

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

GSA open to distributors

Dear Sir: We have assumed that furniture manufacturers bid directly on all GSA invitations. Therefore, it has been our policy not to bid on Federal or State invitations sent to us, especially those consisting of large quantities. We would like your advice or opinion about this.

Reading your Washington Report

column monthly is quite informative. We absorb its contents and know you are well qualified to render an opinion.

Dear Mr. Nestler: You are indeed able to bid on Federal contracts. But it is not smooth going.

First, you should be on the bidder's

mailing list for the items you are interested in, to receive bids. The Atlanta regional office of General Services Administration can send you a mailing list application, and go through the details with you.

The biggest thing to be aware of is that you and not your supplier would be responsible for any contract. You would have to have the manufacturer tied down—you would need a letter of authority from the supplier stating you are his authorized sales representative.

The definite quantity rather than open-end invitations would be the ones you're interested in. If you were low bidder, GSA would then check the plant that would be supplying the item, both before the contract and during the run. The inspector, from the quality control division of GSA, would check necessary production abilities and personnel. GSA would also require a pre-production sample to see if the item qualifies.

If for any reason the contract is not fulfilled, you would be responsible. GSA would look to you to make up any deficiencies if the contract had to be re-let.

You could, also, be the low bidder and not obtain the contract, for such reasons as the plant not being approved, or other factors.

But nothing in the regulations precludes you, in the distribution end of the business, from competing with manufacturers in the field of government procurement.—A. G.





OUR WASHINGTON REPORT:

- More traffic on Interstate Systems
- Knoll and the FTC ruling

A toast to the nation's motorists—Lord love 'em—and motels bless them, with contract executives not far behind in the benediction. The reason is simple and multitudinous—there are so many of them. This year, somewhere around mid-spring, the number of motor vehicle operators' licenses in force passed 100 million. And where there are so many motorists, can another motel be far around the bend, or distant from the next interchange? Better than half the licenses are accounted for by nine states. California has 10 million; New York, 7½ million; Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio and Texas, each over 5 million; Michigan, 4 million; Florida and New Jersey, more than 3 million each.

This year marks a decade since passage of the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1956. More than half of the 41,000 miles of the contemplated Interstate System are now open, and some phase of work is going on for just about all the rest.

Contract Competition Case

Interior designers and furniture retailers are in competition. This finding is news—even if it is no novelty to the businessmen concerned. Its reverberations sound through a Federal Trade Commission case. FTC, in a 4-1 decision, orders Knoll Associates, Inc., New York City modern furniture producer, to stop price discriminations between competing resellers of its merchandise. The commission held that Knoll granted some resellers a 50 percent discount from list price, and others 40 percent. These discriminations could substantially injure competition between them, FTC said.

In this phase of the case the issue was relatively simple. (The hard nub of the case centered on disclosure of documents by a disgruntled employee of an agent.) Knoll did not deny that it discriminated and that some of these discriminations would have adverse effects on competition. But it did argue that the FTC examiner erred in finding competition between designers and retailers in resale of Knoll furniture, and in finding injury to such competition as a result of the price discriminations.

Knoll contended that designers and retailers are in different types of business and "do not operate in the same arena of the market place." It presented evidence to show that designers perform services that dealers don't, ordinarily, and that many designers unlike retailers are paid not as a percentage of the cost of the furniture, or get a fee regardless of whether they are used to procure the furniture; while retailers perform a classic retail function—purchase at wholesale, maintain a stock, display the goods, advertise it, sell at retail.

FTC pointed out previous cases which held that the fact that a seller's favored and non-favored customers normally don't perform the same redistribution function doesn't bar a finding of competition; and competition may exist even though there is a great dissimilarity in the way businesses are conducted.

In this case, however, there is a clear showing, says FTC, that "there is an extensive area in which designers and dealers compete by offering the same products and services to the same general class of customers." The evidence is "overwhelming," it says Testimony by manufacturers and designers establishes that "many designers buy and sell furniture.' There is also uncontradicted evidence that dealers in each market area offer design services "virtually identical" to those performed by designers.

Knoll also argued that it makes no difference to designers whether they buy at 40 or 50 percent discount. FTC disagrees, and cites testimony from designers that they must remain competitive. "An important area of competition between designers and dealers is in the field of contract or bid business. "I cites testimony that contract bids may go for less than 10 percent above cost, so where one bidder has a 20 percent edge over another, competition is barred

The argument by Knoll, FTC notes, is not clearcu—it sells to some designers at a lower price than t some competing dealers, the differences are not one sided; and some firms describe themselves at time as dealers, at times as designers.

Nor does FTC accept the Knoll argument that it lower prices to some customers were granted in goo faith to meet competitors' equally low prices. It do not prove this, FTC says. The examiner held that when Knoll felt it would promote the distribution and sale of its furniture, it gave its highest discount to customers who demanded it as a condition for aggressive marketing. Customarily, these favored customers "usually were receiving, coincidentally, the highest discounts granted by Knoll's competitors."

In such a pleading, FTC says, the seller must prove he was responding or reacting to a competitive situation—he must show that the favored customer not only received a lower price from a competing selled but that its price reduction to that customer was made to meet, in good faith, the competitor's equal low price.

FTC held, rather, that Knoll extended its maximul discount not for this reason but to compensate the favored customers for "displaying and promotine Knoll furniture, buying in larger quantities, or simply because the customer demanded a lower price."

Here is how the FTC examiner describes the cu tomer categories — Knoll sells its furniture "to user to architects, to interior design firms principally e gaged in rendering interior design services, to int rior design firms simultaneously engaged in rendering interior design services and in buying and selling furniture to large department stores which carry no Knoll furniture in their inventory, to retail firms engaged almost exclusively in selling office equipment and furniture, to retail furniture stores engaged almost exclusively in selling only furniture and furnishings, to contract houses which specify Knoll furniture in bids submitted in response to written specifications, and to retail outlets that sell Knoll furniture through Knoll catalogs."

A quick and easy method of checking carpet qualities produced in Allied Chemical's A.C.E. nylon will be available shortly to architects, designers, and other contract furnishings specifiers. Allied's fibers division will issue a hard-cover sample book containing the complete color line and specifications for each carpet quality manufactured by mills using Allied's nylon and which meet the A.C.E. nylon labeling program specifications. Called A.C.E. Carpet Library, the 8 by 101/2 inch sample book will also contain an inquiry card to expedite requests for further information. All inquiries will be referred to individual manufacturers. Mailings of samplers for each of the twenty-one carpets already qualified for the A.C.E. label are expected to begin in January. Schumacher at the Opera

When the enormous gold stage curtain went up on the premiere performance at the new Metropolitan Opera House at Lincoln Center last month, it crowned a successful 70 years of business for F. Schumacher & Co., which specially wove the approximate one thousand yards of fabric. Identical in quality and construction to the original silk fabric woven for the old Met, the new gold curtain fabric differs only in design, being contemporary in keeping with the decor (see cut). It was specially designed by Harrison & Abramovitz, the Met architect, and adapted by Schumacher for the woven fabric, which is unusual in its verti-





cal repeat of about nine feet. Installation was by General Drapery Services. On the technical side, yarns were flameproofed before woven, giving the fabric a flameproof finish without further treatment.





NAFM considering contract unit

A new division devoted to contract furniture is being considered by the

National Association of Furniture Manufacturers, the group revealed last month at its equipment and woodworking fair in Louisville, Ky. Reason for the new division, according to John Snow, NAFM vice president, is the increasing activity of regular household furniture makers in the commercial/ institutional field. Snow told an NAFM dinner meeting that the association hoped to compile statistics on the contract market for members operating in that area, just as NAFM does now for various segments of the furniture industry serving the residential market. These are now issued to manufacturer members every month, providing data on orders, shipments, backlog, average work week, etc., as compared with figures for the previous year.

U of Pa. conducts flooring study

"Manufacturers of the various flooring materials have not only advertised the beauty and durability of their products, but also their associated costs. In the past few years there have been a number of conflicting claims as to the total annual use costs of carpet and resilient flooring. These reports have naturally come from a variety of sources, and the conclusions tend to reflect the source. We have undertaken the task of evaluating objectively the question of the economics of carpet and resilient flooring."

So stated Dr. George M. Parks, assistant professor of industry and operations research at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, in the introduction to his newly published book, The Economics of Carpeting and Resilient Flooring: An Evaluation & Comparison (University of Pennsylvania Press: \$2.50 clothbound, \$1.50 paperbound).

After extensive surveys, time and motion studies, equations, charts, tables, cost comparisons, graphs, and appendices, the study team stated that the annual cost of carpet per thousand square feet to be significantly more than the annual cost of resilient floors. The researchers found the dollar difference constant between carpet and resilient flooring in such areas as cost of maintenance labor, expendable supplies, and capital equipment. They said the big difference showed up when comparisons were made in the initial


costs and service lives of the two flooring materials.

Prof. Herbert R. Northrup, chairman of the department of industry, Wharton School of Finance & Commerce of the University, told a packed gathering of trade reporters and interested observers at a recent press conference that they "never imagined anything publishable would result when the study was undertaken. 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
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
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HOTEL SHOW-'67 EDITION

THE rocketing growth of the commercial/institutional furnishings field during the '60s is dramatically evidenced in next month's National Hotel & Motel Exposition. The show's fourth floor this year will feature 168 exhibitors, occupying 249 spaces, in furniture, furnishings, and decorative accessories. This is an increase of 92 exhibits over last year's show, and a whopping rise of 100 percent more exhibits than the 1959 exposition, which was the first to devote a whole floor to contract furnishings and to introduce the two major institutional displays—Rooms of Tomorrow and Designs for Dining. In addition to these impressive figures, 20 percent of the exhibits on the third floor at next month's show will be devoted to contract furnishings, 50 percent of the exhibits on the second floor, and another 20 percent on the first.

In short, the NH&ME has changed in seven short years from an annual trade exposition dominated by food and food engineering machinery to one where contract merchandise actually rivals "the back of the house" equipment, that is to say, products for kitchens, maintenance, and housekeeping. What this enormous percentage gain in exhibit space reflects is the boom in new construction and in renovation that has taken place in the past ten years. Where hotel management was formerly concerned with administrative problems, today its interest in commercial/institutional furnishings is intense and continuous. The trend has been to work more and more closely with the contract designer. This collaboration has been forced on it by the increasingly competitive situation in the hotel field, where today decorative style is just as important as food and service for attracting guestroom and restaurant traffic.

NH&ME has, as a result, grown into a major market place for hotel and institutional buyers engaged in what has become one of their major preoccupations—the planning and furnishing of new establishments and the renovation of older ones. In this setting, the function of Rooms of Tomorrow and Designs for Dining, which are explored and illustrated in the following pages, becomes increasingly significant. Both exhibits lend themselves to new and existing premises; in Rooms of Tomorrow the Town House suite is expressly planned for renovations, and in Designs for Dining, the complete plan of any one of the five rooms can be adapted with relative ease to the eating place in need of sprucing up. Over and above these types of establishments, the hotel show, which will occupy the New York Coliseum from November 7 to 10, is a first-rate showcase for furnishings of other types, needed in planning old-age homes, dormitories, public buildings, and so forth. ROOMS OF TOMORROW

ELLEN LEHMAN McCLUSKEY CREATES SHOWCASE SUITES FOR URBAN AND RESORT HOTELS IN 1967 ANNUAL EXHIBIT

For nine successive years, leading designers and manufacturers have joined in exposing the potential of their products and services to the hotelmotel industry in the annual Rooms of Tomorrow exhibit. A major feature at the National Hotel-Motel Show held at the New York Coliseum, the Rooms of Tomorrow have been in the past, sometimes bold, sometimes dramatic, but always an imaginative index to solutions of guestroom design and refurbishing.

This year's thematic scheme again centers on two major types of guest accommodations, that of the city-based hotel in need of a face-lift, and the new motel catering to resort trade. Providing a link to the two showcase suites is a lobby and atrium, meticulously planned by Ellen Lehman Mc-Cluskey who was chosen to design the 1967 exhibit. Charles Luckman of Charles Luckman Associates collaborated as architectural design consultant.

Since the lobby more than any other hotel area inspires the first impression, designer McCluskey has definite views as to what it should portray. She predicts smaller, more subtle and hospitable spaces in which architectur details create the desired openness. Keeping with this view, the lobby the Rooms of Tomorrow is fresh contemporary, both in its furnishin and color treatment of pewter, gumetal, black and white. A wire mescreen divider, strongly architectur in detail, sets apart the atrium Glimpsed through the screen, tatrium could be utilized as a publiarea for cocktails or dining.

The focal point of the exhibit, to Townhouse suite, is the answer to u













Living room of the Townhouse suite (opposite page) is the result of combining two small rooms of an older urban hotel, transforming them into a spacious suite with adjoining bedroom and bath (above). Colors of the living area are neutral: beige walls, champagne carpet, naturaltoned sofa, enlivened by a vibrant flamestich pattern in bittersweet, black and pewter, as upholstery fabric and drapery. Since, hypothetically, the rooms' sizes conform to the dimensions of an existing hotel, designer Ellen McCluskey used spacesaving devices to save footage and enlarge both the bedroom and bath. A continuous pattern of damask on walls, as draperies and bed coverlets, gives the bedroom a self-contained appeal. In the bathroom, a square tub forms a recessed niche for the toilet and adds floor space to the small quarters. Lobby design (left) incorporates architectural detailing, such as black laminate paneling interspersed with pewter stripping and pebbled floor with black insets, complemented by contemporary furnishings and a color treatment of black, white, gunmetal, and pewter.







Holiday House suite gives design direction to the new motel still to be constructed and one that would cater to resort trade. The entire suite, comprised of living area, bedroom and bath, is characterized by an Oriental simplicity. though done California-style with sunny yellows against jet black and off-white for walls and floors. Living room resembles a patio in its use of a brick pattern on floors and paneled walls and, characteristic of outdoor living, overlooks the pool. Sofa units that double as beds are built into the corners, giving the room an octagonal effect that is aided by a round area rug. The adjacent bedroom picks up the art noveau floral motif of rug and throw pillows in the pattern of the window shade, thus tying the rooms together in a continuing black, white, and yellow color scheme, Holiday House bath (opposite page) is a showcase of luxurious new products, surprisingly practical in spite of their delicate appearance. Setting the theme are new bathroom fixtures with a stylized tulip design in relief that prompted the black tile insets of the white tile running fashionably up floors and walls. Grand in scale, the room has a sunken bath, ample dressing space, and a lucite chair upholstered in a bright gold.

dating the older urban hotel decidedly urban in its solution. It is a gracious, spacious suite created out of two small rooms and restricted to the dimensions of a typical older hotel. Included is a large living area with a bar/kitchen at one end and an adjoining, separate bedroom and bath. The living room is well suited to informal business sessions or socialzing with its traditional furnishings and air of civility. Furniture invites lounging and the muted background of pale vinyl walls, natural toned sofa, and champagne carpet is vitalized by bold flamestitch pattern at windows and on arm chairs with otto-

Besides adhering to the smaller room size of an existing hotel, the adjoining bedroom considers the probability that the room is devoid of a view. To visually enlarge it and create a self-sufficient appeal, designer McCluskey used a continuous pattern on walls windows, and beds, a cognac and beige cotton damask. Accent tone in accessories is tangerine and furniture follows English-inspired lines.

The small scale shows up again in

the bathroom where Mrs. McCluskey used a square tub rather than the conventional fixture to provide an alcove for the toilet, thereby adding footage to the cramped quarters. Furnishings and wallcoverings in a warm yellow scheme greatly enliven what was once an uninspired room.

Completing the idea display is the Holiday House suite, a patio/living area with spacious bedroom and bath, geared to travelers who will use the suite as a stopover vacation. The leitmotif is sunny Californian, brought about by the extensive use of yellow, sharpened by black accent in contemporary furnishings, with expanses of white in walls and floors. The living area is octagonal in feeling due to the built-in corner sofa units which open as additional beds.

A "no holds barred" approach was taken in the design of the adjoining bath since the designer was not restricted to a qualifying layout. Planned for a new motel, the bathroom is resplendent in its use of luxurious new products and accessories—a room that alone might influence a guest's memorable stay. (C)

DESIGNS FOR DINING

OPULENCE IS THE OPERATIVE WORD IN DESIGNER DOBBINS' QUINTET OF NEW SETTINGS FOR 1967 ANNUAL EXHIBIT AT HOTEL SHOW



Jinx Dobbins, N.S.I.D. of Jinx Dobbins, Interiors Unlimited

A world of continental dining sets the scene for the 1967 Designs for Dining exhibit, annual feature at the National Hotel-Motel Show. Designed by Jinx Dobbins, who heads her own contract design firm in Houston, Texas, the Designs for Dining display illustrates trends and fashion in dining decor.

In planning the feature exhibit, designer Dobbins envisioned esoteric places, then transformed these international themes into a series of restaurants catering to five distinct types of service that range from haute cuisine and luxury tastes to a casual all-American cafeteria.

At the posh dining level, Miss Dobbins has created the Kashmir Room, inspired by Persian opulence for the restaurateur who specializes in haute cuisine. A gentlemen's club of British vintage inspired the Houndstooth Inn, tailored for executive lunches or cocktail trade and featuring a hearty menu. Something new to the annual exhibit is the Berghof, a ski lodge in atmosphere patterned after a fashionable Continental ski resort. As its name implies, the Maison Citron brings an elegant French ambiance to a dining room reserved for ladies' luncheons or cocktails. Rounding out the range of dining designs is the Greenhouse cafeteria along western American lines offering quick-service dining that is at once gay and efficient. (C)

Greenhouse Cafeteria

One of five settings at the annual Designs for Dining display is a sprightly quick-service facility (opposite), representing design trends of the south and western United States. Using a color mood as bright as a garden in bloom, designer Jinx Dobbins states the overall theme with a skylight ceiling, vinyl brick walls, against accents of emerald green, Siamese pink, and white. Planned to the particulars, a tweedy multitone carpet of A.C.E. Nylon resists stains and abrasions, and cuts noise. Chairmasters' furniture is finished in white lacquer with empire green cushioning; napery of Siamese pink, offsets white and green china.

The Berghof

The Berghof expresses the sporting life-borrowing themes from the continental ski resort and interpreted by designer Dobbins in a rugged motif of exposed ceiling beams, oversized dining chairs and tables of oak construction, and a ski mural of Aspen, Colorado. The color treatment reflects a convivial spirit in bright red wallcoverings and upholstery, ultramarine blue on bar stools and black accents. Appointments include red linen placemats and napery, traditional beer steins, and china of a dark tobacco brown on a white body.

Houndstooth Inn

A successful revamp of English pub decor, so much in vogue for its relaxed and informal appeal, is dictated in theme by an overscaled white tone-on-tone houndstooth check as upholstery. The Inn was planned as a dining haven for executive luncheons featuring a hearty steak and ale menu. A color scheme of rich tobacco browns and black furthers the masculine air found in random plank wallcoverings, bark textured floors, and redwood ceiling beams, to which table linens add an exciting dash of Delft blue.

Maison Citron

A fashionable enclave for ladies' luncheons, the Maison Citron typifies Continental elegance as interpreted by designer Dobbins in Frenchstyled furnishings, sculptured columns, blackamoor statues that flank the entrance, and a gazebo ceiling in a specially executed Regency panel design. The intime mood of the room is heightened by i's circular form, echoed in a plush pile carpet dyed to a perfect match of the citron color theme seen on drapery and seating. Table appointments also reflect the posh tone of the establishment in Adam pat'erned cotton damask cloths and napery of the same citron yellow, and solid black china encrusted with gold.

Kashmir Room

Kashmir Room evolves from the legends of Eastern opulence and has as its focal point a custom mural by Nione Carlson, who rendered it true to the technique and manner of the 15th Century. The two walls opposite serve as counterpoint to the mural, one in an off-white silk patterned vinyl, the other in a gold foil outlined by Moorish arches. The formal tone of the room is set by deep Persian reds of the upholstery; high backed dining chairs are covered in a claret Varistripe velvet fabric and specially designed banquettes are done in raspberry velvet. Accessories complete the formal dining setting with crystal chandeliers, framed mirrors, satin-banded table linens, and gold-on-white chinaware.







RAILINGS & RAIL SYSTEMS ARE REGAINING THEIR PLACE

AS INTEGRAL PARTS OF THE DESIGN, WITH SPECIFIC PROTECTIVE, ESTHETIC, AND EMOTIONAL FUNCTIONS.

Even though it seems fairly obvious that railings exist because of a felt need, it is also clear, from the immense variety of solutions to the problem, that the need felt is not entirely a physical one.

Clearly, people do need protection when they must move through a space containing more than one accessible level; stairways, bridges, balconies, decks all need railings. Two-legged motion has some considerable advantages over four-legged motion, but reliable balance in precarious situations is not one of them. We are not nearly as safe on a ledge or an incline as a dog or cat would be, not to mention a donkey or a goat; and a stairway is, among other things, a long series of narrow ledges. Human beings in this situation need two kinds of help, both of which railings traditionally provide. First, they need an enclosing member, a miniature wall, or fence, to prevent falls from a higher level to a lower. A certain portion of the occupied space, generally the lowest or nearly so, needs to be contained space. Second, they need a continuous hand grip, or, in situations of milder danger, a hand rest. Even where this is not used, as it often is, to assist physically in a climb, it is useful to provide a physical reference for the sense of balance, and to offer an equally necessary emotional sense of security.

However, it is coming to be more widely recognized that railings have an esthetic potential. Safety factors alone are no longer the only considerations in railing design. We are beginning to deal with railings in terms of color, texture, and decorative accent, and this is certainly a move in the right direc-

tion. Our age has been almost unique in treating railings as an afterthought, and the final effect of these innumerable postscripts has been a sort of architectural pox. There are a number of reasons why this has been so. For one thing, the age of elevators has made many public staircases of a certain scale unnecessary; those that are 1-ft are likely to be strictly utilitarian. For another thing, masonry architecture has been fairly consistently left to the designers of exteriors, and this has left most railings to be dealt with in the traditions of either carpentry or ironmongery, both of which encourage a piecemeal approach. It is far simpler to manufacture and install components, whether turned or cast, than to build an integrated architectural member. For all these reasons, we are used to seeing railings treated in an additive way, as a final detail to be applied to a staircase or ledge after it has been designed and built.


A major architectural element

But things are changing. We are finally coming back to the organic use of three-dimensional space. Lobby spaces are increasing, multiple-level shopping plazas are going up, pedestrian malls and traffic patterns have transformed the old two-dimensional concept of circulation into a truly dimensional city architecture-at least in the minds of forward-looking planners, and soon it will be in actual fact. Railings, like the multiple platform levels they serve, and the stairs connecting them, have a new chance to be seen. One of the best examples of this is in the TWA terminal designed by Eero Saarinen for Kennedy Airport, where the railings have the double and highly integrated functions of protection and decoration. They are actually part of the design. We think of this treatment as being a highly progressive one; and, of course, it is. But it is interesting to look back to certain other periods and notice that whenever space, and therefore the movement of people, was important to the designer and became an integral part of the design. railings have come into their own as a major architectural element. In the baroque period particularly, and also during the Art Nouveau period, railings were one of the dominant themes in architecture. Spiral staircases, outdoor staircases, monumental staircases porticos, balconies, terraces, and colonnades all served to define and enhance the space through which people moved and their experience of it. Now that we are rediscovering our awareness o public space, we have a new era o opportunity to design integrated, beautiful, and even monumental railings to serve it.


Unfortunately, not all contemporary architects use their new opportunitie as well as Saarinen did. For example there is the new Metropolitan Airpor in Detroit. The railings in this enor mous building are about as ordinary a it is possible for them to be. What may become, in time, a sort of gross monu mentality in the architecture is not i any way matched by the railings, which are neither monumental nor even gros in any recognizable proportion to th architecture they embellish. And ther is always Frank Lloyd Wright's Gug genheim Museum. The railing that serves his continuous ramp is certainl integrated into the concrete design; bu

it has some side effects. Tall men become inured to bumped heads when standing and inconvenient knees when sitting; but there is no getting used to the sensation produced by backing up to a railing that catches one just behind the knees, at exactly the homicide level. (The first time this happens, in the Guggenheim, one begins to wonder just what Wright's intention was. It might be an efficient way to dispose of critics.) People have a tendency to move in and out when examining a work of art; but at the Guggenheim this tendency is quickly tempered by a sort of permanent anxiety, so that one descends the ramp with one eye on the art and one eye on the railing.

Codes: inadequate, inconsistent

This problem is only one of many that point up the lack of any consistent body of knowledge about what railings actually need to be. The few existing codes governing the construction of railings are fantastically inconsistent; and even basic thinking on the subject shows only spotty results in actual railing construction and application.

Basically, a railing should be where people expect one: wherever conditions prompt the human hand to grasp for support. Then, when the support is found, there should be the reasonable expectation that the rail is firm and well secured, and that what is gripped is grippable. It should be properly shaped to receive the hand, and not unpleasent to the touch. Moreover, if a railing is to offer real protection against the hazards of gravity, it must be higher than the center of gravity of any person who may be unlucky enough to fall against it.

Current research into the human factors of railings is proceeding from a number of points of view, but much more is needed. Some groups, like Julius Blum & Company, have investigated the improvement of both attachment and grip factors; while researchers in East Germany have discovered exactly the diameter of concrete cylinder necessary at the top of a wall to prevent its being grasped, for exit purposes, by the human hand.

It would be nice to be able to depend on the professional reliability of the architect and designer in regard to proper human and safety factors in

railings; but it doesn't always work out that way, and this is why building codes exist. Unfortunately, the building codes relating to railings and staircases are both inadequate and inconsistent. The National Building Code, which is backed by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, says (in Section 803, Number 5), "Stairway and balcony railings, both exterior and interior, shall be designed to resist a horizontal thrust of 50 pounds per lineal foot applied at the top of the railing." The Indiana code, on the other hand, calls for a resistance to horizontal thrust of 20 pounds per lineal foot. Is this because Hoosiers weigh only two-fifths as much as other people, or is it pure

The National Building Code has one short reference (in Section 604, Number 8) that deals with the number of rails per width of staircase. It says, "44 inches—one rail; more than 44 inches—two rails; more than 88 inches—three rails." This is fine, but all staircases are not the same, and practice must be controlled either by good workmanship or better codes. A heavily trafficked, steep, fast-curving staircase is a totally different condition from a low-rise, infrequented, straight staircase.

Esthetics vs. safety

The designer of the interior of the bal cony in the Shakespeare Theatre a Stratford, Connecticut, probably found a 26-inch-high rule in the code fo galleries and balconies, for that is ap proximately what the inner edge of hi little wall measures. He carefully gav it an inward offset, to increase its safe ty, and slanted the offset downward t increase visibility for the first rov But that this was not enough is show by the fact that an additional roun steel rail has been added above th little shed-roof formed by the balcon railing itself. This is esthetically un fortunate, for it spoils the architect clever wooden slant, but it may pos sibly make people feel a little safer finding their seats. I watched a woma miss her footing on the lowest ste one evening in that balcony, however and it was clearly good luck and n that extra rail that saved her nec Even with the added rail, the wall that balcony is not enough protection To test it further, I walked past the

ront row of seats after the play. The lanted facing board was not grippable it all, either as to height or as to shape; and while the rail was a graspable hape, it was below hand height.

Clearly, the 26-inch-height rule is alid only under some conditions; if it pplies to a railing set some distance a from the edge of a drop it may well e enough, but if it is attached to the ace of a ledge it is quite a different natter. The conflicting interests of the eated playgoer and the moving one re usually resolved in favor of the eated one, which throws the responibility for the moving patron's safety ack onto the architect who designs he balcony stairs and seating. It may e that there is no really satisfactory olution of the vision-vs.-circulation ilemma in a theatre balcony, in terms f opaque railings. If this is the case, would be a humane effort to devise visually and audially transparent ence and extend it from floor to ceiling f the balcony front.


Above and beyond the questions of eight and of strength per lineal foot, here is the matter of the allowable nit stresses of the material. Robert eery, of Seery & Company, who acts s design consultant to Julius Blum & company, has this to say:


"In order to design a hand railing, nere must be agreement on the loadg characteristics and allowable unit resses. Each of these might be a code equirement. The unit stresses will be factor of the yield strength, depending n the safety factor used. I don't think ny of these values is fixed by refence material you can find anywhere the industry. There is no agreement ithin the industry, and no central surce for the information on safety ctors and codes. What codes there e are inconsistent; it doesn't make nse. Here's a real need for coherence, nd it ends up every man for himself."



and humane solution to the problem posed by growing children, who change their size radically through six or twelve years of schooling, and who must be taught by adults who use the same staircase. In addition to not staying the same size for very long at a time, children are adventurous. Railings have something in common with trees and jungle gyms, and are often just as tempting to youngsters of a certain age. Some railings can be used very well for climbing around, but others are not safely situated for such activities, and need to be designed with some sort of screening to prevent being climbed through. It is also possible to discourage swinging by hands or knees if the cross section of the rail is made less comfortable for this kind of grip. There are a number of ways to discourage orbital motion around railings, easily accessible to the designer who puts his mind to the problem, but not expressed in any of the existing codes or references on railings.

Another lack in the current body of theory and practice is in regard to the aged. Even in this day of geriatric concern in medicine, there is too little attention paid to the actual needs of the old and infirm. These people need not only a railing that will protect and assist them, but one that will also assure them that they are safe, by its unwavering solidity. A connection or attachment that yields slightly to pressure, or a slender enough post to yield even just perceptibly, is worrying to people who must lean hard on the rail. Furthermore, the rail must be of a shape and size that can be easily grasped with the whole hand. A flat, angular, or too slender rail is as unwelcome as one that is too cold or too slippery.


The problems of the aged are compounded in the handicapped. The need for assistance, protection, and security is even more extreme. People using a cane or crutch use the railing not only as a guide and balancing reference, but as a physical support. There is a distinction to be made here between those who have one good leg and those who have none. A person with one functional leg can manage to climb stairs fairly well on crutches, though it is something more of a trick to come down. But those people who have neither leg in action must alternately

pull on the rail and push on a crutch in order to mount, and each pull puts the whole weight of the body on the railing, as each push puts it on the crutch. This requires not only a good bit of strength in the arms, but a grea deal of strength in the rail, as well a a non-skid grip. In a case like this esthetics are the least important consideration.

Bus-stop modern?

Fortunately, however, esthetics are be coming a more important consideration in most railing applications. During th period of the International Style, which fortunately, seems to be ending, build ings were stripped down to th plumbing-and-glass level, typified b Gropius's Bauhaus architecture. In th effort to reduce clutter, the railin ended up as a steel tube. The con sequences of this approach have, i some cases, been outstandingly hand some; but its popularizations have, a too often, ended up with bus-sto modern: that familiar combination raw (and therefore corroded) alum inum, and greasy vinyl; the Pop A paradise. But if Paul Rudolf and th late Eero Saarinen are some indicatio of the architecture to come, the hy gienic mirror-finished cube will give way to a greater and more highl textured sense of spaciousness. We are developing a much greater complexit of visual and circulation levels insid buildings. Railing design will be cha lenged to keep pace with the new spatial and structural dimensions. The warmin of feel and variety of textur as well as the richer use of color, wi invite manufacturers to offer systemat lines of components giving the archite the widest possible choice for his se lection.

A currently excellent example such an offering is the Carlstadt lin of Julius Blum, which has coordinate the multitude of railing elements re markably well. Even more to the poir the Colorail line offered by the san company provides a wide variety indoor and outdoor railings in vario structures and handrail cross section The integrally colored material mak possible a horizontal or diagonal col accent that can be keyed to the interi scheme, a treatment not always po sible with anodized metal. Furthermo the wear characteristics are much in

proved over any coated surface, and the plastic is thermally stable and pleasant to the touch. It does not feel icy in cold weather, or unpleasantly warm in hot weather.

Areas for improvement

One place where some really basic esthetic thinking is still needed is in the handrails of escalators. The present choice seems to be between black rubber and black rubber, either ribbed or plain. If a self-cleaning system were installed in the hidden part of the cycle, we could use a brightly colored plastic or even a pleasant white.

Another place where new thinking is needed is in railings for revolving doors and elevators. If a railing is really a push bar, it should not accidentally imprison the fingers behind it, and if it is really a grab bar, it should not trap cigarette butts and candy wrappers behind it. The revolving door rail should, perhaps, not stand away from the door at all, while the elevator railing should stand away nore, if it is really needed at all.

One more place where I would like o see some more design in action is n attachment methods. The standard ittachments do not provide enough lepth of contact to prevent the railing rom wavering when leaned againstin unsettling experience for anyone who really needs to lean against it. Three screws in a narrow flange are not enough. It would be desirable if nore local builders' standards were prought up at least to the level of the ecommendations of the National Asociation of Architectural Metal Manfacturers. Best of all would be to ountersink all posts, as Mr. Seery ecommends.

It is interesting to speculate on the uture of railing design. As our archtecture becomes more massive and nonumental, the railings might deelop in either of two valuable directions. They might become very thin racery sections, as in New Orleans rillwork or the High Gothic window nuntins, for accent and elegant contast. Or they might carry out the eavy theme by becoming extremely onderous, as were the massive, ouble-curved marble balustrades and andrails of Renaissance Italy. Either evelopment would be interesting, and ven more so would be both. (**C**)



A neglected area of New York's Central Park is charmingly enhanced

WHEN Calvert Vaux planned the Terrace and Bethesda Fountain area in New York City's Central Park in 1858, its elaborate architecture and piazza were designed to set off one of the park's most appealing vistas. With the Mall to the south and a boating lake at the north end of the terrace, the site was one of the most frequented promenades of Gilded Age society. Its advantages include, in addition to the lake, some unusually fing stands of oaks and willows, and since it is at the center of the park it is shielded from the main traffic arteries by spacious lawns and groves on all sides.

Vaux and his associate, Jacob Wrey Mould, went to special pains to make the Terrace unique and delightful. They commissioned Emma Stebbins to sculpt the Bethesda Fountain-an Angel of the Waters, with Temperance, Purity, Health, and Peace as her attendant cherubs-and had the sculpture cast in Munich. The ceiling of the elaborate arcade they designed is faced in Minton tile executed in England after Mould's sketches, and, since no one walks on cailings (yet), it's as fresh today as when the tiles were laid. The balustrades and other architectural elements in Nova Scotia sandstone were also specially carved with deep reliefs of birds, trefoils, floral swags, leaves, and other natural subjects. Since the Terrace is surrounded by hills on three sides, access to it was provided by two grand stairways at either end of the arcade, plus two smaller stairways at far left and right and a broader one at the south end of the covered arcade, the latter leading right into the Mall, where a band habitually played on weekends and holidays. This gift of nature picturesquely embellished was, we are told, gratefully received by the ladies and gentlemen of a century ago, and the Terrace was favored by strollers until well after World War I. Regrettably, with the arrival of the automobile as

a common family vehicle, its popularity declined, the premises were allowed to deteriorate and the carvings were chipped and broken by generations of vandals.

Luckily, a new day has dawned for old Central Park with the election of Mayor John Lindsay and his appointment of Thomas Hoving as Parks Commissioner. Hoving has done an incredible job in a few short months of giving the parks back to the people, and taking them away from the muggers, whose rule went unchallenged for all too many years. Not only has the Bethesda Fountain and Terrace been officially cited as a landmark, to be maintained and preserved as such, but its use has been vastly extended by the installation of a delightful outdoor cafe-restaurant. Designed by James Lamantia, architect, and Elizabeth Gordon, interior designer both of Design Coordinators, Inc., the cafe has restored the Terrace to its role of pleasure-dome for the masses right up until 11:00 o'clock at night In addition to the cafe, which seats 200, two charmingly designed selfservice kiosks hard by the lake offer snack-bar items. And it has all been done, as Hoving is proud of pointing out, without disturbing a blade o grass or cutting down a single tree (C)
















The grand scale of the original Terrace and Bethesda Fountain area dictated the approach by designer Elizabeth Gordon and architect James Lamantia, specialists in traditional renovations in the partnership of Design Coordinators Inc. Thirty chair styles were submitted for approval by the parks commission officials, cafe management firm of Restaurant Associates, and George T. Delacorte, the philanthropist who contributed the furnishings. Wrought-iron chairs and table designs selected were then fabricated by Gallo, and the umbrellas by Finkel. Chairs and table bases are green, table tops white. and umbrellas are mustard-colored with white trim. Architect Lamantia designed the kiosks for self-service snacks. DEVELOPS METHODS FOR PLANNING EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATIONS CENTER FOR BUSINESS AND INSTITUTION

The tempo of business life is spiralling skyward. With the steady advance of technology, expansion of operations, new international horizons, economic and financial complexities, no longer does the corporate right hand know instinctively what the left is up to. Where once the right decision was all-important, the factor of crucial timing has been thrust upon it.

The successful business executive greets a daily stream of information originating from a network of sources -from divisions and departments, branch offices, distribution and production facilities-and from that of his competitors' as well. In the midst of this information explosion, data must be collected, collated, evaluated, disseminated, stored for easy access, and relayed to the men who make decisions. Obviously, the answer to this uniquely modern-age problem lies in effective communication-deep in our push-button technology where it all started.

As designers of systems for communications and the quarters to house it, Menell Associates has been grappling with the problem of disseminating the rising mountain of information to the decision makers. In the course of its experience in dealing with corporate clients, Menell Associates has developed a basic form of inquiry as the starting point in planning an effective communications center. The first step, says Jerome Menell, head of the firm, is to determine the primary purpose of the facility. Though it is possible that the center may be used by a single group for a single purpose, this is becoming increasingly rare. Generally, the center calls for a flexibility to accommodate a greater variety of needs, such as presentations, conferences, screenings, fixed displays, and the like. A primary purpose should therefore be singled out and the secondary purposes developed from the central requirement.

Who will use it? Whether the communications room will be used by an individual, by a group, or by several groups, as well as the level or organization to which these individuals or groups belong, will influence the basic requirements of the center. The configuration, visual, and spatial require-

ments of a room designed to service board members will differ considerably for one designed for trainee session or public stockholder meetings. The type of information to be communicated is another qualifying factor. Whether the room is used to communicate technical information, to conduct sales training meetings, to issue committee and financial reports, to conduct planning sessions, points on the methods of communication to be used.

Information is presented in man ways: oral or graphic, through easel static or movable displays, projectio techniques, texts, charts, graphs, an more typically, combinations of eac Based on the needs of the client, equipment and materials are selected convey the data with the greate amount of understanding and reter tion. Related facilities must be in corporated, and perhaps addition personnel to man the equipment—ar space to house the personnel.

Space and location requirements

In selecting the area to be put use as a communication center st other considerations crop up. The spa should be easily accessible to tho who would use it most. It is necesary that it be large enough for the related equipment and facilities need to complement it. Though requirement for rear projection facilities vary, about eight feet in depth is the minimal span requirement for an average system using three to four projectors. Provision should also be made to accommodate various sized audiences in different meeting arrangements as need.

For instance, where the screen is on the long wall, or in very wide rooms, a U-shaped table works well; the Vshaped arrangements are also comfortable where the communication wall has many visual tools, and both seating arrangements afford an unobstructed view. Or, to further increase the room's versatility the same tables rould be set up rectangle or classroom style, or chairs theatre style.

Aside from the purely technological concerns, the environment of the cener is not to be passed over too lightly, cautions Menell. Lighting, wall reatment, carpeting, furnishings become the background for concentration and can aid or deter the communication process. Lighting is especially important since it must conform of a variety of specialized needs. Budgeting, too, must be carefully nalyzed to assure that the resultant acility justifies the expenditure.

The foregoing investigation was the backbone of a comprehensive study with the management reporting methods, Celnese found it necessary to revamp its

methods of communication and install meeting rooms to present financial and statistical data for study leading to executive committee decisions.

Planning the Celanese center

Menell Associates suggested the executive floor of Celanese's corporate headquarters as the most suitable area for the facility. However, there was no space immediately available. Further investigation of the area uncovered a large meeting room off the executive corridor and several adjacent offices that were used only on occasion. It was then proposed that a series of meeting rooms be planned to meet the executive committee requirements and improve the facilities of the conference room, which is used by other than top management groups.

Using an existing divider, half of the large meeting room was converted into a committee room. It could then be converted into a standard-sized conference room configuration. Menell Associates designed a projection system that serves the committee room, and provides a front projection facility for the large meeting room.

In the space adjacent to both the

projection booth and the committee meeting room, a chart room was installed that permits filing and viewing of confidential information in privacy. Executives concerned with the information stored in this room have access to it all times, yet do not interrupt groups using the meeting rooms.

The chart room has a specially designed and built-in visual file unit that holds 600 slides, all immediately available for viewing. They are easily removed for updating or for a presentation at a committee meeting. The projection facility includes a 16 mm optical sound projector, 2 by 2 or 35mm slide projector, overhead projector for VuGraph slides, and a combined filmstrip projector and record player. All the equipment is operated from a specially designed lectern, which also controls lighting, a front projector ceiling screen, and sound volume. The communication wall, in this instance, is decoratively treated by the use of hinged teak framed panels with vinylcovered cork inserts. When the panels are opened, a paper pad and magnetic chalkboard are exposed.

Since its installation, the communication center at Celanese has been in constant use and already other such centers are being planned for the company. While requirements may vary, as in the case of Celanese, the reason for installing communications facilities remains the same. It is an efficient means of presenting information with the greatest degree of understanding and retention—in less time than that of any other method. (C)
