Which is why child-care product maker Groco designed the Daddy Diaper Bag, a baby-friendly version of a tool satchel—also one made by water company Lewis—that solves all the gear necessary to clean up Junior's plumbing problems. "We took the Lewis design and changed the tool pockets so the inside to hold a bottle and barfies," says Groco product manager Kerry Strickland. It also has a water case, changing pad, and reusable plastic pouch for storing dirty bibs. Six exterior pockets provide a ready handle on rattles and Cheerios. We think it pretty much beats those ugly old jobs posted with the powder-blue ruddy bear motif. Newspaper

With all watching more news than we read, but there's still plenty of newspaper to recycle—about 6 million tons every year. Here are other ways to consume the news. —KAREN KOTLER

Patron a hole. To fix small holes in drywall, The Get House paint contractor Tom Silver starts with newspaper in the breach as a filler for joint compound.

Ear mites. Work boots smelly? Stuff 'em with newspaper. The odor disappears.

Make animal bedding. It's warm and healthier than straw or shavings, even if inherently messy (bedding is not meant to be eaten).

Get rid of it. If the car's stuck in mud, sand or snow (not to mention when the car is stuck under the driver's wheel, heads enough traction to move you on).

Wing presents. The sports section makes a great gift wrap for that noseless, evil Santa getting on Father's Day.

Make a city workshop. After sorting through the news, you'll have a section full of up and let the headlines slide back into your office or storage.

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TOO BUSY OR TOO LAZY TO COMPOST? CHEAT A LITTLE WITH THESE TOOLS



As great as composting is, it's hardly fast. The DIY approach to a kitchen will have you sending mixing and measuring the yard for a year before you can start. That's gone on a soap. If you're impatient and don't have the backyard for food-waste-pile-ups, let these tools help you bend the rules.

1 **Yerkes** Zero-grasshopper to start an indoor bin.

2 **Yerkes** Compost bin bags. Freshly packed bags to replace the outpoured One designed in a gallon of warm water makes enough brew to fertilize a row of houseplants—or 4,000 square feet. \$10 for 12 bags. yerkescorp.com • 1

3 **Yerkes** A four-bellows for teaching rotting matter.

5 **Yerkes** A slow-developing indoor kitchen compost.

6 **Yerkes** A compost bin. A pound of compost, even half a pound of food scraps daily processing them quicker than doing alone. Their waste is the fertilizer. \$20 a pound. yerkescorp.com • 3

7 **Yerkes** A compost bin. A compost bin. Just 32 by 32 by 24 inches. It fits in a place or two small yard. And because the rolls rotate as the bin turns, it helps composting step. \$300. yerkescorp.com • 4



THE OBSERVATIONS LYNCHBURG, VIRGINIA

Architectural gems abound in this historic town, which, unlike lots of other Southern cities, survived the Civil War with its structures relatively intact. Now home to seven national historic districts, it's blessed with well-restored grandeur in various stages of completion. Decaying Greek Revival isn't their main charm, but with restored Queen Anne, Federal-style buildings house restaurants, bars, and hotels. So impressive is the revitalization that the National Trust for Historic Preservation gave the city its 2005 Great American Main Street Award.

The annual James River Batons Festival—while commemorating the town's origins as a trading point for flint-bellied boats transporting the colorful era cash crop of tobacco to the river—has a different focus. BUYING INTO A FORMER RENTAL can mean inheriting some alphanoid spaces. While the footprint of the San Francisco kitchen stay here here original to the 1920s apartment, the contents—including the electric stove and vinyl floor—were left over from a more recent, more two-level remodel. The couple staying in loved to cook and had put up with the cheap redo for several years before the site was put on the market. Three years later, after buying and seeking every home cook, they set about remodeling the kitchen with enough room and storage to accommodate prepping for their frequent dinner parties.

Designer Beth Laughlin found room to expand by taking down a wall that divided the space from an adjacent breakfast nook at one end, and re-mov-ing a divider wall with a doorway to the laundry area at the other. Now one continuous galley, the breakfast nook has a peninsula with two nooks where friends can hang out while the hosts are in the weeds. There are two distinct prep-and-cleanup zones: one along the original sink wall and another in a built-in pantry alcove (where the washer and dryer had stood), complete with double ovens and the all-important second sink. "Having another sink definitely helps when we're getting a meal and the table ready for guests," says the husband. "It also speeds cleanup afterward." Soft-green granite gives the new area counter space that's the kitchen had before, and a mix of flat-panel and beadboard-front cabinets—including a built-in bench with storage-style crystal knobs—replicates the original. Newly milled brushed-iron rings now mark flooring, back made to match originals in the rest of the room. The result: a groovier kitchen that blends beautifully with its period surroundings.

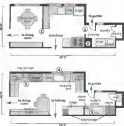
KITCHEN DESIGN

The original kitchen was a small, cramped space. The breakfast nook and the laundry area, which is shown in the adjacent space, the new design more than doubles the workable square footage and transforms the kitchen into a long, airy, bright and airy space.



The Plan

Expand in two directions within the original footprint, then relocate bulky appliances to a second work zone.

What They Did

1. DEMOLISHED INTERIOR WALLS. Taking over the breakfast nook added 80 square feet of space to the kitchen. Removing a wall with a doorway gave back the laundry alcove.

2. TOOK OUT A CHIMNEY. Originally next to the laundry area, it was removed to make way for the second prep-and-cleanup zone. The contractor was able to remove the nonworking chimney and seal it off at the bottom, since the apartment occupies the building's top floor.

3. REARRANGED LARGE APPLIANCES. The fridge and wall ovens were placed on either side of the secondary sink. The new six-burner cooktop and dishwasher sat to the left of the main sink, which wasn't relocated.

4. REVISED THE WINDOW. To make up for the loss of a large window in the eating area (needed to make room for the range hood and more cabinets), the work window was enlarged by a foot along the sides and at the top with the addition of a lintel.

5. ADDED PREP AND STORAGE AREAS. The new kitchen is kitted with countertops for slicing meat and upper and lower cabinets to hold cookware. Custom inserts organize specialty gear, including undershelf bag storage. Vertical compartments vent to the fridge over the ovens, and to one side of the cooktop, storing cutting boards, cookie sheets, and baking tools. "Most people don't realize how much vertical storage they need," says designer Beth Laughlin.

The Details

➤ An arched motif helped give the galley kitchen a vintage look that blends with the home's 1920s style

1 | NEW-ARCHED BOONHAYS in the kitchen looked so authentic that the couple added them in the apartment's other rooms. The curves are repeated in the daylight over the sink, the edge of the custom-installed hood, and in the niches on either side of the cooktop. The adjustable, cord-pendant light is a new interpretation of an early 20th-century shop-lamp.

2 | TOUCHES OF BEAUCHEVOIS in the Beauchevois cabinets: custom range hood and mirror of the built-in built-in—maroon with felt-panel door and drawer fronts—give the cabinet personality and old-fashioned charm.

3 | A CLUSTER OF APPLIANCES, including the painted, 48-inch KitchenAid refrigerator and Dacor wall oven, links the secondary sink from both sides of the island. The island is a buffet, jewelry display, and a snack prep and cleanup zone. Old-fashioned ring pulls and cabinet knobs complement the classic style of the cabinets.

4 | WHITE GUNWY TILE covers the backsplash. It's interspersed with green and pink flower tiles, which the wife chose to suit the traditional style of the home.

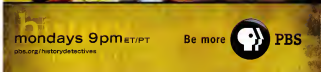
5 | GRANITE COUNTERTOPS made of sage green Costa Smeralda are veined like marble—which would have been the period-appropriate choice—but are fire-resistant, resistant, Arched tiled niches flanking the cooktop hold accent plates and cooking oils.

IF SPRING birds are singing, flowers are blooming, and you're finally getting a substantial uptick property value, it's time to consider all winter's woes. You've replaced the roof shingles and added a fresh coat of paint to the wood siding, but your home's exterior still feels unfinished. Ah, the house of perpetual renovation—maybe it's the craziest or that needs to be changed? Then suddenly you realize what's missing: shutters. Once needed for safety—protecting household occupants and expensive glass panes from the elements—they're now necessary in all but the most hurricane- and tornado-prone areas. And yet, there's nothing like them to give your home a home of curb appeal. Check out the following page for tips on getting the right style of shutters for your home.

RAISED EXPECTATIONS

Don't forget to dress up smaller than average windows with raised panels. Give the exterior some license and flavor with bright red shutters that pop against light-colored siding. 32 1/2 by 47 in. \$180 per pair. shuttersbyhennies.com

Planting in Pots

>> Container gardens are a movable feast for the senses. Here's how to assemble and care for knockout combinations

CONTAINERS ALLOW YOU TO GARDEN where there's no ground to till, brightening up the patio, porch, deck, and stoop where we linger on hot summer days. They also let you skip the major digging and weed pulling of backyard gardening and lean forward to the fun: designing, planting, and enjoying. You get just enough dirt under your fingernails to feel like you've accomplished something.

Paring up pots and plants in planting combinations, you can even work in perennials, grasses, and dwarf evergreen shrubs to provide year-round interest. Best of all, container gardens are clean-up delights. They serve you to slow down, savor the details, and savor the season.

Here's how to get up some pots.

1. PICK A POT

Before you've set on specific plants, it's best to pick the pot before you decide what's going in it. Look for ones in style that suit your house. Classical ones look great on stone patios or beside the front entry of a formal house, while clean-lined geometric shapes complement modern settings. Mixed round colors complement the plants, while wood ones draw most attention to the pot themselves. If you're going for a grouping, an odd number of pots generally looks better than an even-numbered collection.

Another rule, there are also practical concerns when picking pots. For a mixture of plants, look for containers at least 12 inches wide. Plants usually need at least 6 inches of soil depth, while grasses and shrubs may need two or three times that amount. The ideal container has straight sides or ones that flare out at the top for easy access. If you'll be planting pots on a deck or a stoop, look for lightweight materials, such as metal or composite. These and some glazed ceramic pots also have the advantage of being nonporous, so they keep soil and water from drying out and cracking. They're a wonderful pair in any case, but allow soil to dry out more quickly.

THE INGREDIENTS Descriptive from left: Container garden essentials include a pot with a floodmouth spilling soil, a bowl of slow-release fertilizer beads, a mix of plants, best to elevate containers and keep from trapping moisture down below. Check plants for tidy up plants, potting shovels to place over drainage holes, and gardening gloves.

Any pot needs drainage holes so roots don't get waterlogged; these should be covered with pebbles, stones, or a small piece of screening so bugs can't burrow through. If containers sit on a wooden deck, consider using pot feet in a place used to devote them so that the decking doesn't warp, which will lead to rot.

2 ASSEMBLE THE PLANTS

Think beyond one-year plantings of marigolds or impatiens. For a long-lasting display, combine shrew annuals with perennial grasses, shrubs that change leaf color in the fall, or dwarf evergreens. Go for a mix of colors, textures, and foliage types. A tall grass, a delicate vine, and a plant with large, ambling leaves make a

good combination. "A vertical element is important to give the planting height," says Gabrielle Whelan, a container-plant specialist at Stonebridge Gardens, a nursery on Washington's Potomac Island. She also starts with a dwarf conifer, then selects lower-growing and trailing plants to go around it here. One of these might be a flowering perennial or annual in a 4-inch container. She places this, pot and all, into the soil at the front of a large container. Once the blossoms fade, Whelan pulls out the small pot and put in a new one with a plant just coming into bloom. She also likes to redo the pot color in other phorisms.

To balance form and proportion in a pot, Ellen Zachos, owner of Acute

Plant Staff in New York City, which creates and maintains container gardens, values an herbaceous trailing vine of "daisies, fillers, and spillers." Trailing vines are tall plants that go on the ground or back, fillers are medium-size plants that fill out the middle, and spillers grow fully and or cascade over the edge to soften the pot's hard edges. "Leave the gaps to grow in two very different things," says Ellen Zachos, who likes to stick to three to five types, says. "A lot of plants are fine, but a lot of different kinds of plants seem to look great."

Unless you need a deck decoration for a party next weekend, select plants that are relatively small and let them fill out. Avoid buying two whose roots could the nursery containers. Once root balls shed water, so these plants may become perched once you agree them, even if you want them. Put up plants that are suited to the same exposure, whether sun, part sun, or shade, and that have similar water requirements.

3 DEAL WITH THE DIRT

Since ordinary garden soil is too heavy and can introduce disease, it can be used in a bagged planting mix or a homemade equivalent. Products labeled "potting mix" contain sterilized soil loaded with nutrients, while "seed mixes" consist mostly of peat moss or peat substrate, compost, and perlite or vermiculite to keep a loose. Seed mixes weigh less but dry out faster, so some plants, such as succulents, prefer them. For a home-made batch, mix five parts compost with one part builder's sand, one part vermiculite or perlite, and one-quarter part dry organic fertilizer.

Whether media you use, check to see if it contains slow-release fertilizers, if not, consider mixing in some granules at planting time.

4 PLANTING AND MAINTENANCE

If you are growing shallow-rooted specimens in tall pots, you might want to fill in the bottom half with light-weight materials such as broken terra-cotta pot shards or Styrofoam packing peanuts. This promotes drainage and prevents waterlogged soil from planting in the center with the largest specimen and work outward, scooping and filling as needed so that the plants wind up with soil at the same level that they had in the original containers—6 to 8 inches below the lip of the pot. Give plants a thorough drink, using a watering can or a soft-spout nozzle on a hose. Check the level of the soil again and add more if necessary.

Keep watering often—no more than once every two to three days—until the soil is moist and fertile regularly. If you haven't used slow-release fertilizers, following package directions. Clip off spent blossoms or branches that grow too long. With just a minimal maintenance, your container garden will flourish all summer long, and—depending on what you've planted—even beyond. ■

Old Light for a New Look

► Hang a vintage fixture to give a style boost to a bedroom, dining room, or hallway

TODAY YOU ARE ONLY TO FLIP A SWITCH. But in the late 19th century, lighting a chandelier was a difficult task. After climbing the ladder—or more likely, reaching yourself on a chair—and tilting the heavy wrought-iron fixture off its post hanging back, you then had to reach out the cord, under bars, wires, and sconce wires. Candlewicks couldn't just be lit, they required frequent trimming to keep them from smoking up the house.

Tell you this not to discourage you from buying a period light fixture above your dining table but to demonstrate how far household lighting has come. (Yes, most of the chandeliers and pendant lamps that you're likely to find dangling from the rafters in architectural salvage and antique shops are far less troublesome.)

Thank Thomas Edison for that. In 1879, he invented the first commercially viable incandescent light bulb, and, more important, the electric lamp to power it. That means Americans could stop fusing wick candles and lantern gas fixtures. Wisconsin-era inventors who were wealthy enough to take advantage of patent technology, which protected electricity in the home, converted their elegant "gasoliers," wrapping them in gas-tight and nailing wires through piping that previously pulsed with fuel.

These converted fixtures are among the most expensive today. They are also some of the most opulent, with cast brass or bronze arms decorated with floral, animal, and human forms, and with hand-blown glass shades, etched in brilliant colors. One such chandelier, with ram's head carvings and frosted glass shades, salvaged from a late-19th-century Second Empire-style mansion in Bar Harbor, Maine, costs \$8,500 at Blue Dolphin Antiques in nearby Portland.

TOP ► You can tell a converted light by its shade, which are signed at the top and point upward to provide ventilation. Chandeliers or multiple fixtures often point down for more efficient lighting, unless he chose to glow.

More common, and typically less expensive, are hanging lights made during the 1920s, '30s, and '40s, when companies such as Lightolier in New York City were mass-producing fixtures for the millions of new homes, as well as schools and commercial buildings, being built with central electricity. The styles of these lights range from a hammered copper pendant with an amber-colored bowl-shaped shade for a Craftsman bungalow to a fluted chandelier dripping with crystal beads for the grand foyer of a Colonial Revival.

My fixations on the dead-end Madison Avenue poplanned when the Paris Exposition Des Arts Decoratifs in 1925, because nearly a century later they still look contemporary. I recently bought such a fixture, with a milky-white and clear glass shade shaped like an inverted wedding cake, for \$125 at Zabarski's Emporium in Kingston, New York. Now hanging in my bedroom, it's infinitely more stylish than the nondescript brass-caster light the previous owner of my Art Deco apartment had installed. It's also done the right decorum, which is an important factor to consider when buying a salvaged fixture. Be cautious with our discernible architectural style, choose lights that match the size and scale of the room. For instance, a fluted glass light will fit in far better than a large chandelier in a narrow hallway. Coordinating the color of a glass shade with furniture, paint, or an area rug will help marry your lighting and decorating schemes.

Once you've got the aesthetics figured out, the installation is simple enough (see how on right). No electrician—or lampmaker or candle snuffer, for that matter—required. ■



How I Swapped in a Vintage Light

Of all the silver projects I've done, installing this lightweight fixture was by far the easiest. To do it yourself, you need 30 minutes, some basic tools (screwdriver, wire nuts, pliers), and the good feeling that of your choice—I don't care how many loops curls you do at the eye. It helps to hold your arms above your head for this job. Here's the step-by-step.

- 1 ► Cut power to the existing fixture at the breaker. Check to see if there is a live electricity flowing by using a circuit tester and flipping the wall switch on and off.
- 2 ► Release the fixture by unscrewing the nuts on its housing (A) and disconnect the hot black and neutral white wires coming out of the metal box as the ceiling from those on the fixture. You may also need to disconnect a third ground wire (usually green or bare copper).
- 3 ► Install a crossbar mounting bracket (B) as available at lighting supply stores) using the hardware provided.
- 4 ► Connect the white wires at the ceiling to the white wire on the fixture by twisting the ends and then screwing on a wire nut (C). Repeat the process with the black wires and with the ground when it you have them.
- 5 ► Position the new fixture over the screws on the mounting bracket and securing the nuts provided.
- 6 ► Screw in light bulbs and secure the glass shade (D).
- 7 ► Turn the power back on at the breaker and flip the switch on your new light (E).

I'LL NEVER FORGET the first time I laid eyes on my home. A IF YOU'RE THINKING ABOUT DORMERS, you already know that they are the last way to bring light and fresh air into the new rooms you are creating. Here are some things to take into consideration as you consider place the size and character those dormers should have, as well as how they will be set into your roof.

1 | Types of Dormers

The most dormer comes from the French dormer, "to sleep"—the original purpose of these attic spaces. To you and me, a dormer means a window set vertically in a small structure protruding from a sloping roof. That structure has a roof of its own, which can be gabled like frame of the dormer runs to a point at its roof ridge, hip from the window the roof slopes back to its ridge, or shed style like roof

dormers like skylights bring sunshine and air into upper levels. But because they project from the roof, dormers also add extra space to the interior. The most popular dormer shapes are gabled (TOP RIGHT), shed (MIDDLE LEFT) and hip (BOTTOM RIGHT).

In most cases, choose the one that best reflects the style and period of the house.

Each of the three common dormer shapes has different styles and historical appearances, so you'll need to make which one best suits your needs and the style of your house.

2 | Gable Dormer

The most common, and the type preferred by the majority of my clients, is the gable dormer. It works on a wide variety of

house styles, from a classic four-square to more formal Tudor Gothic and Victorian era styles. Gable dormers look best when kept modest in size and vertical in setting, with a minimal amount of space between the window frame and the eave of the dormer. To achieve this thin profile, I allow one 2x6 rather than 2x12 to finish the side walls, while keeping the standard 2x6 window head wall. The result is better aesthetically and doesn't significantly reduce ventilation value, since not much of the side wall projects through the roof.

The window in a gable dormer is best if it, too, has a vertical orientation, either a tall double-hung or two tall windows. You can decorate it with a round, oval, or diamond top, depending on the style of the house. Round window tops look good in Georgian-style houses, oval in a Colonial, and diamonds on Carpenter Gothic and half-timbered styles.

3 | Hip Dormer

Hip roofs work well to top dormers of intermediate widths and with Mediterranean and French-style designs, particularly those with tile or clay roofs. Because the wide dormer serves to signal clearly the existing nature of the roof, it often looks best sheathed in a material that adds some color to the roof rather than the walls of the house. I recently used a hip dormer on an Italian-style house in Nashville, Tennessee, where we needed writing space in a side room—a common use for hip dormers because they don't project out from the roof as far as other types.

4 | Shed Dormer

The shed dormer with practical origins, common to vernacular architecture and Craftsman designs. It not only brings in light but, because a whole section of roof gets pushed up, also makes the attic room feel larger. Shed dormers are commonly used in low-pitched hangdown to create second-level bedrooms, usually on the back side of the house. I design a lot of second houses and cabins and use shed dormers to achieve any bedrooms or cabins on the roof space. These dormers are the easiest type for carpenters to create, as they don't require complicated plans. That makes them the preferred dormer for all roofing materials, particularly cedar shakes.

5 | Dormer Construction

No matter what style of dormer you choose, you will need to consider its location relative to the cross section of the attic roof you are setting in. Dormers of all types are most difficult to do on low-pitched roofs (8:12 and below), and relatively easy on steeper roofs (9:12 and above). On low pitches, dormers can get quite deep, bringing little light in the space within.

To construct a dormer on an existing roof, you'll need to cut the rafters to create the roof for the dormer. To reduce structural complications, try to make the rest of the dormer

HIP Hip dormers lend to be wider and squarer than gables. Most commonly used in California and the southern United States, they fit best when the main attic bedrooms or porch are unchanged.

equal to an increment of the rafter framing. For example, a 4-foot wide dormer would require the cutting of only two rafters in a typical 16-inch-on-center roof system. The rafters on either side must be beveled up, as must the header top-and-bottom, to support the lead of the dormer. The broader the dormer, the greater the load, so it is important to consult with an engineer to add new rafters and ridge beams accordingly.

Wherever your dormer performs, you will find it a great addition for light, view, and fresh air in your new attic space. ■

Zen and the Art of Sawing Wood

» Unleash your inner samurai with every pull stroke

IF YOU'VE NEVER PICKED UP A Japanese saw, be prepared for a shock. Its floppy blade cracks on a rotten-wrapped stick way sooner at first glance than you'd expect. It's hardly capable of any serious work. But get down to the actual business of cutting wood, and you'll ask yourself why you put up with traditional Western-style hand saws for so long.

Many critics distinguish saws from East and West, but a lot looks down to this: In Japan, you cut on the pull stroke. Pulling keeps the blade straight, so it can be thin—up to 75 percent thinner than a Western blade, which was straight to begin with, with every push. And since this blade produces less kick, Japanese users remove less wood, produce less vibration, and need less muscle power. Put simply, you can cut longer, more accurately, and with less fatigue.

While we have nothing but respect for the leaping, horse-drawn Westerners, cutting wood the Japanese way is much easier for us, too. Perhaps it's because you cut the blade with your fingers rather than the heel of your hand. Or it could be all those nag, elegantly sharp teeth that make working a cut so simple. But whatever it is, even a one-hand push-cutter can appreciate the silky surfaces those teeth leave in their wake: one that led us to if they've been smoothed with a plane.

True, those delicate teeth are no match for plywood or knots. But if a knot or two does break, the blade can be replaced, which is cheaper than buying a new saw.

So go ahead. Put the common notions on a shelf of codes. You're in for a pleasant awakening.

ROCKE EISENHORN
The most versatile of Japanese saws, this pull-cutting version has 18th teeth (left) for cutting across the wood grain and 12th teeth (right) for cutting with the grain. The 10 teeth have two toothpicks (left) to rip into it on occasion. Here, the handle shows the traditional "maki" (rope) binding.



Kerf Wars

A kerf is the narrow gully made by a saw's teeth as they chew their way through wood. As you can see from the photo below, Japanese blades produce much narrower kerfs than Western kerf.

1. DEPTH CONTROL

Tooth Talk

On all hand saws, regardless of origin, the teeth are made either to cut with the grain (known as ripping) or across it, the rip teeth on both Western and Japanese saws are similar but bring less with closed-edge tips.



Japanese crosscut teeth, on the other hand, are long and narrow like most are saws. Each one shows throughwood fibers with three little sharp edges: a square Western tooth has only two. You can easily sharpen a Western saw, but taking a file to Japanese crosscut teeth requires steady hands, patience, and a member to help build a fence. If you're lacking any of these, just replace your blade when it gets dull.

5. CURVE CUTTER

This 3-surface curve cutting saw is light as a feather. The main, H-shaped, hand supports the short, wider blades to grip it enough flexibility to saw gentle curves in the wood (MSET). 24 in. \$47. japantoolbox.com

6. FASTEN CUT

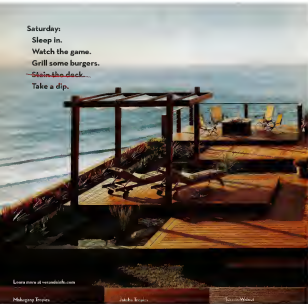

A FOUNTAIN IS COMPOSED OF THREE THINGS: water, which flows up a pipe and trickles back down in a continuous cycle; a pump, which propels the water; and a piece of sculpture, over which the water flows. The sculpture can be built from any material that will withstand constant water. For the project shown here, we used large stones found on site, but pavers, some metals, or pottery will all work (see "Buying Guide," for right).

Regardless of the fountain material, the guts of the system remain the same. It starts with a waterproof tub or basin that lies a hole in the ground to make a reservoir for the water. Above that is a rigid mesh screen that blocks large debris from getting into the tub. The screen is topped with a support system made from a strong but water-resistant material, such as composite decking, to keep the body of the fountain from falling into the basin.

The submersible pump is the heart of the system. It sits below the water line in the basin, recirculating and fine-filtering the runoff from above. Since the pump is electric, the fountain needs to be within reach of an exterior outlet—pump cords rarely reach beyond 50 feet, and manufacturers discourage the use of extension cords. It also needs to be accessible for maintenance after the fountain is built, so you'll need to cut a trap door in the screen that's big enough for you to reach in, unhook the pump, and pull it out. (The screen and support decking can be camouflaged with small stones or even mulch.) The pipe that carries the water to the top of the sculpture screws onto the pump. It also includes a small ball valve that will allow you to adjust the fountain's flow, giving you the option of creating anything from a calming trickle to a formidable geyser.

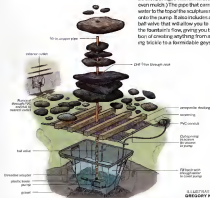

Dig the pump hole

Using a pointed shovel, dig a pit 2 inches deeper than the basin and wide enough to fit it. Put the screen a short distance or on a tarp to avoid nearby dirt (R334T).

Dig a narrow shallow trench between the pit and the nearest exterior outlet.

Set the basin and conduit

Lay a 2-inch-thick bed of drainage gravel in the pit. Place the basin atop the gravel (LEFT). If necessary, shift the gravel so the basin doesn't rock.

Measure the distance from the outlet to the edge of the pit. Cut a section of PVC conduit to this length. Thread a string through the conduit and tape one end of the 1/2-inch pump's plug. Pull the plug through the conduit. Tape the plug securely to the end of the conduit so it doesn't get pulled back in. Lay the conduit in the trench and backfill over it.



3

Dry-fit the parts

Center the pump in the basin (R334T). Lay the screen over the pit and mark it at the spot directly over the threaded outlet on the pump. Also mark the screen at the edge closest to the conduit.

Using utility scissors, cut out a 1-inch-wide circle at the center mark. Then cut a three-sided flap at the conduit mark that is big enough to allow you to reach in and remove the pump for servicing (R334T).



5 Connect the pipe and pump

Using a pipe cutter, cut a 4-inch section off the end of the copper pipe. Unratchet the compression fittings on the outside of the ball valve. Slide a nut from the ball valve (then the brass ring, or ferrule, onto the long section of pipe. Insert the pipe into one end of the ball valve, then tighten the nut over the ferrule onto the valve. Attach the short section of pipe to the other end of the valve in the same manner.

Secure the threaded end of the adapter into the pump outlet. Take apart the compression end and slide the nut (not the ferrule) over the short section of pipe. Connect the pipe to the pump with the compression fitting. Using an adjustable wrench, tighten all three compression nuts an extra quarter turn.

Pour a 2-inch layer of drainage gravel in the bottom of the basin. Lay the pump in the center of the basin with the pipe sticking up. Slide the screen over the pipe and arrange it so the screen flap is near the conduit.

Using a hand saw, cut sections of decking long enough to extend beyond the pit a few inches on either side. Lay the decking across the pit on top of the screen (LEFT).

Drill the stones

Stack the stones to create a well-but fully open, airy arrangement. Build the underside of each stone in parallel to keep track of the order as you unstack them.

Lay a stone on soft ground or gravel. Using a slow-speed drill fitted with a 1/8-inch masonry bit, drill through the flat side of the stone (RIGHT). Repeat for all the stones.

Keep a bucket of water near the drill to catch any splatter when the stone is being drilled—and the drill bit itself—so you won't

6 Assemble the fountain

Thread the stones over the copper pipe until they're stacked and balanced. Mark the pipe where the stones sit. Remove the top stone and use the pipe cutter to cut the copper pipe 1/4 inch below the mark. Replace the stone.

Fill the basin from a garden hose, adding enough water to raise 5 inches above the pump. Open the ball valve, plug in the pump, turn it on and check the flow. Adjust the pressure with the ball valve.

Control the water by opening the stacked stones. Wedge smaller stones into the gaps to keep the structure stable (LEFT). To make the arrangement permanent, turn off the water and squeeze dots of clear silicone adhesive between the stones. Allow the adhesive to dry before turning on the fountain again. Once the fountain flows the way you desire it to, close the screen and camouflage the base with small stones.

Check the fountain's water level regularly—especially in a heat wave—and replenish it to keep the pump consistently submerged.

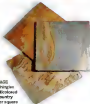

too. "That means choosing between plants that are meant to grow wild, like say in an English country garden, and more formal, pruned hedges that demand regular shaping."

Also think about which months you'll be using the space. Selecting plants that change with the seasons, for instance, will provide visual interest year-round. As with all landscaping projects, outdoor rooms require both short- and long-term thinking, and plenty of patience. Shrubs grow and flowers blossom, but for a lush and layered look, you may have to wait. "Create what you can now," says John Hubbard, a garden designer based in Sagaponick, New York. "There are nurseries and other places where you're going to do next summer."

DESIGNING THE LOOK

The closer an outdoor room is to the house, the more you need to incorporate some of the same architectural elements and materials to visually tie the two spaces together. "It's extremely important for the outdoor rooms to look like they're a part of the house," says Schechter. For an open-air kitchen tucked against the side of a house in Santa Monica, Schechter specified marble counters similar to the ones used indoors. "If it's as if we extended a piece of the house," he says.

The materials you choose for floors and walls should reflect your home's style. Antique brick pavers work well with a traditional Georgian or Colonial Revival, rustic flagstones or wendy cuts a more casual setting. You can look to local history for inspiration, too. To design a brick patio and outdoor pergola for a family in Sag Harbor, New York, Hubbard considered images of the late-19th-century outbuildings and garden structures typical of the town's Shingle-style houses.

OUTFITTING THE SPACE

If you want people to congregate in your outdoor room, give them something to gather around. A built-in outdoor bar or fountain is a tempting magnet, as is a wood-burning fireplace, which also extends the open-air experience into winter.

When selecting furniture, consider the weather-worthiness of the materials. Metal can rust, wood can turn gray, fabrics can mold, and some plastics can quickly fall apart. Properly sealed, teak tables and chairs will return their lustrous hues for years. Other practical choices are synthetic wicker made from resin and furnishings crafted from ultraviolet-resistant polypropylene. Wood, an extremely durable material made

from recycled polyethylene plastic. Outdoor sofas and lounge-seen recliners—now come with cushions clad in fade- and mold-resistant fabrics, in a slew of styles and colors. For outdoor kitchen appliances, as well as portable food and beverage carts, corrosion-resistant stainless steel is the safest bet.

BRIGHTENING UP THE NIGHT

illuminating an outdoor room can be as simple as setting candles on a table, hanging a string of whimsical lights under a shade or brella, or planting risk torches around the patio. Solar-powered lanterns can provide an ambient glow around dining and lounge areas without the need for wiring.

If you want something more permanent, consider low-voltage path lighting, which can safely lead the way from the house so you don't have to trudge blindly through the yard. Strategically located spotlights mounted on trees can help define the perimeter of the space, but beware of the baseball-stadium effect. "You want to light up a dinner area, not the whole neighborhood," says Schechter. If your outdoor structure has a solid roof, weather-resistant recessed cans and hanging pendant lights track lighting, which is especially useful for peering back at a bench area.

Of course, the beauty of any outdoor space is that it lets you take advantage of nature's own light: the eight seasons the moon and the stars. ■

Out of *THE* New, Into *THE* Old

Cracked plaster, peeling paint, and leaking pipes galore couldn't stop one family from swapping their convenience-filled suburban home for a colonial-era farmstead with room to roam

They say good things come to those who wait.

Cheri and Tony Scosconocourt spent four years of searching for the Pennsylvania farmhouse of their dreams that finally came onto the market, the couple would no longer sell their comfort- and convenience-filled 1990s home, snapping up the 44-acre property, and moving right into its 1730s home.

The 4,100-square-foot farmhouse that the Scosconocourts had fallen for was not everybody's idea of idyllic—or even inhabitable. Granted, the place had a scary history: Reverend, as it is known, was once the house of John Parker, the Quaker who colonized the nearby town of Chadds Ford, where Washington and his troops fought the ill-fated Battle of Red Bank in 1777.

Of more immediate concern, perhaps, to the couple's three patterned children, was the fact that the property possessed a fishy odor, though they'd have to backtrack their way through hooped trash and broken trim to reach it. It also had five bathrooms (none of which worked), as well as a barn, a corncrib, a springhouse, and an overgrown orchard, all of which would surely take years to revive. In the home's recent's renovation, the place had endless "potential," if only the new owners could be patient enough for it to reveal itself—and the Scosconocourts had not only fortitude but also a clear vision and a workable plan.

"It looked like a challenge," says Cheri, the project's general contractor—"the region behind all of this," according to her husband—as well as local pestiferous and customer to the family's three children, pet house, three cars, and assortment of guests, guests, chickens, and games here. The Old House landscape contractor Roger Cook took one backyard, overgrown with blackberry and poison ivy, and turned it into a sports lover's dream. • Squaring it in a croquet lawn, a horseshoe pit, and a bocce court. The low maintenance play areas are close to the house and pool, where they offer options for entertainment after a morning swim or before a barbecue feast. Together they provide the perfect environment for fun, weeks. As Roger puts it, "Anything that gets people outside is a reason for the whole family to spend time together."

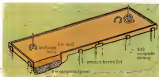

Horseshoes

The swiftness and range of horseshoes sweeping around their target floats through the air on hot summer afternoons, concord.ahd.usdarchild.com/skip pick up the game. >HOW TO

1. Rager prepared it in back of the pit by excavating the 6 by 42-foot area 6 inches down until he reached the subsoil. Then he put down a 6-inch layer of gravel and covered that with landscape fabric.

2. To create the frame of the pit he dug a 6-inch-deep trench around the perimeter of the pit, then set 2x2 composite decking boards, turned on edge, into the trench. The key is to keep the frame as simple as possible, Rager says. He supported the boards with 2-foot-long 2x4 pressure-treated stakes pounded into the ground along the outside of the frame as they sat in the trench. He spaced the boards 1/2 inch apart to hold them up. The boards are 15 inches above the adjacent compacted gravel to prevent empty balls from rolling into the pit.

3. Rager lined the frame with 6 bags of coarse sand, creating a 6-inch-thick layer that he leveled.

4. Using individual corner stakes, Rager placed the 3-foot-long stakes into either end of the pit, leaving 36 feet between them. The stakes provide a regulation height of 28 inches above the playing surface.

Croquet

A lush lawn is great in any backyard, but one with thick turf and a border one fence border practically begs for croquet games to come out and play. On this particular 1/2-by-1/4-foot patch, the game of croquet is a popular one for the 3,000 square feet and is a local game, the rough aim of blunders, rye, and horse games will roll out up to the most serious competitors.

For Rager, looking for the lawn was no different from any other job project, though he added the step of making the field somewhat level. He leveled the soil and laid the turf, then gave it time to take root before allowing to grow on the field. 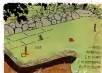

Bocce

Bocce is a slow-tempo game, best enjoyed with the sun low and a cocktail in hand. The rules are simple enough: A small ball, called the pallino, gets tossed down the court, and players must try to get as close as possible with their own balls, some more strategically located opponents out of the way.

Ampden's bocce court is long—87½ feet—and topped with the same dry-cotton traditional tennis court. The court Roger built is only two-thirds regulation size, but that's not an issue, as it's used by local players as well as big Bowditch designs inspired by courts in Boston's North End, where Italian-Americans play into the evening under the park lights. A deep layer of rubber contains packed gravel that supports the heavy clay and longer-lived Composite decking on the inside face of the court resists dents, which a 5-pound bocceball traveling at mph will surely inflict on wood.

A limestone wall runs inside the court and extends into a patio at one end with a table/bench for players and spectators under the maple trees. Along the side adjacent to the croquet lawn, "Gold Medal" games, accessible toons, and a 10-inch entrance will create a calm downtown.

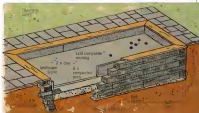
>HOWTO

1. Roger excavated the 30½-by-63-foot area for the bocce court 2½ inches below grade. Then he dug 6-inch trenches around the perimeter and filled them with 2 inches of gravel.

2. He set the first course of 16-foot-long 2x6 timbers on the benches on top of the gravel, butting the wood end-to-end, enclosing the walls and inside with all the joists. Once the timbers were set, he drilled through them every 2 feet and drove 1½-inch rebar through the timbers into a foot into the ground.

3. For the rest four courses of timbers, Roger staggered the joists along the walls by 4 feet so they didn't line up with the courses below. He also alternated the timbers of the corners to make tapered joints. He drove timbers across through each corner and into the outside—two at each corner and every 18 inches along the sides—to tie them together. He capped the timbers with 1x2 wooden rails (TOP RIGHT).

4. To prep for the court surface, Roger laid a 6-inch thick base of compacted gravel (MIDDLE RIGHT) inside the timbers walls. Then he wrapped a 4-inch perforated flexible pipe in later fabric and tied it along the inside edge of the entire court. He capped one end and sealed the other end through a hole in a timber he cut before he built the wall, so the pipe could drain away from the court surface. Once the pipe was set, he put down another 6-inch layer of compacted gravel, a mix of virgin and stone dust.

THE OPEN AIRS OF FINISHED, RED STORAGE BUILDINGS GIVE ARLINGTON Coal & Lumber the ambience of a remote farm. IT'S A STORYLINE WITH END TIME AND THE BEGINNING of a wonderful old house with great architectural details, solid bones—and a country kitchen left over from some long-ago remodel.

Clyde and Rebecca French have been there. After moving into their rather worn perfect 1986 lakefront bungalow in Howell, Michigan, they quickly figured out that the 13-by-56-foot kitchen—with its stained cabinets, dingy country spout, and *Exeter II* tile floor—just wasn't all that functional.

They wanted something bigger. Not much bigger, would you, just big enough for Rebecca to cook up a pot roast for the extended family each Sunday, and for the caters the Frenchs occasionally hire for big deal holidays and birthday parties to do their thing in comfort.

Their first thought? Knock out the wall between the kitchen and dining room, then combine the two rooms into one eat-in superkitchen. But that wasn't going to work. The second-floor plumbing ran right through the structural wall, and the cost of reconfiguring it threatened to double their budget. "That wall was stopping," says Clyde.

It wasn't until Rebecca spied an old copy of the March 2002 issue of *This Old House* that she found the answer to their dimensional dilemma. There on the cover was a photograph of a box-bay window surprise. "And boom! There was," she recalls. Not only would the bump give them more room for additional counter space, it would provide a dramatic view of Thompson Lake, located just beyond the couple's backyard.

Rebecca, who put together a nice book filled with TQM remodern and catalog fixer-upper appliances and cabinet manufacturers, found a clear idea in the pages of the magazine. Unraveling through older issues, she realized a story on Ken Silva installing soapstone countertops and decided they were a warmer alternative to the granite she was considering. "Besides, every body has granite these days," says Rebecca.

When it came to so much storage space as possible, the Frenchs decided to run their new cabinets right up to the kitchen's

Ask This Old House

Windowsill Repair

Our south-facing windowsills are exposed to our worst weather, and they're showing signs of damage. How should I repair them?

BOB WELLS, BELLTOWN, GA

Tom Silva replies: For the kind of wood repair, you can't beat the high bonding strength of a two-part, wood-compatible epoxy adhesive. But don't you slather the stuff on and expect your problem to be solved. You have to prep the wood thoroughly by removing any paint or decayed wood so that the epoxy has something solid to bond with.

For the past decade or so, I've been working with an epoxy made by Advanced Repair Technology that's formulated to expand and contract with wood. To ensure good adhesion, it's applied in two steps: primer, then filler. After prepping and sanding the wood, wipe up and break on the thin epoxy primer, which penetrates the wood fibers. Wait 10 minutes, then mix the epoxy filler and trowel over the

damaged area with a putty knife. When the filler cures, sand it smooth. The filler is so thick that one coat is generally sufficient, but two may be required for very large repairs. Just make sure to sand before painting on a second coat or painting it.

Two Tankless?

I'm considering installing two tankless water heaters, one set to a high temperature for the washing machine and dishwasher, the other at a lower temperature for the bathroom to avoid being scalded. Does this make sense?

SCOTT HENNO, KETCHIKAN, ALASKA

Richard Trethewey replies: Not really. Tankless water heaters are expensive, and a single unit, if properly sized, will easily handle the needs of most houses. Just set the unit's water temperature to a scalding 120 degrees or so and you'll meet most of your cleaning needs, including clothes washing. Dishwashers do need hotter water than that, so many machines have an internal heater to boost the water to 130 to 140 degrees. If yours doesn't already have such a heater, it's less expensive to buy a new dishwasher than another tankless unit.

Front Door Care

I have completely refinished my solid-oak front door twice by sanding it to bare wood, staining it, then applying a marine spar varnish. But the finish still doesn't hold up long under our fierce desert sun. Is there anything I can do to help this door?

MARTY ZIMORA, COLO SPRINGS, ARIZ

Norm Abram replies: I can tell you from personal experience, with the oak threshold at my front door and the oak on my lawn, that keeping a close finish on outdoor wood isn't easy.

First, you need to prep the door properly by completely removing the finish and any semi-processed wood. When the surface is prepped, apply at least five coats of marine spar

varnish-laden with UV inhibitors, use or two coats isn't enough. Then, once a year, sand the varnish with 220-grit paper and apply two more coats, which provide both protection

from the sun. That's what I do with my boat, and it's only exposed to the weather about six to months of the year!

If that sounds like too much work, and painting the door isn't an option, try an exterior-grade penetrating oil like Penolux or Amstar's Timber Oil. Penetrating oils don't form a hard, glossy finish like varnish, so they can't peel. And while you'll need to reoil the door more frequently—at least twice a year—it's usually easy to apply. I've used it on some outdoor furniture projects and it holds up pretty well if you keep it up.

Shrub Turning Brown

Our 30-year-old English yew has begun to turn brown in places. Is it suffering from a disease or simply past its prime?

Roger Cook replies: Yews are pretty tough. Only some drastic things could explain why a healthy plant is turning brown.

My first question is, do you have any

deer? When they feed on yews, the damaged branches sometimes turn brown. Also, yews are sensitive to altered watering patterns. Have you changed how often or how much you water your lawn, the location of a downspout, or anything else that might have reduced or increased the amount of water this plant gets?

If none of this has occurred, have a certified arborist check the bush for disease or insects.

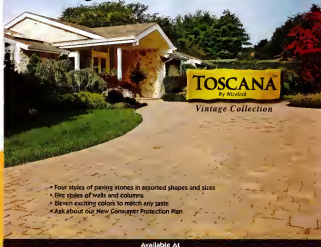
Choosing the Right Screwdriver Bit

When I was installing steel studs, Phillips head screws using a conical-to-drill, I couldn't seem to find a bit that wouldn't strip the screwhead. What's the best way to match a bit with a screwhead?

TRAD MACDONELL, SARASOTA, FLORIDA

Kevin O'Connor replies: Kevin, the bit expert at *Be and Blade* manufactures Vermont American, explained to me that this struggle in the screwhead recess is too likely to strip the head. The three-cuspidal Phillips bit

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size, from smaller to largest, have PIV 1, 2, or 3 stamped on their shafts. With all three bits on hand, it's easy to find the one that fits. If it enters in the access when you turn the screw by hand, try a larger bit.

I also mentioned your problem to Tim Selva. He had three suggestions: Use a drill/driver and adjust its torque to the bit stage when it needs you much assistance, before a ratchet for the screwhead. Always drill a pilot hole first, and always keep the bit at a line with the screw shaft. Tighting a Phillips bit even a few degrees to one side could cause it to lose its grip. With carbon-steel screws, you have to be doubly careful because the metal is soft.

Worn bits are screwbreakers, too, Tim says. If a bit lodges even a look or feel round of over, don't become as one it.

Repairing Tapered Columns

Our 99-year-old barnhouse has tapered wood columns to those that hold up the roof over our enclosed porch. One of the columns seems to be deteriorating,

but I don't know how to repair it or what materials to use. Do you have any suggestions?

KEVIN A. JUST, WESTPORT, HAWAII, U.S.A.

The Shrinker With columns that old, I'd say you're lucky that only one of them has problems. It should be taken care of fairly soon, too, because the more water that gets past those tapered boards, the worse things will be for the interior post, which I suspect is what actually holds up your roof.

First, carefully remove the column's outside boards so you can see where its pattern is made replacements. Then check the post and make sure it's in good shape. If you have any doubts about its strength, replace it with pressure-treated stock of the same size.

I'd rebuild the sides of the column using medium-density particleboard, an exterior-grade plywood covered with non-slippery paper. MDO is desirable, stands up to wet weather, holds paint well, and doesn't crack or check like wet-wood plywoods will when left outside.

After you've cut the side joints, then the edges together and done them with galvanized nails and exterior-grade construction adhesive. Then cover the corners of the shell with non-lead paint made of colored PVC trim, such as Anco or Kleer. When all the joints are caulked and the columns are painted, you won't be able to tell the difference between it and the original.

Tile Over Brick

We'd like to tile over the brick around our fireplace. Can I put cement backerboard on the wall and cover that with tile?

Joe Ferrante replies: Sure you could, but it's far easier to install tile over the brick and then tile right over that. Here's how to do it.

Cover the hearth with a drop cloth and remove the mantel and anything else that's

switched to the brick. Go over the entire area with a wire brush to dislodge any loose mortar, then scrub off the dust with a rag soaked in white vinegar. Let the bricks dry for a day or two, then mix up a batch of white, latex-modified thinset cement to the consistency of mayonnaise. Spread the thinset over the brick with a flat, straight—not notched—trowel and force it into all the grooves. If the joints are still visible after the first coat dries, clean out a second coat to fill in any depressions. If you do it right, you'll end up with a surface that's as flat as a buckboard but without any seams. The next day, lay down a row of latex-modified channel compound with a notched trowel, and set your tiles into that. Don't use mastic; it can't take the heat.

Here's a trick I use when tiling around fireplace. The row of thinset just above the brick is usually the most important, so it should be absolutely straight. Nail a straight 1x board horizontally across the fireplace, as low as the top of the brick, and use a tape

edge as a shelf as you set the tiles. The board also prevents the tiles from dipping before the adhesive cures. Work up from the base first, then, when the thinset hardens, take it off and work down the sides of the fireplace.

Removing a Fence

What is the best way to get rid of an old chain-link fence and its metal posts?

JACQUES HAMILTON, N.J.

Ken Silva replies: Removing the fencing itself is easy. Just take off the metal fittings and wires so that it'll slide the posts and pull it off. Removing the posts is another story, because each one is embedded in a concrete foot-cure. To remove them, the surest way is to cut the concrete and pull the post out. If you're not sure, ask the hardware store for a concrete saw. It's a good idea to wear eye protection and a dust mask when using it.

Start by trying to loosen each line post by rocking it back and forth. If the post doesn't

budge, dig around the concrete until it dries. You should be able to dig it out of the hole with an oxy-acetylene torch. Removal posts probably won't pull out so easily, unless you're using a piece of equipment such as a bucket or Dugout, those concrete treatment that leeches out. If that to remove more than a dozen, instead of removal posts, I'd rent one anyway.

If you don't mind leaving the concrete in place, just cut the posts off. You'll need a reciprocating saw and a bunch of steel-cutting blades if you choose this option.

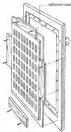

4. **Mount.** Once the finishing dry, drill offholes (one around the door's rabbet) and press the grille in place. Secure it to the back of the frame with strips of wood (as shown). —*HEIDI HOGAN*

Precision Cuts

I use my Japanese saws to cut dovetails or for other precise bench work, and my power tools handle most of the less-refined cuts made on the job site. Cutting Japanese cuts, the saw that gets the most use in my shop, shows in the photo right. It has no teeth on one side of the blade, so it's not built on the other side of the blade having two teeth on one handle.



Tooth Protection

You should always store a saw separately from other tools so its teeth don't get damaged. With Western saws, it's easy enough to hang them on the wall by the big hole in the handle. But Japanese saws have straight handles so I made a wall-mounted rack just for them (below). Most of the teeth slide in and rest at the front; open ended slots cut into the edge of the rack but I keep my flush cutting saw in its overclosed slot, like a hatchknife in a block, because the blade is short and narrow.



When I'm using a Japanese saw, I hold the handle with my wrist straight. My shoulder is bent with the cut, and my hand stays pointed. I bend the blade slightly before pressure is all it takes to guide the cut.

Norm's Tip

The only rule on sawing—whether it's Western or Japanese style—is to stay comfortable and loose and keep your eye on the line. Don't press down too hard; just let the saw do the work.

Sewing Coach

To begin my cuts, I select the saw blade on the cut line and rest my left thumb on the wood, next to the spot I'm cutting. The side of the blade I first make short strokes at a low angle (1). Once the saw is suddenly released, I raise the blade and make long, efficient strokes, lowering my left hand as it covers the line (2). And if I ever lose that line, I'll go to the line again to correct course.

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NOT ONLY WAS Benjamin B. Beckman a pillar of Dundas New York society he was—in the simplest of terms—the Man. Beckman's career included stints as a carpenter, furniture maker, churchwarden, seaman, undertaker and, of course, good guy. According to his biographer (2004) who says he did more for Dundas than any other one that lives here, he's the work in this direction will, while it endures, stand as a monument to him.

Some of Beckman's most enduring work includes the three-story brick commercial building he built downtown and one of the town's finest houses, this Italianate-style house which he constructed around 1852. His mother-in-law, Lydia, lived here for the rest of her life, raising their seven children.

According to grandsons of Beckman, his family moved into the house in the 1860s. His great-granddaughter born and raised next door remembers sitting on the steps of the round staircase and going to the front door and going down the stairs with her grandparents. "I never ever finished from being the man" she says today. The staircase was a hand-crafted "Bryan" man was very much into woodwork—and the house reflects that. It's a beautiful piece.

The staircase is still intact, as are the house's original cast-iron door hardware, horsehair plaster walls, two fireplace mantels, and two over two double-hung windows. But after changing hands and serving as a rental property for the past few decades, the house needs complete renovation, including an update of its electrical system.

Dundas is a small town located in upper New York State's Finger Lakes region and has a population of about 1,600 people. Aside from the beautiful scenery that surrounds it, the town is also close to dozens of vineyards and wineries. While you might not be able to visit the vineyards by yourself, you could at least build on the legacy and help save one of its most enduring legacies.
