Dear Friends:

As I sit trying to outline my thoughts for a "Message" for this season of the year between Thanksgiving and Christmas there have been interruptions for which I should be and am deeply grateful. Interruptions that may be typical for each one of you, whether you be president of a corporation, school official, government official, professional, member of the building industry — or just a "daddy." First, the old jalopy which the boy could not get to run, the "simple subjects" and "simple predicates" which are a new hurdle for Betty Ann, the whereabouts of her "Tell" magazine of the littlest one, and Ginny with her algebra and latin difficulties. My first assumption was that this might be peculiar to our United States, but this could be true of a family in many lands today as civilization and communications extend from the metropolises of the east and west, the settlements of the frozen north to the villages in the jungles of the far east. Is not each daddy, whether white or black, yellow-skinned or red, concerned for his own — as "testing" continues?

With no apparent solution to disarmament and no agreement as to control of testing of nuclear weapons whether low or high yield, whether underground or above, "We are only seven minutes away from complete and total destruction." We of this nation have been blessed with almost total freedom from turmoil and strife. We look forward to a boom in building in 1962 predicted by the Department of Commerce to reach a record \$60-

billion in new construction. And yet we criticize the communist world for its worship of material things when we in this country are fast turning these two significantly Christian holidays into pagan celebrations. Celebrations of Christmas parades before Thanksgiving, bargain sales before and after, and an exchange of material gifts that would be the envy of both Solomon and the Queen of Sheba. There is an ever-increasing conflict between materialism and Christianity. The architectural profession is concerned with the material things of this world as we build, but as a means and not as an end to form and to shape space to better serve mankind in this age of ever increasing technical knowledge and know-how. A light shines through, for in our concern for the material there is a deep sense of responsibility toward our fellowman and his welfare.

As Christmas approaches a consciousness of the Golden Rule filters in and there is evidence of patience and understanding, a greater concern for others and less for self. Some are saying that "Christmas is for the children," but let's not forget the deeper meaning for the Christian world. May we as the architects of North Carolina extend to our many friends throughout the state and the nation every good wish for them and their friends, and to our colleagues throughout the world, and pray for peace on earth and good will toward all men.

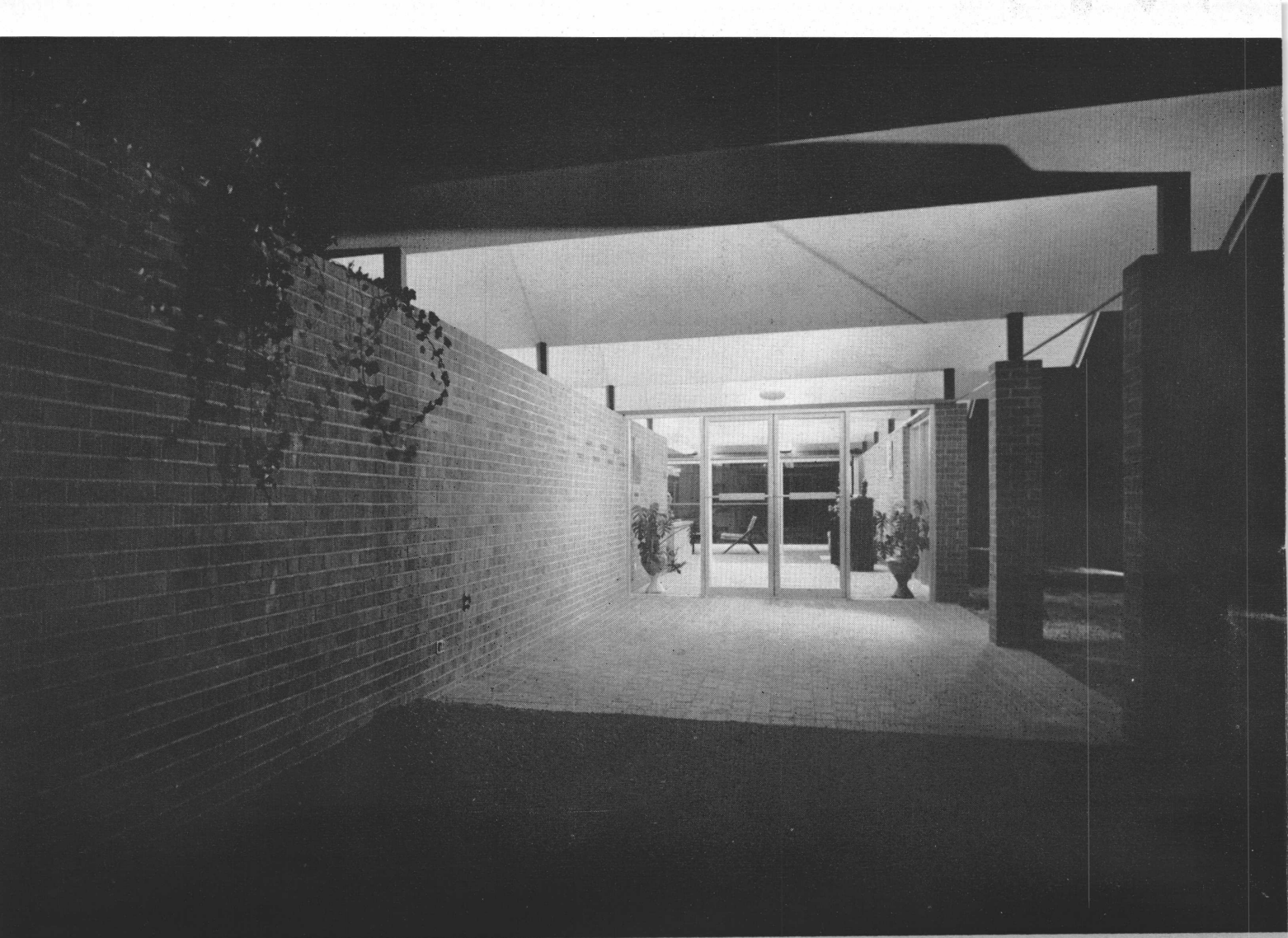
The quotation above is from the brochure designed especially for the Chapter's exhibit at Charlotte, October 12-21, 1961. America's first state-sponsored trade fair was coordinated by the Division of Commerce and Industry of the Department of Conservation and Development. Directed at buyers from all over the world, the Trade Fair showed what our state is and what it can be. The North Carolina Chapter is honored to have been a part of this display by over three hundred exhibitors.

Displayed by the Chapter in the Merchandise Mart were photographs, color slides, educational pamphlets and a model. Three films were shown on a scheduled basis in the Mart Theater.

Our exhibit was in operation from eleven each morning till nine-thirty each night throughout the run of the fair. Hosts were the members of the Charlotte Council of Architects, the Exhibitions Committee and the Public Relations Committee of the Chapter. The very fine cooperation of those architects who loaned us their photographs and those who gave so many hours of their time made a success of this major public relations effort.

Since this was a chapter effort to show North Carolina buildings by North Carolina architects, no names were listed other than the title of the buildings shown. The hosts at the booth explained why we were in Charlotte and answered all questions.

The Chamber of Commerce of Hickory is easily recognizable from either direction of busy four-lane U. S. Highway 70, where it is located. A structure which projects a community spirit of progressiveness and efficiency, it is well designed to take care of present and future needs of this growing industrial community.

A reception area of warm and inviting colors is combined with a display area where photographs, murals and plaques may be displayed. Space is

allocated for exhibition of locally manufactured products, up to ten such units.

The Executive office can accommodate small meetings of ten or less and a Board room is provided to accommodate 50 persons.

Of particular interest is the folded plate roof with white vinyl emulsion covering. The simple rectangular plan of the building consists of 12' x 12' square bays, both interior and exterior.
