



A gorgeous coffee table book on the work of architect Byoung Cho will be available starting January 28.

Widely considered Korea's most important architect, Byoung Cho has created iconic buildings, art and cultural centers, schools, health

facilities, and residences in Korea, Malaysia, Japan, and the United States. He is the recipient of Korea's major architectural awards and has been a visiting lecturer at Harvard and Columbia universities. Influenced by Korea's rich aesthetic tradition, Cho uses understated forms to design buildings that offer powerful yet subtle experiences for their inhabitants. The 1954 Walter and Edith Johnson House in Darien CT, aka the Dogtrot House, was designed by <u>Edward Durell Stone</u> and has been lovingly maintained over the decades by just two owners. This was Stone's final work to outwardly emulate Wrightian detailing, a practice that began with Stone's visit to <u>Taliesin</u> in 1940. The owner needs our help.
