Architects, designers, and clients have always been vitally concerned with building cost while ignoring the investment made in the client's work force. Brill illustrated "a potent ratio for design," where, over a ten-year period, the average total facility cost is \$35,000, whereas the "worker" cost is \$483,500, creating a 7% to 93% ratio.

From Technician to Entrepreneur

How can design professionals achieve more project control and create greater opportunities for expanded business and profit? At the Chicago Chapter Architect/Designer/Developer Conference on Saturday, April 20, five architects and 12 consultants from the fields of accounting, law, marketing, finance, and real estate will explain the stages of a successful development.

"The Decision Maker" is a conference for the design professional who wants to grow from technician to entrepreneur but needs the fundamentals of real estate development to achieve that goal. Five recent, successful developments by Chicago-area architects will be highlighted when the architects involved present case studies showing how they: identified opportunities, determined project feasibility, assembled property, obtained financing, secured necessary government approvals, oversaw construction, and marketed the project.

The case studies to be presented are: the conversion of a loft to office spaces, with Kenneth N. Folgers; a residential conversion, with George Pappageorge; a restaurant, with David Marienthal; a suburban commercial development; and River City: The Mega Project, with Bertrand Goldberg, FAIA.

The conference is structured to include lectures, panel discussions, with ample time for small focus group question-and-answer sessions. Participants may bring actual project situations for assessment by the consultants.

possible through Westinghouse) Brill engaged in dialogue with a small group of architects/ designers, pointing out that ergonomic problems have just come to the fore. "While we were busy accumulating new screens and keyboards, we have been slow to provide a new environment," he chided.

Ronald Goodrich, environmental psychologist, summed up his discussion on "Human Logic in the Electronic Office," stressing that today's design strategies should "celebrate the human."

Integration. High tech functions/high touch form. Efficiency effectiveness. By 3 PM on Thursday the message running under this familiar automated office language was, in the words of Goodrich, "design drives technology, human logic drives the design."

Although I was unable to attend the second day of the conference, in order to keep the FOCUS on schedule, I'm sure that once Thursday established the imperative for understanding that design affects what people do, Friday's session was full throttle on designing for technological networks.

Chapter Gets IDP Program Underway

Last year the Illinois Council, AIA officially endorsed the Intern Development Program (IDP) and formed the Illinois IDP Committee to implement the program statewide.

The Intern Development Program is a self-guided study program designed to give the architect seeking licensure exposure to all aspects of the profession in a working environment. Through the IDP, intern-architects may sharpen their skills and gain the knowledge needed, not merely to pass the registration examination, but to enter the profession at the highest level of competence and with the best possible head start.

We invite Chicago Chapter firms to provide the setting and the professional guidance for the young architect seeking to bridge the gap between formal education and the licensing examination.

The Chicago Chapter has coordinated a five-part program that draws on the Chapter's resources.

I. LOCAL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SEMINARS

These are usually sponsored and coordinated by the Chapter's Young Architects Committee and are publicized in the FOCUS. Over the past two years these have included: the Exposure I & II series, "The Elements of Architectural Practice," that discussed codes and standards, the AIA documents system, project management, and the construction process; "Alternative Careers for Architects;" Starting Your Own Architectural Firm;" and the annual spring registration information fair. The April 1985 program zeroes in on specification practices.

II. <u>IN-HOUSE TRAINING</u> PROGRAMS/SPONSORS

Firms are encouraged to develop programs tailored to

fit the structure of their practice. The Intern's employer/supervisor assumes the role of "professional sponsor," directing the intern's activities so that maximum exposure to various areas occurs.

III. ADVISORS/MENTORS
Each intern will have the opportunity to select an "advisor" from a list that will be maintained at the Chapter office, or the intern can be assigned an "advisor" by the IDP Committee.

An "advisor" is a registered architect outside the intern's office. "Advisors" may counsel their interns individually or in group sessions. The IDP Committee will provide training guidelines and hold meetings on how to measure the intern's progress.

IV. PEER GROUP MEETINGS/ NETWORKING

By becoming Associate Members of the Institute and the Chicago Chapter, young architects participating in IDP have the advantage of exchanging knowledge about their experiences. As Associate Membership grows, the Chapter will be able to increase the number of programs aimed at the intern-architect.

V. THE IDP RECORD-KEEPING SYSTEM

The intern is charged with tracking his or her progress on forms provided by the national IDP organization, with sponsors reviewing the forms on a monthly basis. The IDP form is the glue that holds the program together, because, in addition to pointing out weak areas, it can be used as a guide to the intern's professional development.

Although enrollment and completion of IDP is not mandatory for licensing in Illinois, many of the state's leading practitioners and edu-

utting Your Firm efore the Public

Birmberg & Associates publishes 3 annual Financial Performance vey for Design Firms, the Profit iter, a newsletter for AE Mana-'s and Marketers, and has recentpublished Small Design Firm rketing Manual, aimed particularat the small firm.

There is no magic to getng news about your firm or 's work published. Every rm should seek out these blic relations opportunies. The goal of public retions is to build your rm's image and name recognion. Most firms fail to exoit opportunities for recogtion and wait for editors d others to contact them. To help get articles about ur firm published: Identify your target rkets, which should be lim-ed to three or four markets. Identify those publicaons related to your target rket and supplement these th any local and regional olications you may identify. rectories of publications e available at your public orary reference desk. One cellent directory is "The sign and Building Industry's olicity Directory," prered by Lord Communications Boston.

Obtain copies of each pubcation and review the nature I format of the articles by publish.

Telephone the editor-intef or executive editor of th appropriate publication determine their editorial policies. Do not contact the publisher, managing editor, or contributing editors.

Editorial questions of concern to you include:

What is the nature of the articles they publish?

Do they staff write all articles, or will they accept submissions?

What are the technical details of a submission (length, format, photographs, etc.)?

What is the deadline for your submittal?

Is there an editorial calendar, and what lead time is required for an article idea?

Review with the editor the proposed focus of your article.

Prepare a draft of your article in typed, double-spaced form. Retain the services of a local editor to review your

draft. Free-lance editors usually charge \$15 to \$25 per hour. Most articles should not require more than two to three hours to edit and review.

Prepare a final draft and submit your article to one publication only. Never submit the same article to more than one publication at a time. If your article is not used by your first publication choice, then submit it to your second.

Within two weeks of your submittal, call the editor of the publication to insure it's arrival, answer questions, provide additional information, etc. Ask when publication is expected.

Obtain a copy of the final published article and reprint for direct mail purposes.



seminar was rated by over half of the attendees as "Outstanding." Again, this year, the format will concentrate on making construction law disputes understandable by using the foremost experts in the field and by presenting the material in uniquely interesting and refreshing format.

24 of the foremost contractors, architects, engineers, and the lawyers who represent them, will play act events which occur in the industry and which create the greatest number of disputes. After the construction professionals demonstrate how the disputes arise, the lawyers will discuss what the legal ramifica-

tions of the disputes are and how they may be resolved. Specific attention will be paid to working with contract documents and in describing appropriate field position procedures which will minimize the chances of a dispute arising.

The seminar will end with an intensive demonstration of the examination of a scheduling expert and an accountancy expert on Friday afternoon, April 19. The trial will be presidded over by a judge of the Circuit Court of Cook County in his courtroom at the Daley Center.
