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
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Quick study in contrasts



100 exhibits, 14 workshops to launch Lighting World


New York—After a start postponed by a fire in the Statler Hilton Hotel, the first advanced illumination exposition and conference, Lighting World International, will be held December 7-9 at the Sheraton Centre.

It will feature over 100 exhibits, 14 seminars, and an awards program.

The event is co-sponsored by the International Association of Lighting Designers (IALD) and the Northeast Region and New York Section of the Illuminating Engineering Society (IES). It is geared to lighting designers, architects, engineers, contractors, and all other specifiers of lighting products and systems.

Seminars, tailored to the latest developments in lighting technology, design, and codes, will include a presentation on, "Lighting and Wiring for the Open Office Plan."

This seminar will feature two speakers: James Nuckolls, president, Incorporated Consultants Ltd., and Ken Reuter, marketing manager, AMP Special

Neutral showroom colors highlight furniture

The Corry Jamestown showroom at Chicago's Merchandise Mart is blessed with the perfect shell for image change.

ERD's design team created a background of neutrals—reflective ceilings, gray walls, marble floors, and stainless steel columns to focus attention on and be compatible with varying colors of displayed furniture.

In redesigning the space for this year's

NEOCON, the design team switched from the soft tones and warm colors of last year's market to the brighter, deeper tones which represent the other half of the firm's color line. Color changes were made on the furnishings, and on the color bands which grace the partitions. Blue was used as the foil for the rest of the colors, and as a result, takes a dominant roll throughout. Furniture was rearranged to be freefloating on the center diagonal of the space. All electrical work runs through the floor, so placement changes merely require the simple addition of outlets.

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SOME MARKETS DEMAND DESIGN INTENSIVE BANK SPACES


From the use of neon signs in one Florida bank to teller stations with individual desks and seats in California's affluent Newport area, unusual bank design is the key to attracting new business. Specific markets demand such design.

Automated Teller Machine (ATM) branches, where service is automated rather than personal, just won't do in such locations. It is the market that dictates the mode, financial pressures to reduce construction costs notwithstanding.

This issue focuses on design intensive banks and the products that are integral to them. After all, how much can be said about the 1,011th plastic ATM cubicle that comes off a production line? —The Editors

MASSIVE PENSION FUNDS IMPACT REAL ESTATE, ARCHITECTURAL MARKETS



Expanding money pools offer new and exciting real estate opportunities for contract industry through risk-averse investments

Pension and welfare benefit programs will have a profound effect on the contract design industry. As far-fetched as that may sound on the surface, funds accumulated for retirement purposes will, in large measure, be invested in the built environment and thus impact contract design.

Because pension fund owners (corporations and industrial, municipal, state, and Federal unions), are continuously seeking risk-averse, maximum return investments, their activities are helping to change the face of America's built environment.

And, these fund controllers may also change some of the ways the contract industry and its professionals will market their services. For pension funds are potentially the largest single source of money available in the United States for real estate developments.

Some of those effects will be:

• An increase in larger, mixed use projects in metropolitan areas.

• Accelerated movement to suburban areas with mixed use office parks.

• Changes in the role of the developer entrepreneur.

• New growth in venture capital for "office of the future" technology.

• and, thus, new opportunities for the contract industry.

How it works: In 1974, the Government expressed its interest in helping Americans to a secure retirement with the passage of ERISA - The Employee Retirement Income Security Act. This brought Federal regulation, with emphasis on "the prudent man's rule," to all private pension and welfare benefit programs in the nation. The program ultimately will vest a nonagricultural wage and salary workforce of 49.7 million Americans (if the Minimum Universal Pension System, MUPS, is adopted). It will continue to provide unprecedented and increasing concentrations of money for investment with Federal limitations on how these funds can be spent.

This rapid appearance of large concentrations of money since 1974 has spawned the appearance of a new breed of financial expert: the pension fund manager, which can be a bank, an insurance company, a national real estate firm, or a consulting firm. Funds can be, and often are, placed in commingled or "pooled" funds administered by the managers. Or, they can be directly placed by the owner or the manager.

Until recently, major investment of these funds has been in stocks and bonds. A large percentage has gone into mortgages. But with inflation, the poor performance of the stock market, and the languishing of the mortgage market due to high interest rates, pension fund managers have been looking for a way to diversify portfolios in a manner that would be responsive to inflation and also provide stability. Consequently, they are now entering real estate market on an equity basis in a manner that is having considerable impact on the real estate industry.

Billions in real estate

Two of the largest managers are the Prudential Insurance Company and Equitable Life Assurance Society. Through the PRISA (Prudential Property Investment Separate Account) I and II funds, Prudential now owns \$2 billion worth of real estate. Equitable, the second largest, owns \$1 billion. Prudential, according to Malcolm D. MacKinnon, vice president and actuary of the giant insurance firm, "led the movement to ownership of property as a suitable investment for pension funds," with the introduction of PRISA 11 years ago. "American fund managers are looking at all kinds of alternatives," says Mac-Kinnon, "and real estate has seemed very attractive to them because it appears to behave well under inflation, appreciating at a good rate.

Pension fund owners achieve diversity in two ways: by having more than one manager, or type of manager, and by having different types of investments. There are also different vehicles available to them. In real estate alone, four types of real estate equity investment vehicles are available: 1) pooled or commingled funds offered by banks and insurance companies, 2) closed-end funds offered by investment counselors, 3) real estate investment trusts, and 4) direct investment. All of these provide the investor with an equity position in one or a group of properties, the average minimum cost of which is \$5 million.

Other investments being offered to pension fund investors include: fine art, antique coins, diamonds, gold, oil and gas leases, and timberland. None of these provide the income stream that real estate does ... "a rate of return that does something for the economy," says Malcolm MacKinnon. One big rival for real estate in the affections of the pension fund manager is international investment, according to Michael Clowes, editor of Pensions & Investments. "But real estate remains number one on the priority list." And equity participation in real estate is looking better and better, as a hedge against inflation.


Pension funds, to be sure, are not the only investors in this market. Insurance companies have had a long tradition of investing in real estate for their general accounts. Europeans, Arabs, British, and Canadians are all investing in America. All of them, in fact, are after the same properties — dollars chasing deals and driving up real estate prices astronomically for desirable commercial industrial properties.

Developers: a new breed?

Pension fund managers are partial to office buildings, warehouses, factories, and shopping centers, with hotels and residences bringing up the rear. Residential is suffering from a shortage of mortgage money; hotels are viewed as labor intensive and subject to wear. Offsetting this is the responsiveness of hotel room rates to inflation. Existing properties in these categories are being bought up in such numbers that prices

are steadily rising. "This could force prices up to the extent that yields will go down and make real estate less attractive as an investment," MacKinnon warns. But another effect has been to change the role of the pension fund manager from passive to active.

Once satisfied only to invest, managers are becoming aware of the difference between an investment in real estate and one in stocks and bonds. Unlike other investment types, real estate returns can be improved by good management. For this reason, pension fund managers are becoming interested in playing an active role as developers and managers. As such, they may be changing the position of the developer, both as the financial "partner" and with regard to the property itself.

As pension fund managers begin to exhaust the stock of existing properties and begin to look at development of new properties, there are signs this year that a new breed of developer is emerging. This is reinforced by the emphasis on equity ownership: as owners, the funds can participate in the income stream from rents, with a balloon effect at the end, when the property is sold. By controlling costs and improving management procedures, profits can be maximized. Rents are also susceptible to upward adjustment to meet inflation. As long as inflation lasts, equity ownership in real estate will be the most stable investment pension funds can make.

Role of developer changing

This is bringing about a change in the role of the developer. Typically, developers have entered into joint ventures with pension fund managers for the acquisition or development of a property. The fund supplies the financing and controls the financial "package." The developer acts as the local project manager, responsible for construction, leasing, and management. Fund managers have been extremely selective about developers, looking for high quality regional or local organizations with a good track record. Such a fund acquires a senior interest in the project; the developer's subordinate interest tends to keep pressure on him to maximize operating efficiencies. And the developer has been willing to accept this subordinate role as a tradeoff for the "creative" financing that provides him with development money. Plus, tax shelter advantages accrue, in as much as pension funds are tax exempt and do not need these benefits.

With increasing involvement in real estate, banks, insurance companies, and consultants have been staffing up departments with experienced entrepreneurial talent from major real estate investment and consulting firms, to the point where many of them rival the developers in expertise. These people are



experts in acquisitions, valuation, construction, finance, and law. In response to the need to achieve a more direct control over property management, the staffs also include leasing and management professionals capable of day-today monitoring of property management functions and results. These professionals search out and review potential deals, negotiate with developers and property owners, and oversee management of the properties.

Demand for larger projects

But with the larger concentrations of money available, there is now a demand for larger projects: mixed use office buildings, mixed use office parks, and major urban complexes. The pension fund manager, with his greater resources and financial techniques, and the need for strict financial control, can provide more efficient services than all but the largest national development firms that control desirable properties. He or she can wield considerable clout. As a result, the pension fund manager with a need for new properties of greater size and efficiency, is taking over the developer function: he buys the site, develops it, and runs it. The local developer is relegated to a contractor function in this situation.

Insurance companies have been acting as developers and owners for years. Prudential's \$2 billion PRISA accounts include 500 industrial buildings, 200 office buildings, 75 hotels, 50 shopping centers, 55 apartment buildings, and over three dozen farms. Those companies develop and build properties.

Harry Pierandri of Equitable's Realty Operations says, "We are getting more involved in the early stages of development, but we expect the developer to make things happen. We rely on the developer for the vision to develop the property, assemble the site, and hire the architect and contractors." Equitable's design and construction departments maintain a group of architects who oversee state-of-the-art technology in the planning stages of a project and review plans and specs.

Office of future financing

Another way in which growth of pension funds is affecting the contract industry is in providing venture capital for high technology. A preferred investment now is in the electronics and technology required by the "office of the future" concept.

For the 1980s venture capital will be looking for companies involved with inventions designed to increase productivity and conserve resources. Preferred are computers, semi conductors, peripheral equipment, medical electronics, genetic engineering and testing, measurement, and quality control instruments.

One venture capital firm, Oak Investment Partners, specifically emphasizes "office of the future" technology and telecommunications. Because pension funds, which comprise the bulk of institutional investors, are now after growth, they have been moving into higher risk stocks, subject to ERISA provisions. They see office technology as the last great area where capital investment has not made great inroads ... "and we are just starting to see movement now," says G. Nicholas Potter, senior vice president of Morgan Guarantee Trust Company. That firm is manager of more than \$20 billion in equities, according to The New York Times. Prudential's common stock investment includes a specialized fund that invests in small- and medium-size companies.

The bulk of the workforce has moved from agriculture and manufacturing to information processing and services, says David Bellet, a venture capital expert who sees room for investment here. "And, since productivity improvement measures usually haven't been directed at information service workers, half of the workforce is now employed in the least productive part of industry. The investment community is looking for anything that facilitates getting higher productivity out of labor or capital," says Bellet.

Recently, the president of a major real estate research firm, M. Leanne Lachman, of Real Estate Research Corporation of Chicago, reported on interviews with 71 industry leaders on investment opportunities in real estate. Her conclusions are: (as reported in February 1981 *Pension World*)

 Retail space is in oversupply in large Metropolitan areas; developers are turning to medium-size and smaller cities and to redevelopment of downtown areas.

 Hotels are suffering from perception of escalating room rates (not in New York City).


 Office buildings are strong throughout the country. There is an emphasis on office parks in smaller cities and suburbs.

Rising costs have created interest in multi-use industrial parks, offering office/showroom distribution/service center facilities. There is an emphasis on medium and smaller-size cities.

The bottom line

What does all this mean to the architect and the contract industry? "With few exceptions, financial sources really aren't related to the architect," says Kenneth Simpson, executive vice president of Lazard Realty Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Lazard Freres. The firm sometimes acts as a developer, in some cases buys existing properties, in some cases joint-ventures on new projects with the developer. "When we are developers," he says, "we hire the architect. When we are co-venturer with another developer, we or they, or both, will get involved with the architect. The architect is still dealing with the developer. If financial people are driving the job, they will be aware of the architect's reputation."

This suggests that the architect now has a need to present him/herself to the



financial community. In real estate circles the three magic words are "location, location, location." Good design is important only where all other things are equal. "A good design in a poor location doesn't work, if nobody goes there. In a good location, a good design does better than a poor design in a good location," Simpson says, citing the Seagram Building on New York's Park Avenue. "It enjoys a terrific location, even with a number of other buildings around it. Seagram's is regarded as a well developed, desirable property (over the others), because of its good design.

Those who are saying, "we are developers," are well capitalized developers. They identify a site, they buy the site, go through the approvals, hire the architect and work with him, and hire the contractors. They have whatever expertise is necessary to coordinate the project. But most financial sources don't have the ability to co-opt the developers' function."

The architect or designer who cannot communicate ideas in financial terms will run the risk of being misunderstood, or worse, ignored. On the other hand, as the financial community gains more direct exposure to architects and designers, it may come to understand the long range benefits of human and social values that have always underlined responsible design decisions. Architects and designers may educate financial people. It has happened before. □

CONSERVATISM, CREATIVITY ARE COMBINED IN TWO BANKS

Two Florida banks, Pan American Bancshares & Safra Bank, fight stiff competition with design-intensive spaces

"In Miami, a bank cannot afford to look less important than its competition," says Ronald W. Robison, president, Robison & Associates, Coral Gables. "This is especially true here because competition is so intense with new domestic banks and savings and loans being launched, existing ones adding branches, and everyone seeking the business of a large corporate clientele."

Whatever the specific materials or ambience of a particular space, some common elements of bank design do exist. To achieve the distinctiveness that sets one bank apart from another, Robison utilizes a number of key criteria:

1. Use of top-of-the-line or custom materials.

"Rich materials, lighting effects, marble, wood, leather—all convey credibility and encourage people to trust a bank with their money."

2. Custom detailing.

"Again, credibility is the key. At Safra Bank, we didn't just fit a standard door into a steel frame. We used a custom millwork door with an oak frame and special hardware."

3. Open or glass-enclosed offices.

"There's a trend toward placing management people out in the open and up front so that they are visible and visually accessible. This too builds trust among patrons."

4. Emphasis on contemporary shapes and forms.

"We're still using the old materials—wood, marble, brass, leather—but using them in new ways. Banks are lighter and more open today, with a sleek look that incorporates word processors and computer terminals."

5. Creature comforts.

"The heavy, clunky old chairs that used to sit beside a banker's desk are passe today. We specify chairs that are easy

to move so that the space works with both flexibility and efficiency."

6. Functional efficiency.

"Part of what makes a space comfortable is its ability to work well. We have to provide furnishings related to the electronic equipment, so that two tellers can share a computer terminal, for example."

7. Subdued elegance.

"It's easy to overdress a bank. Much more difficult, and ultimately more satisfying, is the creation of an image in an understated environment."

CONTRACT presents two outstanding bank designs by Robison & Associates that illustrate application of the above guides.

Contemporary earth tones and an unexpected punch of emerald green neon give bank a look of its own

Use of contemporary materials and a conservative color palette was Robison & Associates' approach to projecting an innovative—yet stable—image for Pan American Bancshares. The 4,000-sq.-ft. banking facility is located in a two-story space off the street level entrance of Merrick Plaza, a new office building in the heart of Coral Gables. Maintaining an efficient operational flow for tellers, clerical workers, and banking officers was also high among the design objectives.


Height of the two-story space and an abundance of natural sunlight, supplemented by incandescent and fluorescent light, provided a clean-edged architectural look for the interior spaces. Teller's stations are covered in a high-gloss green mica, and all millwork is custom-designed to incorporate the sophisticated security and communications systems in an unobtrusive manner. White stucco pre-fabricated panels cover support columns in front of the teller's counters. Above the counters, an emerald green neon sign spells out the bank's name. Use of neon in a bank is unusual, but does not detract from its dignity. On the practical side, the neon softens the bold white soffitt that dominates public space overhead.

Conference room is completely open to public view through floor-to-ceiling structural butted and tinted glass windows. Upholstered panels of emerald green mohair fabric cover the back wall of the room. Other conference room walls are covered in natural linen.



Escalator opening becomes dramatic balconied connection between two banking floors

Converting an existing two-story, 3,500-sq.-ft. lobby into modern banking facilities in the 30-story New World Tower Building was the challenge facing Robison & Associates when designing Miami's Safra Bank. Another consideration was to devise an exciting connection between the two levels that would enhance the bank's solid image.

Connection between levels was achieved by first removing an existing escalator from the middle of the lobby, then converting this vacant space into a balconied opening. Thus, a dramatic visual connection between the two levels was achieved, an area which became the focal point of the bank. A protective glass rail, trimmed in oak and brass, borders the balcony.

On the first floor, solid oak is used for the construction of massive, block-shaped teller counters. Counter walls alternate with flat work spaces of deep plum mica. This rhythmic design emphasizes the continuous flow of banking activity. Custom-designed brass light fixtures in inverted trapezoid shapes illuminate teller stations. In the first floor reception area, traditional tweed fabric in cream and mauve covers contemporary chairs. Carpeting is tightly-woven gray wool tweed. Custom-designed oak storage bins and files are concealed behind doors covered in gray fabric. Symbolic of the institution's solidarity is one brass covered wall.

Traditionally, bank vaults are located on the first floor. However, due to lack of adequate space, unconventional design placed the vaults on the second floor. To support the weight, floor required structural reinforcement. Vault placement necessitated installation of a specially designed lift to transfer money from the vault to the downstairs tellers.

Public space on the second floor is enriched by existing Italian marble columns and new fabric textured walls. This open area includes reception desks and bank officers' desks. Executive offices and conference rooms feature large glass walls to insure sound privacy and Levolor blinds for visual privacy. An oval oak table in the conference room is custom-designed. Completing the second floor is the accounting department, a crisp combination of white desks with solid oak tops and bright red metal chairs upholstered in a red tweed fabric. \Box

There are none at this facility where teller desks take the place of a counter.

An unusual feature of the bank's "teller line" is that it is staggered to create a less formal feeling. Individual desks are set off from each other by 2-ft. indentations and separated by 12-in. panels that provide privacy in customer transactions.

Exclusivity, privacy stressed

Indeed, exclusivity and privacy are elements of this plush facility. Lavish custom millwork, handmade carpeting, and other innovative decor accomplish the bank's goal: to harmonize with a community setting closely controlled by zoning, yet reflect an image of leadership in public service and banking prestige.

Prominent features of the headquarters facility at Avocado Street and Pacific Coast Highway include a ceramic-tiled garden level and an artificial skylight. The latter illuminates the main bank level 40 ft. below through an

Subtle floor guides

Since city construction cannot exceed 36 ft. in height from ground level, the architect and designer dug deep to find subterranean space for the total 45,000sq.-ft. facility. Customers have the option of using underground parking and entering a contiguous level, housing staff room, mailroom, switchboard, safe deposit area, and trust department.

Plantings outdoors and inside give a light and airy feeling to this level, which also has a waiting area of 1,000 sq. ft. Ceramic tile covers both the floor and a stairwell to the main level, subtly directing customers to new accounts and main transaction areas.

Once on the main level, customers have a sense of expanded space created by an open well between the first and second floors. The architect, Paul Ruffing, Ficker & Ruffing, opted for the well as a means of opening up second-floor work areas. Without the well, a lowerthan-normal floor-to-floor distance on the second level would have led to congested work space.

Overhead skylight defines

New accounts desks and loan platform desks, custom designed by interior designers of the project, Cannell & Chaffin, are defined on the main floor by the well and skylight directly overhead. The skylight is composed of 2-ft. by 2-ft. fixtures in a continuous grid

pattern with a recessed center and bevelled edge.

A custom-made area rug with a hand-made 4-ft. border also highlights accounts desks and defines the central area, while corresponding in size to the skylight above.

Officer desks on the main floor are designated by table lamps, which create a homey feeling as well as serving a purpose in directing clients to special services.

All of the teller, platform and new accounts desks include a top radius and a 9-in. overhang for customers to pull up to in chairs. Millwork and panelling are of teak; desks are made of oak stained to look like teak.

Local art at each station

Second floor work stations are in a versatile open plan and feature task lighting on back work surfaces and a reflected ceiling plan over essential work areas. In addition, original samples of local art decorate each station and reinforce the bank's hometown orientation. A revolving art exhibit, featuring Newport Beach talent, is also included in custom cabinets on the main floor.

A progression of color schemes occurs in the building, from warm rusts and earthtones on the garden level to shades of steel gray, blue and beige that deepen from the first to the second floor. Executive offices on the top floor use the modular furnishings approach prevalent throughout other levels, but in richer tones of blue and wine red.

The same innovative approach taken in teller desks is employed in executive offices which have entrances that angle out into central space on the third floor. Each office has glass walls that enhance the building's open feeling. There are six executive offices, a conference center, library, president's office and kitchen on this level.

An exterior paved deck area (12-ft. wide) serves executive offices, each of which has sliding doors that open on to the deck.


The third Bank of Newport operation, this facility has already realized improvements in worker performance, traceable to upgraded facilities. \Box

First floor of bank features custom designed millwork in main waiting area. Three rear display cabinets house artwork of local artists in a changing exhibit, supporting the bank's community spirit. Cabinets are lit from top and below. There are built-in coffee makers on the same wall. A combination of teak and oak are used in panelling and all furniture wood accents were refinished or ordered in teak color to coordinate with ambience.



Main bank, first floor, is depicted in floor plan at left. Main entrances, new accounts areas, and central banking area with teller desks are shown. Also indicated are operations area, officers' platform and conference room. Area (below) features extensive custom millwork and carpeting that define new accounts desk. The overhead well has a thick acrylic lens skylight which creates a grid pattern in lighting without losing clarity. Illuminated ceiling tile has bevelled edge. Distance from main floor to second level ceiling is 40 ft.



BANK OPERATES ON THREE LEVELS

Designed by Interspace/Washington, Baltimore's Equitable Trust features multi-level banking, grand architectural spaces, and a one-of-a-kind commissioned art piece by Rauschenberg

Equitable Trust Co., Baltimore, occupies a very complex space with two mezzanines overlooking its main banking floor. Designed by Interspace/Washington, all three levels of the retail banking facility are tied together by a communicating staircase and a grand architectural space. An elevator connects the three levels with third floor executive offices. Locker rooms, a reprographics area, and a lounge/vending space are tucked in behind the second floor mezzanine. A rear staircase behind the teller lines allows tellers access to facilities on the first mezzanine.

Granite and marble selected for floors and walls is consistent with materials used on the building's exterior. The stone also relates to the commercial



mall area, which opens to the west of the bank. Chrome and glass are used to add sparkle to the spaces.

Art is specially commissioned

A straightforward venetian blind treatment was selected by the designers to solve sunlight control for the large window walls which occupy more than one-half of the wall space. Ceiling is composed of a low relief design on a 5-ft. grid with incandescent downlights placed at module intersections. This was done in one continuous plane, thus creating an overall uniformity.


Internationally renowned artist Robert Rauschenberg was commissioned to do a major mural piece to hang above the main teller line. This piece is a threedimensional, multi-colored, slightly abstract mural called "Bank Job." Straightforward, soft colors seen in the granite and marble complement the prime visual impact of this commissioned art piece.

Traffic directed by barrier

A system of stanchions attached directly to the floor is used in combination with a wood barrier that is only 3-ft. high. Upon entering the bank, one is directed around the barrier and

ushered into a line. Rather than being corralled, one experiences the entire space and has an opportunity to look up at the Rauschenberg art.

Furniture is custom designed

The only other major color seen in the space is a custom fabric wall used in the platform area under the first mezzanine. A herringbone pattern of silk was developed for the multi-functional wall, which had to be attractive as well as provide sound absorption.

Custom furniture was designed for the entire space, including teller line, coupon booths, reception desks, platform officer desks, and desks in the metropolitan division. After analyzing needs of various users, it was determined that a relatively standard workstation would be developed for all personnel. Careful attention was made in detailing the furniture to make it consistent in appearance with general office furniture used in the tower space. □

CARPET SCOPE



Maintenance schedule was designed by Jacqueline Young, ASID, for a disaster restoration situation at the Data Processing and Communications Center of Metro Dade County, Florida. After restoration, the area may be maintained under conditions of normal maintenance cycle, as indicated by color keys. Areas that call for daily cleaning, such as elevator cabs, would be maintained on a weekly cycle after disaster is remedied. Such schedules should be developed at the earliest possible time in new installations.

FLOOR MAINTENANCE SPECIFICATIONS CALL FOR CONSISTENT CARE

Jacqueline Young, ASID, details her successful techniques for maintaining both carpet and resilient flooring

by JACQUELINE YOUNG, ASID

Performance of a carpet in a contract installation is influenced by three factors. Of prime importance is the suitability of product design for the intended use. Secondly, method and quality of installation have a major influence on long-term results. But most important of all is the care or maintenance of the carpeting, which determines whether or not it will give the kind of service and satisfaction expected by the client.

Designers and architects are accustomed to specifying exactly what they want in the areas of design and installation, but, in most cases, they have ignored maintenance. Unfortunately, poor carpet care is common and can lead to dissatisfaction and disappointment with an otherwise well-conceived job.

Leave nothing to imagination

In developing specifications for carpet care, directions must be so explicit that they leave nothing to the janitor's imagination. Cleaning terms must be defined, processes explained, and services to be performed must be itemized. Even visual charts, such as illustrated in this article, must be coded to indicate the cleaning frequency for every section of the carpet in a building.

Such specifications make it possible for a client or building manager to contract for proper cleaning services and to begin a planned program as soon as the carpeting is installed. The dangers of neglect and poor technique are thus avoided at the start.

Dirt tracked off early

Most maintenance people are not well trained. They need to be told what to do. Those who are not trained often overlook the difference between hard surface floors and carpeting. On a hard floor, dust, dirt, and spills are tracked from place to place, eventually dirtying the whole area. A carpeted floor, however, localizes the soil. Most of the dirt is wiped from the bottom of shoes with the first few steps taken. Spills soak right in, rather than being tracked about.

Because of this difference in soiling characteristics, carpeted floors should be cleaned differently. They don't need all-over cleaning that hard surface floors must have. Instead, just the track-off and funnel areas can be cleaned. In this way, 100 percent of a carpeted area can be kept looking good while actually cleaning less than 20 percent at a time.

Unfortunately, even this cleaning is sometimes put off too long, until soil is noticeable and dirt is ground in. Regular, planned carpet care and the dry extraction method of cleaning is recommended for its convenience and safety.

Residual soap collects dirt

While wet extraction cleaning does get a lot of the soil up, success depends on the expertise of the operator. The rotary method can tear fibers, push them around. And it is too easy to soak the carpet and leave soap or foam residues, which start attracting dirt all over again.

With the dry/absorbent compound cleaning method, on the other hand, any residues remaining in the carpet keep on cleaning. They remove more dirt with each vacuuming. Spots and spills can be treated immediately, and frequent cleaning of the carpet can be

Maintenance schedules facilitate training

done, because use of the area isn't disrupted. All of this timely care keeps soil from spreading to other areas and may mean a full-scale cleaning is not necessary.

In the Property Management Division of Dade County's Data Processing and Communications Center, which is a busy 24-hour operation, a decision was made to try to save old carpeting with a comprehensive maintenance program. Peter Rouse, who heads up the division, encouraged the effort, because funds for new carpet were not in the budget. A decision was made to use the Twenty-Day Carpet Maintenance Plan of Racine Industries, which manufactures Host, a dry/absorbent carpet cleaning product.

Planning matrix, is guide

The system uses a planning matrix which enables carpet maintenance people to set priorities for a maintenance plan. A timetable of services to be performed nightly, weekly, monthly, quarterly, and semi-annually was worked out. Specifications include resilient flooring as well as carpet maintenance.

Because the carpet was badly soiled, nightly vacuuming of all carpeted floors and nightly cleaning with dry/absorbent compound of the most heavily trafficked lobbies and corridors were specified. Track-off and funnel areas, were to be dry compound-cleaned weekly, other areas monthly.

With new carpet, make plan early

If the carpeting had been new, weekly cleaning of elevators and entry-ways and monthly cleaning of corridors might have been specified. Whatever the frequency, a cleaning plan must begin when carpeting is new, not wait until the soil begins to show.

Because the requested care was different from usual carpet maintenance, Rouse found it helpful to hold pre-bid conferences with contractors to explain the level of care needed, where it was desirable, and how it could be done. Cleaning people needed to adjust to the idea of treating just portions of a floor, instead of the entire carpet area every time.

Every client should be provided with

information on carpet and hard floor maintenance to protect the flooring investment.

NO-WAX MAINTENANCE

The no-wax maintenance method is recommended to replace standard mop and wax techniques on hard surface flooring. This method has been known for many years but has been in limited use. Particularly when vinyl asbestos tile (VAT) is used in conjunction with carpet areas, this method should be given serious consideration.

Substantial cost savings are possible with the no-wax method, in addition to other benefits. The technique also may be used on asphalt tile, it is simple, and it results in sanitary, safe, and beautiful floors.

The first step with any tile installation, new or existing, is heavy initial buffing to create a mirror-like finish, but one which is NOT slippery. The smoother the finish, the fewer burn and scuff marks. Unbuffed tile has micro-peaks, which cause abrasiveness for heels and wheels to catch on and leave marks. On very smooth surfaces, wheels move quickly and easily. Patience is required, however, because the mirror finish does not appear immediately. After six or seven days of buffing, the micro-peaks are gradually removed. At the same time, the finish gets brighter and heel and wheel tracks and burn marks are diminished. After daily buffing for approximately 30 days, a minimum upkeep, high gloss floor is achieved.

Mops, pails, wax, and stripping supplies can then be disposed of. Tile floors can be "dry cleaned" with a daily buffing, and, in most instances, the maintenance man will have time for other work.

PRELIMINARY STEPS

Step 1. First remove all wax. Even a new installation usually has a thin coat applied by the tile supplier. A mild solution of any commerical wax remover can be used to scrub this off. Then rinse the floors carefully so as not to flood them but be thorough. Old tile which has been maintained with standard waxing/stripping programs needs to be *stripped* as usual and thoroughly rinsed with water solution.

Step 2. Some manufacturers often recommend the application of a primer coat made of half water and half any approved water emulsion floor finish. If this is done the first coat should dry three hours or more and the second at least 12 hours or longer. Or this step may be skipped and buffing started as soon as the tile has been stripped.

Step 3. Prepare the solution as follows: Two ounces of floor finish, one ounce of household ammonia, and approximately three quarts of water. Prepare the buffing pad and spray one side of a thick synthetic pad with solution until it is slightly damp. Buff the floor with a circular motion for several feet to "break-in" the pad.

Step 4. Buff an area of about eight to 10 feet thoroughly, spraying it lightly with the solution first. Repeat until the entire area is covered. The solution prevents burning the floor because it acts as a lubricant. An eight ounce bottle of solution will "do" about 8,000 square feet.

DAILY/WEEKLY

Buffing: When the desired gloss has been acquired, the buffing schedule can be cut back drastically with only spot buffing when (and where) required to keep floors in condition. The schedule depends on the type of building and its traffic, use, and soil, but a floor plan can be drawn to show these areas.

Dusting: Floors should be dusted

after the buffing operation. It may be necessary to dust before buffing in some instances. Floors can be maintained in good condition in most cases with no more than a daily dusting. A 36-in. tool can make the work a speedy operation, because a man can dust as fast as he can walk.

Spillage: Wipe up spills with absor-

bent paper or other material. Gum and sticky debris should be removed with a putty knife before dusting or buffing. On occasion, damp mopping may be necessary in vestibules, entrances, or other high traffic areas.

Pad Maintenance: With the No-Wax method it is essential that as soon as the buffing pad looks soiled, it be turned and the clean side used. Pads can be washed and used over and over again in a standard washer/dryer. If pads are washed by hand, they must be thoroughly clean and completely dry.

Like carpet on the floor, tile on the floor is less costly to maintain the higher in the building it is installed, because upper floors have less soil with which to contend.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q What primer should we use?

A Any commercial primer, water-emulsion, or synthetic (polymer) floor finish.

Q Why should a primer be used?

A Because some tile is slightly porous and this solution acts as a leveling agent.

Q Why should it be diluted?

A A thin film coats better, filling any micro crevices in the tile.

Q How often should floors be buffed after the burnishing stage?

A The same schedule as traditional damp mopping, but substitute "dry cleaning", remembering that schedules for the type of building and the specific traffic must be developed.

Q How can burning be prevented during preliminary buffing?

A Use the "water, floor finish, ammonia" solution, which acts as a lubricant and prevents scorching or burning.

Q What size should the buffing machines be?

A In open areas (corridors, lobbies), an 18-in. electric buffer is good. In more constricted areas (offices, conference rooms), 12-in. buffers are easier to handle.

Q How many square feet can be buffed in a day?

A One person can "dry clean" 10 to 12,000 square feet in a day and have time to handle other maintenance responsibilities.

Q What kind of buffing pads should be used?

A Any synthetic, non-abrasive, buffing pad can be used.

Q How can buffing pads be prevented from moving?

A A rubber tip pad behind the buffing pad can prevent shifting.

Q How can buffing pads be cleaned?

A Wash and dry them in an ordinary household washer and

dryer. (They can be cleaned by hand, but must be washed thoroughly in clean, soapy water and rinsed completely in clear water.)

Q Does buffing make the tile slippery?

A The high gloss only looks slippery. It is not slippery at all.

Q How often should areas be dusted?

A Frequency depends upon dirt and traffic and, in many areas, only dust mopping after buffing is required. If an area is swept or dusted more often before "no-wax", then the same schedule should be followed.

Q Should dust mops be treated?

A Only washing and rinsing should be necessary.

Q Will tile without wax stain more?

A Actually, tile stains less, because the surface is denser after buffing.

Q What about spills?

A Wipe them up immediately with absorbent materials and remove gum, etc., with a putty knife.

Q Will mops and pails be needed?

A Only in lavatories or other areas where a buffing machine can't be used.

Q Will unwaxed tile stand up under heavy traffic?

A Yes, it may even last longer, according to micrometer tests which have shown no appreciable wear after five years of no-wax use.


Q Will unwaxed tile pick up moisture?

A Absolutely not. This method creates a nearly impervious surface, because tile has a slight porosity and buffing anneals the surface, closing the pores.

DESIGNER COMBAT MANUAL

The Challenge of Interior Design

by Walter B. Kleeman, Jr., Ph.D., FASID, IBD, CSI, IDEC University of Colorado at Boulder CBI Publishing Company, Inc., Boston Mass., 1981, 338 pp., hardback, \$19.95.

"The Challenge of Interior Design" is a combat manual for designers. Author Walter Kleeman, Visiting Professor of Interior Architecture & Space Planning, University of Colorado, has been a designer and book reviewer for many years. In this book, he notes varying branches of the social sciences which are important to the design profession, as well as the latest data on vision, anthropomorphics, acoustics, temperature, color perception, and cost analyses for furnishings.

Phrases such as "interior ergonomics," "advocacy design," "microenvironmental rights," surface throughout the text. Kleeman opens the text by identifying 30 disciplines that offer pertinent information to the designer, such as: demography, ethology, computer science, physiology, and psychiatry. He also acknowledges that there is no easy way to collate all of these sources.

"It would be very pleasant to say that there is one study in each of the disciplines...which is definitive, and that any designer can take a limited number of studies, put them together, and then design any space or building so that it is behaviorally correct," he notes.

Intervention forces change

Kleeman has little patience for the designer with a dictatorial style. As an interior design consultant for mental hospitals and mental retardation sites, Kleeman has seen how law suits and resulting decisions are forcing changes in the client-designer relationship. He feels the critical role of the designer is pinpointing *real* user needs.

"...funds for the designer and physical improvements come from remote sources, for example, a state board of mental health and mental retardation. It is the patient, however, who is the user and whose needs and wants are paramount...

"This is not, however, merely a matter of distinguishing between the user client and the paying client; it is also a matter of the designer helping patients who by the very nature of their difficulties are in no condition to respond, project, demand, evaluate—in short, to fend for themselves. The designer must therefore be the patient's design agent, intercessor, and advocate.

"It is my belief that architectural and interior designers have been slow to understand the needs for design advocacy; indeed, their attitude is diametrically opposed to design advocacy. Architectural and interior designers are too accustomed to telling clients (both paying and using) what they can have; they are not accustomed or even geared to making detailed investigations to determine client needs and wants.

"However, pressure from a new direction is creating a situation where designers may be forced to consider design advocacy as a way of life. In a surprisingly wide variety of settings, *interior and architectural design is being decided by federal consent decrees and court orders*."

Kleeman covers a broad range in this book, moving from "Spaces for the Elderly" to "Life in the Office," and "University Living & Learning Spaces." The last chapters focus on case studies with complete followthrough on design process and results. Since this October issue is dedicated to bank design, excerpts from the chapter, "The Ergonomics of Desks," follow.

Adjusting chairs and desks

We adjust the chair to fit the desk, not to fit the person using it, because almost all working chairs are adjustable in height and it is easy to adjust the height of the chair. However, the technology is available for an adjustable height desk—as long as long as you avoid the type in which the lowest drawer in the pedestals almost hits the floor.

As a matter of fact, a Japanese ergonomist has not only designed one, but he has also had them built and put into successful use in Japan. They also are made in Sweden and are now being imported into this country. However, the desk only adjusts from 26% inches to 29½ inches in height and the typing surface from 23 inches to 26¼ inches in height, about half the needed ranges.


Currently the typical American desk is made for just two types of people: the tall and the very tall. They are not built for the typical American, though the mythical, typical American is growing taller by the year. Perhaps as a people we will eventually grow up to our desks. Meanwhile, what is happening to the people who are not tall enough for their desks? Researchers are just beginning to dig out the answers, but the present indications are that nonadjustable desks (and poorly designed seating, too) are responsible for a host of troubles and pains that seated workers complain of. Ask any general practitioner or industrial plant doctor what the mostdifficult-to-diagnose complaint is and you will be told it is lower back pain. Ergonomic studies show not only a definite connection between bad working-surface heights and lower back pain but also a connection between these heights and wrist-forearm problems, too.

The lack of height adjustability in the proper ranges is not the only thing that is wrong, ergonomically speaking, with desks; we seem to have forgotten that the angle of the desk top to the floor must be adjustable, too. The late Darell Boyd Harmon, optical theorist and biomechanics authority, graphically illustrates how nonadjustable desk tops can start the visual-defectsphysical-defects process. Harmon's findings are partially supported by Eastman and Kamon's study of posture, back movement, and fatigue of subjects reading and writing at flat and slanted desks.

CRTs revolutionize desks

Ergonomics is also concerned with the outer surfaces of a desk (in addition to the top) from the acoustic point of view. For example, some of the early office landscapes were not successful because of poor acoustic control, and one of the factors involved turned out to be the fact that the sides of desk pedestals are great sound reverberators. To make some installations work it has been necessary to put various kinds of acoustically functional cloth on all outer desk surfaces except the top. This reduces the acoustic confusion and reverberation and damps the sound level. On the other hand, the paper and the filing folders in open-sided filing carts also absorb sound, which is another acoustic benefit.

Another change is coming to the top of the desk. Until recently, the automatic editing and typing machinery of the word processing innovations in offices

had been marketed along with furniture sold by the machine makers, most of which seems clumsy and not particularly well designed for the purpose. However, designers may be paying attention to this design opportunity; the same Swedish manufacturer who exports the adjustable height desk has recently offered a sound-absorbing word processing desk, with a 26-in. square recessed area. The base of the recessed area is a perforated sheet of steel that sends the sound from the machine down to the carpet where it is absorbed, as opposed to a solid bottom that bounces the sound back at the typist.

The microprocessor revolution, which has miniaturized so many electronic products, has begun to revolutionize desk design. A desk containing a complete computer and printer is on the market for about \$3,000. Yet, it is the same size as and looks just like a normally well-styled, single-pedestal desk. Other aspects of the electronic revolution are discussed in Chapter 12, "Life in the Office."

In passing it should be noted that Designer Robert Propst advocates a stand-up desk, and for a very good ergonomic reason. An office worker who has both a sit-down and a stand-up desk will spend time at each, and the worker's circulation and muscular activity will increase, which is desirable for relatively sedentary workers. Some of the newer stand-up desks, which are attached to partitions in systems developed for office landscapes, consist basically of tops that are attached to the partition at any desired height; therefore, within limits, they are adjustable in height. It is doubtful that users yet see that adjustability in the ergonomic perspective we have discussed, although Winston Churchill wrote his books standing up, and many people like to work standing up some of the time. \Box

TECHNICAL SYSTEMS STRESSED

Planning & Designing the Office Environment

Integration is vital in the installation of lighting, acoustics, and HVAC since these highly technical systems are dependent on one another for maximum efficiency. "Planning & Designing the Office," brings these disciplines together, compiling the expertise of top consultants and employees of Owens-Corning Fiberglas. In general, the emphasis is on open plan offices because requirements for technical integration are much more demanding in these settings than in closed offices.

Structure and strategies of planning are analyzed with detailed charts on communications analysis, status charts, and environmental requirements. Coverage of acoustics describes a proven technique for enhancing speech privacy. Air distribution and thermal comfort are explored and typical problems and solutions are outlined.

But, emergency conditions pose the toughest test for the designer. Ralph Gerdes, Rolf Jensen & Associates, led a team effort in the following chapter on fire safety, creating an innovative systems approach for fire safety. Consideration of fire problems is not only a moral obligation on the part of the planning and design teams, but is mandated by law as well. A fire safety program which protects the lives of occupants and fire-fighting personnel, and maintains continuity of operations needs to be established. Program objectives must be defined and the level of need determined, with problem areas recognized and solved. The application of fire protection principles reduces the possibility of danger to life and financial investments.

Ensuring fail-safe system

The Systems Concept for fire protection integrates all services and safety features to form a total system. This is based on the understanding that one fire protection feature does not necessarily work alone or independently and is affected by the operation of other features. Integration of features can result in a more efficient, safe, and economical structure.

The steps within a systems approach for fire protection are as follows:

- Determine the desired level of safety (goal).
- Examine each occupancy hazard (problems).
- Identify problem areas.
- Meet fire safety goals by limiting fire potential (solution).

This goal-oriented systems approach has several advantages over the approach of merely meeting code requirements. It provides a quantitative measure of fire safety goals. It enables the planning team to evaluate the entire design with its built-in safety features for size, cost, aesthetics, degree of protection, and above all, relationship to the needs of the particular organization. It therefore, enables the planning team to provide a level of protection often beyond code minimums at the lowest possible cost.

In working with their fire protection engineer to integrate a safety system into their office design, planning teams need to consider how the following elements will be handled:

- Building construction.
- Fire detection.
- Occupant response.
- Notification/communications.
- Exiting.
- Smoke control.
- Fire control/suppression.
- Fire department response.
- Emergency power.

Building codes establish minimum types of construction based on occupancy, height and area limits, area separations, and provision of automatic sprinklers.

Interior finish is a principal element in determining the fire hazard of buildings. Interior finish includes the materials that form the walls, partitions, ceilings, and other finish surfaces and/or the materials, such as paint, that are applied to these surfaces. The characteristics of interior finish materials relevant to fire problems are their ability to spread fire and generate smoke when burning. Materials that have high flame-spread characteristics, or produce large quantities of smoke are undesirable.


In addressing life safety, building codes limit the flamespread and smoke-developed rating that an interior finish material may have, according to the building's occupancy, suppression equipment, and location of the material used. When selecting finish materials, the planning and design team must, therefore be aware of the code requirements for various office areas and select their materials accordingly. (Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., furnishes a list of all materials tested and their ratings in the *Building Materials Directory*, published by the organization.)

Sprinklers get high rating

A major component in a fire safety plan is the inbuilding means of controlling or suppressing the fire. The most common devices are automatic sprinklers, standpipes, and portable extinguishers.

Automatic sprinklers are activated by the heat of a fire and direct water only on those areas where a fire is actually occurring. Thus, water damage is minimized while the chances of saving lives and property are improved. Performance records documented by the National Fire Protection Association show sprinklers to be effective and reliable in controlling and extinguishing fires in approximately 97 percent of those U.S. offices having sprinkler systems.

Sprinklers are located at the ceiling and may be concealed, recessed, or readily visible. Manufacturers can provide an assortment of styles and finishes. Sprinkler




piping concealed above the ceiling and recessed or concealed sprinklers provide a reliable source for fire fighting yet remain unobtrusive. When detailing or specifying sprinklers, the desired location of the sprinklers in the ceiling should be made clear. Building officials usually require automatic sprinkler installations to be designed in accordance with the National Fire Protection Association's Standard for the Installation of Sprinkler Systems (NFPA 13) which specifies the pipe size based on the number of sprinkler heads being supplied. It also limits the coverage per head to 200 sq. ft. As an alternate, it allows office areas to be designed for light hazard which will allow the pipe sizes to be hydraulically calculated and the sprinklers to be spaced up to 15 ft. on centers, and up to seven and one-half feet from walls. This allows a coverage of 225

sq. ft. per sprinkler and possibly reduced pipe sizes.

Building officials usually require automatic sprinkler installations to be designed in accordance with the National Fire Protection Association's standards.

Standpipes provide a local concentrated source of water for fire-fighting operations. They can be used by trained office personnel or firemen. National Fire Protection Association Standard 14, *Standpipe and Hose Systems*, provides guidelines for the design and installation of standpipe systems. Standpipes are generally located in stairways and other portions of a building so that all portions of the building will be within 30 ft. of a nozzle when attached to 100 ft. of hose.

Portable fire extinguishers also give occupants and fire fighters a tool for controlling or extinguishing fires. They should be provided in accordance with the local code or with the National Fire Protection Association Standard for the Installation, Maintenance, and Use of Portable Fire Extinguishers (NFPA 10). This standard recommends that extinguishers suitable for Class A fires (combustible materials) be located so that the maximum travel distance from any point to an extinguisher does not exceed 75 ft. Extinguishers for protecting Class A hazards should be water types or multipurpose dry chemical. The amount of floor space an extinguisher will protect depends on its rating. For example an extinguisher with a 2A rating can protect 6,000 sq. ft. while one with a 4A rating can protect 11,250 sq. ft. of office occupancy.



In Fire Safety chapter, two illustrations of a reflected ceiling plan show placement of sprinklers in both a closed office layout (above) and uniform placement of sprinklers in an open office layout (left). Co-author Ralph Gerdes makes the point that since there are no full height partitions in open office landscape, it is possible to achieve an optimum uniform pattern. Full height partitions necessitate more sprinklers to provide required coverage of all floor areas. A cost sensitive design and integration of sprinkler locations on a modular basis in the ceiling geometry is achieved. Building officials, according to the chapter, usually require automatic sprinkler installations to be designed in accordance with the National Fire Protection Association's standards.
