Teaching space planners to use electronic technology is focus of 1982 ASID conference seminars

How computers and electronics impact the interior design profession is the focal point of a series of far-reaching programs which will take place during the American Society of Interior Designers' (ASID) 1982 Conference & Exposition, San Francisco. Titled "Dimensions Plus: Integrating Humanism With Technology," the conference will tackle new interior design challenges created by the proliferation of advanced electronic technology.

Convention activities, which are scheduled for July 28 through August 1, will be keyed to a half-day program

of seven workshops which address computer-aided design. ASID attempts to arrange scheduling so that more than one workshop is available to each attendee.

Slated for Friday, June 30, this program will begin with an opening address moderated by Jeffrey Brown, Milliken Corp. Participants will then break up into workshop groups which will cover topics such as "The Computer as a Design Product Tool," chaired by Lawrence Morehouse, Ph.D., professor of kinesiology, UCLA, and the first person to design a chair solely by computer.

Other workshops include "Implementing Data Processing in a Design

Firm" and "The Many Uses of the Word Processor," headed by Henry Haimovitch, AIA, Berkeley, Calif., and Carol Dyer, Edwin S. Darden Assoc., Fresno. Business concerns will be addressed in workshops given by Jeffrey Hamer, Computer Aided Design Group, Santa Monica, and Charles Salembier, Albert van Luit & Co., Los Angeles. Titles of their presentations are "The Computer as a Design Product Tool" and "The Computer as a Business Tool."

Thomas Frank, FASID, Interior Design Assoc., Salt Lake City, Utah, will demonstrate the workings of a microfilmed library of industry sources in "Microfiche: Don't Let Technology Pass You By." Ed Freidrichs, AIA, Arthur Gensler & Assoc., Los Angeles, will discuss "The Computer's Impact on the Future of Interior Design."

Exploring alternative environments

Following the morning workshop program, Buckminster Fuller will address participants on energy-conscious design. Best known for the invention of the geodesic dome—200,000 of which exist throughout the world today—

Fuller is also the creator of Dymaxion House, the Dymaxion Car, and the Dymaxion Map. Author of some 14 books including, *Nine Chains to the Moon and Critical Path*, he will explore the interrelationship between man, design, and technology and the creation of energy-efficient environment planning.

ASID's other featured speaker is Dr. Leo Buscaglia, who represents the "human" half of the conference theme. Buscaglia is nationally-known for his two Public Broadcasting Television programs—"Speaking of Love" and "The Art of Being Fully Human." His address will keynote the opening general session on Thursday, July 29.

ASID's International Exposition of Design Resources will be held at the Moscone Center, a column-free underground structure measuring 880 linear ft. More than half of this year's exhibition space is sold out, according to ASID conference planners. In conjunction with visiting product displays, conferees will attend lectures, seminars, and workshops exemplifying end-use alternatives for displayed products. Approximately 40 sessions will be offered covering topics such as barrier-free de-

project, Designer of Distinction, and Thomas Jefferson awards will be honored.


Another dinner will be held at the Sheraton Palace, which dates back to 1874. Its glass-domed restaurant can accommodate several thousand diners.

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
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Life safety programs gain importance on lecture circuit

Syracuse, N.Y.—Presentations on fire behavior and test methods for flame spread and toxic fumes commanded applause at a recent ASID Professional Development Seminar here. Sponsored by the New York Upstate/Canada East chapter—the second ASID chapter to offer such a program—lectures were conducted by Sivon C. Reznikoff, professor, Arizona State University School of Architecture, at the Hotel Syracuse.

Member of several national materials-testing organizations and author of NCIDQ-listed Specifications for Commercial Interiors, Reznikof showed an extensive series of slides illustrating fire behavior, terminology, codes, and safety, as well as testing criteria for flame spread and toxic fumes. In addition, she provided materials which conferees examined and tested during

the informative lecture.

Special guest speaker was Roland E. Nortman, deputy chief, Fire Prevention Bureau, City of Syracuse Fire Dept.

Contract designs sweep prizes in ASID/Flexalum contest


First prize goes to Dennis Leczinski, ASID, of Claus Heppner & Assoc., Denver. He receives \$3,000 for his design of an indoor entertainment and amusement complex in which blinds were used to overcome HVAC problems pre-

sented by unusually high ceilings.

Second prize winner is Patrick Lloyd, student, Virginia Tech, who will be presented with \$1,500 for his use of blinds as a backdrop in a disco/nightclub. Third place winner Fuen-Cong Joa, student, Fashion Institute of Technology, is awarded \$500 for his renovation of an existing Chicago hotel in which blinds are the focal point of a dining/dancing entertainment area.

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GSA/Supply realignment aims to improve service, reduce distribution costs

Washington, D.C.—Faster service and lower distribution costs are primary goals of a complete realignment of the General Service Administration's (GSA) supply distribution arm. Targeted for completion by October, 1983, the move is expected to save approximately \$14 million annually, according to GSA ad-

ministrator Gerald P. Carmen.

"GSA will consolidate its supply distribution operations into eight full-service depots and 23 retail service centers," he explains. "The consolidation will reduce the amount of space now used by more than 5 million sq. ft. In addition, commercial products and commercial distribution systems will be used to a much greater degree."

Retail service centers will be located in areas of heavy federal employment. Customers will be able to fill orders directly from storage bins, or to phone in or mail orders for later delivery.

"We intend to modernize centers with computerized cash registers and inventory controls, thereby quickly meeting growing demands of agencies such as the Department of Defense and other government service organizations," adds Carmen. "Our goal is a 24-hour turnaround on mail and phone orders."

Plans also call for closing of Raritan, N.J., Shelby, Ohio, and Hawaii, depots. Eight full-service centers will now fill needs in or nearby those areas.

Says Carmen, "The change in the system will require a minimal outlay of funds, but will put goods closer to the customers with greatest demand."

600 manufacturers display products at growing Seattle market

Seattle—More than 600 manufacturers were represented in the Design Center Northwest's 36 showrooms during the recent Presentations Northwest '82 market here. In addition, a number of existing showrooms were completely revamped for the event.

Market attendance was recorded at four times that of previous years. Designers and architects from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California, and Canada were among those registered.

Six seminar programs were offered during the four-day market. Topics included solar energy, lighting, legal aspects of the design profession, and color psychology. One popular presentation was an exhibit of color forecasts for 1982-'84, given by Shirley LaFollett, NWSID.

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

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



Increased interest in contract market potential was expressed by key exhibitors at the 1982 Scandinavian Furniture Fair, many of whom are upscaling their institutional product introductions to reach quality-minded American specifiers.

In face of a widespread depressed European economy, manufacturers here are turning to more fertile U.S. soil, mindful of the marketing complexities behind overseas export.

Whether working through established exporters, or representatives in the States—like HUJU/Chicago, which handles Finnish lines, or ICF, New York—Scandinavian contract manufacturers are sharpening their merchandising savvy to make their products more appealing and affordable to

buyers in the States. More, several prime contract exhibitors at this year's Fair participated in NEOCON—some for the first time.

Computer support furniture, greater stress on systems rather than free-standing furniture, and overall continued quality craftsmanship keyed to ergonomic needs were notable features of this year's Copenhagen market.

Spokesmen for contract suppliers and furniture associations for each of the Scandinavian countries indicate mounting support for export programs to the U.S.

In Denmark, where a 37 percent increase in exports to the States occurred between 1980 and '81, the largest part of production continues to be in popular storage systems, followed by seating.

Winner of Finnish Assn. of Interior Architects award for best product in Scandinavian Fair 1982 is the **Korhonen** Kari 3 chair. Designed for portability, it has three-dimensional folding feature and legs made of birch. Chairs can be stacked. **Circle No. 304.**

Ajar to the Contract Market." Presentations will be delivered by regional reps of the association, one of whom is based in the States.

Reflecting this spirited Danish trend is LaBofa's report that it has doubled contract sales to U.S. dealers in the past three years. Reports Hans Nielsin of LaBofa, "We plan to set up some U.S. production in the next year and our goal is to increase U.S. trade by 40 percent in 1982."

More attention to modular systems design is evident in introductions from these Danish firms: Kinetics, seating system, and the desk/table by Munch Mobler with coordinating side pieces. Magnus Olesen reinterprets its popular stool design in the form of a "Standup" table by designers Rud Thygesen and John Sorensen.

Perfecting for U.S. market

Westnofa, a Norwegian firm whose name signifies "West Norway Factories," is perfecting its Lamironda curvilinear banquette seating for U.S. buyers.

Notes Jim V. Hockberger, national sales manager, "We are selling this peice FOB Chicago as well as direct. U.S. buyers have to realize that it isn't that difficult—or costly—to import from Scandinavia." He observes that the

biggest obstacle to overcome in the U.S. is underexposure of product.

Westnofa currently represents seven factories in the States and was at NEOCON for the first time this year where it premiered Laminova—a table/chair series.

Another Norwegian firm making introductions at NEOCON is HAG which featured its "Splitback" chair, shown here. It is geared to healthcare use and features high- or low-back with back and neck pillow support.



for Artek. The Finnish firm deals through ICF, New York and specializes in the designs of Alvar Aalto. The birch stackable row chair is shown in this coverage. He notes that greater adventurousness among young American space designers has led to a strong reception for Aalto's products in this country.





Export structure

In other countries, penetration of the American contract sphere is being carefully planned. Notes Nils Persson, director, Swedish Furniture Manufacturers Association, "For all furnishings, Sweden's exports to the States are up a third in two years' time. Yet, the American contract market requires caution and education in price options and available quality before we can really capitalize on it."

Swedish contract participants at the Fair include Skandi-Form, which showed its Contrast series for office and conference environments. Other firms whose product photos were not available for publication include Dux, which previewed the Focus 90 seating line for contract and modified the Avanti system for hotel and boutique applications.

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OPEN PLAN DIRECTORY EXPLORES NEW DESIGN CONCEPTS

Now that the last vestiges of doubt have been put to rest about whether or not open plan systems will survive, the design community is turning its attention to more pressing questions. Space planners are now asking themselves how various systems function and how they can be improved.

Two articles in this 10th Annual Open Plan Specifiers Guide explore those issues. One deals with post-occupancy studies of Consumer Credit Centers conducted by Wells Fargo Bank, Calif. The other story summarizes a study that calls for the use of retail design concepts in open plan offices.

With the proliferation of computer support furniture lines, CONTRACT's editors considered expanding this directory to include those products. However, it was decided instead to present that special category of furniture in a separate annual directory, permitting proper presentation of detailed information. 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TECHNOLOGICAL DEVELOPMENTS WILL EXPAND OPEN PLAN USE TO 50% OF OFFICE MARKET

One-third of all white collar workers occupy open offices, spurring projections for \$11 billion open plan market by 1995

Open plan systems furniture has increased its market share from three percent in 1967 to roughly one-quarter of all office furniture shipments. Currently, nearly one-third of all white collar workers occupy open plan offices.

As the trends that generated this exceptional growth are intensified, open plan systems furniture will continue gaining market share, although at a slower rate. By 1995—with shipments of more than \$11 billion—this type of furniture will have captured nearly 50 percent of the entire office furniture market.

One of the major advantages of open plan systems furniture is that it can be easily rearranged to accommodate new electronic equipment or to integrate new computer support furniture designs. For example, the height of a work surface hanging from a panel can be raised or lowered to complement equipment more efficiently.

Handles employee change

Besides being adaptable to changing equipment accommodation requirements, open plan systems furniture is adaptable to changing office functions, which go hand-in-hand with new technology. As a result of this new technology, 70 percent of office workers learned new skills or changed tasks in the past decade.

Rapid penetration of computer terminals can be seen as an indication of how quickly workers need to upgrade their skills. In 1980, there was roughly one terminal for every 13 white collar employees; by 1995, the installed terminal base will reach every 2.5 workers. Highly flexible, open plan furniture minimizes the risk of obsolescence in these rapidly changing times.

Although change is prevalent throughout the office environment, it is most striking in the area of technology. Effective office automation has become an essential competitive tool in the business community. As a result, both the quantity and quality of automation are undergoing radical changes. Automation is increasingly entering the realm of offices that previously had little or no automated functions. Equipment investments are enhanced by the fact that prices for office products, incorporating microprocessors and magnetic

Steady increases in open plan furniture shipments will lead to open office systems capturing 50 percent of total office furniture shipments by 1995. Similarly, non-traditional, open environments will comprise half of total workspaces by the middle of the next decade.

media, are falling while labor costs are rising.

Concurrently, those offices which have attained advanced stages of technological development must frequently upgrade their systems. The average life of a typical business machine is roughly seven years and is expected to decrease as improvements hasten technological obsolescence. Consequently, flexibility—or the ability to accommodate constant change—has become paramount in all facets of office design. It is not surprising, therefore, that office furniture has kept pace with all of these changes.

Open plan systems furniture happens to be a particularly appropriate solution to another trend in today's office environment—the pressure to remodel offices.

White collar workers are now the largest segment of the work force, with over 50 million workers. Businesses which face the problem of accommodating additional employees have two basic alternatives: remodeling available space or locating additional space. Due to cost considerations, the former option is being chosen more frequently.

Remodeling made inexpensive

When redesigning an office, tearing out drywall and plaster is much more

expensive and time consuming than reconfiguring open plan systems furniture. Furthermore, studies indicate that open plan designs can seat 30 percent more employees than traditional, walled offices in the same amount of space.


The average cost of office space has increased nearly 50 percent in recent years (currently exceeding \$20 per

square foot). Systems furniture can make particularly efficient use of costly available space. It can reduce floor space requirements by up to 20 percent.


Further, open plan systems furniture can offer savings by reducing energy consumption. The cost of airconditioning, heating, and lighting is currently at \$3.50 per sq. ft. Energy savings associated with open plan systems include conservation through task/ambient lighting, which can reduce wattages for lighting by as much as three watts per sq. ft. In addition, this type of light generates less heat than conventional light fixtures, thereby decreasing airconditioning requirements.



TURNOVER CUT 50 PERCENT WITH OPEN PLAN DESIGN

Wells Fargo Bank divisions in Santa Ana and Walnut Creek, Calif. discover panels and partitions are key to worker retention





mplementation of a carefully specified open plan system reduced employee turnover by 50 percent at the Wells Fargo Bank Consumer Credit Service Centers. Paul Kahn, bank vice president and manager, consumer services department, reports turnover at 9.6 percent, down from 17.2 percent in 1981. Kahn, who manages four bank centers designed by Environmental Planning & Research (EPR), says

morale and worker attitude have definitely improved.

A post-design evaluation determined degree of employee satisfaction with the open plan environments at both Walnut Creek and Santa Ana facilities. EPR worked with the systems manufacturer on post-occupancy research questionnaires. Robbie Cook, EPR project director, says 12 of 18 design categories evaluated were ranked as "adequate/very good" by more than 90 percent of respondents at the Santa Ana center. Of 152 workers, 109 (71.7 percent) responded to the open plan analysis.

Of those respondents, 100 percent rated overall look of the system "adequate/very good." Other high-ranking aspects were: type/quality of furnishings—98.1 percent; look of workstations—98 percent; comfort of workstation—98 percent; worksurface space—97 percent; and chair comfort—97 percent. In addition, general office environment, color, coworker access, and plantscaping were given high ratings by 93 percent or more of respondents.

Percentages of "adequate/very good" responses ranged from 71.4 to 89 percent for type/quality of data equipment, overall lighting, access to equipment, amenities, storage, and noise level. Comparable statistics resulted from the Walnut Creek division study.

Cook claimed the research was worthwhile in studying

Softened edges promote positive attitude

what works effectively in open plan design. "I was surprised by the results. Knowing that a high degree of privacy and quiet is important, I was amazed to see that those two features were almost totally integrated," he says. "Psychological feelings that open plan offices are less private than conventional offices often prevent workers from adapting to a partitioned system." Acoustical treatment is crucial to privacy levels. Cook recommends carpet, absorbent wall treatments, and acoustical ceilings to eliminate excess noise.

"Density is also just as important," says Cook. "Eight to 10 ft. between workers is a must, as are adequate masking sounds, such as HVAC and lighting fixture noise. Most open plan failures resulted from not adhering to those guidelines."

Noise problems in the system can be eased with white noise and artificial sound systems for additional masking. Density can be altered as well. Those elements, says Cook, are reasons Herman Miller, the manufacturer, and EPR evaluated design. "We could determine any needs for modification. Characteristics of the open plan permitted those adjustments without added expense."

Pre-design studies essential

Of course, recognizing needs before a design is finalized is even more effective. Cook's pre-design analysis took the form of employee interviews and questionnaires to understand work, function, traffic patterns, and adjacency values. Designers then had a written document as a guideline for layout and specification.

Humanistic needs are other factors determining design. "Workers often fear open plan offices because of their high-tech qualities. We responded with a softness in color and texture," reports Cook. "Rounded edges and shapes in furniture and panels were also effective elements in promoting positive attitudes toward the space."

Softened coloration included plum carpet accented by mauve, burgundy, turquoise, and rose furnishings. Ambient lighting reduced glare on video display terminals with task lighting providing worksurface illumination. A mix of carpet tile and rolled carpet allowed access to floor ducts where necessary. That combination gave a neater appearance to continuous aisle and lobby space where rolled carpet could be used.

EPR's objectives in designing Wells Fargo's open plan environment included: effective space utilization, improved worker communication, supervision and privacy (achieved through supervisors' glass-paneled offices), personal comfort, changeability, high quality of acoustics, tailoring workstations to tasks, and eliminating density.

Morale problems among middle management executives who lost private offices were eased by upgrading workstations with wood grains and larger spaces. Individual work areas boosted feelings among lower level employees.

Judging from worker response to the EPR design effort, the job was successful. One employee says, "I like the idea of having my own 'private' office regardless of grade or position. It is an ego trip and should lead to increased pride in work and quality of performance."



Retail Design Concepts Applied To Open Plan

Worker communication gets support from use of office malls, atriums, and stairwells that foster human interaction

Retail design concepts—as applied in malls and shopping centers—are being specified by space planners for open office environments in an effort to foster communication.

Atriums, stairwells, traffic patterns, and browsing routes that were once used in store design motifs alone are promoting retail-style communication in liberated office settings.

In our day of major facility change, users and designers are giving more than lip service to office communication. They see it as both the key to enhanced productivity and the underlying principle assuring longevity in facility design.

Identify communication units

Several studies about employee interaction have long defended the open plan landscape against surprise attack. And, more are yielding results that may alter the thinking of open-space planners in the future.

One time-tested study linking improved employee productivity to enhanced communication has been applied to corporate environments through the consulting work of Dr. Thomas J. Allen, professor of organizational psychology and management, Alfred P. Sloan School of Management, M.I.T.

Allen, who currently manages the university's Industrial Liaison program in which 200 participating companies receive management assistance on an annual fee basis, has been working in the area of corporate productivity/communication analysis since 1963. His book, Managing the Flow of Technology (M.I.T. Press, 1977) is a noted resource in the field.

His research conclusions have been borne out in actual practice with clients such as Occidental Research, Rockwell International, IBM, Corning Glass Works, Bell Labs, and Exxon.

"Some of our earliest studies," notes Allen, "revealed that the probability of people communicating about a work-related subject dropped rapidly as the distance between their offices increased. By tabulating a proportion of people who communicate with a central authority, we identified communication units around which an office could be more efficiently designed."

Time sampling on randomly chosen days is a key strategy of each of Allen's projects. "We ask each employee about his conversations with other people. The next step is to draw diagrams and group people together by project teams and departments," Allen explains.

Communication units are defined and ways to enhance them are devised for recommendation to project designers and architects.

Influencing traffic patterns

Allen's work since the early '70s has been primarily with research and development (R & D) arms of major companies. "Our research indicated that the best source of information for R & D professionals was technical discussion with a colleague," says Allen. Thus, his mission in all consulting work has been to define the communication structure of R & D divisions and create means to reinforce dialogue and exchange.

Impromptu meetings and face-to-face exchange between R & D professionals have been identified by Allen as the most creative and productive worker interactions, comprising some 80 percent of idea-generation among engineers alone.

"By influencing traffic patterns,"

notes Allen, "the designer can increase the probability of spontaneous exchange." Allen's consulting work with Rogers Corp., Rogers, Conn. exercised this principle recently.

"Their R & D group was located in various parts of an old building," says Allen. "We encouraged them to create a central dining area and auditorium to establish traffic patterns that crossed group lines. In addition, conference rooms were situated so that they were shared by various offices—not separated out."

Open stairwells, bays multiply


Allen observes that, currently, industry attention is being given to vertical separation (between floors) as well as to the traditionally recognized problem of horizontal separation (within a floor) outlined above.

Retail design concepts, as applied in malls and shopping centers, are being explored as possible solutions to floorto-floor separation.

Retail design strategies that encourage employee communication and "browsing" between floors include specifying stairwells for projects.

"Exposed stairwells that are centrally located on a pedestrian mall or shopping center-style atrium, remind people of the existence of other floors," explains Allen. "The stairwell helps to develop a new traffic pattern that encourages informal, creative worker interaction." Elevators, on the other hand, create distance and tend to erode potential for interaction.

A resulting sense of employee community is achieved through office stairwells, malls, and atriums. As applied at Corning Glass Works, Corning, N.J., one of Allen's recent clients, an atrium houses 740 engineers in a three-story obstacle-free environment. A system of



stairs, ramps, and escalators creates maximum visibility that improves vertical movement. In addition, an open plan formula provides informal gathering places to foster sought-after communication among R & D professionals.

"These interaction areas," notes allen, "include 100-sq. ft. bay areas that hold offices for each of six technology centers." Each bay end has lounge seating, writing walls, and coffee service.

The design of these coffee areas was carefully master-minded by Corning which predicted that the areas would be used by two types of employees: those who loaf naturally and those who

would have felt guilty about being perceived as loafers.

A solution was reached by the designers who created elbow-height counters near writing walls for plotting technical diagrams. "This way, "observes Allen, "anyone who used them had to stand and looked busy as a result."

using this strategy include a one million sq. ft. Bell Labs office and the French National Oil Company, Elf Aquitaine. The latter is building a new research laboratory that features a central core offering common facilities off of which labs and subspecialty offices radiate like spokes of a wheel.


Any common area, whether for coffee, or services such as photocopying, qualifies as an interaction center.

"More and more of my clients are receptive to thinking of the R & D facility in a shopping mall manner, almost like a village green," Allen says. His contact with companies involves two groups—R & D people themselves and executive, top-level management.


"Corporate executives could consider me an invader on their turf. But, because of their interest in minimizing problems and avoiding costly mistakes, cooperation is fully offered," Allen concludes.

By relating communication to performance, which in turn are affected by architecture, Allen establishes a valuable causal chain.

Probability of people communicating about a work-related subject increases as distance between their offices decreases, according to studies conducted by Dr. Thomas Allen, Sloan School of Management, M.I.T. (below). Offices can be more efficiently designed around communication units, Allen finds. Illustration (left) shows how work-related subjects can be a priority in open plan settings.




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
