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
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
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# **EDITORIAL**

## **Are Designers Losers in Cyberspace?**

Has real-time, three-dimensional, touchy-feely space lost its meaning in cyberspace? Are architecture and interior design obsolete? Should we all just hand in our AIA, ASID and IIDA membership cards and go home? Two recent, unrelated observations point to the possibility that space—not virtual reality—still matters profoundly as the 21st century approaches.

Consider an analysis of the impact of the Internet on America's urban centers that the Taub Urban Research Center at New York University released this September as

Leaders and Losers on the Internet. In focusing on identifying the location of "host" computers directly connected to the Internet, the NYU study asserted that access to the Internet and technical ability to realize the potential of computer technology could be among the key factors to economic development in the future. So where are these host computers situated? Interestingly enough, they're concentrated in five regions: Silicon Valley, Boston-Cambridge, Mass., Los Angeles, Manhattan and Fairfax County, Va.

Will telecommunications deregulation accelerate the gathering of skilled people, investment and innovation in these and other areas? Can the combination of these potent ingredients spawn similar high-tech clusters elsewhere? Does the existence of these clusters mean anything beyond

the possibility that intelligent people like to work and live in physical proximity?

Maybe, maybe not. David Gelernter, a computer scientist at Yale University, told *The New York Times* that, "Culturally, the Internet is trivial. This may change, but I'm not sure that having a lot of Internet connections is any great economic or cultural advantage." Meanwhile, architects and interior designers would be wise to keep conducting site location studies even for clients who are gaga over the Internet.

Another fascinating affirmation of the value of physical space appeared as "Can We Still Afford to Be a Nation of Immigrants?" in the November 1996 issue of *The Atlantic* 

Monthly. David M. Kennedy, Donald J. McLachlan professor of history at Stanford University, pointed out that the movement of some 20 million people or more from Mexico, the Philippines, China, Taiwan, Vietnam, Korea, India, the Dominican Republic and other Latin American and Asian nations to America over the past 30 years occurred for precisely the same reasons as waves of Europeans did a century ago: a population explosion exacerbated by rapid industrialization. Paradoxically, for all our concern about corporate America exporting jobs overseas, many of our


newest immigrants are leaving countries often credited with taking those jobs.

In the convoluted age of the "virtual corporation." the economic and social consequences of immigration can be interpreted as either beneficial or harmful for Americans. Similarly, the presence of foreign businesses in the United States and American businesses abroad can be arguably good and bad. Regardless of the final judgment, the arrival of the latest immigrants declares that physical space is consequential even when Nike shoes are made in China and Honda ships Accords from the United States to Japan.

What are architects and interior designers to make of this? Clearly, they face a formidable challenge in trying to create satisfying spatial environments for the '90s—ones that simultaneously reassure

us that the world we are leaving has not entirely slipped away—and educate us that the world we are entering is not entirely alien. Does this sound familiar? It's the same problem faced by the pioneers of Modern design in the last fin de siècle. Once again, the process of design is at stake no less than the product.

Are we prepared to work with clients as partners, to see our role as maintaining physical space as well as designing it, to exploit modern technology and to accept change as perhaps the only constant in design? Like immigrants, we shall only know when we reach the shore. How reassuring it is to know the shore will probably be physical as well as metaphysical.

## 90 Years Young

New York - Much has changed in the 90 years since A. Stewart Walker and Leon Gillette founded their architecture firm. As the successor firm to Walker & Gillette, Swanke Hayden Connell Architects (SHCA) recently celebrated its 90th birthday in the Puck Building Ballroom in New York City. The firm's celebration includes an exhibit of work from its inception, including projects like the Coe estate in Oyster Bay, Long Island, the Fuller Building in New York City and Rye Playland, all of which have achieved landmark status. It also includes more recent work such as Trump Tower, the Mutual of America Insurance building on Park Avenue, Winchester House, London, IsBank in Turkey and Edificio Central in Caracas, Venezuela.


"In its long history SHCA has seen two World Wars, numerous smaller conflagrations, and has been an observer of numerous architectural periods from Art Deco, as well as its revival, Modernist, Post Modernist and numerous revivals...both worthy and unworthy," says Richard S. Hayden, FAIA, RIBA, managing principal of the firm. As the firm enters the next millennium it has expanded its horizon to include offices in London. Turkey and Caracas and international work throughout the world, while continuing relations with clients that have been with the firm almost since its inception.

## World's First Hyper Building

Mayer, Ariz. - Paolo Soleri, Rem Koolhaas and Nobuaki Furuya presented their designs for a 1,000 meter tall, mixed-use building to the Hyper Building Research Committee in Tokyo. Soleri's designs are on display in the Visitor's Center at his project in Central Arizona, Arcosanti.

The Japanese government formed the Hyper Building Research Committee in 1994 as a joint research organization composed of 93 corporations with the support and cooperation of the Japanese Ministry of Construction. The committee is charged with adopting policies which will make possible the construction of a "Hyper Building," a 1,000 meter high building with a projected lifetime of 1,000 years. The committee commissioned Soleri, Koolhaas and Furuya to develop designs, concepts and ideas that will eventually make possible the construction of such a building. These "Conceptual Image Plans" were unveiled at a symposium in Tokyo.

The core of the project, the Hyper Building itself, consists of a one kilometer high tower and two exedrae, semi-circular edifices, which occupy one square kilometer. A variety of alternative energy production means are incorporated into the design, including 78,000,000-sq. meters of photovoltaic cells, windmills and 5,000 Genset hydrogen conversion units, solar powered generators, which will produce enough electricity to meet the bulk of all residential needs in the building.



The proposed "Hyper Building" will have a projected lifetime of 1,000 years.

# Architectural Hardware

God may or may not be in the details as Mies van der Rohe once proclaimed, but such details as architectural hardware do matter to architects and interior designers. 

# It's Not a Breeze

Loewenstein's Sail chair really stacks up against the competition—and looks good doing it

Loewenstein's new Sail stackable seating offers specifiers and end users all the most popular features required of stacking chairs, including arm and armless versions (middle), tablet arm and book rack options (top) and high-density stacking capabilities (bottom).

n these days of the teambased, employee-empowered work place, the American work force is constantly rushing off to meetings or training sessions, prompting the most basic yet important of questions: "Where will they sit?" The expanded opportunity to accommodate these people has not been lost on commercial furniture manufacturers, many of whom have recently stepped up their product offerings in what is considered one of the highest volume segments of the contract market: stackable seating. Now Loewenstein, the Florida-based

manufacturer of a broad line of seating for commercial applications, has thrown its hat in the ring with its newest introduction, the Sail chair.

Surprisingly, Loewenstein never had a dedicated seating product to go head to head with the stackable competition until its Breeze chair came on the market last year. "Before we introduced Breeze, Loewenstein never had a true, multi-purpose, higher-density stacking collection," admits Leonard Backer, vice president of marketing, "When we realized that this was an expanding market, we wanted to get our percentage of the sales." The Breeze line. which includes bar and counter stool models in addition to the stacking chair. was Loewenstein's first serious foray into the arena.

Sail, the newest member of the Loewenstein stackable seating family, is designed so it can either complement Breeze within a single installation or stand independently. Both are offered in the same 11 seat and back color combinations and 15 frame finish options, but the subtle differences between the two help Loewenstein cover a broader range of applications. While Breeze is available only with arms and can be upholstered. Sail has both arm and armless versions in smaller dimensions without an upholstery option.

Functional features including tablet arm and book rack options, a permanent ganging device, a four-legged base that makes it easier to clean beneath the chair, durable yet light-

weight tubular steel construction. a one-piece, polypropylene seat/ back shell that flexes for added comfort, the ability to stack 18 high on a cart or 10 high on the floor, give Sail the characteristics most popular with corporate as well as educational, health care and other insti-

tutional users of high-den-



sity, stackable seating, and extends its uses into the hospitality and retail markets as well.

Though none of these features are considered revolutionary for stacking chairs, what truly sets Sail apart from the field, according to Backer, is its aesthetic. For this, Loewenstein turned to Italian chair designer Carlo Bartoli, who designed Sail in collaboration with Loewenstein's northern Italian metal factory, where the chair is manufactured. The 30-yearold Loewenstein has long favored northern Italian designers for its products because of their legendary ability to create what Backer calls "contemporary, cleanly designed chairs" whose details and design elements are difficult if not impossible to knock off.



"The chair has a very updated aesthetic," says Backer. "And it has a very attractive price point, which is a considerable advantage for such a highly stylized look." Described as having an "hourglass figure," Sail's elegantly sculpted, onepiece seat and back shell offers an alternative look to graceful. sweeping curves of Breeze with its integral steel frame and independent seat and back.

The companions are aptly named, too, since breezes and sails seem to go together. But don't be fooled into thinking that the latter somehow depends on the former. Sail is quite well equipped to reach any interior destination under its own power.



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

# Standing Room Only

Imagine yourself on anti-fatigue flooring, where people stand for long periods of time, and you'll want LonFoam from Lonseal, Inc.

ith the problems of carpal tunnel syndrome and other work-related disorders becoming a major concern for the design industry, is it any wonder that a company has developed a new anti-fatigue flooring which makes standing less stressful on the body? LonFoam, from Lonseal, Inc., can go anywhere people must stand for extended periods of time in facilities as dissimilar as beauty parlors, surgical units, pharmacies, corporate mail rooms, nurses stations, assembly lines and behind the counter areas in banks, retail stores and hotels. The flooring is formulated with a four-ply structure that features a thick, independent cell-foam layer for resiliency and cushioning. Not only does LonFoam's polyvinyl chloride wear layer exceed all Americans with Disabilities Act standards for slip-resistance on a level surface, it is quieter than other popular flooring surfaces.

"What's most unique to Lon-Foam is the independent closed cellular inner layer, which is critical to the anti-fatigue property," says Sean P. McGuire, eastern region sales manager and product manager for Lonseal. "It's literally a pleasure to stand on compared to other hard surfaces, such as high density vinyls and laminates." The closed cell feature ensures immunity from moisture penetration and bacterial growth, as well as offering sound absorption and heat insulation properties. As LonFoam is specifically engineered to reduce fatigue, it is ideally suited for any application that involves the user in long-term standing.

One of the more surprising applications is the test kitchen. "I didn't realize what a large market test kitchens are," says McGuire, noting that Family Circle magazine, Kraft Foods and lifestyle author and TV personality Martha Stewart have all been evaluating LonFoam for test kitchens where their employees stand all day. "Worker productivity can literally increase tenfold when their feet and legs are not bothering them," says McGuire.

LonFoam's smooth surface is produced through a calendered layered method. In this sandwich-like structure, the top. .032-in.-thick wear surface has a high vinyl content that provides superior wear, durability and stain resistance. Multi-colored flecks are embedded to create a non-directional design, the middle cushioned inner layer is 0.82in. thick and the bottom layer is a polyfiber backing that adds for superior adhesion and dimensional stability. The foam inner layer is blended and calendered onto a polyfiber backing which goes through an oven for expansion, and is then re-calendered and the additional layers are applied. The final thickness amounts to .120 in., and finished rolls are trimmed at 6-ft, x 60-in.

The completed product is bonded to the floor with a latex-based adhesive. All seams are heat welded, giving added insurance against any type of bacteria, growth or moisture penetration. Gement, 1/4-in. minimum APA approved plywood underlayment and even non-embossed existing resilient floors are suitable substrate materials for good bonding. McGuire explains that daily maintenance is simple, requiring a damp mopping or sweeping.

How has LonFoam managed a quick turn around of five months from initial concept to final

development? Honoring strict limits on a utilitarian color line has certainly helped. The company devotes a great deal of resources to research and development, and the new LonFoam pattern represents an evolution from the LonCoin Flecks series it introduced last year. As a chair holder in the Color Marketing Group (CMG), McGuire created a palette of some 20 colors for LonFoam, drawing on instinct and color forecasts from CMG workshops as a guide. From these initial lab samples, Lonseal sought comments from major commercial design firms.

"The key to successful market research with these designers is not necessarily what colors and patterns they like best, but which of these would they actually specify and for what purpose," says McGuire. "You'd be surprised how often the response varies between these two questions." Lon-Foam is very liberal about custom work, making any color that a customer wants beyond its color line of Starlight Blue, Cappuccino Beige, Skyscraper Grey, Window Pane Grey and City Lights Black for only an 800-sq. yard minimum with no up-charge.

Probably the most common question McGuire is hearing from specifiers in response to Lon-Foam is why the product was not available sooner. What's in store for Lonseal for 1997? Quite a lot, according to McGuire, including at least 12 new products that are currently in development. Of course, even if specifiers had to wait more than a year, they'd have LonFoam to make the time pass a lot more comfortably underfoot.

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
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
# **Book Before You Leap**

With financial institutions restricting hotel development, occupancy rates keep risingalong with profits and hopes for new construction

ravelers so unfortunate as to try to book hotel rooms in the middle of the week may find little if any vacancy in such cities as Miami, Philadelphia, Phoenix, Dallas, Denver or Orlando-and scarcely better prospects in New York, Atlanta, San Diego or San Francisco. It's no wonder that hotel owners have been making more money each year since 1993. They've earned it-by cutting staff and other overhead costs, renegotiating management contracts to give operators incentives to raise profitablity and eliminating money-losing activities such as food and beverage service. They've also taken advantage of the surge in business and leisure travel that has allowed the relatively static number of rooms to fill up and the attending room rates to rise accordingly. Since the Gulf War and the recession of 1990-1991, U.S. hotel occupancy has increased from 61% of total inventory in 1991 to an estimated 66% in 1996, pushing up average daily room rates by a healthy 20%, according to Smith Travel Research and Coopers & Lybrand.

Hoteliers didn't arrive at this state of bliss without paying dearly in the preceding years, as architects and interior designers serving the hospitality sector know all too well. Gains in hotel values of 24% over a five-year period and 39% over a 10-year period have been made possible only by heavy write-downs of market capitalization in everything from budget, economy and limited service segments to full service and luxury operations. Vulture fund investors and other real estate opportunists so voraciously attacked failing properties in the late '80s and early '90s that when the wheeling and dealing were over, control of many of the nation's hotels was concentrated in relatively few hands. Namely, those of large, well capitalized hotel companies, real estate investment trusts (REITs), pension funds and investment funds.

If the passing of the small, private investor groups who bid up hotels in the real estate boom of the '80s is a signal for more rational and therefore less frequent or dramatic transactions, architects and interior



designers should find the change welcome, nevertheless. Not only may hotels benefit from the deep pockets and long-term mentality of today's publicly traded companies and financial institutions, they are more responsive to day-by-day operating results and other market fundamentals. Which is to say that new hotels will be built only when and where hotel markets are actually ready to absorb them. In the opinion of Emerging Trends in Real Estate: 1997, Adapting to the 21st Century, a report just issued by Equitable Real Estate Investment Management, Inc. and Real Estate Research Corporation. new full service hotels are not likely to break ground until 1998, even as a modest amount of new construction goes on in lower-priced segments of the industry.

For now, a vigorous hotel boom overseas and modest full-service hotel remodeling, Sunbelt country club construction and seemScala's restaurant (above), designed by Backen Arrigoni & Ross, is one reason for the powerful revival of the Sir Francis Drake Hotel off San Francisco's Union Square. ingly inexhaustible casino hotel development at home are keeping designers busy. Whatever happens in the coming years, the hospitality industry is focused on giving business people and leisure travelers exactly what they want, no more or less. As the following hotel projects in the United States and Japan illustrate, guests can still expect a pleasurable stay in the 1990s—once they manage to book their rooms.



# Fishing for Ayu

Residents of Gifu, Japan are captivated by the Renaissance Hotel, designed by Hirsch/Bedner to welcome visitors to a town where fishing is strictly for the birds

Floating down the Nagaragawa: The lobby of the Renaissance Hotel evokes the tranquil mood that Japanese tourists seek in Gifu from May to October, when fishermen and trained cormorants set out in bonfire-lighted boats at night to catch ayu. The hotel is patronized by business and vacation guests who appreciate such details as the boat-shaped chandeliers, indoor pools, sculpted cormorants and contemporary furnishings, which lend a touch of class to life in this small town outside of Nagoya, Japan's third largest city.



ention the town of Gifu to Japanese young and old and eyes glaze as they conjure 200 years of fishermen using trained cormorants to catch flavorful fish called avu on the Nagaragawa River from May to October. To make the scene more romantic, remind them that ukai or cormorant fishing takes place in Gifu at night by the light of small fires in iron baskets suspended from the fishing boats, and that the fisherman are only too happy to grill the catch right in the boats (avu is also served raw as sashimi) for the pleasure of their guests, who amply fortify themselves beforehand with sake. By the time you point out that Gifu is only 20 minutes by train from Nagoya, Japan's third largest city, they may already be en route to accommodations in the new Renaissance Hotel, designed by Nikken Sekkei and Hirsch/Bedner Associates.

Like the water of the Nagaragawa, the pace of life flows gently in Gifu, which can be viewed as a center of garment, parasol and lantern manufacturing and a bedroom community for Nagoya once the tourists go home at summer's end. This doesn't prevent the top hoteliers in town, Nagoya-based Meitetsu and Osaka-based Kintetsu, both divisions of transportation, retail and hospitality giants bearing the same names, from competing

vigorously for business and vacation customers. However, the hoteliers took a different and decidedly more cooperative approach in creating the new hotel, which is situated at a strategic point on the Nagaragawa downstream from their respective hotels in the center of Gifu.

How do you head off potential rivals at this strategic location with a single hotel that does no injury to either party? Negotiating market share is a time-honored if not always commonplace Japanese custom. Accordingly, Meitetsu and Kintetsu formed a joint-venture to develop the property, commissioned Tokyo- and Osaka-based Nikken Sekkei to be their architect and Santa Monica, Calif.-based Hirsch/Bedner to be their interior designer, and invited Hong Kong-based Renaissance Hotels to act as their operator. Equity would be shared by the two Japanese hoteliers, with Renaissance acting solely as an outside manager.

A program was drawn up by the project team based on the potential for three revenue-generating operations, namely some 200 guest rooms accommodating business and vacation guests, food and beverage services in a variety of venues catering to both visiting and local diners, and wedding facilities serving the needs of local families, who have succumbed much as their counterparts elsewhere in Japan to increasingly elaborate celebrations. The goal set for the design was to flatter local sensibilities with basic facilities exhibiting just the right degree of flair. "Gifu is not a sophisticated metropolis," notes David Weisberg, a director of Hirsch/Bedner, "but we knew its residents would appreciate any touches of big-city glamor that we could incorporate."

Hirsch/Bedner has given customers numerous occasions to discover the hotel's charms within the bounds of its modest ambition and budget. Overnight guests, for example, would quickly discover that the double twin and king-sized bedrooms are more generous in proportion than is the norm in Japan. There would be a variety of experiences to enjoy food and beverage in the hotel's elegant, 70-seat tea lounge, jewel-like, 34-seat Chinese restaurant—hotel restaurants are accorded much prestige in Japan-an upscale, modern Italian-style, 90-seat coffee shop and a cool, minimal, 78-seat sky bar and entertainment lounge on the top floor. (Weisberg describes the karaoke bar, which enjoys uninterrupted views through a ribbon of glass of the river, the town and venerable Gifu Castle, a seven-century-old structure atop Kinkazan or Golden Flower Mountain, as

being "smart without the intimidation.") As for the banquet rooms, which were a collaborative effort between Hirsch/Bedner and the interior design department of Nikken Sekkei, their flexibility of size and ease of use would let families readily tailor the hotel's space to their personal needs.

Managing the project team called for artistry of another kind. Although Meitetsu, Kintetsu, Renaissance and Hirsch/Bedner nominally shared control of the development process, the overall direction was clearly in the hands of the equity partners, who felt obliged to counter each other's proposals

by the spirit—if not always the letter—of the specifications drafted by Hirsch/Bedner. As a result, the public areas furnished by Meitetsu and the guest rooms fitted out by Kintetsu come very close to mirroring the interior design firm's vision for the facility.

Has the Renaissance Hotel become part of the centuries old ways of Gifu? "Occupancy could be higher after the summer festival season," Weisberg concedes. "Visitors prefer to stay downtown in the winter months, as we all anticipated." On the other hand, there has been an outpouring of public approval for the interior design. "People praise the finishes, something magical really happens for the people of Gifu when they hear the usual *konnichiwa* (hello) spoken by the Aussies at the Renaissance Hotel.

with contradictory alternatives as a means of staking out bargaining positions. Renaissance, the official employer of Mr. Nakashima, the hotel's general manager, only ventured opinions when asked.

Despite the inevitable tensions, Weisberg happily points out, "All of us were surprised at how good the results were." He indicates that the department store arms of the two partners took considerable care in purchasing

workmanship and ambiance," he reports. "They love the weddings, and their patronage of the food and beverage services has been really great."


Even one of the more far-fetched notions to staff the bar with young blonde cocktail waitresses from Australia has succeeded. "The GM (general manager) insisted the bar would be a big hit with them," Weisberg explains, "and so it is." Who knows? Maybe

# **Almost Lost Treasures**

The renovation of the Sir Francis Drake Hotel-with an accenting restaurant by Backen Arrigoni & Rossreunites San Francisco with a richly ornamented and memory-laden world hidden for decades

he Sir Francis Drake Hotel in San Francisco seeps of history from a far away past as well as from modern times. During World War II, its rooms were occupied by U.S. military personnel. Its Starlight Room, sentimentally compared to New York's Rainbow Room, became the scene of many tearful farewells from family members sad to see the men go, and was also the place for their reunions. Named after the English explorer who narrowly missed discovering San Francisco Bay in 1579, the building was originally designed by the now defunct architecture firm of Weeks & Day in 1928 with a European Renaissance flare, highlighted by a grand marble staircase and gold-leafed ceilings. Much of this splendor was gradually covered up as the Drake went through many owners and managers until the late 1980s, when the hotel experienced such financial trouble it was foreclosed by Bank of America. The Kimpton Hotel & Restaurant Group, which acquired the hotel in 1994, saw to it that this little piece of history wasn't going to be shut away in the textbooks. With the help of interior designer Michael Moore and Backen Arrigoni & Ross, which designed the accompanying but independently run Scala's restaurant, the Drake's grandeur has been brought up to 1990s standards.

"We weren't just interested in increasing occupancy," says Tom Pucci, director of marketing for the Drake. "In our business, it's about the increase in revenue. Anyone can bring in more people by lowering the rates. But the objective is to increase the rates and at the same time increase occupancy."


Indeed, the Drake's occupancy not only has increased by 12% but revenue has leaped a dramatic 25%. "Part of the idea behind the renovation was to increase the value of the rooms in order to command a higher rate," Pucci adds. With current rates from \$149 to \$229 as opposed to previous rates between \$119 and \$179, this hotel, which serves primarily business customers, with leisure travelers representing 35-40% of the guest population, has surely succeeded in satisfying its financial goals and target customers.

Renovation has had other benefits, to be sure. Not only can the Drake command higher rates, it also attracts a more substantial clientele both in terms of domestic and international tourists and business people and conventioneers. In fact, the Drake is hosting a group from Nike at the time of this writing, and will soon see the likes of Levi Strauss and The Gap.

Clearly, the foundation of Kimpton's strategy to rescue the Drake has been its location at the corner of Powell Street and Sutter Street in downtown San Francisco—a valued asset to tourists and business travelers alike. Situated just off Union Square as the Drake is, surrounded by stores such as Gucci and Tiffany, and fortunate to have the famous cable car stopping right in front of its doors, it's no wonder the new owner wanted to resuscitate it.

Time was of the essense, however. Bringing the Drake back to its lucrative life had to happen in a matter of months after Kimpton took possession. The 417 guest rooms were refurbished quickly but effectively by Michael Moore with a simple paint job, new carpeting, new bedspreads and new curtains—and a general spiffying up of the rooms to make them deserving enough of











higher prices. Included in the upscaling were some 5,000 sq. ft. of banquet and meeting room space.

But the real story of the Drake's rebirth can be found in the other attractions upstairs and downstairs, one being right on its rooftop: the Starlight Room, now named Harry Denton's Starlight Room. The change has been dramatic, according to David Sussman, vice president of development and design for the Kimpton Group, who describes the former Starlight in the '80s as seedy and run-down. "Today, it's the

Another major attraction to the hotel is Scala's, situated on the ground floor in full view of a cable car stop serving the Powell-Mason and Powell-Hyde lines. The design of the restaurant by Backen Arrigoni & Ross (BA&R) is an enlightened example of modern urban archeology, taking full advantage of the detailed and significant architecture from the 1920s that lay concealed within the space. When the architects discovered that such ornamental elements as the intricate ceiling, which was hidden by a dropped ceiling and plastered over sometime during its former

to copy existing originals. Some plaster capitals on the columns, for example, were restored while a few were newly added.

"There was so much character in the ceiling," says Hans Baldauf, senior designer and project architect at BA&R. "We worked on bringing that character down into the space. We also matched the back of the interior, where a new ceiling was installed, with the old."

Inspired by a mixture of French bistro and the smokey patina found in so many old San Francisco interiors, Scala's was once a coffee

life, were still largely intact, they moved quickly to restore them to their former glory.

Of course, elements that had been severely damaged or lost had to be reconstructed from scratch. Wherever the effort was considered worthwhile, BA&R directed artisans

shop and two stores and then a tavern before the space was acquired by the new owner. Now, Scala's is somewhat of a theater unto itself. "When you pass on the cable car you look right into the restaurant," Baldauf explains. "We thought about the connection between inside and outside." The restaurant would also benefit from the energy garnered by arrivals to the hotel and the hustle and bustle outside of the hotel to attract customers.

One unusual aspect of the relationship between the restaurant and the hotel is their independence. Although the restaurant is owned and operated by Kimpton, it is managed separately, with barely a negligible link to the hotel. Yet the restaurant and the hotel give and take a lot from one another, mostly in terms of customers, but also in atmosphere and general activity.

"This is the secret to our success in establishing a restaurant within a hotel," admits Sussman. "We purposely manage it and regard it as if it were not associated with the hotel. The idea is to make it popular with the local crowd rather than cater to the hotel guest. If it's one of the best restaurants in the city, a guest will naturally want to go there."

What Kimpton and the Drake mean to tell their customers is that they don't have a food and beverage department. Though they are in the hotel business and the restaurant business, one is not simply inside the other. Fortunately, even the most near-sighted guest can't help sensing the difference. The Drake is the one with the doorman, Tom Sweeney, who became a celebrity himself in the '80s when he tackled two thieves running off with luggage. The Drake promises guests top service, doorman included, and it delivers to this day.



# Just Like Mama's

You haven't tasted the pizza that Neapolitans eat until you've dined at Manhattan's Naples Ristorante, designed by Frederick Brush Design Associates

hat classic slice of "extra cheese" topped Neapolitan-style pizza that a typical American has for lunch or dinner would draw a curious stare from a typical resident of Naples, Italy-where Neapolitan pizza is much lighter than its American cousin and is eaten as a snack. "The American version of pizza is a heavy tomato-sauce-andcheese-laden pie baked on a thick crust," notes Nick Valenti, president and CEO of Restaurant Associates, a leading restaurateur operating in New York, Washington, D.C., Philadelphia and Los Angeles. Commenting on the pizza in his new Naples Ristorante e Pizzeria, designed by Frederick Brush Design Associates and located in midtown Manhattan's MetLife Building, Valenti says, "Our pizza is light, fragrant and tasty-the pizza served today in the city of Naples.'

Valenti ought to know, having traveled numerous times to Naples with Fred Brush, principal of Frederick Brush Design Associates, to bring the authentic taste of the restaurant's namesake cuisine to New York. "The food is wonderful in Naples," Valenti continues, "and the architecture, finishes, lighting and furniture in the restaurants relate to each other in a distinctive way. Fred and I took copious notes about all the details. What we've created in New York is a roman-

ticized pizza parlor that evokes the memorable places we visited in Naples."

Capturing the flavor of faraway places is a hallmark of Restaurant Associates that was visible in the MetLife Building long before Naples opened this year. As the original operator of food services in the voluminous (2.4 million-sq. ft.) office building formerly called the Pan Am Building, designed by Walter Gropius, Pietro Belluschi and The Architects Collaborative, the company was the obvious choice to provide food services when the property changed hands from Pan American Airways to Metropolitan Life Insurance. "We drew up a master plan for MetLife about seven years ago," Valenti recalls. "It called for four full-service restaurants, two with take-out, plus a take-out express service to be important amenities to the neighborhood as well as the building. There would be something for everyone."

Nearly everyone, anyway. Over the years, Restaurant Associates has opened Cucina & Co. and Cucina Express, a Mediterranean-themed cafe and take-out charging an average check of \$8-10 per person, Cafe Centro, a Parisian brasserie charging \$29-32, and Tropica Bar & Seafood House, an eclectic seafood restaurant charging \$38-40, as part of the renovation and upscale repositioning

of public areas in the MetLife Building. Each of the restaurants was designed by Brush (with Roberto Magris at Cucina) on a singular theme to distinguish it from the countless other food services serving midtown Manhattan around Grand Central Station, the major commuter railroad terminal linking New York's Westchester County and Connecticut's Fairfield County with New York. The MetLife Building is physically attached to Grand Central Station through its public areas, which gives it unequalled exposure to the streams of pedestrian traffic coursing through the area. (See the story of Cafe Centro, "Grand Centro," in Contract Design, July 1995.) The prize: a vast office population working in such blue-chip addresses as the United Nations, Park Avenue, the Chrysler Building and Rockefeller Center.

In this segmented and competitive market, Naples would fill a gap between Cucina & Co. and Cafe Centro by offering a menu with an average check of \$20-22 per person in its main dining room, wine bar and take-out area plus something more provocative: an authentic slice of contemporary culture from Naples. The wayward path of Neapolitanstyle cooking as highlighted by pizza is not unlike the experience of every other ethnic group in America that has severed its roots.





Is pasta the basis of a successful life? Such is the saving by actress Sophia Loren as quoted above the Naples bar (above). The bar seats 70 diners in a lively setting that sees scores of office workers in their twenties and thirties afterhours sharing piccoli piatti, small dishes similar to the tapas of Spain. New Yorkers can also take contemporary Neapolitan cuisine home from the take-out kitchen (opposite), where light, fragrant and tasty pizza as well as numerous examples of cucina marinara are available. Buon appetito!

By inviting New Yorkers to the table, Valenti and Brush are simply taking advantage of their travels to leapfrog a century of acculturation and present Naples as it is now.

Every effort has certainly been made to capture the taste of Naples. Not only has Restaurant Associates brought pizzaiole, pizza chefs from Naples, to train their counterparts in New York, it has also equipped them with three wood-burning pizza ovens (named for the volcanoes Etna, Stromboli and Vesuvio) that bake pizza in just over two minutes at 900°, flour, tomatoes and olive oil from Italy, buffalo milk-based cheese and domestic water that matches Neapolitan water in hardness (mineral content). Similarly, the company has rounded out the menu with such authentic fare as pagnottelle, twice-baked sandwiches made from pizza dough, some 30 piccoli piatti, small dishes similar to the tapas of Spain, and such classic entrees as calamari fritti con salsa piccante, fried squid in spicy tomato sauce, and scaloppe di vitello alla parmigiana, breaded veal scaloppini topped with cheese and tomato sauce.

Had Valenti and Brush been less zealous about authenticity, the interior of Naples would still have represented a healthy exerthe MetLife Building, they want to feel as if they are anywhere but in midtown Manhattan."

But Brush shares Valenti's passion for getting the details right, so "his" Naples pays tribute to Naples as one of the jewels of southern Italy much as Cafe Centro honors Paris as France's City of Light. "We knew from the start that Naples would be combining old and new," Brush recalls. "Neapolitans love their past but are quick to grab onto whatever will give them an advantage tomorrow. We saw this in the dozens of restaurants we studied."

Still, Naples is anything but an appropriation of an existing space, a practice Brush avoids at all cost. ("I don't like being obvious about my sources," he declares.) The designer has turned a large, generic space characterized by nothing more than regularly spaced columns under a

high, flat ceiling into an airy pavilion of tiled walls, a remodeled terrazzo floor, a show-case pizza kitchen (this is still a pizzeria, after all) with its three ovens, a wine bar, a piccoli piatti preparation and display counter, a take-out area and banquettes, tables, chairs and other dining room furniture, fixtures and equipment in wood, metal and glass below gracefully arching ceiling vaults. Almost everything customers see appears both familiar and exotic at the same time because it has been custom designed by Brush, whose talent runs to fabricating the furnishings himself with a corps of trusted crafts people.

A palpable tension runs through Naples due to the contrast between the softly uplighted vaulting of tile and dry wall, which Brush has colored white as a unifying device, and the crisp forms and brightly hued surfaces of the furnishings—particularly the metal and glass sconces—that Brush uses to give the interior a unique look. Few stage props are present beyond some antique furniture and a few travel posters from the '30s and '40s, owing to the strong character of the furnishings. To quote Brush, "When your philosophy is 'Anything you can buy, don't,' you seldom need a lot of 'stuff."

Are jaded New Yorkers taking to the "pizza parlor chic" of Naples? According to John Harding, vice president and director of marketing and advertising for Restaurant Associates, Naples is appealing strongly to office workers in their twenties and thirties who come in groups of four to six for lunch or afterhours socializing. "Our lunch business from Monday to Friday is tremendous," he reports. "Though our dinner business should be healthy over the long term, we're currently seeing young people coming and going from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m., cramming themselves into our banquettes and ordering our piccoli piatti to share. It's great fun—like a non-stop party."



# **Boston Uncommon**

Dwyer & Collora summoned Childs Bertman Tseckares to create an office unlike that of other Boston lawyers—and the result is hold, bright spaces for a hold, bright law firm

Will counsel please approach the table? This one, in Dwyer & Collora's Boston office, was custom made with a design in the wood that reflects the curve of one of the two principal walls, this one painted ochre.







hich of the following items is not like the others: white collar criminal defense, employment litigation, war rooms or brightly-colored, open space? It's not hard to tell. For the law firm of Dwyer & Collora, however, they all work in harmony to create a unique office where 20 lawyers and their staff litigate in Boston. The 16-year-old firm needed to double its space of 10,000 sq. ft., so partners Tom Dwyer and Cathy Weinman sought an architect who could give them an office unlike any other they had ever seen.

Intrigued by Childs Bertman Tseckares (CBT), who had renovated the historic Boston Bar Association headquarters, Dwyer and Weinman put the firm on the short list and gave it a chance to prove its stuff. Although the Boston Bar Association was nothing like the contemporary space Dwyer & Collora had in mind, CBT, which specializes in law firms, presented a plan that worked for Dwyer and Weinman. Scouting for sites together, designer and client found a building that seemed to fit the bill at 400 Atlantic Street. The land-lord? The Federal Reserve Bank.

"We didn't realize what a great landlord we had until we were well into the project." reveals Weinman. "We had a turnkey deal with the building owner, who gave us tremendous supervision." Supervision and cooperation were necessary and present, but Janis Mones, a principal of CBT, admits that modern and striking as the building is, it had little to offer as far as wiring and cabling accessibility. But doesn't a respectable Boston law office just need some conference rooms and a big library?

Not in the 90s. With one CD ROM providing the reference material found in 30 books, the library is becoming more of a showplace and less of a mainstay in firms such as Dwyer & Collora. Also, aside from the Lexis on-line legal data service, there are plenty of similar services on the Web that provide attorneys with a quick, easy way to research. Still, the law library has its place at Dwyer & Collora.

"The library is still the heart of a law firm," notes Mones, "but it isn't something any firms are expanding. People still like to see the books, but any reference material can now be looked up on CD ROMs. Dwyer & Collora is a small firm, so its technological needs weren't as great as some of the larger firms we've designed. But it still needed computer accessibility everywhere."

"We basically just offered them a lot of places to plug in," explains Robert Michel, senior designer with CBT. "They didn't need video conferencing or a complicated sound system, but they needed PC access and a space that would shake up their clients a bit. Most firms want to be all things to all people. This firm is bolder."

The space speaks for itself—and the staff. To come up with a layout that would be the most effective, CBT interviewed everyone in the firm. "It was important to get input from everyone—paralegals, receptionists and messengers as well as attorneys," reports Weinman.

CBT kept the necessary things in mind: spacious conference rooms with pull-down projection screens and blinds, paralegals' proximity to the "war rooms" (where litigation firms keep all the evidence and information for major cases), of which they are considered the guardians, secretaries adjacent to the paralegals' work stations and lawyers' offices (custom designed for each attorney), and of course a fun room where everyone in the firm can get together socially for Friday afternoon get togethers and once-a-month birthday parties that have become de rigeur for the firm. From the "team model" to the aesthetic, CBT went forward on a contemporary scheme.

This is evident the moment you approach the building that houses the attorneys. Since CBT likes to integrate the interior spaces it designs with the exteriors that enclose them, it used paint and such ordinary materials as dry wall, glass, cherry veneer, granite and aluminum to complement the stainless steel paneled structure at 400 Atlantic Street. As the facility has harbor views, it also incorporated two curved walls for a wave-like effect, with the lighting above encased in blue glass sleeves. One curved wall defines the public spaces such as the reception and conference areas, and the other defines the private offices—all with harbor and city views. The curve of the walls is reflected in the curves of the custom made tabletops.

Dwyer and Weinmann also gave CBT free rein to choose appropriate art for the office. Hoity toity foreign art? Nah. CBT kept it local.

"We had a lot of fun with the art," says Michel. "We believe strongly in supporting local artists and services. And this law firm gave us freedom to do that. A lot of times when you're pushing the envelope, people tend to get a little nervous. Cathy and Tom, although completely interested in the process and the design, didn't."

Can the lawyers of a litigration firm be anything but satisfied customers? "Basically," insists Dwyer, "CBT was able to listen to a bunch of lawyers and translate what they babbled into a great space. Everyone in the firm is happy with the space."


Besides, happy workers provide a showplace for CBT to plead and win more of its own cases—oops, projects. "We took a perspective client through the space just the other day," explains Michel, "We were glad to see that it looks exactly the same as when we first finished the project."

Needless to say, the jury wasn't out long. The evidence was good design. Now that perspective client is CBT's. You can tell that to the judge.





# House of the Rising Sun


Computer giant Sun MicroSystems sets a Silicon Valley standard with its new R&D campus in Menlo Park, Calif., designed by Bottom/Duvivier and Backen Arrigoni & Ross

un Microsystems Inc. CEO Scott McNealy has passionately believed that network computing would replace the stand-alone PC in corporate America, and investors who bought into his company several years ago are now reaping their rewards. In just three years Sun's stock has more than tripled in price. McNealy vows that the organization, founded in 1982 and quickly nurtured into the \$7 billion manufacturer of computer hardware and software that it is today, will continue to grow through such recent product introductions as Java Internet software, which challenges mighty MicroSoft's dominance in the PC market. Yet success can be fleeting in the volatile computer industry, so when Sun undertook construction of a one million-sq. ft. research and development campus in Menlo Park, Calif., it asked architect Backen Arrigoni & Ross (BA&R) and interior designer Bottom/Duvivier to design a facility that would bolster the creativity and productivity of some of the sharpest minds in Silicon Valley.

Expansion in the 1980s translated into personnel hiring and the need for more space in and around Sun's headquarters. "We had a lot of growth pressure that we needed to accommodate," observes Eric Richert, Sun's director of workplace effectiveness. "Our leased facilities became a scattering of relatively small buildings that had nothing to do with each other." Believing that employee interaction yields intellectual dividends and anxious to gain better control of its occupancy costs, Sun decided to consolidate engineering and product development employees under one roof.

The search for a parcel of land where Sun could build led to a 57-acre site in Menlo Park. ideally close to Stanford University and the University of California at Berkeley, both major sources of employees familiar with the Unix operating system, on which Sun's products are based. However, the site presented numerous challenges to BA&R. David Israel, a senior vice president at BA&R who acted as project designer and project manager for Sun, explains that the site's unsheltered location on a peninsula, bounded by an expressway, levees and sloughs, faced less than favorable climactic conditions—a potential problem because Sun wanted the outdoor spaces to be virtual extensions of the interiors. In addition,



Sun Microsystems wanted to take advantage of the California climate, even on a site where prevailing wind conditions created architectural challenges. On the exterior, the eight buildings of the campus were massed to create a sheltered courtvard that is popular with employees. On the interior. the design flows seamlessly from inside to outside to take advantage of the sunny climate in places like the main entry lobby (opposite and left).

Sun's insistence on drawing up an exit strategy in case of downsizing, a commonplace fact of Silicon Valley life, helped influence the design of the campus.

Eight two- and three-story buildings—four in Phase I, completed in 1994, and four in Phase II, completed in September 1996—now occupy the site. Their crescent-shaped configuration forms a long and narrow land-scaped courtyard where Sun employees are likely to be found holding meetings on warm, sunny afternoons. In combination with specially designed wind screens, these buildings effectively block enough wind from the courtyard to make it comfortable for occupancy some 80% of the time.

The eight buildings are either H-shaped or L-shaped for flexibility. "The client was concerned that this facility meet its long-term financial goals," explains Israel. "We opted for a linear site plan so Sun can slice off the end of the campus if any buildings need to be leased or sold." The larger, L-shaped buildings can attract prospective buyers or tenants in search of conventional footprints, and the smaller, H-shaped buildings have central lobbies and separate wings that can support a single or multi-tenant occupancy.

Considering the size of the Sun R&D facility, Richert was determined to reject the image of the corporate megalopolis in favor of a more collegial, comfortable and collaborative environment. A great believer in the impact of the office environment on workplace productivity, he hired well-known consultant Michael Brill of BOSTI to recommend how the new facility could accommodate Sun's corporate culture and work practices.







Among the recommendations that the design team was asked to observe were the need for Sun employees to have a high degree of control over access to themselves, along with the contrary need for employees to interact more. "You can design an environment that does both," explains Richert. "You just need a richer variety of spaces and the proper disposition of private and public space."

"Sun's primary business issue was to improve collaboration among employees by providing them with more opportunities to bump into each other," says Israel. "The design was continuously assessed for how it might foster interaction." The massing of buildings on the site, though somewhat uncon-

Floor plans developed around interior "main streets" define neighborhoods and provide access to public spaces, variously known as forums, project rooms and sun rooms. throughout the eight buildings. "With all major public spaces located along that main circulation path, the design increases the possibility for people to meet and interact with one another." Marcinik explains. In fact, Bottom/Duvivier designed the overall facility to encourage interaction beyond normal circles. "Spaces throughout accommodate larger groups or activities," says John Duvivier, a principal at Bottom/Duvivier. "You must leave you own neighborhood to get coffee. You must leave your floor to go to a major meeting. And you not to give all of the credit to the facility's design. "One insight we've had over the last several years," he says, "is that the physical workplace is an important ingredient to improving productivity, but it's not very effective alone. It must be integrated with a management and organizational structure to create a system that helps people work." Sun Microsystems is obviously an organization where the light has dawned.

ventional, has supported Sun's goal, according to Richert. And considering the fact that BA&R and Bottom/Duvivier never consulted on the project design until after Phase I shell construction was completed, the interiors have also turned out to be remarkably effective in supporting a proper balance between private work and teamwork. Moreover, spaces throughout the eight buildings seem to flow seamlessly from inside to out.

To balance private and public space, Sun's standing tradition of almost 100% private offices would be maintained, while interior elements would be configured to create formal and casual meeting spaces to support teamwork. "Our strategy in these buildings with huge floor plates was to divide and conquer so employees would not be affected by the size," says Mark Marcinik, project architect of Sun for Bottom/Duvivier. "We created various neighborhoods or quadrants within the buildings. each having enclosed offices along with shared utilities and conference spaces." Within each neighborhood, multidisciplinary staff is clustered together according to project need, rather than traditional departments.

Circulation paths used by everyone also help establish the perception of equality in the workplace. Typical of Silicon Valley, Sun Microsystems strives to eliminate any sense of hierarchy among its ranks. Three sizes of private offices—each featuring a wood door with a window to establish design consistency and reinforce equality—allow for some distinction between function, but some 80% are entirely uniform in dimension and technology for flexibility. "The work spaces are not highly customized so people can be just as productive regardless of where they are," says Richert. "The staff can move about, but the physical space does not change."

Move about is exactly what people do, according to a post occupancy study commissioned by Richert. Findings indicated that self-reported group and individual productivity at Sun Microsystems has increased by 7-10% since Phase I occupancy in 1994. The biggest contributor to that impressive result: increased communication among the staff.

To satisfy a tight budget, the designers favored the prudent use of more costly materials like wood in highprofile areas only, and then carried the design theme throughout the rest of the facility as paint on walls. This corridor (opposite, left), reading room (opposite, middle) and meeting area (opposite, right) all feature colorful, lively accents reflective of Sun Microsystems relaxed and comfortable corporate atmosphere.

Sun Microsystems considered meeting spaces critical to encourage employees to interact. These accommodations, some formal but most informal, are seen everywhere: major public spaces with lounge seating for casual conversation (top, left), dedicated lounge areas with white-boards (top, right), smaller lounge groupings amidst general work areas (above, left) and a most impressive espresso cafe (above, right) in the central facility.

The site plan (right) responds directly to Sun's request for long-term flexibility. Should the need for downsizing ever occur, buildings can easily be separated out for sale or lease. L-shaped buildings would attract prospective buyers or tenants looking for a conventional floorplate, while the H-shaped buildings could easily support a single or multi-tenant situation.

# Still Thirsty

Faced with an unquenchable thirst for office space, Snapple asked Spector Group to create its East Meadow, N.Y. headquarters in just one year

oung, successful businesses expanding their horizons can be as much fun to watch as young people having a good time. High-spirited, idealistic, fearless and unpredictable, they make careful plans only to change them at a moment's notice, and surprise themselves by performing one extraordinary feat after another. Such was the case when Snapple Beverage Company asked Spector Group to help it develop a new head-quarters in East Meadow, N.Y.

The year was 1993, and the purveyor of ice teas and fruit drinks ("Made from the best stuff on earth") founded by three long-time friends from Brooklyn, N.Y., Hyman Golden, Arnold Greenberg and Leonard Marsh, had outgrown every space it could find in Valley Stream, N.Y., a typical suburban community on Long Island. "Snapple had gone from one building to two and then three," recalls Angie Mongelli, then manager of human resources and administration for Snapple. "We needed space for our existing staff as well as for new employees. We all wanted to be under the same roof."

Because the founders and most employees resided in the area, the search for a new location was limited to Long Island. Snapple focused on finding an existing building that could be quickly remodeled—in a year or less—for some 250 employees. The Long Island real estate market, oversupplied with office buildings in an economy that had yet to recover from the 1990-1991 recession, offered numerous choices. In fact, the general contractor working on a warehouse for Snapple in East Meadow alerted the company to the vacant, 37,000-sq. ft. structure Snapple would call its next home, which had been repossessed by a bank.

To create what Golden, Greenberg and Marsh hoped would be a "clean and classy, but warm and approachable" environment, Snapple retained Spector Group as architect and interior designer and placed Mongelli, reporting to chief financial officer Alan Koss, directly in charge of representing the company on the building team. Mongelli had good cause to regard her responsibilities as seri-

ously as she did. "This was quite a challenge for me," she points out. "I was the only woman in a group that included the architect, the general contractor and the subcontractors, and the men were at least twice my age. I felt that I couldn't make good decisions without sharing information, and I decided to bring everyone into the process."

Following extensive interviews with the founders, senior managers and department heads, Mongelli, Spector Group principals Scott Spector, AIA, and Marc Spector, AIA and their colleagues developed a space standards program that would preserve the existing scheme of private, window offices (from 200-325 sq. ft.) for most managers, and open plan work stations (from 48-144 sq. ft.) for clerks, secretaries, professionals and supervisors. One potential cause for concern in the transition to a standardized workplace presented no difficulties at all: professionals and supervisors, who had been obliged to double or triple up in private offices, were delighted over the prospect of having open plan spaces of their own.



But programming a fast-growing organization is like buying clothes for children. At best, the procedure is an educated guess—you take accurate measurements and then select a size that is one or two sizes larger. "When we visited Snapple's main building in Valley Stream, we found people packed like anchovies," reports Scott Spector. "We decided we needed a five-year program of continuous expansion. Even so, the growth of one group, international operations, exceeded our total estimates in just six months."

A flexible open plan arrangement seemed the best way to cope with such rapid change. Accordingly, Spector Group's modular layout allowed for a supervisor's open plan work a cafeteria on the lower one. (There are also three below-grade parking levels, Scott Spector points out, on the very tight site.)

What kind of visual environment was sought by the three "down-to-earth guys from Brooklyn"? "Hymie [Golden], Arnie [Greenberg] and Lenny [Marsh] saw themselves as meat-and-potatoes businessmen," Marc Spector, the project's designer, observes. "They couldn't forget they had been a tri-state company [New York, New Jersey and Connecticut] in the '80s that nearly went bust in 1983. Faced with the need for professional headquarters, they were anxious that customers should recognize them in the new setting."

At the same time the interior design was being developed, Mongelli made certain that the rest of the work, which included refurbishing the curtain wall and upgrading all building systems, proceeded without a hitch. Every Friday she held meetings in which the entire building team assembled so that virtually any problem could be promptly resolved. "We made everyone feel special," Mongelli proudly maintains. "Every now and then we brought lunch to the construction site. We served Snapple, of course." The payoff came when Snapple welcomed its employees to their new home on time and on budget. "I'll never forget opening day," Mongelli says. "Everyone was thrilled, from the founders to the mailroom clerks."



station to be converted into three order entry clerks' work stations if necessary, introduced an indirect lighting design to deliver lighting free of veiling reflections wherever the fully computerized staff was assigned, and generally opened up the space with glass interior Informality proved to be key in the final design. Against a cool, modern vocabulary of neutral colors and materials, Spector Group devised such elements as 9-ft., 6-in. high "caryatids" that were perfectly scaled up Snapple bottles, complete with correct

The Snapple saga took a surprising turn at this point, however. Not long after moving into its new home in 1994, the company was acquired by \$6-billion, Chicago-based food conglomerate Quaker Oats for \$1.7 billion, and relocated from East Meadow to

walls for the private offices, bright Snappleinspired colors (particularly reds and blues) and cafeterias on both floors where employees could relax. The stacking plan placed the founders (each in an adjoining, 750-sq. ft. private office), accounting, finance, international sales, director of sales and a cafeteria on the upper level, and reception, sales, operations, advertising, computer room and labels and colors, splashes of colors in fabrics and signage, and such names for public areas as the Kiwi Strawberry Conference Room and the Lenny Marsh Board Room. "The employees, who were typically in their twenties, loved it all," comments Scott Spector. "The employees wanted an environment to match their energy level, and we provided it."


the Windy City—eliminating almost the entire Long Island work force and vacated the newly finished facility.

Mongelli manages to sound upbeat nonetheless. "It was an exciting time to be at Snapple," she insists. "We've all gone on with our lives since then. There's no bitter aftertaste." At least not when you're serving "the best stuff on earth."



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# **How to Color a Chameleon**

Alternative career opportunities with good pay and benefits do exist-for architects and designers willing to wear many hats

es, the economy and the job market overall have improved in the last 18 months. So why are many architects and interior designers still having trouble finding work? Because there is a glut of architects and designers in the marketplace, and the schools are graduating more each year without counseling them about job opportunities or helping them to find jobs. Today's recent graduates are competing for jobs with people who have six to eight years' experience. And they're all hoping to land the same basic job—one with a major architecture or interior design firm.

Traditionally, working for a design firm meant status, glamour, a chance to use one's creativity and skills without much in pay or benefits. That's still true today. Unfortunately, the jobs are harder to come by when even some of the largest firms are beating the bushes for business or outsourcing when the projects come in.

The bottom line in the '90s is that design professionals must be willing to be chameleons and change themselves to meet the needs of the marketplace. The first question any employer will ask is, "Do you know CAD?" Designers who studied it five years ago and have not used it since will need to take a course to understand the newest programs. Even firms that don't have openings often have temporary assignments for designers with CAD. And once that proverbial foot is in the door, a "temp" position could become "full-time."

Note that the word "permanent" isn't being used. Today no job is forever, and that may be good. Quality of life issues, personal fulfillment and enjoyment of work are important themes for the '90s, so that changing jobs as your life changes may make great sense. However, deliberately planned job hopping is a new mindset. It means thinking of your career as a series of job components that allow you as a design professional to move among job opportunities as personal needs, interests and the economy dictate.

Employed design professionals as well as recent graduates should be open to jobs that are an alternative to the traditional design firm career path. The logic is simple: that's where the opportunities are. All of the following positions complement and build on a design professional's basic skills and knowledge.

Sales representative: it's not profane to pronounce the "S" word

While "sales" is a dirty word to some design professionals, this is their number one area of opportunity. It turns their design background into an asset—manufacturers

respect architecture and interior design degrees. Plus, sales offers good income and benefits as well as flexible hours. Because designers already understand the technical and aesthetic features of furniture, textiles, wallcovering, floorcovering, lighting, window treatments and building products (the potential list is endless), they can explain them to other designers in their own language. They can use a design library for inspiration, contact manufacturers directly or check the classified pages of *Contract Design* or the industry newsletters, *Monday Morning Quarterback* and *officeinsight*.

Specification writers and project managers for furniture dealerships: needed right now, whatever you think of them

Another area with abundant

jobs today, dealerships complement the work of design firms.
A design firm may order 500 work stations, but a dealer and a manufacturer must provide the technical expertise to "spec" out the stations. Literally hundreds of designers are hired to fulfill that role and that of project manager. Again, while many designers may look down on dealers, they're the fastest growing area in the industry. Dealerships offer good wages—\$50,000 plus—as well as assignments that increase a designer's experience level for the next job.

Managers for facilities, project and furniture management companies: go where the outsourcing often ends up

These are usually small companies that act as consultants to large ones, managing facilities, acting as an owner's representative on projects, recommending furniture dealers and negotiating furniture prices. As corporations downsize their facilities departments, these services are outsourced. To find these firms, designers may need to network with manufacturers reps. The same reps who call

on design firms also call on these consultants to get their products specified. In fact, the reps are a great source for where the jobs are in general—who has the projects and who's hiring.

## Corporate facility managers: how many hats are you willing to wear?

Designers are excellent choices for facility-related positions, whether they're hired inhouse or on a per-diem basis. In today's economy, however, facility managers are wearing many hats. A facility manager may be involved in new projects, downsizing, purchasing, telecommunications and insurance issues, to name just a few. It's an opportunity for the designer to expand his knowledge and skill base.

#### Professional freelancer: when variety is your security

There are agencies that place design professionals as temps who are not looking for full-time positions. Variety keeps their work interesting and secure, they carry their own insurance and consider temp work their own small business enterprise. Architects and interior designers can also keep busy on a temp basis through their own contacts with design firms and dealerships, of course.

#### Outsource resource librarians: my brains, your binders

This area is a new one. These librarians set up a design firm library and then update and maintain it weekly or monthly, on an asneeded basis. They arrange appointments with the manufacturers' reps on the days they are in and do a lot of work out of their own home offices, for example, ordering special samples for new projects. This arrangement allows librarians to have several firms as clients and saves the firms the expense of full-time librarians.

#### In-house architect/designer for real estate developers: are tenants your cup of tea?

Here, the design professional would plan the lobbies and common areas of an office building, and help the developer lease space by providing tenants with the critical space plans and design services that can make a leasing transaction go forward.

#### Residential designer: customer service is key

Contract designers are often concerned with the customer service aspect of residential design, but there is a lot of work in the residential arena today. Many designers who can't find work should consider stores like the Ethan Allen Galleries, the design studio at Bloomingdales, Bombay Company, Crate and Barrel, Pottery Barn and Home Depot. Ethan Allen spends almost one-half million dollars

a year in help wanted ads for designers to work in its galleries.

One large Midwest department store just hired a designer fresh out of school for \$40,000/year. Home Depot hires a number of retired architects and designers. Granted, these jobs may require working some weekends or evenings, but salary plus commission should total twice that of an entry-level position at a major design firm.

#### Showroom sales: are you fresh out of design school?

The residential showrooms for furniture, tile and textiles are particularly receptive to hiring design professionals fresh out of school.

#### Kitchen, bath and closet designers: why not?

Designers who have spent the last six months sending their resumes out to design firms and getting nowhere should send them to a kitchen, bath or closet design company. They'll be hired overnight and trained about the product. Design professionals might also look to other creative industries, such as food, fashion and writing for opportunities. For instance, there are a few design editors and journalists who are architects or interior designers by training.

#### Misunderstood opportunities: marketing and specifying may not be what you think

There are two areas where the opportunities are misunderstood. The first is design firm marketing. Most applicants think the position is about organizing events and public relations, when marketing is mainly "new business development"—getting work for the firm. The position requires sales experience and a connection with the real estate community. Caveat emptor: firm principals get very impatient if new business doesn't materialize quickly, so the marketing position tends to turn over rapidly.

Another frequently requested position is that of the designer in a firm who specifies furnishings and finishes. The truth is that there are few of these positions available. In most firms across the country, the function is combined with other design functions, and knowledge of CAD is a requirement.


## Future employment: why your next job should not be your last

Jobs will remain tight in the traditional design firm market throughout the United States for some time to come. On the other hand, the alternative careers discussed in this article should continue to be plentiful. Design professionals and recent graduates looking for work should keep an open mind and go on as many interviews as possible.

Interviewing is a good experience and the only way to really find out about an area. Before turning a position down—and this situation will arise, believe it or not—architects and interior designers should remember that it is advantageous to look for work when you have a job. Having a job shows your initiative and a good work ethic.

And, as mentioned earlier, as a design professional, you should look at each job as a component in your career, going off to try new areas and returning to others. It's the secret for personal fulfillment and of being employable for life. Consider it perhaps your one and only project that will never wind down.

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# Curing Office Ills by Design?

Repetitive stress injury from white-collar work shows no signs of going away, but it isn't a hopeless case yet-if designers and clients work together now

f you're summoned to jury duty these days, you'll probably hear the words "repetitive stress injury" or RSI in the conversations that fill the courthouse chambers and corridors. The fact that ergonomics isn't just a term understood within the design industry implies that we've come a long way in educating the general public about what's bad for working men and women—and more importantly what's better for them. But reported cases of injuries in the workplace due to repetitive motions are not going away—a fact of modern life that will continue to affect architects and interior designers for years to come.

You may even know someone who is complaining of chronic back, neck, shoulder, hand and/or arm pain due to repetitive movements carried out under one or more of the following conditions: contorted postures, consecutive hours spent sitting at a computer, inappropriate furniture, poor light or uncomfortable room temperature. Take the reported cases of secretaries suffering from RSI: Bureau of Labor Statistics data show that of all secretaries who have missed work due to illness, 12.6% claimed their illness to be due to RSI. By comparison, 8.5% of data entry keyers made similar claims.

Of 6.8 million reported nonfatal injuries and illnesses in 1994, twothirds were from cumulative trauma disorders. That total is 10% higher than its corresponding number for 1993. Who's to blame? Even if the answer were forthcoming, architects and interior designers might arguably spend their time better by determining how to improve the *totality* of office ergonomics.

#### Correct posture: get 'em off their buttocks at once!

For one, the offices of today have been designed primarily for sitting. With an increase in computer use, more and more employees spend a majority of their time tapping away at a computer keyboard in a seated position. There are three problems right there: the one motion of constant keyboard use, the prolonged seated position and the high probability that the employee is neither using the keyboard correctly nor sitting correctly.

With so many variables, it's impossible to say RSI is the fault of the keyboard design, or the chair is not supportive enough, or that the job is too boring. All these things may be true and are significant factors in bringing on a debilitating case of such ailments as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, a slipped such as the copier or the fax machine to your desk can add to the lack of movement a worker encounters on a daily basis. Basically, people aren't doing a lot more than sitting, and they're doing it poorly.

Jerome Congleton, PhD, associate professor in safety engineering at Texas A&M University and designer for Neutral Posture, province that we approach the way we work

sor in safety engineering at Texas A&M University and designer for Neutral Posture, argues that we approach the way we work through the way we design. "We need to design our offices for sit and stand," he says. "We don't want to do either one all day. Today's offices are designed for us to sit all day. If people were able to control their offices they

day. If people were able to control their offices they would sit 23% of the time and stand 77% of the time." Congleton, who consults for United Parcel Service, says that UPS workers stood more when supplied with sit/stand work stations.

Research has shown that people are actually less productive and less healthy when sitting for the majority of the day. "People shrink in the office and their feet swell," insists Rajendra Paul, corporate ergonomist with Haworth. "If you stand for a few hours a day, let's say at 15- or 30-minute shifts, you can reduce foot swelling by 70% and reduce spine shrinkage by

40%, and people will feel more energized. Circulation will be improved. People think better on their feet than on seats."

If getting a new job or changing job tasks is out of reach, the proliferation of adjustable desking systems that allow for sitting and standing while typing is a good step toward working healthier. "A desk should adjust from 23 in. to 46 in. from the ground," reports Congleton. "This would take into account the 5th percentile of women at a sitting elbow resting height to 95th percentile of men standing at 6 ft.-2 in."

But designer beware. There are far too many mislabeled products on the market.



disk or a nerve entrapment. But what this situation means is the problem must be tackled from various angles, including the job description, the furniture specified, the corporate culture and the employee.

Look at your client's office over an extended period of time. How much time do the employees spend sitting? Standing? Doing various tasks? Those questions are crucial in understanding how offices work and thus, how our bodies are being forced to work. We spend the majority of our time sitting at our individual work stations, and our offices are being created expressly for that—with a lack of congregating room and

Some manufacturers tout ergonomic products that aren't necessarily as ergonomic as claimed. Without regulations, this kind of labeling can and has gotten out of hand within the industry.

## Employer education: coaches and players on the same or opposing teams?

Designing a better approach to work applies to the chairs as well, which must be equipped with multiple adjustments to make the grade. A specifier who fails to be educated on this topic risks being confused by all the doo-dads on a chair and specifying one based on the presence or absence of certain levers and buttons rather than their actual functions. Educating the facility manager about ergonomics is also a preventative measure to avoid filling an office with chairs and other furnishings that don't suit workers' needs.

In addition, a facility manager must learn how furniture actually supports the tasks of employees in particular jobs. For example, if furniture is being specified for people who work on the computer all day, such as in data entry or magazine publishing, employees should test the furniture to make sure it can be adjusted by each employee to suit his or her task. All tasks are not the same, all employees are not the same. Why should all be fitted with the same furniture?

Having the best chair, desk, footrest and keyboard is a good start. But take care: the function of each is voided when used incorrectly, such as sitting on a foot when seated or using other contorted positions to perform a task. In other words, employees must be knowledgeable about office ergonomics too.

But how do athletes know how to train if a coach isn't helping? The employer must take responsibility to teach employees through classes or focus groups, and offer corrective measures for an ergonomically poor environment. In Congleton's view, management should check on employees every six months to observe how they are working with their furniture.

What about all those rules we are told about working elbow height and other ideal postures? Congleton resists the fixed 90° angle at the elbows in favor of a philosophy of movement and moderation. "My job is to make being ergonomics simple," he declares. "But the answer is in moving and varying the working position." Paul agrees, noting that changing positions can offset many of the hazards of poor furniture or keyboard design. He proposes that workers think of the slogan, "the best posture is the next posture." In other words, keep your body posture on the move.

# Nurturing versus pampering: who says "ergonomic" means posh?

Is it possible to achieve a total ergonomic environment? In theory, this would grant the

employee absolute adjustability—which amounts to absolute control—of the desk, chair, keyboard, monitor, lighting and temperature. Only with absolute adjustability can a workplace be completely ergonomic. Although many ergonomists doubt such an environment can be achieved in the office, nothing precludes the architect, interior designer, employer or facility manager from coming as close to the absolute as possible.

Why do some employees experience pain while others can type away, burning the mid-

night oil? "Different people have different levels of susceptibility to cumulative trauma disorder, with predisposing factors," explains Rani Lueder, president of Humanics ErgoSystems Inc., an ergonomics consulting group. Designers should be designing for worst case scenarios, she points out. Because we don't know who is and isn't likely to suffer from RSI, the office design should cater to the possibility of it occurring.

One persistent misconception is that the ergonomic office must necessarily be more plush. Paul sees this as old school and adds that the industry is going through a paradigm shift. "When designers designed furniture," he

says, "they focused on making everything more comfortable. That calling card was yesterday's thinking. We have changed our view as far as what's ergonomic. The point is to recognize nurturing versus pampering." Herein lies a distinction between aiming for an environment that tries to do away with discomfort, and one that tries to attain maximum comfort. Which one is the most productive?

According to Paul, the extra unnecessary comfort is pampering. The nurturing category takes into account the positive aspects that may not seem comfortable at first but end up so. Paul compares nurturing to taking a child to piano class, and pampering to giving a child an ice-cream cone. Paul suggests that we focus on the nurturing rather than on the pampering to achieve maximum benefits and to create a more ergonomic environment. Moderation is everything. Too little comfort is not acceptable either.

In many cases, RSIs can be prevented and ailing work places corrected by paying attention to the right areas and measures taken. Take, for example, lighting. Many organizations fail to consider lighting when an employee complains of pain. If a cubicle is poorly lit, an employee may have to hunch, crane the neck and distort correct working position to compensate for loss of vision. The same idea applies to a monitor with a glare. These aspects can be quickly and inexpensively remedied when everyone considers them.

Or it might just be the height of the monitor that is causing the employee to misalign the spine by raising the head. Or the mouse may be too far from a neutral zone, forcing the employee to stretch and create awkward positioning. Because the Apple Macintosh® demands a high level of mouse work, this kind of contortion can be as prolonged as the time spent at the computer. Unfortunately, it is often a combination of many factors too numerous to list, in addition to the presence of stress that might be imposed by the social environment, such as from co-workers or a manager.

"Cumulative trauma disorders are multifaceted," says Lueder. "It is hard to pinpoint where the problem is coming from. Many things are important in assessing the situation."

Of course, our hands are not left tied just because a magic answer doesn't exist. If all of us-those of us who design, including architects, interior designers and industrial designers, those of us who manage, including facility managers and the many "bosses" who create the office culture, those of us who manufacture office furnishings and office machines, and those of us who perform white-collar work, the employees in corporate America's offices—pay close attention to the tasks, the equipment, the body positioning and the levels of motion and stagnation, RSI can at least be mitigated some of the time. Think of this as just one thing more and potentially many things less to worry about at work. 53

Still, society's lack of recognition for the value added by architects troubles Sueberkrop.



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
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Letter from the Editor in Chief of Contract Design

Specifying products for commercial and institutional interiors is a demanding responsibility. As the nation's architects and interior designers know, the challenges never cease, with new technologies, materials and designs flooding the market almost every day. Not only were many of the concepts embodied in these introductions unknown when today's designers attended school, they often remain a mystery to active professionals, at least until the new products begin to acquire a track record of documented installations. The trouble with letting a client become a guinea pig, however, haunts designers. One designer put the matter succinctly: "Buy the wrong chair and you don't make one mistake—you can make hundreds."

To help raise the effectiveness of product specification in interior design, Contract Design invited a random sampling of thousands of individuals drawn from the nation's design community to rank the top three sources in each of dozens of product categories. Their responses—and we wish to express our thanks to all who participated—were tabulated by an independent research organization and compiled as the Top Ten sources in alphabetical listings, forming the heart of our new Contract Design Source Guide for 1996-1997. For example, our entry for "Desks and Credenzas" includes a Top Ten listing of Bernhardt, Dar Ran, Gunlocke, Haworth, Halcon, Kimball, Knoll, Paoli, Steelcase and Touhy.

Can the process of ranking contract furnishings sources be improved? Absolutely—starting with the likelihood that future rankings of the sources will disclose the numerical order of preference, and will be accompanied by the appropriate product selection criteria, also in numerical order. 
## CEILING SYSTEMS & TILES


A lot can happen in the space at and above the ceiling plane in facilities. Lighting fixtures are frequently recessed into the plenum, along with HVAC, security and life safety sensors, wet and dry sprinklers and a growing volume of cabling for power, voice and data, often placed in cable trays left open for quick access. How is all this paraphernalia handled? Among the leading possibilities are a suspended ceiling of acoustic tile or dry wall. When image is more important and budget allows, a designer can work with specialty ceiling systems manufacturers to achieve highly original solutions that give a signature look to a space. The Top Five sources (the numbers fall off sharply afterwards) largely represent acoustic tile and dry wall solutions.



## DESKS & CREDENZAS

Having served their purpose for centuries, desks and credenzas are not about to fade away even as furniture systems redefine themselves and the Information Age ponders whether or not to have offices at all. What a desk or credenza is expected to do has changed drastically in the last two decades, of course. Though reading, handwriting and computer monitoring can still be conducted at the traditional 29-31-in. height of desks, computer keyboards and CPUs are incompatible with many desk returns, and printers, faxes, copiers, modems and a host of other office machines may or may not find graceful repose atop credenzas. Yet the imagery of these products as symbols of office is potent enough that the Top Ten sources stay busy in production.




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### COMPUTER SUPPORT FURNITURE


Given the brief history of the PC, just over 15 years old, its conquest of the commercial and institutional worlds is astounding. Virtually everyone in an organization uses a PC at work, from the assembly line worker to the CEO. As a result, the persistent lack of ergonomic compatibility among the typical office work station, the PC and the office worker remains a source of confusion, discomfort and disability—the latter due to repetitive stress injury (RSI) on the job. The problem is caused in part by widespread ignorance of the complex causes of RSI, the refusal of employers to improve conditions on the job and the failure of many so-called ergonomic products to alleviate RSI. Time will tell if designers find genuine help from all the Top Ten sources.

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




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
#### **ERGONOMIC SEATING**

When Herman Miller introduced the Ergon chair in 1976, designed by William Stumpf, it fired an ergonomics shot heard 'round the workplace—and the race to invent healthy and adjustable office task seating was on. While few chairs in the 1990s can truly claim to be innovative, chair manufacturers are now focusing on balancing technology and cost to create winning combinations. Their incentives are two-fold: Customers want ergonomic chairs to counter repetitive stress disorders, and advances in production engineering make possible better chairs with more features at lower costs. 

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



Every revolution ages as the circumstances behind its success unravel, including the introduction of the open-plan office, which first appeared as office landscaping or bürolandschaft in the 1960s. 


### LOUNGE SEATING
