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

MEET THE TEAN



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
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At the end of a long drive stands a Cape Cod

house inspired by 20th-century beach cottages that perfectly blends the classic and the contemporary.

The front of the twin-tower house, for a family with three children who love the outdoors, is clad in larger Alaskan yellow cedar shingles and oversized windows to subtly and slightly reduce the home's scale. In the back, walls of glass, crowned by dainty muntins, a traditional and timeless touch, turn the waterfront into a real-time mural.

"The site was a diamond in the rough," says Aaron Polhemus, owner and CEO of Cape Cod-based Polhemus Savery DaSilva (PSD), a fully integrated architecture, landscape architecture, construction, and property services firm.

PSD helped the clients select the property and then designed and built a new house and accompanying landscape.

"We created a really special design for the home and the overall site that works well for the family," Polhemus says.



The property, which was overgrown with vegetation and covered with concrete slabs from its days as a landing field, was home to a 1957 two-bedroom ranch in questionable condition that was used as a rental.

It was the water views that sold the family. "They are beautiful here, and so are the sunsets," the homeowner says. "We wanted a house where you open the front door and see through to the water."

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In addition to the main house, the property, which spreads across an acre, has a second structure that includes a two-car garage, a pool house/changing area with powder room, and a second-floor guest house.

To create a unified and welcoming property that ties together the main house and guest house, PSD also created a series of outdoor spaces that the family can enjoy in all types of weather.

"Having outdoor rooms with different exposures provides entertainment opportunities, whether you are looking to sunbathe, get out of the wind, enjoy the pool, or just relax under the pergola and enjoy the shade," says Rob Calderaro, PSD's senior landscape architect.

The classic-style poolside pergola is defined by columns, and the outdoor kitchen has a grill, a sink, a refrigerator, and two beer taps mounted in the granite-topped bar. The views are mostly enjoyed from the waterfront terrace, which has a fit pit.

The landscaping, in the traditional Cape Cod planting palette of yellow, blue, and white, includes hydrangeas, day lilies, native geraniums, and other perennials. The entry court, the only formal area, features a cobblelined circle of greenery centered on the front












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door of the main house, which is framed by two large boxwoods.

Upon entering the house, there is a clear connection to the landscape and water views.

"Our goal was to bring in as much natural light as possible," says PSD's senior designer Sharon DaSilva. "The towers at the rear of the house play a pivotal role in flooding the interior spaces with sunlight from multiple directions, and we incorporated windows on the landings so that light floods down the stairs. We don't get the opportunity to do that often."

Every aspect of the house says family, starting with the name, Chasing Lo Tyde, which incorporates the names of the three children.

In the kitchen, for instance, there's a porthole that allows the parents to unobtrusively check on them while they're in the pool.

"We wanted everything to be functional, durable, and beautiful," the homeowner says. "And there's space for everybody."

Taking cues from the views of water and sand, interior designer Carolyn Thayer of Carolyn Thayer Interiors selected a palette of mainly light colors and soft blues, with a neutral backdrop. Powder rooms, the guest room, and the pool house are where big pops of color can be found.





Knowing the home is enjoyed mostly in the summer months, Thayer made use of many textural elements that lend coastal style to transitional pieces. Some such pieces that catch the eye are woven window shades, seagrass stools, and a live-edge dining table with a rope chandelier above.

"This is primarily a summer home, but the family enjoys visits in the off-season and during the holidays," Thayer says. "With that in mind, we want this home to feel light and fresh for summer but cozy for the fall and winter visits."

As a family home, selections were made with durability in mind. "The home is ready to withstand the activities of this busy family," Thayer says. "We made use of many outdoor fabrics so that the family can really live in the home comfortably."

The living room furniture, for example, is covered in outdoor fabrics, and rugs have been stain-treated.

Spaces were tailored to the individuals who live in them. The primary suite allows for working from home at a desk tucked into a scenic second-floor bay window, while the sons share a room with custom bunks and furnishings capturing nautical vibes. Not to be outdone, the daughter's suite is vibrant with color and boasts a suspended rattan chair for lounging with a book.

The family loves—and makes great use of—the entire house. "I don't have a favorite room because I love them all," the homeowner says. "Starting with the first floor, everything is welcoming. You feel like you're in a special spot." *





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

A Seattle-based interior designer and local architecture firm overhaul a rundown boathouse adjacent to a family vacation home on Orcas Island, creating a serene, modern retreat for entertaining and relaxing.

1. Laguna Nesting Tables, Brownstone Furniture. "The clients previously purchased a glass-top coffee table that was challenging to navigate, so we found this metaledged nesting table that provides more surface area, which comes in handy when entertaining."

2. Two-piece Sectional Sofa, A.Rudin, (Based on sofa #2408 with a custom, raised base); Upholstered in "Smart Grey" 34730-106 Performance Essential **Textures Collection**

Indoor Upholstery Fabric, Kravet. "The clients wanted a comfortable, yet lowmaintenance spot where they could curl up together with their dogs and look out at the water and enjoy the fireplace. To achieve this, we custom-designed a sofa we had used at their main house so that it would sit off the floor and allow more air through."

3. Pillow Upholstered in #33637-84, Kravet. "The owner, not

afraid of a little color, selected these pillows to add a pop of color."

4. Oona Alpaca Throw in Mustard by Fells Andes, Design Within Reach. "This luxurious throw adds a bit of color when taking a break on the built-in daybed."

cedar siding. "The grey-washed wood tones down the brightness of the wood on the floors and ceilings yet still feels natural."

We loved this one because it has a shorter shade, which diffuses light without blocking so much of the view."

RAISING THE BAR

With the help of a local designer, a once vacant and lifeless dirt lot adjacent to a primary residence in Manhattan Beach, California, is converted into a functional oasis for entertaining and relaxing.

For a recent project for a family in Manhattan Beach, California, interior designer Bianca Ecklund of her eponymous design firm wanted the backyard-replete with a pool house, bar, and accessory dwelling unit (or ADU)—to seamlessly blend with the main house. "When designing this space, we wanted it to feel like an

extension or mini version of the main house, but with a playful spin," says the Hermosa Beach-based designer. "This home has a large lot for the area, so making the absolute most of the space was our top goal. We knew the entire indoor-outdoor space needs to be multifunctional. The bar is great for guests,

and even better for poolside entertaining."

Ecklund explains that windows, doors, and flooring also played an important role in the overall design. "We needed this space to feel like a cabana, and the NanaWall doors and windows were key to achieving that open feel," says Ecklund. "Ensuring the floor materials were consistent inside and out really makes the space feel like a continuation of the outdoors."

Following the two-yearlong transformation, the outdoor space-designed simultaneously with the

primary residence—was worth the wait. "Our clients will enjoy this space with their growing family for many years to come," says Ecklund.

A husband and wife's quest for a more

livable outdoor space and a place to store water sports equipment on their Cape Cod estate snowballed quickly into a full-blown redesign of their seven-and-a-half-acre site.

And the mid-1990s Colonial spec house that once dominated their North Bay locale?

It is now a muted backdrop for where the action is: a yoga studio atop the sunken storage space, a new swimming pool with expansive pool house, and a nautilus-shaped outdoor shower.

It all evolved from a preliminary series of site plans developed by landscape architect Dave Hawk, owner of the Sagamore, Massachusetts, firm that bears his name. Once his initial drawings were complete, Doreve Nicholaeff of Nicholaeff Architecture + Design in Osterville joined Hawk and the clients to collaborate further on the master plan. Nicholaeff would design the proposed yoga studio and the pool house inspired by its design, while



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Hawk designed the outdoor shower.

"Doreve was instrumental in bringing good ideas to the table," Hawk says. "I knew she was a great talent and would be good with this client."

Their first decision was whether to match the look of the Colonial-style home, or set off in another direction altogether. The clients opted for something more forward-looking, something that created its own vocabulary among all the diverse elements in the master plan.

"They gave us creative license," Nicholaeff says of her minimalist, Japanese design aesthetic. "They said, 'Go for it!'"

The 20-foot-by-20-foot yoga studio—also referred to as the treehouse, because of a mature oak that pokes up through an opening in its deck—now hovers above the 20-by-40 storage center and overlooks the bay below. The treehouse/studio is a serene space, a private getaway, or a place to make a quiet phone call.

But it's sustainable too. "When you look at the treehouse, underneath it is the concrete storage bunker so that during a storm, water passes through it to the bay," she says. "The storage center goes down to grade, and then nine or 10 feet up, and the deck cantilevers out and embraces the oak tree."

Opposite it, on the other side of the site, sits the new pool house that's the center of activity for family and friends, especially for weekend parties and holidays. A former swimming pool was filled in, and a rundown pool house demolished. "We needed to resurface the pool and then thought: 'You might as well build the pool you want and put it in the place you want it," the husband says.

"The pool house was decrepit and moldy, and nobody went in it," his wife adds. "I said I'd like a place that's still in the action and out of the sun."

The new pool house is in use three seasons of the year, opened to the outdoors with coastal-grade NanaWalls and screens. A hangout area offers a pool table plus bar, bath, and kitchen. A pergola allows owners and guests to relax in either sun or shade.

The idea behind the pool house was to live outside during summer and fall. "You can close it up if it's cool or windy and still get the feeling of being outside," Nicholaeff says.

"And we were careful to recognize the trees."

None of the clients' friends refer to the structure as a pool house—to them, it's for living and dining. "The best time is at Thanksgiving dinner, when it's closed off and all the fall foliage is around us," the wife says. "We put in a hot tub for people visiting that week—we host 20 to 25 people."

Hawk's carefully articulated master plan dealt with building on a coastal property that's restricted by state and local conservation commission bylaws. The zone from zero to 50 feet up from the coastal bank is a no-disturb area. Farther up, the landscape architect worked to redesign the spaces that were 50 to 100 feet back from the bank. "You leave it in a naturalized condition, and then that opens avenues to the 50-to-100-foot area," Hawk says.

The undulating shoreline is anything but a straight line. At different spots it curves and

drops off, and it defines the shape of the entire backyard. "It's way out there with the tree house," the wife says. "Before, we never went to that side of the yard, but now we use it all the time."

Hawk stitched the landscape together with granite walkways and terraces descending from the Colonial home to the pool house. "You come out of the kitchen with your coffee and step down to the pool house terrace where the outdoor kitchen is," he says. "There are rooms and terraces that sequence you to the pool area."

Most important, though are the unimpaired sightlines across the property to the water. "Even when you're looking at the treehouse, you're looking through it," the wife says.

And that storage space below that spurred the entire project?

It's completely out of sight. ◈

NANTUCKET BY DESIGN

KENNERKNECHT DESIGN GROUP CREATES A TIMELESS NEW ENGLAND AESTHETIC ON THIS SMALL ISLAND 30 MILES OUT TO SEA.

The New England-style cottage in

Siasconset, with its weathered shingles and white trim, was perfect.

Across from the beach, it was a short walk to the small-town center of things, making it an ideal second home for the Marblehead, Massachusetts, couple and their two children, who had been vacationing on Nantucket for years.

"When we viewed it online, we knew right away that it was the house for us," the homeowners say. "We loved the ocean views of the open sitting, dining, and kitchen area."

Although the cottage was in good shape structurally, it was unfurnished, so the couple commissioned interior designers Jayme Kennerknecht and Courtney Dana of Kennerknecht Design Group to design and create relaxing spaces for family and guests.

"The walls of the first floor are shiplap, so it was a blank canvas for us to curate layered finishes," says Kennerknecht. "It was a story about texture because the color of the ocean was already there."

The resulting design evokes the beach and a traditional, timeless New England aesthetic that is casual and durable enough for sandy feet and wet bathing suits.

The project presented several challenges, which Kennerknecht and Dana say were fun and exciting.

First of all, the family wanted to move into the house by summer, which meant that the design team had only six months to ready the property.

Because the pandemic was in full swing,

supply-chain glitches forced the designers to be creative. And deliveries were an issue: Height restrictions on trucks meant that Kennerknecht and Dana sourced locally or loaded up their cars at their office and drove the items to the site, a trip that took nearly five hours. On one occasion, coffee tables had to be carried a half-mile to the house.

"We had to be nimble," Kennerknecht says, adding that client consultations were via Zoom, and the actual setup was accomplished in only three days. "We had to work with what was available and add customized features, such as glass tops on coffee tables, and switch upholstery on chairs. But it was design without compromise."

They let the ocean views guide their decisions.

"We wanted to feature and duplicate the view of the water," Dana says. "We added layers of things that feel tactile with subtle and neutral coloring."

This is most evident in the main living area, where a wall of windows frames the waves, creating a magnificent, meditative motion picture.

The sofa, upholstered in sandy, fade-intothe-background linen, is the same height as the windowsill so as not to obstruct the view. Two swivel chairs, upholstered in white,

allow sitters to pivot toward the kitchen during gatherings.

The lamps, which have pale-blue translucent bases that complement the water's hue, conjure images of sea glass; atop minimalist side tables on each side of the sofa, they appear to float on the waves.

The knotwork coffee table echoes the circular oak dining table, which is appointed with rattan chairs. Other textural touches include a large-loop rug, a circular mirror framed with ship's rope, and a metal woven pendant in a white finish like the ceiling so it seems to disappear.

"The eye drifts to the water," Dana says. "It feels magical."

In the second living space, which is used as a family room, the design is more casual, with a subtle powder blue and white palette. The room has a flat-screen TV, a glass-topped coffee table, and a small round pedestal table positioned by the window that's ideal for board games.

On the wall by the window hangs a pair of small locally sourced, white-framed paintings of water hung one above the other that look like an extension of the view.








"Our layouts provide a lot of different seating opportunities, where you can sit with a laptop while working during the day or with a cup of tea at night," Kennerknecht says. "It's all about creating moments."

Although the house has four bedrooms, including two bunkbeds, the spaces are small and must multitask, expanding and contracting, depending on the number of guests.

"Throughout the house, there are many beautiful places to sit, but everything fits with the overall style and does not stand out when not being used," the homeowners say. "There are also accessories with dual purposes; for example, the stools tucked under the console table or a soft ottoman in the media room can be footrests, seats, or tables. The sofas are very comfortable and allow people to gather but do not overwhelm the space."

To create a perfect arrival experience for the owners, Kennerknecht and Dana styled the cottage, supplying everything from beach towels to dishes.

"They arrived to a completed home a day after we left," Kennerknecht says. "It was such a gift for us to be able to deliver a house that felt layered and lived in." •



NO PAIN, NO GAIN

A NEW HOME IN HERMOSA BEACH OVERCOMES MULTIPLE HURDLES TO EMBRACE DRAMATIC PACIFIC VIEWS

A slim lot, a 10-foot drop, and a series of

local ordinances all worked mightily to influence the design of a new home in Hermosa Beach, California.

Like most lots there, this one's 30 feet wide and 100 feet long from the street to the alley at its rear. And it rises 10 feet along the way.

"So this is a skinny box," says architectural designer Jon Starr, owner of the local design firm that bears his name. He's worked on at least 130 homes in the Manhattan and Hermosa Beach areas since starting his company in 1998. By now, he knows the local players and the rules of engagement well.

For this project he drew on both, since Hermosa Beach home-height limits are tied to the topography. In this case, that meant the slope of the lot determined the home's maximum height of 30 feet.

"The rules are dictated by local municipal codes and zoning ordinances—setbacks, height restrictions, open-space requirements—and that all revolves around parking," he says. "The street elevation dictates where the garage is located, which dictates the floor below and the floor above."

"Digging into the front of the lot was the only code-compliant way to get the desired

square footage for the basement," says Chris Lombardi, founder and president of Lombardi Construction. "The basement's flush with the downhill side at the front of the building, and runs 53 feet back."

That required no small amount of engineering prowess. Lombardi shored up his excavation with steel beams and heavy, pressure-treated timber inserted between I-beam flanges, then dug down into pure sand. Now the basement foundation supports the entire building above.

Entry at the rear is at the second level, and the 75-foot-long first floor below tucks into the 10-foot slope, with the basement below that. Still, the designer and builder took full advantage of that below-grade space. "It gave us a basement with a wine room, a sauna, a gym, and a media room," Lombardi says. "And there's a stairwell that provides egress and light."

Its material palette, especially outside, was driven by the relentless oceanside climate and salt air. There, Starr called for board-formed






concrete, black-and-bronze sheet metal, wood siding, and stucco. Inside, it's warmer. He sandblasted the board-formed walls to reveal their wood grain, added white oak and walnut finishes, then laid limestone for floors and some walls. "The tiles and wallpaper are very colorful," says interior designer Rini Kundu, founder of her eponymous design firm. "It's textural, with sculptural elements on the walls."

The clients, a couple with a teenage daughter, were actively involved in design decisions. She's a graphic artist and he's a commercial real estate developer, so they knew more than a little about the look and feel of the spaces being created. "They wanted to explore concepts, which is a lovely thing for a designer," Kundu says. "They're open-minded, and they made some bold choices. They had the vision that paid off in a big way."

There was no formal assignment from the clients to their designers. Instead, experiential questions arose from Starr and Kundu: "Tell us how you like to live—and how you feel about outdoor living and entertaining."

The couple wanted to inject energy into every space. In their basement area dedicated to the art of mixology, they chose the tile for the backsplash, as they did in other rooms. "It's a perfect winetasting and cocktail-making room—a feast for the eyes," Kundu says. "They wanted to make it fun throughout the home, and also be really functional."

Then, to satisfy a municipal requirement for at least 10 square feet of open space, Starr created a second-level courtyard that's 13 feet by 15-and-a-half, partially open to the sky. "It's a place to be private and quiet at the center of the home," he says.

It stands at the base of a bright, open stairwell that connects all levels of the house. Starr and Kundu agreed on pocket doors for three sides of the courtyard, to enhance indoor/outdoor living, and then used bold plantings and a water feature for visual intrigue inside. "Your eyes are drawn to the foliage, and that makes it more intimate and private," Kundu says.

The most expansive view—the one the clients wanted to maximize—is to the west, so their living area overlooks the Pacific. But the dramatic views are on the fourth level, where a roof deck opens up to a 180-degree vista of the ocean, plus Santa Monica and Malibu to the north and Palos Verdes to the south.

Sure, the lot's a slim one. And, yes, there was that 10-foor slope. Not to mention those pesky building ordinances.

But in the end, they all added up to a reminder that hermosa is the Spanish word for "beautiful." •

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CONCRETE COASTAL

SASHYA THIND WARMS CONCRETE WITH WOOD, CREATING CONTEMPORARY INTERIORS THAT FEEL PERFECTLY AT HOME ON THE WATER.

Knowing that concrete floors were at the

top of her clients' wish list, Sashya Thind kicked off the interior scheme for this 4,800-square-foot home in Marblehead, Massachusetts, by diving into finishes. "We started with concrete from a materiality perspective, then decided how and where to bring in warmth," she says.

Coming from a more traditional home in another part of town, the new owners of this waterfront property hired Taproot Design to create a contemporary replacement for the existing shingled dwelling. That said, they didn't want the house to feel stark. "They wanted the interior to reflect the attitudes and personality of their young family," Thind says. "They said 'casual' a lot." Other descriptors included minimal, modest, welcoming, and warm.

Not wanting the concrete floor to be a one-off, Thind devised key moments to showcase the material; namely, the double-sided fireplace, stairwell, and entry. To circumvent the challenges of building with concrete, Thind proposed facing such surfaces in large-format porcelain tiles that look and feel like concrete.

Wood planks line the ceiling in the living spaces, balancing the poured concrete floor that runs throughout the ground level. "We chose Douglas fir for its interesting grain and pink undertone." Thind explains. "The wood looks like weather-beaten boards, but the overall design still feels clean and contemporary." The combination also satisfied the couple's divergent tastes, as one





spouse preferred a more minimal aesthetic than the other.

Contemporary European furnishings take cues from the material pairings and don't distract from the magnificent views. In front of the concrete-style tile-clad fireplace in the living room, sophisticated Ligne Roset sofas with moveable back cushions sit atop a nubby rug. In the more casual family room on the flip side, a cushy modular leather sofa sits atop a felted wool rug with blue topstitching that is as plush as it is durable. "Gathering around the fireplace, whether it be when entertaining in the living room or

for family movie night in the family room, was very important to them," Thind shares.

The kitchen anchors the other end of the open-concept plan. Here, streamlined matte anthracite-colored cabinets frame a gleaming slab of black quartzite, all of which pops against the white walls and ceiling. "I wanted the stone to blend with the cabinetry, but also be a focal point," Thind says of the material, which she also used for the perimeter countertops. The quartzite drove the color of the Leicht cabinetry, although the owners knew they wanted a darker tone in there.

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For visual interest and warmth, Thind clad the island in Douglas fir, then topped it with white quartz. "As we changed the material for the island, it made sense to introduce another crisp element into the palette," she says. Cantilevering the top at one end elongated the island to nearly 13 feet, providing ample seating and serving space.

Black-ash stools with curved backrests inspired by Shinto shrines offer a pleasing contrast against the island. Likewise for the minimalist black-resin dining table and

sculptural ebonized wood chairs. The loop-de-loop of a linear chandelier playfully punctuates the top of the room, its swoops standing out against the kitchen cabinetry as well, especially at night.

The floating stair by Taproot Design comprises white oak treads on a steel spine with transparent glass panels and a polished tubular handrail on one side. Large expanses of the concrete-style tile stretch up the stairwell, where huge picture windows bathe the double-height space in light.

At the top of the stairs, a simple white oak door opens into the primary suite. As one would expect, the bed looks straight out to the water. Thind covered the entire headboard wall with scribed panels of Douglas fir, carefully organizing the grid to mask the joinery. An upholstered headboard adds softness, and integrated nightstands complete the textural tableau. "Beds these days are very low, so we custom-designed a bed so they can enjoy the view rather than stare at the balcony railing," she says.

As for the balcony, it offers the owners a private spot to soak up the sun. Too chilly? Just beyond the foot of the bed, the architecture juts into the landscape allowing for windows on three sides; two lounge chairs are ready and waiting.


The en suite bath boasts a balcony too, as



well as a tub (and a toilet!) with a view. While each bathroom in the home has unique elements, all remain consistent in look and feel with Douglas fir juxtaposing large-format concrete- or terrazzo-like tile. In the primary bath, Thind graced the crisp white soaking tub with a quartzite backdrop for an extraluxe touch that also ties it to the kitchen.

"The home is cohesive, with a dichotomy of rough-hewn and clean, polished finishes throughout," Thind says. "The design is contemporary and warm without shouting waterfront; it has its own character." *

Hotelier Jerry Johnson had a singular

vision for the resort he calls Bungalows Key Largo when it opened in 2019.

He knew the kind of people needed to run it—and the way he wanted to deal with them.

Like Cynthia Costa, its general manager from the get-go. She'd worked for Johnson when he owned the Cheeca Lodge in Islamorada, 18 miles south.

"They treat you like family," she says of Johnson and his nephew, Jeremy. "I have deep roots with them, and work as hard as I can because I have that much respect for them."

Once he'd bought his 12 acres on Buttonwood Bay, Johnson designed 135 identical bungalows himself. At the rear of each, he added outdoor seating, a shower, and a bathtub. Out front is a porch with Adirondack chairs, a ceiling fan, and a pair of bikes. And he laid them all out in a master plan worthy of any New Urbanist practicing today.

He also demonstrated a deft understanding of landscape design. He planted his property with native ferns, towering palms, and flowering bougainvillea. "He was responsible for every plant and tree," Costa says. "He knew where he wanted to put things."

The result? A sanctuary that's known as the only all-inclusive, adults-only resort in the Florida Keys-and a destination unto itself. "Everyone who goes through those gates has an 'Aha!' moment," she says. "They instantly become relaxed."

It happens well before they discover the three restaurants on site, all operating under the inventive eye of Chef Juan Maradiaga. He too has been at the Bungalows since it opened in early 2019, but left after a devastating fire that May. When the resort was rebuilt, the Johnsons called him back.

For good reason. Maradiaga had been trained at Miami's Le Cordon Bleu of Culinary Arts, and worked at the Diplomat Resort in Hollywood Beach. From there, his career took off. "I opened the W Hotel in South Beach and the Fontainebleau Miami Beach," he says. "I was at the Biltmore Coral Gables for two years, and that gave me a background in French cooking and styles."

When he returned to the Bungalows after the fire, he was dispatched to the company's Wyoming resort to absorb its philosophy of food and hospitality. Back in Key Largo, he discovered a completely rebuilt kitchen, and started as a sous chef. Soon enough, he was named executive chef.

Johnson gave him a staff 55, along with carte blanche over menus for an on-site Mexican restaurant, a Mediterranean café, and a steakhouse called Bogie & Bacall's. "Ultimately, it's up to us to find what the guests want, and go above and beyond that," he says. "I try to keep on budget, but my seafood has to be fresh and my standards can't drop—it's a luxury for me, and not every chef has that opportunity."

For fresh local options, Maradiaga deals daily with farms in nearby Homestead. On days off, he scouts the competition, looking for the ideas du jour. On vacations to places like Cancun, he looks for new techniques. "I'm not a chef who stays in the 1990s, the 2000s, or the 2010s," he says. "I get involved in what's trending."

Some of those trends extend to food and beverage on excursions out to Buttonwood Bay. The resort may have started in 2019 with just two tiki boats and a 55-foot catamaran, but its fleet has expanded across the board since then. There are now daily excursions on three different boats—two more than 50 feet—and each with a separate itinerary. A 21-foot Starcraft pontoon boat is also available for private use.





The hands-down favorite excursion, though, is aboard the World Cat, a luxury, 28-foot, dual-console, powered catamaran. "It's a private charter that can accommodate up to six passengers, with an itinerary that can be customized to your liking," says Katie Wilson, property operations manager for Red Hospitality, the firm that contracts onthe-water excursions. "Our watersports concierge will assist you with curating the trip of a lifetime."


Options include snorkeling on a coral reef, lounging lazily on a sandbar, bar-hopping, or something called "Being a Local for a Day." A six-pack of beer or two bottles of

wine are included in the half-day trip, with lunch available.

Other excursions include "Largo Larry's Half-Day Snorkel" on Hen & Chickens Reef & Banana Patch at the Florida Reef—with a picnic lunch including beer, wine, or Champagne—and daily sunset cruises aboard the 52-foot *Lady B* and 65-foot *Island Time*, both sailing catamarans.

On the water, in a bungalow, or at a restaurant, every guest is treated the same way Johnson treats his staff of 270. "It's like you're family coming to visit," Costa says.

And it's a welcome that trickles down from the top echelons of this resort. •

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

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

The architect pulled out a book of Ibiza houses by Rolph Blakstad, its pages tweaked and earmarked.

It wasn't Greece, but it was Mediterranean. Besides, this architect could intuit what the client wanted with ease.

To hire him meant a leap of faith. And she thought: "Why not?" After all, a friend had said, "If you hire anyone, hire Bob White, and whatever he does, just let him do it."

So she and her husband made that leap. Her husband was on board because White projected the epitome of California cool. And she liked him because he reminded her of a surfer. "He's a laid-back dude with long hair, super-nice and soft-spoken," she says.

Their children were grown, graduated from college and living in New York. So the couple was ready for a Newport Beach house, not the 6,500-square-foot home they'd lived in for years in Corona del Mar.

"We said: 'Let's go somewhere smaller, and

travel," she says. "And there was this lot available—on one stretch of beach seven blocks long with no traffic."

So they bought it. Sure, its existing, worn-out duplex had to come down. And, yes, there was the neighbor just six feet to the east. But there was also a wide-open street on the west, with the opportunity for plenty of natural, southwestern light. Best of all, just steps away lay the sand and surf of the Pacific Ocean.

Bob White's been designing residences for 40 years now, many in Newport Beach. He's known for walking the talk of smaller homes—living in a tiny Laguna Beach bungalow from the 1930s, just 1,200 square feet. "To me, the way a house feels is more important than the way it looks," he says. "That's where trust and the leap of faith come in. It'll tell you what to feel."

His clients' 2,500-square-foot house on Newport Beach came with lot restraints affecting its form, scale, and proportion. Its site was a typical 30 by 75 feet, and its height was restricted to 29 feet. A common solution there is two stories of habitable space, with a third for outdoor living and extra room for a bedroom, office, or fitness area.

"Here, we have sleeping space, a bath and lounge area outside, and it's open to the sky with a sundeck and view of the surf," White says.

Zoning restrictions established roof pitches and the building's bulk where the third floor meets either side. "It softens the building's impact," says architect of record, Ron Ritner of the Ritner Group in Newport Beach. "When you decide to go three stories, it's like a layer cake."

An open courtyard on the ground floor allows natural light in, and is the highlight of the entry sequence. "There's the street, the gate, and then you bring light into the space with a little landscaping and greenery," he says. "It's an arrival sequence into a very compact plane."

The architects sacrificed ceiling heights on the second-floor bedroom level, to about eight feet. That gave the home a more expansive first-floor height. "In the great



room, we forewent the floor joists, but used real structural beams and tongue-and-groove above," White says. "So it feels even higher—we got rid of the insulation for the height."

Much of the home is light-filled, thanks to the fenestration on the western elevation. The light is punched up further with white-plastered walls and cabinets, a consistent theme in Ibiza houses that are plastered outside and in. "We drew some inspiration from that and interpreted it our own way and then ran it through the whole house," he says. "You see it in the kitchen: plaster frames, white oak drawers and doors—and it's repeated in the bathrooms throughout."

Outside, he selected a material palette that aims for endurance in a harsh, salt-filled and windy environment. Plaster is complemented by stone accents, and windows and doors on the oceanfront are galvanized, hot-dipped steel products. Materials that weather favorably, including wire-brushed cedar siding and trim, were used everywhere else.

Atop the roof deck, filtered light flows down through a roof of willow branches. "There's one view across the terrace under it, looking across the sand and the water, and it feels like it could be anywhere in the world," White says. "The client had to take a leap of faith on that, and that defined her as a client."

That means she fell in love with the process. "There's magic in this house because of her," he says.

But the architect delivered his own brand of magic too. After all, he walked away from a huge practice in 2003 to create his one-man firm called Forest Studio.

It was, he says, his own leap of faith. *





ood architects design nice buildings. Better architects tap into their vision and imagination. Curious, they delve beyond the nuts and bolts of a project, seeking not only to create or recreate a house but also to consider the intangible elements that endow a structure with a personality all its own. In the case of renovating an old structure with a prominent past, the challenge is to weave its history into its rejuvenation, as architect Patrick Ahearn did with the Myles Standish Hotel when he transformed the late 19th-century structure in Duxbury, Massachusetts, a quintessential coastal town, into a grande dame seaside estate.

For Ahearn, a widely recognized classical architect who focuses on historically inspired residences in New England, this was an "opportunity to hold hands with history while moving toward the future." His clients lived in a relatively new Shingle Style house next door to the hotel and bought the historic property as a precaution against any potential spec builders. They approached Ahearn to reimagine the hotel as a private residence, but not for themselves. "About halfway through the process," says Ahearn, "they fell in love with it so much they sold their house and moved into this one instead."

In its heyday, the Myles Standish Hotel was a destination for well-heeled guests from Boston and New York. There were elegant balls and spirited regattas. The resort bottled its own ginger ale and seltzers, using water from a natural spring on the site touted for its healing qualities. But time and a serious fire diminished the hotel, whose final summer season was in 1914. By the time Ahearn undertook the project, it was essentially only half a hotel, one of two brothers having moved the other half off the property.

Faced with the vestiges of former splendor, Ahearn says the undertaking "required significant rehabilitation, reimagination, and reinterpretation." As with all his projects (including renovations of the Equinox Resort in Vermont and Boston's Faneuil Hall and Quincy Market), he set out to develop a distinct narrative for the property. "We asked ourselves, What if there hadn't been a fire? What if it hadn't been split apart? What could the hotel have been?" says the architect. "We used this singular theme as a guide to



develop the new design." A notable boon to the assignment was access to the hotel's extensive archives, including numerous period photographs, along with the cooperation of the local historical commission.

While exact restoration was unattainable, Ahearn still wanted to create the new home using some parts of the existing structure. At the same time, it was important to meet his clients' desire for a functional long-term home that would accommodate aging in place, visiting children and grandchildren, two offices, and space for entertaining. Capitalizing on long views of Duxbury Bay was critical to the program.

Recalling how the Myles Standish Hotel in its prime would likely have welcomed visitors, Ahearn designed a new arrival sequence with a cobblestone-bordered pea stone drive leading to a motor court and a new street-facing front door. Once only at the rear, a prominent covered porch was also added at the front. This ensemble was completed with a flourish: "We created the notion that there could have been a carriage house associated with the property," says Ahearn. The carriage house, which gives the appearance of having been a boat shed

attached to the main house over time, links to the house via a connector wing.

Inside, what was once a maze of closedoff rooms on the first floor was completely transformed to meet the modern-day needs and lifestyle of the new owners. Large windows, French doors, and ceilings reaching nearly 11 feet feature in a seamless flow from the kitchen to the dining and living areas. Views from the newly added foyer and from a wall of glass in the kitchen look directly out to the bay.

On the second floor, where six dark

bedrooms with minuscule closets once stood, a sunlit family retreat consists of an array of en-suite bedrooms and several balconies, one extending from an expansive bathroom. The third floor's two tight bedrooms and a bathroom tucked under the eaves were reimagined into an open-plan office space, enhanced further by the addition of a Nantucket dormer for enjoying sunrises over the bay.

Ahearn explains that on the entire rear portion of the main house he "revived the porch as it was originally intended, as an

unobstructed place to enjoy the magnificence of the bay." A bayfront pool, cabana, screened porch, rear terrace, and an outdoor fireplace—all new—offer opportunities for outdoor living year-round, yet don't detract from the view nor encroach on the spacious back lawn.

In his body of work, Ahearn exhibits a singular reverence for history combined with a deft and experienced hand. Here, they reinforce the narrative of this home as a magnificent resort of yesteryear while keeping with how people enjoy living today. •









For this client, family comes first. With two girls and four boys ranging in ages from 5 to 17, home life is busy and marked by constant comings and goings for school and sports and activities.


The couple loved living in West Point Grey, one of Vancouver's oldest, most prestigious oceanside neighborhoods. Just across the street is a city park, which prefaces the sparkling blue water of English Bay and the mountains beyond.

However, the family of eight quickly began pushing the boundaries of their existing home, built in 2012. To avoid a disruptive move, and to address the newish structure's lack of history, they decided to acquire the property next door and commissioned architect Eric Stine to dream up a more expansive forever home.

The intricacies of preserving the original home near the ocean presented challenges, with restricted excavation depth and lowerfloor ceiling heights. "It was truly an engineering feat," recalls interior designer Kelly Deck, principal of Kelly Deck Design, of the transformation. "Eric kept half of the original home, but the scale of the addition is much larger than the original. It's really like new construction," she adds.

While Stine deftly achieved a seamless 8,000-square-foot new-old home with seven bedrooms and eight baths in the Craftsman style, Deck and her team tackled the couple's aesthetic goals while considering their needs, present and future. Meanwhile, landscape architect Paul Sangha refreshed the exterior with a poolscape and various outdoor-living destinations.

"This project promised to be a perfect match for my team's strengths and the client's vision of relaxed, stylish living," summarizes Deck. The wife hails from Eastern Canada and likes blending antiques with modern elements, while the husband, a Vancouver native, focuses more on architectural details and top-quality finishes.





"They make a really good pair," adds the designer. "They envisioned something different from what you typically see in Vancouver. They wanted traditional bones; they wanted to play with more contemporary furniture pieces and artwork. They wanted something lasting."

The home's proximity to Royal Vancouver Yacht Club prompted the interior's narrative of coastal elegance. Similarly, Deck and her team derived inspiration from a visit to the Hamptons, where the comfortable, unpretentious style of a friend's historic house left a positive impression. The designer and her team even referenced pictures of Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis on sailing trips or at the beach. "We wanted the home to have the same chic, restrained feel," she explains of the icon's influence.

With a base palette of white and blue, and by layering rugs and mixing antiques and modern finds, Deck created an airy, lighthearted, youthful atmosphere. The intentional use of finish carpentry throughout gave the home an older, more established feel. Stained glass windows—studded with six light-blue diamonds representing their six children—instill extra charm into the paneled stairwell, finished off with a double-height gallery of family photos in antique frames.

Not surprisingly, the new kitchen hums with activity on any given day. "We wanted a big island so my clients can feed the kids quickly, and the banquette is perfect for family dinners. It's also where the kids can read or lounge or do their homework. It's a hangout space," says Deck. The café-style banquette table, crafted from solid white oak, rests on thick plinths for easy sliding in and out.

Matching the island cabinet finish to the Le Cornue range's cheerful provincial blue "just seemed like the right choice," says Deck. An artful arrangement of blue and white china plates ("We looked all over to make this collection happen," she recalls) by the banquette adds fresh pops of blue. Bronze pendants from Urban Electric over the island evoke the feel of historic lanterns but with a modern interpretation.

Just off the kitchen is the entryway, punctuated by a central draper's table, sourced from the UK and augmented with a lower marble shelf for extra storage. "While I was staying at a French château in the Loire Valley, there was a long wood table covered in books and arrangements right when you walked in. I fell in love with it," says Deck of the European flourish. "The owners can create different vignettes depending on the season," she adds.

In the great room, Deck and her team compiled a variety of seating vignettes to fill the long, rectangular space. A custom sofa by Kelly Deck Design is centered on the fireplace, finished with a limestone surround from Jamb in London. Cushy armchairs invite lingering and gauze drapery lets light pass through.

Nods to life by the sea are subtly

intertwined into the interior design: The hardware, plumbing, and lighting are a mix of unlacquered and aged brass, evoking the look of a classic wooden sailboat. The husband's office—outfitted with navy millwork and grasscloth walls, a rope motif incorporated into the moldings, and cognac leather accents—leans nautical and feels masculine.

"Adapting to the evolving needs and tastes of this family was both a challenge and an opportunity," says Deck, adding that the older teens moved their bedrooms to the lower levels, closer to the "hangout room." This recreational space is paneled in whitewashed oak, with blue-and-copper wallpaper between the ceiling beams. "It was intended to feel richer and more intimate that the upper floors," notes the designer.


Each of the children's rooms has its own personality. Two standouts are the underwater bedroom, complete with matching wallpaper and draperies sourced from Paris, and another with a color scheme evoking the iconic Beverly Hills Hotel. The primary bedroom, in comparison, is serene, awash in white, linen, and blue toile. A pale sky blue on the ceiling brings the outdoors in.

At the start, Deck and her team strove to achieve the look and feel of a historic home that had been standing for generations without sacrificing youthfulness or freshness or fun. The result is an interior that engages the senses with interesting details at every turn. "The home is inviting from the moment you walk in," she says. "You immediately feel relaxed." *



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
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
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












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
