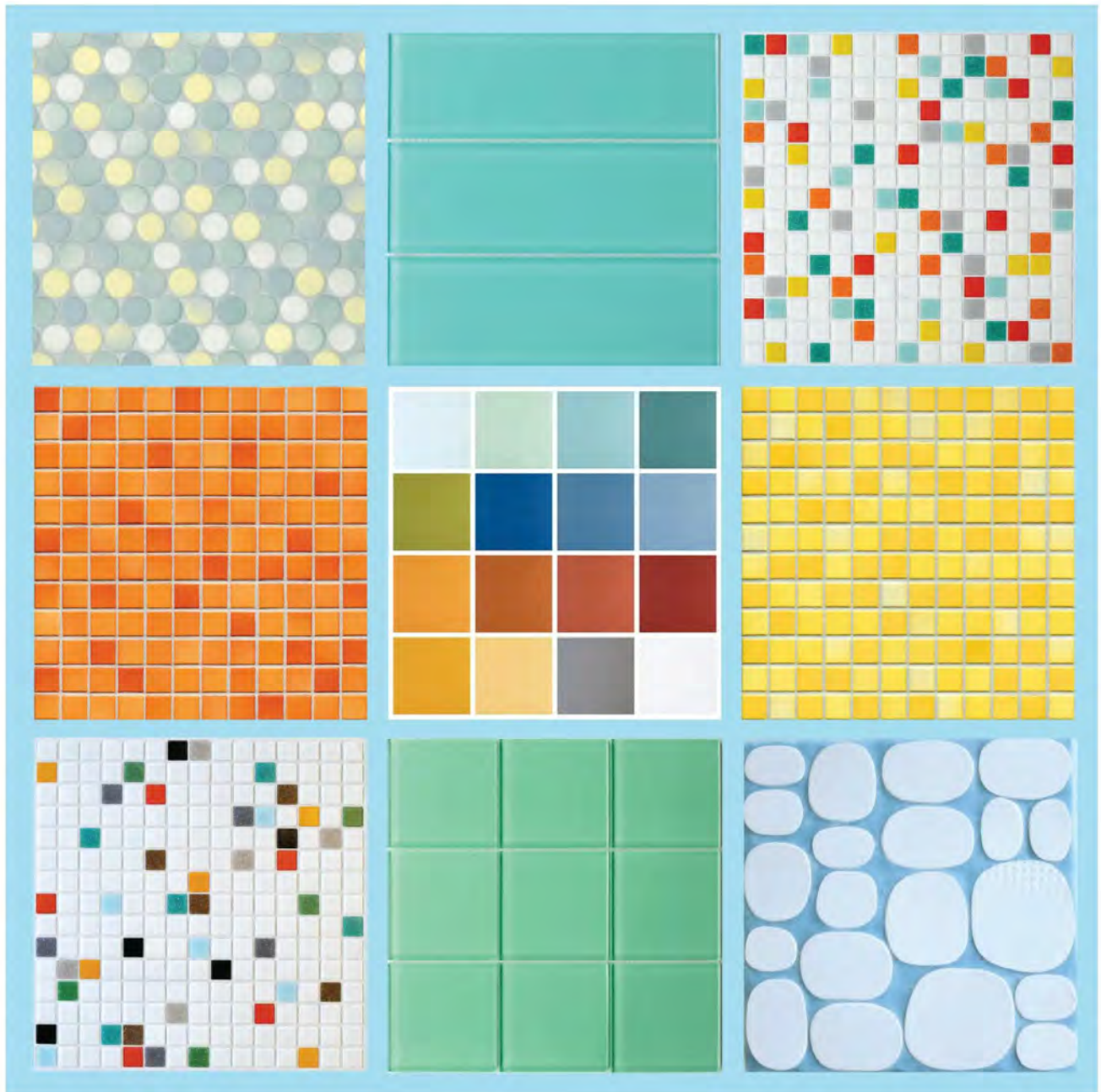

Brass Menagerie

These diminutive finds are big on vintage style.

BRASS HAS BEEN USED in decorative objects since antiquity. But in the 1960s, it took a peculiar and charming form as shiny objets d'art. Small, often animal-shaped, figures became wildly popular decorative accents, continuing a trend that began in the Art Deco era. However, in the mid-century, their forms became simplified and stylized, just as everything else in modernist aesthetics.

Highly collectible and valuable examples can be found from artists like Walter Bosse, who became known for his signature chunky forms in black and gold brass. Simon Kops' designs spanned the other end of the spectrum; his animal metalwork was thin, wiry and minimal. Josef Hoffman's animals bore

an earthy patina and were Rubenesque in their proportions yet lithe with their details. Companies like C. Jeré became known for using brass as a signature material in crafting animals in motion, such as a flock of birds in flight that appears to launch from the wall.

But the charm of this collectible may be in the ubiquity of them in their most humble and accessible form: the shiny, mass-produced versions that were displayed on the mid-century housewife's vanity or the advertising man's desk. They bear no stamps or maker's marks, yet whether as a mouse, a swan, a bull or a giraffe, they always succeed in putting a smile on your face. What more can we ask of something we select to adorn our interiors?

Bright Ideas

THERE IS NOTHING QUITE LIKE a pop of color mixed with the clean lines, bold and unique shapes and sleek finishes of Mid Century Modern design. For designer Sarah Bronstein of Sukkha Interior Design, color is magic. With a passion for all things interior design and over 10 years of experience, she is also a real estate broker based in Western North Carolina.

Though she's located on the opposite coast, when the owners of this Palm Springs home reached out to Sarah for help in a complete renovation, she eagerly took on the challenge.

"WE LIKED THE IDEA OF A TEAL KITCHEN, ESPECIALLY SINCE WE FOUND THE LOUD YELLOW TILES WE PUT IN THE ENTRYWAY. I CHOSE A SIMPLE SUBWAY TILE TO KEEP THE DESIGN MINIMAL WITH CLEAN LINES SINCE WE WERE USING SUCH A BOLD COLOR."

PANDEMIC & PLANNING

Envisioning the property as a sunny and fun home to be rented out as an Airbnb vacation rental between uses, the owners purchased the home at the end of 2020 and soon took the plunge into demolition work. Overwhelmed by the endless array of choices and design questions as well as the supply challenges surrounding the pandemic, the homeowners called on Sarah from across the country to help them.

"I worked with them on the renovation and selected all the fixtures, furniture and décor for the home," Sarah says.

The changes made to the home were fairly extensive, including a rework of the backyard and pool footprint as well as a garage-to-casita conversion. In the kitchen, modern updates were made to create space and connection instead of the original closed-off design. "We opened up the wall and replaced it with the peninsula to open to the dining and living room," Sarah says. "It was a box and very dated."

MID MOD FLAIR

While the only original elements in the home were the architectural structure and the fireplace, Sarah wanted to keep the sparkle and spirit of 1960s Palm Springs in the redesign.



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/ INTENTIONAL DESIGN /

In many mid-century homes, the kitchen footprint is smaller than today's spaces. While typically vacation and rental homes don't need as much kitchen space as a primary residence, there are still challenges in designing the most optimal use of space for both style and function. Sarah Bronstein offers the following tips to remedy this challenge.

- **OPTIMAL & OPTICAL.** Working in a smaller space means you need to find the right balance between form and function. "Be intentional with storage and open shelving, which gives the illusion of more space than upper cabinets," Sarah says.
- **FOCUS ON FINISHES.** Create an enhanced design by choosing design elements that do more for the space. "Try to use finishes that elevate, like a tile backsplash," Sarah advises.
- **VERTICAL VISION.** Tighter spaces demand creativity to cram in all the functional use you can without sacrificing the look and feel. "Use all the vertical space available, like open shelving or cabinets that go to the ceiling," Sarah says.
- **LET IN LIGHT.** To keep your space from feeling small, cramped and dingy, look for the light. "Make sure you consider light sources, both natural as well as fixtures," Sarah says.

SLANTED CEILINGS AND A FIREPLACE WERE PART OF THE ORIGINAL HOME DESIGN, ANCHORING THE CONTEMPORARY UPDATES FIRMLY IN MID MOD STYLE. SARAH'S VISION FOR THE WHOLE HOME DESIGN WAS TO FEEL CONNECTED AND COHESIVE. "IT, LIKE THE REST OF THE SPACE, BALANCES BOLD, MID MOD STYLE WITH CLEAN, TIMELESS DESIGNS," SHE SAYS. LARGE FLOOR-TO-CEILING WINDOWS ALLOW NATURAL LIGHT TO POUR INTO THE SPACE.

OPEN SHELVING IS A GREAT OPTION FOR VACATION AND RENTAL HOMES AS IT PROVIDES A VISUAL BREAK OF DENSE CABINETRY BUT STILL OFFERS A PRACTICAL STORAGE SOLUTION FOR MOST-USED ITEMS. PLAYING AGAINST THE BOLD BACKSPLASH, THESE FLOATING SHELVES CREATE THE ILLUSION OF A LARGER SPACE.

"We knew we wanted to do a modern take on mid-century with bright colors and bold patterns," Sarah says. She collaborated with the homeowners to select the two primary colors—teal and a rich yellow—which are repeated throughout the home. Sarah also made sure to incorporate elements that are quintessentially mid mod. "Every choice we made, from selecting light fixtures to furniture to a rug or piece of art, was with intention to pay homage to the mid-century design history of 1960s Palm Springs," she says. "For example, Sputnik chandeliers, retro wall treatments and clean timeless lines."

Vibrant and bold, this kitchen is a feast for the eyes as well as a thoughtful nod to its roots. 🌿

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POSTWAR

Classic desert modernism meets

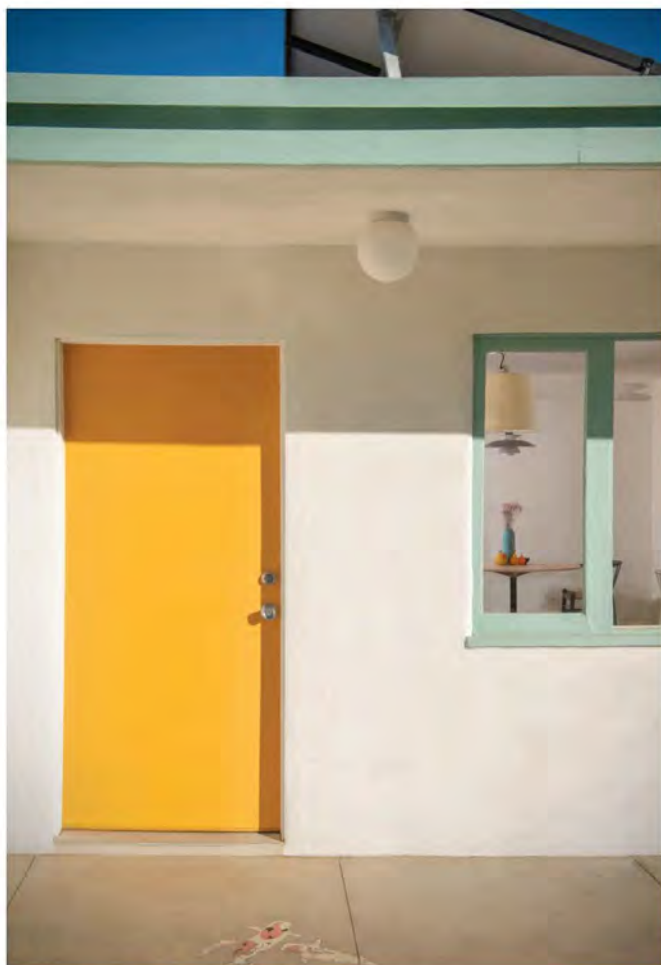


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WONDER

ONE OF THE most fascinating aspects of architecture is the role geography and climate play in shaping the layout, look and structure of a building. With its extreme temperatures and rugged, breathtaking vistas, Palm Springs is one of the most celebrated gems of the Mid Century Modern movement and the location of much ingenuity by renowned architects and designers.

In 1945, architects Albert Frey and John Porter Clark worked with developers Sallie Stevens and Culver Nichols to create a modern, affordable housing tract for war workers in Bel Vista. While most of the other homes have been remodeled in different styles, this home, recently listed by Lilian Pfaff and Nate Cole of Modern California House, stands with some updates but mostly resembling its original layout and style. With a passion to promote well-designed homes, Lilian and Nate share what makes this house special and how it exemplifies the congruence of modern and contemporary living.

POSTWAR BOOM

As with many Mid Century Modern homes, this one is part of a larger tract of 15 houses built to fulfill the housing crisis at the end of World War II. The concept of affordable "minimum dwellings" first appeared in Europe at the end of World War I, illustrated by the exhibition "The Dwelling for Minimal Existence" in 1929 Frankfurt, Germany. "The Bauhaus in Germany as well as CIAM (Congrès internationaux d'architecture moderne) at its founding conference in La Sarraz, Switzerland, in 1928 dedicated their architectural studies to this question how to design affordable houses, which resulted in prefabrication, prototypical floor plans, mass production and all kinds of different housing types, with the rowhouse as outstanding example," says Lilian, who is also an architectural historian and adjunct professor.

While European architects struggled with limited space, architects carrying the torch in post-World War II America dealt with limited materials and an immediate need for homes for soldiers wanting to start life afresh. All of these influences resulted in the creation of this flat-roofed, originally three bedroom, 1,100-square-foot home.

THE ART OF ARCHITECTURE

As is often the case with tract homes, the design of each house in Bel Vista followed strict architectural aesthetic rules. Within this framework, Frey built in certain features modified to the context of Palm Springs, taking great care to mind the hot desert sun and often harsh winds. "A long driveway led to the cantilevered roof over the otherwise open porch, which wrapped around to the main entrance door into the living room to keep the house cool from the blazing morning sun," Lilian explains. "Seven doors opened from the inside to the outside so that every room was accessible from the garden, which also allowed for cross ventilation and then later for very straightforward additions."

However, in the pursuit of the practical, Frey did not neglect the aesthetic. While tract homes can often feel cookie-cutter and contrived with their uniform appearance, Frey took care to change the layout of each of the 15 homes to create a visually diverse architectural landscape.

"Throughout the housing tract, the standardized ground-floor plan was mirrored or twisted around so that none of the houses are the same and the street facades all look different," Lilian says. "This was emphasized also through the different placement of the houses on the site."

CONTEMPORARY UPDATES

While most of this house remains the same as its 1946 conception, over the decades previous owners have made various modifications to accommodate changing times and needs. "Frey anticipated the need for future additions to the original plan, allowing homeowners to enlarge the house on three sides without changes to the interior layout," Lilian says.

Expanding the floor plan to 1,418 square feet, the original open carport is now an additional bedroom, while a built-out patio was transformed into another bathroom. "A covered patio retains the shade of the original extended eaves," Lilian says. The layout largely remains the same, though a wall has been removed between the kitchen and other living spaces to create a more contemporary

open look and feel. Renovations of the bathrooms and kitchen have been thoughtful and with the intent to keep true to the roots of the home. "Furthering Frey's ideas on harnessing natural elements for comfortable living, solar panels now generate electricity for the home," Lilian says.

Though produced in the utilitarian setting of postwar California, Frey's design manages to transcend mere functionality and stands as a testimony of Modernism's ability to bridge the divide between practical and inspirational. As architectural historian Barbara Lamprecht puts it, "The property exemplifies Frey's ability to synthesize the humility of everyday needs with the fresh and creative interpretation of Modernism, even in this modest house." ❀

All About **ALBERT**

For many mid mod enthusiasts, Albert Frey needs no introduction. Renowned for his pioneering "desert modernism" architectural style, Frey is responsible for much of how we perceive Palm Springs today. Originally from Switzerland, he immigrated to New York during the Great Depression and was hired by architect Lawrence Kocher, with whom he designed the legendary Aluminaire House.

After spending a couple of years in Palm Springs doing work for a different firm, Frey settled in the city in 1939. He collaborated for two decades with John Porter Clark, a fellow architect, and then decided to start his own practice. His work spans from public buildings such as City Hall to numerous residential houses and tracts across the city. Without a doubt, Frey's importance in shaping how we understand Modernism specifically within the context of Palm Springs remains undiminished to this day.

Take a drive around town to eye these other iconic properties by Albert Frey:

The Raymond Loewy House (1946)

600 West Panorama Road

Frey designed this home around a boulder pile for industrial logo designer Loewy, even incorporating one large boulder into the pool area.

Palm Springs City Hall (1952-1957)

3200 E Tahquitz Canyon Way

Designed in concert with Clark and Chambers and local architectural firm Williams and Williams, Frey's most notable public construction boasts eye-catching breeze blocks, sleek lines and a showstopping entrance featuring a cutout roof through which three palm trees tower.

Palm Springs Aerial Tramway Valley Station (1963)

1 Tramway Road, Palm Springs, CA 92262-1828

In another collaboration with Clark, Chambers, Williams, Williams and Williams, this design was inspired by New England covered bridges and boasts of an abundance of glass windows to allow for spectacular glimpses of the mountain.

Tramway Gas Station, aka the Palm Springs Visitor Center (1965)

2901 N Palm Canyon Drive

Originally an Enco gas station and later transformed into the Visitor Center, this iconic building boasts of an unmistakably mid mod roof design: the hyperbolic paraboloid.

Frey built in certain features modified to the context of Palm Springs, taking great care to mind the hot desert sun and often harsh winds.

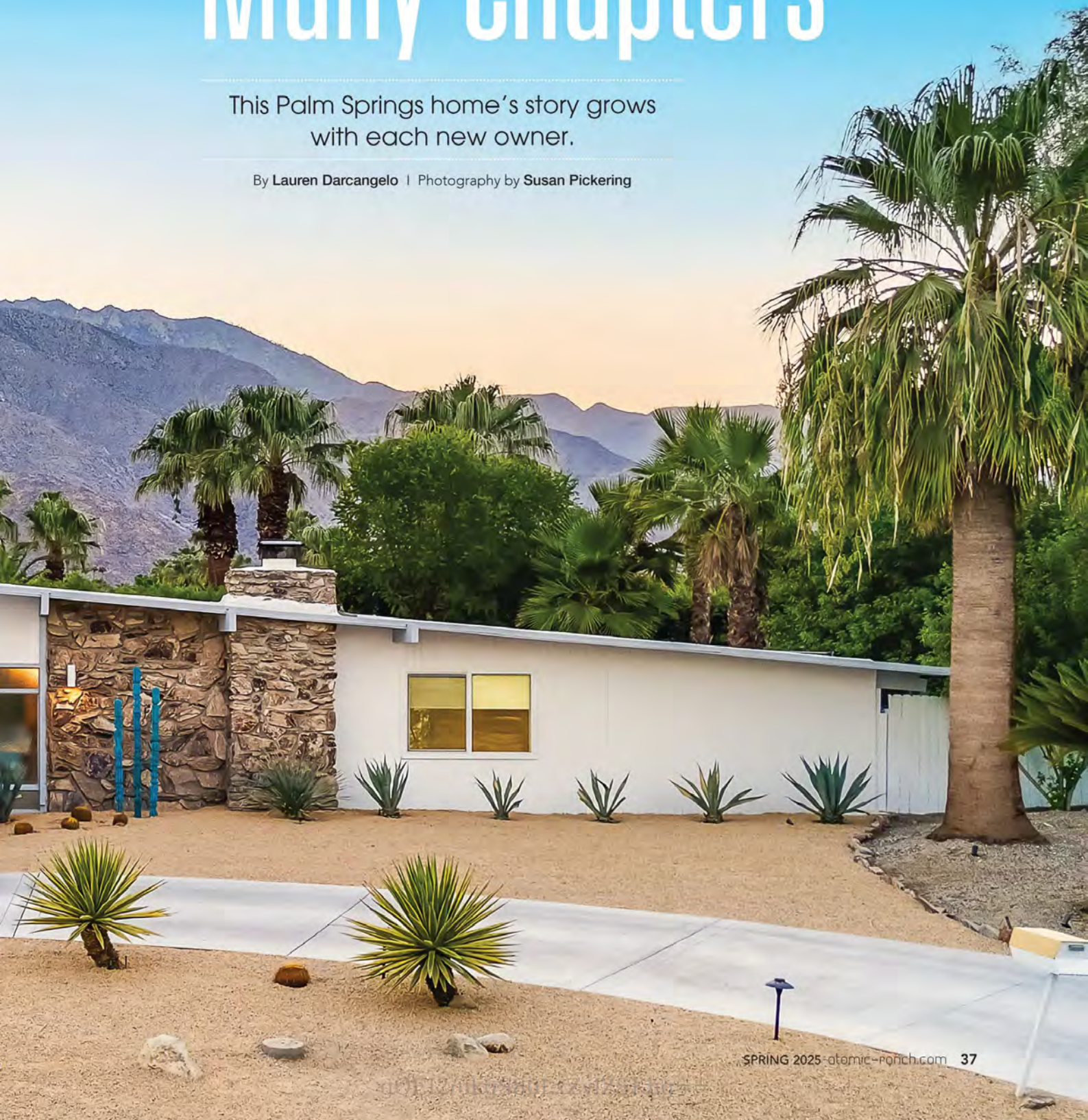


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A Home of Many Chapters

This Palm Springs home's story grows with each new owner.

The mark of a well-maintained mid-century home is its ability to live multiple lives, stories and aesthetics through various owners. For Santa Monica residents Matthew and Perry Helderman, their home on Orchid Street is one of those stories.

"We love design, art, history and architecture, and Palm Springs was always really a retreat for both of us as we're building our careers and our life out in LA," Matthew explains. With his career in the film industry and Perry's in ceramics and interior design, weekend escapes to the desert became a regular respite and the couple quickly started learning more about the history and architecture in the area. "We toyed with the idea of getting a house in the desert for a few years," Matthew says.

THE PERFECT FIT

While it wasn't the first home they made an offer on, this 1958 house, designed by Palmer & Krisel architects and built by the Alexander Construction Company, immediately captured their attention. "When we first walked into the house, it was impressive given the open floor plan," Perry says. Since they were looking for their second home and a place they'd eventually list on as a vacation rental, the couple didn't want to undertake a major remodel or something that would require a lot of work.

Fortunately for them, the home was being sold fully furnished and they liked everything inside. "For me, it was actually really surprising to find a home where I actually wanted to purchase the furniture," Perry says. "The previous owner had done a really good job." The aesthetic was simple and straightforward, with a few furnishings the couple loved. Previous remodels made changes that benefited the couple's lifestyle, like turning the garage into an extended main living space. "Any of the remodeling that had been done was very simple," Perry says. "It was kind of a blank slate as far as the furniture additions."

THE MID-CENTURY CANVAS

Purchasing the home during the pandemic made it a frequent escape and an opportunity for the couple to take what had been started and make it their own. "We always wanted to keep with the mid-century design but add our own special eclectic taste to the house," Perry explains. Many of the home's original features had been preserved, such as the stone fireplace and the wood-paneled ceilings—the perfect backdrop to add finds from the local markets, antiques shops and galleries. "For me, as a designer, it's always about the thrill of finding the next exciting piece, and I know Matt and I together share that as a couple," Perry says. "We're always on the hunt."



INSPIRED BY THE PARKER HOTEL

In the kitchen, Perry and Matthew used this passion to create a tribute to one of their favorite places: the Parker Palm Springs hotel. "If you've walked around the Parker, you've probably seen that open area by Norma's with its collection of mid-century glass in different sizes, shapes and colors," Matthew says. Inspired, the pair began hunting for their own collection.

The colorful glass pieces they've discovered over the years found their home in the kitchen, where a previous owner's remodel kept the space simple and fresh. "We ended up with around 20 or 30 pieces," Matthew says. "And while we're taking a few of our favorites with us, most will stay in the home to give it that extra pop of color and keep that Palm Springs vibe." Displayed on a high kitchen shelf, the glass adds vibrancy and character—a legacy the Helderman's will pass to the next owners.

TRANSFORMING THE OUTDOOR SPACE

Perhaps the couple's most dramatic impact on the home is the backyard remodel. "We wanted it to feel like an oasis and separate the areas to make them more intimate," Perry says. "It's definitely something we're proud of." The couple also added five large palm trees, expertly using landscaping to create cozy gathering spots around the pool and fire pit. This goal of intimacy extended to their complete pool and hot tub overhaul. "We redid the pool and added recycled glass tile from Portugal to the outside of the hot tub. The idea was to make it a little jewel box, a destination within the space," Perry says.

PASSING ON A LEGACY

The arrival of their first son, along with life taking them in new directions, prompted the couple to sell the home. While they know they'll always go back to Palm Springs, both Perry and Matthew feel a sense of bittersweet closure. "We had so many amazing memories here with friends and family, so it feels like we're passing the torch to the next." Matthew reflects. For them, this sale is part of the cyclical nature of homeownership, a chance to pass on a space that's been enriched by their time, vision and memories. And as they bid farewell to their desert retreat, they know they're leaving behind a legacy for someone else to build on. 🌵

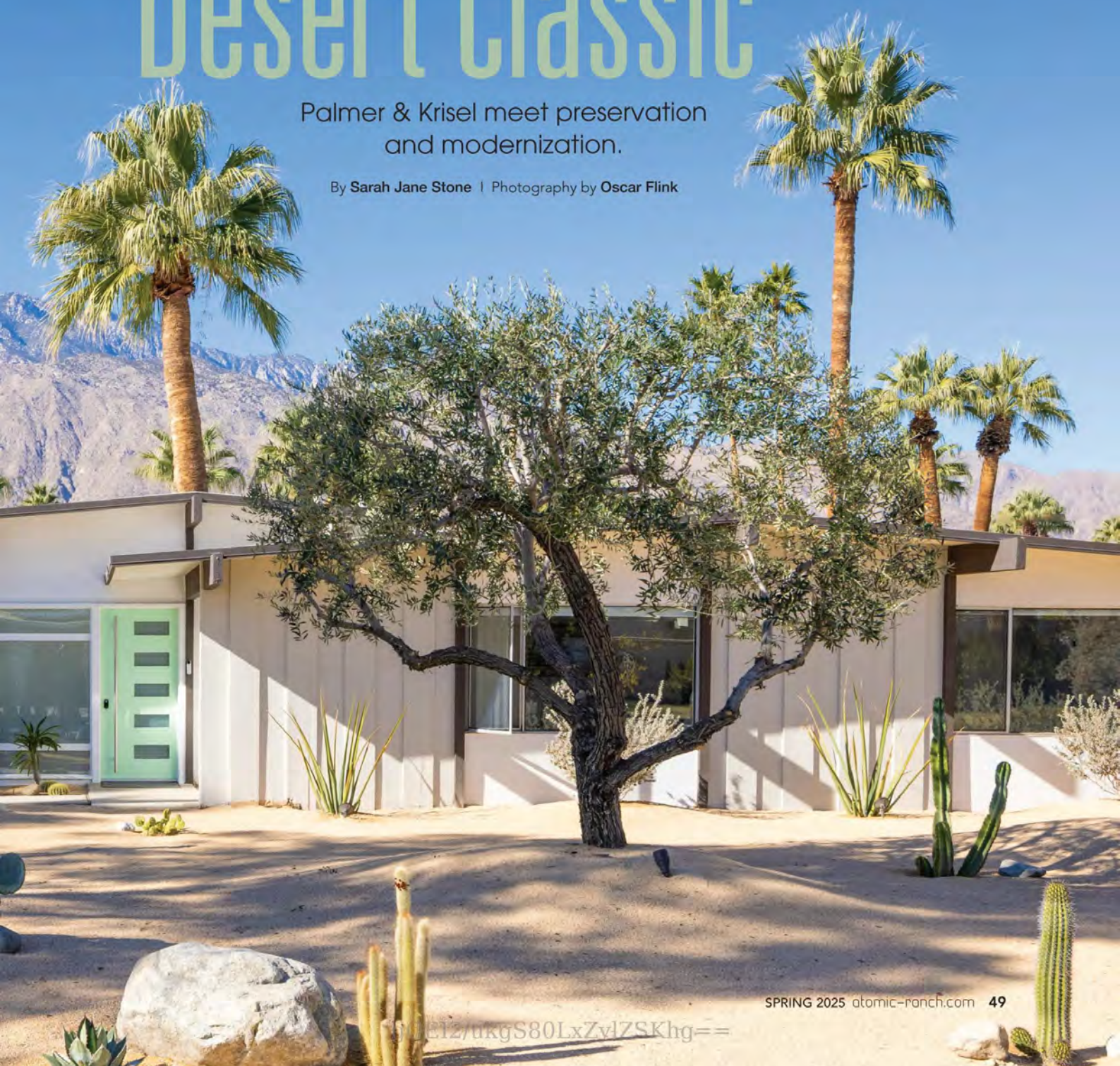

Desert Classic

Palmer & Krisel meet preservation
and modernization.

SIMPLE YET REFINED, THE LIVING SPACE IS A FAMILY FRIENDLY ENVIRONMENT THAT ISN'T FUSSY AND CAN ADAPT EASILY FOR GUESTS.

Tucked away in the iconic Little Beverly Hills neighborhood of Palm Springs sits a once-neglected Palmer & Krisel home. Today, it is a lovingly restored testament to their understated brilliance and architectural genius.

Designed in 1957 and originally built by the Alexander Construction Company, this desert gem found new life thanks to the passion and dedication of architect Daniela Grozdich and builder Victor Grozdich. Purchased in 2022 as a second home for the couple and their two young sons, Luca and Milo, the family spent the next year meticulously preserving the home's original spirit while introducing modern touches that align with today's design sensibilities.

MOVIE MAGIC MEET-CUTE

Daniela and Victor's connection to mid-century architecture runs deep. Over the years, the couple has explored Palm Springs' architectural treasures. They fell in love with the iconic designs of William Krisel and the Alexander Homes, and it wasn't long before the couple began dreaming of owning and restoring their own slice of architectural history.

"I remember walking past a rundown Palmer & Krisel home years ago in Little Beverly Hills and joking to my mom, 'That's the one I'd love to bring back to life,'" Daniela recalls. "It felt

like an impossible dream at the time, but little did I know we would one day make it a reality."

Fast forward five years and the opportunity finally appeared. They spotted a listing for a dilapidated 1957 Krisel Alexander house in its original form—untouched by any major renovations. "It was everything we had been searching for," Victor says. "No one had enclosed the carport, no additions had been made—it was the perfect blank slate."

Despite its condition, they were undeterred. The couple made an offer on the house without even seeing it in person, confident that they could restore it to its former glory. When they arrived in Palm Springs to see the house for the first time, Daniela had an epiphany. It was the exact house she had commented on all those years ago. With that, their journey to bring the home back to life began.

MATERIAL MATTERS

Victor and Daniela's approach to the renovation was rooted in respect for the home's original design while imagining how a mid mod home might be interpreted today. The home was built to feel spacious despite its modest 1,371 square feet. Not wanting to add or make major structural changes, the duo had a lot of work ahead of them.

"We didn't want to recreate the 1950s exactly but rather think about what choices a modernist architect would make in the present day," Daniela explains. "We wanted to preserve the soul of the house while updating it for contemporary living."

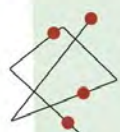
The renovation was led by Daniela, who designed the interiors, landscaping and hardscaping, while Victor

took on the role of general contractor and personally handled all the glasswork—a skill he honed over the years. Key design elements like walnut and pegboard kitchen cabinets, terrazzo tiles and hairpin legs are nostalgic nods to Krisel's original interiors but are paired with contemporary materials that modernize the home without sacrificing its charm.

Cooking Up *Cool Design*

Daniela and Victor's kitchen has undergone a stunning transformation that honors the original design while introducing some essential modern functionality.

The original kitchen layout, though full of character, was cramped by an awkward fridge placement and a tall cabinet next to the sink, making the space feel tight and workflow inefficient. For Daniela and Victor, the goal was not to replicate the past but to imagine how a modernist architect would approach that same kitchen today.

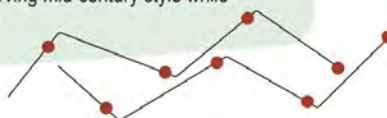
"We thought about what choices a modernist architect would make now, incorporating new technologies while staying true to the home's original spirit," Daniela says.

The new design is clean and uncluttered. The fridge, a stacked washer and dryer, and pantry are cleverly concealed behind walnut panels, keeping the space tidy and streamlined. The Grozdichs carefully considered how every inch of the space could be made functional while preserving the home's open, airy flow.

"The kitchen feels spacious and cohesive, with a sense of openness that matches the rest of the house," Daniela says.

Notable mid mod touches, such as hairpin legs on the base cabinets and custom slanted fronts on the upper cabinets, pay homage to Krisel's design language. Meanwhile, modern touches, like the fully integrated fridge and a floating dish drawer, bring the space into the 21st century without sacrificing its mid-century charm.

With an emphasis on clean lines, functional design and timeless style, this kitchen is a perfect reflection of the Grozdichs' commitment to preserving mid-century style while modernizing it for the sake of livability.

The original footprint and spatial flow were carefully preserved. "Every detail was considered," Victor notes. "For example, we kept the open floor plan and large windows, which blur the lines between the interior and the spectacular desert landscape outside."

RATED (VERY) CHILD-FRIENDLY

The kids' room features a creative art wall that was inspired by the Grozdich family's love of design and their time spent in Palm Springs.

"We often bring other families with kids to Palm Springs, and we thought it would be fun if the art wall could be filled with memories from all of our guests," Daniela says. "It's a space where kids can get creative and make it their own."

ACT II: STYLING

The open living space was designed with comfort and versatility in mind. "We wanted it to feel modern and cozy," Daniela says. "Since we often have a bunch of kids in the house, it couldn't be too staged or precious—it needed to be practical and adaptable for spontaneous get-togethers."

The furniture choices are influenced by mid-century style but have a European sensibility. "I was inspired by Berlin apartments, which are often modern but cozy," she says. "We wanted to capture that feeling here."

That same sensibility, a merging of modernism and comfort, is seen in the primary suite. Through carefully chosen furnishings they have created a tranquil retreat with sweeping views of the desert and mountains.

"Waking up to that Palm Springs view is magical," Daniela says. "The mountains glow pink in the morning when the sun rises. It's unlike any other place."

Victor adds, "We really wanted to capture the feeling of being in Palm Springs. The combination of sunshine, palm trees, desert and modern architecture has drawn people here for decades. It's what makes this place so special."

This Palmer & Krisel home is more than a Mid Century Modern gem—it's a labor of love that perfectly balances historic preservation with modern sensibilities. For the Grozdich family, it's not just a home—it's their "happy place," a retreat where design, nature and family come together in harmony. And for those who visit, it's a breathtaking example of how modernist architecture can respectfully evolve. 🌵

1. Agua Caliente Resort

With properties in Rancho Mirage, Cathedral City and Palm Springs, it's easy to step inside an Agua Caliente resort and escape into a different type of excitement and luxury. From live music and a premier casino to fine dining and shopping, it's 24-hour entertainment at your fingertips. Or try the newly opened Spa at Séc-he at the Palm Springs location. With the sacred mineral springs of the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians as the muse of the setting, the spa is as much of a cultural experience as it is a healing one.

2. Indian Canyons Golf Resort

Built in 1961, this once-private club was a favorite haunt of Hollywood celebrities like Frank Sinatra, Bob Hope and Jackie Gleason. Former U.S. presidents, including Ronald Reagan and Lyndon B. Johnson, also walked these fairways.

3. Palm Springs Art Museum

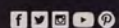

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Young Talent

The Palm Springs Modern Committee is inspiring the next generation of designers and architects.

WHILE MANY MODERNISTS flock from all over the world to visit Palm Springs to admire its mid-century history and architecture, there's a large constituent of people who have no idea about the significance of their city—and they are perhaps the most important people of all: the local kids.

"So, we've got all these people coming here from all over the world, yet our own children growing up here really don't know much about it and we wanted to remedy that," says Joan Gand, the Palm Springs Modern Committee (PS ModCom) Education Committee chair. PS ModCom is a nonprofit organization dedicated to the appreciation and preservation of Desert Modernism. The group actually predates Modernism Week; in fact, they are founding members of that organization too. Today, they organize some of the most sought-after tours of the annual event.

However, PS ModCom's work happens all year. Along with year-round tours, preservation awards and exhibits, their education programs are the heart and soul of the organization. The group's work with local students began in 2014, at St. Theresa School. Inspired by the art teacher's model building project, Robert Imber, a founding member of PS ModCom and a prolific preservationist and champion for modern design, pitched a program that aimed to educate the students on famous local buildings. The session would

conclude with the students creating scale models of the buildings. The program was a hit and continued for a handful of years until Robert passed the torch to Joan, who was able to fulfill Robert's dream for the program by integrating it into the local public school system.

Today, the program, called BEAM (Building Educational Architectural Models), is now an educational component in six area high schools and middle schools, and even offers a Robert Imber Scholarship awarded to three high school seniors each year. The scholarship pays them \$2,500 a year for four years and is intended to be an aid as they pursue studies in the field of design.

Board member Hugh Wakeham describes the BEAM program further: "We become a segment within the art-class program," he explains. "It's a three-day segment of lectures followed by a six-week segment of bus tours and finally the model building."

The students' models also go on display—for Modernism Week and other events, like the Preservation Matters conference, and at the Palm Springs Public Library. "Every year, there is a student competition at a local nonprofit gallery called the Desert Art Center," Hugh says. "The gist of the competition is that there is a winner from each category and the school that the winner attends gets a check for buying supplies."



"We want to keep expanding and adding more students and teachers and basically grow it organically, as word of mouth spreads. We hope to keep expanding it and having as many students learn about architecture and modernism as possible," Joan says. "Our motto is 'preservation through education.' If a student learns to love architecture and then grows up in a position to perhaps vote to save local history or even be on a construction crew of a historic building, to have that understanding is crucial to continuing preservation for the next generation."

The program is also about accessibility. There are trips out of the classroom to visit local landmarks and modernist homes. The students get to see how they live and feel. "It's so rewarding for all of us," Joan says. "The students in Palm Springs are not the 'snowbird' families that come here in the wintertime. They are the working-class families. These kids have no idea; they've never been to these kinds of places. It's about getting them out there and seeing it. They realize there is more out there than their bedroom and even their classroom."

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Artist Kathleen Strukoff is a PS ModCom member and helps teach the programs educating the students on what modernism architecture is, who the "rockstar" architects are who were key in the development of Palm Springs. "There is nothing that compares to the hands-on experience of creating something, and the teachers are always amazed how it works like magic with the kids," Kathleen says. "That is when you know that some of the kids who didn't seem like they were paying attention were actually listening! In the long run, every year we see kids who weren't necessarily thinking about going to college decide that they want to study architecture or something related to that, oftentimes becoming the first person in their family to go to college."

As far as the impact on the community? "The kids learn that they live in a very special place in the world of architecture," Kathleen says. "They discover that there is special history in the places they pass by without knowing about that history and that people from around the country and the world come here to see these places. It gives them a sense of pride about their community and opens their eyes to new studies and careers they had not thought about. The impact might be that new paths are opened for some of our young people in the community and some of them will become the future leaders of the area. The other impact is that this knowledge will help preserve the special buildings in the future when, as I tell them, they are 'in charge' and will make sure things don't get torn down in the name of progress." 🌸



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Desert Modernism

The land of fantastic rooflines and sun-smart design gave way to a signature style of Mid Century Modern design.

AS A STYLE OF Mid Century Modern design, Desert Modernism takes key mid-century elements like sleek lines and open spaces a step further by giving them a Desert Modern twist. But this style isn't found just anywhere: True to its name, Desert Modernism is found most frequently in the arid oasis of Palm Springs, California.

The sunny skies and year-round warmth of Palm Springs made it a vacation destination in the mid-century and its natural beauty didn't hurt too much either. Because of this, the town adopted an informal and relaxed feel, and its architecture started to follow. Here, form followed function as expansive glass windows characteristic of the style showed off the picturesque Coachella Valley and dramatic overhangs protected the interior from midday heat.

WHAT DOES DESERT MODERNISM LOOK LIKE?

The exteriors of Desert Modern homes first and foremost reflect the beauty of the surrounding landscape. This is done through large walls of glass; ample windows and high clerestory windows that let the outside in; low, sleek lines that make buildings blend in with the scenery and open interiors that keep that airy desert feeling.

Desert Modernism also uses natural building materials like wood and stone as a way to blur the line between man-made and nature-made. Block walls and breezeblocks are signature materials that bring earthy texture into the designs.

Structures were heavy with shaded breezeways and overhangs that addressed the harsh sun. Large expanses of outdoor spaces and muted exterior colors were also part of the style's harmony with the landscape.

And because these homes were not often year-round residences, it paved the way for more bold and daring designs, such as the angular rooflines and geometric façades.

THE ARCHITECTS

Before the arid landscape attracted the glamorous Hollywood stars that the area's history is well-known for, the seeds of desert design were planted by agricultural pioneers who were driven by the prospects of date farming—the crop that is the true jewel of the desert today. In 1922, Rudolph Schindler designed a cabin for Paul Popenoe, a scientist and USDA agricultural explorer. The cabin was simple, with low-slung flat roofs that might have been influenced by Pueblo Revival style, but it was decidedly minimalistic and certainly created with the climate in mind: The house featured four open-air sleeping porches that were feasible and suitable to a mostly dry climate. The stage was set, therefore, for this sturdy and strategic form that would withstand the valley's conditions.

There are many architects who produced prolific work in the entire Coachella Valley, but Albert Frey is widely considered one of the founders of Desert Modern style. He once wrote to his boss and mentor Le Corbusier: "The sun, the pure air, the simple forms of the desert create the perfect conditions for architecture." While Swiss-born Frey's design foundation was built in Belgium and France and was informed largely by the De Stijl and Bauhaus movements, it was in the California desert that he truly honed his signature works.

Frey designed Palm Springs City Hall, the Aerial Tramway Valley Station and the Tramway Gas Station, now the Palm Springs Visitor Center. And then there are his most notable residential works: Cree House II; the Lowey house; his private residences, Frey house I and II; and, of course, the small Bel Vista House.

Donald Wexler cut his teeth in architecture working for Richard Neutra shortly after graduating from the University of Minnesota, but once he moved to the desert in 1952 he never left. Wexler pioneered the use of steel in residential work. In 1962, he designed the all-steel Alexander Company houses—a visionary project featuring folded plate roofs and light-gauge metal walls using a material Wexler felt was ideally suited for desert living.

The project was a pioneer of prefab-style construction intended to be fast and cost-efficient. Wexler also designed the Palm Springs Airport and The Dinah Shore Estate.

While William Krisel didn't work exclusively in the desert (he also designed homes in Los Angeles, San Diego and Las Vegas), he was responsible for nearly doubling the size of the city during its boom in the mid-1950s, producing more than 2,500 tract homes that still stand today. Look no further than his signature butterfly roofline and such projects as The House of Tomorrow, Twin Palm Estates and Racquet Club Estates, to name a few, to see how his iconic designs have become emblematic of the style and the city.

William Cody, Hugh Kapture and E. Stewart Williams were among the other most notable architects of the area, each contributing structures to the city's aesthetic landscape and designing homes for stars like Steve McQueen, William Holden (Kapture) and Frank Sinatra (Williams).

Desert Modernism brought together architects and interior designers to create an effortless, simple style. These mid-century designers helped put Desert Modern style on the map—Twin Palm Estates and Palm Springs left all the more beautiful for it. ☼

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PALM SPRINGS LIFE



This Is **Native Land**



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The Coachella Valley's original residents were the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians.

VISITORS TO PALM SPRINGS don't often hear about the ancient history of this fruitful desert area. For at least the last 5,000 years, the Cahuilla Indians occupied Tahquitz Canyon. Their name for the area was Sec-he, or boiling water, and the hot springs and creeks from the Tahquitz, Andreas and Chino creeks sustained the tribe, providing nourishment and spiritual healing.

The Agua Caliente Cultural Museum is a wonderful place to start to build an understanding of the history of these deserts and the people who lived off its lands. The museum, located in Downtown Palm Springs, offers a permanent gallery that is nearly 10,000 square feet of space dedicated to the culture of the Agua Caliente people, their artifacts and ceremonial practices.

The Changing Gallery space often features fine art by fellow native and indigenous artists. There is also a permanent outdoor exhibition called the Oasis Trail that features native plants, rocks and formations from the Agua Caliente Indian Canyons and Taquitz Canyon. 🌵
