Between 1899 and 1905, Austrian architects and designers developed the style now identified as Vienna Moderne. Reacting against the excessive ornamentation of Art Nouveau, Otto Wagner (1841-1918), Josef Hoffmann (1870-1956), and many others created buildings, objects and furniture which emphasized "great simplicity and an energetic exhibition of construction and materials."* In 1903, Hoffmann and Koloman Moser, both of whom had studied under Wagner, founded the Wiener Werkstaette (Vienna Workshops). Inspired by the example of the English Arts and Crafts Movement, the Wiener Werkstaette brought together outstanding craftsmen and the most advanced designers of the time. Also, for the first time, designers other than the Thonets were creating bentwood styles.

THONET MUNDUS J.&J.KOHN

Until 1869, the manufacture of bentwood furniture was controlled exclusively by Gebrüder Thonet. But upon the expiration of the firm's patents, numerous other manufacturers began copying the techniques and styles invented by Thonet. Notable among them was the firm of J. & J. Kohn. A period of fierce competition ensued. In 1906 Leopold Pilzer, who began his career as an office boy for Kohn, merged sixteen of the smaller bentwood producers into a new firm, Mundus, In 1917, Mundus acquired control of Pilzer's first employers, J. & J. Kohn. During the difficult period of economic and political reorganization which followed World War I, Gebrüder Thonet joined Kohn-Mundus (1922-23). Under Pilzer's leadership, the bentwood industry, critically damaged by the war, began to revive.







New York - An exhibition of the work of Lella and Massimo Vignelli recently opened at the Exhibition Center at Parsons School of Design.

The exhibition, honoring the Vignelli design team, is the first of a series of annual exhibitions in which Parsons will pay homage to designers who have made a significant contribution in the contemporary design field.

Interiors designed by the Vignelli's include the Museum of the Minneapolis Society of Fine Arts, St. Peter's Church in Citicorp Building, the Olivetti showrooms in Milan, and the Joseph Magnum Department Store. Product design includes furniture for Sunar and Poltronova.

Serving as guest curator for the Vignelli exhibition is Mildred Constantine, former associate curator Department of Architecture and Design at the Museum of Modern Art. Constantine, who is associated with the Banff

Center for the Arts, counts among her publications Word and Image, which was designed by Massimo Vignelli, Beyond Craft, Revolutionary Soviet Posters, and Tina Modati.

600-room, 40-story luxury hotel rises in Manhattan

New York - Currently under construction on West 57 Street, the 600room, 40-story Parker Meridien New York will be the latest luxury hotel in this city. It is scheduled to open in October 1980.

Interiors of the hotel are being done by Sarah Lee, of Tom Lee Ltd., who envisions a hotel with a European flavor. Using illusion as one of her major design tools, Lee created a wonderful atrium running 57 ft. into the body of the hotel and rising six stories to a skylight. Reminiscent of Renaissance palazzos and basilicas, the atrium is designed to provide either sunlight or moonlight. Architect for the spaces is Philip Birnbaum.

Twenty-six stories will be devoted to 600 guestrooms and suites, eight levels to 100 hotel apartments, and the lower four floors to public areas. There will be one penthouse level as well.

Special features of the hotel will include eight squash and racquet ball courts, complete health club, rooftop swimming pool, and underground parking for 100 cars. Restaurants, bars. conference and banquet facilities, as

well as a small but elegant ballroom, are also part of the projected facilities.

Meridien Hotels, a wholly owned subsidiary of Air France, and the Jack Parker Corp. will operate the hotel.



CONTRACT WORLD

Market study develops profile of furniture industry

New York — Almost 20 percent of all contract design and specification firms responding to a CONTRACT/NEO-CON survey placed their yearly contract furnishings expenditure at over \$5 million. Almost 24 percent located that expenditure between \$1 million and \$2.49 million, while another 13.1 percent reported that it was between \$2.5 and 5 million.

Space planners, furnishers, specifiers, and contract designers made up the bulk of the response, followed by interior design firms, architectural firms, and end users.

Published by CONTRACT Magazine in cooperation with the Merchandise Mart in Chicago, CONTRACT Market Study's aim was to develop an accurate profile of the contract

furniture/furnishing market as well as the contract professional who is the prime specifier and buyer in this market.

Manufacturers, showrooms, and new product introductions and their status were also examined in the report.

95.5 percent of those interviewed did office design, while an impressive 60.7 percent reported doing banks and financial institutions.

Remodeling of interiors is gaining on the portion of new interiors, with remodeling calculated at 46 percent of all jobs done. Firms interviewed also expect that over half of their office business in 1980 will be in some form of open plan/office landscape layout.

Italy plans major trade center in U.S.

New York — Plans to open an Italian Trade Center in New York were recently finalized in an official lease-signing ceremony at City Hall. Approximately 32,000 sq. ft. in a new 27-story office tower designed by I.M. Pei & Partners will serve as space for the largest trade center of its kind established in the United States by a foreign country.

Operated by the Italian Trade Commission, under the direction of Dr. Lucio Caputo, Italian Trade Commissioner/New York, the building will vastly expand the commission's program of promotional activities.

"The center will provide Italian

companies and businessmen with sizable exhibition facilities, temporary showroom and office space, conference rooms, and other support services to encourage increased trade between Italy and the U.S.," said Dr. Luigi Deserti, President of the Italian Foreign Trade Institute. Dr. Deserti flew here from Rome to sign the lease at a ceremony at City Hall attended by Mayor Edward Koch.

The three-floor Italian Trade Center will have its own Park Avenue entrance and large street-level reception area. 12,000 sq. ft. of exhibition space will be provided by the lower level concourse.

Design of the center is being executed by architect Piero Sartogo of Design Collaborative, in consultation with designer Massimo Vignelli.



Knoll creates post-modern paradox

"Where simplification cannot work, simpleness results. Blatant simplification means bland architecture. Less is a bore," remarks Robert Venturi in Complexity and Contradiction in Architecture (MOMA, 1966).


The new, two-floor Knoll International New York showroom is anything but elementary in scope and meaning. The design firm of Venturi & Rauch combines historic allusion, ornamentation, and ambiguity—keynotes for post-modernist design—in creating this striking showroom.

Working within the constraints of the building envelope, a glass and aluminum office building with low ceilings and a grid of columns, the firm creates a space where familiar products are seen from unexpected points of view. On the entry floor, selected objects are spotlighted in a dark, confined space of green hues. Beyond, a larger, well-lighted open area can be glimpsed which contains furniture and fabrics against neutral background hues. Off to the right, draped fabric cascades through an opening from the

floor above. Perpendicular to this grand, fluid statement, a trompe l'oeil wall faithfully duplicates one of several freestanding walls of fabric samples. The parade of square columns has been converted to round, monumental forms, flaring out at the top beyond a decorative black line that also runs along the perimeter of the showroom. To Venturi, the line contains and brings the furniture groupings together. Each column holds an ambient lighting fixture. Windows are covered with undulating vertical panels cut askew on each side, forming an abstract play of light forms.

The upper floor displays Otto Zapf's and William Stephen's open plan systems. This level also contains a luxurious conference room with walls of iced teal silk velvet. Venturi & Rauch plays its design credo with an elegant edge. Streamlined Mies van der Rohe Brno chairs pull up to Charles Pfister's black lacquered conference tables, capturing the reflection of an 18th century Robert Adam ceiling reproduced on acrylic.

Most designer/specifiers familiar with the use of the computer in space planning and specification think of it either as a graphics tool or a computational tool. Cannell-Heumann & Associates (CHA), headquartered in Los Angeles, has developed its use to a point of sophistication where both graphics and space management computational use are integrated.

Even the biggest, most complex jobs among the 40 million square feet of space for which the firm provided design services during the past eight years of its 16-year existence benefit from this capability. Especially with complex installations, changes made in floor plans on CRTs are translated into computational statistics. Remove four workstations from a floor plan, for example, and every detail, including four chairs and ancillary furnishings and equipment, is reflected as a deduction from purchase order information and extended costs, as well. That is a description at its most elemental, since, if added to the software program, the reduction may also affect projections of future space and furnishings needs.

Computer does not create

Starting on the premise that the computer is probably the single most misunderstood and praised piece of office equipment in the 20th century, CHA makes the point that both supporters and critics alike often fail to understand that a computer is merely a tool and is only as effective as the designer-planner is experienced in its use.

"The computer does not create," says Werner Heumann, Chairman of the Board, who directs CHA's space planning and design work, "it can only implement. In such cases, the designer has to add the skills of computer technology to his expertise in one or more of the design disciplines.

"CHA has adopted computers not merely for the sake of computers, but also to allow understanding of problems and, ultimately, produce better design solutions. Critics often regard computer-aided design as a clinical solution, when nothing could be further from the truth. The key is that machines aid, whereas man's mind creates

No loss of esthetic sensitivity

Heumann spearheaded the development of computers as a design tool at CHA and points out that critics are mistaken in their belief that the computer replaces the designer or architect, with resulting loss of esthetic sensitivity. "There is no reason why computer-aided graphics and esthetic design cannot be synonymous," he says, "because final design responsibility remains with the individual who uses the computer. All that the computer does is merely solve complex computational problems and relieve the specifier from doing repetitive graphics that only waste the time of humans and escalate design costs."

How CHA utilizes the tool is typified in a job done for Manufacturers Hanover Trust, one of the largest banks in the world. CHA was retained by the

bank to program 13 divisions of its facilities in mid-town New York City. Currently, those divisions are located in five different buildings. The objective was to locate all 13 divisions in one structure.

Manufacturers Hanover purchased the Union Carbide Building. It has approximately 1.2 million square feet of space, is located at 270 Park Avenue. The bank, however, could not simultaneously occupy the 50-story steel-and-glass structure while Union Carbide offices were still in it. Occupancy was, therefore, scheduled to take place over a three-year period, commencing in the fall of this year, according to a spokesman.

Complex move to one headquarters


It was obvious to Samuel D. Cannell, CHA's president, that an immense amount of master planning would be required to make such a staggered movement of personnel and equipment from so many locations to the one centralized headquarters building. The move had to be made as efficiently as possible while minimizing disruption of the normal, day-to-day banking operations, points out Cannell. "Complicating the problem further was the need to renovate the premises, including revamping the existing mechanical and electrical systems to meet current building code standards," he says.

CHA's computer capability was instrumental in getting the commission from Manufacturers Hanover, Cannell elaborates. "The computer helped us to do a preliminary analysis of the bank's space needs, communications, and divisional objectives. We then applied those needs and goals to a phased space expansion program. Our objective was to coordinate as efficiently and economically as possible the integration of the different departments of the bank, the different communication systems, and other varied

elements into one unified whole over several years of time. And all of this was to be accomplished without disrupting vital bank operations."

The program developed by CHA with the assistance of its computer calls for the bank to occupy the new building in three phases, with the anticipated construction starting date being October 1, 1980. Possible occupancy of 111,594 square feet is projected for February 1, 1981. Phase two, involving 95,652 square feet, could commence construction on

April 1,1981, with occupancy possible on July 31, 1981. A third phase involves 800,000 square feet, with construction commencing on April 1, 1982 and occupancy scheduled for February 1, 1983.

Computer telescoped development

"We developed the program in three months with the assistance of the computer," explains Manuel T. Urquiza, Vice President/Planning of CHA. "Conventional, manual methods of programming would have taken us six to nine months, during which time the requirements for square footage and Manufacturers Hanover Trust personnel would have changed and become obsolete. In addition, the degree of accuracy achievable with the computer program permits faster

and more efficient changes to be made than would be possible using manual methods. We are now updating Manufacturers Hanover's 1977 program with information to allow for changes in the 1980s."

CHA identified the client's requirements in six different stages and about six years ahead of the anticipated needs, he elaborates. "In consequence, Manufacturers Hanover will push ahead with redevelopment plans for 1983."

Wm. C. Walker, Jr., Vice President, Manufacturers Hanover Trust, reflects his enthusiasm of the computer-assisted programming. "We found it to be the most accurate and flexible method of documenting current and projected space needs," he says.

The total CHA assignment utilized

both programming and schematic planning capabilities. That included a thorough investigation of Manufacturer Hanover's functional square footage needs, workstation analysis, and furniture and equipment inventory. It would eventually allow the bank the option of using in-house capability to manage its new facility upon completion of CHA's facilities maintenance system, which updates the architectural, as-built drawings, and inventory systems under license.

Urquiza comments that state-ofthe-art technology today permits most innovative and imaginative programs to be designed and implemented in CHA's projects "We developed an interactive computer program that allows us overall comprehensive computer data bases, which allow for computational programs, such as space needs requirements, square footage, and individuals. But they also allow for merging of data bases and inventory data for furniture and equipment, as well as architectural and mechanical elements. In addition, we have developed an interactive design system, which allows us to develop definitive architectural construction documents that become interactive with the inventory system and the computational programs."

Computers do not vie with esthetics

Heumann cautions that computer-aided design does not negate the importance of esthetic considerations in the built environment. He says, "Architects and designers have not always dealt well with large-scale spatial problems. Such problems often are too complex and the solutions tend to become too superficial, or the problems are complex and the solutions have been too architecturally monumental.


"The computer is a device, a machine which can assist our profession in overcoming monumentalism, and by understanding specifics and particulars, allow us to narrow our focus on the individual problem and create better environmental solutions. In effect, the computer responds very pragmatically and assists in the problem-solving process with an infinite capacity for the specific, the mundane-but-important detail, and the identification of the individual and particular. This process then leads to an accelerated, however precise and articulated, statement of an architectural problem and the requirements to be met in creating a more human environmental solution.

"In essence, planning and design must go beyond mere retrospection and verbal analysis of methods and past solutions. We must recreate by reperforming with new methodologies and new tools."



What will the future world be like? What is the designer's role in guiding and shaping it? What can one of the country's largest, multi-discipline design/planning organizations do to prepare itself now for anticipated change?

Thirteen professionals from SLS Environetics Inc. retreated to Mammoth Lake high in the California Sierras to devote themselves to these questions at company's first, four-day Environetics Futures Group Seminar. Their crystal-ball gazing far into the future explored many possibilities and alternatives open to mankind, some chilling at the prospect, before drawing optimistic conclusions as far reaching as colonized planets and undersea domed cities.

On a more day-to-day business level, the Environetics Futures Group also came to conclusions solidifying the marketing philosophy that individuals of the group possessed but had only just discovered they shared common commitment to (from various SLS Environetics branches, some had not met before this seminar). The thrust of discussions centered on designing communication and organizational tools, reviewing international applications, exploring recruitment of the necessary professional skills needed to increase their expertise even further, and recommending formation of new divisions to broaden the company's base of operations.

The Environetics Futures Group Seminar was opened by the corporate management triumverate of the organization—Lawrence Lerner, president and chief executive officer; Richard Korchien, executive vice president/director of eastern division; Sidney Resnick, executive vice president/director of western division.

In his opening remarks, Lerner said: "We're here to ponder the future of the commercial design industry and our own company. We can only do that intelligently by appraising the future of all of the factors that bear on

the well-being of both." After enumerating some points for possible discussion, he concluded with: "We would like this seminar to deal with concepts, rather than details."

Having given his free-wheeling directive, Lerner, with Resnick and Korchien, left the meeting, rejoining it at the concluding session to hear the results. The participants then spent three days in general, often heated and excited discussions before dividing into two groups to draw their conclusions.

Participants focusing on the structure and future of SLS Environetics were: Don Sacher, Frank Eaton, Warren Chol, Alan Briskman, Paul Pascal, John Hathaway-Bates, Ken Carey. The second group, examining the future of the world, were: Erik Lerner, Gil Simon, Ed Bajbek, Jim Vigus, John Totino, Bob Parfet.

These key persons represent a number of disciplines practiced by the firm in its ten offices (three of which are abroad). The firm operates under two regional umbrellas, the Eastern Region out of New York and the Western Region based in Los Angeles, and employs in excess of 200 persons.

Taken from a copyrighted report issued by SLS Environetics, excerpts summarizing the Futures Group conclusions are reprinted here to spur the imaginations of all designers. Some will nod in quiet agreement with statements made; others may have totally divergent views. In either case, CONTRACT invites readers to respond to the thought-provoking ideas presented here for publication in a future issue.

PART I: AS RESOURCES ON EARTH ARE DEPLETED COLONIZED PLANETS CAN LEAD TO SURVIVAL

The world has just woken up to a set of facts which could bring about the nervous breakdown of civilization itself. There is not an unlimited supply of the raw materials civilization needs to survive and grow. The world has also discovered, almost as an afterthought, that uncontrolled breeding combined with medical advances have doubled "expected life span" (and therefore extended breeding potential) and will soon over-populate our planet to the point where life as we know it will be impossible.

What were once theories expounded by academics and philosophers have now become facts known by all, thanks to the efficiency of modern communications. Cities are spreading out like ink stains on wet paper, and many fear a day when the face of the whole planet will be a gigantic metropolis.

Science fiction is becoming fact. Harry Harrison's Make Room, Make Room and Aldous Huxley's Brave New World are visible in places already.

Those who would deny elitism are facing a movement with the strength of a tidal wave, before which they are no more than finger-sized corks. The industrialized, materialistic powers of the Northern Hemisphere are already established as the elite of the world. Only the destruction of Northern Civilization itself can change the mapped-out future we face; idealogical differences between the Capitalistic West and Communistic East are but different colors of the same cloak. The technology, scientific lead, and education of the North moves into top gear while the Southern Hemisphere still tries to learn how to drive. and the race for success is so short it will be over before the South starts the engine. The prize is power; once won, it cannot be argued.

Every day the Northern Hemis-

We have to consider that human engineering may allow us to live under the sea. Space planners and designers of today ought to begin to consider what talents and disciplines they will require in the very near future to house this sub-aquatic population.

Possible futures are startling

Survival is a need which invents new rules and survival is recognized as the game already. Those who rely on yesterday's rules have already lost.

So what are the possible answers? The Futures Group explored many possibilities. They were not necessarily unanimous decisions nor were all subscribed to. They are, however, possibilities that must be considered, particularly in view of the present events in the world. Listed below, they range from incredible to unacceptable, and yet all are possible:

- Anarchy, as each man tries to ensure his own and his family's survival.
- 2. Nationalism, where none matter outside the camp of one's own.
- **3.** Whole nations could be destroyed to ensure the raw materials to provide survival of the strongest.
- Nations forced into bankruptcy and then stripped of their assets down to the land itself.
- Expansion into space and the colonization of new planets to be systematically plundered of their minerals and produce.
- Exploitation of the oceans and new defense systems to protect investments beneath the sea.
- 7. Fortified domed cities impervious to the destruction and pollution of the atmosphere.
- Genetic engineering to reduce the size and therefore the needs of whole populations.
- Forced breeding limits for all except the elite.
- 10. A legally enforced shortening of life span, where one is "allowed" a pre-determined length of life.
- 11. Return to feudalism, tribalism, or clan survival.

12. Organized "wars" to reduce population.

Group explores positive futures

There are, of course, many other alternatives, some far more chilling to educated minds when considered in the context of historical fact. But when asked to evaluate the 12 most possible future prospects for our diminishing earth, those listed here were chosen by the Environetics Futures Group.

Medical philosophy insists that no disease can be treated until it is recognized. Recognition is dependent upon the history of the patient, genetic trends, and careful examination of existing or experienced symptoms. This procedure was followed by the Environetics Futures Group until the possible trends were identified, then by discussion and debate, treatments and directive, actions were suggested.

The negative values of the probable futures predicted, when related to our present understanding of morality, soon took second place to the benefits which could be gained by actions available to the world now. In fact, it became apparent in a very short time that civilization, by grasping only some of the probable futures, could eliminate others and take mankind into a new Golden Age—just as the fears and troubles facing Europe in the 17th Century opened up the New World and brought about today's civilization.

It is true that many awful events took place to achieve unlocking new continents, but everything we hold dear today grew from those actions. Like a child suffers falls, burns, and tears to reach adult maturity, so civilization of the Old World learned to walk in the new. There is, however, no need for today's civilization to make the same mistakes.

Space colonization a necessity

After all probable futures were considered, all but one proved to be terminal and dependent on what exists in this planet, for the length of the future is relevant on how long Earth's resources will last. The only logical step for mankind is to colonize other planets. Earth is an island, and as we use up what it has, the harder it

The reaction of persons to today's buildings, where they are designated to little common banks of humanity, may bring a demand to return to individuality and privacy as considerations for design.

• It can be expected that as energy costs soar, more and more companies will move into the sunbelt, creating new metropolitan centers that will house total operations in what is today desert, relying on solar power and recycled body heat for energy.



● It may come about that system furniture makers, along with the technology of mobil homes and prefab buildings, will move into construction of total office environments.

becomes to make the journey to another island.

Mankind must own more stockpiles than just Earth.

Accept the need for space travel, as the Elizabethan sailors of England or Conquistadors of Spain accepted the need to cross the oceans, and fear-filled futures not only become acceptable, but also begin to promise the Utopia man has dreamt of since he first began to dream.

The Environetics Futures Group could not just leap across the next hundred years and invent Utopia; it was charged with the discovery of a route to the future.

Logically, mankind must go out into the universe if mankind is to have eternity, for the very day-to-day raw materials mankind needs will one day run out if we are confined to this planet. With every year, the time we have left to develop the means of escape runs out with accelerating speed.

This conclusion, voiced on the first day at Mammoth Lake, slowly gained even greater importance as the meeting proceeded.

Then accept the problem, was the fruit of this conclusion, that technology must not only survive, it also must be developed. If this is the case, came the question, then what happens to the trend to self-sufficiency and the predictions that civilization is going to move away from the city?

Designers can pave road to future

The general consensus led to the following things for the designers and powers-that-be to consider today, to create a road into the future, a future where for the first time in history the world as a whole can look forward to an age of growth, attainment (material and esthetic), and a knowledge that things will get better with every day.

- Human ingenuity may just invent "matter-transfer" machines which would bring an endless Golden Age, but until then, work as normal.
- 2. Designers provide the ways to change society, be it transport or cooking pots, and now more than before, designers are needed by mankind.
 - 3. Designers must find ways to

create the tools for the human race to exploit the raw materials we have left—and there are resources good for centuries if they can be developed and transported to where they are needed. It is time to bring together the politicians, corporate powers, and institutions with the designers so that the talents available can be exploited. The best designers today are drawn out of their constructive purpose into designing consumer products, and this will continue until it is possible for a designer to earn more where he is valuable to society as a whole.

4. The Third World (or the undeveloped nations) need to be assisted to bring them to a point where they can contribute (and be rewarded equally) to the good of mankind as a whole.

At the end of the Mammoth Lake meeting, the expectations of what the world will see in the future were listed by consent, so if you do not have a crystal ball handy, this is what the Environetics Futures Group sees as possible.

Inherited class benefits will slowly disappear but will be replaced by a system of elitism dependent upon skill and education. (This was accepted to be happening already but an acceleration of this process was predicted.) Therefore, access to good education for one's children and oneself will become a top priority to employees, and employers will offer "extra education possibilities" as an incentive to gain the right staff.

Satellites, A/V aid communications

- The present economics of business travel will provide incentives for the acceleration of development of audio-visual communications using satellites as the cost of wire contact methods becomes inhibitive. Satellite communication will allow easier transaction of business over long distances, which will, in turn, provide a need to overcome time-zone differences.
- A possible end-product (made simple by video-recorders) will be for every business day to begin in a meeting with an audio-visual screen. The need to answer quickly many requests, orders, etc., which could be gained

- We may see construction of satellite communities, with employees operating public communication systems and working at a company-supplied and maintained portable office—erected in their own backyards.
- Society may develop to where people leave home and go to work in a kibbutz situation for six months of the year and then return to their homes for a six-month non-work period.
- The idea of geodesic domes covering metropolitan areas may become fact in the next 20 years, as atmospheric pollution and energy-conservation needs increase.



within the first hour in the office would necessitate the need for clerical staff to have contact with other countries person-to-person.

- Following this development it will be necessary to be "able" to communicate en masse and at all levels, and this will herald the end of many of the lesser-spoken languages. It is probable that English will be the basic commercial language with "variance" additions for color from other languages. At first, languages like Norwegian and Flemish will die out, followed within decades by German, Italian, and French.
- International transactions will also bring about the need for standard measurements, and the U.S. will have to learn to live with metric measurements, probably within the next decade.
- Banks and other institutions (including Governments) will find themselves forced into working with the most efficient "International Standards," and this could be uniform and accepted within 20 years.
- Rail transport will return to its 19th Century importance as bulk movement of materials becomes common, for, if banks standardize, so will industries, and as towns rely upon certain industries today, so will nations in the future. (Consider what it would be like if the world's road transport was all manufactured in Japan, all air-

craft in the U.S., all rail transport in the U.S.S.R., and all sea transport in Europe.)

 As technology advances and competition increases, corporations will rely upon "security of knowledge" and monopoly of skills to protect their markets. The days when industries were all located in one town may return, but the ownership of any one industry may become singular, and the "town" will be an integral part of the factory.

Undersea, domed cities possible

Towns could be designed to contain everything necessary for survival—a place to succor thousands or



hundreds of thousands from birth to death—security increased and the environment tamed by covering the total with a dome. Then the colder areas of the earth become useable, and the deserts could sprout flowers of civilization. Strengthen the dome and there is no reason why the city could not be situated on the ocean bed.

The outcome of the Environetics Futures Group first meeting high in the Sierra Mountains of California is that humanity can be optimistic but only if the powers-that-be stop trying to tell the designers "how" to do their job and begin to ask for the answers to earth's problems. If anyone has the answers—it is the designers.

PART II: EXPANSION INTO ALLIED SERVICES CAN BE ROAD TO COMPANY GROWTH AND PRODUCTIVE FUTURE

The conclusion of the group exploring the Environetics framework called for the evolution of the organizational structure which would create a cohesive production and marketing establishment to service the Environetics philosophy.

In order to create and maintain such a new company structure, it was suggested that Environetics be set on a development program, one to take it from its present office planning basis to a total environmental design and construction organization.

There was a consensus that the Environetics organization was about to move from an esthetically based commercial organization into a commercial organization with academic as well as fiscal responsibilities.

Need for new divisions

The Environetics organization now offers many allied services, some of which operate as separate divisions or subsidiaries. Those services that now are part of the total can be made to operate independently as separate divisions, which would round off the present market leadership in environmental design. Current and future divisions would include:

1. Management Consultancy. 2.

Rapid market changes and the creation, growth, and passing of short-life industries may likely bring about throw-away buildings, particularly where modular components can be recycled to house another occupant.

Large corporations may soon protect themselves from energy shortages, local taxes, etc., by establishing their own individual cities, where company personnel will work, enjoy their recreation, and be housed totally within the company-owned complex.

Psychological Study as applied to environments. 3. Televisual Communication. 4. Filing, Paper Flow, Record Retention. 5. Engineering. 6. Energy Management. 7. Security Consultancy. 8. Word Processing. 9. Graphic Design. 10. Building Management Consultancy. 11. Furniture Design and Manufacture. 12. Product Design and Manufacture. 13. Architecturally related structures, such as hotels, hospitals, warehouses, stores, shopping centers, residential designs, and any other. 14. Computer Service Sales.

Move into allied areas

The group advised that Environetics in the future, in order to maintain a clarity of presentation of its capabilities, should also move into the allied disciplines of:

1. Demographics. 2. Site Evaluation. 3. Building Development (including architecture, financing, ownership, leasing, and property management). 4. Project operation in the Third World. 5. Commercial Location Consultancy.

The group further saw the need to develop a division dedicated to training experts of the future, where innovative and creative individuals presently in the formative stages of development would be encouraged to use their abilities to broaden the capabilities and growth of the Environetics philosophy.

They also saw the need to recruit from and work in joint venture with leading experts in all disciplines, which border upon or are contributory to environmental development.

Organizational programs should be developed to allow Environetics worldwide growth within a formulized and cohesive program of marketing, training, and production.

During general discussions of the first few days, it was apparent that within Environetics, as with all design-based operations, there had been separate and rapid development within individual disciplines. If allowed to proceed unchecked, it could bring about a fragmentation within overall policy.

Creativity managed in new ways

Since many of the participants are in daily contact with clients and upfront management, they began to realize that more important than anything within the organization was a need for coordination of information throughout the offices and departments of the company.

They found themselves progressing toward what politically could only be called diplomatic abdication of certain of their needs for the general logic of organization. It was accepted with far less argument than expected that possibly the greatest outcome of the meeting could be the discovery of new ways to manage creativity.

In essence, there was agreement that the organization needed to become a cohesive operation rather than a loose federation of associated disciplines.

From a system to a philosophy

In summing up, there was unanimous agreement that Environetics had in the first day of the seminar developed from a system into a philosophy.

It is hard to explain in a written report how the product of 13 imaginations and professional experience can carry at almost breathless speed the excitement of finding oneself in the encircling the earth and containing huge cities may be the most imminent future answer to over-population and ecological conservation—with earth turned into a park and residential environments, with factories and offices floating above us in space, with workers serving six-month work periods on a satellite and six months back on earth.

We may soon return to old world architectural designs of Europe, with windows facing the sun to make maximum use of light, walls several feet thick to conserve heat in winter, keep building cool in summer.

development of a new approach to design application.

Complete cities in designer's realm

A comment, for instance, that hydrogen-based fuel systems were being investigated quickly developed into the need to research the application of the Environetics philosophy to domed cities.

A chance remark regarding the political importance of almost autonomous power of multi-national corporations led to the probability of Environetics venturing into the total-package market of creating complete cities in the Third World.

A concern about the rising cost of travel developed into a discussion of the application of computer graphics, whereby a central Environetics production complex would feed by way of word processor, telecommunication, and computer terminal the necessary production capabilities to a project office established in the wastes of Alaska or the deserts of Australia.

What had begun as a commercial conference regarding the future of an industry developed into the discussion of the commitment embraced by the Environetics executives, high in the Sierra Mountains of Southern California, in four short days.



NATURAL ELEMENTS PROVIDE ENERGY, LIGHTING

Designers Adcock & Stock, Los Angeles, uses sliding doors, skylights, solar glass to cut energy costs for own offices



With energy-conservation a high priority consideration, it is reassuring to see small, private firms taking energy-saving measures. The new office of Designers Adcock & Stock, Los Angeles design/planning firm, is one such example. Through the use of skylights, windows and window walls that open, and solar glass, the firm conservatively estimates heating and air-conditioning costs are one-half those of a conventional office.


Two years ago, Gene Adcock, president, and A.J. Stock, executive vice president, purchased the former Helms Hall of Fame, once famous for its athletic functions, for its new offices. The historic building had a very large patio with a steel truss framework covering a fireplace and auditorium benches. At first the design team was perplexed as to how to treat this space. After studying the site, the very openness of the patio appealed to them, and they decided to convert this area to offices, renting out the original building to tenants, with a preference to design-oriented firms. Adcock & Stock's offices were built as an addition, wrapping around the Helms building, with a separate entrance.


Taking advantage of climate for light, ventilation

Skylights were placed throughout the offices to minimize need for overhead lighting. Both skylights and glass windows on the southern and western exposures have solar bronzed reflective glass, cutting down on heat and glare by











Patio serves dual purpose

60 percent. All other glass is solar bronzed to reflect heat. Overhead lights are seldom turned on since natural light is augmented with built-in task lighting providing ample illumination. In addition, sliding doors and windows take advantage of natural ventilation.

"On a conservative estimate, we use one-half the heat or air conditioning of a conventional office. Without the solar glass, we would have needed 30 percent more air conditioning capacity," says Stock.

Main offices, which look out on a patio used for client consultations and lunches, are outfitted with Herman Miller's open plan system. Partners Adcock's and Stock's offices open directly onto the patio, yielding two extra conference rooms.

The designers wanted their staffs to be in contact with the outdoors. Open windows and skylights expose wide swaths of sky overhead, bringing an awareness of changing weather. The fireplace, located in the main staff area, is used every day in the winter, not so much for heat as for the cozy feeling and rich smell of burning logs.

The open air atmosphere is emphasized with wood-framed, broad glass vistas to the patio, rug hangings, walls of rough sawn cedar planking, nubby linen textures, and exposed brick from the Helms building. These natural materials mingle with antique doors and chests. Even the bathroom is a retreat with a vaulted ceiling and an antique cabinet. There is a sense of being at home at DA&S, a very satisfactory climate in the fast pace of a business day.

PROPOSED WORKSTATIONS EXPLORE SPECIAL NEEDS OF COMPUTER PROGRAMMER

A relatively new and growing specialty, the computer programmer requires special equipment and furnishings to function efficiently in today's office

Most designers know the furniture and furnishings requirements of a secretary, there are so many of them. But what of the computer programmer, who heretofore has been a scarce commodity, if not a strange and unknown one.

Today, the computer programmer is becoming more and more visible. Tomorrow the programmer will be ubiquitous. In consequence, the space designer had better get to know exactly what the function is of that relatively new light on the office scene. Workstations must be designed to accommodate the function and special needs of this increasingly important office worker.

Several proposed solutions to the design problem posed by those special needs are explored in this article. Some merely satisfy the very basic needs of the programmer, as we know them today. Another responds to the future needs of the programmer's workstation as perceived by some experts in the field.

Since electronic data processing (EDP) is a fast moving science, tremendous changes are occurring in the computer programmer's workstation. The need, therefore, is for workstation design that reflects flexibility in space and furnishings.

Need for different furnishings

Most corporations employing programmers provide them with the same workstation area and furniture provided for other employees. This has proved to be very inefficient use of space and equipment, since much of the standard office furniture, such as letter or legal size file drawers, is useless and quite often cumbersome to the computer programmer. For example, the position of a CRT on a standard height desk brings the keyboard to a level that forces the programmer to rest elbows on the desk and slouch forward in order to punch the keys, thus causing spine fatigue. Provided here are several suggestions to solution of the problem, including: an examination of the computer programmer's operations at his workstation, the tools he uses, his storage needs, and the amenities necessary for the smooth performance of his job.












WOOL CARPET AVAILABILITIES EXPAND AS PRICE FOR WOOL STABILIZES

As a natural fiber, wool remains a standard by which other fibers are measured in contract carpet applications



Wool still is used as the standard by which man-made fibers are judged. While the use of wool in the past few years dimi-

nished drastically, specifiers still ask, "isn't it the best fiber for carpet?"

Certainly, the desire for the appearance of wool is as strong as it ever was, or, at least, for the presumed appearance of wool, since it has many different looks and has changed over the years. These changes were brought about by new technologies of construction.

Sometimes, wool even attempts to imitate its synthetic imitations. Berber styling of custom wool carpets today, for example, has been more affected by the synthetic imitations of the original North African Berbers than by the originals themselves. Permanent mothproofing is another example of imitating the imitations.

Nevertheless, ongoing efforts of synthetic manufacturers for better delustering, development of co-mingled yarns, constant claims for a "natural" look attests to the fact that wool still has the edge in the appearance that people want.

This is especially important in contract. The obvious ability of wool to maintain its appearance over a longer period of time, in practical terms, outweighs the ability of synthetics to wear longer.

Wool is still the only fiber that can withstand repeated crushing of live cigarettes, since the charred portion can be brushed and removed, unlike synthetics. In hotels, theaters, and other public areas, that characteristic is still important despite the increasing prohibitions against cigarette smoking.

In addition, cross-breeding of sheep, as well as specific dietary goals have improved the available strains of wool, so that dependence on Chinese and oriental wools has largely disappeared.

Despite all these advantages, "natural" and otherwise, the one disadvantage of wool is economics. The cost of wool per pound is at least twice that of nylon. About 60 to 70 percent more wool is needed to give the equivalent appearance performance, with the result that the cost of the face yarn of a wool carpet is three times that of nylon.

No doubt the signature aspect of wool has its appeal; the fact that it is expensive is no doubt part of that appeal. But the gap is narrowing. One of the advantages synthetics have had over the years has been price stability. That is less true today. Woven wool—the two go hand in hand for many reasons—is still the dominant choice for contract in the United Kingdom and, to a lesser extent, in Europe. The choice of wool in contract in the United States has always been an important option.

Finally, when one considers the enormous technical, environmental, economic, and now political obstacles that must be overcome in order to convert crude oil into carpet fiber, there is something wonderfully attractive about the simplicity of converting grass into wool, with a few lamb chops thrown in for good measure.

QUICKSHIP PROGRAMS FILL DELIVERY VOID

To counter interminable delivery waits, many manufacturers have set up rapid delivery programs, offering a variety of services with varying lead times, furniture lines, and specifications

Specifiers, dealers, space planners, and end users awaiting long-overdue furniture shipments were unable a few years back, to do much but wait, fume, and wait. Deliveries often taking up to 30 weeks, regardless of scheduled shipping dates, created difficulties for dealers and end users alike. Now, for those fed up with long furniture delivery periods, there is recourse. Quickship programs have been instituted by a number of manufacturers, often speeding delivery up to 40 times faster.

Most popular items kept in stock

Although varied, most quickship programs have these points in common: certain pieces, usually best sellers, are kept in stock and offered in limited colorways and materials. Time limitations most often run within five to 10 working days from receipt of approved order. Some companies warehouse regionally, while others ship straight from the factory. Shipping insurance policies do not differ when articles are shipped in this way. Other than keeping up with demand, no manufacturer interviewed has encountered any problems or snags with quickship. Whatever the program, the idea is rapidly gaining widespread acceptance.

Inventory is verified on CRT

Haworth developed its R.U.S.H. (Rapid UniGroup Shipment by Haworth) program because of an existing need in the marketplace for better service and also because current customers needed extra desks, cabinets, and furnishings to accommodate new growth. Regular shipping times were

far too long, yet the company wished to retain its customers.

The system is designed to respond quickly to smaller, more immediate product requirements. A comprehensive inventory system is kept on hand to enable Haworth to ship UniGroup panels and components in most colors and fabrics within five working days from receipt of accepted order.


Like all quickship programs, it does have its limitations. It is meant to provide UniGroup pieces for several workstations or add-ons that must get there "yesterday." However, for an entire officeful of furniture, the company's normal program applies.

R.U.S.H. consists of a selected in-

ventory of panels, shelves, flipper door units, work surfaces, task tables, lighting fixtures, and 15 other popular component and accessory groups in a variety of sizes, colors, and finishes.

When an order is received, an operator verifies inventory status on a CRT. Provided sufficient inventory is on hand, the order is confirmed and forwarded directly to the R.U.S.H. distribution center. Customer gets immediate confirmation, and the order is shipped within five working days.

Most companies charge no cost premium over regularly processed orders. Items are, however, shipped at customer expense. After acceptance, cancellations usually cannot be made

without consent of the company. A restocking charge is often applied to returned orders.

Faster turnover due to quickship

Because leather furniture is expensive, one company, Leathercraft, found that many dealers wanted items for display, but were not prone to warehouse a lot of merchandise for this reason. Leathercraft's quickship program thus enables the dealer to get more turn on each item without warehouse expense. Orders can always be taken by the dealer on furnishings that remain in his showroom.

On its quickship items, Leather-craft stocks frames and has chairs sprung until the order comes in. Then leather upholstery is done to order. Of 40 different executive office chairs, 11 are on the quickship program. They are available in three different leathers. The company also has a quickship program for its line of leather sofas, chairs, and ottomans.

Complete status of order available

Atelier International has developed a quickship system because of high demand for better service and because lighting and accessories are easy to stock. Al carries all lighting and accessories in its quickship line and the Maralunga chair. Designed by Vico Magistretti, it is Al's chair design with the greatest demand in this country. Al does not warehouse regionally and reports no problems other than keeping up stock.

Atelier also offers no-fault shipping insurance protection. Purchasers pay three percent of the total net value, and AI either repairs or replaces damaged products and takes care of all claims against the transport carrier.

Quickship items built to order

Originally AGI Industries had a

warehouse program designed for immediate customer pick up, but the company found that a lot of money was being tied up as people would not pick up their own items. So it was decided to take the fastest moving items and put them on a quickship basis. AGI has 15 chairs, two lounge seating groups of three items each, and 10 different tables in its quickship line. Supplies are kept on hand, but the company does not warehouse. Items on quickship program are special built-to-order units, so that no inventory of furniture exists. AGI has been doing quickship for three and one half years now, with up to 80 items on a single order, and reports never having been late on anything.

70% of business is quickship

La-Z-Boy, with 10 warehouses regionally, reports that 70 percent of its business is involved in quickship programs. Tom Spangler, contract sales manager for La-Z-Boy, notes that the marketing program has been specifically geared in this direction. The company has 57 stockkeeping units


available in 19 different styles and six different color combinations. Shipping is between five and 10 working days after receipt of approved order.

Spangler also reports no additional charge for the company's drop-ship program. It works like this: if a New York dealer has a Los Angeles customer, he can send a chair from a warehouse near the customer's town. These warehouses always maintain in stock between 800 and 2,000 chairs each.

Inventory responds to change

GF Business Equipment is currently test-marketing its Quick-space program in the Northeastern United States. A very comprehensive system designed to respond quickly to the rapid changes which occur in today's fast-paced office environment, the program offers a total of 200 open plan system items. These include panels, electrical units, pedestals, hang-on components, and worksurfaces.

GF's older quickship program, RFD, has been in existence for nearly eight years. GF inventories more than 170 traditional items including desks,



chairs, tables, files, and bookcases.

According to GF vice president/ sales William Oliver, the company can streamline production to limited finishes, fabrics, and top materials for immediate shipping and invoicing.

An on-line computerized inventory program and a toll-free telephone number for dealers have been established for rapid confirmation of Quick-space orders. Use of the Northeast as a testing ground aids the company in adjusting initial product mix, inventory levels, and buyer preference. Plans to expand the program to other areas of the U.S. are now being made.

Company guarantees 5% reward

InterRoyal Corporation's \$126, 000 Guaranteed On-Time Shipment Program assures that each order will be shipped within five working days from receipt of order. If it is not, the customer may deduct five percent from the invoiced amount of purchase.

The multi-part program includes monthly Guarantee Bonds, redemption book for customers to keep track of orders, and a booklet explaining details of the new manufacturing process.

"Major reorganization and streamlining of manufacturing systems, equipment, and procedure," says 'Alex Dadourian, InterRoyal president, "have made the program possible." Each manufacturing facility has its own order department and services customers in its marketing area. Computerized inventory reports track progress of each piece of furniture. Nothing is released for shipment until all parts of the order are complete in the holding area.

Have there been many of the five-percent deductions? No, none at all. To date, all orders go out on time.

Setting up warehouse in target areas

With warehouses pinpointed throughout the country in major market areas, Art Steel's Prompt Ship program maintains items for immediate shipment in each local warehouse. Included are chairs, screens, desks, files, and storage units.

Another company, Upstate Precision, is in the process of setting up quickship warehouses in the target areas of New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Detroit, and Cincinnati. These major warehousing programs enable user to get the company's 6/5 Series Panel line of desks, files, and credenzas as well as FORMFAC self-connecting screens. While this program is being set up, Precision's Flash Delivery System applies. This program carries the 6/5 line, and shipment is within five to 10 days from receipt of order. Maximum order is five units of each item.

Storwal International's P.D.Q. program insures that furniture will be on its way to the customer within 72 hours, at the latest, from date factory receives order. Lateral and vertical files, desks, tables, and chairs make up its quickship line.

24-hour goal from order to set up

Steelcase carries roughly 300 different items on its quickship program,

which ships five days from receipt of order. The original concept of Steel-case's program was to have items being installed 24 hours after the order is received. While not yet practical, the company is working toward that goal.


Steelcase has a network of 10 warehouses regionally, with each carrying the same items. Customers can phone the nearest warehouse and get products shipped from there.

Hot line orders via recording

Madison Furniture Industries offers several desks, tables, and chairs in its Mad Dash program. All wood items are available in either oak or walnut in two finishes, and fabrics are offered in three selections. Items are shipped in one week.

Thonet's in-stock inventory of its Breuer arm and side chair can be shipped to the customer 48 hours after receipt of order. Orders can range in quantity from one to 24.

Harter's Sudden Shipment program ships within 10 working days from receipt of order and offers 20 dif-

ferent office chairs in six colors and four finishes. Maximum quantity is 25 units per order.

QS/4 from Corry Jamestown has more than 40 items, including desks, chairs, and files, ready to ship in four days. They are offered in the most popular materials, colors, and fabrics. Corry Jamestown has established a hot line for customers to facilitate use of QS/4 program. A recorded message gives instructions to caller who then states the order in the instructed sequence. Once the phone call is completed, there is no need to send a confirming order.

Any standard serieSeven panel or component from IKD Haws Corp. can be shipped within 20 days or less. What differentiates this program from most others is that customer can choose from the company's complete line in the entire selection of vinyls, fabrics, and trim options. Acoustical Partitions Corp. is another firm that also offers customers a quick shipment program of its entire line of office partitions.

In-house inventory kept flexible

Stow-Davis' accelerated shipment program is broken down into two parts: the Immediate Shipment Program, shipping desks, credenzas, and seating within 72 hours of receipt of order, and the Allegro program, which will ship a large selection of office furniture within six to ten weeks.

Haskell of Pittsburgh's Superstock program, which covers over 100 individual products, including the most popular lines of desks, seating, and files, will ship within 24 hours after telephone request. Haskell dealers have benefited from the Superstock program because it keeps its in-house inventory flexible.

Executive Office Concept's quick-

ship plan features desks, bookshelves, tables, and seating. EOC's plan provides basic component parts for rapid final assembly on site. Shipping is within seven to 10 days, although many items are stocked for immediate delivery. Roughly 30 percent of the company's output is quickship, and EOC reports an extremely high percentage of on-time performance.

Shaw-Walker has been publishing a bi-monthly delivery schedule since 1955 to keep field personnel and customers accurately informed regarding deliveries. This program was expanded in 1967 to include quickship merchandise. Shaw-Walker is presently on the verge of introducing its redesigned delivery/quickship program, which will include a wide range of desks, vertical and modular lateral files, seating, tables, and filing cabinets, all in a variety of colors.

Quickship for antiques, too

One company, Antiquarian Traders, offers immediate delivery for either lease or sale of any stock item from its line of traditional antique office furniture. The company's inventory of Victorian, English, and American antique furniture numbers over 6,000 pieces for shipping anywhere in the U.S. Often furniture is leased to a client who has ordered furniture from a different source and is faced with a long delivery wait. A short-term lease program is especially designed to meet this need.

Among the company's inventory are partners' desks, rolltop, flat-top, and cylinder top desks, chesterfield couches, sideboards, leather and oak swivel chairs.

Monarch Furniture's original Rushship program consisted of 16 executive swivel, secretarial and side chairs shipped within five working days. It was begun two years ago and was so well received that an upholstered sofa, chair, conference table, desk, and credenza were added to round out the program. Four chairs

from the company's Circa 90 Collection, introduced last year at NEOCON, are also among new lines in the quick-ship program.

More than 450 items on PDQ

Cole Business Furniture's Products Delivered Quickly (PDQ) guickship system offers shipping within 36 hours of order receipt on more than 450 items including desks, credenzas, modular items, seating, files, and specialty cabinets. The program which has been successfully operated since 1972, is set into action by one toll-free phone call. Customers place their order with a customer service representative who arranges shipping via the quickest possible route. If the desired item is not in stock, the rep will suggest an alternative, or advise when the product will be available.

Castelli's Quick Action Program maintains approximately 20 items in stock from one warehouse. Each item, in a choice of fabric or wood selection, is warehoused for limited maximum quantities per single order, depending on the item. QAP orders are shipped within two weeks from receipt of approved purchase order. If the item is not available from quickship stock, Castelli guarantees standard delivery time of six weeks.

Dunbar's Priority-6 program speeds up that company's delivery time by 50 percent. Included in the offering are executive office suites, a complete casegoods and upholstery package, and several finishes and fabrics plus COM. In order to accommodate its stocking dealers, Dunbar limits each order to three of any item, except its 980 chair which may be ordered in pairs.

Quickship given top priority

Tri-Mark Designs offers its Quickship program delivery within 3 weeks on the entire line of 100 and 350 Series of tables in mirror stainless chrome. The company reports that very often its regular shipments are made in three weeks or less on most items.

Martin Michael, vice president/ marketing and sales for Chromcraft Furniture, reports that a big percentage of that company's office chair business comes from its 47-item quickship stocking plan. The program is top priority, so that when a Chromcraft dealer calls for a stock shipment he can depend on the company to have it ready.

Globe Business Furniture has found its quickship program very successful and has reviewed area warehouse programs because of this success. The company stocks its most popular items and ships within 72 hours.

Rose Manufacturing Co.'s Quick Ship Five program ships order within five working days. Up to 20 acoustical modular panels and free-standing screens can be ordered at one time per purchase order. Dealer discount is 50 percent. Telephone orders are accepted, and Rose pays all transportation costs.

The chair and seating division of Boling Co. has a rush order shipping system that is implemented when a call is received from an authorized dealer. Once all information (item, material, color, and so forth) is gleaned from the dealer, a check of vital information is made from office records. If everything is in order, items are shipped within five working days. Under the program, Boling dealers

have the availability of every upholstered chair and seating unit in the line, in a choice of approximately 400 colors.

Cramer Industries' quickship program, BFD (Best Furniture Delivery), ships within five working days from receipt of order. Cramer maintains a broad selection of contract furniture items, including chairs, office tables, computer tables, and safety ladders. Orders are immediately carried out by a toll free telephone call to headquarters.

Jasper Seating Co. has a Prompt Ship Program, PSP, which ships in two weeks or less. Nine chairs in several combinations of vinyl and fabric selections include secretarial and executive posture chairs. Dealers are offered a special discount on orders of six chairs or more under PSP.

Quickship responds to emergency

Begun in 1974, Herman Miller's Rapid Response program makes up a substantial portion of its business. Delivery of those products involved in quickship is done within 48 hours. About 90 percent of Rapid Response orders are placed over the telephone in what amounts to a word-of-honor system.

Separate inventory distribution centers are located in Irvine, Calif.; Dallas (recently moved from Houston in order to increase capacity); Grandville, Mich.; and Atlanta.

About a year and a half ago, a

southwest-based company planning to move into new spaces was informed by its space planners that the custom-designed furniture for the new offices would not be ready for several months. During the crisis, a sales representative for Herman Miller was asked how quickly his company could react to the emergency. Herman Miller responded in two days with a detailed plan for existing programmers, plus one for future expansion. In three weeks, Action Office Workstations were in place and ready to be used.

Discovery Concepts, which offers 16 different set-ups in its systems line and eight in its wall systems line, ships within five working days.

Just introduced early this year, JG Furniture Systems' Express program offers upholstered panels in six sizes and two fabric selections. Fifteen basic components available through the program provide necessary flexibility to assemble complete workstations needed. Furniture is shipped within 7 business days, and orders are taken over a special toll-free number designated for Express only. Individual orders not exceeding \$90,000 list are accepted within limits of weekly volume allocated to the program.

Many firms are jumping onto the quickship bandwagon because of high demand in the marketplace. In addition to the firms mentioned here, there are again that many out there either starting or refining quickship programs.


