

Saarinen At Cranbrook

John Jickling, FAIA – Gold Medal

Three important exhibits will be on display at the Cranbrook Academy of Art Museum through the month of October:

<u>Saarinen In Finland</u> was organized by the Museum of Finnish Architecture. The exhibit includes drawings, furniture and photographs highlighting Eliel Saarinen's achievements in Finland and Europe from 1896-1923.

Saarinen At Cranbrook: Designs For Cranbrook & Kingswood Schools deals with his transition period, 1925-31. Cranbrook School is reminiscent of his Finnish national romantic and Jugendstil architecture while Kingswood demonstrates the influence of Frank Lloyd Wright. This exhibit was organized by the Academy and uses architectural drawings, renderings and watercolors along with his furniture and textiles.

<u>Natural Histories: Recent Works</u> by Dan Hoffman features constructions and drawings by Cranbrook Academy of Art artist-in-residence, Dan Hoffman.

Hoffman explores the synapse between biological and technological processes in architecture. The works use material and fabrication as a point of departure, seeking ways in which past and future habitations may be created.

John Jickling, FAIA 1988 MSA Gold Medal

John Jickling, FAIA will receive the Gold Medal of the Michigan Society of Architects on October 21, 1988 for the significant contributions that he has made to architecture.

Inspired by the Sarrinen tradition and honed by the discipline of managing his own firm, he built up a body of work that earned him a Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects College of Fellows in 1979 and a Gold Medal from the Detroit Chapter in 1983.

He has diligently attended to both his community and his profession. For six years he served on the Birmingham Planning Board at a time when the city was struggling to establish its identity. He lead the effort to simplify the zoning ordinance, assure open space and control high rise development. He worked through the ranks to become president of the Detroit Chapter/AIA and the Society. He served three years on the national board of directors of the American Institute of Architects.

He was born in Michigan, served with the U.S. Air Force until the war ended in 1945; received his B. Architecture by examination in 1950 and started up the path to the Gold Medal. He worked for eleven years with Swanson Associates until he set up his own practice in 1959. The Jickling & Lyman partnership was formed in 1962 and later later became Jickling, Lyman & Powell Associates.

Although he devoted many hours to public service, his firm was able to design a number of important buildings including the Gerald Ford Presidential Library, A. Alfred Taubman Medical Library, and the Bentley Historical Library.

In 1986, the honor awards banquet occurred on Halloween at the Ford Museum in Grand Rapids. The guests were requested to come dressed as their "favorite architect". John's wife, Barbara, came dressed in one of John's old suits leaving no doubt who her favorite architect was. She was also an architect and managed the firm until her retirement. She died early this year.

For The Well Read Architect

Creative Design Decisions was written by Stephen J. Kirk, AIA and Kent Spreckelmeyer. This book provides a formal approach to decision making, problem solving and evaluation of each stage of the facility cycle from feasibility to design, construction and occupancy.

Kirk is an architect with Smith, Hinchman and Grylls Associates and is completing his doctoral in architecture at the University of Michigan. Spreckelmeyer is with the University of Kansas School of Architecture and Urban Design.

Case studies include a data processing center and a corporate headquarters, illustrating applications of analytic techniques during all phases of a building's cycle including lifecycle costs and post-occupancy evaluations.

The book was published by Van Nostrand Reinhold any may be ordered by mail from them at their mail order Service, 7625 Empire Drive, Florence, KY 41042. It is 256 pages and contains 77 line drawings.

National High School Design Contest

The Architectural Studies Center at Lansing Community College will host the first **National High School Architectural Design Competition** June 19-21, 1989 in Lansing. The national competition comes about as a result of nine successful Annual Michigan High School Architectural Design Competitions. Each years the number of students participating, the number of districts represented and the amount of prize money has increased. In 1988 there were students from 90 school districts and \$10,000 in U.S. Savings Bond prizes.

An initial grant from the Lansing based Talbert and Leota Abrams Foundation got the program going. A number of students from each state will be invited to participate. They will be welcomed by Governor James Blanchard and conducted on a tour of Elijah Myers' historic state capitol building to view the restoration that will be underway. In the evening the student architects will be taken to Ann Arbor for an event hosted by Domino's Pizza and the National Center for the Study of Frank Lloyd Wright. They will tour the Carl Wall "Snowflake" House designed by Wright and built in Plymouth in 1941. They will tour Monoghan's extensive collection of Wright decorative arts and end the evening with pizza and Domino's Classic Car Collection.

The next day it is back to the boards where the students will work for 16 hours on an identical design problem. Judging will be performed by a jury of architects from across the United States. The team will be headed by Hugh Newell Jacobsen who will deliver the keynote address and announce the winners. The first prize will be a trophy and a \$10,000 Savings Bond.

Author, Author!

Harold Linton, a professor at LIT, and Richard Rochon, a lecturer in architecture there, have co-authored another book, **Color in Architectural Illustration.** They will be honored at the Beaubien House on November 9th by a Book Party jointly sponsored by the Detroit Chapter/AIA, Michigan Society of Architects, Michigan Architectural Foundation and LIT. The reception will begin at 5 p.m.

According to Linton, a Southfield artist and color theorist, the book provides an understanding of the role of color in highly refined pictorial composition. According to Rochon, a wellknown international architectural illustrator who is also president of Rochon Associates, Inc. in Dearborn, the book addresses the current resurgence of interest in color for architectural illustration and design application.

Color in Architectural Illustration contains 185 color illustrations of local and nationally recognized landmarks, including many designed by architectural firms located in Ann Arbor, Detroit, Birmingham, Troy, and Bloomfield Hills.

It is the second book by the pair. Their first book was called **Color Model Environments: Color and Light in Three-Dimensional Design.** The cost of the book is \$39.95 and copies will be available at the reception.

Value Engineering Workshop At SH&G

MSA Honorary Members

To recognize the contributions of persons who are not otherwise eligible to become members, the Michigan Society of Architects from time to time bestows Honorary Memberships on those outside the profession who have made a significant contribution to the advancement and understanding of the importance of architecture. This year the heads of three organizations are being honored.

Paul A. Johnson is president of the Grand Valley State University Foundation. He uses well designed buildings as one of his tools to improve both the quality and availability of higher education for Michigan residents. He was instrumental in establishing and creating the new downtown campus of the University as a complement to the urban re-birth of Grand Rapids.

Dr. Russell Mawby has used his position as Chair of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation to improve the quality of life and environment throughout the United States. His recent efforts toward the revitalization of downtown Battle Creek and the decision of the Foundation to construct their new international headquarters in a deteriorating five block area of downtown is an examplary example of his commitment.

William White through his position as president of the Mott Foundation was influential in the development of the Water Street Pavilion in downtown Flint and the removal of many blocks of closed boarded up buildings on Saginaw Street. He established an architect selection process similar to that of Cummins Diesel in Columbus, Indiana that provided outside financial support for the fees of Halprin & Associates, a well known architectural firm, to design the Flint River Front.

Hastings Award Goes To Slocum

The Hastings' Award will be presented to Dick Slocum, AIA of Kalamazoo on October 21, 1988 at the Michigan State University Club in Lansing during the 73rd Annual MSA Convention.

"As architects, we are committed to our profession and this commitment carries responsibilities beyond those of design. We are committed to making a more habitable environment for every man, woman, and child in our society, said Robert Hastings, FAIA. In his speeches, writings and life Hastings championed the idea that architects were in a unique position to help humankind achieve its highest potential. When he died prematurely in 1973, the Hastings Award was established in his name to recognize architects who shared this goal and used their time and talent to improve the human condition.

Dick Slocum chose to improve the quality and accessability of health care in his community. He served seven years on the board of the Kalamazoo Health Systems Agency. In his role as chair of the physical facilities committee, he has examined over 400 million dollars worth of construction and has saved the health care users over 70 million dollars worth of unnecessary cost.

The care and rehabilitation of battered women and their children has also been one of his concerns. While serving on the board of directors of the local YWCA, he helped to plan a new facility that includes an entire floor dedicated to the special needs of the Y's domestic assault program.

Slocum has also found time to make improvements in the architectural profession. He has been president of both the Western Michigan Chapter/AIA and the Michigan Society of Architects. His training in architecture and engineering gives him an insight into both disciplines. The subjectiveness of "architecture" is difficult to define in terms that can be enforced by law. So for the last eight years, at the request of the Michigan Attorney General, he has been working with a joint architect/engineer committee in an effort to more clearly define article 20 of Public Act 299. A consensus has been reached and the new definition should be approved this year.

Robert Hastings believed that an architect should work to improve the lives of people. Dick Slocum, AIA continues to do that and for his extraordinary efforts he will be honored by his peers.

M-Day Coming

Clayton T. "Tom" Grimm, P.E., CSI, a nationally recognized architectural consultant, will be the featured speaker at **M-Day-1988**. The event will be held on November 29th at the U of M Michigan League in Ann Arbor. Grimm, who has been a long-time lecturer at the Austin Campus of the University of Texas will take up the widely discussed "Brick and Metal-Stud Controversy."

The Masonry Institute of Michigan's Annual "M-Day" seminar is co-sponsored this year by the Huron Valley Chapter/AIA. It will also feature a review of the 1987 Honor Awards Program, as well as sessions on masonry cavity walls, material properties of clay and concrete masonry units. The proposed ACI-ASCE 530 Standards for Building Code Requirements and Specifications for Masonry Structures will also be examined.

Registration begins at 7:30 a.m. with coffee and danish and the formal sessions begin at 8:30 a.m. Wine and Cheese will be served following the program at 3:30 p.m.






