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BERGLAND APPOINTED INTERIM ARCHITECTURE DEAN AT UCD

Executive Vice Chancellor Bruce W. Bergland was appointed acting dean of the New College of Architecture and Planning at the University of Colorado at Denver. Georgia Lesh-Laurie, vice chancellor of academic and student affairs, said the appointment on April 8, 1994 is subject to the approval of the CU Board of Regents.

"Dr. Bergland was the unanimous choice of the architecture and planning directors," Lesh-Laurie said. "He also received the overwhelming support of the faculty, with no negative comments."

Bergland, who joined CU-Denver in 1972, has held a number of faculty and administrative positions on the campus. Since 1989 he was executive vice chancellor. From 1986 to 1989, he served as UCD's vice chancellor for planning. Prior to that time, he held posts in the office of academic affairs and the Graduate School. He was acting dean of the school of Education from 1982-83.

"I am delighted to be able to serve the New College of Architecture and Planning in Denver, as well as the Environmental Design Program in Boulder," Dr. Bergland said. "I was very encouraged by my meetings with the faculties on both campuses. I believe by working together we can create a climate of stable and steady growth."

Bergland said he plans to meet immediately with faculty as well as professionals in the architectural and planning communities to build on the work begun by the former dean.

Dwayne Nuzum, AIA left the architecture deanship in March to become executive director of the Colorado Commission on Higher Education.

DESIGN TEAM SELECTED FOR JOINT AIA PROJECT

The AIA Colorado and AIA Denver relocation task force has selected a team of young designers to assist in the design of a space to be jointly shared by both offices. Originally from several different firms, the design team came together specifically for this project. The four people who make up this team represent a variety of backgrounds and talents. Wendy Larkin-Burbage, Victor Kolouch and Jim Smith were classmates at the UCD College of Architecture and Planning. Mr. Smith (Davis Partnership) and Ms. Larkin-Burbage (originally JHP, also now at Davis Partnership) were both awarded the Tau Sigma Delta bronze medal as their classes' top designers. Mr. Kolouch (Collins Master Builders) is a studio instructor at the College of Architecture and Planning in Boulder. John Woodworth (Davis Partnership) is the architect of record and he received his degree from the University of Washington.

The intention of the AIA task force and the design team is to get support for the project from area suppliers via donations of materials and labor. The design team is particularly interested in native materials and suppliers that are from Colorado. All who contribute to this project will be publicly and permanently acknowledged in the public space of the new office.

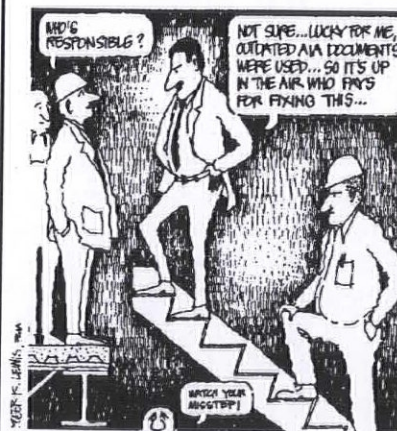

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ICBO STANDARDS COMMITTEE CREATED IN COLORADO

The Colorado Chapter of the International Conference of Building Officials (ICBO) has established a Standards Committee to work toward greater uniformity in interpretations of Code language. Participants on the committee include building officials from jurisdictions throughout Colorado and representatives of several industry groups, including AIA Colorado. While the committee has no direct power to change the Code, they will be reviewing issues where discrepancies have become apparent and will make recommendations to local jurisdictions that will (hopefully) make it easier for architects and other members of the construction industry to design and build to a consistent standard.

The Committee's product will be a series of "Standards Reports" to be submitted to the entire Colorado Chapter of ICBO for review, discussion and (again, hopefully) approval. All reports will utilize a consistent format with an issue identified, applications explored, resources developed and/or identified, and recommendations completed. Once adopted by the entire Colorado ICBO, it will be up to individual jurisdictions to implement the recommendations through either a formal amendment of the Building Code or through a less-formal adoption of a policy statement. AIA will continue to participate as an interested party and encourages individual AIA members to pass on any concerns they may have.

As of the first of April, one issue had been forwarded to the larger body/pressure testing of gas piping. Apparently, various jurisdictions are requiring everything from no pressure testing to maintaining 50 psi for 24 hours. The recommendation was simply to comply with the UMC's requirement of 10 psi for 15 minutes.

On March 25th, the Committee met to explore several issues and to identify other potential topics. The bulk of the meeting focused on "equivalent gripping surface" as it relates to handrails (UBC 3306). While 1-1/2" - 2" diameter handrails are clearly defined, "equivalent" is not, and causes problems for designers, suppliers and building officials. This creates the most confusion in the residential market where more traditional, decorative rail shapes are more widely used. The consensus at this meeting was to use Lakewood's current policy as a good starting point and to build on it in future meetings. By establishing a range of quantitative standards, it is hoped that design, safety and access issues can all be met without requiring individual departments to decide whether an individual shape is or is not "equivalent" without these guidelines.

Other issues discussed, to be reviewed in greater detail at future meetings, include:

- unvented gas space heaters
- Federal requirements for low-flow plumbing fixtures
- definitions and appropriate uses for patio enclosures
- crawl-space ventilation requirements, especially as they

relate to basements using structural floors in expansive-soil areas

- roof-truss blocking requirements in UBC 2517
- testing-lab requirements for wood shakes and shingles in 3208-3211
- the Consumer Product Safety Commission's interest in encouraging a requirement for carbon monoxide detectors in residential occupancies
- clarifying the UPC recommendations in Appendix C for numbers of plumbing fixtures in various occupancies
- mobile-home set-up and installation requirements
- Federal mobile and modular housing certification versus local requirements for fire-resistive construction (location on site) and limitations on wood-burning fireplaces
- definition of occupancies and calculation of occupant loads
- Chapter 33 corridor construction, separation and maximum dead-end requirements

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE ("GAC")

The Colorado Legislature has been busy this year. 363 House Bills and 213 Senate Bills have been issued. AIA Colorado has reviewed each one of these bills for items pertaining to the Design Profession. Most of the Legislators' time this year has been spent on issues regarding education concerns, juvenile crime, other social concerns and of course, the annual budget. With the session closing on May

11, we are continuing to monitor six bills for activity. Three other bills previously monitored have been signed into law. Six House and Senate bills have been Postponed indefinitely and two others lost the battle and never got out of committee. We fought hard to get Senate Bill 74 (which proposed changes to the current Mechanic's Lien Law) "killed" in committee. This was a joint effort by AIA, AGC and ACEC.

Daily pick up of the legislative bills and monitoring of their status is an important part of what AIA Colorado does for you each year. By keeping up daily with the issues, we are poised to confront legislation that may affect you and the profession of architecture.

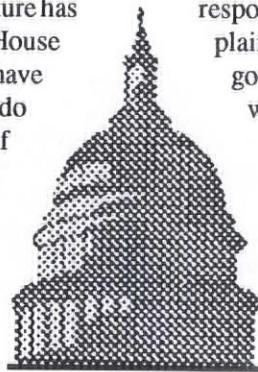
The Government Affairs Committee is also on top of other issues in the state. We are in the process of

responding to AIA member complaint regarding issues of alleged government agency competition with private enterprise.

Lobbying sessions with our state representatives are planned in July to include the Dillion/Frisco/Breckenridge area, Glenwood Springs and Grand Junction. These locations have been chosen as being central to architects and legislators from surrounding areas. Look forward to being contacted

to participate in these sessions.

A call went out in mid-April for a quick response from our "Minuteman" soldiers to address members of the House Armed Services Committee members in Congress. We were asked to contact our members of Congress and urge opposition to an amendment that could narrow the list of A/E Services covered by the Brooks Act. The Brooks Act requires the federal government to procure A/E services through qualifications-based selection, as opposed to low-bid. On Wednesday, April 20, the House Armed Services Committee was to consider an amendment that would change the definition of the term "architectural and engineering services" by deleting the reference to service that "may be logically or justifiably" performed. This small, but important change could reduce the scope of services subject to Brooks Act procurement.

NEW AIA CONGRESSIONAL FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

Proceeds from the fifth annual *Art by Architects* silent auction, to be held May 13-15, 1994 at the AIA Convention in Los Angeles, will benefit the AIA's new Congressional Fellowship Program. This program will seek to place one or two architects each year in six- to twelve-month "fellowships" with Members of Congress and the staffs of Congressional committees.

"The characteristics that make architects good architects can also make them good public policy makers," said Robert A. Peck, AIA's Group Vice President for External Affairs. The first Congressional Fellows will be placed in positions when the 104th Congress convenes in January 1995.
