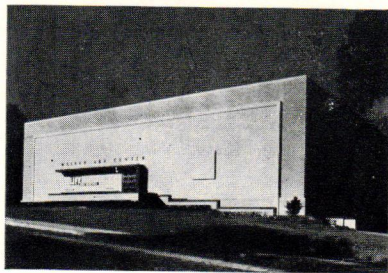

EVERYDAY ART OUTDOORS

A selection of well-designed objects for outdoor use was shown in an exhibition in the Everyday Art Gallery during the summer of 1948. An abundance of ideas for porch and garden furniture, camping and sports equipment, picnic and outdoor serving accessories has appeared during the past few years and among them are a surprising number of good designs. As it is the case with bathroom and kitchen equipment, articles for use in the great outdoors are not subject to the sentimental and traditional restrictions which so often hamper the development of good design in living room or bedroom furniture.
