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

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
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


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EVENTS CLEARING-HOUSE LOCATED

The flood of replies to CONTRACT's August editorial commentary, "Clear The Date, But With Whom?" included announcement of a new service through which design professionals can learn of industry-wide conventions and conferences. Just as we published a plea to establish an events clearing-house for the design profession, FYI Systems, Irvine, Calif.,



let our editors know about its new FYI Events Directory, scheduled for publication next month.

The semi-annual 40-page directory will contain a minimum of 40 event listings per month for a six-month period. Chronological listings, and indices to events-by-type/by-category, and sponsorsby-type are among the publication's features. Deadline for submission of material to the publisher is March 1, '85 for FYI's second edition in July, '85.

A subject of many events listed in FYI's first design directory is CAD/CAM; another popular conference topic is office automation. In addition, interior design competitions are included in such quantity they may eventually form a spin-off directory of their own.

Also during next month, FYI will make available an on-line computerized data base for industry events. This will form the basis for a phone-in service for planners who may want to "clear the date" and for participants who would like to have more control over their travel schedules.

CONTRACT congratulates FYI for pioneering the first comprehensive directory of design-industry and allied professional events and encourages readers to contact FYI Systems, POB 19654, Irvine, CA 92713, for further information.







Dallas-A south Boston site has been chosen for the Dallas Market Center (DMC) Co.'s third trade mart, the Boston Design Center (BDC). Other developments of DMC are the Dallas Decorative Center and the Decorative Center of Houston (DCH).

The 550,000-sq.-ft. BDC is being co-developed by Richard A. Flier Interests of Boston; architectural design and renovation services are being provided by local firm Schwartz/ Silver Architects.

The structure, designated for renovation by its codevelopers, offers showroom space for manufacturers of furnishings, fabrics, and accessories. Already 28 percent leased, it is located at 660 Summer St., a site which is part of the Boston Marine Industrial Park, less than five minutes from downtown Boston and 10 minutes from Logan International Airport.

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
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

Merchandise Mart re-names Boston design mart, chooses site

Boston-The Merchandise Mart Properties Inc. of Chicago has chosen this city's Navy Yard, Building 149, as the site of its newest trade mart, the New England Design Center. The facility was formerly called the Boston Design Center, the name of the Dallas Market Center Company's newest design facility also located in Boston.

Building 149 includes 700,000 sq. ft. of space and is connected to a 1,200-car garage. It will serve as a design

center with both contract and residential furnishings showrooms while also offering office and retail space. The design center portion will be managed by The Mart; the project is being developed under a partnership formed between The Mart and The Congress Group, Boston.

Leasing efforts for the center have already begun, with the commitment of Baker, Knapp & Tubbs, manufacturers of high-end furniture, to 30,000 sq. ft. of space.

Contract projects take \$3,000 purse in Diller contest

Chicago—Two prizes totalling \$3,000 were awarded to planners of contract projects in the second annual Diller Corp. National Laminate Design Competition. Awards were presented to designers incorporating Diller's Homapal metal laminate in innovative projects. Diller Corp. is a subsidiary of Formica.

A \$2,000 prize was presented to Bertram Laudenslager and Arthur L'Esperance, Whitemarsh Interiors, Flourtown, Penn., for their design of a food service center for local executive offices. According to contest judges, Homapel brushed aluminum in a copper color coordinates with copper-colored wallpaper to create an air of contemporary elegance in this project.

Toby Kath, T.K. Design, Rochester, won \$1,000 for her renovation of a local foundry as an office/manufacturing facility. Here, Homapal brass-toned brushed aluminum adds the high-tech look that is appropriate to surroundings, commented judges.



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
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

A three-year professional program was also accredited at the New England School of Art and Design, Boston.

Design industry pricing data now being compiled

Brookline, Mass.—Information on design fees, contracts, and work requirements for more than 40 types of space planning projects will soon be available, thanks to a study being conducted by Professional Services Management Journal (PSMJ) and the A/E Marketing Journal (AEMJ). Called the 1st Annual Design Services Pricing Survey, it is headed by Bill Fanning, an Atlantabased management consultant.

Other information to be incorporated in the survey includes average billing rates and mark-ups on reimbursable items. Comments PSMJ editor Frank Stasiowski, "In today's economy, there is tremendous pressure on design firm profits that is largely attributable to clients demanding more services without fee increases. Currently, design firm management is ill-equipped to deal with this issue as no data base on fee levels is available for reference."

Western design Oriental decor blend in Beijing hotel

Beijing, China-President Reagan's recent state dinner for top Chinese officials was among events which marked the opening of China's first luxury hotel designed for major conferences and business meetings. The 1,007-room hotel was a project of Welton Becket Assoc., New York, architects for the \$75 million American/Chinese joint venture.

Called the Great Wall Hotel, the 21story structure represented an historic step for the People's Republic of China and an unusual challenge for western architects, according to William Scott III, director, Welton Becket Assoc. "Our Chinese partners were intent on creating a western-style facade, while maintaining some traditional Chinese motifs in the interior design," he says. As a result, the firm selected a glass curtain wall exterior, "which is inherently modern, while reflecting the ancient city and landscape surrounding the building," Becket concludes.

Three reflective glass towers which are visible throughout the capital city serve as symbols of contemporary achievements in the People's Republic. Joined like the spokes of a wheel, the wings enclose a six-story glass atrium topped with a rooftop restaurant.

Inside the atrium are a tea garden and

pagoda pavilion overlooking a landscape of waterfalls and reflecting pools. Four glass elevators ascend through the towers from this space.

Chinese decor is also reflected in a four-meter mural of the Great Wall which graces lobby interiors. It is enhanced by rose-colored chromesheathed marble pillars, Oriental rugs, silk wall hangings and Chinese antiques.

Guest amenities include a main dining room, nine restaurants and bars, 15 banquet halls, and a ballroom large enough for 1,200 people. The latter was the site chosen by President Reagan on the occasion of his dinner.

According to Scott, construction of the hotel was particularly challenging due to shortages of necessary raw materials, Thus, many building components had to be imported and redesigned for use here. Other challenges were presented by the need for a reinforced concrete building frame which can withstand the city's frequent tremor activity.

Partners in the \$75 million project were the Beijing branch of China International Travel Service and E-S Pacific Development and Construction Co. The latter is owned by Becket Investment Corp. and Unison Pacific Corp.





In general, specification of a building's automation system is not understood by the architect, much less developed by him. Project mechanical engineers do that job. In this area, architecture/engineering (A/E) firms have a substantial advantage over straight architecture firms. Significantly, it is the A/E firm and not the A firm that leads our profession in both building automation experience and design automation experience. Very few straight architecture firms consistently use CADD. The opportunity recognized by some CADD-experienced A-E firms is one of merging computer-based design products with the clients' computerbased building and office automation systems. This is an uncharacteristic and non-visual, potential architectural innovation. It follows on work already being done by non-architects. ??

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

Color adds product diversity, gives mfr. competitive edge

Increased competition in the | many options in a standard | range." The available specsystems furniture market is prompting manufacturers of these products to seek new ways to sell their wares. As a result, the architecture and design community has recently witnessed numerous changes in the look of open plan systems in the form of more wood finishes, high-style panel fabrics, and innovative uses of colored surfaces.

One firm which has taken a stab at innovative color applications is Modern Mode, a company known for its transitional wood systems furniture. Due to its basically conservative image, Modern Mode lacked a marketing approach that would make its new 3000 Series of open plan furniture stand out in the crowd. The lightly scaled wood system was viewed as having strong sales potential, however, and management turned to color treatments to catch the designer's eve. Now called Tek 3, the system is offered with a choice of 15 finishes which can be applied to storage components, pedestals, or the entire worksurface top. This innovation, coupled with a brightly colored brochure, makes a strong contemporary statement about the firm.

Take second look

Explains vice president, sales, Bill Halsey, "Color has established the contemporary image that makes designers look twice. Plus, it adds the product diversity that permits designers to service an entire corporate office with one furniture line.


"I believe this type of service is demanded by designers today. The ability to offer

Initially, Modern Mode investigated color finishes with an ebonized stain which it offered with its cherry wood system in 1983. Success of this introduction led the firm to expand the treatment to other woods and to research a multi-hued program. According to Halsey, a monolithic treatment which presents a look of solidity and stands up to heavy office use was a key requirement; thus, modification of Tek 3 construction was needed. Finally, a substrate board dense enough to absorb color without excessive filler worksurface, it is usually black

trum-which incorporates neutrals such as black, two gravs, tan, and cream; shaded pastels with rose, peach, teal, and azure casts; and bright vellow, red, and blue-is inclusive without being confusing. Deep, rich green, blue, and burgundy round out color selections.

Says Halsey, "Today when we display the system in a showroom or brochure, specifiers immediately react to the color. However, we find that color is usually selected for a pedestal or overhead cabinet in one of the bright finishes. Where a color is chosen for a



was developed and the firm began fine-tuning its palette.

Colors were selected by Bill Halsey with assistance from graphic design consultant Michael Vanderbile and input from the design community. "Our objective," says Halsey, "was to include as standards highly popular colors, rather than offering a wide custom or dark gray in response to functional considerations."

The pared-down 11/4-in. scale of the Tek 3 Series had always been seen as an advantage by Modern Mode due to its adaptability to radius and mitered edges, among other treatments. Now, with the addition of color, the product is expected to take a giant step

forward in the market.

Notes Halsey, "Designers have a tendency to spend a lot of time thinking about the fabric they will specify because it affords them an opportunity to be creative with color and pattern. Now, the Tek 3 program lets them have fun with workstation design as well."

Indeed, with Tek 3, designers can play around with a wide variety of components and color treatments. Incorporated in the product line are worksurfaces in two heights and three shapes; connecting units in three sizes; backcorner CRT tables in two depths; a range of returns and credenzas; overhead and pedestal storage; and freestanding capsule-shaped conference tables.

Comments Halsey, "Today, the traditional roles of wood and metal systems manufacturers are crossing over. We see metal manufacturers offering wood as a product option, while wood manufacturers turn to color treatments. This trend represents the expansion of the industry and points out the need for diversification by all open plan furniture manufacturers. For, as systems are more widely used on all corporate levels, it is necessary to offer the variety that adds unique qualities to individual workstations. And, as work spaces become smaller, systems furniture will be called on to add interest."

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

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

'See' lighting effects prior to placement with visualization tool

A computer-aided "Lighting Visualization" program from one of the nation's top manufacturers of office furnishings enables designers to see effects of their interior ambient lighting schemes prior to implementation, reducing the need for costly redesign based on inadequate planning.

The availability of this program, offered as a mail-in service by Steelcase Inc., Grand Rapids, Mich., not only underscores the industry's current focus on quality interior lightrelatively simple manner. De- | signers submit a scaled floorplan and analysis request form, detailing types of products specified, fixture placement and position, and in the case of projects not using Steelcase products, photometric reports. Specifiers must also indicate the horizontal height for which they want footcandle measures computed. Finish colors and reflectance values for ceiling, floor, and walls must also be provided as determined from a guide furnished by Steelcase.

ing, but also indicates a move on the part of big-name furniture manufacturers to strengthen their foothold in the lighting industry. Steelcase, along with other top manufacturers such as Herman Miller, Knoll, and Stow/Davis, has been offering various lighting products for task and ambient use for some time. "Lighting Visualization," however, takes Steelcase one step further-from merely providing product to supplying lighting services.

The program operates in a

This data is then fed into a computer which develops a lighting-level analysis based on an unfurnished space. The computer makes all necessary calculations and translates the results into color-coded graphic and textual formats showing footcandle distribution at the specified height. Results are sent to clients approximately five days after receipt of submission

Included in the standard "Lighting Visualization" package are a contour plot on mylar overlay and a tubular report. On the contour plot, the color green may refer to illumination measures of 30 footcandles or more, yellow for 20- to 30-footcandles, and red for 10- to 20-footcandles. With this coding, clients can easily see if an area "measures up to their expectations."

Tabular report included

With the tabular report. specific footcandle measures at individual points contained in the drawing can be determined by simply tracing along vertical and horizontal column guides which resemble those used in road maps.

Clients can also order perspective views of lighting designs from a selection of eight angles. These views show light distribution on ceiling and walls with fixtures in place.

Although "Lighting Visualization" does offer time saving benefits as well as savings in energy and investment, it is important to remember that the program is not offered as an alternative to the services of a lighting designer. It cannot determine footcandles as reguired for a task, and because it assumes an unfurnished space, neither can it make adjustments for reflectance values of furnishings.

"The primary consideration of this program is the amount of illumination at task surfaces and the luminance variation from task to adjacent areas which could incur eve fatigue," says Don Dekker, environmental support services consultant, Steelcase. "The program doesn't address footcandles in that it doesn't say, 'these are the levels needed to perform a specific task."

"We're not trying to make judgements on the adequateness of a plan," he adds. "The program is simply a tool, and, as a tool it says, 'these are the footcandle levels a designer has chosen, and these are the patterns of light that will result in the plan."

In addressing the fact that the program does not take into account reflectance values of furnishings, a matter which lighting designers consider important to lighting design, Dekker does not feel that this detracts from the program.


Colors affect quality

"Although furnishings colors do have an effect on the final lighting quality of a space, in most cases lighter colorswhich have been included in the reflectance guide-are used," says Dekker. "And, these colors do not have as great an effect on work areas as do darker colors."

Dekker also cautions against using "Lighting Visualization" in spaces that exceed 200 ft. in any direction. "When making calculations," he says, "a given number of points are assumed. If you go beyond that number, accuracy is diluted."

The cost of using Steelcase's tool varies with the type and number of graphics desired, but the base cost includes a processing charge of \$3 per luminaire for which analysis is requested (at a minimum of \$100) plus a computer programming charge of \$50 per non-Steelcase luminaire.

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

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
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

Tiles are individually finished and may be filled in with fabric, glass, wood, or vinyl. The array of available colors and finishes permits a variety of visual effects, from soft harmonies to muted contrasts.

Designers may also use the tiles to arrange patterns, insert windows, or alternate visual rhythms by manipulating light, color, and texture. Acoustical privacy can be added and localized by placement of a tile over the noise source. The same location may accept a tile with horizontal frets for mini shelves or other accessories.

Ethospace affords the worker opportunities for social contact. Windows offer a means to define public and private space; partially enclosed offices with windows afford privacy as well as visual access to co-workers. "In the past, people had to decide whether they wanted one kind of office or another," says Stumpf. "If they wanted custom design, they'd have to wait. If they couldn't wait, they couldn't get the one they wanted. If the corporation achieved a unified image, the individual often lost a sense of place.

"The drive to leave a personal mark on one's workspace has always been important," Stumpf adds. "This desire for personal comfort will only gain in importance as people spend more time at the workplace. Ethospace was designed on the principle that people cherish chosens, not givens." **Circle No. 296.**



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

SoHo showroom sets stage for success as Italian furniture manufacturer enters U.S.

Establishing an identity in the American design community is the goal of Fantoni USA—marketing arm for the Italian contract furniture manufacturer. Thus, in setting up New York showroom operations, location and space plan were carefully selected to assure that the firm and its products are appropriately presented.

A 5,000-sq.-ft. former warehouse and printing facility in Manhattan's SoHo district was the site chosen by Fantoni due to SoHo's growing importance in the architectural and design community. New York architect Al Salsano was commissioned to create a stage set for Fantoni's furniture—some of which is part of the permanent collection at the Museum of Modern Art. Immediate space planning needs included concealing exposed pipes and radiator units and refurbishing columns covered with peeling paint. Salsano responded by painting pipes and radiators a neutral gray; columns were refinished in tambour, a feature of Fantoni's DS System.

When complemented by carpeting in the same gray tone, these elements appear to fade away under spotlights which accent the furniture. Says Salsano, "As a result, pockets of space, which permit clients to be absorbed by the furniture rather than by the space design, are created."

Upon entering, visitors are surrounded by stark white drywall framing a black marble floor which instantly communicates a stage-like quality. The contrast of black furniture against the neutral gray and white showroom draws clients through the space, while adding drama to the showroom.

Similar contrasts were used by Salsano to maximize the showroom's visibility and importance in the eyes of passers-by. The showroom is located below street level and has only one window through which furniture can be viewed from the sidewalk.

Framing the window is a bright neon sign which immediately draws attention. Meanwhile, greenery at the window base and on columns which step down into the showroom minimizes the sensation that the visitor is in a subterranean facility.

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




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Metal connector knuckles (right) align and space panels. And a basic connection device, a durable plastic hinge (left) joins panels, regardless of how they're angled or configured.

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


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JEFFERSON COLLECTION IS 16TH ANNUAL PRODUCT DESIGN

Record number of gold medals among fewer total awards signifies quality of entries in the 1984 judging he Jefferson Chair/Table Collection designed by Niels Diffrient for SunarHauserman, was selected Best-of-Competition in the 16th annual Institute of Business Designers/CONTRACT Magazine Product Design Competition. Taking two gold awards, one for Best-of-Show and one for the Innovative Product Solution category, the Jefferson Chair/Table was among a record number of gold awards made by a distinguished group of four jurists.

Gathering for two full days of deliberations at the IBD headquarters, Merchandise Mart, Chicago, the judges awarded several gold, silver, and bronze awards plus five honorable mentions, although the latter category was earlier eliminated from judging this year.

Of the 42 awards, down five from last year, 16 were gold, 12 silver, and nine bronze. Category 13—Upholstery Fabrics—claimed three gold medals, while each of four other categories took two gold awards. Certain categories of the competition received multiple silver and bronze medallions.

Jurists were Eugene Daniels, FIBD, national president, IBD, and president, Counterpoint Inc., Knoxville, Tenn.; Dale Fahnstrom, IDSA, associate professor, product design, and chairman, Institute of Design, Illinois Institute of Technology,

Absence of winners in 10 categories out of 22 is reflective of high standards set by the judges, according to Karen Guenther, competition coordinator for IBD. "We will launch an extensive campaign together with CONTRACT Magazine to welcome competition participants in early 1985 for next year's event," says Guenther.

"There were so many excellent entries in certain categories—especially in fabrics—that this year, judges established sub-categories for medalist recognition in these product lines. That is why multiple awards occurred so often.

"It is to the credit of this very responsible panel of jurists that pains were taken in selecting the winners over a grueling two-day period," Guenther concludes.

OFFICE OUTLOOK: TIGHT BUDGETS, CREATIVE SOLUTIONS

An issue crammed with exciting new furnishings products by extension celebrates beautiful interior space planning. This month, CONTRACT does exactly that, providing some of the latest examples of space design that stimulate minds and emotions. Despite the restraints of budget limitations, designers manage to create interiors that achieve the best of two objectives—productive, efficient space design and esthetic quality. Office installations in this issue strike a happy balance between the two goals that will appeal to readers on many levels.

ECONOMICS GUIDE DESIGN OF BROADCAST STATION HEADQUARTERS

Plumbing shafts form promenade on floor once occupied by hotel

espite a stringent budget which guided design of Channel 13/WNET's Manhattan headquarters, there was no shortage of creativity on the part of local design firm Colbert deSign. The space is a visual delight featuring arched promenades plus a soft apricot and blue/gray palette.


When designer Terry Colbert began work on the 20,000-sq.-ft. facility, a floor of the Henry Hudson Hotel, large plumbing shafts marked the "U"-shaped space. These shafts had once serviced guest rooms but now uselessly flanked corridors at 18-ft. intervals.

Structural and budgetary constraints made it impossible for the public-supported, non-profit institution to remove the shafts, but, according to Colbert, "They were large and hideous, and something had to be done with them. The station had previously attempted to hide shaft walls behind open plan furniture, but this resulted in a forced look and created an awkward traffic pattern."

Cutting costs is major consideration

Colbert's solution integrates the shafts into space design by using them as foundations for arches. Where shafts flank both sides of a corridor, full arches were constructed; half arches were employed in corridors featuring only one wall of shafts. This latter treatment also serves to add variety to the primarily symmetrical, full-arched corridors. As another benefit, the 60-in.-deep shaft wells are used as secretarial work areas, allowing form to combine with function.

Economics were a prime consideration of the design project, and Colbert responded to this in a variety of ways. By leaving hallways free of dropped-ceiling and heavy-duty

light fixtures, he was able to cut costs while easing the tightness of low-ceilinged areas. And, despite the fact that Channel 13 mandated use of its existing furniture—a hodgepodge of styles and colors—Colbert's addition of similar task lamps with translucent apricot shades adds a homogenizing touch throughout the floor. "Illumination from overhead fluorescent lights has been kept at lower-than-normal levels in an attempt to encourage workers to use these lamps," says Colbert.

Perimeter fan coils handle heating and air conditioning needs while a hierarchy of open landscape and short-wall, fixed-partition offices are programmed at critical points to free air movement. In this way, Colbert was able to economize on the number of ceiling-mounted units that would have been needed to extend air to central areas.

Through a variety of lighting techniques, multiple effects are achieved. For example, tungsten uplights illuminate archways while creating subtle shadowing on arches, soffits, shafts, and ceiling beams. Artwork, used to help relieve the monotony of flat walls at corridor ends, is highlighted by track lighting as are some open spaces in corridors. Track lighting is also used to play up the texture of louvered closet doors.

Furthermore, open landscape areas take advantage of natural light pouring in through perimeter windows, while also serving to break up corridor length. Gray carpet tiles help define corridors from work areas which include offices for 87 employees, core facilities, editing rooms, libraries, pantry, conference/screening rooms, computer-oriented training room, and "new-technology" computer laboratory. A dot pattern runs throughout corridors; solid gray is featured in work areas.

OPERATIONS IMPROVED

Order with style achieved in planning

or New York law firm Kelley Drye & Warren, designers LCP Associates, also of New York, created an interiors package that is at once organized and visually striking. Organization is achieved through such means as bi-level circulation paths, vertical communication via stairways, centrally located service core, and modular approach to furnishings and filing.

But it was with an eye to the exterior that designers created visual effects to lend drama to this orderly space plan. Natural light is gathered and distributed throughout the interior through abundant use of glass panel and careful preservation of expanses of exterior glass wall. Panel heights of secretarial stations were designed to permit maximum access to light. Visual variety is achieved as well by alternation of enclosed spaces with open areas.

The firm of 170 lawyers occupies 120,000 sq. ft. on five floors at 101 Park Avenue. Says senior designer Julie Lindh, "The client sought an elegant, prestigious look. In addition, a prime requirement was space organization. Clean lines were mandated."

Designers began to articulate the plan by locating partner and associate offices along the perimeter. Standard locations were established for conference rooms at the northwest and southeast corners of the building. In these spaces can also be found two secretarial stations and stairwell.

Additional secretarial stations, paralegals, and various support functions (including

lawyers' 120,000-sq.-ft. HQ

library, central file, mailroom, copying machines etc.) are located in bands of space between the core and perimeter offices. Circulation is divided into two levels. The first level surrounds the core; the second exists between perimeter offices and the service band. The latter path is primarily for clients, being less traveled and quieter.

A modular approach to furnishings and storage systems helps achieve the clean-line image desired by the client. A custom lacquer storage wall, for example, was designed by LCP on a module that reflects the building perimeter module. Secretarial areas in East-West, long-run-of floor locations enjoy a 75-ft. length of storage wall which is 7-ft. high and broken up with private office doors. The wall offers 2-ft.-deep storage cabinetry.


Private offices located on the opposite side of this wall have their own 4- by 9-ft. section storage walls. Modules can be joined by eliminating sheet rock walls to create a partner's office from two associates' offices.

"This flexibility was not necessarily a requirement, but we were told to build it in anyway," notes Diane Zabiela, vice president, LCP.

In an associate's office, a wall module consists of a door and a vertical file, or a counter with two shelves above. In a partner's office, a module contains door, coat closet, or files with two shelves above. On top of the storage wall a light tray illuminates both perimeter offices and adjacent corridor. (Continued)

Reception areas, located on floors 29 (main reception) and 32, are open and airy spaces to which interest is added by angular wall treatments. This is especially apparent on the 29th floor where a 40-person conference room (which can be subdivided) has a wraparound reception area nearby.

Other conference areas are located in "corners" of each floor created by the building's wedged shape. These catty-corner conference areas seat eight and are a neat solution to an otherwise awkward space problem.

Color schemes chosen emphasize gray with brick, salmon, and wine-colored accents. General, public areas are of two neutral grays accented by brick-colored fabric. Secretarial chairs are done in the same color. Partners were given a choice of three palettes of burgundy, blue, or brick accents.

The core, partitions, and cabinetry are of medium gray; spaces on the perimeter are a lighter gray, including partitions, lacquer panel storage wall, secretarial stations, and carpeting. Thus, when looking out from a partner's or an associate's office to the secretarial area, a slightly different, darker value of gray used there tends to offset private office color subtly.

Chrome was the main metal employed, while mahogany was the dominant wood. Stairways are of granite with glass panel rails topped by chrome. □



BUILDING BLOCKS HELP MAKE CHEMICAL BANK WORK

Universal approaches enable facility to cope with change

Janning to accommodate change anticipated over the duration of the client's lease prompted Gensler & Associates, N.Y., to take a building-block approach to interiors for Chemical Bank, located on Madison Ave.

Intensive work with the Real Estate and Construction Services departments of Chemical Bank's Real Estate Division yielded a forward plan that also drew on needs of the bank's Information Services division. A key consideration was markedly increasing use of computers by the facility's support services staff.

Five of six floors, totalling 200,000 sq. ft., have been completed for the bank. Legal, finance, and human resources departments, among other bank services, are located on floors nine through 13 of the building; floor 14 is scheduled for completion early next year.

"The banking industry is changing so rapidly," notes Ken Van der Kolk, AIA, of Gensler, "we had to build in flexibility for the extent of the lease." Working closely with the client proved to be a plus. Notes Van der Kolk, "We were fortunate to be able to work with staff who were extremely knowledgeable about the needs of the bank as well as the needs of the facility." Chemical Bank manages over three million sq. ft. in the New York City area.

Space planning organized along a modular concept permitted designers to apply similar approaches floor-to-floor. Support services are located in common areas in the building core (at the apex of the building's L-shape). Private offices ring the perimeter. In addition, conference rooms are designated centrally located positions on each floor. The latter were designed for versatility and accommodate various meeting formats.


By taking a universal approach, designers worked to limit workstation modules to four different types and private offices to three kinds. Notes Gensler's Dina Frank, "We

started out with a workstation module and worked our way up to offices and floors, while applying the modular approach all the way."

In this manner, "neighborhoods" were formed, dictated by the number of private interior offices required in relation to open plan. Private spaces were most frequently allocated to the Legal and Employee Relations departments. Open plan use was determined more by function rather than by worker status.

Computer equipment centers were located on every third floor, in the center of a "sandwich" of other bank service floors. Wiring for these centers was an intensive area of work in the project.

Interior treatments worth noting are use of custom-designed frosted glass wall panels, used abundantly in private offices and conference rooms. The latter afford a degree of privacy for workers. The motif of etched glass was created by sandblasting under the designers' direction.

Lighting treatments include use of sconces in elevator lobbies and corridors. Since the building had low floor-to-ceiling height, thus eliminating the possibility of using recessed fixtures, sconces were employed as an easy solution.

Finishes used featured polyester lacquer applied throughout the facility on doors to conference rooms. And in elevator lobbies, high-gloss plastic laminate wallcovering was used for durability as well as esthetics.

Portals were added to corridors to break up the space in a foreshortening technique. Adding another design element to corridors was a solid-color carpet tile into which designers cut solid accent tiles to direct circulation.

Color schemes include two neutrals—either beige or gray—and accent colors of blue, green, and salmon.

NEO-CLASSICAL DESIGN IS INFUSED WITH FUN

The Depository Trust Co. HQ by Soo Kim Associates, N.Y., was created on tight budget, but provides 'up' image

> eo-classical interior architectural detailing mixed with contemporary furnishings provides a strong design theme for The Depository Trust Co.'s new headquarters.

The design theme encompasses the full expanse of the site, and was achieved at a relatively low construction cost.

Occupying more than 200,000 sq. ft. of floor space, the headquarters building in New York City has six floors. Four are already occupied; one is under construction; and another is being reserved for future use.

Created by Soo Kim Associates, New York City, the design centers on an enhanced multi-floor communications scheme. Thus, sculptural stairs from floor-to-floor invite human interaction.

Shadows create contrast

Stepped-up ceilings and banded pilasters are used throughout the new building to provide depth and dimension. They act as major focal points in the fundamental design theme.

The volumetric design is supported by cove and down lights which define and accentuate various dimensions in each area.

Shadows are cast to lend contrast and create a particularly three-dimensional look, according to Bruce Schrimmer, associate architect in charge, Soo Kim Associates. Cove, wall washers, and fluorescent fixtures yield diffused ambient light.

"Use of the same design elements, carried through to the elevator lobby and floors above, unifies the site as a whole. But having different color schemes for each floor renders each level unique," Schrimmer says.





Creates strong image for client

"We developed five different accent color schemes—one for each active floor," Schrimmer states. Accents used are: rose, aquamarine, blue, and smoke in combination with stucco beige.

Carpet tiles are employed in most floor areas, including elevator lobbies. The design team used them to define circulation from department to department and within departments, as well.

Delivers right feeling at low cost

"The beauty of this installation," adds Schrimmer, "is that we were able to create a strong image for the client without being flashy."

Planters and artwork are strategically placed throughout each floor. "In addition, we were able to pool all used furniture and relocate it throughout, so that used furniture is never combined with new," Schrimmer reports.

"Filing cabinets, which define some of the corridors, stand from 3-ft., 6-in. to 5-ft., 5-in. high," he adds.

Schrimmer points out that details of the staircases—specifically, the bent rails mirror the design of sofas and a reception desk, which doubles as a security post. Custom-designed, the reception desk has a Neo-Classical look, a style which was also introduced at a messenger window and in elevator lobbies.

Immediately adjacent to the reception area are the boardroom and corridor leading to the offices of the chairman of the board and the president.

"The overall Neo-Classical theme enabled us to deliver exactly the feeling for the space desired by the client, while staying within budget and having a little fun with the design," Schrimmer concludes. \Box
