Federal insurance for medical facilities

\$6-8 billion asked for hospital building

Art stressed in government construction

It's not just that there are more sick people though there are, in a population of nearly 200 million that is just beginning to boom, burst and babyout again. But, far more importantly for your business in the rest of this decade, there will be more sick people able to pay for better hospital and nursing care. This is due to both general prosperity and to the increasing number of Federal programs that will stimulate, in one way or another, facilities aimed at taking care of America's growing population.

Some programs seem little, some are large. Some are old and being refurbished. Some are brand new.

The current housing and urban development bills before Congress include a provision for a program of Federal insurance for group medical facilities. This includes both construction and equipment, for a trend that is spreading over the country. In addition, public groups are asking Congress to broaden the present program of insurance for profit-making nursing homes to nonprofit nursing homes. These latter already have one program of direct loans. Congress is also being asked to include nursing facilities in housing for the elderly projects insured by the Federal Housing Administration.

The Administration wants to finance a \$6-\$8 billion modernization program for city hospitals. The plan is for the U.S. to pay 2/5 of the cost, and insuring or making loans for another 50 percent. This is outside the confines of the present (and expanded) Hill-Burton hospital program, which has been broadened from new construction to modernization. The Administration estimates that a third of the nation's hospitals — or, 260,000 beds — are in an obsolete condition.

The pressure for up-dating these—which would mean both a hefty volume for interior renovation and new furnishings—traces directly to Medicare for the aged, which goes into operation in July. How mammoth this will be, how great the demands, are still somewhat speculative, but officials are braced for an onslaught of new requirements.

The hospital program would start with planning funds only in this first year, and go into its 10-year modernization activity in mid-1967.

Nursing home provisions of the Medicare legisla-

tion go into effect Jan. 1, 1967. This field has seemed in the past more promising than it has turned out to be for many; but now, the Federal underwriting is likely to put a firm base under this, and more private enterprisers are looking into the construction and operation of such units.

This year has seen both the first modernization grant under the 19-year-old Hill-Burton program, in which \$160 million has been authorized for modernization and replacement in four years, and the first grants for nursing school construction, under the Nurse Training Act of 1964. These grants help build, renovate, and equip nursing school facilities.

Beautifying public buildings

Rep. Pepper (D.-Fla.) has introduced HR 12298, which would require that at least one percent of the money available to construct Federal buildings shall be used for decoration and beautification of the structures.

"Public buildings which are drab testify to a dearth of spiritual sensitivity," he says. This would encourage the creation of murals, mosaics, paintings, sculpture, ironwork, weaving, stonework, and artistic work in other media, he believes.

"I should hope that our public buildings would be not only monuments to our power but symbols of our appreciation of artistic achievement," the veteran legislator states.

Procurement savings estimate

General Services Administrator Lawson Knott, Jr., reports to the President that the Jan. 9, 1965 directive which placed a moratorium on purchases of new file cabinets and requiring a reduction in the purchase of office furniture saved \$3.6 million in cabinet procurement, and \$7.5 million for the second category —\$3.8 million on furniture and \$3.7 million on typewriters. Altogether, in 1964 the U.S. spent \$77.8 million in this area, and in 1965, \$66.7 million, Knott reported. The program is continuing. Departments are under instructions to use used and rehabilitated filing cabinets, office furniture and typewriters, and to retire records to low-cost storage space.


Use of interior designers

GSA likes to keep its staff busy. It doesn't advertise, but it does find that word gets around that it has designers on its staff who are "free" to the customeragency. It gets enough calls, it is somewhat choosy. Where the job promises to be a long one, and it does not want to tie up personnel, it may refuse the work. In any event, it does not put a restriction on the use of outside interior design firms—the Federal Aviation Agency building here was one such; the new Lafayette Park complex of buildings now being erected here in colonial red-but-red brick is also an outside job. GSA gives the designer its guidelines, to use GSA spec furniture wherever possible. Often, where it turns down a request, the agency will simply wait its turn.


Whether it gets in on the pre-skin phase of the building, and thus can help select such architectural details as wallcoverings and colors, floor materials and design, or not, depends on the way the building contract was drawn up. GSA takes the job as the customer brings it in. (C)



CONTRACT BUSINESS: NOTES & COMMENTS

Artist-Craftsmen exhibition

For the fifth consecutive year, members of the Artist-Craftsmen of New York have been singled out for awards by their member craft society. More than 200 of the design entries are now on exhibition at the National Design Center.

Of the more than four hundred works submitted by society members, a jury of art authorities has selected thirty for awards and citations. Jury members in the 1966 exhibition chosen by the guild were Eugene Goosen, chairman of the department of art at Hunter College; Paul Smith, director of the Museum of Contemporary Crafts; and Barry B. Tracy, associate curator of the American Wing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Awards are issued in categories that represent the major crafts: ceramics, sculpture, textiles, jewelry, and work in enamel, glass, metal and wood. The Just Lunning Memorial Award was presented to Robert Filipek for a leather and steel swing chair.


These were some of the events forecast by Albert Herbert, AID, New York, in a discussion on contract vs. residential design at the February meeting of the Eastern Pennsylvania Chapter of the AID in Philadelphia. Mr. Herbert postulated that the growth of the contract market in the past 25 years is but a small indication of what is yet to come.

"Most firms, even very large ones," he stated, "have not established a buying policy for furnishings. They are relying on the contract professional to set this policy. The contract designer holds the key to a very complex field. He is a new species to the corporate structure—a problem solver—directing the purchases of huge corporations.

"All of us must face facts," Herbert continued. "We know the wholesale price structure, and the protected source is fast falling by the wayside. The trend is to corporate clients who prefer to handle the discount themselves, and large source firms are accepting company checks. This relieves the designer of taxes and financing and free to design, which is of ultimate importance," Herbert stressed. "We are getting our design fee—not acting as a clearing house."

Inez Croom, AID, New York, rallying for residential design, spoke out against the impersonality of her contract counterpart. The personal touch or the association with private clients cannot be dismissed altogether, she argued. "I want to know how they live, how they will use every room—and I like to buy and sell."

"I helped to restore a church once," she added commenting on one of her few 'commercial' jobs. "I told them I would do it on a cost plus basis. When it was completed, they sent a check for twice the amount."



U.S. carpet mills produced 260 million square yards of carpet in 1964, according to the American Carpet Institute. An estimated 25 percent of this output was for contract applications. The Institute added that 85 percent of total production for the year was in tufted carpeting.

Ghana: business as usual

The hazards of extending business operations overseas were recently demonstrated to the plan/design firm Saphier, Lerner, Schindler, Inc. The firm has a number of overseas projects -one of the most extensive being that for the former government of Ghana headed by Nkrumah, which involved work for the Ghanaian Ministry of Health and Ministry of Agriculture. At the time of the military coup which overthrew Nkrumah, the various SLS projects in Ghana had already passed early planning stages and there was apprehension as to whether or not the new leaders would recognize the former government's commitments. The entire project was in doubt for a number of days, but a phone call from the SLS representative in Rome brought good news. He had received assurances from the new military government of Ghana-decidedly pro-American-that the SLS programs drafted with the former regime would be continued.

JUTE CARPET BACKING COUNCIL PUBLISHES RESEARCH REPORT

Exhaustive testing by the Jute Carpet Backing Council on the characteristics of jute backing have yielded some interesting results. Jute backing is a structure with extraordinary physical balance, so that it has relatively equal strength in both warp and filling directions. These properties are said to obviate the need



Combination of high break strength and low extensibility of jute backing was found to assure a permanently firm carpet installation, even after years of wear.


for special handling or reduction in tension while stretching in either direction, or even diagonally.

Breaking strength of jute has a range of 100 to 150 pounds in the warp direction, depending on the weight of the carpet fabric, and only about 20% less breaking strength in the filling direction. These high minimums are said to provide a margin of safety which protects against splitting even under extreme conditions.


At the same time, jute has extremely low extensibility, or stretch under load, according to the Council, insuring against distortion from tension. Extensibility, however, is sufficient to enable it to "bump' handily over gripper pins during installation of carpet by the tackless method. Jute's extensibility, moreover, is said to remain almost constant at room, freezing, and water boiling temperatures, an advantage that shows up strongly in the tufting, dyeing, installing, and commercial cleaning of carpets.

Jute-on-Jute double carpet backing is a completely compatible structure, according to the Council, both backings having similar physical characteristics, so that the properties of one layer simply enhance the properties of the other.

The Council has issued a report on jute in comparison with other types of backing, the first in a series of research studies. Copies of these reports are available from the Jute Carpet Backing Council at 160 Broadway, New York City. (C)

WHAT is the essential difference between architectural interiors and "decorated" interiors? Basically, it's the extent of the designer's technical involvement, which in turn hinges upon the technical equipment he brings to the contract job. He must be equipped to translate the client's functional needs into a working environment. This is far more than furnishing or "decorating"; before anything, it means the conditioning of the space to yield the right visual, aural, and thermal characteristics. Visual here refers to formal divisions of space: walls, lighting, color, and finishing materials. Aural elements embrace all acoustic materials, as well as equipment for voice and sound transmission and suppression; in short, communications. The thermal elements involve the "comfort conditioning" of the interior environmentheating, cooling, and ventilating. For the designer who thinks in terms of the architectural whole, the esthetic features of the job must be precisely correlated with these basic functional considerations.

All of this relates to a point we've emphasized before: that the earlier the contract designer is allowed to bring his special abilities to bear on the job, the better both the functional and esthetic results will be. When these conditions exist, or are brought about, at the level that prevailed in the planning and designing of the new Rohm & Haas headquarters in Philadelphia, the doors are wide open for a unique achievement.

Not that Rohm & Haas simply acquiesced to operating in a thoroughly contemporary framework of design goals. On the contrary, the corporation, although it produces advanced materials (Plexiglas, Dithane, pharmaceuticals, synthetic fibers, and

agricultural chemicals), is a sturdily traditional outfit, steeped in the *mores* of Philadelphia and deeply respectful of the city's hallowed place in our national history, including its architectural past.

Actually, it took much persuasion on the part of the architects and space planners—George M. Ewing Co., Philadelphia, with Pietro Belluschi as consulting architect, and the space planning/designing firm of Saphier, Lerner, Schindler, Inc. (SLS)—to convince R&H that its business would operate more efficiently in a contemporary building, planned and furnished in keeping with the functions to be performed in the headquarters of a major industrial company. More than tradition was involved—the former Rohm & Haas offices were located in a motley group of tiny town houses that the city of Philadelphia has since designated as landmark buildings.

Corporate growth over the past twenty years was so rapid that R&H literally never had time to establish itself in a proper headquarters. Space planning in the




antiquated row of buildings that the company occupied was improvisational, to put it kindly, and the furnishings were of the same hit-or-miss genre as the architecture. R&H considered bringing the mixed bag over to the new building. (Saphier, Lerner, Schindler, in fact, had as one of the tasks assigned to it by Alexander Ewing, project head for the architect, to "survey existing furniture and arrive at a proper evaluation for its re-use." Highly resistant at the outset to any suggestion of a modern environment for their new office building, the strong reservations of the R&H management were gradually softened to the point where they eventually gave approval to virtually all of the original recommendations. An occasional piece of old furniture did manage to survive the "style revolution," but ultimately, much to its credit, R&H gave its assent ungrudgingly to an advanced contemporary design, from the office of the board chairman to the employee's cafeteria.

The building itself is not only uncompromisingly

modern but atypical in appearance and construction. A distinct innovation are its sunscreens of bronzecolored Plexiglas (an R&H product), supported by a dark bronze aluminum lattice. The lattice is attached to the outside of the building by an overhang on each floor which extends out some five feet. The sunscreen provides environmental control for the interior, while the lattice forms an open curtain wall that gives the building a lightness of scale that conceals its very substantial reinforced concrete construction. The cost of the building, exclusive of site and furnishings, is estimated at \$10 million.

Because the planning and design principles introduced by Ewing and SLS were completely new to R&H, elaborate mock-ups and dry runs were the order of the day, or rather, the two-year planning period. In one major model exhibit, SLS set up a complete floor of furnishings, separated by typical partitioning. There followed a full day of detailed presentations, attended by 25 of the top R&H executives. From this audito-

rium-scale display of furnishings, executives made their selections from furniture groups, along with compatible equipment.

Next, entire departments were set up on an empty floor of the old Farm Journal building in Philadelphia—complete with new furniture, ceilings, lighting, partitions, doors, carpeting. Everything was built, down to the last piece of hardware, and then exhaustively tested. Even employees' reactions to modern colors, which they had never worked with before, were explored; in the mock-ups, the R&H staff were subjected to a range of environments from the vibrantly colored to the bland and subdued. It was the dry runs, involving physical tests of furnishings and employee reactions to new working environments, that decided R&H in favor of accepting the SLS recommendations.


Interior architecture in the new headquarters is specialized. Throughout the building, the Ewing concern and SLS worked with the company's engineers and product designers to incorporate many of the R&H products in place of conventional semi-structural materials and finishes. Thus, there are two large murals in Plexiglas in the cafeteria, commissioned by R&H to expose its employees to the esthetic possibilities of the firm's product. One of the murals is by Shirley Tattersfield, the other by Frieda Koblick (see illustrations on opposite page). On the ninth floor, where the executive offices are located, there is an abstract sculpture in Plexiglas and stainless steel in the form of an architectural column in the center of the board-room foyer. Everywhere in the building R&H plastics appear in the form of door knobs, screens, coat racks, room dividers, and other fixtures.

Working methods

Ewing retained SLS to collaborate with them on the general design and interior architecture of the R&H building. This extended to partitions, flooring, acoustical ceilings, lighting fixtures, wallcoverings, paints, washrooms, core facilities, as well as to such standard space planning facets as work stations, furniture, and furnishings.

Once architects Ewing and Belluschi had designed the building enclosure, SLS projected the working areas in three-dimensional form, then relayed to the (Continued on page 88)

Ewing firm what was being planned in terms of design and space break-up. After consultation and revision of the projected plan with the architects, SLS made a formal design presentation at its New York office, with architects and clients in attendance. Later, when final approval of the plans for the floors were received from R&H, the SLS drafting staff did free-hand construction detailing of all elements to be introduced into the shell, including dimensions and elevations. SLS provided roughs and all information necessary for interior architectural construction, and these were in turn incorporated into the Ewing working drawings of the building.

All of the foregoing occurred while the building was still on the drawing boards. The next step was to send out every element of the R&H job for bids, which the Ewing firm received. SLS made up shop drawings and samples for Ewing and scheduled regular visits to the construction site as soon as work started on the building.

Testing of all materials, furnishings, and finishes was a standard feature of the project—Rohm & Haas did not want to discover mistakes after the fact. In the mock-ups at the aforementioned Farm Journal building, 5,000 square feet of space were employed to set up prototypes of typical office units and portions of the actual furniture. Some of the tests served to eliminate materials, rather than to work them into the scheme. Draperies, for example, were at first deemed unnecessary because the Plexiglas sunscreens on the building's open curtain wall did most of the job without additional light diffusers but they were reinstated for decorative purposes.

Desks, chairs, partitions (with special emphasis on gauging vibration when doors were opened or shut) were extensively tested too. Partitions and carpeting were coordinated so that large areas of carpet would not need alteration or be destroyed when partitions were moved.

In submitting everything to exhaustive tests by a phalanx of professionals—floor plans, office layouts, business systems, furnishings, and all finishing materials—R&H sagely insured itself against wide margins of error in specifications. Actually, the margin proved almost negligible. Each purchase was a conscious commitment to a particular product, made with full knowledge of all the competitive products in terms of performance, cost, durability, and maintenance. Each purchase, therefore, was in effect a hard-won endorsement of the individual product, certifying its superiority over its competitors in rigorous testing.

In human terms, everyone likes the final result, everyone feels comfortable working in the new building, and visitors are unanimously impressed by its graciousness, by the pleasantness of the light, the colors, the furnishings, the art objects, and the proportions and relationships of work areas, corridors, and private offices. After all, this is the final test of the building's success as architecture and interior planning—that it generates positive feelings of pride, enthusiasm, and ease among those who use it. (C)

ACOUSTICS: THE CONTRACT DESIGNER'S ROLE IN SPECIFYING THESE MATERIALS HAS BECOME AN IMPORTANT, COMPLEX RESPONSIBILITY BY NICK POLITES

JUDGING from manufacturers' literature, one would think that the only people who ever specify acoustical materials are architects. Contract designers, of course, know better. Specifying these materials - the architectural materials, that is, and not just carpets and drapery - is a fundamental part of their everyday work. If in some installations contract designers have not specified all of the acoustical materials chances are they will at least have specified the major portion. Marvin Affrime, of Space Design Group, estimates: "We specify between 75 and 90 percent of the acoustical materials that go into our installations," and most designers concur with him.

Because the designer's role in specifying acoustical materials has not perhaps been fully appreciated, it seems like a good time to take a closer look at it, then turn to the major manufacturers for a brief rundown of some of the products on the market today.

Precisely how much autonomy the designer has in specifying acoustical materials depends on the installation as well as the building it is located in. In remodeling work, for example, the contract designer specifies all the acoustical materials. The only exception is when the building owner has undertaken the remodeling, in which case the architect retained would specify the acoustical ceiling. Even here, though, the owner may have allowed a certain amount of money for acoustical materials, so that the designer can specify them to the remodeling contractor.

In new buildings it becomes somewhat more complicated. With an institutional building owned by the tenant, says Lawrence Lerner, "if the designer is called in from the beginning he specifies all acoustical materials." A new rental building, on the other hand, usually has its acoustical ceiling specified by the architect.

"This is so for two reasons," explains Charles Winecoff of Planned Office Interiors. "The builder specifies all acoustical materials, buys them from one manufacturer and gets a cost savings. Or sometimes a system is set up for the whole building and other products won't fit." The main objection here is not so much technical, according to Winecoff: "Generally, for most needs of our clients, the building's acoustical material is 'adequate.' But it is not necessarily what we esthetically prefer." There's also the problem that the building's acoustical material may be in sizes that hamper the placement of lighting and other fixtures.

Fortunately, there are many exceptions to the practice of the new building owner specifying acoustical materials. The building owner often sets up allowances for these materials. This allows the designer to specify them. If he goes over the allowance limit the client of course pays the difference. In other cases, the designer may be able to change the building owner's specification and get a credit from him for his client. Then he can go ahead and specify what he needs. This will be drawn into the plans, approved by the client and turned over to the landlord and building contractor, who will install it. The client pays the difference in cost, if any.

Apart from acoustical ceiling materials - which control reflected sounds, not transmitted ones — all other speci-fication is done by the contract designer. This covers a lot of things: in a restaurant, setting up sound barriers between kitchen and dining room; in an office, giving special acoustical treatment to reception areas, conference rooms, data processing areas and duplicating rooms. Such acoustical treatment goes beyond what the building offers. In creating sound barriers between partitions, for example, it may involve carrying the acoustical material above the partition all the way up to the slab.

How much control?

Experience, most designers agree, tells them how much acoustical treatment a space needs. "The products are rated," says Don Eliason, vicepresident of Duffy's, Inc., a New York office design firm, "and you know what the noise factors will be for different functions. After you work with acoustical materials for a while you develop an idea of how much treatment a room needs." In general acoustical treatment of the ceiling is sufficient for ordinary functions. Why? Most acoustical ceiling products have absorption coefficient ratings well over 0.50, meaning that they absorb more than 50% of the sound waves hitting them. Studies indicate that an effectively sound conditioned room has an average absorption coefficient of surfaces equal to at least a rating of 0.20. If the ceiling does not bring the average up to this level the addition

of carpets, drapery and upholstered furniture usually will.

There are occasions, however, when acoustical problems become complicated. A recording studio in an advertising agency, for example, or a hotel/ motel meeting room which will be used with sound equipment. Here the work may become more sophisticated and get involved with cork walls, perforated panel walls and spray-on materials. For work like this designers usually call in acoustical engineers to consult with. The installation of materials may be done by acoustical contractors.

But by and large, despite these exceptions, specification is pretty much left to the designer. And this presents only one problem. How to choose from among the bewildering array of acoustical material products -from 12" square tiles with perforated holes to sprayed-on asbestos materials to complete ceiling systems integrating light, ventilating and other mechanical functions - from new patterns, textures, shapes, designs, colors -from materials such as mineral wool, cellulose fibers, asbestos, aluminum alloys, fiber glass, mineral fibers, etc. Let's try sorting them out a bit, going alphabetically by manufacturers. The list is far too long to consider them all, but at least we can hit some of the major ones.

Armstrong Cork Co. offers one of the most flexible approaches to ceiling design ever developed. Its Luminaire ceiling systems, first introduced in 1963, integrate lighting, air distri-

Circle No. 103. bution and acoustical control into a single unit, the module. Each function, including lighting, is designed to complement other functions. Three Luminaire systems have been introduced: the A-50 System (50-inch module size), the B-48 System (48-inch module size) and the new C-60 System (30 x 60-inch module size). Modules are suspended on grid components.

Of great interest to the specifier is the fact that these units can be arranged in any number of ways, either to vary the design of the ceiling, or to accommodate beams, columns or other obstructions.

In addition to a full line of standard acoustical products, Armstrong also makes the Ceramaguard ceiling system. This is a ceramic acoustical layin ceiling which is suited to high humidity locations, and can even be used in exterior applications under canopies or pavilions. A special acrylic paint finish provides it with exceptional washability and ceiling whiteness.

Spray-on acoustical material

The Asbestospray Corp. produces an acoustical material that is ideal for curved and eccentric surfaces, since it is applied by pressure spray gun. The sprayed-on mixture of virgin asbestos fiber, mineral fiber and inorganic dry binder forms a highly fireresistant surface. Asbestospray has been used in such installations as the TWA terminal building at Kennedy International Airport and the Air Force Academy chapel.

Celotex Corp.'s ceiling products span the full standard range of materials, textures and patterns. Technical excellence is a strong point, with special attention paid to high resistance to heat transmission, and to maintaining stability dimensional high and strength. The line of ventilating acoustical ceilings is particularly strong, and may be had with both lay-in panels and tiles. In addition, two types of sound deadening board for use in sound rated partitions and floor constructions are produced: Soundstop board and Resistone noncombustible board.

Elof Hansson, Inc. makes a wide range of well-researched and engineered acoustical ceiling and partition products, covering the entire range from low-cost wood fiber tiles to expensive Hansopan metal pans. The latter are especially well-suited for use in areas where humidity is too high for other types of acoustical materials and where frequent washings are necessary for sanitary requirements.

Another popular product is a sound barrier designed for use between the top of a partition and the floor above to eliminate transmission of sounds over the partition.

Flintkote Co.'s acoustical ceiling tiles and panels offer the designer a variety of patterned surfaces and textures to choose from. Some of them have subtle color contrasts to blend with the color scheme. The Aquatone tile, for instance, has a soft green base color with white texture to blend harmoniously into a cool, relaxing color scheme. The Beigetone tile offers possibilities of warmth with its light tan base and raised white texture.

Wallboard partitions

Gypsum wallboard products for use as partitions are also a specialty of the company. These include sound transmission control partitions, which make an excellent base for decorative paints, wallpapers, texture finishes, fabrics and vinyl wallcoverings.

Johns-Manville produces several unusual acoustical panels and tiles. One of the more interesting is the Acousti-Shell, which creates a sense of height and interest for interiors. Made of fiber glass, these vaults are produced by a pyramidal mold with lightly curved sides. The peak of the pyramid and the angle between adjacent sides are rounded off to avoid sharpness. All four sides have a 11/8inch flat border: two sizes are available-24 x 24 inch and 48 x 48 inch. An attractive variation is the fabricfaced vault, in 24 x 24 inch size, which has a surfacing of woven fiber glass fabric in a checkerboard pattern of 1/2 inch squares.

Of special interest to hotel and motel designers is the series of tiles with





decorative colorings combined with perforations or fissures, which will brighten up any room. The company also offers a full standard range of acoustical ceiling products, including ventilating ceilings, and products of mineral wool, asbestos and perforated metal.

The Mirawal Co.'s strip ceiling members allow the designer to achieve sweeping lines with sharp, eye-appealing uniformity. The custom features of this line will be particularly attractive to the designer. He may specify color to the manufacturer, which is an acrylic paint sprayed on, then baked. Units are custom cut to specific job requirements in lengths up to 20 feet. The surface material is an aluminum alloy, lightweight yet strong. A model incorporating ventilating slots is available. The strip ceiling systems were developed in Denmark and have won widespread acceptance in Europe.

National Gypsum Co.'s big news is the catalog of choice it offers the designer. It produces acoustical products made of mineral wool fibers, felted mineral wool, metal casing backed with sound absorbing pad, metal pans, perforated asbestos panels, coated wood fibers, cellulose fibers, and others. The choice of patterns and textures is equally wide.

Of particular appeal will be the line of Travacoustic tiles, which feature a random, fissured surface closely resembling travertine stone. Surface finishes include striated and sculptured patterns. The tiles are made of noncombustible mineral fibers, and a series is offered for ventilating ceiling systems.

Meet esthetic requirements

Owen-Corning Fiberglas Corp.'s acoustical products are geared to meet the most exacting design and esthetic requirements, and the most critical module dimensions. Ceiling materials are available in any rectangular size from 12 x 12 inch or 12 x 48 inch up to 2 x 8 feet, 4 x 4 feet, or 4 x 8 feet. An important feature is that any Fiberglas ceiling can be installed early, even before the building is closed in, and without waiting for ideal temperature and humidity conditions. Tile and ceiling board materials run the gamut of surface finish possibilities: fissured, striated, pinpointed, textured. Both painted and completely washable vinyl-finished surfaces are offered for most ceiling products.

Other sound control products made of Fiberglas include building insulation for noise barriers between floors and partitions.

Pittsburgh Corning Corp. has been

getting a lot of news mileage out of the Geocoustic unit absorber, which is used in original designs but is primarily intended to correct acoustic deficiencies. It has been successfully used in restaurants, private clubs, hotel meeting rooms and auditoriums.

With the absorbers, sound problems can be corrected without making structural changes. Each unit is made of rigid open-celled glass foam 13½ inch square and 2 inches thick. Integral spacers hold them slightly away from the wall or ceiling to create the effect of a resonant chamber for improved efficiency; or they can be adhered to walls and ceilings with acoustic cement. A "patch" spacing technique is recommended.

Expressive design possibilities

Simpson Timber Co. holds out expressive design possibilities with its acoustical materials. Pyrotect Linear acoustical board, a long strip that comes in 12 inch widths and lengths from 47³/₄ inches to 8 feet, permits clean sweeping lines from wall to wall. The material is made from wood fibers factory impregnated with permanent fire retardant chemicals.

Another design possibility is offered with a redwood exposed grid system, suspended from ceiling joists by hanger straps to form a 2×2 foot or 2×4 foot module. Runners can be left natural or stained or even painted to blend with any decorating scheme.

United States Gypsum Co.'s hallmark is choice, one of the widest in the industry. In the Acoustone mineral tile line, a mere recital of product names will suggest the range of patterns and surface textures available: Glacier, Finesse, Domino, Cadence Striated, Fantasia, Checkmate, Harlequin. The range is from the straightforward to the fanciful to the elegant and back again. For the unusually demanding designer, custom patterns and sizes will be produced to meet individual requirements.

The fire-rated characteristics of these products are excellent, and airventilating ceiling systems are available.


Wood Conversion Co. also stresses an unlimited array of acoustical products that offer expression in design as well. One may prove especially fascinating to the geometrically oriented designer: the line of Mozaitex sculptured panels for walls and ceilings. These 12 x 12 inch tiles, in deepsculptured contemporary patterns, come in three designs - Tuscon, Doric and Ionic - and since the profiles of the four sides of each design are exactly matched, different patterns may be combined in any sequence. 



THE WESTERN CONTRACT MARKET

BY LOUIS BING

FURNITURE trade in the West is booming-but the contract furniture field there is bursting its seams. Almost forgotten are the days when specialized contract needs were filled largely by trained salesmen of one supply firm in the West, supplemented by decorator-contract sales departments of the leading department stores, and occasional large scale furniture stores. Today there are many specialists in the contract field-with a dazzling and often incoherent crossing of service lines. A standard method of distribution on contract selling has developed over the years, however, a sort of "par for the course," although with the expected number of deviations.

The standard procedure is roughly: from architect, designer, or the newer "space planner," to contract purchasing agent, to factory production, to installer on the job, to acceptance by the customer, who has separately made his financing arrangements. The principal customers for contract use are: hotels, and motels, public institutions, banks, and other large scale offices, ships, country clubs, hospitals, and dormitories. Government purchasing is a separate category with its own rules and traditions.

Architects often obtain contract orders as a result of their assignments on large scale projects, mainly hotels and motels, and their familiarity with the job before other professionals are called in. They serve as consultants on a fee basis, according to the following average breakdown:

New large scale jobs: 7% of furniture purchase price

Smaller new jobs: 10%

Large remodeling jobs: 15%

Small remodeling jobs: 20%

Jobs over \$1,000,000 at cost, command smaller fees. However, some large-scale contract agents employ their own architects, or architects may enter the market as their own purchasing agents, buying directly from manufacturers or their representatives.

Contract houses do entire job

Contract houses, some of huge size and importance in the trade, include Western Contract Furnishers, based in San Francisco, and Albert Parvin & Co., a subsidiary of Parvin-Dohrmann Co. with home offices in Los Angeles. These companies are equipped to de-

sign large, medium, or small projects, to do the actual buying of the furnishings which are then delivered by the factories direct to the site, where professional installation companies do the physical moving and placing of all furnishings. Except for financing, these large contract companies do the entire furnishing job.

Western Contract Furnishers is a relatively new company (12 years old) with a large central office and showroom in San Francisco, and branches in Oakland, Honolulu, San Jose, and more recently in Los Angeles. The firm employs 32 sales personnel in the San Francisco branch alone, including seven who are NSID or AID members. In furniture, Western buys principally from manufacturers who specialize in contract production-American of Martinsville, Kent-Coffey, Stanley, Heywood-Wakefield, Vista of Los Angeles, Costa Mesa of Anaheim, to mention a few. Its sales comprise furniture, rugs, fabrics, electrical appliances, wall decor, lamps, and the firm's showroom in San Francisco is a full scale display of furnishings.

Albert Parvin & Co. maintains a large showroom in Los Angeles and its salesmen operate throughout the West, competing in every marketing center. Many large hotels in the area, extending to Las Vegas, are Parvin decorated installations, as well as restaurants, banks, and other large institutions throughout the U.S. The Dohrmann Hotel Supply division, Burlingame, Calif., is a very large manufacturing operation, making steel restaurant and commercial kitchen equipment, with huge display space for a complete line of restaurant and public feeding equipment. A facility of any size can be serviced there, or in one of Dohrmann's 20 stores throughout the West with salesmen in other western cities.

Western and Parvin/Dohrmann represent the giants of the contract field in the West, but there are also wellestablished smaller contract sellers that function in a variety of ways. They may operate as full agents, coordinators or brokers to pick up jobs at small fees and commissions.

Retail furniture stores are not completely eliminated from contract selling—some in fact go after contracts aggressively. Among them are Breuner's of Northern California, Barker Bros. in the south, Lachman's of San HOW THE COMMERCIAL/INSTITUTIONAL SPECIALISTS OPERATE IN A MARKET WHICH HAS BURST ITS SEAMS IN THE PAST TEN YEARS

Francisco, Lloyd Center Furniture Co. of Portland who operates a special contract division, Aaron Schultz Furniture Co. of Long Beach, C. S. Wo of Hawaii which also manufactures a line of living room and case goods, and a number of other smaller retailers. This latter group often gets contracts by accident or from "captive" customers in their locale, where they are associated with the purchasers. Smaller retailers participate in contract selling on occasion through the furnishing of an installation for a fee on jobs sold through other channels. Many, however, do not wish to get involved with contract business in any manner since the markup is uniformly low and the jobs are time-consuming.

Important buying group

Chain hotel operators comprise an important group of buyers, either under their own names, or through affiliated, wholely-owned subsidiary companies. Hilton Hotels, Sheraton, Western Hotels, Del, Webb, Holiday Inns, Travelodge and Motelodge, and others act on their own account and buy competitively.

Where does all the furniture going into these jobs come from? Factories that specialize in contract production gain strength through their versatility and ability to take small cuttings for prompt shipments. Vista Furniture Co. of Anaheim, for example, is so identified with contract trade that they have a public, as well as a private "contract" entrance to their showrooms at the Western Merchandise Mart. Vista operates on cuttings as low as 50 or 60 units and is frankly a contract supplier. Furniture Guild of Los Angeles is also an important resource for contract goods, although it still supplies to the retail trade. B. P. Johns of Portland, Ore., has been eager for this business and has offered special contract suites for the past three years.

Manufacturer's representatives who offer special contract lines through their showrooms are another important link in the contract sales field. In San Francisco, Tony Dedier Co. is a contract specialist with many lines. In Los Angeles, Halperin & Morrison as well as R. A. McCort are firmly established in this area.

Installation has become a business in itself, and in California certain instal-

lation trades require a license from the State Board of Contractors.

Freight, which is not part of installation, averages 5 percent on most jobs; installation on the Sheraton Hotel in Boston, for example, cost \$65,000 for 1000 rooms, a substantial cost consideration.

Specialists in the field

There are still other types of distribution in the Western contract field. M & L Furniture Co. of San Jose, for example, specializes in furnishing model homes on a contract basis, and actually warehouses enough merchandise to supply a large scale business. Furniture leasing is a relatively new type of contract selling with a tricky penalty under the Internal Revenue Bureau if the amortization is not handled correctly.

The Simmons Co. is an example of a specialized situation. Simmons' contract department on the fourth floor of the Western Merchandise Mart serves the entire Western division, and functions in four main sections. Its hospital supply department can equip an entire hospital and has such giants as American Hospital Supply Co., Western Surgical Co., and others as its main customers. Simmons sells big hotel chains directly; and another section services the U. S. Government, which is sold both through a full time Washington D. C. salesman or the Western division.


In contract furniture sales, as in the rest of the furniture world, styles are changing quickly. The standard utility furniture that was supplied to hotels from 1945 to 1960 no longer pleases the traveler, nor do the severe lines of Scandinavian styles. Now the main trend in the West is Mediterranean design, though Oriental, French Provincial, Victorian decor are still popular. They all represent a trend away from mass production and many manufacturers have difficulty in adjusting to the new, more complicated trends.

New International Design Center

The creation of the New International Contract & Home Design Center in San Francisco, set for 1966-7, is an interesting development on the coast. Here, in a building adjoining the Western Merchandise Mart, will be tenants at all levels of the furnishing field-manufacturers, designers, contract sellers, manufacturers' representatives of national lines, service companies. The expectation is that as they learn to live under one roof and to adjust their sales to new competitive channels, they will adjust to the marketing practices of the contract furniture industry of the West.
