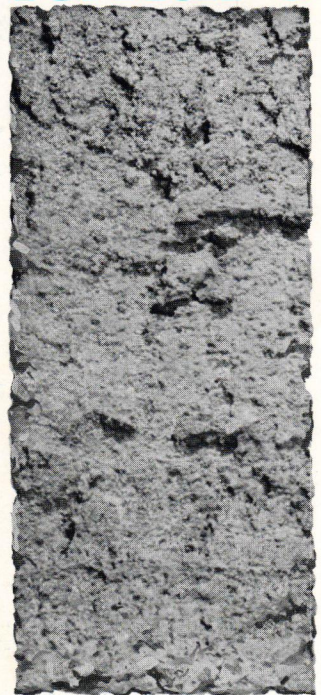

I would like to take this opportunity to commend you for your work on "Indiana Architect." Image Builders has greatly improved our professional publication. Please continue the good work.

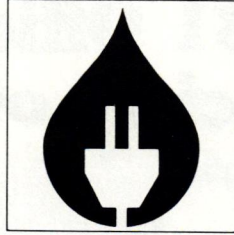

ENERGY:

Title III of the National Energy Conservation Policy Act (NECPA) establishes a cost-sharing program for public and non-profit schools and hospitals. The purpose of this program is to assist owners/operators of buildings in all of these categories to identify and implement energy conservation operations and maintenance (O & M) measures; to evaluate the potential for energy conservation measures; and, for schools and hospitals to acquire and install energy conserving capital improvements. According to Federal regulations, the major goal of the grant program is to reduce the consumption and associated costs of conventional energy resources used by eligible public and non-profit institutions. Cost-sharing funds appropriated by Congress for implementing the program are administered in Indiana by the Indiana Energy Section. Program funds are available on a fifty percent matching basis.

There are three types of projects funded under NECPA. The first, Energy Audit (EA) is a brief on-site survey and analysis of a facility. This step must be completed by a certified Energy Auditor. A certified Energy Auditor is an individual who has completed one of the training sessions held by the Indiana Energy Section.

The second type of project funded is a Technical

Assistance Project (TAP). The TAP report is meant to serve as a basis for analyzing possible energy conservation measures. This report must be done by an engineer or architect registered in the State of Indiana. Both the Energy Audit and the Technical Assistance Project are prerequisites in applying for the third type of funding, the Energy Conservation Measure.

The NECPA funding for an Energy Conservation Measure (ECM) project is intended to assist in the purchase and installation of energy saving equipment recommended in the Technical Assistance Project.

Regardless of the type of project for which assistance is requested, it is important that the institution meet requirements set forth by the federal government and the State of Indiana.

We encourage the readers of the Indiana Architect to participate in the Schools and Hospital program by informing the public and non-profit institutions in their areas of the program and the subsequent services of the architect and engineer.
