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


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


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Designers rally against sales tax

Dear Editor: On March 4, 1983, I received notification of an impending action in the New York State Legislature to enact a law taxing designers' fees. Senate Bill #3426 and Assembly Bill #4226 were intended to impose a sales tax on any and all fees charged by design and architectural firms at a rate equivalent to the existing State sales tax within New York counties.

The design community mobilized immediately to counteract Governor Cuomo's efforts to raise State revenues. The Institute of Business Designers (IBD) New York Chapter Executive Board requested all members to write to his or her State Senator and Assemblyman protesting the imposition of this tax. The end result of such taxation would be to put New York State interior designers at a disadvantage relative to out-of-state firms. This measure would also serve to raise overall project costs to the client.

IBD was joined by the American Society of Interior Designers (ASID), the American Institute of Architects (AIA), and other industry organizations in lobbying against the bills. Soon after, we heard that the bills would be dropped and, due to State law, could not be reintroduced for one year.

With the pressure removed, everyone breathed more easily, but many questions have been raised. Will the Legislature repeat this attempt next year? Does our lack of licensing leave us defenseless against such an attempt?

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
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Baker, Knapp & Tubbs former prexy Kelley named to head Chicago's MartCenter



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
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Portman announces ADAC grand opening at recent New York reception

Among furniture company executives present were Jory Probber (left), vice president, and Harvey Probber, president, Probber.











Lexington, was awarded \$5,000 in a separate student category.







Minneapolis Market accepted for listing in Nat'l. Register


Minneapolis—International Market Square, a major regional trade center planned in an existing building here, has been accepted for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

September marked the start of a \$20 million renovation of the nine-acre complex which will house the center for design, home, and office furnishings industries. The market will provide more than 400,000 sq. ft. of showroom and office space.

Developer of the building, the former Munsingwear plant, is Market Square Development Company, a joint venture of Trade Market Associates and Omni Venture Ltd. Architect for the project is Winsor-Faricy Architects Inc., St. Paul.

Says principal Richard Faricy, "The building's all-concrete construction and mushroom column support system designed by C.A.P. Turner were major technological breakthroughs and had wide influence on construction techniques."


International Market Square showrooms will be leased to firms specializing in commercial furniture and furnishings, floorcoverings, fabrics,

accessories, lighting, art, and wall-coverings. The mart has currently reached an agreement in principle with North Central Home Furnishings Representatives Association (NCHFRA) through which the organization will endorse leases with its members in buildings three and four commencing in 1986, according to management. Final details of the agreement are currently being completed

According to the Towle Company, Minneapolis, which negotiated the property's sale to the developers, the complex is the single largest, adaptive re-use project undertaken by private developers in the Twin Cities and ranks among the largest in the country.


Abstract designs take Fields awards

66 Every year, a wealth of technology is developed as a result of federally funded research and development programs. The impact of this technology on building design and construction is a known quantity and can be described in terms of energy-savings, product durability, life-cycle cost benefits, and more efficient operation systems. But how does the design industry find out about the work being done and apply it to our profession? My suggestions include: establishing an insider group of designer professionals to track governmentsponsored R&D; organizing an industrial research board of representatives

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
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FULL-SERVICE BRANCH BANKS DESIGNED FOR THE AFFLUENT

Bankers have a sharp eye for affluence. It is, therefore, no coincidence that downtown and suburban full-service branch banks continue to flourish in prosperous areas. Despite the proliferation of automated teller machines in satellite centers and branches, the personal banking needs of the well-to-do continue to be met.

Beyond simple deposit and cash transactions, traditional banking concepts are keyed to privacy in an air of warmth and comfort. Ergo, one does not clip coupons in a hovel or have confidence inspired by an officer seated at a circa 1949 workplace.

The following installations are of the posh variety, designed for select customers who would have it no other way.—The Editors

Posh, elegant interiors are key to Mitsui Manufacturers Bank located in Beverly Center, Los Angeles. Rich burgundy tones warm highsheen metallic and lacquer finishes used throughout. Bank trade, and, therefore design, caters to a design-oriented crowd (the Pacific Design Center is just down the street) as well as patrons of wealthy Cedar Sinai Medical Center. In Chic Beverly Center, L.A., Bank Attracts High-Style Clients

Reflective surface treatments & richly colored lacquers add pizzazz while playing up curved space at Mitsui Manufacturers Bank

Interarc designed the branch bank as a stand-alone installation, adaptable as bank headquarters if ever required. The

bank contains board rooms, executive areas, and full-service operations.


Pie-shape is an asset

Among its assets is an unusual pie-shaped configuration, played up by designers with a curved teller wall and corresponding curved glass gallery on the second floor. Public areas have full-height ceilings; a mezzanine level was built above to house a board room, loan documentation area, credit department, and support facilities. Officers, tellers, collections, new accounts, automatic teller machines, a special express teller window, and safe deposit are located on the ground level.

Vertical aluminum blinds, rich burgundy colorations, tubular light fixtures, lacquered check stands, chrome accents, and carpeting throughout give the installation its sleek quality. □








Canyon Design Opens Bank Space While Adding Southwest Flavor

Tiered stone balconies in desert tones enhance regional image, overcome structural problems, & add interest in Texas bank





olors reminiscent of a desert sunset in a canyon-like interior negate cumbersome structural elements in a large retail banking space. In addition, colors and textures provide Continental National Bank of Ft. Worth customers with an environment that is appropriately reflective of its geographical surroundings.

Designed as a tower set on a 45-degree angle across a 40,000-sq.-ft. site, the building features a narrow, shaft-like atrium that prohibited free circulation throughout the bank's main floor. Limestone and granite interior balconies designed by space planners widen the shaft, while a wall-free, open landscape layout encourages traffic flow across service areas. These tiered balconies also serve to separate the bank from the remainder of the tower structure, while desert rose and plum color treatments visually unify its eight floors.

According to project designer Mel Hamilton, ISD Chicago, creating a stone canyon was a logical design concept as it reflects the region's geography. "Besides overcoming the architectural problems, this concept enabled us to further enhance the bank's strong southwestern identity. As part of the Bank of the Southwest Holding Corp., it figures prominently among financial institutions in the region.

"Unlike most Ft. Worth banks which adhere to a traditional image—orange carpet and Queen Anne chairs—this bank is very forward-thinking. Thus, we could employ treatments that reflect the area's natural environment," he notes.

Ambient light combats CRT user eyestrain

Original design programming included private executive offices along the perimeter of the bank's upper floors. However, randomly located columns prevented such planning as budgets did not provide for demolition. As a solution, designers installed open plan executive workstations at windows and continued this theme for all bank personnel.

As canyons are too vast to offer adequate lighting throughout, bank planners were required to supplement natural light. Even with open landscaping, each 40,000-sq.-ft. floor was too large to capitalize on illumination from windows. Planners selected an ambient lighting system since it does not require rows of obtrusive tracks and can reduce glare from CRTs at teller counters and workstations. The light source also provides a good simulation of natural illumination.

Although Continental National's major thrust is toward corporate accounts, the bank was careful not to sacrifice the

needs of its retail customers. The main banking floor received the most careful design treatment and is comprised of teller counters approximating 100 linear ft., new accounts, money market service centers, personal loan and customer service departments, and safe deposit.


Prominently featured is a round vault door dating back to the Depression which designers rescued from a warehouse and installed for one-third the cost of a contemporary square door. Made of nickel and refurbished with chrome and brass trim, it is of a style that definitively connotes banking space—a priority of planners and bank managements.

To open the shaft that architects created within Continental National's tower, designers built interior balconies to create a canyon effect. Further enhancing this southwestern ambience are pink granite balcony treatments, rose-color granite floors, and carnelian purple granite on teller counters. According to designers, these finishes imitate the colors of a Southwest sunset.

LAKE SHORE NAT'L. REMODELS FOR AUTOMATION, SERVICES

Chicago bank continues to operate & confront industry change during seven-year building program

xpanded use of CRTs to accommodate rapid changes in the banking industry and purchase of another branch by client Lake Shore National, Chicago, were among factors confronted by Perkins & Will designers during a seven-year renovation of existing facilities and construction of a new addition.

Accommodation of state-of-art financial services and technology in ATMs, CRTs, and other forms of automation required updating 55,000 sq. ft. in a four-story structure during occupancy. Further, robust staff and financial growth, capped by purchase of a new branch, meant that a master plan for expansion to new quarters had to be formulated by designers.

The bank retained Perkins & Will Architects, Chicago, to devise a plan that would respond to existing and future operational requirements. The result: a new four-story addition of 41,475 sq. ft. constructed adjacent to existing bank facilities which were remodelled simultaneously.

Explains Lake Shore's chairman of the board and president, William Mitchell, "We are no longer dealing with a 'banking' industry per se, but rather with a wide range of financial services as a result of changes brought about in the field. This has meant that we at Lake Shore National had to re-examine our internal organization to better cope with competitive forces in future."

As evidence of a small part of Lake Shore's operational re-evaluation, the bank's consumer loan department was down-scaled when direct loans were phased out. Concurrently, data processing departments were expanded and CRTs installed in five times the quantity originally planned. "We went from roughly 20 throughout the bank to more than 100," says Mitchell.

Departments move four times

As data processing geared up to new levels in handling the needs of a recently purchased branch and expanded customer services, Perkins & Will interior space plans were revised. Says



Security factors presented challenge

Lynn Schmitt, project interior designer, "We used a phasing approach, knocking down partitions as required and rethinking power management and work organization. All of this was accomplished with the cooperation of workers who were using the space during renovation."

According to Mitchell, the tremendous amount of data processing committed to by the bank meant that a sophisticated plan of department relocation during renovation had to be worked out. "When moved, each teller had to be relocated along with two-to-three pieces of state-of-art automated equipment." While tellers actually moved just once during the project, au-

diting and human resources departments were moved four times. And, for a period, the accounting department was divided among four floors.

Departmental moves were targeted for those areas of bank operations having the least amount of customer interface. The new building addition helped realize that objective. Explains Schmitt, "The new quarters offered us some 'swing space' to move personnel from existing space as required."

While the first floor of the old building was vacated for renovation, provisions were made on the second floor for temporary occupancy—including installation of circuitry and support for mainframe computer tie-ins. When the first floor was completed, some personnel moved back and some were located on the second floor of the new building addition. This permitted planners to complete the escalator core and the area around it.

Used 20-year projection

According to Schmitt, the project was based on a 20-year lifespan. "We planned for personnel expansion, but actually, the effects of automation worked to lower the personnel count to less than it would have been under previous operations. As needed, in the next five years, space can be recaptured for departmental reorganization."

In addition to considering the bank's rate of growth, the 20-year plan examined banking industry growth and the effects of computerization.

Improved departmental adjacencies were part of the plan. Lake Shore's old four-story building housed various departments and services that had become overcrowded and were inadequately planned. Secretaries for officers were inefficiently located and occupied a disproportionate amount of space.

Major problems of vertical circulation and departmental adjacencies were alleviated with the introduction of a central escalator to an expanded second-floor banking area and alteration of vertical core elements, providing direct public access to banking operations. The latter was a response to the need for expanded banking facilities and reorganization of teller services. In addition, it created an esthetic impact through a two-story opening. Core elements were changed to relieve traffic flow problems.

Employees were allocated freestanding workstations wherever possible. This permits maximum flexibility and adaptability to computerized systems.

Security factors addressed

The design project strove to create more efficient security systems for the bank. However, adequate security had to be provided while the project was in progress as well.

Says Schmitt, "In one case, we had to tear out an exit stair to build a new one. Thus, a temporary entry and egress created major security problems."

In addition, in expanding the retail floor to two levels and building the central escalator, designers had to cut into the vault area. As a result, guards were stationed on vault duty during renovation and bank operating hours, as well as at night.

Once in place, certain design elements helped to secure the building more efficiently. A marble screen wall,

for example, helps to define teller areas and provides security for money transfer.

Centralized, streamlined design of teller areas represented an improvement over earlier operations where tellers were located in three small areas divided by public circulation and separate from elevator and stair access to the vault—a security risk.

Improved circulation is evident, too, in check-writing counters. Designed as small, sculptured units in narrow cylinders of stainless steel and topped with tempered glass disks, they are located throughout the main banking floor area adjacent to teller lines for easy access.

Brushed and polished stainless steel are carried throughout interiors to complement gray and black Italian marble used on vertical surfaces and certain floor areas. Irregularly spaced columns were clad in stainless steel and serve as axis points for furnishings.

Neutral gray backgrounds are offset by rust, saffron, and mauve tones as well as warm mahogany and oak. Each floor illustrates an individual application of this color palette.

Beach & Desert Bank Branches Each Appeal To Own Patrons

Swimmer Cole Martinez Curtis design of two Columbia Savings & Loan branches tailored to Calif. customer preferences

wo different bank branch locations—one at the beach and one in the desert— posed a design challenge for Swimmer Cole Martinez Curtis (SCMC), planning and design group, Marina del Rey, Calif. For, while interiors had to reflect separate and distinct surroundings, they also had to be planned to accommodate identical internal banking service elements specified by the client.

The challenge wasn't new to SCMC which has planned 12 branches for Columbia Savings and Loan of Southern California over the past four years. The most recent branches completed, a facility at the Fashion Island shopping center in Newport Beach and one in Palm Desert, use the same internal furnishings components, while appealing through space design and treatment to two separate clienteles.


The Fashion Island branch reflects the sophistication and contemporary taste of its affluent customers. The Palm Desert branch was designed to appeal to the conservative, largely retired citizens of the community.

Inside/outside coordinate

A freestanding building, Palm Desert is compatible with its desert surroundings. The same materials selected by architect Daniel Dworsky & Associates, Los Angeles, for the building exterior are employed in interiors. Included are Bush Hammered concrete for structural walls, redwood for interior ceiling, and pave brick flooring for outside traffic areas and entryway. Redwood ceilings extend to the outside in key areas.

Careful choice of interior finishes was

Mahogany, which gives warmth to outside of triangular-shaped building, is used as a band on inside to delineate face of mezzanine and in teller areas along two sides of triangle configuration at Fashion Island (below).

made by SCMC to provide continuity with the exterior. Figured mahogany was used for the teller line, check-writing stands, and custom desks. Mahogany edges of the teller line and desks are softened with a bullnose edge and have brass reveals. Interiors mirror desert hues and comfort patrons with cool pastel colors. Custom patterned carpet is slate blue with beige accents to pick up concrete colors of walls.

Affluent customers want elegance

Similarly, at the Fashion Island branch, design appeal was specifically aimed at the community. The look combines elegance and contemporary finishes and furnishings. Both interior and exterior use similar materials.

The strong architectural statement imposed by a triangular building and exterior finishes prompted SCMC designers to design interiors that are somewhat understated, yet elegant. Exterior materials include Carnelian granite with a flamed finish used for structural walls. Mahogany gives warmth to the outside of the building and is used as a band on the inside to delineate the face of the mezzanine.


Interior finishes were carefully selected to create a unified design. A very fine Sapele Pomelli mahogany was used for teller line, check-writing stands, cabinetry, and desks. To draw attention away from the angularity of the building, check-writing stands and back of chairs are circular in shape, further softening contours.



Planners devise careful strategies which double bank's size yet keep it operating during total reconstruction

ow does a space planner double a bank's size, demolish its original structure, yet keep it operating throughout all design stages?

In the case of Farmers & Merchants Bank, Foley, Ala., specifiers implemented a phase planning program. The first step was to purchase an adjacent property and partially remodel it. Planners then moved operations into the remodeled facility while the original building was completely reconstructed. So successful was the design program that, according to bank management, the bank's deposits grew by \$15 million while phase planning was under way.

Says project design firm Design/Build Concepts' president Dick Domurat, "Ironically, the public did not seem to notice that the remodeled facility was unfinished until the original structure was rebuilt. Thus, we have to assume that careful planning contributed to the bank's growth throughout this period."

Competition demanded new image

As the only remaining independent bank in a county where holding companies had become the trend, Farmers & Merchants needed a more impressive look to compete in a changing market. Yet, management did not want to lose the intimate, small-town atmosphere that contributed to its profit margin.

Phase planning permitted the bank to gradually overhaul its image without alienating customers. In addition, working space grew from 10,000- to 12,500-sq.-ft. through the use of the remodeled facility while the old bank was being demolished and rebuilt.

After the old bank was gone and a new structure was in its place, all public banking was returned to its original site. Loan function and internal operations areas were created in the remodeled structure. Finishing touches were applied and a 23,000-sq.-ft. integrated banking facility was in operation.

A key factor in selecting space planners for the Farmers & Merchants Bank project was effective reutilization of the existing site. Design/Build Concepts' plan to keep public areas in their original locations, but house them within the new structure (above), led to its selection as project design firm. Planners added warmth to the bank's streamlined, contemporary interior with woods, plants, and skylights (opp. page). Bronze and brass mirror mica treatments on teller counters and planters reflect sunlight and increase brightness within the space.


Woods, daylight add intimacy

Says Domurat, "The bank selected its space planning firm by competition. The big factor in the contest was effective reutilization of the existing property." Clearly, the Design/Build Concepts program achieved that goal by permitting public areas to remain in their original, highly visible location—the prime corner of a city block—for all but five of the months that construction was under way.

The newly designed bank features public areas filled with skylights, plants,

and warm woods as well as bronze and brass mirror mica accents. Earth-tone paver tile floors further accent a streamlined, yet warm, environment.

Currently estimated at 92 million in deposits (before redesign the total was \$40 million), the bank reflects what Domurat calls an "aggressive image that is not cold." Or as Farmers & Merchants president Ken Schultz notes, "We did not lose the intimacy that has always appealed to our customers through the space expansion."
