OUR WASHINGTON REPORT:

A. Richard Zimmerman: Head of GSA interior design staff

A LONG-TIME veteran who learned the interior design business the hard way, who for years taught furniture courses and has held jobs in both retail and manufacturing firms, is now in charge of the Federal Government's largest interior design staff. In that post, he's one of the key men involved with the more than \$100 million in household and office furniture procurement that makes the Feds the contract industry's number one customer.

This General Services Administration official is A. Richard Zimmerman. Before he came to Federal employ in 1963 he had a varied career that let him see furniture industry problems from both topside and bottomside. He had been an accountant before World War II, then later took over two furniture stores as controller. It didn't take long for him to realize that sales people didn't know their furniture. (He still stresses the need for them to have this knowledge, to give them additional selling points.) To learn the business himself, he worked in a furniture factory on his days off—Fridays—for eight years.

Then he organized and conducted a 10-hour traveling furniture clinic for the Southern Furniture Association, and held classes $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours an evening, four nights a week. Subjects included upholstery and case goods construction, woods, veneers, plastics, color harmony, color balance, use of accessories—Dick Zimmerman prides himself today for having read about every book on the subject, worked on about every type of machine, and in just about every furniture factory in the High Point area. He also organized a semi-annual 40-hour week-long course in furniture, in High Point. At the same time, he worked as training director in adult education for the Universities of North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia, on the same course for furniture people.

After three years for the Southern group, he did the same work for three years for the Texas Furniture Association. He also taught interior design at the summer school of the North Carolina Women's College, Greensboro. Following that, he freelanced as a store consultant, working with layouts and merchandising, and then with a partner set up a decorating department in Greenville, S.C. He managed a store in Greensboro, N.C., for about a year.

At the time he came to the Washington area, Zimmerman was designer and sales manager for Swain of High Point. A Washington store was a customer, and he worked there temporarily as an interior decoratorsalesman.

The U.S. at that time was looking for a man to do specifications for office furniture, in the standards section at GSA, and Zimmerman began with that in 1963. He handled the design and specification of all wood office furniture. When GSA's Federal Supply Service took over all of the agency's interior decorating chores, which previously had been split, Zimmerman became chief of the combined interior design staff.

Thus, with considerable experience in both private industry and the Federal agency, Zimmerman is keenly aware of the similarities and differences between them—and is trying to overcome some of the gaps, to improve operations all around. In government, since all agencies must buy schedule furniture—items which have been approved for purchase from designated firms for a given period—interior designers have a captive client—but a resistant one. In private industry, where there is freedom of choice, a designer must be able to sell his rendering, a layout. In government, he finds himself working within considerably more restricted limits.

In both fields, there aren't enough specialized experts—and the demand is great. Zimmerman points to the pick of jobs with top firms open to the relatively few qualified graduates. Time-lags develop—and gaps in communication. In his design and spec period with GSA, Zimmerman revised a specification for traditional executive office wood chairs that had been in effect for 12 years; another for a davenport and easy chair, in effect 15 years. He found component specs that went back to the '30s, and that called for techniques and materials that just aren't in common use in today's modern factories—tacks where staples are used today.

Terminology shows the gap—"davenports" instead of sofas, "lights" for lamps, "dolly" for bedframe. Zimmerman hopes to set up a vocabulary for Federal procurement that will have everyone talking a common, easily understood language.

More ambitious, and longer range, are hopes that the huge Federal procurement volume will be swinging its own forward weight. For various reasons, this procurement has followed industry fashion and trends by some time, generally. With a captive clientele, and with such volume, could not the U.S. be in the vanguard every now and then, be not the follower but the leader?

Still to be tried out is a new method of handling overflow business. Zimmerman has nine designers—two assigned full-time to Washington region upper-echelon work, six in his office in Washington, and one in Wiesbaden, Germany. So far, the staff has been able to handle all the jobs it has been asked to do. Under a 1966 regulation it can farm work to private designers in the jobs' localities. Agencies with massive jobs will make their own arrangements—the Defense Department, before this regulation, engaged Doris Schaefer to do the new Forrestal Building here. The Department of Housing and Urban Development hired away one of Zimmerman's own designers to work fulltime on its new building. If a

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designer has enough background, he can be pla in a space management section, which most agend have. Where agencies do have their own designed they work on their own, without either control imposed coordination from the GSA group. They must follow the requirement of using GSA sched furniture, however, unless there's nothing in schedule to meet the particular need.

Zimmerman is looking for staff-just as soon the present Federal job freeze thaws. Unfortunate there's no time for training; whoever comes on to start with little more than a briefing, so a g background is required. Since there is no Civil S vice register for interior designers, because th isn't that much demand, applicants have these rou for employment: They can take a Federal entra examination, and start as a GS-7, paying about \$6.0 for a year. Or, if there's an executive opening, gra 13 up, they can take a Federal Administrative a Management examination. Perhaps the easiest w is to begin as a temporary-which can last for yo working life. Then, to go on the permanent rol only 90 days as a GS-7 are required after taking examination.

Zimmerman, like his boss Bob Hughes, head the furniture and furnishings branch, is also alway looking for more suppliers. The GSA people invaluably welcome new interest. They're sorry when man facturers shy away because of fear that Federal contract means a government man will run the factor—'tain't so.

After his own long experience, Zimmerman fe pretty strongly, however, that a company making of quality of furniture can't produce another qualit too well. (He once found, at Swain, in an effort bring in a less expensive line of sofas, all he end up saving was the cost of some materials—labor trained to do its job a certain way, and will ke on doing it that way, for one thing.)

"We welcome everybody who makes anything get on the bidders' lists and to come in and talk w us," says Zimmerman.

He points out that the Federal schedules are loose, and so is delivery time, that this is eas added business for a manufacturer. A good operat can do this and never interrupt his regular prodution, Zimmerman says. This helps him to be assur he can keep his workforce.

A supplier shouldn't be afraid of government wor the design chief says. He thinks what keeps many o is that they just don't know what the ropes are f getting in.

Looking ahead, Zimmerman anticipates that t design group at GSA will become more involved the selection of furniture, in design, fabrics, as colors. In the next six months to a year, there pro ably will be more lines in the government schedule more variety of furniture, and probably, if there time, some weeding out of present lines. (C)

Minneapolis' new marketplace

The new Minneapolis Merchandise Plaza will be more than just a marketplace for manufacturers in the upper midwest. The Plaza (see cut), besides filling a need by enabling manufacturers and wholesalers to display wares in a single location the year-



round, is a smaller version of Rockefeller Plaza in New York City, the prototype of the city within a city. The new Plaza will incorporate many facilities. Focus will be the Merchandise Mart, a 20-story reinforced concrete and glass showroom building rising from a landscaped plaza. Adjacent will be a column-free exhibition hall. A motor hotel with swimming pool will be located at the east end of the complex, which will also have restaurant, banking, and shopping facilities, as well as an enormous warehouse. Architect for the 10-acre, multi-level center is Madgwick & Helander. Construction is scheduled to begin this summer.

FIT grads available for employment

June 1967 graduates of the Fashion Institute of Technology's course of study in interior design will be available for full-time employment from April 24–June 3. Following a return to college for a few days to attend a series of seminars, they will return to employers on a permanent basis. Students are trained to assist as sketchers, renderers, designers, executors of floor plans, color and fabric coordinators, shoppers, showroom sales assistants. A new 50-story office structure, to be known as The Burlington Building, will be erected on the site of the old Ziegfeld Theatre on Avenue of the Americas in New York City. Frederik Lunning prize awarded

The annual Frederik Lunning prize, a cash award of \$7,000 will be divided equally between Swedish glass artist Gunnar Cyren and Finnish furniture designer Yrjo Kukkapuro. The prize, sponsored by Georg Jensen, Inc., was conceived to encourage young Scandinavian designers who demonstrate potential for influencing the development of Scandinavian design both at home and abroad.

Student competition

The imagination and skills of interior design students will be called upon in a national competition sponsored by Decorative Furniture Manufacturers Association, in celebration of its 25th anniversary. The competition has two categories-residential and nonresidential-and an award of \$500 will be given to the top winner of each. All entries will be judged for originality, coordination, and use of color, plus integration of all furniture and furnishings and adaption of these factors to the room's use. All furniture must be selected from lines produced by members of the Association, and only one entry per student may be submitted. Requirements are: perspective renderings and room plan, clippings of fabrics, paint colors, etc., plus a brief written description of the room's purpose and use. Each entry must be mounted on one 30 by 40-inch display board, with a sealed envelop containing student's name and school attached to the back. Deadline for entries is April 30, 1967. Electronics for the textile designer

The marvels of our electronic age never cease to amaze. The latest innovation is an electronic "paint brush and drawing board" that will enable the textile designer of the future to discard his traditional paint brush and graph paper in favor of a pen that "writes" with light on an electronic drawing board linked to a computer. The new technique, called "textile graphics," has been developed by IBM and a prototype model was recently demonstrated. It works like this: Instead of copying an enlarged outline of an artist's sketch onto graph paper, the designer displays the sketch on the IBM 2250, then selects weave designs from a library of hundreds of weaves previously stored in the computer. He indicates with a light sensing pen the area of the fabric pattern in which a specific weave is to appear and presses a button. The weave im-

otor hotel survey

here were 5,379 motor hotels with 1,787 units in the United States at e end of 1966, according to a survey Stephen W. Brener, of Helmsleybear, Inc., real estate firm. The 1966 gures compare with 4,782 motor hols with 467,608 units in 1965. The 7 new motels raised the national avage size of a motor hotel slightly, om 98 to 99 units.

2% gain in '65 furniture sales

ne estimated total of household furnure sold in 1965 through furniture id department stores—the industry's to major outlets—was \$2,552,439 at anufacturer invoice (a little over .25 million in retail figures).

Lodging industry registers gains

Gross income for the nation's 66,690 hotels and motels increased \$156 million in 1966, while occupancy inched up to 64 percent compared with 63 percent in 1965. Approximately 1,000 new motels were built last year, and some 100 small hotels ceased operation or were razed. This resulted in a net gain of 34,000 rooms, bringing the total number of available rooms to 2,500,000. Prospects for continued good business seem bright, although an increase in room rates was predicted in many areas, due largely to the impact of higher wage scales.

A!A plans New York guide

A guidebook to the architecture of New York City will be released next year by the New York Chapter, American Institute of Architects, in conjunction with the AIA national convention in May commemorating the 100th anniversary of the NY chapter. Included in the 384-page guidebook will be more than 500 photographs and illustrations, including prototype building styles, stores, and residences of unusual interest.

New Social Sciences Center awarded

The 10th Annual Silver Medal Award of the Pennsylvania Society of Architects went to Harbeson Hough Livingston & Larson, Philadelphia architectural firm, for its design of the new Social Sciences Center of the University of Pennsylvania. The Center, a \$5 million project recently com-



pleted, consists of four structures, and each building makes use of red brick facing, pre-cast concrete trim, and exposed vertical concrete columns to create a unifying effect (see cut). The Center is the first of a planned series of internal quadrangles to be built under the University's Integrated Development Plan.


New assignments . . .

In another assignment, for U.S. Steel, Flannery is providing merchandising and design services for an all-purpose steel canopy program. . . . Corco, Inc., Chicago institutional interior design firm, will design furnishings for a major expansion of Lowell Hall, a luxury highrise residence for women students at University of Wisconsin, Madison. The new residence will include a huge rumpus room with game equipment, snack bar, vending machines; three visiting parlors; library and reading room; a rooftop sun deck . . . Richard D. Roselle, Seattle-based design consultant, has the unusual commission to plan and coordinate color and material selection for the interiors of four new ferries of the Washington State Ferries. Roselle will serve as consultant to W. C. Nickum & Sons, marine architectural firm designing the four ships to be used in Puget Sound. . . . Brand-Worth & Associates, Los Angeles interior design/planning firm, is directing the remodeling of Gardena Bowl, in association with architect Philip Furukawa. A coffee shop and a bar and restaurant are being added to the 16-lane, 18,000 square foot bowling center. . . . Western Contract Furnishers, Oakland, Calif., will furnish the new executive offices of DiGiorgio Corp., food processing company, which will occupy the twenty-third floor of the new Alcoa Building now under construction in the Golden Gateway district. Western will provide complete furnishings, carpeting, draperies, and wallcoverings, working closely with architect and interior designer Whisler/Patri Associates. (C)






LEHIGH/LEOPOLD: NEW YORK SHOWROOM

The new Lehigh/Leopold showrooms at 415 Madison Ave., New York City, are an effective example of dramatic space planning. The showroom was designed with the intention of emphasizing the furniture itself, permitting the architect and designer to see the pieces with a fresh and clear outlook. This effect is achieved by the use of gray tones with white walls, unified by carpeting throughout the area. Other stark, but dramatic effects include a gray louver ceiling above which is an arrangement of fluorescent fixtures placed to produce a staged effect on the furniture beneath them (bottom photo). Accent lighting is provided through an opening in the ceiling at each column. Within the opening is a modular arrangement of gray plastic hanging panels which baffle the spotlight and extend from column to column, forming a fascia which delineates changes in the ceiling level. The changing ceiling heights, in addition to allowing more room for light fixtures and ductwork, provide a suggestion of defined areas within the open space of the showroom. Hanging plastic panels, which extend from ceiling to ceiling, column to column, divide the showroom physically, with the reflections and abstractions seen in and through the panels providing an extra element of interest.

Designed by Robert Tiffany, manager of design, Lehigh Furniture Corp. with the assistance of Richard S. Levine, the showroom displays a variety of both Lehigh and Leopold furniture, including desks, tables, chairs, sofas, ottomans, credenzas, and accessories. Among the new Lehigh products seen are the group 47 cabinet and desk, wood and metal chairs, round and rectangular tables, and a selection of fabrics. Lehigh's Centriform, a space-saving unit designed for banks (top photo), is also on display. The Leopold items include the Template twodrawer lateral file, curved desk and C-shaped work station, the new Century 21 desks, chairs and credenzas, and Mitre desks and credenzas. (C)

THE BIG SHOW AND ITS BACKGROUND



For the past few months, we have been asked repeatedly: Why an industry show? What purposes will CONTRACT '67 fulfill? What gaps in producer-customer relationships will it bridge? Aren't there other shows and other facilities that are doing the job already?

To take the immediate circumstances first, CONTRACT '67 took form last April, as a direct result of a meeting between a group of manufacturers and the publisher of contract Magazine. The manufacturers, all of whom produce commercial/institutional furniture and furnishings, felt that there was a strong need for a one-stop annual showplace where busy designers, specifiers, architects, and others whose product knowledge is essential to volume buying decisions could see and examine the contract industry's collective product.

The manufacturers who met with us were not merely looking for a show, but one that would be responsibly managed and aggressively promoted. As the specialized publication of the field, CONTRACT Magazine appeared to them the logical choice to initiate, organize, and carry through such an industry-wide trade show. In subsequent meetings with our Industry Advisory Board we developed policies for the show and themes for the seminars and panel sessions that will be held each morning. New to show business, CONTRACT Magazine arranged to retain the services of a professional show management firm, National Expositions Co., to assure that the administration of the show would be in capable hands, and that the time and place chosen would bring together large numbers of contract professionals—designers and specifiers responsible for ordering hundreds of millions of dollars worth of contract merchandise each year.

Collaboration with National Expositions Co. has proved

that we made the correct decision in selecting a professional show organization. Through its efforts, more than 135 leading manufacturers have taken space in CONTRACT '67 at this writing. National Expositions has also worked up a complete attendance promotion program, including magazine advertising, publicity, posters, and more than one hundred thousand pieces of direct mail offering advance registration to contract specifiers and buyers.

The fruits of the campaign are already apparent, even before the opening of the show on April 25; hundreds of contract professionals have replied to the mailings from all over the country, indicating their intention to attend CONTRACT '67. Pre-registration forms have been received from individuals and firms as far away as Hawaii, Texas, Ottawa, Puerto Rico, and California. Among the advance registrants are the presidents of the country's largest hotel chains, store planning directors, school and institutional purchasing agents, military and Federal government procurement, plus, of course, a host of designers, specifiers and contract furnishers from most of the fifty states.

As a result of these combined efforts, the exposition that will take place April 25 through April 27 at the New York Coliseum will be a big one—and a highly significant one. In a field which has been developing an identity, an exhibition like CONTRACT '67 represents perhaps the final step in the emergence of a coherent industry, in which the professional stands in a definite relationship to a well-defined group of manufacturers and the products they make.

Admittedly, the contract industry has reached across a multitude of trades and professions, and just as clearly, its communications have not kept pace with its volume of five billion dollars in contract furnishings annually. In New York City alone, the contract specifier must visit hundreds of sources in dozens of buildings to keep up with the industry's endless repertory of products. With CONTRACT '67, we inaugurate the first compact and comprehensive showplace for the contract industry.

President, Tom Lee Ltd.
Topic: New problems and
logistics that confront the
hotel designer.

Tom Lee is an internationally famous designer whose activities carry him around the world and whose projects include hotels, offices, department stores, museums, showrooms, and store windows. Lee's sense of light and space developed while he was costume and set designer for theater and ballet. That discipline has influenced his design concepts-he does not create a room, but rather a total setting for people. To his credit are such projects as the Doral Beach Hotel in Miami, the National Design



Center in New York, the Fashion Industries Presentation at the American National Exhibition in Moscow, a skyscraper in Johannesburg, the Bigi shop at Bergdorf Goodman and the Bonwit Teller windows in New York, and the Shah's Royal Teheran Hilton (in collaboration with Hilton architects). He is currently working on a 500-room contemporary hotel in New Orleans.

ROBERT HUGHES

Chief of Furniture and Furnishings Branch, General Services Administration.

Topic: How the government goes about specifying and procuring contract furniture.

Robert E. Hughes is a veteran of 27 years in the Federal contracting service, who heads up a purchasing staff of 46. He is now chief of the furniture and furnishings branch, procurement operations division, of General Services Administration, the Federal government's housekeeping agency. Hughes began his career in 1939 with the Home Owners Loan Corp. In 1942 he transferred to the Public Housing Administration, first in Boston and then in the Washington regional office. In 1950, Hughes joined GSA in the procurement division. In 1962 he joined the central GSA office procurement operations division as chief of the photographic and reproductions branch, and in 1965 he succeeded to the post of chief of the furniture and furnishings branch. Hughes now operates a purchasing program in excess of \$100 million annually, making GSA the largest single source of volume in the contract industry.

LEE EPSTEIN

New York Attorney, counsel for the contract design industry, and educator.

Topic: What the Space Planner/Designer should know about the law and contracts with clients.

Lee Epstein has made important contributions to clarifying the many legal complexities involved in the relationship between planner/designer and client. Specifically, he has written countless articles on the subject in leading trade



publications, including "Designer Compensation," which appeared in July 1965 con-TRACT. He recently drafted the form contracts for the Industrial Designers Society of America. As an educator, Epstein teaches business practices for industrial designers at Pratt Institute and lectures on business practices and interior design at Parsons School of Design, Rhode Island School, Philadelphia College of Art, and Syracuse University. He is executive secretary of the Committee for American Participation in the Triennalle, and was instrumental in planning the United States' show at the U.S. Trade Center in London.




approach and innovations. Lerner is also an active member of the Young Presidents Organization and a frequent contributor to YPO Enterprise as well as other business and design magazines and dailies.

SCHOOL FURNISHINGS-II

MAXIMUM DURABILITY MUST GO HAND-IN-HAND WITH A
HOSPITABLE ATMOSPHERE AND PROVISION OF GOOD WORKING
AND SOCIAL ENVIRONMENTS. BY LOUIS S. BING



What is the trend in 1967 in furnishings for educational institutions? The definite preference for nursing homes and health institutions, where a homelike atmosphere is considered of therapeutic value, is now toward decorative furniture in distinctive stylings, such as the ubiquitous Mediterranean. For schools and colleges, the demand is almost entirely for coordinated modern, in simple, functional, straight-line design. Emphasis is not to individualize differences in styling or design but rather to create rooms that will withstand hard usage.

College students, particularly young men, are inclined to be careless and neglectful of their environmental backgrounds. As a result, furnishings for living quarters, libraries, student unions, and dining areas must be carefully engineered to plan for maximum durability and to provide, as much as possible, for a ready-made place for books, sports equipment, bed and bath linens, apparel, and other personal accouterments. Owing to the ever-increasing demand for income from dormitories, it is also necessary to plan for a growing hospitality and for student welfare. Often, comfort and appearance standards take the form of high-pile rugs of nylon or other synthetic fibers, colorful draperies, woven


and textured upholstery fabrics, and bright contrasting colors on walls and movable furniture.

Quantitatively, the largest expenditure on furnishings for colleges goes into equipment for dormitories. Manufacturers maintain virtually two complete lines—one prefabricated to attach to walls and floors in order to qualify for Federal financial aid; the other, an equivalent styling in freestanding or movable pieces. Finishes for dormitory furnishings is largely plastic laminates for casegoods in standard walnut or lighter natural birch; some are in natural woods with oiled surfaces.

To conserve space, in view of high building costs, student bedrooms tend to be small in size, usually 194 square feet for a two-student room. Yet students themselves are growing taller and larger in size, and beds are usually seven or eight feet long. As a result, expert engineering of bedroom furniture is required to provide a "place for everything" in a compact space. Storage facilities, for instance, are available in modular units, compartmentalized and adjustable for apparel and personal effects.

These bedrooms must also accommodate a study desk, often part of a built-in wall unit, and one wood arm-

chair per person. Beds that are attached to the walls can be swung to an up-right position, totally concealed during daytime. Also popular is the dual-purpose bed, doubling as a lounge for extra seating space. Mattresses are either foam rubber or inner spring, usually on flat suspended wire steel spring bases. Double bunk beds are no longer in popular demand, since they do not adapt easily for social gatherings.

Free-standing bedroom case pieces duplicate the variety of built-ins and come in many sizes. There are ward-robes, desks, armchairs, chests and other storage cabinets, and sleep lounges. Regarded as utility equipment, they are of no identifiable period design or style. When they are varied, it is usually for size or specialized utility features, seldom because of the basic functional design.

Uniformity exists in public dining areas as well, and almost all food service is a la cafeteria. In large rooms,


furniture is arranged to cater to small groups, perhaps eight to twelve persons at a table. Square or oblong in size, tables can be easily moved into various combinations. Chairs are principally chrome plated with plastic backs and seats, to match sturdy chrome legged tables with Formica and other plastic laminate tops. However, sturdy wood chairs and tables are still popular, especially in privately owned colleges, and here upholstered chairs in plastic or fabric covers add warmth to the room. There is a growing use of multicolor schemes in dining areas, often up to four or six basic hues. An important variation of dining design is the university faculty or club room, with more emphasis on decorative design.

For lounges, student unions, and the social areas in dormitories and libra-





moved far away from the standard joined desk and chair in the classic tradition of the one-room school house. Now available in highly specialized designs, chairs come in many colors, many fabrics, and with many optionals such as drop tablet arms, book compartments and baskets. There are efficiency attachments to work benches, desks, and study tables. Where upholstery is desired, in theaters or auditoriums for instance, new nylon pile fabrics are most welcome.

Classrooms, too, require special attention with the increasing use of audio-visual equipment. The prevailing practice is definitely away from inflexible furniture arrangements and toward the free-standing desks and chairs that can be grouped and regrouped as required. Mainly in metal there is still a demand for wood classroom furniture, all planned for adaptability to changing classroom sessions. This same demand comes from the

needs of special furniture sized to the new cubicles in modern college libraries where there are open stacks of reference and general books and where students are brought right in to the reserve book area.

There are many other needs for furniture in the modern school and college. Furnishings must be provided for such specialized areas as physics and chemistry labs, gymnasiums, beauty colleges, music and art departments, domestic science kitchens, to name but a few. Providing these furnishings, there are many relatively small but highly specialized equipment manufacturers, and the national giants leave these fields to the specialists.


Demand also exists for carpets, hard surface floor coverings, and draperies compatible with the use of modern and functional school and college furniture. Carpeting is now entering the classroom, the lounge, the library, and even the hallway, to give a definite up-lift to the general environment. New synthetic carpet fibers prove highly resistant to soilage and fire, and winew maintenance equipment and finishing techniques they can endure long, hard life. Carpet mills are eage to provide information on carpetin for the kindergarten or college class room. Resilient flooring manufacture have improved their products and ofer a broader range of materials, including cushioned vinyls, especial useful in labs and areas of maximu traffic.

Fiber glass, now available in mar colors, patterns, weaves, and weight is a popular choice for drapery fabrics. A new trend is the multi-purpos fabric, sui able for drapery, upho stery, bedspread and other uses, provide elegance and cheerfulness in variety of colored prints as well a solids.
