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

6 Do you love the house? Then, go right ahead and buy it! 9

EDITOR'S NOTE: Tony Adams, thirty-three, is a contractor specializing in the restoration of historic and period houses in Savannah, Ga. Also a carpenter and machinist by trade, he has worked on many historic houses.

Albert Keidel first became interested in old houses when, as a student at the University of Texas School of Architecture, he used to go to the missions to sketch. In between ranching, he has restored numerous houses in the Fredricksburg area.

Roger Brassard, a broker-Realtor, formerly a contractor, has been involved in restoration work in Providence. R. L. for the last fifteen years. He is known for his restoration of the first seventeen houses on Benefit Street.

What are the most important things for a prospective home owner to look for in estimating whether an old traditional house is worth restoring or remodeling? Mr. Brassard: You must look at the basic structure of the house to see whether it's in fairly good condition. Too often a redeveloper will mistake superficial dilapidation for real dilapidation and will tear down an absolutely great structure.

Mr. Keidel: First you must ask yourself, do you want to live in the area? Next, what is the condition of the house? Perhaps the most important questions are: Do you love it? Do you really want it? If the answers are yes, often people ignore the first two points, then go right ahead and buy it.

Mr. Adams: The historic value of a house can be important. Historic Savannah, which is dedicated to saving old houses can help determine the value. Also, location is important. Is it an active restoration area? Is it a good area? This is especially important in the eventual monetary return on the house—if the owners ever need to sell or rent it.

How do you go about judging the physical soundness of an old house?

Mr. Adams: I first check the exterior appearance of the house to see if it's sagging. If the house is brick or stucco, I check for cracks on the outside and from the top of one window to the bottom of the next. If the house is clapboard, I look to see that the building lines appear level. Inside. I check windows to see if any moisture or water is leaking in: floors to make sure they are level and in a brick house that they meet the walls. Very often the floor joists will rot off where they go into the well, thus allowing morsture to come through. I check carefully for cracks in fireplaces and make sure they don't lean. The cost would be high if we had to rebuild them. Any one of the things listed can be corrected, but would insolvement.

How do you tell the architectural period to which an old house belongs and when it was built?

Mr. Keidel. The period and era cau be determined by the stille of various details as well as the seneral style of the house stille. The houses in this area are a combination of vari-

ous influences: of early European settlers, of Mexico, and the old South. To find out the exact date of a house. I often look under the rafters in the ceiling or on a cornerstone. Many carpenters carved their name and the date in these places. Sometimes, I hunt down the deed or talk to the relatives of the original owners.

Mr. Brassard: I can usually pinpoint the date of the house within about ten years by studying the molding—the style, width, and cut of it. Also, the thickness of the walls, the style of the frame all give clues as to the period and date. Often 1 must research a house to find its exact date. The Providence Preservatión Society does a great deal of the research on these old, historic houses.

How important is it to be absolutely authentic in matching the original architectural style of a house? Mr. Brassard: I think it's important to be as correct and authentic as you possibly can, especially on the exterior. We have in some areas what's known as "historic zoning," which states that the exterior of the house must be in keeping with the original style. I believe you can have an authentic, traditional interior and still have a working, functioning house.

Mr. Keidel: It depends on how the house is to be used. If you are restoring it to become a museum, then you should be absolutely correct. If you are rejuvenating a house for occupancy, then you should do this in accordance with the style or *character* of the house. You needn't be absolute about it. Where a breezeway once stood, you could install sliding glass doors. A kitchen never would look the same, but you can have all the modern conveniences you want and still retain the flavor of the original old house.

Mr. Adams: If you tried to be absolutely correct, then your house simply wouldn't be a working house. We try to match architectural style as closely as possible but not exactly especially in the interiors. The historic houses we have restored are lived in by families needing modern conveniences. But the restrictive covenant issued by Historic Savannah, which bought many of these old houses, regulates the exterior.

Where do you get workmen who can reproduce paneling, cornices, and other building details that are so important in a traditional house? Can you find traditional building materials by national manufacturers? Mr. Adams: There are an adequate number of good craftsmen in Savannah who can reproduce various items. Paneling material can be reproduced in our mills, knives necessary to shape the materials have been ground to match the type used years ago. One thing we can't find and is too expensive to make is antique glass. It is very hard to find traditional building materials. One exception are locks—mortise and rim locks are still manufactured. But porcelain and brass knobs are not made in great quantity and are expensive.

Mr. Brassard: What's hidden behind the plaster and beams doesn't matter as far as the authenticity goes . . . it's the show pieces the trim, doorknobs, etc. that do. We try to hunt down these things ourselves, but they are getting harder to find. I often salvage hardware, doors, staircases, banister rails from old houses that are being torn down. I'm constantly checking the areas where contractors are razing houses.

Is it more costly to restore or rebuild an old traditional house than to build a new contemporary one? Mr. Adam – It is cheaper to restore an old traditional house Continued on page 137

"We found doing up our first house such a lot of fun that we have our eves on two other properties right now, which we plan to renovate and sell," said Mr. and Mrs. Charles Tallman whose house in Savannah is photographed in this issue. "There are ways of getting the money if you put your mind to it. Downtown Savannah is now part of Urban Renewal and this means 100 percent loans are available directly from HUD (U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development) and the terms are very good. Around 4 percent on \$35,000 for twenty-five years. And HUD specifies owner occupancy, which is good and means speculators can't get in there, so a stable neighborhood will be created." It was not as easy in 1969 when the Tallmans bought their present house. "At that time we were in the middle of the money crunch when a bank wouldn't even give you \$100 to buy an automobile." Mr. Tallman continued. "We had enough cash to buy the house outright for \$12,000 but it wasn't habitable. We needed \$35,000 to make it livable. We had to go out of town to a small bank 75 miles away in Statesboro, Ga.. to get an initial commitment for a construction loan. Then a local financial institution in Savannah came through with the money we needed, but our mortgage is only for 15 years at $8\frac{1}{2}$ percent. Not as good as the terms offered for a new house."

HELP FROM A MORTGAGE BROKER

Mortgage brokers can sometimes be helpful in getting better terms. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Stamm, who have bought and sold four houses on one block in Manhattan's Upper West Side and now own a fifth, relied exclusively on mortgage brokers to get them financing for all their houses. Mrs. Stamm, an energetic young mother of three, who has revitalized their once-neglected block by planting trees, renovating houses, and establishing a community spirit, is coauthor with Deirdre Stanforth of a forthcoming book about buying and restoring a town house. She explained: "After spending months trying to obtain an adequate mortgage for our first house, we confacted a mortgage broker who took only two weeks to find us a mortgage for \$10,000 more than the only mortgage we had been able to find. A morthalle broker keeps up to date with the mortname market and has developed a relationship with many lenders. He knows what banks have mortgage money, includincontot town bars you wouldn't know about what kind of property they are interested in and the best way to present your case. He charges about 2 percent of the mortgage, but we thick it worthwhile to cut cost: on renovating to pay this fee."

owners. Mr. and Mrs. John von Hartz, would not trade this house for anywhere in the world. "When we painted it up the shoemaker across the road actually came over to thank me for giving him something good to look at." says Mr. von Hartz, who is a writer and founding member of the Brownstone Revival Committee. "Living here has restored our faith in people. When we were offered the house at first for \$23,000," he recalled. "we came to understand that revitalization is not a concept finance people readily understand. In our sort of area almost the only way you can buy an old house is through a purchase money mortgage from the seller. We put down \$5,000 cash and were paying the rest off in monthly installments." That was all right until the sellers wanted cash a little later on and were prepared to discount the mortgage by \$4,000 in return for the outstanding money immediately. Mr. von Hartz started looking for a conventional loan. "This time it sounded like an easy thing. After all we already had the house and all we needed was \$12,000. But still no lending institution came through. At this point I wrote to Andrew Heiskell, who was then chairman of the Urban Coalition-he is also chairman of the company I work for-and explained what we were trying to do. He sent my letter to the chairman of a bank that had already turned us down and they said they would lend us the money if we could get FHA (Federal Housing Administration) approval. This is the government backed loan which insures the mortgage with no risk to the bank at all.

"By this time we'd turned the house into a two-family house, and when the FHA inspector saw it, he told us we didn't qualify for one of their loans because we didn't have two separate doorways and two separate sets of stairs. That got

he mad. I think the FHA has changed its attitudes since then and it needed to, it was too tied into suburban real estate markets. Of course, we were depressed, but we thrilled to the hunt, I sat down and wrote more long letters and in the end FHA reversed its decision and so did the bank, and finally we got a loan for twenty years at 734 percent. The whole business took seven months. What's frustrating about doing up an old house is not the fixing up part, but the paperwork and financing. But if you tell the whole story, and if you're very tenacious, invariably you can find a sympathetic ear."

ADVICE FROM REVIVAL COMMITTEES

There are restoration committees ready to lend sympathetic ears in many cities, including Boston, Providence, Newport, Savannah, Charleston, New Orleans, and Philadelphia. Mrs. Frances Edmonds, who started the Historic Charleston Foundation back in 1947, has been a strong force in influencing the local banking community in Charleston. "The only loans that are turned down today," she declares, "are those applications from people whose eyes are bigger than their pocketbooks. Of course, it wasn't all that easy when we started the Ansonborough project, but now that properties have doubled and tripled in value, even fairly young people here can get very nice loans. Up until recently the banks preferred to lend money for conventional rehabilitation. They requested architect's plans and the contractor's contract, so they could give a combination mortgage based on the purchase price plus a construction loan, but now they're even ready to lend money to people who will do the bulk of the renovation themselves."

Miss Betty Gibson, president of the South End Historic Society in Boston, was one of the first to buy in the South End Continued on page 83

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
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
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The little-known bulbs

PART TWO

Last month in discussing some of the bulbous plants that are not widely used by American gardeners, we locked somewhat closely at anemones, Glory-ofthe-Snow (Chinondoxa), Colchicum, and Autumn-flowering crocus. This month we continue with this less-known group, then bow briefly, but warmly, to daffodils and tulips, the hit parade of the bulbous world.

ERANTHIS. This great genus of canely sprites, as you know, is commonly called Winter Aconite. It and Galanthus (Snowdrops) are the earliest of the spring-flowering bulbs and what gorgeous blankets of vellow Eranthis make! Eranthis are cheaper than dirt (less than a nickel by the thousand). They come from irregularly shaped tuberous roots that look like preces of old dried wood when you get them and if you are inexperienced you might throw them away. If they dislike being planted upside down, they don't seem to complain. Louise Beebe Wilder observed that her inclination was to push the delicate flowers of Winter Acomie back into the ground or cover them up, for they always seem to appear when spring weather can't be distinguished from winter. Plant Eranthis 3 inches deep and 4 inches apart in the shade of deciduous trees.

ERYTHRONBUM. 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

They are, however, taller than others, but nevertheless are rock garden or border plants, as are Thalia, Liberty Bells, Suzy, Trevithian, and April Tears, which are members of the dwarf group. These are a tribe apart so far as my feeling for them goes, best summed up in a single word: exquisite.

SCILLA. More gardeners should know Scilla sibirica, which asks for nothing except to be planted somewhere. It does not, however, spread as vigorously in turf as it does in more open earth-there, it goes rampant. In Connecticut gardens it runs a race with and sometimes, where protected, blooms a nose ahead of snow. drops. Yes, it will do better in a loamy, gritty, rich soil, but what bulbs do not? Sibirica is blue, S. alba obviously white; a hybrid called Spring Beauty is a large blue. S. tubergeniana, not a sibirica variety even though some catalogues list it as such, is silvery-white with a bluish undertone and very nice indeed. All are inexpensive enough to plant by the hundreds and if you are just starting with them a thousand is not too many, which probably proves that I am mighty cavalier with your money.

TULIPS. To those who have only seen big tulips, it may come as a surprise that there is a whole race of miniatures. It is, however, more likely that many gardeners have seen these nice little fellows since they have increased in popularity the last decade, but haven't recognized them as tulips. This is quite understandable because they don't look much like conventional tulips. They are properly called species tulips and there are many of them, but we are concerned here with the true miniatures among themspecies whose stems do not grow above 6 to 7 inches tall. Some times they are listed as Botanicals. However, in a list of Botanical tulips before me is Tulipa acuminata, which throws a 15 inch stem. Fosteriana Kaufman niana, and greigii, and their hy had abachassia botanicat. have sometic, with faller stems. but in calcut there species on cept the first there are real minuature. going for them that one does not find in Cottage Breeder, Dar win or the other conventional forms they live longer. You can get two good years out of the conventionals and cut flowers if you move the bulbs to the cutting garden, the third year. After that they are not worth growing But with the species and then hybrids you get four or five years of bloom-longer if they like their homes. A friend of mine natural ized some on a bank that was reasonably damp in the fall winter, and spring months but parched in summer. Because they have had a minimum of competition from grass, he has had wonderful results. Also, the conditions were those of their native lands the Caucasus and Turkey. I had always thought that tulips would look out of place naturalized, but that is because I had not seen them grown. that way. These looked fine. Species tulips, regardless of height, are all great rock garden plants; if you plant them in other areas, remember that a gritty, healthy loam and sun are then fare. And protection from wind.

TRADITION ACROSS

The inspiration for this issue is the growing interest in American traditions, in restoration and preservation that we find welling up across the country. There are many explanations for this ground swell.

One interesting opinion comes from writer Jane Jacobs, author of *The Economy of Cities*, who feels that the need for tradition is really a need for diversity.

> We need this interest in our past to preserve the variety and diversity of our lives and the lives of our cities; it's the diversity of cost, use, size,

life style—that's all important to the whole. It's impossible to create instant diversity in a city or in a life. But the restoration, on all levels, of old communities within modern cities satisfies our need for rich, mingled cities and personally for a kind of 'time' travel in which we can investigate the ways in which people in other periods chose to live their lives. There's nothing more rigid and escapist than someone who wants to live surrounded with things only of the current period. That's a fortress-

like attitude. A return to tradition is anything but negative, it's a very open, affirming attitude, affirming of our vitality, the vitality of cities.



We open the issue with a portfolio of beautiful historic houses, all historic landmarks, which would nevertheless qualify for today's living. Not that living with tradition means living in a museum. The rest of the issue is a scratch-the-surface manual of how to live with tradition in today's terms, what's beautiful in American tradition, what adapts well, what other people have done and what you can do about restoring whole communities while you're working on your own house. We've covered a Texas farmhouse restored to the original, furnished with natural materials, but equipped with modern conveniences; a modern house on the Monterey Pen insula, full of traditional and local crafts. lore; the story on community restorations of both public private buildings; plus young couples who choose to live in old houses because they cost less, are better made, afford more space for a family.

IHE VITALITY OF AMERICAN TRADITION

The renewed and growing interest in American tradition has inspired House & Garder to photograph a series of extraordinarily beautiful and varied historic houses, their furniture and decoration. The oldest house is dated 1719, the youngest, 1809. Built as far north as Portsmouth, New Hampshire, as far south as Charleston, South Carolina, each of the group is respected as an important landmark, as alive and welcoming today as it was when it was new. They are all open to the public under the auspices of historical societies that have been instrumental in their restoration and preservation. All could be lived in today with equal pleasure, comfort, and inspiration

If a sermon on the uses of the past were required, imber of appropriate texts lie ready to hand. One thinks of ana's celebrated "Those who forget the past are condemned eat it," and Maugham's "Tradition is a guide and not a jailer," est of all, Yeats's profound "How but in custom and in ceremony nocence and beauty born?" Plenty of texts, in short, but it out that no sermon or preacher is required—the congregation eady convinced. Indeed, it has leapt from its prison of pews or a good while now has been happily rummaging about in the obwebby attic of time past, raising clouds of dust, some of it n, in pursuit of those souvenirs and emblems of custom and ony that we keep fearing we may have misplaced or thrown unaware that in most cases our neglect of them is precisely has insured their preservation.

For it appears that something as opportune as it inexpected has happened, and it is this: that the nineteen-sevenre manifesting a greater interest in the usable past than the fifties attes ever did. Not in many decades, if ever, have we as a people egerly and wisely looked forward by dint of looking eagerly. to back. It is a feat that, as far as we know, only man among the animals is capable of performing, and when it succeeds it enhances life as little else can. To dip one's hand into the river of life not at one place only but at a hundred is a form of immortality; it will not outwit death but it helps to outwit the infuriating brevity of life. By an instructive irony, this extension of life, this joyous mingling of past and present, has occurred at the very moment when many of our graybeards were sourly asserting that young folk nowadays were bent upon throwing every baby of past virtue out with the bathwater of past evil. So much for the night-thoughts of graybeards! The fact is that the babies are thriving, and the bath-water . . . well, even the bath-water tends to look more wholesome than it did.

One test of a generality is its least likely application; among those young whom we think of as farthest out and therefore as most unregarding of the past we encounter, to our surprise, few of the conventional iconoclastic gestures of revolution. On the contrary, it is plain that they are attempting to create a new order out of what amounts to the sacred materials of the old. They are laying claim to an inheritance that their parents and even their grandparents were inclined to spurn. It is not the elderly and timid but the young and bold who are prising open the battered, whale-backed trunks of yesterday and bedecking themselves with ancestral trophies. For them, the past is no mere grim minatory skeleton at the feast of life; it is a jolly companion and the best of teachers. We observe this playful transformation of past into present in the costumes of the young, in their songs, their politics, their so-called "life-style." When a handsome young person approaches us along a street, it may be difficult at first to determine his or her sex behind the shift integral. and the game glasses and the melodious cinctures of " brass, but it is still more difficult to determine his or her place origin: The smiling apparition is ablaze with hints of the second the Moslem East, Christian Europe, Hindu India. predicted a few years ago that one of the most popular recordings of 1971 would be "Jesus Christ Superstar," or that a current off-Broadway hit would be a rock version of the Gospel according to St. Mat thew? Or that their food would be not that of Howard Johnson but of John the Baptist: sesame seed and honey and chickpeas and millet? Or that like Thoreau a hundred-odd years ago they would turn their backs on the demons of Progress, of Bigness, of Technological Prowess, and ask of any supposed improvement in our society not "How much richer will this make us?" but "How much harm will this do?" Not for them the grotesque urban din that signifies an ever-increasing Gross National Product; they listen for something infinitely nearer to old country pleasures, infinitely more delicious to the ear, saving with Blake, "Piper, pipe that tune again!" and, with Millav, "Earth, earth. I cannot get thee close enough!" Not for them to be always running faster, faster, faster, but to attain the effortless equilibrium of a fish in water, a bird in air, the uncanny stillness that remains "when hearts are full of their own sweetness, bodies of their loveliness."

There are fashions in traditions-what is a tradition, indeed, but a fashion that has lasted?—and it is obvious that certain traditions lend themselves much more readily to fashionable modifications than others do. In the case of clothing, a new material emerges (silk from the East, nylon from DuPont), and fresh possibilities in dress instantly establish themselves. In the case of food, the potato, brought from the New World, quickly alters the diet of Europe. In architecture, changes are notoriously slower-so slow that they are sometimes imperceptible to the very people who are engaged in bringing them about and who are seen long afterward to have opened the door of novelty by zealously seeking to keep it shut. Settlers in a new land, instead of responding to the importunate demands of a new climate, continue to honor the traditions of the land and climate they have left behind. 

Everything about the house on California's Monterey Peninsula that Kipp Stewart designed for himself and his wife has the look of rustic simplicity and, because Mr. Stewart is a furniture designer, the precision of fine furniture. The materials sprang from the earth herself: adobe bricks 18 inches thick for the groundfloor walls, native Monterey pine cut into rough siding for the second story. The Stewarts asked friends George Sidman, a carpenter-designer and stonemason, and George De Amaral to oversee the actual construction, but "we all worked on it."

The house has much of the flavor of the old California adobes. For all its simplicity, the house contains special places for everything the Stewarts are likely to do: for Mr. Stewart, an office-study, an artist's studio, a courtyard to sculpt in, and even a darkroom. For his wife, who is an accomplished craftsman and among friends a celebrated cook, a loom in the living room so she can work at it "whenever I like and as long as I like"; a big kitchen where she produces meals that are works of art; and a garden she calls her "garden of delight."


The Stewarts share their 2½ acres of pines, live oak trees, and daisy hedges with two black cats, a Labrador retriever called Bugs, a scramble of bright-feathered Bantam hens that cluck about in a pack, and a cow whose milk Mrs. Stewart turns into cheese. "Eight gallons make a wheel of Monterey Jack, a traditional cheese from back when the peninsula was dairy country."

"We've always lived apart from the city and its continual interruptions," says Mr. Stewart. "Yet there's nothing old fashioned about the way we live. It's just deciding what's most important."

The master bedroom, paneled ceiling and all of rough Monterey pine, is part of a bed-bath-dressing complex that consumes most of the second floor. Mr. Stewart designed the big pine-wood bed; his wife made the patchwork coverlet. The brass-piped stove once warmed a small ship, now throws a respectat for blustery evenings inland. Across stairhall is door to darkroom.

The two-story adobe and pine house stands at the skyward end of an eroding country road that twists up from the river below in Carmel Valley. Wild boar roam the hillsides that undulate northward to the mountains along the coast; the land is textured with eucalyptus, cypress, and Monterey pines, heather, and live oaks spreading in the sun. The house itself is set apart from the wildness by a man-made plateau bordered by white adobe walls - now low and curving, now high and secure - edged with daisies allowed to grow naturally in clumps. Looking from the south like a double shadow box, right, are the two-story entertaining terrace and beside it, the bed-and-bathroom balcony that serves as bathtub pavilion. Windows, soaring and broad, gaze down the valley in all directions, making the house a solitary lookout on a veryclose-to-primeval landscape of enduring magnificence.

The house is our home, and **the setting will be our paradise**. Everything we've planted will produce flowers, fruit, or fragrance"

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













HOUSE WITH THE WARMTH OF THE LAND

It's the **details that make the house a joy.** Something unexpected. Something we've made with our own hands"

First row, from left: Stairs are constructed of Monterey pine block 6-by-6-by-8 inches high, built on top of ordinary stair treads, then filled with polyurethane resin. In the stairway niche stands an old Mexican pottery vase, painted many times over, now peeling into a rainbow. Kitchen ceiling is covered with Spanish cane (the kind ordinarily used for templan, fendings attached to black plywood pain els. Bathtub. secondhand and painted blue to match the front door, stands on its own four feet on the balcony outside the bathroom. Inside the bath-dressing room, the pine counter is sealed with plastic, lighted by 25-watt bulbs. Second row, from left: t'pstairs study, with its "window" overlooking the living room, is equipped with work counter, deep drawers. The study's antique quatrefoil window. set in a deep windowbox reveal, was once the upper section of an old Dutch door. Inside. its frame is white lacquer. Outside, the window is set in a face of slate blue to match the front door directly below it. Downstairs floor is entirely paved with cross sections of Monterey pine 6-by-6-by-2 inches deep, laid in sand on a concrete slab like a huge mosaic of malachite-only brown. To seal it and give it a dance-floor gloss, polyurethane resin was used. Blue and white shower's hand-made Mexican tiles are brilliantly skylit, share their glow with the bath area. Towel bars are fat pipes painted white. Third row, from left: Migh wall that encloses the swimming pool area corners to form one wall of the tiny guesthouse-a single bedroom and bath often used as a cabana as well. In time, a good part of the walls will be tapestried with ever-green, ever-flowering vines like passion vine, kiwi fruit, Burmese honeysuckle, roses, and espaliered trees. L-shaped pool. 75 feet long, is lined with charcoal gray plaster to give the water a deeper color. Courtgard within the adobe walls will soon be covered with crushed granite the color and texture of coarse golden sand. In the sandy strip between house and pool, young eucalyptus and pittosporum. To the right, in view of the dining room, a grove of olives. And to the left, in the vegetable garden behind the house, citrus trees that flourish in the doubled warmth of sun reflected off the stark white walls of the house. Bottom row, from left: Bull's eye porthole. a window in the guesthouse bath, was rimmed for fun with bright emerald green paint. Beneath the stairhall window, glass angles outward to form skylight for the garden-tool and laundry room below. Windouxeat in hall, covered with Indian panels and appliqué.


HOUSE WITH THE WARMTH OF THE LAND continued For all its charm, the kitchen, *right*, is a real cook's kitchen for a no-nonsense cook who grows the vegetables, makes the cheese, and fixes pasta from scratch in the "noodle machine." Appliances and cabinets are painted black. Open shelves hold bowls and baskets; other supplies are kept in a commodious pantry-closet nearby.

Mrs. Stewart's corner of the living room, above, is furnished largely with her loom, which now holds the beginning of a macramé sampler she's working on. Clustered about: umbrella swifts, a warping reel, baskets of materials.

On the adobe-paved entertaining terrace, *below left*, guests are sheltered by thick white walls, treated to a view.

In Mr. Stewart's studio corner, *below right*, the twostory window angles at the bottom to let light in longer, form wider counter space. In the adobe block that supports the counter is a big bin for art supplies. Beside the built-in bookshelves, an African hanging made of 4-inch vertical strips sewn together. On the floor, a painting by Mr. Stewart.

Five experts with special insight into the psychology of tradition—a psychologist, a socio-anthropologist, a historian, and two antiquarians—give some illuminating information on this interesting subject.

Some people turn their backs on tradition. What causes this? "There's a bit of rebellion there, either from parents or society," explains Dr. Robert Tyson, a psychologist at the City University, New York. "But it's perfectly common and expected for some young people to reject the symbols they grew up with. They think about what the tradition stands for and whether they want it or need it. They find some traditional ideas don't make sense any more. And then they begin to build up new traditions of their own."

But at any time in life, we may want to change the atmosphere in which we live, to turn over a new leaf. We deliberately discard old memories. "People need and want symbols that verify their feelings. They create an environment to mirror their beliefs and ideas. It's perfectly natural," Dr. Tyson continues. "All the same most people feel happiest living in a traditional atmosphere and there are sound reasons for this. It has a very positive effect on our emotional well-being. Being surrounded by tradition gives us a feeling of continuity, of being able to reach back, of belonging. Tradition makes us feel good, happy, tranquil, and contented. And we can feel proud and patriotic, too, when we remember the historical associations. Human beings are conservative. When something has worked out and it's reasonably congenial we tend to keep it. It seems sensible not to exchange it for something we don't know."

THE VAN LIEWS IN PROVIDENCE

"We felt we would miss the best part of Providence if we'd bought or built in a suburb—

we're not from here and it would have been silly to miss the special quality of Benefit Street." What the Alfred Van Liews got when they bought a Victorian house 111 years old were lots of big rooms with high ceilingsbasically two floors with four rooms each, all centered around a large hallway—mahogany moldings and paneling, beautiful old brass and a feeling of permanence. "Some of these big Victorian houses frighten people," says Mr. Van Liew, "They're more of an unknown financially and esthetically than the colonial or Greek revival styles.

For us, this house was better suited to the present needs of the family."

Though trustees of the Providence Preservation Society, which has been responsible for protecting and restoring Benefit Street, the most historic section of Providence, the Van Liews bought then house out of more than just a love of history and tradition. "We did the house purely for ourselves, it wasn't just to be altruistic or a desire to live in a museum. For the money we could spend, this house had more of a feeling of craftsmanship and quality than moviling word backd for ourselves. In addition,

Another aspect appealing to Mrs. Van Liew is that this brick house is much easier to clean that the frame one. When the Van Liews bought the house it was structurally sound but very dark. The plumbing was shot and there was a stream of water running down the stan vay. They painted everything white, gutted the old kitchen and made it into a two-car garage, put a new kitchen where the old dining room was, rewired, put in new plumbing, heating, and air conditioning. They used an architect for stress drawings and the how-to of routing pipe through solid brick inner walls, putting air conditioning and heating conduits under the floors. say the Rufus C. Barkleys, whose family has lived in Charleston for generations. Built in 1772 for the Agent of Indian Affairs who fled several years later with the start of the Revolution, this graceful old house is situated in Charleston's old walled town. "There's no land to build a new house in this part of town," according to the Barkleys who'd just rather not move off the Charleston Peninsula.

Largely restored by a previous owner, the house is one room and a hallway deep, with two side porches opening onto a moderately formal garden of azaleas, camellias, dogwood, mock orange.

Furnishing the interior of their houses with antiques of the period is as important to many Charlestonians as the precise restoration of the outside.

"Since Charleston is an eighteenth-century city, it seems logical to furnish a house with antiques.

When we travel we're always hunting for furniture, it's relaxation for us. We inherited furniture from our families but have accumulated once thus on our own we recorry proud of. The hardest thing to find is local period furniture, the clock in the front hall is one of four in existence, made exactly at the form of the house. The highle way the hving room is a Chippendale piece from Philadelphia, the big secretary in the same room to local made around 1790

Other than furnishing the house, a process that still isn't finished,

it took the Barkleys two years to modernize the house.





Because the Hills have three sons, they needed more room, and got it with the help of designconsultant Albert Keidel, a man with a passion for the old local houses and the skill to update them with no! loss of character. For example, he complemented the limestone of the old house with board and bat ten exterior walls for the new wing, thus pairing two materials as completely compatible as a friendly brace of country neighbors.

New wing, left, with its sloping roof consists of one big room for living and dining with the east end devoted to quite a sizable open kitchen. The limestone wall is the original north wall of the old house, sandblasted to remove a nell of cement, and thick enough to hold the new fireplace -an auxiliary broiler wide enough to grill a steak of truly Texan stature. 

Bluegate's Chocolate

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Drinks that bloom with Fruit and Howers

Possibly because my mind is a totally unscientific one, it boggles rather easily at the suggestion that "textured soya" might be palatable enough to replace real food and drink. But I like the almost equally boggling proposition—that fruit and flowers are marvelous to use for flavoring all sorts of beverages (not to mention food).

One of the simplest, easiest, and potentially healthiest summer drinks to make is **Fruit Punch.** Your basic requirement is a pile of fruit—peaches, apricots, strawberries—sliced or otherwise readied for eating and placed in a big bowl or jug. You then pour over enough white wine to cover and soak for 2 or 3 hours. It is always wise to soak fruit, if it is used for punch, in a small amount of the liquor so that it absorbs the taste and blends with whatever else you add.

In this case you add several bottles of the same white wine, about $\frac{1}{4}$ of that amount of vodka, a glass of some sweet liqueur if you like, and sugar to taste. Just before serving, pour the punch over a big chunk of ice. Serve the liquid, not the soaked fruit. Float borage or nasturtiums in the punch bowl, and add slices of unsoaked fruit to each glass.

As I age, a process not so entrancing in humans as in wines, incidentally, I like my drinks longer, pinker, greener, cooler, and less alcoholic. So I retreat behind a sort of **instant fruit cup** in my more careful moods. This consists of $\frac{1}{3}$ red wine, $\frac{1}{3}$ orange juice, and $\frac{1}{3}$ club soda. It looks rather exotic, tastes good, and helps you seem neither unfriendly nor too teetotally.

Of course, any drink made with fruit or fruit juices can be alcoholic, too, if laced with the appropriate firewater. Take **Doogh**, for instance, a drink the people of the Middle East imbibe during the long, hot desert summers. Peel a cucumber (about 4 inches of one will do) and purée it in the blender or extract juice in an orange squeezer. Strain into a tall glass, add 1 cup of yoghurt, ice, top with club soda, add salt to taste, stir, sprinkle with mint if desired, and serve. The result is a lovely pale greenish-white affair that is very refreshing and not sweet. If you want it stronger, add vodka to taste.

For another good, short, cucumber drink, use 2 jiggers cucumber juice, 1 jigger vermouth, a glassful of vodka, and some slices of cucumber. Mix the liquors, pour in the juice, add ice, and stir. Serve with 1 or 2 cucumber slices floating on top.

Often made with a slice of cucumber or a sprig of borage to garnish it is **Pimm's No. 1 Cup.** which has a gin base. However, at London's exclusive Hurlingham Tennis Club, Charles, the barman, has his own formula. He uses 1 or 2 jiggers of Pimm's, a slice of orange, 1 of lemon, a maraschino cherry if you like, and a sprig of mint. The cup is then filled with ice and lemonade to wet the parched gullets of the players.

In India an eye appealing summer drink is made by floating various kinds of nonalcoholic liquids in varicolored layers in a big class pitcher, or in individual glasses. On the bottom goes grenadine, then carefully pour in layers of black currant juice, orange juice,



Cover and barely simmer for an hour. Strain, reserving liquid. Add bread crumbs and butter to the mixture and season with salt and pepper to taste. Simmer the mixture gently for 20 minutes. Stir in the cream and serve immediately.

Potato and Sausage Dish

As long as you have plenty of sausages on hand, even frozen, this useful dish can be expanded to feed last minute guests, for the ratio of potatoes to sausage doesn't matter.

Chocolate Mousse

6 squares semisweet chocolate
2½ tablespoons very strong instant coffee
6 eggs, separated
Whipped cream, optional
Grated chocolate, optional
Melt chocolate over very low

heat with coffee.

Beat egg yolks a little. When chocolate is melted, remove from heat and stir in yolks. Beat egg whites until very stiff and fold into chocolate mixture.

Turn into a soufflé dish and refrigerate. If desired, decorate top with a thin layer of whipped cream and grated chocolate design. Serves 6.

NOTE: This is really a very easy and quick chocolate mousse. It can be made in equal proportions of eggs to chocolate squares: i.e., 2 eggs to 2 chocolate squares up to 8—it doesn't work with more than 8, for some reason. In cool weather, leave outside overnight to chill.

Apple Pudding

Green cooking apples (enough to fill a 9-by-4-inch baking dish) 3 tablespoons lemon juice 1/4 cup water 1 cup sugar 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon salt 6 tablespoons butter Heavy cream

Peel, core, and slice apples and arrange in baking dish. Sprinkle on lemon juice and water. Mix half the sugar with cinnamon and sprinkle over apples. Mix remannice summ with flour and salt and work with butter until crumbly. Spread over apples and month other spoon.

Bale no. a 355 oven for 10 minutes. Serve with cream. Serve 6.

Prune Soufflé

1/2 pound pitted prunes Tea 1/2 cup sugar Lemon puice

4 egg whites Whipped cream flavored with brandy

Stew the prunes in tea until soft. Add the sugar and mix well, and put through a coarse sieve. Add a little lemon juice. Beat the egg whites until stiff and fold into prune mixture. Turn into a soufflé dish. Put dish in a pan of warm water and bake in a 360° oven for 25 minutes or 380° oven for 20 minutes. (Soufflé can be left in turned off oven for several minutes without spoiling.) Serve with brandied whipped cream. Serves 6.

NOTE: This soufflé can also be made with dried apricots, cooked in water instead of tea.

Ho's Cobbler

1/2 cup butter
1 cup flour
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup milk
2 cups canned blackberries with juice

Preheat oven to 375°. Melt butter in a large baking dish. Sift flour, sugar, and baking powder into a bowl. Add milk and mix well. Heat blackberries in their juice. Pour the batter over the melted butter. Do not stir. Pour hot blackberries over batter. Do not stir. Bake until batter creeps to the top of the baking dish and forms a brown crust, about 30 minutes. Serves 6.

Star's Heart of Cream

8-ounce package cream cheese 1/2 cup sugar Vanilla essence 1/2 pint heavy cream, whipped Fresh strawberries Fresh Strawberry Sauce (see recipe below)

Mash cream cheese with the sugar and a few drops of vanilla until smooth. Fold in the whipped cream. Turn into a mold, preferably heart shaped. Refrigerate at least 1 hours. I nmold, decorate top with strawherries and serve with Fresh Strawberry Sauce, Serves 6. Fresh Strawberry Sauce 1 pint strawberries 1 2.3 4 cup superfine sugar Juice of 1/2 lemon Juice of 2 oranges 1/4 cup water Reserve the best strawberries to decorate the cream. Slice the rest and mix with the sugar, lemon

juice, orange juice, and water. Do not cook. Pour some over the cream just before serving and serve the rest separately.

The Ultimate Sacher Torte

This dessert was invented because Star Duwyenie thought the cake part of Sacher Torte never seemed gooey enough. He came up with this idea of simply 2 layers of icing with filling in the middle.

1 pound sweet chocolate 1 cup milk 6 egg yolks, beaten

1 pound unsalted butter, softened Apricot jam, slightly heated and put through a sieve

Bring milk and chocolate to a boil in a saucepan and stir until chocolate is melted. Remove from heat and cool slightly.

Add egg yolks and butter alternately in very small amounts. Pour into 2 cake pans 9 inches in diameter, completely lined with aluminum foil. Refrigerate for 6 hours. Turn one layer out onto a chilled plate and peel off foil. Cover with a layer of the sieved apricot jam. Refrigerate 1 hour.

Turn the second layer out on top, peel off the foil. Use a warm knife to cut into wedges. Serves 6.

Iced Cheese

Small whole ripe Brie 1 cup heavy cream 3 tablespoons freshly grated Parmesan cheese Salt, freshly ground pepper Cayenne Paprika

Remove the rind from the Brie and blend cheese with cream, Parmesan, and salt, pepper, cayenne, and paprika to taste. Turn into a round plastic food container and refrigerate 3 hours. Turn out onto a folded napkin. Serve with warm Euphrates wafers, water biscuits, or matzos, and use a hot knife for cutting.

area six years ago. Even as a Realtor – a member of the National Association of Real Estate Boards – working with finance, she only got her mortgage, she recalls "under protest. In Boston about the only way you can go about renovating is to take out a second, purchase money mortgage from the seller. My house was \$16,000; I got a \$12,000 mortgage from the bank, \$2,000 purchase money mortgage from the seller, and put in \$2,000 myself. It's worth \$40,000 now. The mortgage situation has been terrible, but I think you can say we're enjoying a breakthrough now. I've been used to shopping for mortgages at ten or fifteen banks, but this week I got a conventional loan for a client for 80 percent of the purchase price."

A WORD ABOUT TAXES

Renovation can bring some financial jolts later on. In all areas where substantial improvements have been made, taxes on properties have been increased. "In Providence," says Mrs. William Allen, president of the Rhode Island Heritage Foundation, "taxes have been increased five times. It's sad that people are penalized in this way for restoring and helping to improve a run-down neighborhood. It's very shortsighted of government. It ought to be the other way around, people should get some benefits, taxes ought to be reduced, but I suppose we have to recognize the fact that government just doesn't recompense people for being good."

One person who is working energetically to reverse this state of affairs, is Mr. Richard Jenrette, president of Donaldson, Lufkin and Jenrette. Inc., the Wall Street investment banking firm, who is also chairman of the Financial Subcommittee of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, in Washington. Mr. Jenrette is actively involved in preservation, owns two Greek revival houses, one along the Hudson Valley in New York and one in Charleston, S. C., and has, with partners, recently reconstructed the Mills Hvatt House, a 250room Victorian hotel in Charleston. "We need tax breaks, we need tax incentives from the federal government." he says. "I am hopeful that the government will adopt a stronger policy about preservation," he says. "There is nothing that cannot be changed. In the meantime, local communities can start initiating their own city legislation, they can start working to get new tax assessments on restored property. I am interested in adaptive uses of buildings. Instead of making museums out of old buildings, giving them some commercially viable usage. A company is allowed to have tax breaks on plant and equipment, why not on historic property? I see this whole restoration mood as a way of restimulating the economy. Opening up and publicizing historic communities will bring prosperity, help fight the current recession. Some of the most important structures that should be saved are in economically depressed areas. Now that defense costs are being cut back, the government could initiate a specific program that would make sense."

Meanwhile, the National Trust is planning to raise \$10million so that it can lend sums to local groups. "This is a drop in the bucket compared to what's needed, but it's a step in the right direction," Mr. Jenrette continued. "What I would like to see is a government loan of \$100-million at 1 percent to the revolving fund of the National Trust. We're caught up in the environmental spirit. Almost every city has old Colonial buildings: I'm hopeful that the bicentennial celebrating independence will inspire people to start looking into their town's past and preserve interesting old architecture."

HOW TO RENEW FURNITURE LIKE AN EXPERT

Quite often furniture simply needs refurbishing instead of refinishing. Perhaps the hardware is tarnished, or a scratch has marred an otherwise unflawed finish. Perhaps a piece simply needs cleaning and rewaxing, or needs a fabric or paper lining in a niche or drawers replaced. House & Garden visited Thomas Principe, manager of Antique Furniture Restorers Corporation in New York, and watched him refresh a fine desk from tip to toe. With the same care that has attracted private clients and top interior designers to his shop for twenty years, he illustrated techniques you can use at home.





1. TO CLEAN HARDWARE: Remove metal handles and escutcheons carefully with a screwdriver or pliers. If the hardware is gold plated (likely on fine French or Italian antiques), gently clean the piece with a fine, soft toothbrush dipped in a solution of ammonia and water in equal parts. Do not soak. Rinse immediately with fresh water and dry with cheesecloth. If the hardware is brass (likely on English and French antiques), submerge hardware in solution of ammonia and water, in equal parts, and soak for ½ hour. Use only a plastic or glass container. If brass doesn't come clean, resoak for 24 hours. Take out a piece at a time and rub lightly with 0000 steel wool dipped in same solution. When piece gleams, rinse in clear water. Dry with clean cheesecloth, Rub again with dry (not wet) 0000 steel wool, and buff with dry cheesecloth, being sure

to brush away any remaining steel wool or dust. Place cleaned pieces on a protected surface in a well-ventilated area and apply a thin coat of lacquer spray such as clear gloss Factual Finish with a fanning motion. Respray in about ten minutes, again a light coat, to be sure each piece has been entirely covered with lacquer. Let dry one hour. The result is a protection for brass that will last for years and can always be removed by soaking 24 hours in ammonia and water. NOTE: Don't apply lacquer on a damp day—it may turn whitish. If hardware is brass-plated cast iron (likely on reproductions) and tarnished, restoration of gleam is impossible. Costly replating or buying new hardware are options, or you might soak the hardware first in ammonia and water to see if you get a smooth pewter-like look. This low luster finish can be quite handsome.



2. TO CLEAN A WOOD SURFACE: Dip 0000 steel wool into a solution of benzine and crude oil in equal parts. Apply with the grain in a back and forth motion (use same motion for burl). Rub dry with clean cheesecloth. Take care to remove all possible oil on piece. Keep cloth folded evenly, and do a section at a time. . TO REPAIR SCRATCHES AND SMALL HOLES: A blending stick is adequate for scratches. Stick comes in light or dark mahogany, walnut, or natural. For holes, use a hard wax stick in the shade closest to your piece. Put a small chunk of this tinted wax on a wedge, such as a dowel or orangewood stick, and force it into the crevice. Remove exwax with wedge, and buff with dry cheesecloth until wax is totally red from the smooth surface. iff so hard that the wax m lie the clonico 1. to wax: Use a mixture of commentation to inperior in sub-Wo ---- the ----- of followed dry 5 minutes. 5. TO LINE DRAWERS, SHELVES, OR NICHES WITH FABRIC OR DECORATIVE PAPER: Place a piece of tissue paper or newspaper on surface to be lined and trace outline with your thumbnail. Carefully cut this pattern out and lay it on a piece of cardboard of poster weight, about 3/16-inch thick. With a pencil, draw around the pattern, then use a matt knife or razor to cut the cardboard to the precise shape. You now have a templet. Test templet dimensions by putting it into drawer or on inner panel of door. Trim if needed. Place decorative lining or fabric on paper face down on a table, templet over it, and cut around with scissors, allowing an extra inch for fold over. Make 1-inch cuttings an inch apart in the fold allowance. Glue tab cuttings onto cardboard templet. Use a white water-based glue that is easy to remove in case you need to pull fabric or paper tighter to eliminate wrinkles. Place lining in desired position. To bree vertical surfaces, use a few tiny finishing nails to hold the covered cardboard in place. A decorative braid or ribbon edang can be glued over the finishing nails if you desire.

Traders who bought some of the land from William Penn. Here in 25 square blocks including almost 700 historic houses in an area adjacent to Independence Hall and the Libertv Bell, twentieth-century living has been happily matched to eighteenthcentury charm. The area is mostly residential and, keeping company amiably, are authentic Colonial restorations, careful reproductions, and some contemporary houses sympathetic in scale and materials to the old houses. With architectural control, there are shops, apartments, and urban spaces, which create a felicitous present-day way of life. So this is not a museum setting. 7 Brick walkways connect the old streets; and street furniture, such as signs and street lamps, matches the architectural style. 8. 9. 10. **11.12** New playgrounds, public gardens, and pocket parks expand the community life as do a row of shops that face Head House, the restored 1745 public market whose Colonial character they echo. 13 In seaside Cape May, N. J., not far from Philadelphia, large-scale historic preservation is also contemplated. The whole town of some 1,325 acres, a treasure trove of wooden Victorian houses, iced like wedding cakes with curlicue gingerbread trim, was recently added, at one fell swoop, to the National Register of Historic Places. Two enterprising individuals accomplished this. A 70-acre area in the heart of the town is already designated Victorian Village. I In Providence, R. I., the resfunction of some 250 houses largely through the efforts of the Providence Preservation Society, has insured the quality of the environment in the College Hill area close to Brown University. Now a National Landmuck the community illustrates the harmonious effect of streets where preservation has kept houses compatible in scale, materials, and character.

Civic expansion in a big way often means instant demolition of the irreplaceable past. But in Boston some important historic buildings, both public and private, have been saved, restored, and brought into meannight relation to the most advanced new twentieth-century structures. One is the Sears Crescent building, **15.** a before-1850, red brick, quadrant like commercial building, while the the town's nineteenth-century book center and housed the early reformist paper, The Christian Freeman. Now, adroitly restored, it contains restaurants and offices and equably faces Boston's protean new City Hall across the new nine acre brick square. Nearby also is the 1865 former City Hall, 16. whose Napoleon III exterior has been restored and its interior completely remodeled for contemporary office use. Both buildings are now self supporting, tax paying landmarks brought back to life.

use. By purchase and rehabilitation, houses, commercial structures, a neighborhood are restored for private occupation. Another group, "Strawbery Banke, Inc.," is a restoration and educational organization with 10 acres and twenty-five historic lumses grouped in diffarea established in 1630. The Supher Chase house, 17. Governor Goodwin mansion, Captain John Clark house and others are here and open to the public to illustrate the way of life of our forebears. Some of the houses undergoing reconstruction are firsthand exhibits of the processes and problems of restoration.

In the Midwest, the small town of New Harmony, Ind., traces its origins to two sects, the Harmonites in 1814, the Owenites in 1824. Their utopian ideals and simple living patterns are reflected in their houses and streets, a setting preserved almost intact from the nineteenth century. A typical scene, the road to the poet's house is illustration, 18. Another model town, built from scratch on the prairie about 1880, was Pullman, Ill., now part of Chicago. It was the creation of George M. Pullman of the Pullman Palace Car Co. Given an 1896 award at Prague as "the world's most perfect town" it still exists and is undergoing restoration. Its concept was as all embracing as any town planning today. The community plan and urban design, by architect and landscape architect, covered 4,000 acres along Lake Calumet. Residential areas, free of all traffic, were established away from industry. A belt of open recreational space ringed the town; public and commercial structures were handy but apart from the homes Individual buildings included a clock tower, churches, a hotel, a glass-roofed, 90-foot-high Arcade (really a nineteenth-century shopping center) not unlike Naples' Galleast in concept. Condemned to make way for the Ozark Expressway some years ago, the handsome 122year-old Greek Revival mansion was saved and restored through the efforts of Landmarks, Inc., the A.I.A., and other organizations and individuals.

At Greenbush, Wis., in the State Park, the restoration of a nineteenth-century inn, Old Wade House, **21**, and nearby Butternut House, the home of the innkeeper's in-laws, present a good rendition of stagecoach days in the Midwest. There's a Carriage Museum of historic vehicles here also and, in other parts of the state, four other historic sites of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

Adobe and redwood, used for the walls of the Casa Amesti in Monterey, 22. are the traditional materials of California. Begun in 1843, this house was enlarged by Don Jose Amesti in 1846 including the characteristic Monterey balcony. Handsomely furnished by its last private owner, the interior designer Frances Elkins, and with beautiful formal gardens by her brother, architect David Adler, the house now belongs to The National Trust. Preserved as a historic house it also serves the present as quarters for the Capital Club of Monterey. An excellent eye view of early California in the Mission, Mexican, and early American periods of state history is San Juan Bautista near Monterey county. The 1797 Mission, the nineteenth-century houses, gardens, hotel and Plaza have been effectively restored.

Finally, down in San Antonio, Tex., historic buildings were brought back to life dramatically. Twenty-four vintage structures including Victorian, Mexican, early Texan, in the downtown district were included in the Civic Center Urban Reregal Project. this is the place to be, the center of civilization, of growth, of scientific and industrial exploration. This leads to an appreciation of the whole history of the country, of the traditions that have made it what it is today."

"Some people want to get away from their parents and get away from who they are in that way," says Dr. Lionel Tiger, a Professor of anthropology at Rutgers University, author of Men in Groups and co-author of a forthcoming book The Imperial Animal. "But there is in America the notion that you should remake yourself, that you should keep forging ahead, that you become perfect if you constantly improve yourself." When this urge to change and to remake has been applied to architecture, Dr. Tiger concedes, it has not always been for the good. "Some modern forms of architecture are contra-indicated in terms of the human being-the highrise when it's used for housing, for example. We are very small scale animals, we probably developed in small groups of thirty to fifty, so we don't respond to a vast regiment of neighbors. Look at your own life, if you know twenty or thirty people closely that is a lot, then there are probably thirty more you care about professionally, the rest you don't know. In suburbia, on the other hand, we may sometimes be too spaced out, too isolated. There really hasn't been a good solution for living since the row house that comes right up to the sidewalk. The density of population is very agreeable. It's an extraordinarily good invention for the community, especially when it is combined with a square or a communal garden behind the houses. It's a perfect combination, in fact, of the private and the public. It's a pity, though, that they are no longer being used for the extended family for which they were originally built. Our current way of life involves a highly specialized family structure. It's very exotic in one sense, the amount of kinvisiting that goes on the mobility is quite spectacular. But when it's difficult for children to have contact with more than one generation, it probably reduces then sense of security.

Mr. Ronald de Silva, the Early American antiques expert at Parke Bernet, has seen the enthusiasm for tradition reflected in sales at the gallery, where re-

cently an Early American highboy fetched a record \$102,000. "Ten years ago," he admits, "Americans were still rejecting American arts, they were more stimulated by European objects, but now it's all changed. They're not rushing off to Europe, rejecting their heritage and adopting everything in Europe. Todav an eighteenth-century piecrust table made in New York will fetch \$12,000 against \$700 for an English one. Why? Simply because it's rare and one of a kind handcraft. There's a whole new generation of collectors, young people whose parents bought English or French furniture. What do they appreciate about American pieces? I wouldn't be in this field if I didn't think it was the most superior furniture in the world. They feel this, too. We have always been a practical people-we have come to see that old things are practical and unique and beautiful, too. The construction of old furniture is honest and this honesty is very attractive. American cabinetmakers, particularly, were away from the design sources, they were out of the mainstream so their lines and proportions may be wildly out of line, but quite unique. In the faults lies an attraction, which can be very satisfying. Today when I am advising young people what to collect, I tell them to buy Empire made between 1820 and 1840. There are still some bargains and some of the top antique dealers are storing it away in barns all over the country. They predict it is going to come into its own in the next ten years.

American paintings, too, are receiving fresh appreciation. Mr. Rudy Wunderlich, the art dealer and Director of Kennedy Galleries who has quietly devoted twenty years to collecting unpopular American artists for the sheer beauty of their work, suddenly finds they are of great value and in demand by his customers. "Why have I specialized in American art? I think one reason is that these artists give a true representation of America, and this is the only record there is to show how the country developed. Nobody was out in the West in 1835 photographing the Indian, but some artists painted the scenes from real life. I find these subjects very romantic and quite unique. With our current ecological interest has come a new realization of the wealth of talent and righness in our land."

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
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ROUNDCOVER UNDER FILLES needs a shot in the arm when hot, dry weather clamps down. This is when voracious tree roots, reach-

ing for every available drop of water, leave weaker-rooted plants parched and wilting. A top dressing of humus with a little fertilizer added, plus thorough watering, will start new roots and lusty growth of the groundcover plants. Don't overdo it, though, since the tree roots will also creep up and demand their share of the feeding. Best way to keep both trees and groundcover thriving is to feed and water the tree, too, but out at the branch tip line where the greatest number of feeder roots grow. Use a sub-surface irrigator or punch holes with a crowbar or soil auger to get the water and plant nutrients down to where the roots are. This treatment will help to keep them down where they belong.

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HE FINE ART OF JAPANESE GARDEN **DESIGN** has an endless fascination, whether your interest is esthetics. horticulture, or labor-saving practicality. Although numberless books on the subject have appeared in the past, Japanese Stone Gardens by Kazuhiko Fukuda is the latest and undoubtedly the best word. It includes photographs of several gardens, old and new, with stones ranging in size from gravel to boulders. He also tells how to select, arrange and set the stones. (Charles E. Tuttle Co., Rutland, Vt., 05701, \$22.50.)

BROWN PATCHES IN THE LAWN at this time of year may be caused by cinch bugs. To find out, pull up a fair-sized pinch of the dead grass and drop it on a piece of paper. The insects will fall onto the paper where you can see them. Some are tiny—about 1/16 inch long—and red. Others are about 1/4 inch long, black with transparent wings. A spray containing Sevin, applied according to the manufacturer's instructions, will polish them off in short order, but it may be necessary to reseed the patch of grass they have been living on. As a preventive measure in spring, rake up and burn any patches of dead grass that may have been cinch bug infested the previous year. Sevin, incidentally, decomposes quickly. Applied to a lawn, it cannot harm bees or other beneficial insects.

EXPERIMENTING WITH FERTILIZER MIXES CAN BE VERY INSTRUCTIVE. INSTEAD OF 5-10-5, 10-10-10, and such standard formulations, other combinations are sometimes better for particular kinds of plants or unusual soil conditions. Possible combinations of the three basic elements are practically limitless, of course, but the makers of hyponex plant food are offering a range of mixes that should satisfy the experimental urge of practically anyone. Their beginner's assortment has ten different formulations in $\frac{3}{4}$ -ounce packets. Larger quantities of all ten, plus several others, are also available. The ten-packet kit is \$1.90 (plus 50c handling charge if your total order adds up to less than \$5) by mail from the hydroponic chemical co., inc., copley, ohio, 44321, or you can buy it at your local garden supply shop.

THE LEAVES OF TREES ABSORB MORE POLLUTANTS than the roots, according to experiments at Boston University. Strontium 90. particularly. is absorbed from the air much more quickly than from the soil. Lead. too. seems to be quickly absorbed by leaves. This is why the leaves are the first part of a plant to show signs of pollution damage. It also makes us realize more than ever how important plants are in keeping the air breathable for people.



ONSERVATION BEGINS AT HOME, and nobody is better aware of this than John Vosburgh, who has been in the forefront of the movement for en-

vironmental quality for many years. In his book *Living with Your Land* (Scribner's, \$6.95), Mr. Vosburgh takes up the problems that anyone buying land, with or without a house, must take into account, such as ground water, drainage, and settling of soil. He talks about wildlife, plant and animal, and has sensible words to say about the creatures some people find scary for no good reason—skunks, for instance. He tells how to attract birds, discourage squirrels, and live in harmony with nature and your neighbors. Mr. Vosburgh provides implementation for his sage advice in a special section telling where to find the advice, assistance, and material you need.
