, d valuing the membership. ere was a full day concerng "The Profession and Govnment Affairs." This Polital Action Committee day adessed architects and the ficit, the design construcon industry as a campaign sue, and the AIA legislative enda and priorities. Varis senators and representaves presented their views.

We participated in, rather an simply listened to, sesons broken down into four .tegories: state councils, apters with staff and over 0 members, chapters with aff and under 500 members, d chapters who have no paid aff. This effective method gearing the "message to the dium" was due in part to st input from CCAIA's Richard ok. The schedule was strenus, confirming my observaon that participants, rather an speakers, should move om session to session. Three .d one-half to four-hour dis-.ssion marathons (pre-and st-luncheon) tended to deadones bodily extremes.

Alice Sinkevitch and Joan Gallagher brought stacks of our mailings which elicited much favorable comment, and Alice's special interest presentation on "Non-Dues Revenues Programs" was packed with lucre-seekers.

Representative Dan Rostenkowski was presented with his honorary AIA membership certificate and the entire Illinois delegation thanked Representative Sidney Yates for his effective support of arts legislation.

The most memorable gatherings were the breakfast meetings for large chapters, discussion on the liabilities of chapter boards, an exchange with R. Bruce Patty, AIA V. P. and President Elect, on programs and alternate careers for young architects, and an open-ended dialogue on public board members and long term goal committees.

I would have liked to spend more time reconciling the IDP program as we need to continue reaching beyond the traditional practice of architecture which accounts for only 28% of our membership. The Insti-

tute's goal to attract public membership needs honing regarding benefits, categories, attracting peer groups, role models and John Q. Public.

I found it gratifying to discover that efforts made in the early '70s were alive and still growing, efforts such as "America By Design," a public TV project, the Interiors Committee, and certain aspects of the Master Spec. It was instructive to recall that much of what makes the AIA a vital and relevant force was initiated by Phil Will in the fifties. It was refreshing to note the impact Tom Eyerman made last year, the changes in the Grassroots format wrought by Richard Cook, and Don Hackles effort for effective continuity of purpose within The Institute.

The camaraderie over Peking lobster with everyone from Illinois, recalling names and faces from a decade and a half (or so) ago, wandering through national headquarters reminds one that The Institute is a fraternal, as well as a professional, part of an architect's life.



PRODUCT DISPLAY COMPETITION ANNOUNCED

Entries from manufacturers or designers responsible for the design of unique product displays within participating Neocon 16 showrooms at Chicago's Merchandise Mart and International Expo will be accepted through May 15, 1984 for the Neocon Product Display Competition. This award, sponsored by the CCAIA Interior Architecture Committee and Interiors Magazine, is intended to promote increased service to the specifier in selecting furniture, components, lighting, and accessories through excellence in product display. Entry categories in-

clude lighting, accessories, workstation systems, free-standing desks and tables, seating, floorcoverings, fabric and wallcoverings, storage and filing, and architectural elements.


