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
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OUTDOOR LIVING



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Some two decades ago, when Peter Stephens was just starting out his landscaping career in the village of Osterville, Massachusetts, he came across a property in the Wianno Beach neighborhood that intrigued him.

He couldn't help wondering about the estate, principally because he couldn't see over the 10-foot-high stucco walls that surrounded it.

What he saw when Dan Gordon Landscape Architects, where he is a principal, won a commission to renovate and modernize the property didn't disappoint.

Sited at the end of the peninsula where it could greet the boats as they floated by, the estate, he says, "is magnificent and rare on the Cape because it's totally hidden from the street and neighbors and has 270-degree water views plus two private docks."

He and the DGLA team designed a landscape that incorporates spaces for active enjoyment of the surroundings and capitalizes on those views.

"Preserving the views while still providing maximum privacy was hard to do," Stephens says, adding that the owners wanted the landscape to have a casual look and feel.

The stucco and red-tile-roofed Mediterranean-style house was refashioned as a Cape Cod shingle-style residence, and the grounds

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were recreated as thoughtfully designed spaces that respond to the unique environmental elements, wind and surf, while exploiting the scenery and privacy of the large lot.

The first order of business was to improve the arrival sequence by designing a cobblestone-lined pea stone drive and rerouting it so that guests are directed to the front door instead of to the guest cottage.

Because the owners use this, their vacation home, throughout the year, the front of the house features a green and white palette of ferns, rhododendrons, boxwood, and Annabelle hydrangeas that provides all-season interest.

"The area around the entry is shady," Stephens says, "because we worked around the existing large trees."

The front also is home to a vegetable garden and a potting shed that's in the style of the main house.

The back of the house, which faces the water, is sunny and filled with colorful, aromatic perennials, including catmint and lavender, that bloom in the summer when that space is most used.

The palette—pinks, purples, blues, greens, and whites—is created with a variety of plants, including daisies, agastache, and grasses.

Outfitted with a pergola, a firepit terrace, an outdoor kitchen, and a swimming pool that was added as part of the renovation, the space is the entertainment hub of the estate.

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A pool garden that's slightly elevated from the lawn connects the family's main living space to the landscape without interfering with the views.

"We designed the pool garden around the views and added a retaining wall with a short fence on top so you can still see the water," Stephens says.

To improve access to the property's private beach, the DGLA team added steps and redid the dock and boardwalk.

The biggest challenge of the project was finding a way to block the strong winds that are characteristic of the community without compromising the views.

The L shape of the house is a key component of the mitigation, acting as a buffer.

At the pool, strategically placed glass screens punctuate portions of the traditional-style Western red cedar picket fence, creating transparency and safety.


A vegetated dune, restored by the team, separates the maintained landscape from the seawall and ocean. It's planted with grasses that sway in the breeze.

The docks, surrounded by native beach grasses and roses, encourage the owners' friends to tie up their boats and stop by for cocktails.

For Stephens, it was quite fulfilling to finally peek over the wall and to create usable outdoor spaces that the owners can share with their children and grandchildren for years to come.

"Working on the property, after seeing it all those years ago, was rewarding," he says. •

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TREEHOUSE YOGA STUDIO AND POOL HOUSE

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It was the landscape that inspired Doreve

Nicholaeff's design for a treehouse yoga studio and a pool house for a secluded property on Cape Cod Bay.

The two structures complement the topography and also serve as a counterpoint to the main house, which is Colonial in style.

The owners, who spend a great deal of time outdoors at this, their vacation home, wanted an all-season, sustainable space designed for a comfortable and enjoyable environment in their backyard that nods to nature.

Nicholaeff responded by creating two transparent structures that, she says, "hover above the land" and are "simple and have an intimate relationship" with their natural surroundings.

"We worked with the colors and textures of the surrounding trees and vegetation

and nestled the architecture into the land," she says.

The treehouse yoga studio, which is in a velocity zone, is designed to withstand the flow of water in a flood. It literally lives in the treetops, its deck incorporating one of the property's existing oak trees. Its roof deck serves as an additional viewing platform.

"It feels quiet and serene," she says.

The pool house is a series of interconnected modules, including ones for reading and TV viewing, that are clad in natural materials and are FSC certified. Its sloped roof and NanaWalls are appointed with bronze and copper details that will patina with age.

Both structures use geothermal systems for heating and cooling, and the pool house has solar panels. •

BEAUTY ON THE BAY

PATRICK AHEARN ARCHITECT

On three prime acres in Duxbury Bay, Patrick Ahearn Architect designed a timeless homestead for a blended family.

Inspired by the majestic shingle-style waterfront properties that dotted the New England coastline in the early 1900s, this newly constructed H-shaped house, although it spans more than 7,200 square feet, has the look and feel of a historic seaside cottage.

"We wanted to make the house look like a restoration," says Patrick Ahearn, adding that the mix of private and communal spaces on the "spectacular site lives for today and feel warm and cozy."

White-cedar shingles that weather to gray

in the saltwater air, New England fieldstone and bluestone, along with window boxes, shutters, and copper lanterns, hint at history, as do the gabled dormers, cupola, and arched doors of the adjoining new-construction carriage house.

Symmetry, inside and out, defines the expansive residence, which was featured on *Ocean Home*'s June/July 2025 cover.

The first floor is devoted to informal gathering and formal entertainment spaces, which include a great room and an oversized kitchen with two islands. They are organized along a central spine that goes from the front door to the covered patio overlooking the bay.

The first-floor private spaces, including a

library, a screened porch, and a family room, are on the opposite side of the house. French doors in the rooms along the back of the house link indoor and outdoor areas.

The sleeping quarters are on the second floor. There are six en-suite bedrooms, including the primary one. A beautiful yet utilitarian laundry room, with two sets of washers and dryers, is flanked by an oversized walk-in linen closet that accommodates all the bedrooms.

The carriage house includes top-floor living quarters.

When the residence was completed, a long-time local stopped by to compliment it.

"I remember this house from when I was kid," he told Ahearn, who smiled but couldn't bear to spoil the illusion. •

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THE HISTORIC MYLES STANDISH HOTEL RESIDENCE




Patrick Ahearn Architect converted what had been half of a 19th-century historic seaside resort in Duxbury, Massachusetts, into a grand private residence.

Built in 1871 as The Standish House and known subsequently as The Myles Standish Hotel, the structure was split in half in 1915, and one wing was moved to another site. A century later, Ahearn and his team transformed the remaining wing into a waterfront estate for a family.

"The fact that it was half a hotel gave me poetic license to be more interpretative of what had been there before," says Ahearn.
"We took half a house and made it a whole new presentation that still captures the essence of 1871."

The new arrival sequence created by the Ahearn team makes a grand entrance, and the new carriage house reads as a boat house that had been connected to the main structure over time. A covered porch similar to one that graced the original hotel was inserted along

WAHI LANI

WALKER WARNER

In this kitchen, the central gathering spot in a new-construction house in Hawaii, Walker Warner used skylights to bring in natural illumination and to connect the space with the naturalistic island setting.

"Our original vision for the kitchen included a band of windows between the countertop and upper cabinets, but after considering the challenges controlling the views out toward neighbors, we opted for the skylights instead," says partner Kathy Scott, AIA, LEED AP.

The result is a pattern of sunlight that moves throughout the day, casting light down on the Spessart oak cabinetry and Pietra Cardosa slate counters and backsplash.

"We oriented the stone horizontally, so it reads like waves of water," says Scott. "The raised counter at the perimeter of the island keeps messes out of sight when entertaining in the living room and lanai."

The minimalist space is ideally suited to the client's surfing lifestyle, which includes walking to the beach and paddling out in the waves, and then coming home to rinse off and recover in the cool of the pool.

Like the other living spaces in the residence, the kitchen connects to a central courtyard and the pool, making the home into what Scott calls "a peaceful oasis within an active surf community."

The home's Shou Sugi Ban façade, visible beyond the kitchen island, visually connects the structure with nature, specifically the lava that's ubiquitous in the Hawaiian Islands.

"We found that the burned-wood siding has a natural luminescence that enlivens the home's interiors and reads as a jewel box within the native landscape," Scott says, adding that the team had never used it before. *

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POOLSCAPE



Seamlessly blending Hawaiian design with

oceanfront living at its finest, Peter Vincent Architects devised a poolscape dedicated to entertaining and family gatherings that creates a unique experience from the main house.

"The overall goal was to create a space that felt like a resort while drawing inspiration from the existing home, which was renovated as part of the project," says Peter N. Vincent, FAIA, NCARB. "The design had to be respectful of the required setbacks while still offering a sense of privacy and distinctiveness."

A pair of pavilions play host to a central pool and its courtyard, celebrating the beauty of Windward Oʻahu.

The courtyard is a contemporary interpretation of a tidepool garden, which is sunken to further mitigate the wind and to allow for a vertical waterfall surrounding a "floating" dining lanai.

A "Moses" walk that gives the illusion of walking on water separates pool water from living Taro and Koi ponds and gives access to a lounge seating "island." A cascading, tiered water feature and native plantings work in



environmental harmony with the architecture.

The multifunctional entertainment pavilion is sited next to the house yet is set back far enough from the beach to allow a large lawn that showcases panoramic views.

To buffer the pool and outdoor living spaces from the frequently strong on-shore trade winds, the design team fashioned a pool pavilion that has two large lanais, an outdoor Above, Framed Mokulua Islands views through the pool/entertainment pavilion from the common area of the guesthouse pavilion.

dining area perched over the pool, a kitchen, a shower room, and a flexible space that can be used as a living area.

One of its special features is the pop-up TV screen, which is tucked into a recess in the foundation so it's not visible.

The guest house pavilion has a hospitality area, a bathroom, three guest rooms with indoor-outdoor showers, and a recreational area for Ping-Pong and other activities.

The pavilions, which have wide overhangs and distinctly Hawaiian rooflines that echo the character of the main house, are open on both ends to frame dramatic views and connect with the landscape.

The poolscape, a prime example of indooroutdoor living in Hawai'i, merges the architecture and landscape and takes advantage of the views, including those borrowed across adjacent properties, breezes, natural plantings, and beach setbacks.

"Everyone remarks on its hospitality-inspired, resort-like atmosphere," says Vincent. "It feels like a hidden oasis tucked away for the owner and their guests to enjoy in the heart of a popular beach town." *

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In a plan that complements the classic

architecture of the house and that breathes in sync with the setting, Dan Gordon Landscape Architects created an outdoor oasis on a waterfront property in Osterville, Massachusetts.

After tearing down the old house to build a new shingle-style house and guesthouse, the owners commissioned the team at Dan Gordon Landscape Architects to create environmentally sensitive outdoor spaces that feature the animated views and enhance the character of the property, which faces West Bay and offers boat access to Nantucket Sound.

Although the lot is small—it's surrounded by coastal buffer areas—the owners' program was quite ambitious. They envisioned a pool, a spa, and a pool house as well as seating and dining areas for entertaining family and friends.

"It's their primary home, so the program was significant," Dan Gordon principal Patrick Taylor says. "A central challenge was to make the design of these elements connect seamlessly with the buffer areas to both the west and north."

Collaborating closely with the architect,

the team created a sense of arrival with a chipseal drive with cobblestone accents that curves toward the entry court.

The native plantings are carefully curated to merge with the landscape, transitioning from more formal in the front to more relaxed in the back, which faces the water.

A pair of white-flowering crape myrtle trees that mirror the double gables flank the front door. They, as well as banks of white hydrangeas and staid boxwood, set the tone and give a hint of the vision to be discovered as each space is revealed like the pages of a book.

In the back, colorful perennials, including Russian sage, catmint, and agastache, liven things up, encouraging guests to put their feet up as they watch the boats in West Bay.

To that end, the terrace by the guesthouse is edged by tussock hair grass, which Taylor says was chosen because "it flows back and forth in the breeze."

A honey locust tree provides dappled shade—and serves as a vertical design element—poolside.

Many of the trees on the property were incorporated into the new design, which enhances the natural look of the property.

The back elevation was not level, a factor that "gave us the opportunity to create

intimate and expansive views," says Taylor.

Dan Gordon Landscape Architects designed a series of stepping-stone terraces, creating what Taylor calls "a multilevel design that connects interior and exterior spaces."

To tie all the spaces together with the architecture, the team designed a Chippendale-style gate on the side of the house that relates to the exterior railings on the residence. And they repeated the reclaimed New England granite that was used on the veneer of the house on the series of walls that retain and support the landscape program on the bluff.

The backyard amenities are centered around the pool house, a structure that opens on two sides, erasing spatial boundaries. It

flows onto a patio with an ipe deck that has a view of the boats in the bay.

"The beautiful property was the inspiration for the design," Taylor says. "And it was a team effort."

The owners love the fact that the property gives them a strong connection to the water. "Each space was designed with the intent to capitalize on the visual and physical connectivity to West Bay," Taylor says. *

LIVING BAJAAT KIMPTON MAS OLAS A RESTORATIVE RETREAT WHERE OCEAN VIEWS, PRIVATE PLUNGE POOLS, AND THE SPIRIT OF TODOS SANTOS COME TOGETHER IN PERFECT RHYTHM. BY MELISSA C. GILLESPIE

There's something hypnotic about waking up to the Pacific. At Kimpton Mas Olas in Todos Santos, the ocean isn't just a view—it's a presence. It shapes the day's rhythm, from sunrise to sunset.

Set on Baja's rugged Pacific coastline about an hour north of Cabo San Lucas, Kimpton Mas Olas is an adults-only escape with a focus on wellness, sustainability, and immersive luxury. While many resorts chase extravagance, Mas Olas finds its beauty in the details: native gardens, intuitive architecture, and the feeling that you've stumbled upon something that wasn't made for Instagram but for you.

I started every morning with a run along the beach, the sand still cool beneath my shoes and the waves rolling in a steady

cadence beside me. The shoreline here is expansive and wild-no packed lounge chairs or noisy vendors, just the sound of the sea and the occasional hawk overhead.

A PLUNGE POOL WITH A VIEW

Afterward, I'd head to what quickly became my favorite part of the trip: my private plunge pool. Positioned just outside my villa with uninterrupted views of the Pacific, it was the perfect spot to cool off, float, and take in the horizon. I spent hours there—reading, thinking, doing nothing at all. Some villas also come with firepits and outdoor showers tucked into the landscape, but for me, it was all about that pool and the view.

Throughout the resort, water is a central element. The main infinity pool, with its

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sleek curves and in-water loungers, leads to a sunken swim-up bar that's ideal for a midday cocktail—or a long afternoon. And there's something refreshing about being surrounded by water while still feeling so connected to the land.

SAVORING BAJA, ONE DISH AT A TIME

That connection is felt everywhere at Mas Olas. Built on what was once a poblano chili farm, the property embraces its roots. Nine interconnected gardens supply the kitchens with herbs, fruit, and vegetables, while the citrus groves and apothecary garden provide ingredients for both cocktails and custom spa treatments. I joined a workshop at the resort's apothecary, foraging for lavender and hoja santa before blending a personalized oil scrub. It was hands-on and grounding in a way few spa experiences are.

The culinary program is equally rooted in place. Chef Sandro Falbo draws on regional ingredients and traditions with thoughtful, creative execution. At Kahal, the oceanfront restaurant, I lingered over a Baja seafood platter while watching the sun slip behind the surf. Botánica, set in the garden, serves rustic dishes like roasted goat and slow-cooked barbacoa unearthed from the traditional pit. Centro Café became my daily stop for smoothies, local coffee, and those "bee bowls" made with fresh honey and pollen from the resort's own hives.

ROOTED IN WELLNESS AND NATURE

But Mas Olas isn't just about indulgence. The spa blends sacred design with natural materials, offering treatments in outdoor nests and hydrotherapy in a quiet, gardenframed circuit. What stood out most to me was the apothecary experience, a chance to engage with Baja's botanical healing traditions firsthand. It's a resort that invites you to engage, not just observe.

EXPLORING THE SPIRIT OF TODOS SANTOS

Mas Olas is also a gateway to nearby Todos Santos, just 15 minutes away. A historic artists' town with cobblestone streets, it's where you'll find open-air









cafés, surf shops, and art galleries that feel refreshingly local. The vibe is casual, creative, and authentically Baja.

Back at the resort, that same spirit pulses throughout the property. It's luxurious, yes, but not in a flashy or performative way. It's a place that invites you to slow down and engage. To taste, to move, to breathe.

WHY YOU'LL WANT TO RETURN

When it was time to leave, I packed a few things I didn't arrive with—a small jar of apothecary oil, a pressed flower from the citrus grove, and a renewed appreciation for what it means to feel truly present.

Kimpton Mas Olas isn't a place to check off a list. It's a place to live in, if only for a few days. •

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The narrative in the case of Claxton House, a new single-family residence in the historic Long Island, New York, whaling town of Sag Harbor, so deftly weaves history and historical fiction that its timeless tale rings truer than truth.

Architect Andrew B. Cogar, president of Historical Concepts, which has offices in New York City and Atlanta, and Hamptonsbased interior designer Bryan Graybill won two Ocean Home awards for the residence they designed for one Ensign Claxton, a character they conjured up from the past to guide the project.

Their vision started with a small 19th-century ice-storage warehouse at the edge of the cove that was demolished to make way for what they call an unremarkable 1950s tract house that they were commissioned to renovate.

The 1.5-acre waterfront site is next to a rail line that, long ago, was decommissioned. The property's utilitarian past, as well as Sag Harbor's industrial heritage, became the basis for their shared design vision.



"The existing house sat on the water," Cogar says. "We wanted to keep that nautical connection, both as an experience and as the framework for views."

Striving for sophisticated simplicity, they

imagined a more romanticized version of that original warehouse, seeing it as a rope-making concern that would have been added to the property as its proprietor, Ensign Claxton, late of the English Royal Navy, prospered.

A combination of built-in and freestanding kitchen furniture evokes a casual European sensibility, with pots, pans, and dishware on open display. Large windows inspired by warehouse doors line the sink wall, opening to engage with the front garden.

Interior windows create a transparent partition wall between the entry hall and kitchen. This industrial-inspired design element defines both spaces while allowing shared light and views between them.

Claxton, they imagined, had conducted a raid against the Americans at Sag Harbor in the War of 1812. He lost the battle, but he fell in love with the town, making it his home and building a house that reflected his European-inspired design sensibilities.

The pair are quick to point out that history records that there was, indeed, an Ensign Claxton who led a drunken disaster raid on the town. But that's where his American story ends: He returned to England.

The warehouse-turned-residence narrative plays out architecturally on the exterior in humble materials (the façade is wood planks and wood-shingle siding punctuated by carriage doors) and implied additions (a two-story wing and a single-story wing look as though they were added at different time periods).

Because the backyard is only 10 feet from the water, Cogar and Graybill centered the entertainment area in the front of the house.

A path from the parking court leads to the garage/pool house, which is styled as a carriage house, then to the pool and a dining grove shaded by crape myrtle trees. There's also a "secret garden" hidden behind banks of boxwood.

The interior walls of the house were removed, creating loft-like, hospitality-oriented spaces that are artfully partitioned with paneled screen walls to create distinct areas.

Natural illumination, framed views, and indoor-outdoor features are the defining thread.











"The spaces are separate, but they share light, which is an English convention," Graybill says. "They don't take light for granted. The glazing goes almost to the ceiling."

A club-like parlor, complete with a gentleman's bar, and a three-season porch overlook the water; a primary suite nestles under a snug roofline; and a cozy reading nook with casement windows has a tree-house-like view.

A small office off the primary suite that's wrapped in windows provides sightlines across the water and to the neighboring porch. And the guest suites are reminiscent of those in a luxury boutique hotel.

Walls of windows in the back of the house not only illuminate the spaces but also frame water views. Elements such as the sleeping porch, whose brass railing looks as though it came from a ship passing by, blissfully blur the lines between indoors and outdoors.

The interior décor was influenced by English design—Graybill and Cogar looked to Arts & Crafts, Regency style, and the Aesthetic Movement—as well as English, French, and Viennese traditions at the time of the railroad's heyday in the 19th century.

The open kitchen, which Graybill styled as a workroom, has a distinct English accent.

"Unlike in America, it's not an extension of the living room," he says. "There's no built-in cabinetry; the pieces in various woods we designed are fitted to look like furniture."

Cogar adds that "the practical informs the pretty—everything is easy to grab," which comes in handy when guests volunteer to help out the chef.

Like the other rooms in the house, the kitchen features a mix of antiques and custom furnishings that have the elegant look of times gone by.

The living room, whose banks of windows bring the water nearly close enough to touch, is the perfect fusion of Cogar's and Graybill's old-new/indoor-outdoor aesthetic.

There, a curvaceous apricot banquette is paired with a 1930s-style gentleman's bar, designed by Graybill and fabricated from old-growth wood by a fourth-generation English cabinetmaker. Vintage Thonet

Top to bottom, Above the parlor is the primary suite, its ceiling height mandated by the plate heights of the previous home. This challenge became a charming opportunity, allowing for a cozy reading nook and casement windows that provide a treehouse-like view over the water.

At the bed wall, intricate millwork and glazed interior windows provide a dramatic backdrop, concealing a dressing room in plain sight while maximizing natural light and views throughout the primary suite.





chairs and a vintage Edward Wormley coffee table complete the cozy scene.

The ceiling, painted a high-gloss cream, reflects the natural light.

Throughout, Cogar and Graybill embraced the concept of shared space, playfully hiding things in plain sight.

In the primary bedroom, where the blue marble of the fireplace mantel evokes the water visible through multiple multipaned windows, the bed's headboard backs up to a closet that's defined by another wall of windows. Café curtains on the lower portions of the glass pique interest yet prevent peeking into this personal space.

The narrative continues in the office, which is appointed with a window seat and a vintage desk.

"We imagined that it had been an old porch," Cogar says.

Cogar and Graybill embraced the challenges of the project—town regulations, for instance, forced strict height restrictions that impacted the ceiling of the primary suite.

"Architecturally, we made the most of the limitations," Cogar says, adding that the resulting organic nature of the façade fits in with other historic homes in Sag Harbor. "They forced us to get out of our comfort zone and to be creative and inventive."

And, he added, "we compressed 200 years of authentic history into the house," a fact that would have made Ensign Claxton exceedingly proud. •

Inspired by a sandcastle, this vacation home, in the planned community of Alys Beach, Florida, represents the singular vision of the architect, Jeffrey Dungan.

"After some initial meetings and sketches, the client pretty much gave me carte blanche," he says. "We clicked, and he told me to design the house that I would like to live in."

The result, a white stucco Modern Gothic residence that hints at the ecclesiastical, is what Dungan calls "a really cool place to recharge on long weekends and vacations."

A large multipaned Gothic spire gives the front façade the feel of a cathedral but with a modern ethos.

The heart of the home is the central courtyard that wraps around the four-level structure like a shawl. Dungan conceived it to provide privacy from neighboring houses and to serve as an entertainment hub. To that end, it's filled with a variety of over-thetop features that channel a boutique resort.

The roof terrace is accessed via the marble waterfall wall via a stair from the lower courtyard, where he placed a swimming pool.

The circular bottom of the third-floor hot tub forms a skylight that illuminates the bar on the second floor and opens to the swimming pool. A 14-foot marble wall beside a marble stairway becomes a gently splashing waterfall that's made to be touched and heard, as people flow up and down.

"Overall, there's a bit of a fantastical, kind of James Bond feel to the house," Dungan says.

Throughout the house, he employed sculptural Gothic arches to add classical drama and to serve as serene grounding architectural details.

The kitchen, for example, is set in an arched nook that makes it separate yet still visually connected to the living room,

which is made of board-formed concrete with a three-sided fireplace, creating a communal gathering spot that opens to the courtyard.

In the primary bedroom suite, groined arches form a celestial-like ceiling for the bed, which looks as though it's under the protection of heaven.

The indoor spaces graciously open to the outdoors, seamlessly connecting to a private, almost secret landscape.

Natural materials, including marble, oak, and linen, are designed to soothe the senses. But even they push the envelope. In the primary bath, which is appointed with a burnished-silver metal soaking tub, the wall is clad in black and white marble whose ink-jet pattern gives it the quality of graffiti or a work of abstract art worthy of a luxury gallery; in this house, the walls are the art.

One of the few specific items the client requested was an office, a space that Dungan chose to make different from all the others in the house.

In contrast to the snowy whiteness of the rest of the interior and exterior of the house. the office is black, its walls and ceilings covered in wood burned in the ancient Japanese technique of Shou Sugi Ban.

The treatment turns the space into a protective womb, a sanctuary for relaxation as well as work.

The project, which took four years, was challenging. Dungan, who has designed other houses for the community, incorporated Alys Beach's complex urbanism with rules on height, style, color, and materials into the house without compromising his ideas.

He had more leeway in this house than the others he designed in Alys Beach because the 8o-foot-square lot—two adjoining plots—was exceptionally large.

The fact that the client imposed virtually no limitations actually made the project particularly difficult.

"Design is the search for limitations," Dungan says. "If I can do anything, I almost can't find a place to begin."

And, he adds, he had to keep asking himself, "How can I create this place, and what am I basing my decisions on?"

All in all, though, he concedes, "It was a great problem to have."

When the residence was completed, Dungan was a little reluctant to turn over the kevs.

"I would live in it in a second," he says. "As a vacation place, you feel like you're in a whole other world." *





Set boldly along the coastline of Makena on the Hawaiian isle of Maui, this residence, designed by Walker Warner, brilliantly balances openness with privacy and sunlight with shadow.

In the front, the half-acre waterfront estate presents itself as a modest, single-story structure defined by a board-formed concrete wall that wraps around a courtyard.

But behind the façade, the house is two stories of glass and steel that open up to the seascape and a white-sand beach.

The owners "had a very clear vision," says Walker Warner associate principal Amadeo Bennetta, RA, LEED AP. "The grand, 180-degree uninterrupted view of the coastline is revealed only after you enter the home."

The island of Maui, the house, and the location hold special significance for the owners. "It was a passion project," Bennetta says.

Envisioning the house as a place to entertain family and friends, "they wanted each room to be unique and have a purpose," he adds. "The house has a distinct, special vibe that reflects them."

The program they desired was simple: five bedrooms, an office with a corner view for him, a den in a bunkered-down space for her, a family room that opens to the pool, and an open-concept living room, dining room, and kitchen whose spaces are connected to the outdoors via a lanai and serve as an entertainment hub as well as a central gathering spot.



"The public spaces are important to them because they can all be together in them," Bennetta says.

Light plays a prominent role in the house, whose natural palette of rugged, low-maintenance materials, including board-formed concrete, cypress, and steel, complements the local basalt that exists on the site and allows it to live harmoniously with its surroundings.

Skylights and clerestories perforate the minimalist structure from all sides, flooding the interior with light while activating textures on the concrete and cypress walls. Inside, vertical wood louvers separate spaces while inviting sunlight to filter in.

Beyond ushering the light in, the architecture also had to counter its harshness. The 10-foot roof overhang facing west acts as the primary defense to intense exposure and heat gain. It is bolstered by a system of pocketing slatted screens at corner windows that filter in afternoon sunlight.

Inside, the ocean breezes that define the island flow through large sliding-glass doors. Ceiling fans maximize natural ventilation and minimize energy consumption.

With these elements, the house, which has LEED Silver certification, harnesses the elements in a beautiful and sustainable way.

The project came together so well because "the clients were right with us or even one

step ahead of us," Bennetta says. "They understood the value of textures, materials, and finishes."

The main challenges of the project were drawing the best-suited subcontractors from a small labor pool and getting products shipped to the island while still staying within the construction timeline.

The clients, Bennetta says, "have lived in the house and have loved it. The spaces feel uniquely tailored to their desired lifestyle and fit them just right."

So enthused are they, in fact, that not only are they spending more time at the residence, but they also have commissioned the Walker Warner team to design a guest house for them on an adjoining lot. *






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
