
(The following is prepared in response to a request from Rae Dumke on November 21, 1983, that each chapter of the MSA prepare monthly an article for inclusion in the MSA Publication MONTHLY BULLETIN for receipt by MSA prior to the 10th of each month prior to month of publication in 1984; this is prepared for receipt prior to December 10th, 1983, for the January issue. Editor's Note: Western Michigan and Detroit have responded for January. We would like to publish all nine chapter reports in February.)

A legislative breakfast, a roofing seminar, tours of buildings from Battle Creek to Holland including works by Harry Weese Associates in St. Joseph County for Lake Michigan College, CRS for Herman Miller Company in Allegan County, James Ryan Associates for Lakeview Square Shopping Mall in Calhoun County, a gala exhibit opening at the Kalamazoo Center for the WMC/AIA traveling exhibit entitled "CELEBRATION OF 125 YEARS OF ARCHITECTURE IN SOUTHWESTERN MICHIGAN," and a special presentation to the founder of the Herman Miller Company at the annual WMC/AIA banquet held at SOM's Kalamazoo Institute of Arts' ARTCENTER in Kalamazoo were all special activities in 1983 which marked the 60th anniversary of the Western Michigan Chapter of the AIA-the oldest chapter in the state save one. Outgoing 1983 WMC President Nelson Nave was presented with a plaque at the banquet in thanks for his leadership in Chapter activities during the eventful year.

The WMC/AIA newsletter "COLUMN" has been issued ten times. Each issue is eagerly awaited not only by the membership but-we are informed-also by our area legislators, city commissioners, and other persons interested in architects' views of things. Editors Mike Marshburn, Nelson Nave, Mark Reile, Gary Johnson, Norm Hamann, and Mark Klepper have established a "winning formula" for the newsletter with a cavalier format and an editorial policy which does not eschew controversy.

The "COLUMN's" Onion Award to the City of Kalamazoo for its proposed rail-overpass bridge and subsequent press reporting on discussions the Chapter held at our March 1983 Monthly Meeting-together with Nelson Nave's effective activities as president of a committee formed to focus attention on the project, together with newspaper articles by other members of the Chapter-have been influential in causing a re-study of the project and a call for a special election to resolve the issue. National AIA encourages its members to take a stand on architectural issues, to speak out against bad buildings and bad planning; this has been done with some effect in 1983 and it is expected that there will be a continuance by members of the Chapter.

A monthly event of the 1984 WMC/AIA year is being initiated this year: it is planned that each month a past-president of the chapter will prepare an article relating to the 1984 national AIA theme-American Architecture and Its Public. These 12 articles will be made available for publication to all Western Michigan newspapers; it is expected that articles will be prepared by Nelson Nave, Norm Hamann, Mike Marshburn, Dave Pyle, Jerry Klingele, Bill Hamill, Evie Asken, Glenn Rhodes, Dick

Slocum, Bob Tower, Chase Black, Gordon Belson, George Sprau, and Peter Vanderlann all members of the newly formed Past Presidents' Council, Western Michigan Chapter.

During 1984, the WMC/AIA traveling architectural exhibit will continue to tour Southwestern Michigan with scheduled showings in Battle Creek, Marshall, and St. Joseph. It is estimated that over 2,000 persons have seen the exhibit already during its showing in Kalamazoo and at Southwestern Michigan Community College. The Kalamazoo Public Museum has purchased the exhibit for its permanent collection following the end of its tour this year.

To illuminate contributions to architecture and to design, the Chapter honored Mr. D. J. DuPree, founder of the Herman Miller Company, at its December 1983 meeting held as Kalamazoo Institute of Arts. Mr. DePree spoke to members and guests about the history of the company and events which led to the formation of policies and actions which guide the company. Mr. DePree was presented with a copy of the book written by MSA member William Muschenheim, FAIA, entitled WHY ARCHITEC-TURE. Guests at the meeting included his daughter and her husband, Dr. and Mrs. L. Van Kley from Zeeland, his granddaughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. P. Mott from Kalamazoo, Kalamazoo Mayor and Mrs. F. Hamilton, the Director of the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts, Mr. T. Kayser, and the Director of the Kalamazoo Civic Players and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. J. Carver.

Mr. DePree was given an expression of the regard the Chapter holds—the text of which is reproduced:

INTERIOR ARCHITECTURE Another Profession or a Profit Center?

On January 19, 1984, a jointly sponsored meeting will be held by the Detroit Chapter, AIA, ASID and IBD to discuss the relative roles of architects and interior designers in the development of commercial buildings. The panel, moderated by Graham Dickens, AIA, of Ford & Earl, will consist of two corporate client members of the community, and a member each of AIA, ASID, and IBD. 

For renovation, a caution should be noted if tiles are to be thin-set. Concrete slabs are never exactly level. "Hills and valleys" exist. These are not noticed when carpet covers a slab. The surface should be leveled before the tiles are installed. There is no way a floor can be evened up with a 3/32-inch setting bed.
