When Thonet's headquarters were moved from Vienna to New York, Leopold Pilzer relocated more than just the company's administration—he transplanted the Thonet tradition. Although the name Thonet and the products it represented had been established in the United States since 1853, the shift to a New York base of operations permitted the expansion of the firm's commitment to innovative design solutions. Be-tween 1940 and 1944, three manufacturing facilities in the United States were acquired, and Thonet began to produce furniture in new materials such as molded plywood and aluminum, as well as developing, in America, bentwood manufacturing capabilities.

In 1962, after the death of Leopold Pilzer, Thonet was purchased by one of America's best-known furnishings manufacturers, the Simmons Company. A new period of diversification and expansion began—a diversification that extended to new materials and designs and an expansion into new contract markets, among which furniture for the healthcare field became an important concern.

Gulf + Western acquired

Simmons, along with Thonet, in 1979. The resources of one of the foremost international diversified corporations now support Thonet's continuing growth.

One hundred and fifty years after Thonet first began to explore new ways of designing and manufacturing furniture, the firm that bears his name remains proud of its heritage, and dedicated to the tradition of innovation and creativity which Michael Thonet inspired.



Wool Bureau expands on domestic and foreign wool sources

Dear Editor: George Levine's article. "Wool Carpet Availabilities Expand As Price For Wool Stabilizes" (March 1980 CONTRACT), is another indication of the reawakening to wool's appearance/performance properties over the life of the carpet. Although you clearly state in fine type that the listing is reprinted from Appendix X on Imported Carpet from the Cross Index of Commercial Carpet, readers may draw the impression that the list was all-inclusive and assume there is no domestically produced wool carpet. Further, the list excluded special-order wool carpeting which is an important segment of wool broadloom consumption. The following list of domestic and foreign mills gives a more comprehensive range of wool lines currently available in the U.S.


Hinz wanted to create an environment expressing orderliness, quality, good taste and openness for both locations.



Contract office furnishings to grow at 12-percent annual rate, according to new NOPA total industry study

Alexandria, Va. — The amount of office furniture and furnishings specified is expected to grow from \$2.4 billion in 1977 to \$10 billion in 1989, at an average annual rate of 12 percent, according to a new "Future of the Office Products Industry" report issued by the National Office Products Association. The report is designed to provide an overview of the future of the office product industry.

According to the report, the market for office products is expected to gradually shift from the manufacturing sector of the economy to the service and trade sectors, from large offices to small and medium-sized offices. Office population is moving out of central cities, giving rise to new office construction and the need for new methods of office products distribution. The growth of the open plan systems market is expected to introduce fundamental change to the office furniture business. Dealers face increasing competition and smaller margins as manufacturers and others become involved in negotiation processes.

End-user purchases of new open plan systems and associated furniture are expected to grow from \$430 million in 1977 to \$5.2 billion by the end of the decade. Purchase of conventional office furniture by end-users is expected to grow from a little less than \$2 billion to \$4.8 billion during the same time period.

High growth rate within the open plan systems segment is attributed to the continuing growth in value added to the workstation, new office construction, and expected conversion of existing office space.

Major technological trends are described in the four chapters of the final report which specifically address the impact of technology on the office. Whereas office computing was the single most significant force for change in large offices in the 1960's and 1970's, office communications will probably emerge as the most important factor for change in large offices during the

1980's and 1990's says the report.

Dealer's office furniture sales are expected to grow from 1.9 billion to \$6.2 billion during the decade, at an average annual rate of more than 10 percent. Conventional furniture sales will grow at an average annual growth rate of little better than 3 percent. Dealer's open plan systems sales volume will increase at just under 20 percent, from 300 million in 1977 to 2.6 billion by 1989.

Electronic technology, also dealt with in the report, will pose minimal risk to the office furniture manufacturers. Although slower shipment growth rates for some office furniture is anticipated, most new office machine installations will complement, not compete with, conventional furniture lines and open plan components.

Smith Stanley Study forecasts \$16.5 billion contract market

Darien, Conn. - Smith, Stanley & Co.'s "Contract Furnishings II, A Market and Economic Study of the United States Markets," projects sales of \$16.5 billion by 1984, a growth of 74 percent over the record-breaking 1979 figures. Since the research company's 1972 report, when contract sales were at the 6.4 billion level, the market went through the \$10.9 billion mark in 1979, and is still climbing. Office furniture accounted for \$4 billion of that. with open systems furniture responsible for \$600 million and rising. Floor products accounted for 16.3 percent of that total, wall finishes for 15.5. doors and door hardware 9.8, window coverings 8.2, lighting fixtures 7.9, ceiling materials 3.0, and partitions

coming in at 2.1 percent.

In a geographic breakdown of markets for contract furnishing, the Smith, Stanley report shows sales of contract furnishings in 1979 greatest in the states making up most of the "sunbelt" areas of the United States. The South accounted for 31.6 percent of such sales. Next came the Midwest with 24.8 percent; the West with 23 percent; and the Northeast with 20.6 percent. Western states showed the greatest percentage gain, the Northeast the greatest loss.

The report goes into detail on the furnishings market by building type and projects market categories through 1984. 
AlA urges support of building energy performance standards

Washington, D.C. — The American Institute of Architects recently reaffirmed its support of the Department of Energy's proposed building energy standards (BEPS) as a major step toward national energy self-sufficiency. AIA also urged that these standards be implemented as rapidly as possible. These standards recognize the designed energy consumption of the total building over the period of one year.

Among the advantages of BEPS: built-in flexibility, allowing for innovation and creativity; technology not frozen by endorsement of one method or material over another; natural and renewable resources recognized and encouraged: valuable consumer information on energy efficiency is made available.

Carpet industry opposes California legislation

Dalton, Ga - In cooperation with the Carpet Manufacturers Association of the West, the Carpet & Rug Institute recently testified in opposition to California Assembly Bill 2103 at a hearing in Sacramento. Numerous elements of concern in the bill include authorization of the California Home Furnishings Bureau to establish performance standards for carpet; enactment of new legislation relating to unfair business practices currently covered under other federal and California state legislation; licensing of carpet manufacturers, retailers, and distributors requiring fees ranging from \$120 to \$180.

Commenting on the proposed legislation, CRI President Richard Eldredge stated: "In addition to sharing the concerns of CMA West, whose members would be scrutinized most closely, CRI is concerned for manufacturers in other states which would also be affected if goods are shipped into California. The origins of this bill are unclear as to the cause motivating the sponsor of the legislation. Eldredge went on to say that existing laws cover unfair business practices and activities of installation contractors.

CRI, CMA West, Western Floor Covering Association, and other organizations presented testimony at the hearing, each opposing various aspects of the bill which apply to their constituents. In addition to opposing the bill on its own merits, the organizations are concerned that the bill may be unconstitutional at the federal level.

With introduction of its ConCentrx chair line at NEOCON 12, Steelcase, Inc., is making a breakthrough in the state-of-the-art of chair design. Innovative features start with a new concept called "synchronized articulation," which gears itself to task orientation in the rapidly changing office work environment.

This feature incorporated into the swivel-tilt mechanism permits a chair occupant to push back into a full-tilt position while feet remain firmly planted on the floor. Leg areas from the knees to the pelvis remain almost parallel to the underside of the workstation, resulting in elimination of pressure in the popliteal area immediately behind the knee and under the thigh.

Steelcase's remarkable engineer-

ing creates a variable movement ratio of two-to-one for the chair back as against the seat movement, drastically reducing vertical pressure against the underside of the legs behind the knees. Such pressure normally restricts blood flow and is the source of fatigue and a variety of physical maladies that generally plague office workers.

That development also has solved the somewhat less serious, but annoying, problem of shirttails pulling out of trousers as seats are reclined, since there is no countervailing force to pull at the shirttail or blouse. At the same time, the head remains in a position that maintains the correct angle of orientation to working tools, such as CRTs, microfiche viewers, and flat work surfaces.

Coupled with other adjusting

mechanisms, the ConCentrx line literally gears itself to the demands of the human body for comfort and the ability to perform work tasks with minimal fatigue. Seat angle and back tension are both adjustable with separate controls. Height adjustment is offered in standard Twist-o-matic (while standing) control that locks the height when occupant is seated, or as an optional pneumatic (gas cylinder) lever. Back tilt operation has its own lock/release mechanism.

ConCentrx combines anthropometric posture features, including lumbar support, with a series of features specifically designed to provide comfort and increased productivity in the office. Even foam pockets shaped to relieve pressure on the ischial tuberosities contribute to the ergonomic perfection of the new seating line.

Maximum stability is achieved with a five-armature base. Five different caster options are available. Now under development is Counterpoint, a totally new fabric program encompassing approximately 20 new fabric lines in more than 200 colors.

The chair line will be offered in both an operator's and a managerial model. Sixteen styles are available, depending on arm and height adjustment options. Chair bases will be in chrome, plus six colors of plastic (PVC) cap sheet over metal, offering outstanding maintenance, cleanability, and color protection with a minimum of 1/8-in. color impregnation of the PVC plastic coating. Shells, arms, bases can all be color coordinated in single-color, monochromatic finishes.

Related to Steelcase's 454 line, ConCentrx maintains a similar reveal line in the back shell. While resembling the family that it springs from, the chair lines differentiate themselves both in scale and mechanical features. ConCentrx tends to smaller scale than the 454 line, which is executive oriented and consequently is designed to a larger, executive size. Minimum requirements, however, have dictated a design that encompasses any physical stature, man or woman, from the fifth to the 95th percentile.

When combined with various arm options, task function sizing, mechanical adjustability, color availability, and maintenance capability, the Con-Centrx line stands out as a major contribution to chair design for the task-oriented eighties. Circle No. 200.










Concept flow chart

INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITS EXPANDED, SEMINARS REVAMPED, WORKSHOPS ADDED FOR INDUSTRY'S SHOW OF SHOWS



Each year, NEOCON grows successively bigger and more influential as the major national contract show. So much so that it becomes its own "hard act to follow." Yet NEOCON 12 has been planned with a renewed vitality to top all past performances during its three-day run, June 11, 12, 13, at The Merchandise Mart in Chicago.

This year, the educational format has been changed so that only two seminars will be held concurrently. And for the first time, NEOCON introduces small workshops to promote in-depth discussions and participation by a limited number of pre-registered attendees. Also new is a full student program.

Manufacturers will make NEOCON the time to debut new products, many of them shown in this special NEOCON issue. New products from abroad will be displayed at the expanded NEOCON International at Expocenter, just across the street and part of the Mart complex.

To add further perspective to the timely events that will take place at NEOCON, CONTRACT continues its practice of reporting on today's news and future trends that influence the constant growth and evolving nature of the contract industry. Two surveys released within the past month are briefly summarized below, with full reports to follow in future issues.

Booming market at \$10.9 billion. A market survey by Smith, Stanley & Co. Marketing Consultants entitled "Contract Furnishings II, A Market and Economic Study of the United States Markets" reports that the contract market has grown from \$6.4 billion in 1972 to \$10.9 billion in 1979 (based on manufacturers' prices). Looking five years ahead, the survey forecasts a growth to \$16.5 billion in 1984, with open plansystems furniture showing a projected 75 percent growth by 1984.

The largest segment of the \$10.9 billion market in 1979 was office furniture, accounting for \$4 billion. Of that, open plan-systems furniture was \$600 billion. Other segments of the market are: floor products \$1.7 billion; wall finishes \$1.68 billion; doors/door hardware \$1.06 billion; window coverings \$890 million; lighting fixtures \$862 million; ceiling materials \$326 million; partitions \$229 million.

What encourages productivity? The second survey centers on employee productivity, conducted by pollster Louis Harris for Steelcase in its second study of the office environments, "Comfort and Productivity in the Office of the 80s." This study examines how employees and employers perceive the elements that affect work and how they feel about output.

At the top of the list by office workers for increasing their productivity is higher pay, and just below that is more comfortable heating, air conditioning, and ventilation. Other factors cited by employees include more quiet on the job, encouragement from management, experience with the job, better office equipment, desks, and files. Next was more stability in the office and less moving around of people, followed by more comfortable chairs and finally, better lighting.

Harris chided executives for being "out of touch" with the people whose on-the-job comfort they are responsible for. Executives surveyed named these four elements as the keys to productivity: more encouragement from supervisors and management; more experience with the job; better pay incentives; and finally, more comfortable HVAC.



150th ANNIVERSARY: THONET HIGHLIGHTS FIVE CLASSIC PERIODS

"The real miracle performed by Michael Thonet was to solve what remains industry's greatest problem—the marriage of the craftsman and the machine. Thonet achieved this without in any way intruding on either's productive ability. His was one of the earliest ventures into mass production and he approached it with such sensitivity and feeling that the esthetic contribution was enhanced."—Henry Dreyfuss

The marriage lauded above has not only been successful, but it has also been a long one. It spans an unprecedented 150 years with designs of such universality that passage of time serves only to elevate them to the true meaning of classic.

Starting with Michael Thonet him-

self, the names of designers and their achievements constitute an elite roster: Cafe Daum Chair, 1850. Bentwood Rocker, 1860. Corbusier Chair, 1870. Vienna Cafe Chair, 1876. Breuer Cantilever Chair, 1928. Breuer Wassily Chair, 1925. Mies van der Rohe Cantilever Chair, 1927.

This tradition of excellence gave birth when Michael Thonet, a master cabinetmaker and inventive designer, started his own firm in 1830. His experiments in new techniques led to the process of making molded plywood furniture out of wood veneer strips. He brought his five sons into the business in 1853, and that year marks Thonet's first U.S. showroom in New York.

In 1938, Leopold Pilzer bought out minority interest of the Thonet family and move the company to the U.S. Within the past few years, Thonet and its parent company, Simmons, were acquired by Gulf & Western.

Continuing its leadership in design, Thonet through its New Design Program brings an added vitality to its lines by such contemporary designers as Bob Aronowitz, Bernie Katzanek, Don Petitt, Rud Thygesen and Johnny Sorensen, Joe Russo, Ric Sonder, Bob DeFuccio, David Rowland.

On these pages is a pictorial synopsis of an exhibit marking five major periods in celebration of Thonet's 150th Anniversary.





100th ANNIVERSARY: STOW/DAVIS TRACES INDUSTRY GROWTH

During its heyday as furniture capital of the U.S., Grand Rapids was home of the country's leading furniture manufacturers. Many of these companies have perished, while others have been absorbed by conglomerates as the industry shifted to other parts of the country. One of the few firms that has survived—and prospered—is Stow/Davis, which celebrates its 100th anniversary this year. Like the few remaining companies in Grand Rapids, Stow/Davis owes its long reign to the tradition of maintaining quality during transition periods. Tracing the history of the company also becomes a chronicle of the birth and maturation of the contract industry as we know it today. What the industry was like during the early part of this century is vividly, often colorfully, recalled by D.D. Hunting, who started working for the company while he was in high school more than 70 years ago, and who then became a design-sensitive salesman representing S/D for executive office furniture and a metal furniture manufacturer for general office lines. In 1936, D.D. Hunting invested in S/D with other partners, later buying some of their interests. Today, his son, Allen Hunting, president of the firm since 1969, is responding to the needs of the present-day marketplace with appropriate products including an open plan furniture system. Together, D.D. Hunting and Allen Hunting in an informal interview span many topics concerning Stow/Davis and the industry alike. Highlights of this exclusive interview are combined below with photos old and new. Stow/Davis has indeed come a long way since 1880, when Russell J. Stow founded the company, and since 1885, when George A. Davis joined Mr. Stow in partnership.

1908 TABLE DISPLAYS HAD SAWED-OFF LEGS


DDH: While in high school, I worked in the Stow/Davis show-

mid style, but with their legs sawed off to about six inches. Can you imagine a display like that today? My job was to go



room, where furniture was simply lined up in rows on bare plank floors. One early line of office tables came in five graduated sizes. Starting with the largest at the bottom, the other sizes were stacked on top of it, pyra-

ahead of the salesman and customer and pull the cords of the white globe lights hanging from the showroom ceiling. Everyone wore hats and smoked cigars; there were cuspidors all over the place, and part of my job was to



clean them out. As the salesman showed the furniture, he'd slap his hand hard on the table surface to show how sturdy it was. They were heavy, made of solid wood. I never heard a salesman talk of refinements or of functionalism

1879 COMPANY ASSETS TOTALED LESS THAN \$500

AH: As you can see from this ledger page (above), the company started in a small way, with parts and machinery inventory for 1879, in preparation of the opening in 1880, coming to a grand total of \$421.99. Our entire operation today is on computer—inventory, billing, status of every order.

HAVE TRUNK, WILL TRAVEL

DDH: Right after market, our salesmen would start out on sixweek-long sales trips, as was the habit of all salesmen. We traveled by train with a large steamer-type trunk packed with samples and even scale models. We still have the model of an elegant 1917 roll-top desk (right) for executive offices. All parts—drawers, roll-top—actually work. It was hard to find well designed,

well furnished offices then. To sell that idea, we'd rope off a scaled-down area on the prospective customer's desk and arrange the doll-like furniture to show what the office could look like. It was very successful. Stow/ Davis, by the way, was the first to introduce the "matched suite"—coordinated desk, table, telephone cabinet, costumer, wastebasket. This was 1915.

EARLY DEALERS WERE STATIONERY STORES

DDH: There were very few recognized office furniture dealers in the early days. Many of our most successful dealers today were originally typewriter salesmen. While some large office furniture companies had their own stores in big cities, we always depended on working with dealers. AH: Stow/Davis now has a sophisticated network of office furniture dealers throughout the country as well as our own sales organization. We operate out of eleven regional sales offices, some with showrooms. We sell strictly to dealers but we do make presentations. It isn't unusual for us to fly, say, to Houston, make a presentation, and return the same day. A far cry from the six-week trips of the past.

F.L. WRIGHT: "THEN THEY'LL BE CAREFUL"

DDH: I worked with Frank Lloyd Wright on the famous Johnson Wax Building (opposite), 1936-39, for which Stow/Davis in collaboration with several other Grand Rapids companies produced

most of the furniture designed by Mr. Wright. One chair for stenographers had three legs—two at the back and one at the front, all on casters. I explained to Mr. Wright that should a stenographer lean over to reach for something, she would lose her balance, fall out of the chair, and land on the floor like a scared rabbit. "Well," said Mr. Wright, "they'll fall once or twice and then they'll be careful!" Obviously, OSHA didn't exist then.

DDH: An important result from the Guild was that we could insist that dealers carry a representative display sample on their floor—a model office with all elements coordinated. Our most successful dealers today started that way. It also marked the beginning of designed displays.


CRAFTSMEN REPLACED BY ENGINEERS

DDH: Stow/Davis built its reputation on superb executive office furniture that required top craftsmanship. Today the quality is still superb, but the method of production is different.

AH: You can't find those fabu-

CONTEMPORARY MOVE SPARKED BY SOM DESK

AH: Our entry into contemporary design dates back to the early '60s with two desks. One was called Transitional; the other is the Architectonic Desk (below left), by Davis Allen of Skidmore, Owings & Merrill for a Bankers Trust project. The desk was not only a milestone for S/D but also for desk design in general. It set a new direction, and even today we see many versions of it made by other manufacturers. Our reputation has been built on excellent traditional furniture, and too many people still think of us that way. Actually, only about ten percent of our lines today are traditional.



DDH: Companies today are aware that employees work best in comfortable environments with proper acoustics, good lighting, and functional furniture. In the early days, the volume of business in office furniture from a company was, generally, \$300 per office employee, for chair, desk, file, wastebasket, etc. Today, that figure is something like \$3,600 to \$4,500. Price now is less of a hurdle; companies seem to have money but they insist upon having the best.

AH: Furnishings are actually an




Paradigm Chair, 1978, designed by Richard Schultz.

insignificant part of a company's cost. It comes to about six percent of annual expenditures, with salaries accounting for about 92 percent. But isn't it strange that a person can spend five minutes gulping down a cup of coffee in a \$5,000 dining room at home, ride to work in a car that probably costs more than that, and then work eight hours sitting in a \$26 posture chair. There's a growing need to be able to measure how the environment affects the employee's well-being and level of productivity.

FURNITURE WORTH MORE NOW THAN THEN

AH: We're one of the few survivors of the day when Grand Rapids was the furniture center of the nation. Those who lowered their prices with cheaper materials have perished. Companies that have done good work consistently, using good materials and charging for it, have been able to survive. I maintain that every piece of Stow/Davis furniture ever sold is worth more today than when originally purchased. That's pretty good!

FURNITURE GUILD PROMOTED DESIGN


AH: Right after World War II, there was a push on the designed office by an association called the Executive Furniture Guild. The Guild ran schools on the rudiments of design, teaching dealers how to coordinate colors in paint, rugs and carpets, draperies, upholstery, furniture. It provided dealers with a coordinated package to sell. Ultimately, the Guild outlived its usefulness as the design field gained impetus and matured to its present level.

lous craftsmen any more, so we took craftsmanship out of the shop and put it into the engineering department. There, they write good specs and produce products with good equipment. In the old days, machines didn't always cut straight, so the cabinetmaker had to make up the variances. Twenty years ago, there was not one qualified engineer at S/D. Now we have about 25. This is an old industry; there's nothing really new in it. Glue, screws, materials, machinery-it's what you do with it that counts.
