Directors leaving the Board this year have given generously of their time during their term of office. Gene Terrill, immediate Past President, successfully guided the MSA during 1979. His years of service have been appreciated by past boards and by me in particular since my term followd his. Bernie Mayotte, 1980 Treasurer, and Bob Fearon, Secretary, were both key members of the Executive Committee and vital to the decision making process that kept the 1980 Board running smoothly. Harry Van Dine, roit Chapter Director, almost singlehandedly, shepherded the publications committee and produced the handsome "50 Most Significant Structures in Michigan" catalog of Gene Terrill's 1979 Celebration Exhibit that has been traveling around the state. Each MSA member will soon receive a copy of the catalog. Gretchen Minnhaar, Grand Valley Chapter Director, has long been active in Chapter and MSA affairs and has ably represented Michigan architects and the MSA on the Construction Code Commission.

In December Paul Bowers completes his term as Director from the Michigan Region representing us on the National Board. Paul has served us with distinction. During his three years in office he has kept the MSA Board informed, sought our counsel and actively spoken out at the national level in our behalf. Each new Regional Director has taken on the job with some trepidition in the light of his predecessor's performance. And so it is with me. Paul Bowers has given new definition to the Regional Director's office. It will not be easy for me to follow in his footsteps.

Looking back at 1980 one accomplishment stands out making the whole effort worthwhile. The Beaubien House now belongs to the MSA. It is no small success, in my view, due not only to the support and generosity of a great many MSA members, but to the vigorous efforts of our staff, especially Ann Stacy, our Executive Director. Beaubien House is more than our headquarters. It is a major MSA project and its restoration will have a high priority in the future. The first steps will be taken in 1981 to make the Beaubien House a tangible example of creative adaptive reuse of this historic structure.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE REPORT OF LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

The Legislative Subcommittee for revising the State Professional Services Contract met in January and in March, and jointly with the Bureau of Facilities Committee on the same dates. Many items were discussed and tentative agreement was reached on most of the problem areas, particularly in the Insurance Provisions.

Your Chairman also attended several meetings with our Legislative Consultant in an attempt to formulate strategies for dealing with proposed Legislation affecting our profession.

Among the bills so addressed are the following: H.B. 4114 (recodification has passed both houses of the Legislature and has been signed by the Governor. By working closely with committees in both houses, we were able to have adopted all the amendments which were requested by MSA. One amendment, detrimental to MSA, was added narrowly in the closing moments of Senate debate. That amendment increases from \$5,000 to \$50,000 the exemption for a public works project not requiring the seal of an architect, engineer or land surveyor. We have discussed this problem with Representative Gary Owen, sponsor of H.B. 4114, and he has agreed to help us get a correction in the new legislative session beginning in January.

H.B. 4053, the construction lien bill, is now being reviewed by your legislative committee in the interim between passage of the bill by the House and consideration by the Senate. If any problems are discovered, we will be prepared to work them out in the Senate committee.

H.B. 5541, on retainage, has passed the House in accordance with guidelines submitted to us by MSA and is now awaiting action in the Senate Committee on State and Veterans Affairs. We are continuing to monitor its progress in that committee.

H.B. 5978, the licensure fee bill, is aimed at fulfilling a legislative mandate that boards of all licensed professions be self-supporting. For architects, this meant increasing the original examination application fee from \$60 to \$105 and raising the annual renewal fee from \$25 to \$50.

We were inclined to fight such steep increases, but we were dissuaded by implications of the Tisch amendment to the constitution. If Tisch were to have passed, we were told that the Department of Licensing and Regulation would be abolished, so there would be no licensing of Architects and consequently no fees. We believe that in those professions where fees pay the cost of regulation such regulation would continue. It seemed safer in such event to make sure that our board would be self-supporting. The Chairman of your Legislativee Committee concurred.

H.B. 602, which would require competitive bids for the design and renovation of existing school buildings, has been referred to the House Education Committee. We are opposing this bill on your behalf.
