Rebuttal on "Professional Jealousies" · Corrected by Correctional · Apologies to LeFort

Dear Sir: We read with interest Lawrence Lerner's articulate article in your July issue expressing the point-of-view of an "interior specialist" on the subject of architecture. Certainly there must be general agreement with the thesis that "there is a serious fallacy in the dictatorship of the arbitrarily beautiful exterior." This is particularly true when this exterior decorating, as practiced by certain architects whom Lerner knows, conflicts to an excessive degree with interior functional efficiency.

The suggested remedy to this failing in architectural design is also stated in strong simple terms: the architect should consult with the interior planner "before he commits himself to his beautiful exterior."

Tomorrow we're sure to open another journal and read an equally cogent article written by one of the other "specialists" telling us that the ills of contemporary architecture will be cured if the architect will follow the advice of the air conditioning engineer, or the structural engineer, or the accustical consultant.

Of course, the architect must listen to all of the consultants and then weigh and balance their requirements to achieve an integrated "series of systems" greater than the sum of its parts. Any individual part will be compromised to a certain degree by the other parts. In the best of buildings any one of the "specialists" will be able to criticize the compromises in his particular system. Although the degree of variance from the virtually unattainable perfection of each separate element can undoubtedly be used as one of the criteria for judging the quality of the architecture, all of the elements must be analyzed.

One of the elements of architecture that many of the more myopic "specialists" fail to understand or appreciate is the relationship of the building to its external surroundings (the "arbitrarily beautiful exterior"). A building has an obligation not only to its prospective users but also to the neighborhood to the city of which it is a part. Does Lerner really believe that a typical speculative New York City office building, with its relative flexibility of interior layout and

design, is architecturally superior to a Seagram Building, with its dictatorial periperal lighting system, rigid structural module, and uniform window treatment restrictions?



OUR WASHINGTON REPORT:

- Viet Nam spurs government spending
- Invitations for bids; awards

THE Capital this season contains many feelings of pessimistic inevitabilities, centered about growing prosperity with growing pains, international actions, and internal indecisions. However, the contract industry in its business concerns seems certain to escape the chafing and the chills that are besetting other elements of our political economy.

If the Viet Nam war continues—and continuation appears to mean escalation—Federal demands for contract products and services will grow. Military facilities need to be furbished and refurbished; the Defense establishment expands. Witnesses to this are the growth of activity by the Defense General Supply Center, and by the Far West procurement offices that funnel goods to the Orient, as we've been reporting.

On the other and at this time apparently paralytic hand, if the war were to lessen or stop, the expenditure of billions that is now being poured into it would not cease to be. The pressures for spending billions on urban problems would multiply: Not only would the cities and the equal rights forces clamor for this, but so would the economy's planners and projectionists. Here is an area to outpace space—and renovation and restoration means both the growth of agencies and the new enlivenment of cities.


The consequences for the contract executive can only be heartening. If, eventually, businesses will be moving into the slum areas instead of moving out, and if the institutional campaign means opening of thousands of government offices across the United States in noncentralized and often converted footage, the contract industry will be gaining supplemental volume.

Agency actions

General Services Administration continues in effect a temporary requirement for compliance reports on equal opportunity in employment, from Federal contractors. Until present rules are revised by the Secretary of Labor, contractors are to continue using Standard Form 100, Equal Employment Opportunity Employer Information Report EEO-1.

Federal Trade Commission consent order bars Decorwood Corp. of America, Philadelphia, from using deceptive means to recruit franchised dealer-applica-



tors for its Decorwood wallcovering materials, such as claiming it maintains a resale service to help dealers, is nationally advertised, absorbs training costs, etc.

Census Bureau reports central office and auxiliary staffs in industry are growing. Such employees numbered just under one million in 1958, but totaled 1.2 million in the latest census taken in 1963.

Contract firms may benefit from the expanding Manpower Development and Training program. Recent projects include: W.H. Capell, Jr., Suffolk, Va., eight trainees for 26 weeks as apprentice-entry upholsterers and furniture frame makers. Walt's Cabinet Shop, Bismarck, N.D., one trainee, 26 weeks, apprenticeentry cabinet maker.

You can get the full set of regional marketing guides prepared by the Commerce Department, now. There are nine thin volumes of "Facts for Marketers," regional economic profiles, plus a volume on "Measuring Markets," describing the measurable characteristics and dimensions of a market, and listing the statistics you might find most valuable. The entire kit is \$3.50 from Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 20402.

Securities and Exchange Commission gets a registration filing from Ramada Inns, Inc., Phoenix motel franchiser, for \$10 million of convertible subordinated debentures, due 1986. Three-fourths of the funds will be used to provide funds for new motor hotels.

The hospital market would be greatly expanded if a new bill ever passed the Congress. Rep. Hosmer of California wants the Hill-Burton Act, which is administered by the Public Health Service, to be extended to include supporting facilities for health centers. This would make funds available to provide self-care rooms and dining facilities for ambulatory patients and for diagnostic patients, and housing and dining facilities for families of patients in hospitals or clinics.

Contract continuity

Those suppliers who have participated in Federa procurement seem to stay in, if the list of award winners is any indication. The biggest problem is getting started—deciding to enter the competition, being able and willing to risk the initial tool-up and preparatory costs to meet Federal specifications and requirements. In addition to the problems, and perhaps some compensation, you can be sure that Federal procurement will continue, for furniture and furnishings It is not a sometime or seasonal thing. This latest sam pling of invitations to bid gives the flavor of the potential. If you're interested, carry on with your neares Business Service Center office of the General Service Administration.

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

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

Cleveland Merchandise Mart Open for Business

The \$1,500,000 Cleveland Merchandise Mart, rapidly taking shape in the heart of the city, is ultimately expected by president/developer Dennie A. Barnes to be a "showplace and permanent trade show comparable in scope to the nation's major merchandise marts." Barnes acquired two dilapadated buildings on Cleveland's Prospect Avenue, joined them, and has completely remodeled the interior and exterior to provide 100 modern exhibit spaces for the permanent display of furnishings and accessories.

Several weeks before the official June 15 opening date, 29 manufacturing firms had leased more than 30,000 square feet of space, with an additional 15 companies negotiating for occupancy by the end of the summer when the first phase of the project will be completed. Of the lessees, 28 of the firms had never before maintained exhibit quarters in Cleveland. As the link between New York and Chicago, the new Mart is expected to attract many new companies to this midwest area.

A second phase of the project entails the complete remodeling of an adjoining structure, adding another 250 private showrooms to the exhibit spaces. The three-building complex will ultimately reach from Prospect Avenue on the north to E. 4th and High Street on the west and south. Developed privately and without the aid of civic funds, the new Mart has caused a flurry of other revitalizing activity in downtown Cleveland.

New School offers courses on architecture and planning

The New School for Social Research in Manhattan will offer a series of eight courses on architecture and planning through its Center for New York Affairs. Scheduled for the Fall 1966 term, the courses will center upon physical characteristics and historical background of the city, city planning, social and environmental aspects, housing rehabilitation, and factors that affect the development of a city, such as population, industrial revolution, and transportation.

Among the professionals engaged to conduct the sessions are Peter Blake of Architectural Forum who will explore "Architecture and Design in New York City," Elinor Guggenheimer,

member of the New York City Planning Commission, and Charles Abrams and Percival Goodman, both of the Columbia University School of Architecture, who will hold a special lecture series on the "Future of the Metropolis."

NSOEA Week in Chicago

The Merchandise Mart and the National Stationery & Office Equipment Association have joined forces to develop a unified approach to the annual convention in Chicago, and have designated September 26 through October 2 NSOEA Week in Chicago. The agreement means that the Merchandise Mart is now a formal part of the NSOEA Convention and that exhibits, special meetings, and the important Institute of Business Designers Symposium are scheduled concurrently at the Mart, McCormick Place, and Conrad Hilton Hotel. Two special features of the show are the introduction of new office furniture collections, and the Institute of Business Designers Symposium on September 28-29. Speakers for the symposium include a psychologist and lighting, display, and design experts. Sessions are scheduled in the Mart's M&M Club, from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. both days. Reservations can be made through NSOEA. Space 1143, Merchandise Mart, Chicago.

Contract carpet sales soar

Sources in the carpet field predicted during the Chicago furniture markets in June that by 1970, 50% of all carpet sales would be in the commercial/institutional field. Carpet sales were said to have increased from 5 to 25 percent in the first six months of 1966. Emphasis is being placed on the new synthetics, such as polypropylene and acrylics, but wool is making a strong comeback in the contract market.

Intercon I names 2 to new board

Intercon I, the international contract exposition and congress sponsored by the Merchandise Mart, Chicago, is moving ahead with the programming of its approximately 60 sessions scheduled for the event next March 20-22. Joining a growing list of professionals on the board of advisors are Charles M. Nes, Jr., FAIA, newly elected president of American Institute of Architects, and Dr. Harold B. Gores, president of Educational Facilities Labora-

tories, Inc., of the Ford Foundation. The board of advisors will be instrumental in the development and pres-

entation of the educational and informative sessions during Intercon I. Thus far, other members of the board include Bert C. Ahrens, executive secretary of National Association of Educational Buyers; Albert Christ-Janer, dean, Art School of Pratt Institute; Arthur Davis, AIA, member of esthetics committee, AIA; Clyde Dixon, president, Innkeepers Supply, Inc.; William Katavolos, chairman, industrial design department of Parsons Institute; Clarence Scheps, executive vice president, Tulane University and president of National Association of College & University Business Officers

Intercon I, which will combine both educational sessions and exhibits of contract merchandise, will be held at Merchandise Mart and McCormick Place in Chicago and will bring together the professions, industries, products, and purchasers involved in the international contract furnishings business.

New assignments

Western Contract Furnishers report a heavy design schedule, starting with the contract for design and furnishing of a new 11-story residence hall at the University of Santa Clara. A new 242room men's dormitory, Ben Swig Residence Hall, is the first high-rise on the campus and set for completion on September 1. The Carmel La Playa Hotel is also undergoing a refurbishing by Western, from public areas to its 80 guest rooms. Enlargement of dining and bar areas will be a feature of the project, where a Spanish atmosphere will prevail. . . . Leon Gordon Miller & Associates has been com-

missioned to plan and design the new corporate offices and operating facilities of Avis International, located in Garden City, Long Island, New York . . . Maxwell Co. has been engaged to redesign and refurnish portions of the Detroit-Leland Hotel under the terms of a \$350,000 contract with the management. The assignment calls for new furnishings for 329 units that the Detroit-Leland will operate on an apartment-leased basis. Maxwell also announced the design, supply, and installation of the Sheraton Sand Castle Inn, Sarasota, Fla., scheduled for completion November 1967. The project includes refurbishing the existing Inn, and a new 100 room addition, as well as convention facilities, dining room, coffee shop, and lobby. . . . Henry End Associates was recently commissioned by Columbia Development Corp., to design the interiors of the new 140room Columbia Inn motel located outside Baltimore, Md., with facilities for dining and banquet to accommodate 400 people. A second project, the design of a 300-room hotel at Atlanta's municipal airport will be based on the 1966 Room of Tomorrow that was a joint effort of Henry End and architect Morris Lapidus and a feature of the annual National Hotel-Motel Exposition. The new facility will incorporate convention space for 800, gourmet dining room, coffee shop, private club, swimming pool, and outdoor skating rink. Morris Lapidus Associates is the architect. . . . Corco, Inc., Chicagobased institutional interior design firm has been awarded the design and furnishing contract of a new \$1,500,000 men's dormitory at Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Ill.




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
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
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488 to 600/SLS makes its move



NEW OFFICES OF THIS MAJOR CONTRACT DESIGN FIRM NOT ONLY SYMBOLIZE ITS WORK BUT POINT THE WAY TO THE FUTURE ORIENTATION OF THE PROFESSION

AT Saphier, Lerner, Schindler, middle age is regarded as a state of mind rather than a count of years. The largest contract design organization in the country and certainly one of the most successful, SLS should be middle-aged in terms of the number of years it has been in business, but it has, quite contrarily, been kicking over the design traces for the past two decades. The newest move of its headquarters from Number 488 to Number 600 Madison Avenue in New York City, is proof positive that age, affluence, and accretion of personnel are not necessarily accompanied by stodginess or by a "safe" repetition of the thinking that went down well with clients the day before yesterday.

Instead, the new SLS offices are remarkably fresh. Their freshness is, of course, not that of the lucky novice, but that of a vigorous, imaginative design group at the height of its powers, capable of making optimum use of its broad experience. Although the new quarters at 600 Madison will undoubtedly serve as a "showcase of ideas" to present to the prospective client, it is much more than that. The offices represent a breakthrough in design principles as applied to the special set of conditions under which SLS conducts its business. Its design is a thoroughly integrated performance, in other words, organized in terms of a working environment, rather than as a presentation case devised with one eye cocked on a likely client. Visually, the offices are quite splendid, constituting a varied, flexible workspace that is inevitably the envy of those employed elsewhere.


SLS moved for none of the classic reasons, according to Lawrence Lerner, president. The firm could have solved its

expansion problems by renting contiguous space at 488 Madison, where the offices it had occupied for six vears had been strikingly successful premises, witnessing the birth of its branch operations in San Francisco, Boston, and Chicago and the maturation of its Los Angeles office. Out of a conviction, however, that the vitality of a design organization is bound up with and stimulated by changes, experimentation, and improvement of its own environment, SLS rejected the idea of annexing space within the same building. The problem then became how to "start clean" in another location. The offices which the firm wanted to leave represented an investment of \$12 per square foot, an expenditure which Lerner states takes more than six years to absorb. The first task became to find a company which would recognize the worth of the premises at 488 and deem it worthwhile to buy them lock, stock, and barrel and to compensate SLS at least in part for its extensive investment. Fortunately, a corporation that wanted the old offices "as is" was found, enabling SLS to design its new headquarters from the walls outward, with no burden of old furniture or equipment to drag along.


Several characteristics of the new offices at 600 Madison are highly creative innovations; the knowing eye will recognize them in the photos on these pages. Verbally, one might call them an important essay in a new dynamics of office design, in which all personnel is housed in minimally shielded work stations that are continually enlivened by the excitement of color, lighting, and kinetic sensations, carefully calibrated and set one against the other so they act as stimuli rather than as potentially confusing elements. Interestingly enough, this principle of innervation is carried out consistently, in the executive offices to the same degree as in the secretarial stations. The environment contributes positively and creatively to the interrelations of personnel and to the work to be done. This feeling of open linkage within the suite of offices is thoughtfully carried out, to its deepest interior as well as to its surroundings inside and outside of the building. There is interacton and a democratization of design that avoids the two poles of isolation and indiscretion. "We believe in using design itself," says Lerner, "to instill a sense of pride in every individual and a conviction that he is an important member of an effective team, no matter what phase or level of work he-or she-is engaged in." Thus, the same creativity and care have been

lavished on the design and construction of the secretarial island as on the executive offices.

The basic technique by which these objectives were achieved involved adapting the bare space to the needs of the SLS working team, rather than succumbing to it and winding up with the conventional arrangement that preempts the perimeter and its windows for the top brass and leaves everyone else in the bland lacklustre light habitually found in general offices. By eliminating opaque divider walls wherever possible and substituting ceiling-high glass panels as successive "set-back" space dividers, transmission of sound is inhibited while the transmission of light is maximized.

Executive offices

In the offices of the three senior officers—Michael Saphier, chairman; Lawrence Lerner, president; Bernard Schindler, vice president—a number of experiments have been carried out. Schindler, who is an engineer, works with drawing board, reference library, and a lot of loose papers. At the same time, he requires a place where he can meet and confer with groups of people for several hours at a time. His office has been cut to fit, so to speak, by means of a "rolltop" work area; a wall of English brown oak rolls up vertically at the touch of a

switch to reveal the work area, and comes down just as quickly when the "talk" space is to be used for a conference.

Saphier's office is deliberately casual, unobtrusively offering its occupant a choice of working stations, plus two "talk" postures, one in a swivel chair, the other in lounge-level seats disposed around a table. Lerner's office, similarly, avoids conventional confrontations. There are no pull-up or conference chairs in the room, only informal and well-upholstered pieces. Instead of a desk, there is a control console which Lerner designed (see pp. 78-79). This is set atop a post-mounted floating island that serves simultaneously as desk, table, file cabinet and communications center. A ceiling panel conceals a screen that drops down for viewing motion pictures or slides. Storage areas contain an amazing volume of reports, client presentations, lecture materials, etc., yet they are so inconspicuous that one is surprised at the huge library they reveal when opened.


Executive secretarial island

The four-unit executive secretarial pool contains notable refinements on work stations of this type. There are continuous electrical connections, a continuous telephone raceway, built-in files, typewriter stands, and spe-











Floor-to-ceiling panels of Acoustapane completely enclose the office of SLS production supervisors (above). The specially designed desks feature cubbyhole storage bins for plans and tilt-top desk surfaces, which adjust for drafting. Doors and plank flooring are oak, one of many varieties of wood used throughout the premises. Acoustically treated glass is again used to form enclosures for work stations of client contact men (above right). These executives spend most of the day outside the office, and while space is modest, the fixtures and acoustic privacy denote status. Executive corridor (far left, opposite) is walled with glass and rosewood; the batten expanse to the left shields the executive secretarial work area. Presentation panels form a divider in client room, setting off the formal design presentation portion of the room (bottom right) from budget review conference area (near left, opposite). Space-age softs provide unusual yet luxurious seating. The ceiling, composed of a series of ash wood baffles, tapers downward toward the center of the room. Presentation panels are center-pivoted and swing about for checking individual items during sessions. Of unusual design is the conference table, an SLS original. Details (two small center photos) reveal solid ash base and radically pieced top surface.


Office of SLS president Lawrence Lerner (right) is dominated by a custom-designed desk/table/file (see also sketch below). It incorporates a polished-aluminum communications panel, which also contains controls for the extraordinary lighting of the room: note the huge, vertically hung cylindrical fixture and tiny exposed bulbs that stud the dropped wood ceiling. Green Tulip chairs contrast with a vibrant blue carpet inlaid in white marble flooring; the window counter is rosewood and glass. By drawing back the vertical blinds of the office, the production secretaries' oak-framed work stations, and just beyond the design department cubicles, are viewed (top left), illustrating the visual continuity stressed throughout the office. Storage wall in Lerner's office (lower left) has built-in drafting table. The trio of insets shows desk construction, with top tilted back to hold large drawings, and two detai's of storage wall.











SLS chairman Michael Saphier occupies a large, glass-walled office (right), muted in color and highly textured: couch upholstery is velvet, side chairs are suede, cantilevered armchairs are rattan and chrome. Teak is the choice of wood, and cabinetry along the rear wall provides a mounting for telephones as well as storage and drawer space. A panel swings down to form a writing plane, the closest concession Saphier makes to the standard office desk. Cartoons mounted on the window wall panel are those Saphier contributed to New Yorker Magazine as a young free-lancer.


cialized storage spaces. Here again, the area is visually open but glassenclosed for acoustic privacy.

In the space planning department, a vertical light wall directly lights the work through filtered glass, instead of the conventional overhead lighting that throws light downward onto the work station. An important innovation in the production department are the "pews" incorporated in the secretarial areas. Project directors use these to dictate to the secretaries, who remain at their stations (see cut opposite page).

Although custom-designed furniture is the rule rather than the exception throughout the new SLS offices, it is at its most dramatic in the client presentation and reception areas. A twenty-first century look is deliberately cultivated in the luxurious low-slung seating-individualized. heavily upholstered equipped with built-in tape recorders and audio-visual controls. The special table in the conference room, its form roughly that of an inverted cone, is built up of strata of carefully matched woods and topped by pieshaped matched grains (see p. 77). The panels between the reception and presentation areas provide not only a mounting for renderings, photos, and swatches, but act as a room divider as well.

Representing a major investment, the SLS offices reflect a confidence in the present and future of contract design that is hardly misplaced. From a three-man operation in 1948, with smallish commissions in product, exhibit and space design, SLS has grown into an organization with five fully staffed offices in this country. Its clients include major corporations of the "blue-chip" variety, and it specifies millions of dollars worth of contract furnishings and equipment every year-in the past twelve months more than \$25 million worth. Its most recent major assignment is the planning and design of the world headquarters of COMSAT in Washington, D.C. These offices will not only house the administrative core of this quasi-governmental agency, but will oversee the control centers where communications satellites are launched and their orbital flights channeled. The firm's new Manhattan offices are, like COMSAT itself, a symbol of the new directions that contract design will take-B.H.H.

Since SLS senior VP Bernard Schindler travels extensively, his New York office (below) has been designed to serve as an auxiliary conference room in his absence. The walnut wall (lower right) closes off the actual desk area; when activated by a keyed mechanism, the wall rises and swings back, much like a garage door, to become the ceiling in the work portion of the room. Opposite page: Executive secretarial "island" (top) is framed by glass panels; rosewood battens set at intervals provide a corridor facade. Rear wall of private office (center) is glass from a five-foot height to the ceiling, providing a view of space planning department just beyond. Production secretaries' work stations (lower left) have built-in dictation seating. Conference room (lower right) is used for informal meetings with clients and business associates.

DFB DESIGNS CRISP SHOWROOMS FOR TWO POPULAR AUTOS





Today's automobiles are comfortable, powerful, and the most accessible forms of transportation in history. Although they contain luxury features, cars are no longer a luxury item, but have become a necessity to most people. An automotive showroom should exhibit these qualities, reflecting the power of the car without letting the customer forget its luxury and comfort features. In its designing of the new showrooms of Luby Chevrolet and Volkswagen Fifth Avenue Motors, Designs for Business, Inc. strikingly conveys these features with soft outdoor details that brighten the showroom and exhibit the cars in their natural settings. The outdoor motif is supplied by numerous plants and trees, extensive tract lighting for a bright sunlit effect in all weather, and striking accent colors on desks and chairs.

Floating islands, tinted glass-enclosed offices which allow the customer a clear view of the cars at all times, give the room an open airy feeling. Smooth surfaces reflect light onto the chrome and mirrors of the cars, heightening the shiny new look that is so popular in today's automobiles.

Although a single theme unites both showrooms, each contains distinctive design details that reflect the public image of each car. At Volkswagen, the room has been kept as trim and spartan as the automobile and its advertising. Since many of the cars sold here are delivered in Europe, an international motif was adopted, highlighted by the stylized maps on the windows and marble-like Italian hexagon unglazed quarry tile. The hexagon shape is repeated in the large floating island in the center of the room that serves as the sales manager's office. The room also features built-in furniture by Ezra Blank Associates, to give the customer a clear, unobstructed view of the vehicles on display.


In the Chevrolet showroom, the floating islands, located along the perimeter of the room in a simple rectangular design, contribute to the long modern look of the cars. The contemporary look is picked up in the Lightolier suspended glass globe lights, and the brightly colored Knoll chairs and Peerless desks. (C)

LIBRARIES FOR SATELLITE CAMPUSES

THE University of California, reportedly the nation's largest educational facility, continues to spread a network of satellite campuses across the state. With an anticipated total enrollment of 108,300 by 1970, the university is already planning the facilities to contain the flood of students entering the university at an unprecedented rate. At San Diego, it opened its First College of which the new Library-Humanities building holds the key position in the formation of a campus quadrangle still to be built. Eleven more colleges are planned for U.C.S.D. to be erected one every two-and-ahalf years for the next 27 years at a development cost of approximately \$400 million. Construction of the Second College got underway this year as the second phase in the development of the 1,000-acre campus community.

Architectural firm Deems, Lewis, Martin & Associates of San Diego plotted the Library-Humanities building with the knowledge that its function may someday be changed to a departmental library or to a classroom building. The three-story structure provides for library, study areas, class-

rooms, staff and administrative offices, and special departmental services rendered by the library, and includes a "temporary" 250-seat lecture hall on the second level. Though it was not anticipated in the original design plans, the architect was able to incorporate additional classrooms and study spaces in the basement area to further increase the building's flexibility. Interior design, furnishings, coordination of color, textures, and graphics on the three story structure was the work of the architect.

Though current enrollment at U.C.S.D. is less than 1,000, its capacity will ultimately reach 27,500 students. In accordance with this long-range view, provision was made for additional floor space over its central library hall on the mezzanine level.

The Irvine campus of the University of California is no less foresighted than its sister branch in San Diego. Planned by architect William Leonard Periera, the campus is the heart of Irvine Ranch, one of the biggest private development projects in the world. It calls for a 1,000-acre campus linked to a university city within a mile of hotels, shops, restaurants, housing on

all income levels, churches, and recreation centers that will occupy 93,000 acres of open land adjoining the southern edge of Los Angeles.

At the San Diego library, the central hall is arranged in a series of bookstack groupings that divides the interior spaces into quiet study and work stations immediately adjacent to the shelves. Using segmented table tops on component legs, the tables provide seating for six and eight students a each reading table, while its design allows free access even for students seated at the ends. Study carrels are used singly, back-to-back, and as carousel arrangements by a special rigging of "half legs." Upholstered modular seating provides lounging areas for quiet browsing in the magazine and reference book sections.

At Irvine, segmented and standard tables are used in the general reading area and in private conference and study rooms which line the building's perimeter. Here again, the special study carrels, either singly or grouped, are arranged next to and behind bookstacks and along windows.

Both the San Diego and Irvine library facilities were furnished with









new library group developed by Herman Miller Inc. around a flexibility principle that reiterates that of the architectural planning. Herman Miller Inc. has pioneered in the experimentation of furniture for educational use: it developed the improved seating designs for the Rensselaer Experimental Classroom and adapted the seating for Chicago's Circle Campus. Its new library group includes a basic inventory of library furniture coupled with components that combine to create specialized furniture geared to the individual library layout.

The new library group shows the strong influence of Herman Miller's Action Office series in its design features. The design of the cast aluminum legs, seen also on Action Office pieces, permits easy entry and exit from tables besides being esthetically pleasing. Work surfaces of the study carrels are sloped to a natural writing angle with an 8-inch shelf above to hold books and study materials. Another innovation is the double-shelved card catalog stands that allow both stand-up and sit-down card reference and are equipped with built-in card holders under the table edge.

DOOR HARDWARE

UNEVENLY STUDIED, THIS FIELD OF DETAILING IS A MELANGE OF PAINSTAKINGLY DESIGNED CUSTOM WORK AND IMPROPER SPECIFICATIONS. BY ROBERT MALONE

HARDWARE for the door is possibly the most unevenly studied subject in contemporary architectural and interior design. That is, the amount of attention given to it by different responsible people at different stages is probably more inconsistent than any other. Certain aspects of door hardware (such as the lockset) have been analyzed and reworked until they are remarkably reliable, while certain other aspects (such as hinges) have stayed almost the same for hundreds of years, and only recently have begun to be re-examined.

At the other end of the purchase, some architects and designers have designed their own door handles and coat hooks in order to get exactly what they need; while others pay so little attention to this detail that the fittings may actually arrive late enough to delay occupancy, or have to be installed hastily and without adequate supervision. All too often we find, even in major installations, doors whose throw-bolts just miss the box strike. In others, we find hardware improperly specified in the first place: it is far from unheard of to find heavy 11/2 inch or thicker solid-core doors hung on minimum standard 3 inch hinges, or light hollow-core doors used with heavy decorative hardware. This last error is a particularly unnerving one to experience, because the door swings with the wrong momentum and closes with the wrong sound.


Clearly, a mechanism used as constantly as a door needs to be looked at critically by someone who is aware of more than the style of the hardware. Anyone who has ever hung a door himself develops a respect for the integrity of the hardware and for its proper positioning and securing: the alternative to accuracy is the chronic headache of unbalanced swings, unlatchable latches, squeaking hinges, or warping and jamming. It is up to the architect and the designer to insist that the contractor keep to certain standards of workmanship, in order to assure that whatever door and hardware is chosen will be used to the best effect.

The greatest spacing between door and frame belongs at the bottom: approximately 5/8 inch, depending somewhat on floor and sill conditions. The narrowest space should be on the hinge side: two recessed hinges or butts along a 1/32 inch seam between door and frame is standard for interior doors. Both the top and the latch side of the door should leave 1/16 inch between door and frame, or slightly more on the latch side, measured at the acute angle of the bevel. It might be added at this point that door warpage is often a consequence of bad hinge placement rather than of poor door construction. Three hinges, accurately placed, can act as insurance against most warping problems

Another set of items to consider early in the design process, before going on to the questions of access, security, and appearance, is the auxiliary hardware. If closers, letter slots, stops, bumpers, holders, or hooks are to be used, now is the time to consider them, not after the door is in use and they have been discovered to be necessary. Spacing and positioning of these items should be part of the whole door design, not applied afterward. Afterthoughts always look it. It should be remembered, especially if a door opens directly against a right-angled wall, that knobs extend from 21/2 to 3 inches (or more for highly decorative arrangements) and should not be allowed to strike the wall or to interfere with holding devices, which must be placed with reference to this measurement.

Hidden door controls

In regard to door closers, it may be remembered that not so many years ago, the most positively ugly object in the designer's world was the closer control valve. A formidable casting sticking out from the top of the door, it had all the grotesqueness of the gargoyle with none of the charm, and it destroyed many good solutions for interior design. Today, with certain types of doors (metal ones particularly) it is possible to put the control, except for the




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
extensor arm, inside the door. Most of the closers that remain outside have been simplified to the point where they are quite acceptable. Of course, in the case of metal and glass doors, engineering has developed a number of solutions for hidden control, opening and closing, and even remote control. Very recently, sliding doors have been made automatic as well. There seems to be a great future in the possibilities of the automatic and controlled door.

Such apparently stable devices as coat hooks should be considered dynamic rather than static. Their shape and structure have an effect not only on the eye of the beholder, but on their capacity for service. Hooks should not twist, sag, or give way from metal fatigue because of improper design. Neither should they deform the garments hung on them, nor allow them to slide off. When specifying such items it is helpful to look at some that have been in service for a time, and see what the effects of use are. White metal hooks will break off short when swung on; and schools, among other places, seem to contain large numbers of swingers.

Letter slots are another item to be tried as well as looked at. These also are operating mechanisms, not just styling points. A letter slot that gives off a tinny clink or a jarring clank, rather than a solid clunk, is bad business.








When considering the type of opening and closing devices for doors, the architect or designer will find a wide range of controls offered by the industry. There are not only knobs, but levers, bars, pulls, push plates, and dummy trim, which does not operate a latch. Each of these devices has an appropriate height on the door face, which is more or less standardized, so that it is a surprise to find one misplaced; but it does happen. Measuring from the center of the control device, it has been found best for knobs and levers to be placed at a height

over its lifetime.

Fortunately, within the engineering of the lockset itself, real progress has been made. It is now possible to get locksets that can be uniformly counted on not to wobble, loosen, and twist. Knobs retain their capacity to function remarkably well nowadays. (For some reason, the loose and rotating rose plate is still a problem here and there: presumably a way will soon be found to install these permanently tight.) The responsible specifier can help to encourage such good engineering by specifying quality hardware, and thus help to discourage, in turn, the makers of substandard fittings, who sell on the basis of first cost alone.

Improvements of inner parts

Most of the internal parts of standard lock and latch sets are now cold rolled and pressed steel, in contrast to the die-cast cases and cylinders of earlier days; this means not only longer service and smoother action, but also greater security, since some diecast parts are vulnerable to external shock and to compressive forces. A further improvement, as regards both security and durability, is the plating of the steel to resist rust and corrosion, and the use of nylon bearing points to minimize wear. Many of the throw bolts now available throw a full 5% inch which not only increases security but extends the life of the mechanism, since the extra length can partly compensate for door warpage

of 34 to 38 inches from the floor, for horizontal push bars to be placed at approximately 45 inches, pull handles and bars at about 42 inches, and push plates at 50 inches. The one control position that hasn't yet been solved is that of the so-called panic bar, which is generally placed at the same height as the latch it is intended to release, and therefore at the same height as a knob. These bars are so often used at school exits that it should be pointed out that a tenyear-old child has been known to go right through a glass plate in a door because he charged it at a height where it is natural to push a heavy door: not at knob level, but a foot higher. Signs about not running in the corridors don't help; but a redesigned panic bar certainly would. The point to remember is that pulling force is exerted best just above waist level, while pushing force is most effective just below shoulder level. As far as the choice of control types is concerned, the standards of the industry have made it possible to choose a control for its function and style alone, without having to worry about relative quality of performance.

Another place where the industry is now making strides is in the number and variety of hinging devices. Available today are not only a wide range of standard single-swing hinges, but also slim silhouette and invisible hinges, double-swing hinges of several kinds, emergency hinges that reverse their swing under pressure such as Hager's 400s, and ingenious doubleacting door pivots. There is even a good hinge with a built-in door-closer action by Towne. However, we are a long way from having explored all the possibilities, and a long way from integral, one - piece, weather - tight hinges that get stronger with use as polypropylene does.

As the largest single hardware item, locksets also constitute the widest range in terms of selection. The industry has put a great deal of thought and ingenuity into the problem of providing the exact latching and locking capacities required for a wide variety of uses. In addition to the usual domestic builders' hardware, there are in most manufacturers' lines a full range of hotel, motel, school, and hospital types of lock and latch combinations. However, the range varies somewhat from maker to maker, and in ordering a specific and complex set


of capacities it is advisable to work well in advance.


Although there are upwards of thirty possible variations on latching and locking capacity, the basic types break down more or less into two categories: free access latches, such as "passage door" latches, ball latches, and magnetic holders, which are always openable from either side; and limited access latches. These latter range from the familiar "privacy lock," which prevents nothing except the unintentional invasion of privacy, through school "classroom and closet" locks which can lock people out but not in, and "patio" and "non-lockout" locks that unlock themselves automatically if the door is opened and closed, all the way to "asylum" type locksets with rigid knobs on both sides, opened only by key from either side. The problem of maximum security has been dealt with by specially guarded deadlocks and mortise locks, and in the case of Sargent & Company, by a newly patented keying system which prevents the duplication of keys by any usual method. Duplicate keys can be obtained only from the factory itself, and only by authorized persons such as the building owner.


Variations for special needs

There are refinements and variations to allow for special needs such as occupancy indicators or emergency exits, and the industry has made an effort to standardize the nomenclature of the different capacities in order to reduce confusion. (It is very nearly possible to specify lockset capacities merely by describing the function of the door in question; but not quite. It will be helpful when the names and descriptions are fully standardized.) One might say that the functional problems of latching and locking devices are being met with progressively greater success.

It would be pleasant to be able to say that the esthetic aspects of latch-lock-and-knob sets are being improved with equal success, but that is unfortunately not true. It would be true to say that there is a growing recognition of design in the hardware industry as a whole. The shapes of door knobs and roses are being looked at with a decorator's eye, and altered accordingly. Each year has seen an increased assortment of available finishes and colors, as well as styles, that would have astonished even so



inventive a designer-architect as Louis Sullivan.

The industry has much to be proud of in its attention to finishing possibilities, to the new use of new materials, and to what seems to be the beginning of a more catholic approach to the question of style. There is not only a greater variety of hardware for modern structures, in simple, bold forms, but also a new and very wide selection of historical reproduction pieces, and some highly individualized patterns with a hand-wrought look, the craft approach.

Plastics are no longer used for bearing alone, but emerge as delrin knobs and vinyl laminates for knob and rose faces. The standard metals, aluminum, steel, bronze, and brass, are offered in bright, rubbed, and satin finishes, and Sargent offers fire-glazed copper. There are, in addition, varieties of wrought iron, brushed chrome, silver. and 24-carat gold plate to satisfy the most unusual taste, and ceramic (by Towne), plastic, glass, mosaic inlay, and pressed wood as well. One can specify door hardware to match nearly every period recognized by the trade, including our own, and keyed to a rather wide range of other interior hardware such as switch plates, towel racks, etc. There seems to be a constant increase of items to choose from: but this has not yet gone so far as to shut off the creative architect who wants to design his own hardware for some particular project.

Many of the knobs and levers offered can be had with a choice of alternate roses or escutcheons, or with none at all; some of the lever and roseless trim combinations give a very clean look to a usually rather cluttered place on a door. It is to the credit of the industry that it can offer this kind of possibility and also offer the ultimate in rococo for those who want it, as well as the standard range of knobs. This range seems to cover a fairly good assortment of styles in each manufacturer's line, but from maker to maker, the standard assortment remains pretty much the same. I think designers and architects would agree that the richness of variation in finish and ornamentation leaves something to be desired in the range of basic forms and structures.

It seems, for instance, that most large manufacturers now have standard knobs with concave front faces (which catch the light and give a decided and clear form definition). This shape has almost reached the proportion of a design cliché, despite the fact that it may have seemed a welcome change from the round or near-round knob, or-if you can remember-the faceted glass knob of yesteryear. Industry spokesmen will point out that there are decided advantages to the concavity on the front of the knob: it sets off the key or latch location, and adds considerable strength along the edge of the indentation. Without wanting to ask for more form variety for its own sake, we have to wonder whether other forms just as suitable aren't equally attractive and functional. There must be a multitude of possibilities between the lever and the knob (and Yale has introduced a cast design line combining these two forms), and between the ball knob and the cylindrical knob. The lever itself has had a refreshing rejuvenation, and can now be had in a wide variety of styles to suit both the contemporary and the antiquarian taste.

But many of these new designs have been designed first for the eye, and only second for the hand; and since the eye becomes rapidly unconscious of so ubiquitous an object, while the hand encounters it directly many times a day, it might have seemed almost better if the designer had worked blindfolded on the knobs for a while, before being allowed to look at them. The old-fashioned squashed-ball knob is still a reasonable solution to the problem of the graspable turn handle, as far as feel goes, and it is the sense of touch which is affected most often and longest by the door knob. Some of the newer solutions, while they have the advantage of looking modern, are not nearly as satisfying to hold and turn.

Since the hardware of a door is so personal to us, the engineering involved in that hardware, as often as not, concerns human engineering. Some of the major problems that exist for hardware engineers affect the user directly, and should, therefore, concern the selector.

Any door pull or knob should, when used, give a sense of actual operation. The mechanism should be felt to turn, as the door should be felt to swing. This is a kinesthetic satisfaction, the recognition by the user, usually subconscious, that he has made an actual event happen. For instance, while the knob should turn easily and smoothly, the user should be able to perceive by feel when the door latch is open, so that turning and opening are two connected efforts, not two indistinguishable ones. Probably one of the main reasons for the renascence of the lever handle, aside from the wish for a variation on the eternal knob, is that the working of a lever is satisfying to the hand. (It has become particularly popular for use with office entrance doors; the Seagram building uses it almost throughout.) The motion of the lever is wide and perceptible, while the effort and type of hand motion is still easy. The resulting sense of action is one of the goals of the designer's work: the feeling of having operated a satisfactory

and effective mechanism and achieved a tangible result. Since the act of closing a door has a more definite conclusion than that of opening it, the sense of action is easier to achieve. In spite of all the engineering efforts toward silent operation, it should still be possible to tell, by sound or by feel, that now that door is really closed. We all remember, probably with fondness, those old, sturdy refrigerator doors that closed with such a pleasurable snap; and most men still refer to the juicy latching sound of the old high-quality touring cars' doors. It's interesting to note that Detroit has spent a lot of time and money in recent years attempting to recapture that sound and feeling.

Hardware of the future


Sighting along the trends of today toward the hardware of tomorrow, we can make some wild and not-so-wild guesses as to what can happen next. It is fairly easy to predict that the increased use of movable partition systems will make for a more orderly program of hardware selection. Many more conditions will be pre-set by the use of modular components; and still, through good design, flexibility can be and ought to be a quality of modularity. The number of choices may thus be reduced at some time in the future, but the functional and economic advantages will be considerable. The amount of coordination needed, and the number of items carried in stock, would be sharply reduced. Perhaps locksets and other door hardware will become a rather pure extension of the partition system itself.

Another highly probable development is the manufacture of entire locksets in high-density plastics with metallic finishes. So much of these could be integrally cast as to make them virtually untamperable, as well as maintenance-free. And eventually doors can be cast with their own integral hardware.

Automatic control systems for doors serving a large traffic flow may be computerized like the new Barnes system for New York; they might even be iris-type doors, like a camera lens, but with a human profile rather than a circular one.


Laminated structural plastics will eventually become one of the standard materials for doors, for reasons of durability and easy maintenance; and the hardware of that time will be an interesting thing to see. (C)






















CONTRACT ANTIQUES

American dealers and decorators have attended the Antique Dealers Fair and Exhibition since its inception in 1934. Held annually at Grosvenor House, Park Lane, in the West End of London for a week in the month of June, this exhibit is the leading antique show in the world. Its attendance of about 27,000 persons includes many professionals in the home furnishing field, of whom approximately fifty percent come from overseas. A substantial amount of selling is done to American buyers, both collectors and also for resale. For the American furnishing trade, there are many potential rewards.

All pieces exhibited must be certified for existence prior to 1830, which automatically makes them duty-free to the United States. There are exhibits of personal jewelry, silverware, china and porcelain, paintings, rugs and other antiques, but principal emphasis and space is devoted to furniture. With the growing scarcity of available pieces, with inflation in many countries, and with an ever-widening appetite for the ownership of antiques, prices have risen substantially in recent years. However, not all types of antiques participate in this increase in price. Most antique pieces have a ready resale demand and value which assures the firmness of price levels. As a result, the trade tends now to fewer transactions on items of better quality.

American buyers represent a varied group: private purchasers buying on own account, museums, decorators buying for their own inventories or for clients, dealers who are often wholesalers who sell to other distributors or to retailers, and a growing group of contract furniture distributors who buy for commercial users. In recent years principal commercial users are the large U.S.A. industrial companies, who often purchase for their board of directors' rooms, top officials' offices, or their public areas for prestige publicity. A definite portion of American business is with entertainment and moving picture companies, who buy or often lease fine pieces. From the point of view of American purchasers, investments in antiques can often be charged off as expense, at a constant depreciation over twelve years, down to ten percent

of cost. In this manner, a valuable and marketable asset results.

At the Antique Dealers Fair, discounts of ten per cent are customarily given to commercial customers, although larger discounts are often obtainable on individual pieces, or through bargaining.

Demand in the United States is largely centered in New York City, where large wholesalers buy constantly and redistribute throughout the country. The impact of demand from Houston, Texas, is definitely noticed, undoubtedly to oil magnates for their homes or businesses. Washington, D.C., New England and California are also frequently mentioned as purchasers, as well as the old plantation homes of Virginia and the South. Taste is similar to that of Great Britain, mainly for pieces of best quality and design, infrequently for bad taste in rococo styles, sometimes with no taste at all on the part of consumers who buy through decorators.

The importance of the Antique Furniture Trade in England is the result of the national history. Unlike other European countries, England never concentrated its wealth in a single capital or the courts of nobles, but wealth and ownership have been widespread for centuries, and except for the bombings of World War II, there

has been no invasion from war since 1066. As a result, antique furniture still comes on the market, though fewer each year, throughout Britain.

To gather these pieces into the channels of trade, a vast informal network of information, communication and distribution has developed. In every area of Great Britain small local dealers and agents watch every local sale or disposal of home furnishings to "spot" every available item. It is at this level that occasionally a sharp dealer will make a top bid of £10 for a Sheraton chair or table worth £500 in a London shop, and by fortuitous circumstances create a reputation of excessive markup for the entire sellers, often through the large London auction rooms of Sotherby & Company, 34 New Bond Street, or Christie's, 8 King Street. There is also much re-selling from dealer to dealer to balance inventories. For American dealers or decorators, most purchasing is done in London establishments which offer the largest and most varied assortments. Most pieces must be repaired, reconditioned and refinished before reappearing on dealers' floors.

A brief review of the Antique Dealers Fair indicates the wide choice of styles, prices, and resources. In genereral, Sheraton, Hepplewhite and the other classic 18th century styles hold

top popularity, often in satinwood veneer which fits all manner of furnishing decor. Another popular trend is to unusual and exotic pieces, to key an entire room and to provide high conversation value.

A list of dealers may be helpful for types of merchandise, but is not intended to be inclusive of all available good resources.

Norman Adams Ltd., 8 Hans Road, Knightsbridge, London, has a small shop and consequently specializes in small scale pieces, suitable for American homes and apartments. Mainly 18th century British antiques are shown in rosewood, tulip wood and amboine wood, emphasizing "charm of character."

H. Blarmann & Sons, 23 Grafton Street, London, specializes in top quality early 18th century French furniture and British furniture which was contemporarily under French influence, with many highly ornamented and decorated designs.

Mallet & Sons Ltd., 40 New Bond Street, London, had the distinction of offering the highest priced furniture treasure in the show, a large original Chippendale cabinet with strong Chinese influence, decorated in gold leaf, selling for £45,000. Other pieces exhibited were in Chinoiserie decor, currently most popular in cream or red lacquer.

M. Harris & Sons, 44 New Oxford Street, London, has a large store and can exhibit many large pieces, always several fine 18th century breakfront cabinets, often the key to an en-

tire room. They handle British pieces made before 1830 exclusively, and are constantly "trading up."

A great conversation piece was shown by Trevor Antiques, 14 Ship Street, Brighton, England—a curved couch in the Egyptian architectural manner, with gold crocodile feet, designed in England after Napoleon's conquest of Egypt.

Harrod's Department Store, Knightsbridge, London, has a general line of medium quality antiques, mainly 18th century British pieces in mahogany.

Similarly, Maples & Company, Tottenham Court Road, London, a leading general home furnishing store, specializes in 18th century British chests, tables, cases and dining pieces in popular priced ranges. Both Harrod's and Maples attend to the crating and shipping from their own workshops.

Two firms which specialize in informal country type furniture are Gilbert Morris & Son, Ffynnongroew, Holywell, North Wales, and C. Toller, 51 High Street, Eton, Windsor, England. Originally cottage furniture, these pieces are in imported mahogany or local oak or fruitwood and are much like American Colonial styles in decor. These pieces are not costly, as they were all made by unsigned artisans, usually the joiner (carpenter) on local country estates. Welsh dressers and

Another type of dealer (and there are many such) is The Dower House Ltd. of Cookham Village, Berkshire, England. This attractive display at the Fair is mainly for purchasing by dealers from the owner's large barn where merchandise is stacked as received. From this, and similar shops, items are

distributed throughout England, blan-

ket wrapped on common carrier trucks.

cupboards are currently most popular.

Another type of exhibitor is the service industry. Packing and shipping can be ordered through Pitt & Scott Ltd., 1 St. Paul's Church Yard, London, or from Davies Turner & Co. Ltd., 4 Lower Belgrave Street, London, and with branches in many other cities.

For constant information on British and world wide antique furniture trade there are also several publications, including The Connoisseur, 22 Armoury Way, London, Collector's Guide, 167 Fleet Street, London, Antique Collector, 16 Stratton Ground, Victoria Street, London, Apollo, 22 Davies Street, London, and others.

A sophisticated and complex trade, indeed, is the world of furniture antiques, but one in which the impact of American buying has always been important. A trip to the Antique Dealers Fair in June in London is an easy means of investigating the primary market and making valuable contacts. Perhaps there is a place for more antiques in the channels of distribution through American dealers, decorators, or contract furnishers at a good margin of profit on a high unit of sale. (C)

SAVINGS ASSOCIATION: A STUDY IN ARTICULATE SPACE AND DESIGN

For the Cuyahoga Savings Association in Cleveland, Arthur Lawrence Associates relied on a series of related details to produce a unified and lasting impression of refinement and efficiency. Under the direction of Arthur Lawrence Jr., ALA introduced a simple, dignified color scheme to tie together the diverse activities of the bank. Most of the furnishings are extremely simple and are upholstered in rich dark gray, brown, and blue. The off-white drapery and dark gray-brown carpeting repeat the abundant muted and neutral tones used throughout the building.


The soft color scheme is contrasted by bright art work supplied by ALA to keep the atmosphere from becoming too somber. These include a stainless steel hanging sculpture with a 12-foot diameter by Harry Bertoia, contemporary paintings from Zao-Wou-Ki, Pierre Soulager, and Peter Sedgeley, as well as a 400-year-old Japanese scroll.


All of these items were included in the plans only after ALA had compiled a 50-page analysis of the needs, work patterns, and traffic flow of the various departments. All of the bank's employees were interviewed before the offices were located and the color schemes and furnishings chosen.

Since he had a free hand in planning the entire layout, Arthur Lawrence Jr. was able to coordinate custom-made furniture with standard units. For instance, he had George Nakashima design an eightfoot-round table in English oak for the board room, located on the mezzanine, which also features blue silk upholstered chairs from Zographos and white silk wallcoverings by Isabel Scott. Wood tops were also used for the polished stainless steel desks designed by James Maguire for the mortgage and loan office, also on the mezzanine.


