ELIQUIS® (apixaban) is a prescription medicine used to reduce the risk of stroke and blood clots in people who have atrial fibrillation, a type of irregular heartbeat, not caused by a heart valve problem.

#### IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION:

• Do not stop taking ELIQUIS for atrial fibrillation without talking to the doctor who prescribed it for you. Stopping ELIQUIS increases your risk of having a stroke. ELIQUIS may need to be stopped prior to surgery or a medical or dental procedure. Your doctor will tell you when you should stop taking ELIQUIS and when you may start taking it again. If you have to stop taking ELIQUIS, your doctor may prescribe another medicine to help prevent a blood clot from forming.

• ELIQUIS can cause bleeding, which can be serious, and rarely may lead to death.

• You may have a higher risk of bleeding if you take ELIQUIS and take other medicines that increase your risk of bleeding, such as aspirin, NSAIDs, warfarin (COUMADIN®), heparin, SSRIs or SNRIs, and other blood thinners. Tell your doctor about all medicines, vitamins and supplements you take. While taking ELIQUIS, you may bruise more easily and it may take longer than usual for any bleeding to stop.

• Get medical help right away if you have any of these signs or symptoms of bleeding:

- unexpected bleeding, or bleeding that lasts a long time, such as unusual bleeding from the gums, nosebleeds that happen often, or menstrual or vaginal bleeding that is heavier than normal
- bleeding that is severe or you cannot control
- red, pink, or brown urine, red or black stools (looks like tar)
- coughing up or vomiting blood or vomit that looks like coffee grounds
- unexpected pain, swelling, or joint pain, headaches, feeling dizzy or weak

• ELIQUIS is not for patients with artificial heart valves.

• Spinal or epidural blood clots (hematomas). People who take ELIQUIS, and have medicine injected into their spinal and epidural area, or have a spinal puncture have a risk of forming a blood clot that can cause long-term or permanent loss of the ability to move (paralysis).

This risk is higher if, an epidural catheter is placed in your back to give you certain medicine, you take NSAIDs or blood thinners, you have a history of difficult or repeated epidural or spinal punctures. Tell your doctor right away if you have tingling, numbness, or muscle weakness, especially in your legs and feet.

• Before you take ELIQUIS, tell your doctor if you have kidney or liver problems, any other medical condition, or ever had bleeding problems. Tell your doctor if you are pregnant or breastfeeding, or plan to become pregnant or breastfeed.

• Do not take ELIQUIS if you currently have certain types of abnormal bleeding or have had a serious allergic reaction to ELIQUIS. A reaction to ELIQUIS can cause hives, rash, itching, and possibly trouble breathing. Get medical help right away if you have sudden chest pain or chest tightness, have sudden swelling of your face or tongue, have trouble breathing, wheezing, or feeling dizzy or faint.

The information below does not take the place of talking with your healthcare professional. Only your healthcare professional knows the specifics of your condition and how ELIQUIS may fit into your overall therapy. Talk to your healthcare professional if you have any questions about ELIQUIS (pronounced ELL-ik-wiss).

### What is the most important information I should know about ELIQUIS (apixaban)?

For people taking ELIQUIS for atrial fibrillation, do not stop taking ELIQUIS without talking to the doctor who prescribed it. For you stopping ELIQUIS increases your risk of having a stroke. ELIQUIS may need to be stopped prior to surgery or a medical or dental procedure. Your doctor will tell you when you should stop taking ELIQUIS and when you may start taking it again. If you have stopped taking ELIQUIS, your doctor may prescribe another medicine to help prevent a blood clot from forming.

ELIQUIS can cause bleeding which can be serious and rarely may lead to death. This is because ELIQUIS is a blood thinner medicine that reduces blood clotting.

You may have a higher risk of bleeding if you take ELIQUIS and also other medicines that increase your risk of bleeding, such as aspirin, nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), warfarin, or COX-2 inhibitors. Your doctor will tell you the risks of bleeding. ELIQUIS also can cause bruising, nosebleeds, bleeding from the gums, and other medicines to help prevent or treat blood clots.

Tell your doctor if you take any of these medicines. Ask your doctor or pharmacist if you are not sure if your medicine is one listed above.

### While taking ELIQUIS

- you may take more easily
- it may take longer than usual for any bleeding to stop

Call your doctor or get medical help right away if you have any of these signs or symptoms of bleeding while taking ELIQUIS:

- unexpected bleeding or bleeding that lasts a long time such as:
  - unusual bleeding from the gums
  - nosebleeds that happen often
  - menstrual bleeding or vaginal bleeding that is heavier than normal
- bleeding that is worse or you cannot control it and pink or brown urine
- red or black stools (like blood)
- cough up blood or in your vomit looks like coffee grounds
- unexplained pain, swelling, or joint pain
- headaches lasting day to week

Forming a blood clot that can cause long term or permanent loss of the ability to move (paralysis). Your risk of developing a spinal or arterial blood clot is higher if:

- a thin layer called an endothelial catheter may develop in your blood to give you certain medicine
- you take NSAIDs or a medicine to prevent blood from clotting
- you have a history of difficult or repeated bleeding or spinal procedures
- you have a history of problems with your spine or have had surgery on your spine
- you take ELIQUIS (apixaban) and receive spinal anesthesia or have a spinal puncture, your doctor should watch you closely for symptoms of spinal or vertebral blood clots or bleeding. Tell your doctor right away if you have tingling numbness or incontinence, weakness, or loss of leg and feet.

### What is ELIQUIS?

ELIQUIS is a prescription medicine used to:

- reduce the risk of stroke and blood clots in people who have atrial fibrillation
- reduce the risk of forming a blood clot in the legs and lungs of people who have just had hip or knee replacement surgery
- treat blood clots in the vein of your leg (deep vein thrombosis or deep venous thrombosis) and reduce the risk of them occurring again

It is not known if ELIQUIS is safe and effective in children.

### Who should not take ELIQUIS?

Do not take ELIQUIS if you:

- currently have certain types of abnormal bleeding
- have had a serious allergic reaction to ELIQUIS. Ask your doctor if you are not sure.

What should I tell my doctor before taking ELIQUIS?

Before you take ELIQUIS, tell your doctor if you:

- have kidney or liver problems
- have any other medical condition
- have ever had bleeding problems
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if ELIQUIS will harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if ELIQUIS passes into your breast milk. You should not breastfeed if you are taking ELIQUIS for any reason. You should not breastfeed if you are taking ELIQUIS for any reason.

Tell all of your doctors and dentists that you are taking ELIQUIS. They should talk to the doctor who prescribed ELIQUIS for you before you have any surgery, medical or dental procedure.

# Roger Cook

This Old House landscape contractor since 1982

**After more than three decades on air, how do you keep it fresh?**  
Every homeowner has different needs, and every project has different challenges. That's what keeps the job from becoming repetitive. Plus, we have a lot of fun on the set. It's like going to work with four brothers—and you know how brothers are!

**What trends are you seeing in home landscaping these days?**  
I'm seeing less demand for the "perfect lawn" and a growing interest in organic vegetable gardening and native landscaping plants that use less water. I'm excited about the move to table movement and the return to eating more locally grown, in-season foods. The key for gardeners who want fresh produce from early spring through late fall is to plant in succession—sleeper plants based on their maturing dates. And always set up the garden in areas that get full sun.

**The Lexington Project is airing now. Tell us what landscaping challenges you're facing there.** The Lexington property has a protected stream and wetland area in the backyard, so we had to jump through a lot of hoops for the local Conservation Commission, including using proper gutters, a drywell system, and turning a section of lawn back to nature using local plants that will provide wildlife habitat. The other major challenge, as always, is budget. The homeowners would like to do everything on their wish list—lots of plantings, a big patio, a few perennials—but they only have the budget to do "Phase 1." So we've helped them get the most for their investment by focusing on a beautiful front front walk, a very cool granite house number, a few flowering trees, and plenty of fresh air in the front yard for their young daughters to play on. The "phasing" of landscape projects is something that happens often in my industry. We've given them a solid base they can build on over the coming years.

**One last question: What's your favorite tree, shrub and flower?** House dogwood is a four-season tree with beautiful white flowers in June, sweet strawberry-colored fruits that birds find delicious in the fall, and exfoliating bark in the winter. Summerweet (Celastrus laticollis) shrubs feature fluffy white flowers that bloom by mid-July, with a fragrance that is attractive to butterflies. And vibrant, fragrant peonies have always been my go-to flowers.

### Dispatching mouseguests

The suggestions offered for eliminating mice ("Meet the House Mouse") didn't follow all the tenets of Integrated Pest Management (IPM), a series of preventive strategies to deter pests. The mouse issue is in boxes in that they find food, water, and/or harborage there. Single flies, such as house flies, carry germs and eliminate food sources, are often not effective. If traps must be used, they should be live traps, released once providing an important food source for a variety of wild predators, including birds and owls. Poison should never be used as it can harm not only humans and pets but also wildlife.

### Silence the screech

### Puncturing tin cans

I have a tip to add for making the DIY mouse traps less empty tin cans ("Get The Look For Less"). It is easier to nail the pattern if you fill the cans so within 1/2 inch of the top with water and put them in the lowest overnight. Then cut the pattern for the holes, lay the can on a disinfected tray lined on your work surface, and hammer the holes. This prevents the cans from leaking when you're finished hammering, just throw the var enough to make it not of the can.

## HOW TO INSTALL A LINOLEUM FLOOR



If the word linoleum makes you think of grandma's flannel kitchen floor, think again. In tile form, linoleum offers a nice alternative to ceramic, wood, or vinyl, in just about any room. It's colorful, outlasts underfoot, warm to the touch, and hypoallergenic, all thanks to its construction of linseed oil, sawdust, and cork. Best of all, the tiles click together to form a floating floor, so no glue is needed to install them.

Downloadable templates make intricate patterns easy. Before you begin, map out your pattern on graph paper using colored pencils, each square equals 1 square foot of the room. Total the squares for each color and order an extra 10 percent of each.

### What is the most important information I should know about ANORO ELIPISTA?

ANORO ELIPISTA is only approved for use in chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). ANORO ELIPISTA is NOT approved for use in asthma.

ANORO ELIPISTA can cause serious side effects, including:

- People with asthma who take long-acting beta<sub>2</sub>-agonists against LABA (asthma), such as vilanterol (one of the medicines in ANORO ELIPISTA), have an increased risk of death from asthma problems.
- It is not known if LABA medicines, such as vilanterol (one of the medicines in ANORO ELIPISTA), increase the risk of death in people with COPD.
- Tell your healthcare provider if breathing problems worsen over time while using ANORO ELIPISTA. You may need different treatment.
- Get emergency medical care if:
  - your breathing problems worsen quickly
  - you use your rescue inhaler but it does not relieve your breathing problems

### What are ANORO ELIPISTA?

ANORO ELIPISTA contains an anticholinergic (anticholinergic), and a LABA medicine, vilanterol. Anticholinergic and LABA medicines help the muscles around the airways in your lungs stay relaxed to prevent symptoms such as wheezing, cough, chest tightness, and shortness of breath. - ANORO ELIPISTA is not for use to treat sudden symptoms of COPD. Always have a rescue inhaler (a short-acting bronchodilator) with you to treat sudden symptoms. If you do not

have a rescue inhaler, contact your healthcare provider to have one prescribed for you.

- ANORO ELIPISTA is not for the treatment of asthma. It is not known if ANORO ELIPISTA is safe and effective in people with asthma.
- ANORO ELIPISTA should not be used in children. It is not known if ANORO ELIPISTA is safe and effective in children.

### What should not use ANORO ELIPISTA?

Do not use ANORO ELIPISTA if you:

- have a severe allergy to nebulizers. Ask your healthcare provider if you are not sure.
- are allergic to umedimium, vilanterol, or any of the ingredients in ANORO ELIPISTA. See "What are the ingredients in ANORO ELIPISTA?" on next page for a complete list of ingredients.

### What should I tell my healthcare provider before using ANORO ELIPISTA?

Tell your healthcare provider about all of your health conditions, including all you:

- have heart problems
- have high blood pressure
- have asthma
- have thyroid problems
- have diabetes
- have liver problems
- have eye problems such as glaucoma. ANORO ELIPISTA may make your glaucoma worse.
- have problems or bladder problems, or problems passing urine. ANORO ELIPISTA may make these problems worse.

- are allergic to any of the ingredients in ANORO ELIPISTA, any other medicines, or food products. See "What are the ingredients in ANORO ELIPISTA?" on next page for a complete list of ingredients.

- have any other medical conditions
- are pregnant or planning to become pregnant. It is not known if ANORO ELIPISTA may harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding. If you are taking if the medicines in ANORO ELIPISTA pass into your milk and if they can harm your baby.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. ANORO ELIPISTA and certain other medicines may interact with each other. This may cause serious side effects.

Especially tell your healthcare provider if you take:

- anticholinergics (including trichloroethylene, anticholinergics)
- diuretics

Know the medicines you take. Keep a list of them to show your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine.

### How should I use ANORO ELIPISTA?

Read the step-by-step instructions for using ANORO ELIPISTA at the end of the Medication Guide.

- Do not use ANORO ELIPISTA unless your healthcare provider has taught you how to use the inhaler and you understand how to use it correctly.

## 5 FAST FIXES

❑ **Replace lost furniture pads.** They protect your floors but break down over time. If any of your pads look worn, take time this month to replace them.



❑ **Elevate potted plants.** Place containers on stands to let air circulate below and reduce the chance of rot on wood decks and porches.

❑ **Make stairs safer.** Add reflective tape to make steps a guide or an illuminated stairway easier to see.

❑ **Recalibrate the oven.** Use a tested oven oven that monitor to check the temp, then reset the oven's thermostat. Following the manual's instructions.

❑ **Schedule fireplace checks.** They go for gas inserts too. They can't blow behind fireplace screens, but they can still deposit creosote substances in your chimney.

❑ **Wash away salt damage.** Passing cars can spray road salt onto plants, damaging roots and browning leaves. When the weather warms, hose off affected plants and soak the soil to dilute salt buildup.

## ❑ **Disinfect Fido's toys**

Pets' playthings are some of the germiest items in the house, thanks to infrequent cleaning (and your pup's lack of hygiene practices). To help keep your whole family healthy, run hard-to-reach toys through the dishwasher on the wick cycle to sanitize. Throw soft toys in the washing machine, set on COLD, then air dry. You can do the same with rope toys, just skip the detergent for safety. Repeat monthly.



## ❑ **Identify hidden leaks**

In honor of Home Leak Week (March 1-2), check your water meter before and after a three-day period when no water is being used. A net change indicates a possible leak. Look for drips and/or leaks behind toilets or around shower stalls. Water stained walls and warped floors can point to hidden water too.



## ❑ **Reduce puddles**

Spring's heavy rains, coupled with melting snow, can turn the yard into a swamp. If you have low areas in your lawn, add



topsoil to help even the surface and prevent standing water—at least until you're able to plant new grass. Bonus: Tackling these areas now will help you keep mosquitoes from invading in once the weather gets warmer.

## ❑ **Inspect the garage door**

Get up about 10 minutes before you leave for more than 15 minutes to inspect your door. To make sure you can get down in a pinch, pull the emergency release cord and manually open the door. It should lift smoothly and stay up a second. For a first check, flicker the light switch to test a wall's set of balance, which can be repaired or replaced. If you're unsure, call in a pro to adjust the oil.

## 20 IDEAS Keys

These indispensable openers—often made of brass—can do more than provide access. Read on to unlock new uses.

### 1 Use as a plumb bob.

Tie a key to a string when you need a vertical reference line for indoor jobs, such as hanging wallpaper. Because the key is flat, it will sit flush against the wall, unlike a regular plumb line, making it easier to check that your work is straight as you go.

### 2 Turn them into hooks.

Send the keys using pliers and a different wrench—if keys are old and brittle, you may want to heat them over a gas burner first to make the metal



more pliable and prevent them from cracking. Also tie a piece of wood with a hole at the end to the key.

### 3 Pop a top.

Grab the edge of a beer or soda bottle cap with a key's teeth and lever it off.

### 4 Anchor a balloon.

Tie a few loose keys to the ribbon on a party-ready helium balloon to keep it from floating away.

### 5 Create a door chime.

Suspend keys from a string and attach a fishing line attached along the edge of a narrow board with edge screws. Hang a door to alert you when someone is entering.



### 6 Distress furniture.

Place several old keys on a ring and attach to a piece of string or a long zip tie. Drag furniture with the keys to create indentations where wear marks might occur naturally with age.

### 7 Make magnets.

Glue small magnets to the backs of old tarnished keys to add a fun touch to your fridge front.

### 8 Donate them.

**Single-load laundry pods** More than 17,000 children under 6 years poisoned from laundry—between 2011 and 2013, after ingesting or inhaling the contents of laundry pods. These products are small and colorfully packaged so they're super appealing to kids. All are coated with a thick, easy-to-rip or dissolvable wrapper. Store locked up, out of reach and against little ones.



**Mouthwash** Many brands of mouthwash contain alcohol. The same kind of alcohol found in baby-proofing covers. If you must have the beauty benefits, store it in a locked-med cabinet and with a child-resistant cap.



**Vintage toys** You may be tempted to let little ones play with your old beloved toys. But anything made prior to 1975, when lead paint was banned, can be problematic as old school stuff starts to flake. Stay far from sharing your collection with kids.



**Imported spices** Seasoning from overseas is sold in plastic or glass jars. But in the U.S.A., if you must use imported spices, avoid consuming them too frequently to avoid 300°F, which can cause burns.

## Cleaning tips for tricky spots

Wiping down the counter. Easy. Tackling the dust bunnies behind the fridge. Not so much. Forget some places in your house require a little extra effort. Here are expert tips for getting the grime out of the hard-to-reach areas.

► **BETWEEN RADIATOR COILS:** Wrap a dustcloth around a pencil to get between coils. Or use a radiator brush (Brushed-nylon radiator and baseboard cleaning brush, \$24, amazon.com). Follow with a wet rag and dry with a clean cloth to prevent rust.

► **BEHIND THE TOILET:** Use an old toilet brush (not the one you use to clean the bowl) to reach behind the tank. Doused with toilet cleaner? Add bleach with a steam cleaner to loosen the grime residue.

► **ALONG HORIZONTAL BLINDS:** For a quick fix, dust out the venuses. For a deeper clean, get plastic or aluminum blinds out of their hardware and give them a bath in the tub using a scrubbing mitt (why else do they're dry). For vinyl slats, use a gloved hand to sweep the dust off each one.

► **ON TOP OF CEILING-FAN BLADES:** Climb up on a stepladder and place a pillowcase over a blade, holding it closed to pull away dust. The case will contain the dirt.

► **IN BACK OF THE REFRIGERATOR:** Don't let the back of the fridge reduce your appliance's efficiency. Set down a large piece of plastic on a surface of the floor to protect your floor, and wiggle the refrigerator out. Vacuum the coils, then wipe with a damp cloth. —*MICHAEL ROSENBERG*

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## Crowd pleaser

**TIGHT QUARTERS** can really cramp your decorating style. That's why Tim and Wendy Hayes, who love hosting a crowd, were eager to open up—and brighten up—the dark kitchen in their Portland, Oregon, home. The Hayeses gained the room within days of getting the keys to the two-year-old 1936 bungalow, salvaging only the stove. “The layout was awkward and the kitchen was closed off from the dining and living areas,” says Wendy. Having out a dining wall created airflow and flow room without altering the footprint.

Once the shabby, worn-out cabinets had been scrapped, Tim got busy building new ones at his own design, giving the stacked upper sections glass doors at the very top. Then he addressed the tricky task of spray-painting the cabinets in Wendy's favorite sun-drenched shade, a buttery pale-rose up in that sunny Pacific Northwest locale. Pine floors and a cheery butcher-block island top lend more warmth. Aluminum casters allow the island to go from prep surface to serving station to seat any bash the couple may host. “It's not a big house,” says Tim, “but the new open concept makes it easy to get everyone together.”

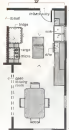

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## Upgraded for grown-ups

A children's sleeping loft becomes a piney yet refined two-part master bath full of light and custom-made amenities

**A HOUSE OUGHT TO** keep pace with its owners. Back in the early 1990s, when Ann and Doug McKillan started their family, they bought a rustic home in the woods of Hudson, Wisconsin. Used primarily as a summer retreat, it had a cramped first-floor bathroom that didn't bother the couple much. "I'd often shower upstairs in the kids' area and Doug used the outside shower," Ann says. Two decades later, hoping to spend more time in the place, they made a larger, more accommodating master bath a top priority.

Designer David Heide hired on to fully remodel the house, built in 1916. Seismic guidelines presented sharing the footprint, so since they couldn't go out, they decided to go up. "To increase headroom on the main, Heide deconstructed the roof, raising the ridge 3 feet and adding four stud dormers," Ann says. With ample room now for a master suite on the second floor, walls went up to create a lavatory as well as a separate space for the shower and concourse. Local artisans crafted knotty pine vanities and a spectacular skylight with a lead glass to celebrate the forest setting. "We have lots of room, lots of light, and lots of views go," Ann says. The place now suits the McKillans so well, they sold their house in St. Paul, Minnesota, and made it their full-time residence.

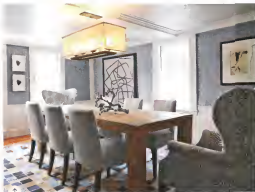

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## The need to feed

For a knockout garden, you've got to serve up the right nutrients in the right proportions. Call it menu planning for your plants

NO MORE spotty turf, stinky blooms, or stony vegetable plants. If that's your mission, you're not alone! Homeowners spent over \$6 billion on fertilizers in 2013. But randomly adding fertilizers won't produce a beautiful bounty, both plants and soil require a nutrient-rich diet tailored to their needs. Ahead, we answer your questions, troubleshoot problems, and guide you toward the ideal mix for your lawn, flowers, veggies, shrubs, and trees. You'll learn what to sprinkle, spray, mix in, and spread around for a garden that's the envy of the neighbors.

### Q How do fertilizers and soil amendments differ?

A Fertilizers, which can be organic (e.g., bone meal) or chemical (such as superphosphate), provide nutrients directly to plants, especially nitrogen (N) for leaf and stem growth, phosphorus (P) to stimulate root growth and seed formation, and potassium (K) to promote flowering and fruiting. Amendments, such as peat moss, vermiculite, and compost, indirectly impact plants by improving the structure, texture, and microbial activity of soil. A top layer of organic mulch, such as pine bark, to conserve moisture and retain warmth, absorbs the soil as it decomposes. Used together, these can all help deliver the right nutrient balance to your garden.

Facebook discussions recently, a number of folks wanted to know how to hang shades we're talking about you, Serena Shades!], so we thought we'd break it down. And we went a step further by using a unique type of shade from Lutron, called Serena. It houses D-cell batteries in the case of the roller, allowing you to operate the shade with a nifty little remote. The batteries mean you don't need an electronics fan for the install—just the following instructions.

### Serena shades step-by-step



#### 1. MEASURE AND ORDER

For each window opening, measure the width at the top middle, and measure the height at each side and at the middle. Use the narrowest width and the tallest height as minimum dimensions to order each shade.

#### 2. LOCATE THE MOUNTING BRACKET

On a wall that's at least 1/2 inch thick, make a 1/2-inch hole 2 inches from each side and along the groove through the top of the bracket. Hold the bracket in place, centered side to side and recessed equally on each side and mark the pilot holes.

#### 3. INSTALL THE MOUNTING BRACKET

Remove the bracket and drill a 1/2-inch pilot hole at each mark. Check the bracket for level, then it if necessary, shim it if necessary and secured with the mounting screws. Take care not to overtighten them, which could warp the bracket.

#### 4. HANG THE SHADES

For shades longer than 48 inches, snap the center support into the bracket. Tip the shade into the bracket, hooking the lower tab with the shade clips and gently press the top into place. You should hear a click.

#### 5. INSTALL THE BATTERIES

Bring the fascia on both sides and just 4 inches and down lowering it to reveal the battery compartment. Insert the specified number of D-cell batteries, then rotate the fascia back into place.

#### 6. ASSIGN THE REMOTE

Locate the LED push button on the left-hand side of the shade. Press it, wait for the LED to light up, then press and hold the 0.56C button lowermost on the wireless remote. When the LED flashes, you're in complete control. ■

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## Clad a wall in stone

Use cast-concrete stone veneer panels and masonry screws to dress up a plain wall—no mortar required

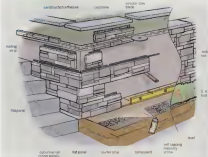


**COST** \$14 per square foot  
**TIME** Two days to clad a 200-square-foot wall  
**DIFFICULTY** Easy (but cutting is dirty work)

**IF PULLING INTO YOUR** driveway causes you to cringe at the sight of an exposed foundation or a stretch of bare cinder blocks, why not cover it up? These panels of hand-painted cast concrete provide the look of handstacked natural stone, and you don't need to hire a mason. In fact, you can install them on concrete or even framed walls with little more than a drill and a circular saw. Follow along as *This Old House* senior technical editor Mark Powers uses them to transform an unsightly expense into a front-yard focal point.

Stone veneer panels: Versant Stone Corporation in Tempe, Arizona (\$20 per panel, including tax and shipping)

**SUNDAY** Finish and cap the wall. (Steps 4-7)

- polyurethane construction adhesives.



**1/ Measure the wall.** To calculate the number of universal corners to order, measure the height in inches of each outside wall corner, as shown; divide by 36, and round up to the nearest whole number. You'll fit one in between the corners with flat panels. To calculate how many you'll need, multiply the wall's width by 24 (height in feet) and divide the resulting area by 24 (each panel covers 2 square feet). Subtract the number of universal corners from the result, then add 10 (one to go to your order at flat panels). Add one universal corner to be safe.

**2/ Paint the bottom.** The panels must be installed above ground level, so a strong, waterproof support called a starter strip, as you'll want to paint the wall below the starter to match the stone. First, a spray paint color similar to the color of your stone panels and paint the bottom two inches of the wall.

## 2 PREP THE FIRST COURSE

**3. Install the starter strip.** Set the location for the starter strip at least 2 inches above any soil. Insert the strip along with the top of a stake on the adjacent side of the corner. If your drill driver with a 1/8-inch masonry bit and a pilot hole through a stake in the strip near the corner and insert the wall. Drive a masonry screw to secure that side. Then use this 3-foot level to bring the strip level and mark it as shown. Drill pilot holes and fasten the strip in three or four more spots, depending on each case.

**4. Remove the tail.** Flip panels from a tail on each side that meets with a stake or corner that that panel has to be. Use a utility knife to cut the tail on the corner. Then flip the panel and form a new surface and cover the "dead" side of the film to knock the hole out. The resulting film will make for a tight corner.



**TIP** Keep your bit spinning to remove dust as you back the drill out of the pilot hole, allowing the masonry screw to tap into the concrete.

## 2 INSTALL THE FIRST PANEL

**5. Mark the panel.** Each row starts at a corner with the finished end of a universal corner overlapping the end of a fish panel (with the tabs moved). First, the universal corner is cut into two pieces: the finished edge of each piece starts at a corner, and the cut edge is flat.

**adjacent panel:** For panelties, pull the universal corner so that each panel is at least 1/8 inch long. Or, as an alternate, cut 4 feet against the stair riser. Reuse flat panel on the adjacent side in the starter step. Then open the universal corner upside down, butt its beveled edge against the stair riser, and scribe a outline, as shown.

**5) Cut to length.** Rest the marked panel facedown on a work surface with scrapboards beneath it on the far side of the cutline. Use a straightedge to mark a squared-off cutline along the narrowest point of the soffit line. Fit the circular saw with a segmented diamond blade and cut along the line, going through the concrete as well as the metal nailing strip. Be sure to wear safety glasses, a dust mask, and eye/ear protection.

C) **Fasten the first panel.** Hold the rail universal corner against the wall, bringing its finished and flush with the face of the adjacent flat panel so that the two pieces form a 90° outside corner. Level the universal corner and drill pilot holes through the nailing strip as shown directly through the rail (if necessary, in at least two places). Fasten the panel with 1½-inch self-tapping masonry screws.



#### 4 FINISH THE FIRST COURSE

**A) Complete the corner.** With its bit removed, buff the end of the flat panel lightly against the back of the universal corner. Check the panel for level—making sure the starter strip is free of debris—and drill pilot holes through the sealing strip. Fasten the panel to the wall as shown, using four industry screws for full panels.

**B) Finish the run.** Continue installing full-size flat panels, working your way down the course. When you near the end, measure and cut a partial panel to fill the end of the course. If the wall piece has a lap or feather edge, use the S in 1 tool to knock it off. Fill the joint in place with joint holes, and screw it to the wall.

#### 5 FILL IN THE FIELD

**A) Install the second course.** Use the cut half of the universal corner from the first course, positioned on the opposite side of the corner to stagger the joints. Slip the square on its bottom edge into the groove on top of the flat panel beneath. Position a flat panel, with its top notched, atop the universal corner in the first course. Be sure it's cut to a different length than the piece beneath, so that the joints across the wall. Mark and drill pilot holes for the universal corner, secure it, and install the adjacent flat panel to complete the corner.

**B) Align adjacent panels.** Work along the course, brushing out debris from the top groove to ensure that the panels fit together snugly. As you set each new panel, make sure that it is aligned with the previous paneling meeting with a metal rod in the groove along the top edge. The rod should lie flat and bridge the grooves in adjacent panels. If it doesn't, use the S in 1 tool to shim the panel up, or back down screws out of the previous panel and adjust it. When the panels align, drill pilot holes and fasten them to the wall.

**C) Stagger the joints.** If the end of a panel falls inline with joints on any of the previous courses, you'll want to cut down its length slightly to maintain staggered joints. Hold the panel in place and mark the sealing strip at a different length. Transfer the mark to the back of the panel, cut it to size, and refasten to the wall.



#### 6 INSTALL THE TOP COURSE

**A) Cut panels to fit.** On the final course, you'll need to cut down the height of the panels to fit, removing the sealing strip so that the stone reaches to the top of the wall. First, lift a panel back and scribe a outline on the back at the height of the wall. Set the panel on a work surface and use the marker to cut it to the proper height. You may want to cut your corner pieces to length first, then cut them to the proper height, as shown. Dry fit the two pieces at the corner to check the fit.

**B) Glue the pieces.** Remove the corner panels and apply straight beads of construction adhesive on the back of each piece in vertical lines, as shown, so that water is free to flow behind the panels and drain properly. Set the panels in place on the wall and adjust them to fit snugly at the corner.

**C) Sink the fasteners.** To further secure the cut-down panels, locate several spots on each one where you can sink a fastener as close as possible to joints between stones. Holding the piece in place, drill a pilot hole through the panel and into the wall. Drive in a masonry screw, sinking the head below the surface of the panel. Cover the screw heads with caulk, gather some dust from the cutting table, and blow it onto the drying caulk to camouflage it. You can touch up any gaps in the same manner. Finish installing the panels in the final course.



#### 7 CAP THE WALL

**A) Cut the capstones.** Select a capstone several inches wider than the depth of your clad wall to create an overhang. Measure and mark the cap stones to fit along the top of the wall. Use the corner line and the segmented diamond blade to cut to length, as shown.

**B) Set the stone.** Working with a partner, lift the capstones and dry fit them on top of the wall. Remove them and apply construction adhesive to the top of the wall and the edges of the veneer before setting the stones. If you prefer an even more substantial look, set them in a stiff mortar bed. Now take a step back and marvel at the seamless look. ■

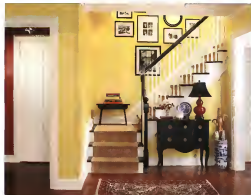


# BUMPING UP The Charming

A GENTLE EXPANSION BUILDS ON  
THE SPIRIT OF A 78-YEAR-OLD HOUSE

NEVER HURTS to have a decorator at the helm—especially one with drafting skills. Witness what pro Jennifer Vreeland McDermott was able to accomplish at the place she shares with her husband, Mark, and their two kids. Never mind wallpapering the dining room ceiling and hauling home a vintage stove. On some days, while the rest of the family was far afield elsewhere, she was standing in the backyard of their decaying but solid Dutch Colonial Revival. “I was out there at five in the morning to make sure we got it right,” she recalls of the new addition. “I would say, ‘No, it needs a better curve,’” meaning the final survey departs from the new roof.

Most homeowners take a pretty relaxed approach to the look of the house, even if they spend more time there than they do out front. But for Jennifer and her tongue-in-cheek architect Lou Hesse, all four sides matter, from the detailing around the eaves to the way alterations to the exterior affect the flow of traffic and light—and standing rooms—inside.

Tinkered with owning her family's 1,600-square-foot house into a more functional 21st-century home, Jennifer and Hesse worked from the outside in. The result was a fresh layout and more living space, made possible in part by an addition that faces the backyard with carefully styled and unexpected grace (see page 67).

“Additions are almost useful exercises, and that was the last thing I wanted to do,” says Hesse. “We tried to keep the same roofline and made the interior fit, even though that meant some sloped ceilings on the second floor.”

Jennifer, a former magazine editor, first got to know Hesse back in the 1980s, when she was producing an annual show house and he designed and built one of them. They became so used to collaborating, you could say they were able to finish each other's floor plans.

"He can take our usage in the smallest spaces," Jennifer says.

The house Jennifer wanted Hesser's help with this time was a 1937 three-bedroom, one-bath family farmhouse, built and hand-finished by its original owners, Mark's grandparents. Situated in Englewood Cliffs, New Jersey, a suburb that blossomed after the George Washington Bridge opened to traffic, in 1931, the little house had close some hard time as a rental between the second and third generations. Overgrown foliage blocked the light in front, and in back the narrow strip seemed hesitant about making contact with the yard. Still, the neigh-

borhood offered period charm, not to mention easy access to Manhattan, and at first the couple spent their off-hours simply cleaning, scrubbing, and refreshing.

"So much character was covered up by wallpaper and layers of painted dirt and linoleum," Jennifer says. "We found some of the original doorknobs in the attic"—during his childhood years, Mark's father had replaced them with privacy locks—"and put them back." She adds, "We spent the first 18 months getting down to the bare bones, nipping up carpet, power-washing the outside. It was kind of like stepping off the 1980s as much as we could to bring the house back to the late 1930s."

As the kids got older, the house began to feel more cramped. The 10-by-10-foot kitchen was crowded, and had four space-squandering doors, one on each wall. The sole, charmless bath was upstairs and served the whole house, and storage was a throwback to the Depression. "There was only one tiny closet on the first floor," says Jennifer. "You couldn't fit four seasons for four people in there."

To address the big picture, the couple brought in Hesser and general contractor Christopher Mager—though brought in is probably the wrong phrase for Hesser. Working

long distance from his Michigan studio, he turned discussions and drawings into finished plans without ever stepping into the house.

The team's goal was to expand and rework the layout without bordering the house with one of those invasive additions one sees so often in suburbia. By bumping out a mere 12 feet and cleverly making new spaces around old, the trio would increase living space from 1,600 to 2,500 square feet and give the family two baths, an extra bedroom, and two more closets upstairs, plus a new kitchen, a den with a gas fireplace, an office-area-plus-coat closet that serves as a mudroom, and a full bath on the first floor.

"We figured we could just live upstairs with a makeshift kitchen in the living room while we renovated," Jennifer recalls wryly. But after a month, contractors first pushed them into the floor and into the home of Mark's parents, where they began a three-month countdown to the final kitchen.

Mager's crew pruned off the old aluminum siding and took portions of the house down to the studs, allowing new windows, wiring, plumbing, and insulation to go in. The team kept the front-facing master bedroom while turning the second bedrooms into a master bath and walk-in closet. They also tinkered with the hall to

Ditching the mudroom, he skim-coated the exterior and created a period-appropriate portico supported by simple round columns. More quality finishes, such as a cedar-shake roof, copper gutters, and hinged raised-panel shutters, add substance to the little house. For the symmetrical garden, which is bisected by a formal brick walkway, West chose Japanese holly over similar-leaved but slow-growing boxwood, achieving the lush landscape in just three years.

## IDEAS TO STEAL

**PORTICO:** Refreshed addition, the fiberglass columns and fish-scale cedar shingles, enhance the new portico. Similar to shown: Shingles, \$5 per sq. ft.; builddirect.com. Entry columns, from \$250 each; merritts.com

**LANDSCAPING:** Placing the holly shrubs in varying heights creates an enfolding effect. Weatherproof fiberglass window boxes and pots create spots for colorful flowers in the all-green landscape. Nantuxet window box, \$100; greeneye.com

**WALKWAY:** An old brick walkway of asphalt brick replaced a curved decomposed granite path. Cut costs by using 12½-in.-thick bricks and walking concrete walls or building a meandering path with cobble pavers. Sunrise by shower, Brookstone Red Tile Series veneer bricks, \$2.88 per sq. ft.; janiashellbrick.com. Fullanfield concrete pavers, \$5 per sq. ft.; lewes.com

## RESTORE THE PORCH

It didn't take long for the new owners to decide to tear open the enclosed front porch of this late-1800s farmhouse in Wilmette, Illinois. Happily, they found the original posts and windows all in good condition. Working with architect Suzanne Van Cleave, the couple commissioned new railings that incorporate historic balusters inspired by those of local historic houses, as well as a design detail at the gable-end's peak that repeats the motif. The porch's fascia board, having rotted over time, was replaced with beecher, wider stock to balance the left of the porch. Finally, the owners splashed the place in Sherwin-Williams's Bokero. Though not an historical color for the area's late-19th-century farmhouses, red was often used on barns of the period. Says Van Cleave, "It seemed appropriate—and a little ironic, since it's in a dense urban neighborhood."

## IDEAS TO STEAL

**PORCH RAILING** Historic baluster balusters are often used on Victorian-era houses; the simple treatment here, interspersed with plain 2x2s, fits this farmhouse. Look for off-the-shelf baluster designs, starting at \$50 each at [williamsdecor.com](http://williamsdecor.com). Or create your own custom pattern with a jig; see how at [thefirsthouse.com/mar2015](http://thefirsthouse.com/mar2015).

**CABLE DETAIL** Van Cleave added the triangular pediment at the top, repeating the detail used in the balusters and mounting the piece on brackets. This flooring detail was installed over existing vents, allowing them to work unimpeded. Estimated cost: \$1,000. Effect: perfection.

**PORCH GUEST** Fold-down cat cribs tucked under the porch showed Dixie had been a cat's place for animals to curl up. And cat treaters 1/2 inch raised, grade plywood replaced recycled vertical slats, echoing the curve of the window casing and keeping the area easy and open.

## MAKE IT WELCOMING

This new-old Colonial Revival in Palo Alto, California, had plenty of appeal, with its impressive portico, beechy trim, cedar shingles and roof shakes, and well-placed windows. But not until new owners enlisted designer Carolyn Woods to add bellowing symmetrical garden borders and a red-swinging gate did the place come to life. Out came trees that had hidden the house from view. In went 4-foot-wide beds edged with boxwood and tall, iceberg rose standards, with unfussy perennials, such as yellow lavender and catmint, spilling onto the brick walkway. More sheared boxwood crosby wraps the yard and is tucked into waxy, style cast-stone urns. Setting off all this greenery is a 3-foot-tall square-picket fence with an arch-top gate that swings open to point the way to the front door.

## IDEAS TO STEAL

**FENCE AND GATE** Replacing a hedge with a square-picket fence created an enclosure without dominating the landscape. For a similar style in easy-care vinyl, look for pickets and posts with level corners and frames. Estimate the gate work: see. Similar to shown: Chestnut Hill cellular PVC picket fence, \$120 per linear foot; [wpcowoodenorkers.com](http://wpcowoodenorkers.com).

**FRONT DOOR** The cool gray stain on the house is individually applied cedar shingles in a rich brown stain floor color. Semi-transparent stain: Driftwood Gray, \$34 per gallon; [colorfast.com](http://colorfast.com). Paint: A Capella, about \$70 per gallon; [ajoy.com](http://ajoy.com).

**ENTRY LIGHTS** Three light lanterns spaced behind the door and a five-sided pendant hung below the ceiling illuminate the landing and highlight the beech glass fanlight and side lights. A pair of tall candle lanterns at the base of the door adds a romantic glow. Similar to shown: Luster Lighting's Westover series, \$300 and up; wayfair.com. Lanterns: Minka-bronze finish, \$120 each; potterybarn.com.

## UNCOVER A CHARMER

Cheery colors and streamlined landscaping turned this once dreary boardwalk in Austin, Texas, into the coolest house on the block. Builder Royce Flournoy preserved most of the 1939 cottage's original wood siding and updated it with fresh paint. All the limestone chimney needed to restore its textured look was a good power-washing and a new cap. Seeking privacy on this wide corner lot, Flournoy enclosed a section of yard with a well-laminated cedar fence, running the 1-by-2-inch slats horizontally to echo the clapboard siding. Playing off the original trim beneath the porch windows, a new front door features a lower panel detail that is an exact match. The limestone gravel terrace edged with Winter Gem boxwood is water-wise and easy-care.

## IDEAS TO STEAL

**PAINT:** Flournoy gutted the entire modern cottage, but he wanted to mix a classic combo of cheery colors. Instead, he went with a zingy green. Paint: Iron Mountain (body) and Pale Ivoryette (accented shutters), about \$50 per gallon. [karpenterhouse.com](http://karpenterhouse.com). Opposite (front): \$35 per gallon; [popdirtsloughworks.com](http://popdirtsloughworks.com).

**SLATTED DETAILS:** The new fence is made from 1-by-2-inch clear western red cedar that will fade to a soft gray under its hat to the limestone chimney. The front porch railing is made from local, pre-cut recycled plastic. Similar to shown. Cedar slats, 50 cents per linear foot; lower rails, Highway Hardware. 4-Foot Porch Swing, \$325; [amazon.com](http://amazon.com).

**LANDSCAPING:** Rectangular slabs of poured concrete set into the crushed gravel terrace are a budget answer for a stone-slab walkway. For a true limestone effect, look for a true desert native that is totally shade tolerant and requires less watering. [Amaranthus-St-Aurora.com](http://Amaranthus-St-Aurora.com). \$225 per pallet (covers 450 sq. ft.). [karpenterhouse.com](http://karpenterhouse.com).

## LET IN THE LIGHT

Having to scratch down to see out front, windows blocked by a low-pitched roof gets old fast. Just ask the owners of this 1920s house, a once-dim tiny Cape in Takoma Park, Maryland, that they transformed into a Craftsman-style cottage. Looking for more square footage, the homeowners turned to architect Shawn Buckler to add on in back and give the front rooflines an overhaul too. The result is an open porch with a gable and roof featuring a unique slatted design that echoes the porch railings. Local codes restricted the new porch to a depth of 9 feet, but the airy design makes it feel larger—and brighter too. To add interest to the faux-slate roof, Buckler created a patterned inlay accent. A house that was "sort of weird" is now a storybook showstopper, right at home in a historic neighborhood of bungalows.

## IDEAS TO STEAL

**PORCH:** The roof is a take on a classic Craftsman-style gable design, with railings and an open gable detail constructed of 1/4-by-4-inch wood slats. While appearing to support the porch rail, the anchoring brackets are actually hollow PVC bolts, in one the tapered columns built around 4x4 structural posts.

**ROOF:** Synthetic slate has a lighter weight, negating the need for no structural support. It's easier to trim and costs about one-third less.

Generating the inlay's layout on a computer first (you could do the same on graph paper) sped up installation and helped cut the cost. Majestic Slats, \$37-\$59 per sq. ft., installed [scottmfc.com](http://scottmfc.com).

**PAINT:** Emulating the design rule of three, a clay red accent color is repeated three times: on the roof tiles, on the lower edge of the slatted gable and at the base of the columns. This highlights key features and keeps the eye traveling from the rafters of the house to the top porch. White Eggs and Woodwork (Ochre Green), and Rockwood Terra Cotta (accent), \$55 per gallon; [shawnbuckler.com](http://shawnbuckler.com).



## USE COLOR TO PLAY UP DETAILS

Hidden behind a stand of ailing century-old trees, this magnificent 1870s Italianate, in Berks County, Pennsylvania, had seen better days. Four previous owners had left their mark on the place—primarily in the form of paint and neglect. Intricately carved moldings, paneled shutters, and fretwork had disappeared under a thick crust. Rampant climbing ivy had damaged large sections of brick. Working with local craftsmen, homeowner Brett Youmans repaired the crumbling porch posts, soffits, and 14 decorative corbels, all victims of water damage. Meticulously scraped and patched, the 12-foot-tall porch and 8-foot shutters are now painted in a handsome display of warm and cool grays that show off the home's unique architecture.

### IDEAS TO STEAL

**PAINT:** After sampling more than two dozen colors, Brett chose a striking combination of *Sole White* for the body and porch columns, and three shades of gray. (See left) *Network Gray* (shutter panels) to medium *Web Gray* (porch floor) to dark *Cyberpace* (trim). About \$20 per gallon; shuman-williams.com

**FRONT DOOR AND CEILING:** The restored double front doors pack a welcome punch of color with a custom shade of red. Pale blue, true to the period, accents the ceiling. Similar to show *Melrose Red* (door) and *Glossier Blue* (ceiling). \$40 per gallon; benjaminmoore.com

**LANDSCAPING:** "Sometimes you add by subtracting," says Brett. Removing a stand of trees allowed sufficient light for a new lawn. Shapely evergreen shrubs—anew at high, low maintenance hedges and boxwoods—line the porch. Short, Red Wing dogwoods whose crimson stems add winter interest, dot a new walkway to the left of the house leading to the driveway.

## WARM UP A COLD FACADE

What a difference a wash of lime-white can make. As impressive as this 1926 French Eclectic house was, the monotone monolith of red brick lacked detail, depth, and warmth. Reimagined by architect Jeremy Corkern, the Charlotte, North Carolina, home finally got the elegant patina it deserved. The front door is a 9-foot-tall arched limestone frame, now a dramatic focal point, and the divided lights of the French doors echo the existing windows. Against the pale facade, the gray slate hipped roof and the multiple-flue chimney pop, and shutters that looked drab in harsh black now blend in, painted a warm white. Replacing a standard window with a custom bay inset with wavy restoration-style glass added major oomph.

### IDEAS TO STEAL

**PALE PALETTE:** True limestone is a centuries-old type of rustic paint made of slaked lime, water, and pigments off the shelf products create a similar patina. The finished here was done with diluted white latex paint, mixed with sand and applied in a couple of coats using a horsehair brush and a brush-pig for texture. An experienced painting contractor can help choose the best option for your house, depending on the color and condition of the existing brick. Porter & Paint's Lime Wash, \$200 per gallon; shopcompany.com. The other subtle colors at play here: warm

white limestone (trim and window shutters) and pale green Arctique (door shutters). \$60 per gallon; shuman-williams.com

### DOOR AND BAY WINDOW

Corkern designed an oversize arched limestone entry door, cased with 7-foot French doors, and added glass to height that balance the towering walls. The pointed molding around the custom bay window mirrors the visual weight of the front entry.

**LANDSCAPING:** The three shrubs on the right and lone shrub on the left are an example of asymmetrical balance. The simplest way to achieve it is with the 3-plus-2 arrangement shown here. Works well with planted pots too. ■

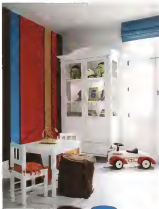

# <ALL ABOUT> Shade Trees

They aren't fast growing, but these majestic beauties are worth the wait. Plant one to boost property values, lower energy costs—and leave a lasting legacy. BY LINDSEY KILGER

**OWNING A HOUSE** means putting down roots, and nothing underscores that notion like planting a large tree whose leafy embrace will shade your home and yard. We're talking about oaks, elms, maples, beeches—trees that can live for a century and whose names conjure small-town streetscapes and back-yard picnics. Such a tree is an investment in the future. It may grow in a twig, but as you watch it grow, its canopy spreading and its trunk thickening as it rises toward a full height of 50 feet or more, it will seem to feel like a member of the family.

There are practical reasons to get in on one of these trees, too. Their deeper roots reduce the likelihood of backing pavement, and their strong branches act as less prone than spindly specimens' to break under stress from wind or snow. Properly placed, they can keep a home cooler in summer and warmer in winter, taking as much as 25 percent off utility bills. Plus, when it comes to curb appeal, a mature shade tree can boost property value by as much as 20 percent.

We've narrowed the choices down to six species, all beloved for their looks, longevity, and low maintenance. And spring is an ideal time to plant. The key to success? Putting the right type of tree in the right spot, where it can spread out unimpeded. Read on for our guide to selecting, planting, and caring for a shade tree that will grow straight and tall—and enrich the landscape for generations to come.



Permanent roots anchor a tree to the ground, while temporary feeder roots carry water and nutrients to leaves, branches, and flowers. All healthy, well-shaped trees have a balanced canopy and a single strong leader.



## VITALS

**HOW MUCH DO THEY COST?** A young tree, shipped with no branches, starts at \$40. A 2-year-old specimen goes for \$200 and up. A first-grown tree without 2-inch diameter trunk can range from \$100 to \$1,000.



**WHEN TO PLANT?** In general, most are best planted in spring or early fall so that strong roots develop before winter weather sets in. Plant bare-root trees, ideally April to May.

**BUY OR HIRE A PRO?** It's easy to plant a 100-pound potted tree. But one weighing 300 pounds? Call in a pro. An arborist or nursery employee is usually included for trees with a trunk diameter of over 2 inches.

**HOW MUCH CARE?** Newly planted trees need supplemental watering and pruning for the first three years, then only as needed.

**HOW LONG DO THEY LIVE?** About 50 years or longer, often 100-plus years.

A large deciduous shade tree, such as oaks, which can reach a height of 30 feet, provides a focal point in the landscape.

## Pick a tree

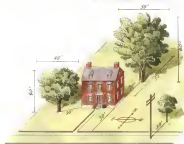

## GIVE IT ROOM TO GROW

Too big a tree in too little space is an all too common problem. A tree that's oversized for its site can damage a house's roof or foundation, impinge on power lines, and encroach on a neighboring property. Carefully consider a specimen's size at maturity—and believe that it will grow that big. A typical 55-foot-deep backyard can accommodate one large shade tree planted at least 20 feet (or about half the width of its mature canopy) from the house and 5 feet from the sidewalk in a typical front or side yard, about 30 feet deep. Select a medium-size tree no taller than 40 feet and plant it at least 20 feet from a house's foundation. Around power lines, stick to a small tree, under 25 feet tall.



## TIME TO SAY GOOD-BYE?

Cutting down a 75-year-old tree—even if it's damaged, diseased, or causing havoc with paving—is a tough call. Before deciding, consult an arborist. A heavy limb that's leaning precariously may be saved with cables or bracing, one with dead and broken branches might be live with a good pruning. An arborist can assess whether a diseased tree is treatable or if changes in leaf color, development, or branch tip dieback indicate that it has to go.

## BUYING BASICS

Young trees are available three different ways. Here's what to look for.



**POTTED** For convenience, most folks buy three- to five-year-old trees sold in 15-gallon pots at nurseries or home centers. Shopped over, gently slip the tree from the pot's thick, solid mass of coaling roots in a bag sign. And if the tree's root collar is banded, don't buy it.



**BARE ROOT** Plant growers dig up white-barked trees at about 1 year old, then shipped. Smaller root trees can be a money-saving option. Look for multiple small, fibrous roots that are moist but not muddy. Plant within 72 hours or keep in a bucket of water until ready to plant.



**BURL AND BURLAP** Mature, well-grown trees are dug up with soil intact, then wrapped with burlap and sold at nurseries. Check for a strong trunk and a firm root ball. If the burlap is torn, roots might be broken. The root ball should be 20 to 30 inches. The burlap (burlap sheath) is secured with twine above the root collar.



## Plant it right

Roots spread outward so a wide, shallow hole that allows the root collar to sit 1 to 3 inches above the soil is best.

**FOR NOTED TREES:** Dig a hole with sides that flare outward, three times the width of the container. Carefully slide the tree from the pot. Prune any circling roots with fine vertical slices along the sides of the root ball. Add soil, keeping the root collar above the hole, and water.

**FOR BARE-ROOT TREES:** Soak overnight, then clip any damaged roots. Dig a hole 3 feet wide and 1 foot deep, mound soil in the center so that the root collar sits above grade. Place roots over the mound and fill in with soil. Water once to settle the soil, and water again.

**FOR BALL AND BURL TREES:** Dig a hole as deep as the root ball and five times wider to encourage rapid rooting. Move the tree into place. Add soil so the root collar is above the top of the hole. Remove any wire, oval, and burlap. Fill with soil and water thoroughly.

## PEST ALERT

They chew, they suck, they bore: insects are among the worst scourges affecting deciduous trees. Some are species-specific while others are less discriminating. Here's how to address the damage.



**► Emerald ash borer** *Homocidus asperatus*  
Bark-eating sawfly-grass borer, larvae feed on inner bark, eventually killing infested ash trees.  
**FIX:** Have a pro apply systemic insecticide, even to healthy trees.



**► Asian long-horned beetle** *Anoplophora glabripennis*  
Bark-long, black beetle with white spots, larvae tunnel into maple, yellow, and elm heartwood.  
**FIX:** Notify, remove infested trees.



**► Gypsy moths** *Porthos dispar*  
Dark, hairy-spined caterpillars up to 2 inches long damage the branches of many types of trees.  
**FIX:** Too widespread to eliminate entirely. Aerial spraying with pesticides can lower the population.



**► Agedash tree pest** *Agathidium*  
Different colors that affect many tree species. Sucking damages leaves, leaving leafy-like scars. Encourage sooty mold.  
**FIX:** Ignore risk; infestations, treat with a targeted pesticide.



**► Tree collar borer** *Phoradendron*  
Fuzzy, 2-inch long caterpillars infest any tree species. Feeding leaves long, thin holes.  
**FIX:** Ignore, and let natural predators, including birds, rodents, and lizards, go at them.

## Pruning 101

On a young tree, you prune to create a balanced, well-spaced canopy.

**YEARS 1-5** Prune to encourage a single leader and cut out winter sprouts and suckers. Remove branches that create a weak or narrow crown or angle the trunk sharply. As the tree grows taller, remove branches on the bottom third of the trunk.

**5-PLUS YEARS** Remove damaged, diseased, or crossed and rubbing branches. Also prune to create better branch spacing.

## SIX TO SKIP

They're showy and fast growing, but these trees are a headache in the making.

**► QUAKING ASPEN** *Populus tremuloides*  
The most widely found tree in North America, its roots spread approximately 100 feet from the trunk.

**► NORWAY MAPLE** *Acer platanoides*  
Invasive throughout the Northeast and Midwest, strong shade, sap flow, roots suck and buckle sidewalks.

**► SWEET GUM** *Liquidambar styraciflua*  
Common in the Southeast, this tree has an invasive root system and filters pollutants and streets with sticky, sticky fruit fall through water.

**► MULBERRY** *Morus nigra*  
Invasive, it grows many berries, is spread by birds throughout the eastern U.S.

**► BLACK WALNUT** *Juglans nigra*  
Black walnuts make surrounding soil toxic to many other plants.

**► TREE OF HEAVEN** *Ailanthus altissima*  
This tree is an invasive that spreads quickly and outcompetes other plants, especially in urban areas.

## Good neighbors

Shade trees often get a bad rap among gardeners because their leaves block sunlight and their roots take up lots of water, leaving the soil around them a wasteland. But suitable companions do exist, such as these dry-shade dwellers.



**BLEEDING HEART** *Lamprocarpa spectabilis*  
Zones 4-9  
Wooded perennial with fern-like foliage, showy heart-shaped pink to red flowers with white lines.  
Small white flowers on stems that rise 2 to 3 feet tall.



**FOAM FLOWER** *Claytonia virginica*  
Zones 4-9  
Native to the eastern U.S., this clump-forming perennial spreads by runners, making a thick 8- to 12-inch high carpet of green. Small white flowers on stems that rise 2 to 3 feet tall.



**HOSTA** *Hosta*  
Zones 3-8  
Well-maintained with showy foliage in blue, green, or white, hostas are a staple of the garden. They are a staple of the garden. They are a staple of the garden.



**JAPANESE ANEMONE** *Anemone hupehensis*  
Zones 4-8  
Native to China, this perennial sends up a clump of leaves in spring, followed by a showy display of white, purple, or white flowers on stems that rise 2 to 3 feet high that bloom in the fall.



## SAVING OUR NATIVE LANDSCAPE

The American chestnut was the dominant tree in the eastern U.S. until it was killed over a billion of them in the early 1900s. Once shaded streets and parks across the country, then, in the 1930s, came Dutch elm disease, a fungus caused by insect infestation. Now ash trees nationwide are at risk from the seemingly unstoppable emerald ash borer, an imported pest. But hope is on the horizon. Plant scientists at the U.S. National Arboretum have already bred and patented two disease-resistant elm varieties. And progress is being made on disease-resistant chestnuts. Crossbreeding the American ash with harder-related species is under way and may possibly restore this species to our neighborhood by the next decade.

**Q** How and when  
should I prune  
my shrub roses?  
—PAUL MCGUIER, DUNNING GA

**A** Rose pruning is best done in early spring, when forsythia starts blooming. Take a pair of sharpened bypass pruning shears – like the ones shown here, and remove any canes, or stems, that are dead diseased, or touching each other. Next, shorten the remaining canes by one-third or one-half, making each cut at a 45° slant, ¼ inch above an outward-pointing bud. Your shrub will have a nice, compact shape and a good start on producing lots of blooms this season.

While watching *TOH* TV recently, I saw Roger digging postholes with a tool I've never seen. Can you tell me what it is?

—JOE FORT BALTOGARDENS, MD

**ROGER COOK REPLIES:** That's my Bosch digger, and I often goaded looks when I go to use it. But after watching it in action for a few minutes, people quickly see how much easier it is to use than a typical post-hole digger with a scissor handle.

The Bosch digger has a long handle and shaft with a sturdy fixed scoop at its business end. About two-thirds of the way up the shaft, a short handle hinged to a steel rod controls a movable scoop. To dig, you fold the short handle up, pouring the movable scoop down, and close the fixed scoop on the ground. Then flip the short handle down to clamp the scoops together around the lower soil, and pull the digger straight up and out of the hole.

With this design, you can dig an 8-inch-diameter hole with straight sides nearly 4 feet deep. With a conventional digger, the scissor handles collide with the sides of the hole at about 18 inches down. To go any deeper, you have to make the hole wider, slowing down both the excavation and the backfilling process.

My digger, alternatively called an Eric digger, after the manufacturer, Simlar Inc. of Mahomet, Illinois, is sold online at [mugcoyagerhardware.com](http://mugcoyagerhardware.com). At \$435, it's a serious tool, tough enough to claw through any native rocky soil. That's more than I can say for the thin, exposed steel blades on most posthole diggers.

## Hot ground

The snow was melting and I was clearing my downspouts when I got a nasty electrical shock. Cautious, I got out my multimeter, which showed a 50-volt potential between the ground and the downspout. The ground itself was electrified (!) until I shut off the main breaker. What's going on?

**SCOTT GARDEN REPLIES:** You've got the electrical equivalent of a water leak, but far more dangerous. Call your power company immediately to fix the problem.

Somewhere downstream from the breaker, inside your house, an exposed hot wire is in contact with a ground wire or a conductor, such as a metal pipe, and is leaking stray voltage to the ground. This leakage, known as a ground fault, is more pronounced when the ground is wet.

Left uncorrected, this leak can speed up the corrosion of buried steel pipes and steel fence posts, and will jolt you if your electric is in the case area. Worst case, you run the risk of being electrocuted or having your house catch fire. Don't wait to make this call.

## Deep-freeding trees

After losing an old pine tree in my front yard, I'm determined to save its heir, which provides wonderful shade. One arborist says it needs "deep feeding," aka cost of \$1,000. Another says to use this old-fashioned tree such a treatment. What should I do?

—SYNANARDER CHANDLER, ARIZ.

**ROGER COOK REPLIES:** I believe that a tree in distress, no matter how old, can benefit from deep feeding. Having for miles injected through a hole about 6 to 18 inches into the ground, beyond the reach of greedy grass roots. But if your tree is healthy and pushing out plenty of needles every spring—it certainly looks to be in good shape in the photo—then deep feeding probably isn't necessary.

That said, your tree may benefit from some extra attention to its root system because trees on sidewalk locations are vulnerable to all sorts of stresses, such as soil, drought, car exhaust, and the like.

First, test the soil to find out exactly which minerals, if any, are lacking. Then, if ferns later in the season, spread it in early spring or early fall after removing any grass or mulch around the tree. At the same time, top dress the area with 1 to 2 inches of compost, and water it into the soil.

With a rake. Compost encourages the growth of beneficial organisms, so I hope that enhance the ability of roots to absorb nutrients. Finally, cover the soil with mulch, keeping it 3 inches from the trunk.

## Shingle color

I just had my garage sided with white cedar shingles. I want them to turn a lovely light gray. The shingled houses by the shore. Will misting them once a month with seawater do the trick?

**TOM SILVA REPLIES:** I don't know, it might. Seawater does discourage the mold that turns raw cedar black, but you will have to go on spraying indefinitely to keep sidewalk at bay. Not only that, the salt will kill foundation plants, and unless you had the foresight to use copper or lead flashing, and stainless-steel nails, it will corrode any exposed metal.

If we were my garage, I'd brush on Bleaching Oil (via [westcoast.com](http://www.westcoast.com)), a lightly pigmented oil soon with endogenous that gradually, over the course of a year, turns cedar shingles an even drierwood gray. **Cold blocks**

I have a 2950s brick Colonial with uninsulated concrete-block walls. Inside, the drywall is nailed to studs fastened flat against the block. How do I insulate walls with stud bays only 1 1/2 inches thick?

**TOMMYVA REPLIES:** You can't. And there is no effective way to fill the voids in an existing concrete block wall. Your only option is to cover the inside of the exterior walls with a continuous layer of insulation, as though you were insulating a basement wall. In fact, this would be a perfect application for InsulXtrix foam panels (insulxtrix.com), which I installed in the basement of the 2012 TOH TV project in Cambridge, Massachusetts. To see me using them, go to [showhouse.com/tv/2012](http://showhouse.com/tv/2012).

These tongue-and-groove panels are made of expanded polystyrene (EPS)—the same stuff that's in the cup that keeps your coffee hot—and are glued directly to the concrete block with a polyurethane adhesive. Drywall can be attached to these directly without the need for studs.

Your walls, in their present state, have an R-rating of about 3. According to the International Energy Conservation Code (IECC) for your area, masonry walls—ones made of thick block, brick, stone, or adobe—should be at least R-10. Adding 2 1/2-inch-thick InsulXtrix panels will bring your walls to R-13, 30 percent more than the IECC minimum.

Before you can install these panels, you'll have to do some demolition. Remove all the trim from the exterior walls—windows and door casings, trimboards, crown molding, you name it—and rip the drywall and mud off the block walls. Then, to account for the foam's additional thickness, add jamb extensions to

the windows and doors and cut around their openings.

Now, as you glue the panels to the exposed concrete blocks, leave a 1/4-inch gap at the floor and ceiling, and cut holes in the panels to fit around outlets and wall switches. After the adhesive cures, add extra-staple bracing to the outlets and switches, and spray foam into every gap—top, bottom, and around each hole. Install the drywall over the panels. Finish it, then replace the trim.

When you're done, I bet you'll see a welcome drop in your heating and cooling bills.

**Advice for beginning woodworkers**

I want to build and install basic cabinets, but I don't know how to use tools safely or how to join two pieces of wood together. Can you suggest any resources to teach the absolute beginner?

**MORRISSIAN REPLIES:** One mistake I see a lot of beginners make is to run out and buy a bunch of tools, particularly power tools. Simply owning tools won't magically make you a woodworker. I'm not saying you don't need tools, but you have to know how to use them properly, and the sequence of steps needed to complete a project, or it probably won't

turn-out well and you could get hurt.

I think it's better to educate yourself first. Books such as *Getting Started in Woodworking*, by Annei Fraser, and *Woodworking*, 101, by Joe Hurre Wapczarek, are a good introduction to the tools, terminology, and techniques of woodworking. You can also learn a lot by watching how-to videos like those on [thisoldhouse.com](http://thisoldhouse.com).

To gain hands-on experience, work with a friend who has tools and is handy. Or take an evening class at the local high school or community college. In that setting, you'll be able to work under supervision in a well-equipped shop, meet like-minded folks, and get helpful advice and encouragement. Classes taught at home centers also offer the chance to sit back and connect with people who enjoy wood working. Just be sure to sign up for introductory classes and start with easy projects, like the ones you want to do. If you enjoy the process, work your way up from there.

**Norm's tricks of the trade****What's the best way to fold a sheet of sandpaper?**

—CLARE MALLON, OCEANVIEW, NY

**A:** I didn't need to give much thought to how I folded sandpaper. But then I realized that if the abrasive were rubbed against another, the grit would be worn even before it reached work.

That's why I tore out the sheet in half across its width—rough side down to avoid dulling the knife (1)—and fold each half in thirds (2) so that only the smoothest backing touches the abrasive.

This keeps the side over which you rub the sandpaper smooth to hold sand for less time than a full sheet folded into sixths.

**THE HISTORY** When prominent businessman Jacob H. Hays passed away in 1896, he left quite a bequest for his wife, Sarah. Along with a cluster of furnishings and farm animals, he set aside a small fortune—and very precise instructions—to build her this sprawling 7,000-square-foot house, which she called it quite lovingly: The house was later purchased by Dr. C.D. Morgan, who briefly converted the building into a medical hospital for patients in town. In the years since, it was used as a nursing home as well as a private residence, and has sat vacant for several years.

**WHY SAVE IT?** The structure blends elements of Greek Revival and Federalist architecture, including a broad tray hane beneath the corner line and simple stone blocks above the windows. The interior has an elaborate quarter-round staircase and matching paneled throughout the vestibule. It also features carved mantels, built-in cabinetry, stained and leaded glass windows, and the original furnishings.

**WHAT IT NEEDS:** Structurally, the house is in good shape, with an intact brick facade and a sturdy stone foundation. A previous owner put on a new roof that installed a handful of new windows. The plumbing, electrical, and heating systems need complete overhaul. Call on a team of about 100,000 located 60 miles north of Columbus. The house was sought to be built back when it was built, and that's no less true today: whoever takes the renovation will own what is widely thought to be the grandest house around these parts.—MILL HOLT
