PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The MSA delegates at the AIA's national convention in Phoenix had the opportunity to hear the views of all of the candidates running for officers of the AIA Board. The individual strength and views of each candidate made the selection very difficult. We are most fortunate to have so many qualified and dedicated members willing to give their time and energy to the Institute.

With the leadership of John A. Busby Jr. FAIA as First Vice President/President Elect, the membership will be well served as John recognizes the broad range of interests of all of the members and I believe we can benefit from his experience and knowledge as a practicing architect who is committed to good design, historic preservation and governmental affairs.

Robert E. Gramann, AIA of Cincinnati, Ohio; Ted P. Pappas, FAIA of Jacksonville, FLA.; and Donald J. Hackle, FAIA of Chicago, ILL were elected Vice presidents. Phillip W. Dinsmore, AIA was elected secretary.

Resolution A-1 asking that an "ACTION BY THE DELEGATES" at any meetings of the Institute, in the form of a resolution shall have a binding effect on the Institute and the Board of Directors, was DEFEATED.

Resolution B-1 asking that "FUNDED COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS" be equitably distributed to each region. PASSED.

Resolution D-1 ask that a national task force be established to prepare a "CODE OF PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITY". PASSED.

Resolution D-2 ask that the Institute consider the "ECONOMIC STATUS OF THE ARCHITECTURAL PROFESSION"

to be the major issue for the '80's. PASSED.

Resolution D-3 asking the Institute to intensify its efforts to implement the 1982 resolution "OF NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT". PASSED.

The Iowa chapter also introduced a resolution that asked the AIA to implore our governmental leaders in Congress and the Administration to reduce the country's ever increasing national debt, and to couple federal spending with federal revenue to insure a balanced federal budget as an on-going concept. PASSED.

It appears, that by the number of members attending, the 1984 national convention in Phoenix was a success and I look forward to 1985 in San Francisco.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The recent National AIA Convention in Phoenix May 5-9, 1984 was well attended by Michigan people. The investiture of new Fellows occurred on Sunday afternoon, May 6, with six new Fellows from Michigan joining the College of Fellows. Evie Asken FAIA and Chase Black FAIA of Western Michigan Chapter, and Hideo Fujii FAIA, Karl Greimel FAIA, Robert Margerum FAIA and Charles McCafferty FAIA of the Detroit Chapter. A convocation dinner at the plush Biltmore Hotel of all AIA Fellows occurred on Monday evening, which featured Mr. Kaufman's son discussing Frank Lloyd Wright's "Falling Water."

The entire AIA National Board was also privileged to be guests of Mrs. Frank Lloyd Wright at Taliesin West. This was an exciting experience, not only to see the famed school, but to talk to staff and students on location.

The election of new officers also occurred at the Convention, with John Busby FAIA of Atlanta, Georgia elected First Vice President (President elect) of AIA. John will be President in 1986. Also elected as Vice President was Robert Gramann FAIA of Cincinnati, Don Hackl FAIA of Chicago, and Ted Pappas FAIA of Jacksonville. Phil Dinsmore AIA of Tucson was elected Secretary. It is a great slate of officers which will represent the Institute in great fashion.

Two issues which received considerable attention at the business sessions were Public Membership and the Governance Task Force Study. (1) The Public Membership program is being launched this summer and has been developed to encourage the broadening of our membership and the involvement of people related and interested in our profession. Attractive brochures will soon be received by all members explaining the program. (2) The Governance Task Force Study, Chaired by former AIA President Bob Lawrence, is evaluating institute structure and its relation to the major goals as expressed in the Direction '80's report as well as to respond to membership concern about Institute responsiveness and governance. Each chapter was asked to respond to a Survey in January, 1984. A status report was presented, and discussed, at the Convention with the final report due in September, 1984.

Finally, much attention has been given by various chapter officers and members, the Executive Director and myself in trying to improve the service of the AIA switchboard in Washington and the amending and/or cessation of the threatening letters issued by AIA concerning nonpayment or delayed payment of dues and/or the im-

proper filling out of the supplementary dues portion of the annual invoice. National is well aware of our irritations and concerns, and is taking steps to rectify this unfortunate situation. We will continue to press the staff and officers in Washington to straighten out their switchboard problems, which we understand were caused by the installation of a new phone system, and to stop the computers from issuing the abrasive form letters on invoice problems.

Awesome! The 1984 AIA Convention held in Phoenix May 5-9 is history! From an overview given by President George Notter, from the Governor of Arizona's remarks on Sunday, from the keynote address by pioneering forecaster Dr. Marvin Cetron, the timely workshops, the "Cinco de Mayo Weekend Celebration" co-sponsored by the AIA, the "show-stopping" Herman Miller office of the future spectacular, the cookout on Pinnacle Peak, the Dodge Party, the olympic size swimming pools, the desert in bloom, palm trees, 101 degree temperatures, Mexican food, the fellowship with other architects and friends, meetings with AIA staff, one-on-one meetings with 1984 national award winning architects, the 1984 AIA exhibit of New Products and Technology — all this and more! And it is great to return to Michigan practice with spirit renewed!

The convention sessions were very well organized with many activities aimed to serve the members in attendance and the Chapters represented. This was a "model" convention — well

run, spirited, informative, diverse, inspirational. Every detail was attended to from the general assembly sessions to the small workshops, from working lunch sessions to the extravagant western-style cook-out for over a thousand architects on a desert mountain top; "world-class" speakers and panelists whose words were translated simultaneously by interpreters for the deaf — and also recorded with cassettes made available immediately following each session.

Keynote speaker Cetron delivered a three-hour address in less than an hour and received a tumultuous ovation at the end of his talk. He set the convention tone — and his talk provided topics for many conversations throughout the convention at many gatherings. He provided "riveting and provocative images of the society and the 'publics' that American architecture strives to serve" — as promised in the MEMO. A forecaster by profession, he went beyond — much beyond — CAD and CAM, and told what people in what occupations will receive the highest financial rewards for what they do — people who can do something that "numerically controlled equipment" cannot do; creative people involved in writing and in painting, sculptors and architects — and those in professional sports! Those people who are creative and whose actions are not governed by precedent — but rather those people who can do something unique. People with ideas. The innovators. Not the imitators.

What else could be observed at the 1984 AIA Convention is that AIA in 1984 is a slimmer, trimmer organization — with much refocusing going towards the various Chapters throughout the United States. And the 1984 Convention was the occasion for

the announcement of THE FORUM FOR ARCHITECTURE — the AIA Foundation Public Membership Program. The 1984 Convention marked the official beginning of the new program — a program in which for the first time in AIA history the AIA has opened its doors to the general public. It is hoped that in a short time this program will have over one million members. Awesome!

Cranbrook, designed by Eliel Saarinen, will be the site of the July 8-10, 1984 AIA National Committee on Design. This meeting is open to all MSA members and is an opportunity for members to participate in a national committee without the expense of travel.

Events throughout the meeting will include a tour of the buildings and grounds designed by Saarinen with the help of other gifted Cranbrook artists. Lectures on Cranbrook and a panel discussion about the legacy of Cranbrook will give a sense of history and show the influences of the Academy. A reception, hosted by the Detroit Chapter, AIA, and LIT at the Afflect House will be on Monday evening, July 9th, prior to the evening events.

CALL FOR PAPERS/ 6th URBAN DESIGN CONFERENCE

A call for papers on the topics of recycling of industrial, railroad and riverfront land has been announced for the Urban Design Forum of the Sixth International Conference on Urban Design. Deadline for submission of abstracts is June 29th.

The conference, whose theme is Urban Design in the Context of a Changing Economy, will convene in Pittsburgh, September 19-22, 1984. The program will explore new approaches to redevelopment of industrial, railroad and riverfront land, through a series of daytime workshops and an evening Urban Design Forum.

Abstracts, of no more than 500 words, should be submitted, no later than June 29, to the Institute for Urban Design (IUD), Main P.O. 105, Purchase, NY 10577. Accepted papers will be published in a post-conference Proceedings.

The conference is being sponsored by the IUD in cooperation with the Pittsburgh Dept. of City Planning. Registration rates are \$300 for members of the IUD; \$358 for new members; \$385, non-members; \$90 students. Forum participants will be admitted to the conference at a Forum Speaker's Rate of \$250.

1984 STEEL BRIDGE COMPETITION ANNOUNCED BY AISC

The American Institute of Steel Construction is now accepting entries for the 1984 Prize Bridge Awards.

The competition recognizes the versatility of steel as a bridge materials and encourages the steady flow of improvement in the basic metal and the design of bridges which enrich the American landscape.

Bridges in the 1984 competition will be judged in ten categories: long span, medium span/high clearance, medium span/low clearance, short span, grade separation, elevated highway or viaduct, movable span, railroad, special purpose or reconstructed.

To be eligible for the 1984 contest, a bridge must be located within the United States or its territories and be built of structural

steel fabricated in the U.S. The bridge must have been completed and opened to traffic from January 1, 1982 through June 30, 1984.

Entries must be postmarked before September 1, 1984. Entry forms are now available from AISC, 400 N. Michigan, Chicago, IL 60611 (phone 312-670-2400).
