ATTENTION: INTERNS & EMPLOYERS Architects' Board Adopts Revised Rules for Registration

Effective January 1, 1992,

"Submission of a Certificate of Completion of the Intern Development Program of the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards shall be accepted as evidence of completion of architectural experience to the Board.

The Board adopts by reference the standards set forth in the publication "IDP Guidelines", published in January, 1989, by the American Institute of Architects and the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards."

IDP



THE PROGRAM

The Intern Development Program is a comprehensive internship program administered by NCARB that was established during the 1970's. It is a self-motivated program providing a structured transition between formal education and architectural registration. It is essentially a record-keeping process initiated and maintained by the intern. The benefit experienced by an intern equals the amount of personal initiative expended. IDP provides a framework by which an intern can gauge his or her exposure to the many aspects of professional practice deemed critical to the judgment of a licensed architect. The intent of IDP is to better prepare interns to sit for the Architectural Registration Examination (ARE).

WHAT THE IDP IS NOT

IDP is not a panacea to achieve professional competence, nor does it automatically guarantee success on the ARE.

THE CHALLENGE TO THE PROFESSION

While the IDP process is initiated and documented by the intern, licensed practitioners are needed as professional sponsors and advisors. Time demands upon them are usually minimal. Wisdom and judgment regarding various aspects of professional practice that have been acquired over time may be imparted to an intern through a short counselling session, for example. The resulting benefit to an intern from such an experience may be substantial.

Dinner will be at the Hotel Pontchartrain at the Top of the Pontchartrain, Two Washington Boulevard, Detroit, MI 48226, followed by a tour and meeting at Cobo Hall.

1989 Detroit Chapter Honor Awards Program

This Year's Honor Awards Committee has been pursuing an extensive program structured to provoke thought among members of the profession and to extend dialogue between architects and the public at large. The 1989 program will occur on December 2, 1989 at the recently restored old Wayne County building and will consist of the traditional evening ceremony and a day long symposium exploring the statement "Design excellence benefits the community!"

The Honor Awards Program will be judged by three architects from across the country who will be in Detroit to conduct the jury and participate in the closing session of the symposium. The symposium will include a morning session with a panel of prominent local leaders from corporate, developmental, governmental and architectural realms. Project submissions may be used as a basis for the discussion regarding the benefits of design excellence. An afternoon session will focus on whether we are achieving design excellence in our region as well as issues at the forefront of public thought regarding architecture. This session will feature several established Detroit area architects as panelists. Jurors for the Honor Awards Program will participate in the submissions and a presentation of awards for Conceptual Projects.

In Addition to the traditional Honor Awards, 25 Year Award and the Young Architect Award, a new category of Conceptual Awards is being introduced. The Committee invites submissions of projects, objects

or ideas that pursue the ideals of architecture through a broader vision and may never be realized in built form.

Members of the Detroit Chapter/AIA are eligible to submit projects completed after May 1, 1986 located anywhere in the United States or abroad for consideration of an Honor Award. The new category of Conceptual Awards is open to chapter members and associate members pursuing architectural registration and sponsored by a member. Nominations for the 25 Year Award will be accepted for distinguished projects in the Detroit Area designed by a registered architect between 1955 and 1964. DC/AIA members are encouraged to nominate exceptional DC/AIA members aged 25-35 for recognition of accomplishment for the Young Architect Award.

It is the hope of the committee that this year's program will encourage interaction and provoke dialogue within and beyond the architectural community. We hope you join us in our celebration of excellence in architecture! Watch for the Design Award mailing in the next few weeks.

MASONRY INSTITUTE SCHOLARSHIPS

The Masonry Institute of Michigan has awarded \$1,000 scholarships to eight students in the School of Architecture at LTU. The Institute's first scholarship was awarded in 1977. Since then, a total of 53 LTU architectural students have been aided by the scholarship program.

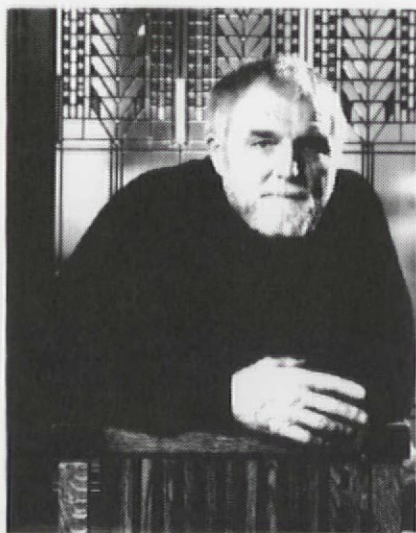
COLUMBUS, INDIANA

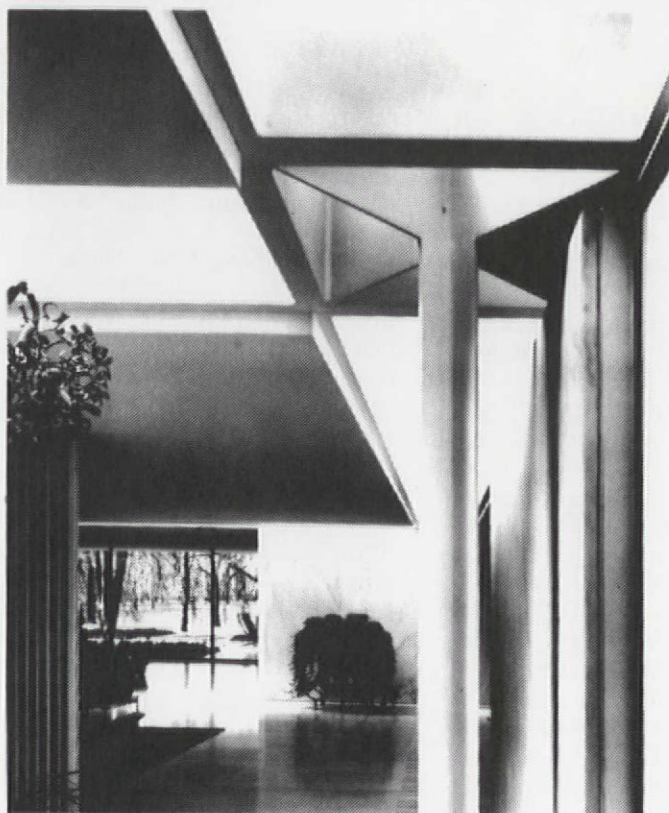

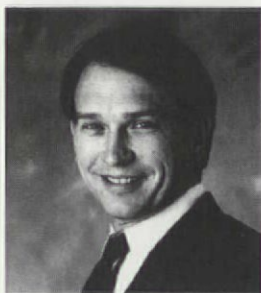

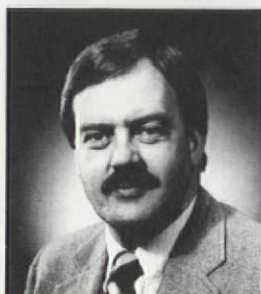
