



For years, Susan Smith longed for a beach house where she could hang out with and entertain family and friends.

Her husband, Jay, wasn't so keen on the idea. A second house, he reasoned, wouldn't be relaxing: It would mean more work and responsibility.

But when they discovered Georgia's Sea Island, an idyllic, ride-your-bike-everywhere community within a comfortable driving distance from their Atlanta home, his doubts dissolved.

"Sea Island is beautifully remote and beautifully not remote at the same time," Susan says. "It's a quiet residential area in a hotel setting."

Originally, the Smiths were going to expand and renovate the existing house, but after consulting Bulent Baydar, the principal architect in Harrison Design's Atlanta office, they decided to erect a new house.

His team, in collaboration with the firm's St. Simons Island office, executed the design, and Joe Bowles Construction, based in St. Simons Island, Georgia, built it.

The couple added one large caveat: They wanted to preserve the live oaks that dot the 1.2-acre wooded property and to take advantage of the views of the marsh.

"Most of the trees are over 100 years

old," Susan says, adding that "it's a house of the trees."

The L-shaped farmhouse weaves around the live oaks, including the magnificent one outside the living/dining area that is the centerpiece of the home's original wooden deck.

Although Sea Island requires residences to be in a traditional style, the Smiths envisioned a more contemporary aesthetic, which is why the Harrison team decided to design a farmhouse that "creates the impression of generational architecture" that evolved over time, Baydar says.

"We wanted a place where we can kick back and relax," Susan says. "And we didn't want it to look like our main house, which is traditional. We wanted clean lines and lots of windows to take in the great vistas."

The materials Harrison Design selected—masonry, wood, and glass—define three distinct yet complementary time periods in the farmhouse's fabricated past.

As a gesture to history, the contemporary farmhouse is erected around a new massive, open wall of masonry with a chimney that looks as though it's from a much earlier structure. The so-called "older" elements of its façade are defined by a subtle tabby stucco treatment, whose stenciled grooves mimic cut stone, a rustic feature.

The farmhouse, which is clad in five-inch







clapboard siding and has a standing-seam metal roof and wooden purlins, gets its contemporary edge from dramatic glass A-frames.

The L shape of the house allowed Baydar and his team to continue the illusion of a compound that had, indeed, been created over generations.

The L's one-story long leg, the more traditional section of the farmhouse, has vaulted ceilings and contains the major rooms—the living/dining area, the primary suite, the family room, the kitchen, the office, and the screened porch, which is illuminated by a clerestory window in its cupola.

Sleek steel doors and windows, another slightly more contemporary touch, create an indoor-outdoor air.

The shorter, two-story leg, which houses a guest wing and a two-car garage that is styled as one of the older sections of the farmhouse, offered another opportunity to modernize without compromise: The backfacing wall is all glass.

The farmhouse's main staircase, which is illuminated by room-height windows, is a traditional-contemporary masterpiece. It floats in the space, its plain, industrial-style

The home's interior, by Bill Mohr of Atlanta-based Stewart Mohr Designs, features a palette that is a study in restraint. Wideplank French oak floors, which are so light in color they look as though they're limewashed, ground the white art-gallery-like walls and the plate-glass windows and their minimal frames.

Like the façade, key features of the interior, including the fireplaces in the living/dining area and the screened porch, are plastered in tabby stucco, odes to the residence's supposed storied evolution.

The screened porch, one of Susan's favorite spots, is clad in tongue-and-groove boards that rise to its cupola.

The kitchen, where the Smiths spend a lot

of time, is a light taupe color with white accent tile. There is a trio of windows over the sink and a large central island that's styled as a farm table, complete with a sink. The ceiling is clad in pecky cypress, the only element that was reclaimed from the original house.

"The juxtaposition between the modern and the traditional elements in the farmhouse," Baydar says, "plays well together. It creates a pretty harmonious structure."

The Smiths couldn't agree more. Susan loves waking up each morning and viewing the old live oak and the marsh from her bed.

"It's a beautiful, restful place," she says.

And she's most pleased by the fact that Jay, too, has fallen in love with the beach house.

"He loves it—maybe even more than I do," she says. ◈



#### **SOUTHERN TWIST**

Scandinavian-inspired design and custom touches abound in a vacation home for a family of five on Kiawah Island, South Carolina.

For a New England-based family, the idea for a second home in Kiawah Island, South Carolina, stemmed from one desire: having a seaside place to retreat. "They have spent many years vacationing in this locale and finally wanted to have their own space," says Elisabeth Lyons Becker, design director of MDI Interior Design in Charleston. "The homeowners had a focus of creating space for their family to disconnect, engage with each other, and make memories. This house was designed to fit the family

themselves and not to host multiple groups and users. It is intended to be the spot where the nuclear family gathers, rejuvenates, and reconnects. We were able to focus on creating space for very specific needs and personalities."

Tasked with designing a modern vacation home that was both inviting and utilitarian, Lyons Becker incorporated the homeowner's affinity for Scandinavian design along with an open living, dining, and kitchen concept for the family's busy lifestyle and three

teenage children. "The client envisioned a space that was heavily influenced by a Scandinavian design aesthetic with a heavy emphasis on natural materials and light bright tones," says Lyons Becker, who opted for bespoke elements such as a rectangular dining room table design inspired by a magazine photo procured by the client, upholstered seating, and built-in cabinetry and shelving to flank the fireplace. "The contemporary design called for minimal trim and fuss. The dining room chandelier has an organic shape that contrasts many of the linear elements in this space, making it the perfect focal point. Its round, handpressed glass features add texture and are cohesive

with the chair back fabric. Both of these design choices subtly stand out in this clean, modern space."

When your home is within walking distance of an idyllic stretch of Rhode Island beach just outside Newport, you can expect a flurry of visitors all summer. That's exactly the case for a Middletown, Rhode Island, couple who wanted their home to be a comfortable and welcoming summertime gathering place for friends and family.

"When summer comes, the house is pretty much booked every week and weekend from our friends from childhood, high school, college, and our family coming through from all over," the homeowner says.

That's why when they redesigned the house, they did it with an eye toward entertaining. Both the upstairs and downstairs have full kitchens and living areas, so the homeowners created their home's lower level with guests in mind.

Working with designer Justine Sterling of Massachusetts-based Justine Sterling Design and the Rhode Island-based contractor Innovative Design Concepts, the couple reimagined their home by eliminating unneeded storage areas, maximizing ocean views, and creating bright, open spaces for people to comfortably gather, whether it's playing games in the kitchen or having dinner in the more formal dining room.

"Whatever it may be, we can all get together now," the homeowner says. "The space has been maximized in a way that it hadn't before."

#### A BEACHY WELCOME

The home's welcoming, beachy vibes start immediately in the front entryway, thanks to details like a textured hemp wallcovering in ombre hues of soft, sandy browns, a jute runner, and an organic-looing chandelier woven from strands of ecru-toned wooden beads. Pops of color and coastal Rhode Island flair come thanks to prints of aerial photos of two local beaches—Gooseberry and Second—by photographer Gray Malin.

"You're looking at the beaches that you can go visit while you're here," the homeowner says. "They come in and feel like they're in an ocean house."

Sterling says she wanted to "create continuity between all the spaces from the minute that you walk in the front door," and that's evident even in transitional spaces like the stair hallway, where a surfboard and a nearly floor-to-ceiling photo of bright, rippling, cerulean water by photographer Wendy Concannon make a seaside statement.

The oversized, organically shaped coffee table's polished top is made of fossilized clams, while side tables and a sideboard with white caning add even more translucent texture and visual interest to the room. More lively layers come courtesy of the contemporary, pale verdigris rug; textured sand-colored wallpaper; dark brown rope mirror; and woven roman shades.

"Texture and layering always make a space feel alive," Sterling says.

Texture and jolts of color enliven the dining area, too. While the tabletop's finish is natural, its apron and legs are painted a poppy light teal, and instead of just one kind of dining chair, there are two: white, fabric-draped chairs that sit at either end of the table and rattan and

white-weave chairs that echo the kitchen's counter stools.

The end result is an easygoing and comfortable seaside home that's always ready to welcome family and friends, without the old-fashioned stodginess that

predominates in a lot of traditional New England coastal décor.

"I wanted something that reflected more of my personality, which is just a little bit more relaxed but chic, and bright and modern," the homeowner says. \*

### LIVING SMALL

FOR THEIR OWN WEEKEND RETREAT, TWO ARCHITECTS CHOOSE A PARED-DOWN DESIGN THAT RESPONDS TO THE GLORY OF ITS NATURAL SURROUNDINGS.

#### Sporting a whimsically shaped silhouette,

this petite Fishers Island cottage shaped like an observation tower instantly piques the interest of anyone curious about house design. But long before the first foundation stone was laid, or cedar shingle nailed into place, the architect-owners frequented the undeveloped parcel teeming with invasive plants just to make sure they understood

the canvas upon which their house would be built.

"Just as important to us as the architecture of the house was the setting, the landscape architecture, and the site itself," says Stewart Skolnick, cofounder of Haver & Skolnick. He and his partner, in business and life, Charles Haver, run their architecture firm out of a restored 18th-century car-

riage house in Litchfield County, Connecticut. "We wanted to make sure we understood the potential of the land so that we could site the house properly," concurs Haver.

Much of the potential the two were eager to grasp consisted of views of the Atlantic Ocean and of some of the island's 350 acres of protected conservation land. "On a clear day, you can see Montauk Point," says Skolnick, adding that you can also glimpse several ponds—one for oyster cultivation—that surround the property. "There are reflections of water all around the house." On this sparsely populated island, Pointer Perch, named after their German shorthaired pointer, Keeper, overlooks only nature as far as the eye can see. Even the outdoor shower offers a glimpse of the ocean.

The higher up you go on this unique

parcel of land, the better and more expansive the views. "That's really what the driving factor was in the design of the house," says Haver of the structure's accentuated verticality. To capture the views on all sides, the building has the living spaces on the second floor, with the primary bedroom and mudroom area below. The small kitchen sits in a dormer created by the back side of the hip roof. "It's a very dynamic form, but its vocabulary is rooted in the Shingle Style, in which the bulk of the island's houses were built," explains Skolnick.

Most of Fisher Island's approximately 600 houses were built in the 1920s, the same era Frederick Law Olmstead, Jr., was hired to plan a private 1,800-acre residential development on the island. The stock market crash of 1929 dramatically slowed development.

When Haver and Skolnick were mulling the design of the building, they took their time, going through nearly a hundred different schemes over the course of a decade. "In the end, we decided we should just design for what we need," says Haver. "It's a weekend and vacation retreat, so the simpler it can be in terms of maintenance, the better." The Alaskan yellow cedar shingles, bronze railings, and charcoal gray aluminum-clad windows they chose for the exterior will weather over time. Exterior paint, needing occasional touch-ups, is limited to the front door and the walkout basement's mudroom door.

Having spent so much time walking the property before building on it, the two men say it was a quick decision to build not only a small house—it has a single bedroom and one full bath—but also one that blended effortlessly with the existing landscape. It was important for them to keep the house very rustic and low key.

Inside the 1,200-square-foot home, walls and ceilings painted crisp white pair with rift- and quarter-sawn oak flooring and hand-hewn beams. "Nickel-gap paneling gives it scale and recalls what an older porch might look like," observes Haver.

For the two architects, it was a challenging exercise—one they often employ with their clients—to ascertain the

minimum they needed to be comfortable. "When we started out, we had a guest room on the lower level," explains Haver.

Acknowledging that they don't have company often, they opted instead to use the space for sorely needed storage. An outdoor shower was a must.

The combined living and dining space on the second floor "pretty much does everything for us," says Haver. The only other room on that level is a small kitchen. "Because we like living very simply, we deliberately didn't want any hanging cabinets," says Skolnick, explaining why they opted for open shelving. "We wanted to be able to easily reach for a glass or a plate." The pyramidal ceiling in the kitchen is a miniature version of the one in the living room, each a perfectly square space.

"We like living with antiques," says
Skolnick. "In Connecticut, we have a lot of
Americana pieces; here we deliberately
chose to go with European—French, Italian,
and Spanish." The two men also have a
penchant for contrasting antique furnishings
with modern abstract art, which hangs
throughout the home. "So much of what we
do as architects has to be very precise," says
Skolnick. "When it came to art, we wanted
something that would be anything but that."

Similarly, the paths cut through the meadow, the driveway, and the planting beds are all undulating, curving forms, because, says Skolnick, "In nature, you don't find right angles."

Stacked from the road down to the ocean,





the two lots Haver and Skolnick purchased total 3.1 acres. They donated the lower lot to the Henry L. Ferguson Museum Land Trust, which owned all the land on the south and east side of them already, and retained the right to maintain the view and the meadow. "We knew that we would never want that lot to

be developed, and by giving it to the land trust, we'll never be tempted to do anything there, nor will anyone else in the future," says Haver.

"Overall, we're very pleased with the house," says Skolnick. "It feels like pulling on an old sweater and it feels really good. It suits us." \*







# **SET IN STONE**

LUXURY ALUMINUM TABLES FROM MCKINNON AND HARRIS ARE NOW TOPPED WITH NEW RAVENNA MOSAICS.

#### Two small Virginia businesses-each

artisan-driven and each highly successful—have joined forces to create custom-designed, handcrafted tables.

McKinnon and Harris has been making high-end outdoor furniture in Richmond since 1991. New Ravenna has been producing exquisite glass and stone mosaics on the Eastern Shore since 1992.

Now they've teamed up to turn out highperformance aluminum tables from McKinnon and Harris, topped with natural stone mosaics from New Ravenna.

"They have the same pursuit of excellence that we do, with a respect for

creativity and the arts," says Will Massie, cofounder of McKinnon and Harris, about New Ravenna. "They don't want to be the biggest—just the best."

Tabletops seemed a natural nexus. "We're adding something cool to their product, which they were looking for," says Richard Walters, New Ravenna's CEO.

New offerings include a 45-inch Albemarle square dining table, a 45-inch Mundy round dining table, and a 60-by-30inch Parsons coffee table. The three debut mosaic patterns, chosen from the thousands that New Ravenna makes, are called Raj, Marabel, and Rattan. Their stones have been polished, tumbled, and honed for texture and interplay of light.

Each pattern exudes its own character. Raj is geometric and modern. Marabel looks like it's straight out of an ancient ruin. And Rattan is textural, to round out the portfolio. "Designers really love to play with color, texture and patterns—and mosaics really give the designer the ability to create something truly unique that nobody else has," Massie says.

He and his sister, Anne, founded their company with the goal of elevating and inspiring their clients with art, design, and craftsmanship. Of their 120 employees in Richmond's Scott's Addition, 95 are engaged in manufacturing. The firm creates its furniture out of high-performance aluminum with a titanium undercoating, adding an epoxy primer and a urethane finish.

"It really gives us an edge over everybody in the industry," he says. "We're known for having a product that's built to last—you can use it out on the saltwater."

New Ravenna, on the other hand, was founded by Sara Baldwin, a native of Exmore, Virginia. While a graduate student at art school at the University of Pennsylvania, she visited New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art and came across ancient mosaics. She began recreating them herself—and eventually turned New Ravenna into Exmore's largest employer—with four buildings and a staff of 125.

Walters, who attended Georgetown as an undergraduate and the London Business School for graduate work, visited New Ravenna's factory in 2013. "It was an incredible thing—it was art, but business," he says. When Baldwin asked him to join the company as its CEO in 2015, he agreed—and then bought New Ravenna in 2017.

Walters and Massie met through Makers Alliance, a peer-to-peer network of likeminded, luxury maker brands. "We quickly formed a bond and determined that we'd love to create a product collection together because of all we have in common," Massie says.

Luckily, he says it's a collaboration destined to last for years. ◈







oodcliff, a stone and nickel gap contemporary with a metal roof designed by Cathy Purple Cherry for a retired energy executive and his wife, sits on a bluff 40 feet

above the Severn River, an estuary off the Chesapeake Bay in Annapolis. "The name is descriptive, but also references the street that the client's father grew up on in Richmond, Virginia," the architect says. Surrounded by tall trees and lush swaths of green lawn complete with Adirondack chairs and a flagpole, it is a picture-perfect, everyday retreat for someone who spent decades traveling the world.

The owners, who relocated from a Texas metropolis, relish the quieter pace of coastal living—Purple Cherry surmises they didn't landscape the river side of the property so that the husband could putter about on his tractor. They were also keen to pay tribute to their global adventures. "They wanted the house to be a living gallery," the founder and principal of Purple Cherry Architects says. "It's designed with clean lines and large walls against which they can display collections from their extensive travels."

The 6,300-square-foot home stretches nearly 160 feet east to west along the craggy cliff in what Purple Cherry calls a "fantastic long line." That said, this is no mere low-slung rectangle. The podlike design alternates between three one-story volumes with gable roofs oriented east-west and two double-height towers with gable roofs oriented north-south, with a flat-roofed connector between them. The effect is lyrical and nearly symmetrical, save for a screened porch that juts north toward the water and a three-car garage that pushes south on the flip side.

That the eastern tower is the entry is clear, literally. Both the front and back façades are glass, from the foundation to the roof. That the house is see-through, from front to back along most of its length, was a significant aspect of the design. "All the primary spaces capture the view," Purple Cherry says, noting that the isolated site allows for such splendor.

From the low platform of a front porch, and with the water a straight shot ahead, 10-foot-tall glass doors open into the gallery-like space, its ceiling soaring to 28 feet at the




ridge. That the room is just 13 feet wide amplifies the impact.

Expanses of warm white walls showcase lifetimes of artifacts. There is a collection of antique copper plates that the husband's parents acquired when the family lived in Turkey and a grouping of carved camel bells from Djibouti, a small country in East Africa. Figural sculptures by Mozambique ceramicist

Antique copper plates that the husband's parents acquired when the family lived in Turkey hang in the entry tower, which reaches 28 feet high at the center. A shallow bluestone patio runs in front of the primary suite at the left, while a more expansive entertaining patio runs from the entry tower, along the living room and kitchen, to the screened porch. The kitchen and living space

Reinata Sadimba stand on simple pedestals flanking the back door. And a linear fireplace invites guests to linger. "The space can be used for cocktails and hors d'oeuvres when they entertain," Purple Cherry says.

Tall openings at the left lead into the open-concept living area with a vaulted ceiling. A coffee table that the homeowner made from a slab of wood from an East African mango tree is an earthy accent between swoop-armed sofas in front of a fireplace with an elevated concrete hearth. A 30-foot wall of glass opens to the bluestone patio, making indoor/outdoor living and entertaining easy, a must on a property like this. On the south side of the house, slim upholstered chairs neatly surround a dark wood pedestal table in front of windows looking to the woods.

The elegant kitchen recedes against the wall opposite the seating area. Rift-sawn white oak frames a niche lined in charcoal sintered stone with subtle veining; a rectilinear hood in the same material and offset white oak shelves make for a minimalist arrangement against it. The



induction cooktop disappears in the matching charcoal sintered stone countertop, which is also used on the prep portion of the island with nary an overhang. A pale gray cantilevered tabletop wraps the island base, providing a causal spot for the couple to eat that is conducive to conversation.

"You're either a big cook or you simply stop once the kids are out of the house," Purple Cherry says. "Many of my clients are tired of the kitchen being front and center and acting as a drop zone for everything." To that end, the architect slotted a full-service galley kitchen behind the beautiful tableau. The sleek, uberfunctional area contains a gas cooktop, an assortment of ovens, a refrigerator, a freezer, a coffee station, and storage aplenty. Even the sink and

dishwasher are in there, as the end cap with a view. "You hope that if the coffee is in the back, the mess will stay back there too!" Purple Cherry says.

The bedroom pods stand sentinel on either end of the house. A pair of bedroom suites for the couple's daughters are on the west end of the house, past the back kitchen and tower pod with the stair and elevator up to the husband's office. While there is also a guest house on the grounds—a smaller, more casual version of the main house—their offspring stay here with their parents. There is plenty of privacy since the primary suite is in the easternmost pod. Its standout moment? A freestanding tub perfectly positioned in a corner of glass. Open the slider and you're basically bathing al fresco, the ultimate indoor/outdoor connection. •



# "The thing about living with a genius is that I get no credit whatsoever," Rick Miller says with a laugh. "When people walk into our home, they say, 'You're so lucky to live with Oren,' as if I have no taste."

Oren is Oren Sherman, an artist, a Rhode Island School of Design professor, and a design specialist at Elkus Manfredi Architects, a high-profile commercial architecture firm in Boston. Miller, a psychotherapist and the founder of the nonprofit organization Gay Sons and Mothers, is his husband. The couple, who met as young men in Provincetown, Massachusetts, have been together for 30 years. As Sherman points out, Miller has been exposed to a lot of design. "The truth is, the house is very much a combination of the two of us," Sherman says.

The couple are the second owners of this

1,600-square-foot midcentury modern house in Truro, a tiny town on Cape Cod. They are intent on respecting its modernist roots. When erected in 1957, it was about 800 square feet; the original owners eventually enclosed the screened porch (now the dining room) and added the primary bedroom. "It was built as a modest summer home; we didn't want to turn it into a fancy house," Sherman says. Still, there was room for improvement.

They invited their friend Thomas Henry Egan III, a principal in Evolve Residential, to have a look. Egan defined a proper entry, redesigned the galley kitchen, and enlarged the windows to enhance the indoor-outdoor

connection. Waking up surrounded by greenery and gazing into woods bathed in late afternoon light are among the greatest rewards of living here. "In four minutes, Tom told us what we needed," Miller says. "His advice made this place what it is."

Sherman's creations don't hurt either. His wallpaper patterns, manufactured by Astec Wallcoverings, grace the kitchen (exploded paisley) and bedroom (a metallic faux bois) and will soon go up in the office bath. "It's a mylar wallpaper like the kind I used to help my mother put up in her friends' houses," Miller says, amused. A geometric rug design of Sherman's, manufactured by Brintons, the British company that supplies carpets for Buckingham Palace, adds pattern in the living room.

And then there's Sherman's fine artwork, along with works by local artists, friends, and colleagues. A print of a Cape beach shack he painted hangs over the fireplace, surrounded by landscapes and streetscapes purchased at local auctions. Another of Sherman's pieces—of a midcentury modern house in Los Angeles designed by Pierre Koenig—hangs in the bedroom. "It's like I imagined we'd live in a modernist house someday," he says.

Everything in the home has meaning. "We came to this house wanting it to be authentically us," Sherman says. The last thing either wants is a self-consciously stylish place devoid of character. That the interiors tell their story, as a couple and as individuals, is important. Cherished family pieces mingle with pieces they acquired together. "A house should have a sense of history, reflect the way you live now, and hold a piece of the future," Sherman says, expanding on a quote from prominent interior designer Charlotte Moss.

In the entry, funky midcentury pottery fills a traditional antique hutch inherited from Miller's gay great-uncle. They use his dishes and silver, too. Sherman's most prized possession, a Lalique bowl that was a wedding present to his parents in 1944, is displayed on the midcentury modern credenza that Miller's mom found. "I normally say that if something gets broken, don't cry over anything that can't cry over you, but this is irreplaceable," he says. He





feels the same about the silver candlesticks that his late mother, a silversmith and landscape designer, made in the 1950s. "I coveted them my entire life," he says.

In the living room the pair get a kick out of their curvy vintage sofa, which reminds them of sofas their Jewish grandmothers might have had and thrown out. Soon, the sofa will sport a new look: spring-green mohair. Sherman fell hard for the fabric when specifying 1,000 yards of it in deep red for seats in a theater that Elkus Manfredi is designing. "I want to be wrapped up and buried in this mohair," he says.

Like the sofa, the marble-topped dining table designed by Eero Saarinen for Knoll

in 1956, was a splurge. "I'd loved it for 40 years, since I worked at Design Research the summer before I went to RISD," Sherman says, referencing the legendary Harvard Square store. It was under the tutelage of owners Ben and Jane Thompson that Sherman first saw and came to appreciate Charles and Ray Eames, Marcel Breuer, and Mies van de Rohe furniture, along with Marimekko patterns and color.

"Overall, we didn't spend a ton of money, but this home reflects our lives together and our personal histories," Sherman says. \*

### WHEN IT COMES TO BUYING OR DESIGNING A NEW HOME, THERE'S ONE BASIC CRITERION THAT NOTORIOUSLY TOPS THE PROVERBIAL CHECKLIST: LOCATION.

It was this factor that provided the defining moment for notable architect Paul McClean, principal of McClean Design in Orange, California, when he was enlisted to help a homeowner and his family create their dream home in Bel Air, a coveted Los Angeles neighborhood. "It's a very unique lot, and it's very steep with a long driveway, and kind of has a



limited footprint that we could actually work on," says McClean of the lush hillside lot he designed with help from contractor Craig Williams. "But, at the same time, it's wrapped by trees, and feels almost very secluded and private, so that was what was attractive about the property. They appreciated that the site was nestled into the hillside and that the house could be designed in a way that allowed for very intentional interplay between the tree canopies and this 'tree house' emerging from within. There wasn't a very wide parcel at the bottom, so we had to hug the house to the driveway in order to create enough room for the backyard, which we set up like a series of rooms."

For the 14,000-square-foot modern home spanning six bedrooms and ten baths, Mc-Clean—who has designed projects in locations such as Beverly Hills, Laguna Beach, Turks and Caicos, and Whistler, British Columbia—tailored the design to the family's needs and expansive art collection, and desire for a connection to the outdoors. "I've known the homeowner for quite a long time, and he wanted it as a family home [and a base for himself since they live partially in California and on the East Coast]," adds Mc-Clean, who also incorporated select furniture and pieces from the homeowner's own collection. "He's a big art collector and that was important to have places to highlight the art and just create a warm and inviting family home. And fitness was super important, so a gym was a big component, and they wanted a way to connect the various spaces to the outdoors as much as possible. We kind of saw that whole base floor as one extended entertainment living space."

The location of the home itself naturally determined the overall design direction. "It's really lot-driven, and that's something I find for most of our projects we don't set out to create unique shapes or anything, but most of it becomes site-driven by multiple conditions," says McClean. "In this particular case, the lot is a very strange shape, and it's almost like a backward "s" form, so the house kind of weaves like a snake format around the usable parts of the lot, and we oriented spaces so that they had the best views and they are practical and useful, but at the same time [we had to find ways to ameliorate those condiFrom top: The dramatic Poliform kitchen with dark marble and bronze accents and adjacent living


tions where those corners come together, so there are some triangular spaces that we used for utility spaces, and that really helps to make it work and function."

To accomplish this and take full advantage of the woodsy lot and city views, the house was designed with three stories: a basement level for a media room; wellness and fitness center; bar; and glass-enclosed, walk-in wine cellar; a main floor with the garage, kitchen, dining room, family room, library, and a guest room; and an upper floor comprised of three bedrooms and outdoor

patio on the west side, and primary suite on the east side. There is one additional bedroom above the garage. "Each floor has two 'wings' that spin off a central axis staircase," adds McClean. "We were able to achieve entertaining or guest wings on each floor, while opposite the axis, the more intimate and private wing would curve away, creating the S-shaped floor plan."

For the materials, McClean chose teak for exterior cladding; steel; 12-foot-tall floor-to-ceiling glass windows; and walnut and silver travertine stone flooring. "It's kind of floating in the forest, and we wanted to have warmer materials and have that feeling like you were in a forest," explains McClean. "You don't see other homes, you just see the distant view of Westwood. We spend a lot of time in our work trying to edit views with either water or landscaping, and we try to give that feeling that this a refuge with a sense of peace, calm, and tranquility."

McClean also designated a library and office space for the homeowner's art and book collections with Poliform shelving; separate "his" and "hers" primary baths with silver marble and walnut; and a sprawling outdoor space that features a large patio with a rectangular lap pool (with a potted olive tree completely contained within it) that has a reverse infinity edge that spills on both sides; a hot tub; and a lower reflection pond with stepping stones. "There are so many great reflections in that water if you're sitting in the living room or the dining room," explains McClean. "If you look across, you see the beautiful reflections of the sky at night. We wanted to create a variety of experiences within the house versus one thing that just gets repeated over and over again."

Layering in experiences and subtle architectural nuances throughout the home was entirely intentional. "I am very happy with the way it turned out," says McClean, of the four-year-long project. "It's just a unique series of spaces. It's not sitting on a flat piece of land somewhere with a traditional garden or a traditional front yard. The way it's set up and the snaking orientation of the plan creates these interesting, intriguing moments. I really like that aspect of it." \*

#### THE TERRACES, FORT LAUDERDALE BEACH, **FLORIDA The Terraces**,

a boutique luxury condominium in Fort Lauderdale Beach developed by Latitude Group and designed by architecture firm Garcia Stromberg, features only 22 residences—all corner units. Residences range from 1,775 to 2,700 square feet and include floor-to-ceiling impact glass windows and spacious private terraces.
