EASY WAY TO IMPROVE YOUR HOME RIGHT NOW

✓ Keep your watering system in shape

Your sprinklers are working overtime right now, so make sure they're up to the task. Clean out the filter inside, replace worn-out nozzles, and tighten loose connections so that you don't waste water. Make sure sprinkler heads are angled to give your lawn a nice, even soak—no dry spots, no puddles. (Thinking about an upgrade or triangler configuration other workbench?) Waterfalls as the rule? Consider an upgrade to lower flow distribution for some of your jobs at the old house, every house.



□ Do your doghouse duty

Summer is scorching dogs' water, so our four-legged friends To celebrate—who knew?—National Doghouse Repair Month. In July, make sure their retreats are well-stocked and have vents to let heat escape, raise them off the ground to help dogs stay dry and cool. Want to build a doghouse? Go to thinkdoghouse.com/bonus for instructions and photos of peach prizes in various house styles.



□ Attract butterflies and hummingbirds

These pretty little winged creatures help pollinate your plants. Lure them with colorful blossoms and flowering herbs, species to look for include phloxes, sandwaver, red trumpet honeysuckle, sage and lavender. Plant these in pots if they're not already in your garden.

Flower buds and open flowers draw these predators.

TOH TIP

□ Before vacationing, upgrade security systems. Sturdy dead bolts and window locks are musts. Also, use motion-activated lights, cameras for sliding glass doors, and wireless alarm systems for fire. Your window go the extra mile toward keeping intruders. These products that prevent break-ins at the old house, every house.

□ Fix torn screens

Even small holes let mosquitoes sneak in, so patch them before you replace the screen. Cut a piece of screening larger than the hole, remove a few wires from each edge, and bend the edges 90 degrees. Press the patches on the screen so that the edges match through the mesh. Seal the wires flat to secure the patch.



□ Keep ants out of the kitchen

To the season for these pest-eating insects to mount a home invasion. Our top tip to keep the bugs from marching in: Trim trees and shrubs 4 to 6 inches away from your house and foundation so that ants won't have an easy path to travel inside.

→ Caulk cracks and crevices in your foundation.
→ Clean rain gutters to prevent water from leaking inside. Ants are attracted to any spot in the house that stays damp.
→ Bait ants by setting out a bowl with a mixture of equal parts sugar water to attract them, and sodium borate (a.k.a., boric acid), a natural insecticide. Once a few ants die, the rest of the colony will get the signal that it's time to head for the hills. (Just make sure pets can't get at the bowl.)



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Toilet trade-ins save water—and cash

The humble commode guzzles 30 percent of the H₂O in your house, so low-flow models not only slash your water bill, they also help planes like 80-year-old Maxine, whose water needs are expected to double in 20 years. That's why local businessman Kent Martin (above) convinced the city government to offer rebates of up to \$75 to folks who replace their toilet with WaterSense-labeled models that use 20 percent less water. The program saved 3.45 million gallons during its first year. More than 600,000 water-saver toilets have replaced older ones since. Ask yours if you saved money back for a trade-in.

Poolside pointers

It would be a shame to let a day of swimming and sunning turn into a cautionary tale about pool safety, but the facts don't lie. More than 2,000 people are injured in the hospital each year with pool-related injuries. Here are four things you can do to help prevent accidents:

1. Check that drain covers are tight so that "suction" isn't sucking kids down. Don't get suctioned and trapped. Opt for covers with speed covers, whose shape makes them a bit better at preventing this hazard than flat covers.
2. Surround your pool area with a 4-foot (or taller) fence to keep kids from falling in when no one is around. Make sure the gate is self-closing on the inside so that little hands can't reach it.
3. Apply anti-slip surfacing tape along pool edges and diving boards.
4. For above-ground pools, remove steps and ladders when not in use.

Deck-circle pathway

To keep little feet—or big ones—from beating a dusty trail into your grass, install a few “stepping stones” made from composite decking. They’re durable, no-maintenance, and affordable (or even free, if you use leftover boards). And the playful, chunky design will put a spring in your step for seasons to come. **THE HOW-TO** ▶ Place seven boards side by side, leaving 1/4-inch between them for drainage, and criss a circle around them. The deck screws attach a base of three boards perpendicular to the others, one at the center line, the other two near opposite ends of the circle. Use a jig saw to cut out the circle, then bury the base so that the piece is flush with grade.

Stop those leaks

Stop drip stops in the sound of your water bill going up, up, up. On average, a home drips away to \$100 a year of water each year enough to fill a swimming pool. Try these tips to fix common trouble spots. (For more details, check out thisdiynation.com/fixes.) —NICKAL RODRIGUEZ

Deliver faucet Stop all the water supply (remove the handle) to your faucet, remove every the old rubber washer that's under the hexagonal nut beneath the handle(s) and replace.

Outdoor spout If the leak is coming from the handle, remove it and replace the washer inside. If you see water oozing from the base of the spout, try tightening the nut that holds it in place.

Flush Add a few drops of food coloring to the tank. If the water in the bowl of the toilet is colored, then half as how the flapper inside the tank is no longer. Replace it, and use 400-grit paper to sand down corrugations on the flush-valve seat. (The piece, the flapper valve) so that the seal is tight.

Simple design, timeless style

A square layout, classic white cabinets, and neutral stone counters add up to a kitchen that will stand up to decades of use without looking dated. *by KATHERINE AMER • Photos by DAVID LOEBMAN*



When the emphasis of a kitchen remodel is on timeless practicality, the room can work hard for years without looking out of sync with the times. That's what the soul cook who owns the space above here envisioned, having endured a badly planned galley kitchen for years. The house that she shares with her husband and their two sons in Manhattan Beach, California, was built in 1940 as a one-story weekend place not meant for serious cooking. Needing more room overall, they asked local architect Michael O'Keefe to add a second story and a kitchen that would be "simple and clean, and which they would still love in 30 years," says Exton. He moved the bedrooms upstairs and turned the old galley into a dining room, a sitting room, and a powder room. The crown jewel of the project, he says, was tracking the new kitchen and an adjacent breakfast area into the footprint of the old guest suite. Efficient and well proportioned, the new space has an old and beautiful character, which provides a home and a sanctuary of work area. The white-painted cabinets with their doors are a model of organization, with each designated to hold specific items such as cereal boxes or food storage containers. Highly functional but warm, the kitchen has a timeless style that will stay fresh for years to come.

1 Relocated the kitchen to a central location in a ground-floor great bedroom. The architect kept the room's original footprint.

3 Added an island with drawers for utensils and a clear cut-out case—handy during meal prep. The new workspace fits in close to the outside, so traffic flows around the island, not through the room.

4 Installed a skylight above a brick chimney, made possible by a small setback on the new second floor.

5 Carved a breakfast room out of the former guest bath. Sliding glass doors replaced small windows, providing access to the garden and bringing in light.

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How to add blasts of bright color

Choose neighboring hues on the color wheel, then warm one up and cool one down for a happy color scheme. BY ROBIN KRAVITZ



Those things live in warm colors, like the bright green on the mosaic shower at right, and another to ditch an entire room is it. Consider instead putting it with a closely related color, like the pale chartreuse on the upper portion of the walls, to create a combination that feels right.

The trick, says Mark Chamberlain, a decorative painter and colorist in New York City, is to select colors that are neighbors on the color wheel, a tool that designers use. (Find a wheel at chickdiaz.com/colors/.) The seven basic colors in the spectrum are arranged on the wheel this way: red, orange, and yellow (warm colors) and green, blue, indigo, and violet (cool colors).

Then keep in mind that warm up hues often pair well with cooled-down ones. The two here are Climbing Lily and Limeade from Ralph Lauren Paint. Limeade is a warm, yellowish-green. Climbing Lily is cooler, greenish yellow. "Choose colors from close but different price ranges," Chamberlain says. "Then play around and posted a combination you like."

Rooms with mosaic actually feed themselves to the two related-shades treatment, but you can also create separate color fields by opening off the wall halfway up or adding a chair rail. Here, crisp white built-in floors help lighten up the effect. The bottom line: a lively look and a great place to begin the day. ■

Design ideas for sheared shrubs

Shrubs clipped into geometric shapes can set off areas in your yard and solve a multitude of problems. Here, tips and tools for shearing success. *by REBEKKA FOX • Photography by MARK LORBERMAN*

For centuries gardeners have been clipping and shearing shrubs as a way of defining areas of their property. And not only for aesthetic reasons. After all, a beautiful wall of greenery is less expensive to construct than a wall of brick or stone. Leaving aside fancy copes of cast iron, the geometric forms that shearing can produce—rectangular walls, box columns, pointed cones—turn shrubs into green architecture, enabling them to create boundaries, establish sight lines, direct traffic, and highlight focal points in the landscape.

The garden shown here and on the following pages sits behind a historic English-style Arts and Crafts home in Pasadena, California, its formal structure designed to complement the straightness of the house. Though the garden is expensive, don't be intimidated. There are lessons you can learn from its use of formal hedging and clipped shrubs to apply to virtually any yard or garden, large or small.

1. Fill out problem areas in the yard.

It would be hard to keep a fully grown, round gliding clematis under the heavy shade of a large arbutus. A small, green, pointed shrub with clipped branches, which the gardener intended to define the space, has become a climbing plant, its branches filling the space. It's a good thing the shrub is so close to the house, where the new shape blossoms, the new becomes a useful green wall with a more restrained, formal feeling.

Garden wells really help a pond or dock feel like a moat, whereas they're made out of greenery, stone, or, more unexpectedly, the old child's window used here. Hang from rails on stop-over points; they resemble a 66 by 18-foot dock, giving it the elegant air of a glass-boat conservatory. **Monroe:** Suzanne Hudson, a garden designer, snagged the five 17-foot-tall feds for \$98 each at a flea market near and recently put them to use to define her Douglasville, Georgia, dock. Like mountain white oak but on a tree.

For the furnishings, painted metal porch gliders and spring chairs from the 1940s had the laid-back look Hudson wanted; the arm elastic rosin and auxiliary metal achieved the right rusted finish in short order. "Green, brown, and white, the natural colors of pines in a garden, are a back-of-the-color scheme," she says. Blue lips are new and rose pillows brighten it up.

"Our house is a little bit dinky," says Lucy Smith of the circa-1900 cottage she shares with her husband and sons in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. So *The Old House* editor-in-chief Carol J. W. Karth of Bedford, New York, offered suggestions on giving it grace as they

Karth quickly recognized a gem in the rough. "The house has simple lines that make it adaptable to several architectural styles," she says. Many of her proposed changes, such as an earth-toned color palette and to period iron-roof tiles for porch columns and lamp posts, nod to the Craftsman aesthetic, which became popular soon after the house was built. In addition, she traded the loaned shutters for rustic board-and-batten models and added weathered versions of Victorian-style porch brackets because they suited the house's small scale and cottage feel. The copper roof overhangs and stone column bases are also long-lasting investments that would increase the home's value. Lucy's favorite result? The new color scheme. "Now we don't have to pick out paint," she says. ■

These beautiful wrought-iron or copper glass globes hanging from classrooms, libraries, courthouses, and kitchens as far back as the 1920s. With their clean, utilitarian lines and practical light-diffusing shades, hard-working schoolhouse lights were a popular choice anywhere good work and outdoor lights were needed. As demand for them increased, the original white flared globe soon took on hand-painted bands of color, more geometric forms, and fancier metal finishes.

Flush mount. This no-shade style is space-saving optimum for tiny bedrooms and hallways with flat (or lower) ceilings in need of good ambient light. "To maximize light in small rooms, one can't rely on the ceiling is fine," cautions Bay-Romero. "For larger spaces like a 30-foot-long corridor, placing one every 4 to 10 feet works best."



Semi-flush mount. With a shade that drops the shade down as much as 6 inches, this style works well in rooms with ceilings 8 to 10 feet high. Because this style fixture tends to light up as well as out, it helps make ceilings seem higher as that small room feels larger. Try one in a laundry room, den, or over a table for a modular table glow.



Pendant. With golden suspension, a shade whose covered with metal or mesh, or shrouded through chain links, this style is a good choice for rooms with ceilings 11 feet or higher. Typically 12 to 36 inches long, pendants 30 inches or less are obtained by trimming the rod or removing links, or custom ordered. Pendants look striking singly or grouped in threes, just be sure to hang them at the bottom of the shade at 40 inches above a kitchen prep area or 35 inches above a dining table.

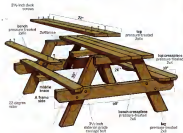

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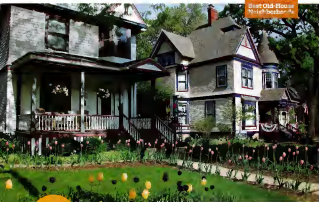

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It takes a little time to find the best neighborhoods, precisely what we looked for in selecting the winners of our second annual Best Places to Buy an Old House contest—places that might not be on your radar but deserve to be. This year we discovered 51 great spots, one in each state and our first Canadian entry to make the cut. You'll see all of them in the following pages. Find the rest at thisoldhouse.com. Like last year, we relied on our good friends at Preservation.Discovers.com solely as contact thousands of neighborhood groups, real estate agents, and preservation societies to get their takes on the best places to track down, fix up, and fall head over heels for older homes. A great example is Takoma, Washington's Dodge-Clarendon neighborhood, a cool, quirky scientific suburb known for its strong sense of community, walkable, tree-lined streets, well-populated front porches, and blocks of old houses. That's where Jennifer Wilder McMurtre found her perfect yellow bungalow for just \$115,000. "I was born in Miami, raised at Miami Beach, and lived in New York and California," says Jennifer, "but I've never seen a neighborhood like this." Those who nominated their favorite spots this year did exactly the same way. Here's hoping you'll find one to fall just as hard for.



Best Place for Fixer-Uppers

Elgin, Illinois

- Less than 40 miles from downtown Chicago
- Doodling, TLC-needing Queen Annes start at \$100,000
- Grants available to convert multi-family houses back to single-family homes

THE NEIGHBORHOOD: Not far and second old Illinois. Homelessy imagine herself living in Elgin. Illinois. Growing up in nearby Schaumburg in the 1960s, she shared the city had a reputation for being "grungy" rundown—even a bit dangerous. A few years ago she made just stop here while riding the Fox River Blue Trail, which runs 30 miles through the Chicago suburbs. It was there she realized that either Elgin's reputation might be rapidly changing or things here had changed dramatically for the better. In the market for a house, Brenda did some research and discovered



she could get more bang for her buck in Elgin than in other Chicago area towns. She soon stumbled upon late 19th century brownstones in the Gifford Park neighborhood for \$268,000. "Elgin is beautiful," she says. "It's walkable and safe, with plenty of bike paths." Besides, new parent, and her husband, Evan, are looking for a larger house, hopefully one of the city's cherished Queen Annes, which start at \$200,000. That's the great thing about Elgin, says Brenda. You can buy a starter home, upgrade to a eventual residence to raise your kids, then empty nest down to a bungalow when you retire.

THE HOUSES: Some of the city's most handsome Queen Anne Tudor and Gothic Revival houses are found in the Northwest neighborhood, which borders downtown and contains two historic districts, most notably Elgin's oldest neighborhood, Spring Douglas, a National Historic District. Here, a 2,000-square-foot Queen Anne can be had for \$150,000 to \$300,000, depending on its condition. **WHY BUY NOW?** The best reason is summed up by Elgin resident Pete Cella: "No one really knows about us yet." Property values in the historic districts are on a steady climb in part to the city's proximity to Chicago. The city is offering grants to help buyers restore single-family homes that were broken apart into multi-family units.



Best Place for Northern Exposures

St. Patrick's Ward, Guelph, Ontario, Canada



- Stone and brick cottages
- Year-round access to Toronto
- Walk downtown in just 15 minutes

THE NEIGHBORHOOD: In the early 1900s, entrepreneur J.M. Lyon started giving away land to factories and selling small residential lots in St. Patrick's Ward, just outside downtown Guelph. Soon, thousands of European immigrants, mostly Italian, started coming here to work

in these factories and live in the small stone and brick workers' cottages, often adding their own vegetable gardens. Nowadays, some of these factories are being turned into condos. And this quiet urban neighborhood is drawing new residents, who fall hard for its brick industrial beauty, stone churches, sidewalks, some remaining vegetable gardens. Most of the Italian families have moved on, but "The Ward," as it's called, remains a land of opportunity for those looking for a friendly, old-fashioned neighborhood to call home.

THE HOUSES: Four-square and Victorian built between 1900 and 1920 are common. Though the most notable homes here are stone or brick Italianate cottages and "Orlando cottages," the latter are one-and-a-half-story stone and brick Gothic Revivals with a hipped roof and simple square gables above the door. Houses start at around \$286,000 (U.S.).

WHY BUY NOW? Buyers are rediscovering the charms of this

outlet community just minutes from downtown Guelph, and are moving here to remodel houses. There are plenty of jobs, but Guelph, which has a population of about 115,000, is just 80 miles from Toronto, so it's also an ideal place for commuters looking for lower housing prices and a slower pace.

COTTAGE LIVING ABOVE: "The Ward" is a 100-acre lot with a large garden. **BELOW:** The Italianate workers' cottages are stone and brick.



Best Place for Families

The Vine neighborhood, Kalamazoo, Michigan

- Free college tuition for public school graduates
- Great tax incentives for buyers
- Proximity to restaurants and college sporting events

THE NEIGHBORHOOD: After a neighborhood in the 1950s, initially Victorian, an neighborhood is experiencing quite a comeback as people move here because it's close to downtown, stellar schools, parks, hiking trails, and playgrounds. Sure, it's a great place for families, but since it borders Western Michigan University, "The Vine" also works as a youthful feel with lots of trendy restaurants, bars, and shops.

THE HOUSES: Most are four-square or Queen Annies, which retain their details. Including wrap-around porches, double-hung windows, and Victorian ironwork. Ready to move in homes go for \$100,000 and up. Four upper start at \$50,000.

WHY BUY NOW? A new Spanish language immersion school and a top-notch public high school in the Vine are luring families. Thanks to "The Kalamazoo Promise," students who attend Kalamazoo schools from pre-kindergarten through 12 receive tuition to any of Michigan's public colleges or universities. But even students who attend grades nine through 12 here get 60 percent off "The Vine" if a student at a local public district school leaves to take school year at a district with that size thousands in property taxes.

Best Place for Foodies

Temescal neighborhood, Oakland, California

- A vibrant restaurant scene and farmer's market
- A great place for first-time buyers
- Spacious backyards

THE NEIGHBORHOOD: Located in North Oakland, just a few miles from Berkeley, the Temescal neighborhood, named for the creek that runs through it, was once thriving Italian-American village and the terminus of Oakland's streetcar line. In the past few years, this long-overlooked hole has been at the top of listing buyers' wish lists. The neighborhood is full of colorful, stone-influenced homes, many of which have a small but sought-after backyards. Some people first discover Temescal while visiting its popular Sunday farmer's market or the growing number of restaurants, bars, and bakeries that are opening here, including the famed Sola cafe & bakery, which reportedly sells the best third chicken sandwich in the planet. "It seems a lot of people are starting to look for places in Temescal now," says Ondra Joyner, a Realtor with Red Oak Realty. "That's probably because the two- and three-bedroom houses here are perfect starter homes." Temescal is also close to business and freeways. And you can be in downtown San Francisco in less than 20 minutes, beating heavy traffic.

Best Place for Urban Suburbanites

Richmond Hill, Queens, New York

- Suburban living, minutes from Manhattan
- Bedrooms a perk destined by Frederick Law Olmsted
- Local neighborhood organization helps with associations

THE NEIGHBORHOOD: Richmond Hill is as peaceful as a backwater town, but it's in the heart of the city. That's why it's hard to imagine these homes are less than a 48-minute subway ride from midtown Manhattan. Established in the mid-1800s as one of New York City's first planned communities, Richmond Hill was once home to thousands of Italian, Irish, and German immigrants looking to escape the crowded living conditions of the city. That escape was made all the more pleasant thanks to Forest Park—a 600-acre landscaped law Olmsted urban retreat with horse trails, golf courses, and gardens—which borders the neighborhood.

THE HOUSES: The largest, most detailed homes are in North Richmond Hill, bordering the park, where many homes designed by local New York City architect Henry Huggan stand. These Queen Annies and Colonial Revivals are known for their unique built-ins, enormous front porches, tiled floors, and outcrooked shutters. More modest Craftsman and Victorian homes in the southern part of Richmond Hill start at about \$250,000.

WHY BUY NOW? New York real estate is as affordable as it is likely to get, especially in the outer boroughs. The Richmond Hill Historical Society is drawing more attention to the neighborhood by sponsoring regular house tours, including New Yorkers in the area's unique history and architecture.

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THE BACKLASH LIFE: Temescal is a haven for buyers looking for affordable homes—like this stone bungalow—in a vibrant, happening neighborhood.

THE HOUSES: Many single-family homes here are 1800s bungalows that, while modest from the outside, are packed inside with architectural details, such as built-ins, moldings, wainscoting, and window seats. These houses start between \$500,000 and \$600,000. Pricey, yes, but that's a heck of a lot cheaper than a house, especially one with a yard, within your San Francisco or other nearby Oakland neighborhoods, such as Rockridge. **WHY BUY NOW?** If you found yourself priced out of the Bay Area during the housing boom, now is the time to get it and the shot Temescal borders urban areas and is experiencing a genuine effort as people scramble for more affordable real estate. And did we mention that chickens are cool?

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Build a sitting wall

Make a patio or garden border that does double duty as extra backyard seating

Take a scenic drive through the back roads of New England and you will inevitably get one of the 2-to-4,000 miles of roads with built by 19th century farmers trying to delineate their land. You may not have a large plot to mark off, but your pines and flower beds will still deserve a border, and one that doubles as a place to sit down will make your landscape all the more enjoyable. 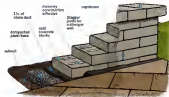

1. Lay out and excavate the area

At least half the depth of the wall's first course must be buried for stability, so you need to dig a trench before stacking the stones. Allow for at least 2 inches of soil on either side of the trench, which you will backfill to keep the wall from tilting as the ground settles. Once you've laid out the trench, a string line acts as a reference point against which to check the depth of the trench.

A Using stone-colored chalk, the horizontal of the wall's guide, mark out the length and shape of the trench. Add at least 1 inch on either side of the stones. Drive a stake at each end.

B Using a shovel or mason string and stretch it between the stakes. To keep the string from shifting, notch each stake and hook the string in the notches rather than tying it. Use a shovel to clear the string, and remove it as needed when you dig.

C Using a spade and starting at the low point of any slope, dig a trench at least 12 inches deep or until you reach bedrock. Use a shovel to topsoil the lighter-colored soil beneath. Measure off of the level line to mark the base of the trench level as you excavate the area.

Tip Use a shovel or mason string and stretch it between the stakes. To keep the string from shifting, notch each stake and hook the string in the notches rather than tying it. Use a shovel to clear the string, and remove it as needed when you dig.

2. Lay the base

Gravel is cheap, tightly packed layers for the stones with a crushed rock, with stone dust mix known as power base. Put down the base in layers so that you can pack it well, building it up until the depth of the remaining trench is about half the thickness of your stones.

A Throw 1 inch of power base into the trench.

B Using a hand tamper, compact the base.

Measure the distance from the base to the level line to make sure the base is level. If necessary, pour additional layers of power base and tamp each one until the surface of the base at the low point of the slope is half the depth of one block plus 1 inch from the level line.

C Shovel 1 inch of stone dust into the trench. Spread and level the stone dust by pushing a spade over the uneven surface. Check that the thickness of the base is half the depth of one block plus 1 inch from the level line and stone dust is equal to the shallowest point to half the thickness of one stone.

3. Lay the first course

A level and sturdy wall of stone depends on the positioning of the first course. A first course that fits will fit the block stacked on top of it, and one with gaps will leave off the rest of the joints. If there's any slope in your area, begin to set the stones from the high end of your trench and build up the low area to avoid having to remove any stone dust.

A Set the first stone so it's level between the stakes of the trench. Using a 4-foot level, check the stone running from side to side. Then, to break and remove a corner, using a mallet, tap the stone to set it. Place the next stone. Set it with a mallet and check that it's flush with the adjacent stone and level in all

directions. Continue setting the first course in the same way until you reach the end of the wall.

B Using a spade, backfill the gaps on either side of the stones with stone dust and a layer of dirt. Support the dirt by pushing it in place, being careful not to dislodge the stones.

Tip When setting a stone, butt it against the adjacent stone, then drop it straight down so that you avoid dragging the stone down and pushing it into the base.

LIKE OLD TIMES, ONLY BETTER

It started life as an outbuilding, with old shutters nailed down for a floor. Then, over its 300 years, it grew into a breezy summer cottage. Finally, thanks to a smart remodel, it's now a comfortable family home.

Here's one way to describe a dream house in Edgewood at low order: shingled summer cottage about lake side from ocean. David and Tracy Gervant bought just such a place in Amagansett, New York, in 1999, and treasured it as the perfect getaway from their high stress city jobs. They loved the cottage's history. The core of the structure is believed to date from the early 1700s, when it was little more than an outbuilding for a nearby house. And they loved its charm: Rooms had evolved in quirky, make-do fashion over the years—some with shed roofs and 7-foot-high ceilings. Making improvements those first few years—updating a guest bath and replacing the furnace and septic system—the couple enjoyed their summer place and celebrated the birth of two daughters, now 4 and 9. Then Tracy received a simple request that fell, in can happen with old cottages, in a near-potential of the whole place.

"I just wanted to get rid of the noise," recalls Tracy, of the commercial range in a carbide and kitchen-lamby room that had an exposed side that was hot to the touch—a safety issue with young children—and heated up the entire cottage. In discussing ideas with contractor Robert Ruscio and architect Tripp Rosenberg, the couple embarked on a series of "it made sense" decisions that eventually transformed their cottage from 1,500 square feet of ramshackle construction to 2,800 square feet of sound, light-functioning living space. It made sense to bump-out space for a dedicated kitchen, away from the main traffic flow, but adjacent to the family room. And while they were at it, it made sense to redo the bedrooms, the master had no foundation and the girls' room was barely big enough for one daughter, let alone two. "And once we decided to add on a dormer on master suite with a proper foundation, it made sense to add a second floor for the girls' bedrooms," says David.

All the sensible decisions were undertaken with one overarching goal in

keep the whimsy and character of the old cottage, blending it seamlessly with the new spaces. They would leave the 7-foot ceiling height of the dining area intact, for example, preferring to expand the adjacent outside deck. They would keep the living room's mahogany floorboards and beach rock fireplace attached, but replace the tall windows facing the fireplace with weather-tight reproduction.

The size and slope of the kitchen bumpout was determined by traffic considerations and function. "In a beach house where there's lots of entertaining, I like to allow a 4- to 4½-foot traffic corridor versus the more conventional 3½-foot corridor," says kitchen designer Scott Smith, the architect's husband, who worked with her on the project. The 13-by-14-foot room includes zones for cooking and clearing food within the kitchen along the exterior wall, a crease aligned with an outdoor water bridge so that kids can easily grab a glass, and a snack counter on the family room side of a half wall to keep guests nearby but out of the work area. One kitchenworkmate speaks to the extensive structural work the cottage required: A pair of square columns that echo existing columns in the living room's entry conceal steel posts that support a

load-bearing laminated veneer lumber (LVL) beam that spans from kitchen to family room. "This piece was about to fall down," says contractor Banda, who found rot and insect ports building up the house in some places. "We had to put in over 14-foot-long LVL beams to create the 28-foot span we needed, supporting them with steel posts that go right down to the new concrete foundation."

To give the young family the bed-

room space they needed, Kristy Smith designed a new stairway to replace an existing poorly built bedroom on the back of the house. The first-floor master suite also includes another and has a private porch. strange details in headboard painting, wooden metal-rod cabinets, and mirror windows that bring in ocean breezes.

Boudie repaired the existing stairway, keeping the original balustrades, and transformed an attic area—which had old shakers and doors for floorboards—into a finished playroom, complete with headboard ending, built-in wall storage, and a handcut mirror window that overlooks the family room and kitchen. "From that window, the girls lower nets down to us while we're cooking, using a jumpy rope and hooker," says Tazzy.

Perhaps the most challenging aspect of keeping the old rooms intact while adding new spaces was reconciling the rooflines. Because the cottage had evolved somewhat haphazardly—such gabled bedrooms, a shed-roof dining nook, and a flat porch tucked in over the years—new areas needed to look as though they had, too. "We ended up with 30 different roof elements," says Benberg Smith, who tackled the new two-story bedroom wing under a gable that also has two shed dormers to add interest to the girls' bedrooms and bath. She added a shed roof to the master suite porch and capped the kitchen baywindow with a gable.

Inside, all these additions meant a mix of flooring—tanner oak here, wide mahogany there—that needed to be unified. Boudie got wide-board Douglas fir for the new kitchen and master suite, as well as the new second-floor bedrooms and hallway, then every wood floor in the cottage was stained the same dark hue.

Though the renovation was much

more complex than they could ever have imagined, the Garsens don't regret a thing. "I love history," says David. "Even though many people told us we would've been better off tearing the place down and starting over, we didn't want to."

The seamless result leaves masters wondering where the old past ends and the new spaces begin, all while enjoying the many places for relaxation. "It's nice to have a room open up in many directions," says Benberg Smith. For the Garsens, that means coffee in their sister's porch and cocktails on the deck, while the girls have their clams to agitate.

"The house is full of cozy places to just hang out in," says David. A few more words to add to any dream-house description: ■

Stone countertops

Nothing elevates the appearance of a kitchen like a handsome, hard-wearing slab of stone. The experts at This Old House explain how to find a quarried countertop that suits your home, your budget, and your cooking style. *By Josh Gerschlager*

The countertop makes the kitchen. It's the work surface where you prepare food, eat casual family meals, perhaps even pay bills and help Junior with his homework. And of all the countertop materials you can buy, stone is the gold standard for both durability and character.

Every rock pulled from the earth has its own natural color, veining, and speckles, brought vividly to life by nature's work of suns and pulsating wheels. So whether you select a solid burgundy quartzite, a deep blue granite, or a beige travertine embedded with fossilized seashells, it will be as distinctive as an original work of art.

And as permanent, too. Unflooded by hot pans or water, a stone countertop will last as long as your house—maybe even longer. It needs only a little routine care and forethought to ward off water marks, stains, and etching typically caused by acidic foods. But even if the worst happens—a chipped edge, a red wine spill—most stones can be restored by a professional.

On the following pages, we explain the differences between the various stone types, offer money-saving tips, and cover the basics of stone care. By the end, you'll know when it's time to bring your kitchen, beautifully and durably, into the stone age.

standards for stone

Follow these rules of thumb for good-looking, long-lasting counters.

Backsplash
Set off with a different stone.

Stainless
Durable, but it's not stone.

Sealants
Triggers a reaction that seals acids or oil.

Edges
Rounded stone isn't a chip at all; it's an acquired taste.

Overhang
Equal for and beyond the perimeter of the island or on overhang.



VITALS

What's it cost?

Typically \$20 to \$300 per square foot. Sink and faucet holes and fancy edges are extra.

Does it build up?

Impervious to heat and water but will chip if say, you bang a cast-iron skillet on an edge.



Will it stain?

Thanks to approved factory-applied sealants, some stone is now come with lifetime warranties.

How much care?

Keeps spots promptly with soapy water or stone cleaner. Apply under all islands for grout. That's a daily care in three years.



Where to buy it?

At a home yard if you can pick the exact slab you want, at a big box store you choose from display samples. The big box store might have a lot, but don't expect your slab to match the sample exactly.

Is stone right for your kitchen?

Sure, it's showpiece, but keep these practical considerations in mind before you buy



Different Every stone is different, so the pattern and color you choose is one of a kind.

Durable Unlike laminate, wood, solid surface, or engineered stone, natural stone is unaffected by heat.

Versatility **Seamless** Stone slab provides a smooth surface, although the ornate veining you'll see is typical of natural tile tops.

Low maintenance Just wipe up spills as they occur and simply seal when required (once in 6 to 12 months).

Repairable Cracks, chips, and scratches can be fixed on site by a stone restorer.

Impermeable to water Unlike butcher block—or a laminate's engineered substrate—stone stands up to splashes.



Price The high cost of quarrying, shipping, and fabricating stone makes it one of the most expensive countertop choices.

Brittle Stone will crack if it's not evenly supported. Cabinet tops must be flat and level or covered with plywood and shimmed level.

Not DIY-friendly Except for soapstone, which you can cut with woodworking tools, you'll have to hire a pro to make the sink and faucet holes and to shape the edges of your slab. Stone weighs about 15 pounds per square foot, so you need well-insulated saws to cut it.

Some are stain-prone Travertine, limestone, and marble bleed easily if not periodically sealed; less porous stones, such as Vermont slate and soapstone, are more silent.

May be vulnerable to acids Citrus fruits, vinegars, and cleaners with bleach or ammonia will etch marbles, limestones, and travertines, even if sealed. A stone restorer can repolish a stain in your home.

Stone for every style

With so many patterns and colors—including speckled and vibrant and subtle and subdued—stone complements most any type of kitchen. Here are some tips for selecting the right stone for you.

Colors • To best showcase the counter, pick a stone that can freshen up the color of the cabinets. Pair a warm granite with a water-oiled cherry, for instance. A neutral chrome coating of Carrara and white quartz is clean and contemporary but will downplay the stone. Avoid trends in extreme colors that you fear the next owner will really tire of.

Patterns • Don't be afraid of natural veining—it's what makes quarried stone different from most man-made countertop materials. Variegated patterns also hide stains and grime better than those with uniform colors.

Surface treatment • A shiny granite may look suit a formal kitchen, but in a more rustic setting, honed is usually a better choice. Some stones, such as soapstone and slate, can be polished smooth, but that's your only choice. Keep in mind that the surface treatment can also affect how the stone is sealed. Granite, for example, is easier to keep spot-free if you use a stone sealer, but it's better to keep it honed. But in wetter areas, such as inside or beside a sink, a honed finish makes sense because you can use a scrubber sponge or a light abrasive cleaner such as Bar Keepers Friend without worrying about scratches.

Thickness • Stone slabs come in two standard thicknesses: about 1½ inch (2 centimeters) and about 1¾ inch (3 centimeters). Thicker stone has a greater visual heft that's generally preferred in kitchens. To get the look for less, ask your installer to glue or "laminate" a sliver of stone to the backsplash. It's a quality job; these edge slivers will be cut from the same slab and the installer will look over it.



pro advice

DOUBLE THE OUTFIT • This is a good idea if you're choosing stone for a kitchen. Before you buy a slab, bring home a few samples and look at them in your kitchen at various times during the day. A stone's appearance changes dramatically depending on lighting conditions.

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Q I'm told that the gas I keep in a can for my lawn mower goes bad the longer it sits there. Is there any way to prevent that?

A Gasoline can degrade after a couple of months. One option is to buy only a few months' supply at a time. But it's easier to take preventive steps than to deal with a bad can of gas. An additive will keep gasoline for up to a year. Also, be sure you always store your equipment in a dry, well-ventilated area. If you're not using the fuel, consider using a fuel stabilizer. Don't forget to use the correct fuel for your engine. It might not be the best idea to use a fuel stabilizer if you're not using the fuel. —ROBINSON, THE OLD HOUSE EMPLOYEES

S: Visit a machine shop; they might be able to fabricate parts from scratch. This is a tolerance of last resort because of the cost, but it's a few hundred dollars of shop work covers your cost of machining fixtures, then maybe the expense will be worth it.

Q LAMN INKLEDER

We have what the neighborhood nurseries call "crawping Charlie" growing all over our lawn. We've tried pulling them, digging them up, reseeding overseeded, cutting the grass short, and leaving the grass long. Nothing seems to work. Help!

Roger Cook replies: Crawping Charlie, also called ground ivy or gill-over-the-ground, is a perennial and a highly invasive creeping vine of the mint family. It lives conditions that grass doesn't shade, and kill that's wet, acidic, or compacted. So if you see this weed, it's a message that your lawn needs help.

Cleaned weed killers might get rid of it, but unless you change the conditions that encourage this pest, it'll just come right back. Get a soil test and add the nutrients or minerals that are missing. Power or rotary edging trim to remove more light. Reduce mow of course weeds, such as rye, which don't overwinter the grass, and raise a case against over water the fall to reduce compaction. Aerate aerating, spread a mixture of compost and sand over the grass so that the soil will drain better. If you can't do a somewhat shady area, use a grass blend suitable for shade. And if you still have problems after all that, give up on grass and plant a native shade groundcover that's more to your liking.

Q CRACKED STONE TREAD

The five steps leading to my house have 3/4-inch thick limestone treads. The bottom tread and riser have cracked. I'd like to replace this piece, but the only limestone I can get around here is 2 inches thick. Is there a way to solve this problem?

—REBECCA WILSON, NJ

Tom Silva replies: I can imagine a couple of possibilities, though it would be a lot easier if you could get your hands on some 3/4-inch thick limestone. Have you checked architectural salvage lots? Or maybe a online stone yard? That isn't just about getting the steps to match; it's also a good safety. If the distance between the tops of the steps isn't exactly the same, you're going to trip on them every time.

I can see from the photo (above) that one of the stone treads under the corner has sunk. This may be what caused the tread to crack in the first place. So, first, reset the stone, then convert the broken tread and repair the cracked riser.

If you're replacing with a 2-inch-

thick piece, you have to lower the riser by 1/4 inch. Use a hand sledge and stone chisel to knock out the old mortar, and, if necessary, raise up the new stuff. This will be a little tricky, because you don't want to crack the stone or damage any visible surfaces. Be sure to wear safety glasses.

When you're chisel-ing off enough, set the new stone in a construction adhesive made for concrete block. It's much thicker than mortar and should work fine.

Q KATILE WITH GRUBS

We have a Kentucky bluegrass lawn with a bad case of grubs. We've treated the grass repeatedly with a grub-control product, but the critters keep coming back. What do you recommend we do?

Roger Cook replies: Grubs are the nocturnal, root-eating larva of June bugs and Japanese beetles, and are very difficult to control.

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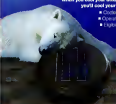
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The history: No one knows who the first owner of this 300-year-old house was, but it could be that he was a kind of slave owner. At the turn of the 20th century, the house's life server Millington neighborhood was home to some of Baltimore's most affluent families, many of German and Jewish descent. This three-story, 4,700-square-foot estate is a good example of the large, light-style houses built by the moneyed elite back then.

In 2006, following a wave of neighborhood renews in Montreal, a development company bought the place for \$275,000, most likely for a condo conversion. After gutting most of it, the company standardized the project and is selling the house at a loss, says

Why we like it The house is close to shops, a nearby fireplace mantels and hand-carved candlesticks warm. Many of the homes on this block have been beautifully restored in the past decade and are now valued upwards of \$400,000 each. Makes sense, since Rosewood Hill, a National Trust Historic District, is experiencing something of a renaissance because of its handsome architecture and proximity to 265 acres of Dog Hill Park.
