As I begin my year as President of the Michigan Society of Architects, a Region of the American Institute of Architects, comprising the Detroit, Flint, Grand Valley, Huron Valley, Mid-Michigan, Northern Michigan, Saginaw Valley, and Western Michigan Chapters, I would like to present to you my progtam and the committees I have appointed for 1978 to implement that program. Of course much of our work this year will be a continuation of previous sound programs but some will be in a new direction, a prople direction, both to the public and the profession.

Our major emphasis will be on professional competence just as national AIA. Our continuing education program for Architects is as before a standard part of this thrust but we also want to help our intern Architects take advantage of the new AIA Intern Development Program package as they prepare for their State Board Exams; work more closely with our State Board of Registration; reevaluate the Architectural course offerings of our colleges and universities; spread the High School Architectural drafting program and competition all over the State; get Architect volunteers into our elementary and secondary schools statewide with aware-ness "courses"; provide Architects with easily delivered package programs on design and energy for presentation to local and statewide civic organizations; and provide increased individual member services, as we are able, especially to the small practitioner, the Associates, and Architects in Government and Industry.

Our vigorous thrust on Government Affairs begun the last couple of years by Past President Paul Bowers, AlA, will have a high priority and will expand in scope and influence as we combine our efforts with those of other design professionals experiencing similar concerns.

MSA publications efforts have been waning the last several years, so we are going to work on a new, multi-track communications endeavor that should revive this important arm of our society.

A couple of other groups I feel we should be nearer to are the Building Officials of our State and the Great Lakes Basin Commission. We will try to do some things this year in their direction.

In order to tap the resources of our "elder statesmen", I have instituted a Committee of Past Presidents and Regional Directors to work on special projects.

Naturally we will continue our Membership Program, Ethics, Honor Awards, Annual Convention and Mid-Summer Conference, R/UDAT, and Beaubien House restoration.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Fee Schedule

Improving the architects' fee schedule for state construction, our major project for this year, has proven even more difficult than we had thought. Literally hundreds of hours have been consumed in meetings and negotiations with the Division of Management and Budget, with the Joint Committee on Capital Outlay, and with research conducted by the MSA and DMB. The compromise reached, although still under fire from some members of JCOC, is scheduled for final approval by the State Administrative Board at its next meeting January 3. Budget Director Gerald Miller, who has been very helpful throughout this entire process, has taken a toughout this entire process, has taken a tough position against any further changes and is committed to a recommendation that the Administrative Board adopt the schedule as is. Consulting engineers would also be beneficiaries of this improved fee schedule.

Recodification

A special committee of the legislature, chaired by Representative Gary Owen, is at work on a plan to codify the statutes which regulate the some 38 professionals under jurisdiction of the Department of Licensing and Regulation. We are holding a series of meetings with key persons on the committee and in L&R to make sure that in any such recodification the interests of the design professionals are protected. As a result of our input into these discussions, and at our request, the Committee, by late January will have developed a general outline of the proposed legislation so we can clear up any remaining problems before the bill is formally drafted.

S.B. 111

This bill, which would amend the statute of limitations for architects and engineers by making it less restrictive, is under attack by the Michigan Bar Association, which wants to extend the limitations to one year after a defect has been discovered "or should have been discovered". We were responding to a Supreme Court decision in another state which found a similar statute to be too restrictive. The Bar Association is responding to a Supreme Court decision (involving the medical profession) which says, in effect, that a person cannot be deprived of a right that he doesn't know he has.

The question now is whether to stay with our present statute, which has not been challenged in the Michigan Supreme Court, or run the risk of an MBA amendment that might leave us worse off than we are at present. This is a policy decision that we will seek in January from a combined meeting of architects and engineers. We will also be exploring other alternatives.

MSA/CEC

Through the leadership of Paul Bowers, AIA, and others, the Michigan Society of Architects and the Consulting Engineers Council have now joined forces in the legislative efforts. Because we will now be representing both groups, and additional PAC fund money will be available, the joint legislative effort can be more effective and problems of the design professionals can be brought into even sharper focus. There will be some differences, but for the most part, objectives of the two groups are similar. The combination will result in cost savings, which will benefit both entities.
