CONTINUING EDUCATION - THREAT OR OPPORTUNITY?

Until now, after initial registration as an Architect by the State, all any of us had to do to maintain that privilege was to stay out of trouble and pay a biennial fee for license renewal. Now, the State is indicating they will begin to enforce a long standing provision of the Registration Act that allows for "a demonstration of continuing professional competence shall be required and evaluated by the Board." (Public Act 299, 1980, Section 2009)

Last January the State Board of Licensing and Regulation met in Lansing. On the agenda for that regular meeting was a proposal for retesting for Architects for re-registration at the time of license renewal. The goal of that proposal was for us to re-prove our proficiency each time we renew. Fortunately representatives from your MSA Board and staff were present to hear, and object to, that suggestion. Instead of that dangerous proposal being accepted the State Board cordially allowed MSA to suggest an alternative proposal for consideration. We (MSA) have been given 1 year to formulate a plan to meet the mandate of the State and establish guidelines for a program and reporting technique to satisfy the State's demands.

MSA President Dick Fry asked me to chair a task force to look into the alternatives. I invited Dick Slocum,

Carl Pirscher, Linc Poley, Bob Beckley, Steve Whitney, and Hank Kowalewski to join me in this effort. We have met several times and are on our way to what we hope will be a "win-win" solution for all concerned.

The Task Force has viewed the State's mandate as an opportunity not a threat. Rather than viewing this demand as a need to re-prove our ability, we accept it as a way we can maintain our proficiencies we originally proved at initial registration. All of us will benefit from the availability of programs/seminars which will keep us abreast of changes in practice or technology. Chapters stand to gain membership by providing programs and your MSA organization will benefit by providing record-keeping, clearinghouse services for all Architects in the State, whether members or not. Your benefits as members of MSA/AIA continues to grow!

The goal of the Task Force is to keep our program simple, achievable by all, easily reportable and verifiable, and credible to the State Board. We have reviewed similar programs in other States and other professions; we have consulted with AIA for their input. While it is too early to outline specific thoughts, the Task Force is centering its efforts in three areas. Re-testing was considered and eliminated as unacceptable. Currently still under consideration for credit toward a re-registration goal are:

1. Practice - Based on your involvement in an architectural practice or education, you will be given credit for that full (or part) time exposure.

2. Non-Credit Education - Part of your requirements might be met by participating in informal professional activities. AIA involvement, seminars, self-study, and significant travel and research might all be considered.

3. Credit Continuing Education - Formal programs, approved by the State and offering C.E.U.'s might be offered by MSA, Chapters, or institutions.

Specific numbers of credits/units/hours in each category have not yet been formulated, but it has been discussed that credits in at least two of the three categories be met. Consideration has been given to Architects who have retired, or are in education, in industry, and in remote locations; depending on your individual desires and constraints, you will be able to design your own program for continuing education!

The Task Force will be sending a first, interim report to your MSA board in October at the Detroit Convention. Input from that meeting will be taken into consideration and a final recommendation brought back to the board at its December meeting. Ask your Chapter's MSA Directors for a report on those recommendations and give us a feedback on these important matters! We will be taking a final proposal to the State Board of Licensing and Regulation in February 1991 for their review and hoped-for acceptance. Implementation of that plan will be up to that body.

MSA PROPOSED BY-LAWS CHANGES

These By-Laws will be discussed and voted on at the annual business meeting on Thursday, October 18, 1990 at Cobo Hall in Detroit, Michigan.

ARTICLE: #3, Dues, Fees and Assessments; Section 1, Annual Dues; Paragraph "d."

PRESENT LANGUAGE:

d. Exemption. Members Emeritus and Honorary Members shall be exempt from payment of annual dues.

PROPOSED LANGUAGE:

d. Members Emeritus shall be assessed an annual fee to cover the costs of mailing etc. The annual fee shall be determined by the Board of Directors of the Society.

e. Exemption: Honorary members shall be exempt from payment of annual dues.

ARTICLE: #5 Board of Directors; Sec. 1, Membership; Paragraph c.2, Election of Student Associate Director

PRESENT LANGUAGE:

2. The Student Associate Director shall be appointed by the regional officers of the AIAS region including Michigan.

PROPOSED LANGUAGE:

2. The Student Associate Director shall be selected to serve for one year term on the Board by a process defined by the American Institute of Architects Student Chapters (AIAS) in the Michigan region. Only accredited schools of architecture shall be eligible. The accredited schools of architecture in the State shall alternate the position annually. Should a school not have a candidate, the position advances on to the next school in the rotation.

ARTICLE: #5, Board of Directors; Section 1, Membership; Paragraph c1, Election of Associate Director

PRESENT LANGUAGE:

1. An election for the office of Associate Director shall be held at the business meeting held in conjunction with the Annual Fall Convention of the Society. Nominations shall be made from the floor by any Associate Member in attendance. Voting will be by secret ballot of Associate Members present. Election will be by plurality of votes cast.

PROPOSED LANGUAGE:

1. An election for the office of Associate Member Director shall be held at the Society's Business Meeting at the Society's Fall Convention. Nominations shall be made by the Chapters and presented by the Directors at the June Board Retreat. Additional nominations may be made from the floor at the time of election. Term of office is one year. Voting will be by secret ballot of Associate Members present. Election will be by plurality of votes cast.

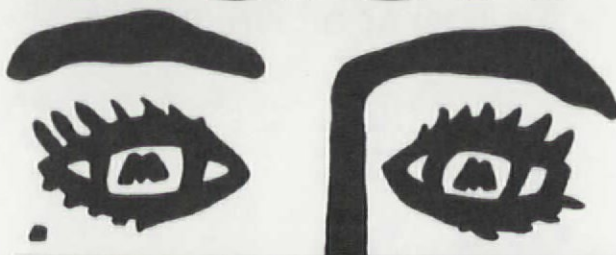

1990 RECOGNITIONS

NORM HAMANN MSA GOLD MEDALIST

The Michigan Society of Architects president Richard Fry, AIA, will present the 1990 MSA Gold Medal to Norman Hamann, AIA, Western Michigan Chapter member and past MSA President at the 75th Annual Convention. The medal will be presented to Norm during the Awards ceremony at the Detroit Institute of Arts on Friday evening, October 19th.

The Gold Medal award is to recognize an individual architect who has clearly demonstrated distinguished leadership in the profession over an extended period of time, such services being over and above that expected of any official capacity, and by his leadership, advance the cause of the profession and provide an inspiration to fellow practitioners.

Norm is president of Diekema/Hamann/Architects, Inc. of

Kalamazoo. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan. The AIA has been a way of life for Norm and he has served both the local and state levels for many years. He served on the MSA Board during the fund drive and renovation of the Beaubien House and was instrumental in seeing that phase of MSA come to a conclusion. Dialogue between the profession and the schools of architecture was initiated during Norm's term of office as president. He realized the importance of the Intern Development Program for young architects and worked with the State Board of Licensing to help implement this program in Michigan. In addition to his commitment to AIA, Norm has served on a variety of community boards.

RICHARD ROCHON MSA HONORARY MEMBER

Honorary Memberships are awarded to people who are not eligible for AIA membership but who

have rendered distinguished service to the profession of architecture or to the arts and sciences allied with architecture. Richard Rochon meets and exceeds the criteria established by the MSA for Honorary membership and will be presented with the membership during the awards ceremony.

Rochon has provided support to Michigan's architects as the state's most widely known renderer. He has been in business since 1962 and is president of Rochon & Associates. He attended LTU, and has been a faculty member teaching drawing and rendering techniques at LTU since 1978.

He has authored "Color and Architectural Illustration" and with Harold Linton, an LTU colleague, "Color Model Environment", two books that provide indepth analysis of color for renderings.

PAINT THE TOWN

On Saturday, August 18, 1990, almost 6,000 volunteers representing 75 corporations and organizations from all over the Detroit Metropolitan area gathered in a neighborhood on Detroit's west side to participate in the Third Annual Paint the Town project. Using volunteer labor, donated supplies and services, and monetary contributions, they painted the homes and spruced up the yards of 200 senior citizens, disabled adults and low income residents to help maintain their independence.

This uplifting, hands on, people-to-people event was sponsored by the Michigan Corporate Volunteer Council in cooperation with Project Pride, a branch of the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce. Paint the Town's intent is much more than putting paint on the homes-- the goal is to build self-sustaining neighborhood organizations which can continue to maintain and improve the area long after the volunteers have gone home.

This year, Paint the Town was covered by Channels 2, 4 and 7, several radio stations, Crain's Detroit Business and Detroit Free Press.

Team Leader Pam DuBois recruited twenty seven people from four architectural firms to represent the Detroit Chapter AIA. The team scraped, re-glazed windows, primed and painted the trim, windows, doors, front porch, back porch, and garage of Mrs. Beulah Dysart's home.
